### U.S. climate report warns of extreme harm

Findings, at odds with Trump, say worsening weather, fires will smash economy, environment

WASHINGTON - As California's catastrophic wildfires recede and people rebuild after two hurricanes, a massive new federal report warns that these types of extreme weather disasters are worsening in the country. The White House report issued Friday also contradicts President Donald Trump.

The National Climate Assessment was written long before the deadly fires in California this month and before Hurricanes Florence and Michael raked the East Coast and Florida. It says warming-charged extremes "have

already become more frequent, intense, widespread or of long duration."

The report notes the last few years have smashed U.S. records for damaging weather, costing nearly \$400 billion since 2015.

The recent Northern California wildfires can be attributed to climate change, but there was less of a connection to those in Southern California, said co-author William Hohenstein of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"A warm, dry climate has increased the areas burned over the last 20 years," he said at a news conference.

The report is mandated by law every few years and is based on more than 1,000 previous research studies. It details how global warming from the burning of coal, oil and gas is hurting each region of the United States and how it affects different sectors of the economy, including energy and agriculture.

"Climate change is transforming where and how we live and presents growing challenges to human health and quality of life, the economy, and the natural systems that support us," the report says.

That includes worsening air pollution causing heart and lung problems, more diseases from insects, the potential for a jump in deaths during heat waves, and

### Black Friday scene at Sears: Stocked shelves and sentimental customers

Sales on Thanksgiving and Black Friday showed consumers are eager to open their wallets this holiday season. The question is how many are willing to open them for Sears.

Hoffman Estates-based Sears Holdings Corp., which filed for bankruptcy protection in October, isn't just trying to shake off its run of dismal holiday seasons. This year, the beleaguered parent of Sears and Kmart is trying to bring back shoppers to ensure a future for the company and some of its stores.

Friday got off to a slow start. When the recently remodeled Oakbrook Center Sears opened at 5 a.m., there was no line

outside the store and only a few

cars were in the parking lot. While the number of Black Friday shoppers at Sears stores was down — as expected — compared with last year, Chief Brand Officer Peter Boutros said that's in part because the day after Thanksgiving is not the kickoff to the holiday shopping season the way it once was

for all retailers. At Sears, Black Friday discounts started Thursday evening for most shoppers. Boutros said the company saw "good upticks" sales of men's, women's and kids' apparel, as well as strong demand for Kenmore

and Craftsman products. Now that retailers spread deals throughout the month of November and make many of the same discounts available online, there's less incentive to be at the store when doors open on Black Friday. Shoppers in the Chicago area and across the country appeared to head out to malls later in the day than in the

Online spending between Nov. 1 and Thanksgiving Day is up about 18.5 compared with the same period last year, according to data from Adobe, which tracks sales at the top 100

### **Eternal Indian restoration** gets some solid backing

Nearly \$600,000 raised to restore statue sitting over Rock River

The beloved but crumbling national landmark on bluffs overlooking the Rock River has been covered in a tarp once

The last time that happened, it signaled a largely bleak future for a giant statue that had helped draw 400,000 visitors a year to a

remote patch of north-central Illinois about 100 miles west of Chicago.

This time, the cover is a hopeful milestone for its rehabil-

Nearly \$600,000 has been raised to restore the 48-foot-tall, 270-ton concrete figure known as the Eternal Indian. An engineering firm has been chosen and a conservator is expected to sign a contract soon. Plans call for the 107-year-old statue designed by acclaimed sculptor

### Holiday stakes high for Sears

U.S. retailers. On Thanksgiving alone, consumers spent \$3.7 billion, up 28 percent from last year, Adobe said.

Even if Black Friday as a whole doesn't draw the frenzied crowds it used to, an estimated 164 million people still planned to shop between Thanksgiving and Cyber Monday, according to the National Retail Federation. Friday remains the most popular day during that period, drawing about 71 percent of those consum-

That's an opportunity for Sears to win back customers. Shoppers at local stores Friday found shelves full of merchandise and discounts, but not aisles filled with customers or the long checkout lines evident at some competitors. Even those who said they don't shop at Sears as often as they used to expressed sadness at the storied retailers'

Debbie Steimel, 60, of River Grove, had already stopped at Kohl's early Friday morning before coming to Sears in Oak Brook hoping to get ideas for holiday gifts.

She shops at Sears less frequently since her local store closed, but said she'd still miss the retailer if it doesn't make it through bankruptcy. She likes that Sears has "a little of everything." It's also the place where she grew up shopping, and where her parents brought her to visit Santa during the holidays.

"I'm a little partial, I guess," Steimel said.

Cicero resident Jayne Harrison, 62, was at the Chicago Ridge store early Friday to buy a pair of boots with a coupon she found

online. "They're not going to survive. I got these boots for \$5," Harrison joked.

Harrison and her friend, Cheryl Medley, 58, have been following Sears' struggles. The two women said Sears had been woven into their lives since childhood, and they said it's sad to see the chain struggle. Medley, of Oak Lawn, said her grandmother used to work at Sears and she would visit her at work. Harrison's sister worked there in high school.

Lockport resident Sherry Watson was carrying a pair of Levi's and sifting through stacks of plaid shirts in search of a gift for her husband.

Watson and her family have been coming to Chicago Ridge Mall every Black Friday for more than 15 years. They tend to follow the same itinerary: Park outside Sears, then hit that store and Kohl's before going to the other shops.

But the atmosphere is nothing like it used to be, when the crowds were thicker.

"Everyone is competing with Amazon, but we still like the shopping experience," said Watson, 54. "It's still an event for us. It's a family tradition."

Still, by about 11 a.m., the checkout line stretched nearly to the back of the store. Dozens of people were perusing the appliance section, opening microwaves and inspecting refrigerators. Some shoppers pushed around overflowing carts, and other lugged bags of bedding toward the exit.

At the Sears store in Schaumburg's Woodfield Mall, a steady flow of customers were browsing the aisles by 8 a.m. But the crowd at Sears was much thinner than in the rest of the mall, including in Macy's, where customers stood in lines as many as a dozen people deep in front of registers.

Kenosha resident Denise Dufern, 59, strolled through the clothing displays at Sears, but said she was just killing time while she waited for the auto center to finish installing her new tires. Dufern worked at the Woodfield Sears more than 30 years ago. Friday was the first time she'd been back in decades.

When she worked there, employees often had to park across the street from the mall or in a remote parking lot on Black Friday and weekends during the holidays. She had no trouble finding a spot close to the store Friday morning.

Eamon Griffin, 49, and his wife arrived at the Woodfield store with a page-long list of gifts to buy for their kids and relatives and hopes of scooping up particularly good bargains this year.

"It doesn't look like it's gone into bankruptcy," said Griffin, of Norwood Park, as he walked through the store. He did say, however, that he thought the store would be more crowded.

Industry watchers expect shoppers to open their wallets this season, pointing to high consumer confidence and low unemployment. Companies like Walmart, Target, Best Buy, Macy's and Kohl's reported growing sales headed into the holidays.

The rosy outlook is good news for a retailer hoping for strong sales, but it leaves one less excuse if it falls short.

Sears' situation is "clearly challenging," said Christina Boni, a vice president at Moody's Investors Service. Financing secured in bankruptcy will provide liquidity to keep the business going through the holidays, but the company will need to figure out what comes next, she said.

Sears told the Bankruptcy Court it believes it can avoid liquidation by reorganizing around a smaller group of profitable stores, which it intends to sell to a new owner that would continue operating the business. The company identified those 505 stores, including nine Sears stores and two Kmarts in Illinois, in a court filing late Wednesday.


The retailer got the court's approval last week to begin trying to sell its best-performing stores and outlined a timeline that would require finding an initial bidder by Dec. 15.

Sears has tried the "shrink to grow" strategy before, Boni said. It's possible that this latest round would leave a core group of stores that can succeed, but retailers that appear to be in better shape tend to be those with the scale and financial flexibility to invest in keeping up with customers' demands, she said.

To help get it through the holiday season, Sears has secured a commitment for an additional \$350 million in bankruptcy financing, which Boutros said bolstered his outlook.

"I'm optimistic and bullish that we're going to win the holiday, and that's going to put wind in our sails to come out of Chapter 11," he said.

### Demonstrators protest Roberson shooting

Group calls for economic boycott of Midlothian

About two dozen demonstrators marched a few blocks down Pulaski Road in Midlothian to the village's police station Friday to protest the Nov. 11 shooting of Jemel Roberson by a police officer.

"We came out on Black Friday to call for an economic boycott of Midlothian," Eric Russell, activist and co-organizer of the rally, said.

Roberson, 26, was working as security guard at Manny's Blue Room in Robbins and was trying to apprehend a gunman when Midlothian police arrived on the scene and shot him, police said.

State police have stated that Roberson wasn't wearing anything to identify him as a security guard, but several witnesses say that "security" was written on his

Activist Matt Harrington said Friday that protesters want the police officer, whose name has not been released, to be fired and charged and for the mayor and police chief of Midlothian to step down for allegedly trying to cover up the incident. Shouting chants, such as "Jus-

tice for Jemel" and "No justice, no peace, no racist Midlothian police," protesters also prayed for justice while placing their hands on the Midlothian Village Hall

Midlothian police stopped traffic temporarily on Pulaski Road to allow the protesters to cross the street and had monitored them in front of the village hall.

Along with activist Tio Hardiman, who also attended Friday's rally, Harrington and Russell helped organize a Black Friday protest along Michigan Avenue in Chicago three years ago to protest the 2014 killing of Laquan McDonald after the release of police video of his shooting.

Although not as large as that protest, Russell said they were trying to bring attention to the fact that many Robbins residents shop in Midlothian and a boycott is needed to motivate officials to act. The marchers were joined by Roberson's girlfriend and mother of their 9-month-old son.

Harrington said other demonstrations are being planned for some time after Roberson's funeral on Saturday.

### Post-holiday challenge: Here comes the snow

Expected storm to affect Sunday travel

As families finish off the last of their Thanksgiving leftovers over the weekend, it may begin to look a lot like Christmas in the Chicago

A snowstorm is expected to hit Sunday, possibly bringing several inches of snow before Monday morning, with even higher amounts expected north and west of the city, according to the National Weather Service.

A winter storm watch has been posted for Winnebago, Boone, McHenry, Ogle, Lee and DeKalb counties west and northwest of Chicago, where more than 6 inches of snow could fall during the day Sunday, according to the weather

Gusty north-northeast winds will cause blowing and drifting snow and make for treacherous travel conditions.

Travelers should be prepared for slick roads, poor visibility and increased travel time as they head home after the long holiday weekend, the weather service said.

"This couldn't happen at a worse time," said Charles Mott, a meteorologist for the National Weather Service.

The city of Chicago is not under the storm watch, but forecasters said that could change as the low pressure system tracks closer to

"There is still plenty of uncertainty with this storm, especially with the winds coming off Lake Michigan, where water temperatures are in the 40s," said weather service forecaster Ricky Castro. "The ultimate track of the storm will determine who gets what."

As of Friday, Chicago had received 3.6 inches of snow in November — a half-inch above average for this time in the month, Mott said.

Current forecasts predict the coming winter to be a relatively standard one in terms of temperature and snowfall, he added.

'If there's any kind of trend, it's colder," Mott said. "If there's any kind of trend, it's toward the snowier side."

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### Village Music Store nears its final note

Patrons fondly recall Deerfield institution slated for demolition

Generations of North Shore residents from well-known musicians like Richard Marx to local teens looking for a hobby learned some of their skills at Deerfield's Village Music Store. The store closed this year with the retirement of 50-year employee Lana Rae.

The former Deerfield home that housed the music store for decades soon will be torn down to make way for potential new development.

While the building might soon be gone, memories of music lessons and creaky stairs are still fresh in the minds of local residents.

Rae, who started working at the store and studio a year after it opened on Osterman Avenue, kept it operating after the death of its founder, Bob Gand, in 2014.

The business got started when Bob Gand's wife, Myrna Gand, said she wanted a guitar for her birthday in 1962, according to Gale Gand, their daughter and a celebrity chef.

He bought the guitar for his wife, who had another use in mind.

"She hung it on the wall," Gale Gand said. "It was art over the couch. Dad was bummed. He decided he was going to learn to play it."

As Bob Gand was developing his guitar skills in his Deerfield home, the neighbors started to hear the sounds of his practice sessions.

Rather than complain about the noise, Gale Gand said the neighbors had a different idea. They wanted to learn to play too. "They came over on Monday night and he started teaching them," Gand said. "He stayed about six months ahead of his students.'

Soon the lessons started taking over the house. Bob Gand got a room at Deerfield's American Legion Hall and continued to give lessons there. He continued his job as a sales executive for a lighting company.

"He put on a suit and wingtip shoes every day and went to work," Gale Gand said.

Then one day in 1967, the family got a surprise. Bob Gand said he was going to quit his job and make music a full-time gig.

He bought an old house on Osterman Avenue just west of Waukegan Road in downtown Deerfield and opened up shop. A year later, the business was going well enough for him to hire Rae in 1968.

While many people learned to play guitar from Gand, Rae and other teachers at the Village Music Store, his creativity was often at its best when he had to quickly figure things out.

Gale Gand, who started working in the store as a youngster, said she remembers when a man called the store and wanted to know if he could learn to play bagpipes. She said Rae took the call. "She said, 'Bob, I need you to learn to play the bagpipes," Gale Gand said. "We have a student who will be here Thursday. Be ready.' '

Rae said the store has a lot of special memories for her. Along with music lessons, there were more than 5,000 scores of sheet music and supplies for guitars. Music teachers from around the North Shore came to shop and

"It was like stepping back into the '60s." Rae said. "The customers loved it. It was a lot of nostalgia. It was more than a store. It was the camaraderie with all of my customers. We would talk about what was going on in their world."

Elissa Delman, a Deerfield resident, took guitar lessons at the store when she was a third-grader.

"I loved it," Delman said. "It was awesome. It was in a room with five people. I remember the creaky wood floors." Delman's sister, Marnie Schindler, who now lives in Riverwoods, also took guitar lessons at the store from Lana Rae.

"I would walk up the creaky stairs to the practice room for my lesson," Schindler said. "It was a really comfortable place."

For the Gand family, music went beyond the store. Bob Gand started the Gand Family

They would pack the family in the car and tour when Gale Gand was young. She remembers Montreal's world's fair in

The village of Deerfield purchased the property on Oct. 18 to preserve the site for future development.

Village officials expect the house to be demolished by the end of the year.

### Nearly \$600K raised for Eternal Indian statue restoration

Lorado Taft to be completely restored by August.

I'm "pleasantly surprised and grateful," said Jan Stilson, a resident of Oregon, Ill., near the statue's home, who organized a local group to restart a restoration that had stalled about three years ago. "Some say it was divine intervention. Other people call it karma. Everything just lined up."

The latest restoration of the statue — informally known as Black Hawk, the Native American leader in the 1832 war that bears his name — received its most significant boost when the Illinois legislature agreed earlier this year to a capital budget that included \$350,000 for the effort.

"That was a game-changer," said Illinois Conservation Foundation Executive Director Eric Schenck. The nonprofit has partnered with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources on the work. "It created an incentive for private money to come forward."

A few weeks after the state money was secured, Oregon manufacturer E.D. Etnyre & Co., which provided equipment for the original construction of the Eternal Indian around 1910, contributed \$100.000.

In addition, Oregon resident Kim Smeja donated \$20,000. Several banks in the region gave a total of \$14,500, and fans of the statue from California to Virginia offered financial help and expertise, Schenck and Stilson said.

Schenck credited local residents for "banding together" and state Rep. Tom Demmer, a Dixon Republican, for raising the issue in the legislature. Demmer also helped coordinate early meetings between local advocates and state agencies.

The first meeting occurred in March. By then, work on the statue that began in 2013 had been stalled for two years, after a disagreement arose between the conservator and engineers over how much of the statue should be replaced. Then state funding that had been promised failed to materialize.

In 2015, Landmarks Illinois placed the Eternal Indian on its annual list of the state's most endangered places. Early the next year, work stopped and the statue was covered in plastic to slow its deterioration.

"I couldn't stand to see it

wrapped one more year," recalled Stilson, an Oregon writer and historian. "I had to do something."

She recruited others in the area for what became the Black Hawk Restoration Team. After overcoming initial skepticism from the earlier, failed restoration, many in the community wanted to help, Stilson said.

"I think people were worried about this," she added. "They were ready to put their shoulders to the grindstone and finish the job."

Thought to be the secondlargest concrete monolithic statue in the world, the Eternal Indian drew international headlines when it was dedicated in 1911. Taft, who also designed the Fountain of Time on Chicago's South Side and Alma Mater statue at University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, intended the sculpture to be a contemplative homage to Native Americans, who have a rich history in the region.

Although it is often referred to as Black Hawk, the statue looks nothing like him. It does, however, bear a close resemblance to Pulitzer-prize-winning writer Hamlin Garland, a friend of Taft who resided at the Eagle's Nest Art Colony that existed near the statue site. Taft helped establish the colony after the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago.

Despite at least two restorations, the statue deteriorated extensively.

Last spring, supporters of resuming restoration persuaded the state to pull off the wrapping to generate more enthusiasm for the renovation and draw visitors to the statue, which stands in Lowden State Park. Stilson acknowledged that she remains concerned that a disagreement similar to the one that derailed the earlier restoration may occur this time.

But state officials, local supporters, the engineering firm Simpson Gumpertz & Heger Inc. and the conservator Quality Restorations Inc. have been meeting regularly to monitor and update progress, she said.

"It's a faith thing," Stilson said.
"We're all hoping for the best but
we have no firm guarantees, and I
think everybody's a little antsy
about that."

Schenck said he was confident that both companies' extensive experience and detailed communications with each other would guard against a repeat of the earlier breakdown. If all goes well, work could begin in earnest next nring

Frank Rausa also counts himself as an optimist. In 2008, he and his wife, Charron, undertook fundraising that led to the 2013 restoration launch.

Lack of state funding was the primary setback then, Rausa said. He also noted that relationships among the organizations and supporters are stronger this time than in the last restoration.

Despite his excitement, Rausa, 76, of Rockford, said the new effort is bittersweet. Charron Rausa died in 2016.

"I wish all this would have happened earlier," Rausa said of the renovation. "But I'm sure Charron's happy now that it's going to be done."

nastier allergies.

"Annual losses in some economic sectors are projected to reach hundreds of billions of dollars by the end of the century — more than the current gross domestic product (GDP) of many U.S. states," the report says. It'll be especially costly on the nation's coasts because of rising seas and severe storm surges, which will lower property values. And in some areas, such as parts of Alaska and Louisiana, coastal flooding will likely force people to relocate.

"We are seeing the things we said would be happening happen now in real life," said another co-author Katharine Hayhoe of Texas Tech University. "As a climate scientist it is almost surreal."

And Donald Wuebbles, a co-author and University of Illinois climate scientist, said, "We're going to continue to see severe weather events get stronger and more intense."

What makes the report different from others is that it focuses on the United States, then goes more local and granular.

"All climate change is local," said Pennsylvania State University climate scientist Richard Alley, who wasn't part of the report but praised it.

While scientists talk of average global temperatures, people feel extremes

more, he said. "We live in our drought, our floods and our heat waves. That means we have to focus on us," he said.

The Lower 48 states have warmed 1.8 degrees since 1900 with 1.2 degrees in the last few decades, according to the report. By the end of the century, the U.S. will be

pending on how much greenhouse gases are released into the atmosphere, the report warns.

Outside scientists and officials from 13 federal agencies wrote the report. It was originally scheduled for December. The report often clashes with the president's past statements and tweets on the legitimacy of climate change science, how much of it is caused by humans, how cyclical it is and what's causing increases in recent wildfires.

Trump tweeted this week about the cold weather hitting the East including: "Brutal and Extended Cold Blast could shatter ALL RECORDS -Whatever happened to Global Warming?"

Friday's report seemed to anticipate such comments, saying: "Over shorter timescales and smaller geographic regions, the influence of natural variability can be larger than the influence of human activity. Over climate timescales of multiple decades, however, global temperature continues to steadily increase."

Releasing the report on Black Friday "is a transparent attempt by the Trump Administration to bury this report and continue the campaign of not only denying but suppressing the best of climate science," said study co-author Andrew Light, an international policy expert at the World Resources Institute.

During a news conference Friday, officials behind the report repeatedly declined to answer questions about the timing of its release and why it contradicts public statements from Trump.

Trump, administration officials and elected Repub-

3 to 12 degrees hotter delicans frequently say they can't tell how much of climate change is caused by humans and how much is natural.

Citing numerous studies, the report says more than 90 percent of the current warming is caused by humans. Without greenhouse

gases, natural forces - such as changes in energy from the sun — would be slightly cooling Earth.

"There are no credible alternative human or natural explanations supported by the observational evidence," the report says.

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

### Corsi talks to Mueller about plea deal

Trump associate says developments could come soon

WASHINGTON - Conservative writer and conspiracy theorist Jerome Corsi is in plea negotiations with special counsel Robert Mueller, according to Corsi and another person with

knowledge of the talks. The talks with Corsi — an associate of President Donald Trump and GOP operative Roger Stone - could bring Mueller's team closer to determining whether Trump or his advisers were linked to WikiLeaks' release of hacked Democratic emails in 2016, a key part of his long-running inquiry.

Corsi provided research on Democratic figures during the campaign to Stone, a longtime Trump adviser.

For months, the special counsel has been scrutinizing Stone's activities in an effort to determine whether he coordinated with Wiki-Leaks. Stone and WikiLeaks have repeatedly denied any such coordination.

Stone has said that Corsi also has a relationship with Trump, built on their shared interest in the falsehood that President Barack Obama was not born in the United States.

Corsi confirmed the plea negotiations after they were first reported by The Washington Post on Friday.

"It's true. Your story is accurate," he said, declining to comment further except to say there may be developments next week.

Stone said in a statement that he was not aware of any plea discussions involving Corsi, describing him as an investigative journalist "whose activities I would think would largely be covered under the First Amendment."

Last week, Corsi said his efforts to cooperate with prosecutors had broken down and that he expected to be indicted on a charge of allegedly lying.

He described feeling under enormous pressure from Mueller and assured his supporters that he remains supportive of the president.

In a webcast and a series of interviews, Corsi said he had spoken to prosecutors for 40 hours and feared that he could spend much of the remainder of his life in


At that time, he gave no indication that he intended to plead guilty, instead casting himself as an unfairly targeted victim of a Mueller campaign against Trump.

Then, Corsi abruptly fell silent, canceling a scheduled Nov. 13 interview with

David Gray, his attorney, told NBC that he had just spoken to the special counsel's office and had advised Corsi to cancel.

Corsi has resumed talks with Mueller's team about a possible deal that could result in him agreeing to plead guilty in exchange for leniency, according to the person familiar with the

It is not clear what infor-

mation Corsi could leverage to get a deal with prose-

He told the Daily Caller

last week that prosecutors are focused on whether he had developed a source with inside information about WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange's plans.

Corsi said he did not have a direct source to the group. Instead, he said he developed a theory that Assange had access to hacked emails belonging to Hillary Clinton campaign chairman John Podesta and that WikiLeaks would release them in Octo-

He told the Daily Caller that he shared his prediction with many people, including Stone.

If Mueller could prove that Corsi learned about Podesta's emails from Assange or another person in contact with him, he could try to link WikiLeaks' releases to Stone or others in Trump's world.

Stone told the publica-tion that Corsi never relayed such information.

"He never told me that he had figured out or believed that John Podesta's emails

had been stolen," Stone said. On Aug. 21, 2016, Stone tweeted "it will soon (be) the Podesta's time in the

He has insisted his tweet had nothing to do with any plan by WikiLeaks and that it was based on research Corsi had provided to him about work Podesta and his lobbyist brother Tony had done involving Russia.

"He simply told me of their Russian business deals in banking gas and uranium," Stone said in a text message this week to The Washington Post. "There was NO WikiLeaks con-

Stone told the House Intelligence Committee in September 2017 that his Podesta tweet was "based on a comprehensive, early August opposition research briefing provided to me by investigative journalist, Dr. Jerome Corsi, which I then asked him to memorialize in a memo that he sent me on August 31st, all of which was culled from public records. There was no need to have John Podesta's email to learn that he and his presidential candidate were in bed with the clique around Putin."

Stone has since said that the information in the Aug. 31 memo – which he received 10 days after his now-infamous tweet — was similar to information that Corsi had relayed to him verbally before the tweet.

The prediction that Corsi said he made that Assange would publish Podesta's emails was correct: on Oct. 7, 2016, WikiLeaks began publishing 50,000 emails stolen from Podesta's account, releasing them in batches of a few thousand at a time each day leading up to the November election.

Corsi told the Daily Caller that he based his prediction on public sources of information, including the fact that Podesta was not among the Democrats whose emails had been published by WikiLeaks when the group released Democratic National Committee correspondence in July.

He said he concluded WikiLeaks must be holding back Podesta's correspondence to make a bigger splash later in the campaign.

Podesta did not work for the DNC and the emails were stolen from his private Gmail account.

### Pakistan: Attackers kill 4, target Chinese Consulate

Armed separatists say they're fighting against 'occupation'

KARACHI, Pakistan -Armed separatists stormed the Chinese Consulate in Pakistan's southern port city of Karachi on Friday, triggering an hourlong shootout during which two Pakistani civilians, two police officers and all three assailants were killed, including one who was wearing a suicide vest, Pakistani officials said.

The assault, claimed by a militant group from the southwestern province of Baluchistan, reflected the separatists' attempt to strike at the heart of Pakistan's close ties with major ally China, which has invested heavily into road and transportation projects in the country, including in Baluchistan.

The Baluch Liberation Army said it was fighting "Chinese occupation" and released photos of the three attackers.

In Beijing, Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said China would not waver in its latest big project in Pakistan - the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor — and expressed confidence that Pakistan could ensure safety. Still, China asked Pakistan to beef up security at the mission.

Authorities said the dead civilians were a father and a son who were picking up their visas for China. The consulate's diplomats and staff were unhurt and were evacuated to a safe place, senior police official Ameer Ahmad Sheikh said. A spokeswoman at the Jinnah Hospital said a consulate guard was wounded and was being treated

The attack began shortly after 9 a.m. when the consulate was open for business. The militants fired at consulate guards and hurled grenades, breaching the main gate and entering the building, said Mohammad Ashfaq, a local police

Pakistani security forces surrounded the area. Local TV stations broadcast images showing smoke rising from the building, which also serves as the residence

of Chinese diplomats and

other staff. "Because of a quick response of the guards and police, the terrorists could not" reach the diplomats, Sheikh said after the fighting ended. "We have completed the operation."

Geng said the attackers did not get into the consulate itself, and that the exchange of fire took place outside the building. The discrepancy with the Pakistani officials' reports could not be immediately recon-

Pakistani Prime Minister Imran Khan condemned the attack and praised the Karachi police and the paramilitary rangers for heir courage.

He ordered an investigation and vowed that such incidents would never be able to undermine relations with China, which are "mightier than the Himalayas and deeper than the Arabian Sea."

In a rare statement about attacks in Pakistan, neighboring India condemned the assault on the Chinese Consulate, saying that "there can be no justification whatsoever for any act of terrorism."

# American on trip to Indian island: 'I don't want to die'

Missionary wrote of meeting tribe before being killed

NEW DELHI - The American missionary, paddling his kayak toward a remote Indian island whose people have resisted the outside world for thousands of years, believed God was helping him dodge the authorities.

"God sheltered me and camouflaged me against the coast guard and the navy," John Allen Chau wrote before he was killed last week on North Sentinel Island.

Indian ships monitor the waters around the island, trying to ensure outsiders do not go near the Sentinelese, who have repeatedly made clear they want to be left alone.

When a boy tried to hit him with an arrow on his first day on the island, Chau swam back to the fishing boat he had arranged to wait for him offshore. The arrow, he wrote, hit a Bible he was carrying.

"Why did a little kid have to shoot me today?" he wrote in his notes, which he left with the fishermen before swimming back the next morning. "His high-pitched voice still lingers in my head."

Police say Chau knew that the Sentinelese resisted all contact by outsiders, firing arrows and spears at passing helicopters and killing fishermen who drift onto their shore. His notes, which were reported Thursday in Indian newspapers and confirmed by police, make clear he knew he might be killed.

"I DON'T WANT TO DIE," wrote Chau, who appeared to want to bring Christianity to the islanders. "Would it be wiser to leave and let someone else to continue. No I don't think so."

Chau, whose friends de-

scribed him as a fervent Christian, attended Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Okla. Before that he had lived in southwestern Washington state and went to Vancouver Christian High School.

Indian authorities have been trying to figure out a way to recover Chau's body after he was killed last week by islanders who apparently shot him with arrows and then buried his body on the beach.

A team of police and officials from the forest department, tribal welfare department and coast guard Friday launched a second boat expedition to the island to identify where Chau died.

The officials took two of the seven people arrested for helping Chau get close to the island in an effort to determine his route and circumstances of his death, according to a statement issued by police for the Andaman and Nicobar islands, where North Sentinel is located.

Chau paid fishermen last week to take him near North Sentinel, using a kayak to paddle to shore and bringing gifts including a football and fish.

"Since the Sentinelese tribespeople are protected by law to preserve their way of life, due precautions were taken by the team to ensure that these particularly vulnerable tribal groups are not disturbed and distressed during this exercise," the statement

The team returned later Friday.

The police and the coast guard had carried out an aerial survey of Northern Sentinel Island earlier in the week.

Officials typically don't travel to the North Sentinel area, where people live as their ancestors did thousands of years ago. The only contacts, occasional "gift giving" visits in which bananas and coconuts were passed by small teams of officials and scholars who remained in the surf, were years ago.

Police are consulting anthropologists, tribal welfare experts and scholars to figure out a way to recover the body, said Dependera Pathak, director-general of police on the Andaman and Nicobar islands.

Scholars know almost nothing about the island, from how many people live there to what language they speak.

Chau estimated the island had about 250 inhabitants, with at least 10 people living in each hut.

### Afghan official says death toll in mosque blast climbs to 27

KABUL, Afghanistan – An explosion ripped through a mosque inside an Afghan army base in the country's volatile eastern Khost province as Friday prayers were drawing to a close, killing 27 soldiers and wounding 57, the military said.

The blast may have been set off by a suicide bomber or a remotely detonated bomb but nothing was officially confirmed and details were sketchy. No group immediately claimed responsibility for the explo-

President Ashraf Ghani condemned the attack in a statement and also wanted to know how the army's security was breached.

The explosion came just days after a suicide bomber killed 55 religious scholars gathered in the Afghan capital, Kabul, to celebrate the birth of Islam's Prophet Muham-

### Judge rejects bias claim, won't toss Trump charity lawsuit

NEW YORK - President Donald Trump's claim that a lawsuit against his charitable foundation was motivated by political bias of the state attorney general's office was rejected by a judge.

New York State Supreme Court Justice Saliann Scarpulla on Friday denied a request from Trump and his foundation to dismiss the suit in which the president and his three eldest children are accused of engaging in a decadelong pattern of self-dealing and using the nonprofit's funds for political purposes.

The lawsuit is one of the most serious legal challenges facing Trump and his family. Unless an appeals court blocks the attorney general, the process of uncovering evidence will allow the state's lawyers to reach into the Trump family's financial dealings.

### Duck boat owner settles with Missouri family over accident

KANSAS CITY, Mo. – The company that owns a duck boat that sank on a Missouri lake in the summer, killing 17 people, has settled the first of several lawsuits filed in the acci-

William Bright, 65, and his wife, Janice, 63, were among those killed in the July 19 accident on Table Rock Lake. Their three adult daughters filed suit.

Adam Graves, an attorney for the family, said the

settlement with Ripley Entertainment was finalized Thursday, and that his clients were satisfied with the terms, which were not disclosed.

Three others named in the suit will remain defendants. They are Ride the Ducks International LLC, a division of Ripley; the captain of the boat, Kenneth Scott McKee; and the driver on land, Robert Williams, who died when the boat sank.

### Turkey says Trump 'turning a blind eye' to Khashoggi's killing

AMMAN, Jordan — For months, Turkish officials have been leaking gruesome details surrounding Jamal Khashoggi's death as a counter to President Donald Trump's moves to absolve Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, the Trump ally thought to be behind the Saudi journalist's slaying.

But Ankara took a more direct approach on Friday, with Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu slamming Trump for "turning a blind eye" in Khashoggi's death, and accusing him of putting money above human values.

Trump's statements in support of the prince mean that the president is saying, in essence, "'Whatever happens, I will turn a blind eye," Cavusoglu said in an interview Friday with CNN's Turkish affiliate, CNN Turk. "This is not the right approach. Money is not everything. We shouldn't abandon our humanitarian values."

Cavusoglu's rebuke echoes those from other Turkish officials, who have described as comical an exclamation-point-filled message this week from the president concerning reports that the crown prince ing.
"Maybe he did, maybe he didn't," Trump wrote Tuesday in a 633-word message, later adding, "In any case, our relationship is with Saudi Arabia." He also thanked the kingdom for its support against Iran and "keeping oil prices at reasonable levels."

Khashoggi, a onetime Saudi government insider who left the kingdom last year and became a U.S. resident and Washington Post columnist, disappeared after entering the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul, Turkey, on Oct. 2.

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman was in the United Arab Emirates on Friday, on his first tour abroad since the killing of Saudi writer Jamal Khashoggi at the kingdom's consulate in Istanbul.

The prince, who arrived

in Abu Dhabi late on Thursday, is also due to visit other Mideast countries, where it is expected he will be warmly received by Arab leaders who have stood firmly by his side amid international outrage

over Khashoggi's slaying.
The crown prince will round off his tour with a

stop in Argentina where he'll come face-to-face with world leaders on Nov. 30 for the two-day Group of 20 summit. Among those expected to attend that summit are Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, who has kept international pressure mounting on the kingdom.

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

### Sales tax on rise after court ruling

States can make more companies collect for online purchases

WASHINGTON Shoppers heading online to buy holiday gifts will find they're being charged sales tax at some websites where they weren't before. The reason: the Supreme Court.

A June ruling gave states the go-ahead to require more companies to collect sales tax on online purchases. Now, more than two dozen states, including Illinois, have moved to take advantage of the ruling, many ahead of the busy holiday shopping season.

"Will your shopping bill look any different? ... The answer right now is it depends," said Jason Brewer, a spokesman for the Retail Industry Leaders Association, which represents more than 70 major

Whether shoppers get charged sales tax on their online purchases comes down to where they live and where they shop.

Before the Supreme Court's decision, the rule was that businesses selling online had to collect sales tax only in states where they had stores, warehouses or another physical presence. That meant major retailers such as Apple, Best Buy, Macy's and Tar-

get were generally collecting sales tax from online customers. But that wasn't the case for businesses with a big online presence but few physical locations.

Now, states can force out-of-state sellers to collect sales tax if they're doing a fair amount of business in the state. That means retailers such as Overstock.com, home goods company Wayfair and electronics retailer Newegg can be required to collect tax in more states. Those companies were involved in the case before the Supreme Court, but a wide range of businesses from jewelry website Blue Nile to clothing and outdoor company L.L. Bean and electronics retailer B&H Photo-Video are also affected.

Before the Supreme Court's decision, Overstock was collecting sales tax in eight states. Now, it's collecting sales tax nationwide. Jonathan Johnson, a member of Overstock's board of directors, said a small number of customers reached out to ask about the change when it happened but the company now hasn't had a question about it in months. Wayfair, for its part, was collecting sales tax in 25 states before the decision. Now it's col-

lecting sales tax in 36 of the 45 states with a sales tax.

Where online shoppers live also can affect whether they're being charged sales

States had a strong interest in taking advantage of the Supreme Court's decision by passing laws or publishing regulations prior to this holiday shopping season if at all possible, said Richard Cram of the Multistate Tax Commission, which works with states on tax issues. Those that did have generally been following the lead of South Dakota, which brought the issue to the Supreme Court. South Dakota requires sellers who don't have a physical presence in the state to collect sales tax on online purchases if they do more than \$100,000 in business in South Dakota or more than 200 transactions annually with state residents.

Several states - Alabama, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Maryland, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, North Dakota, Washington and Wisconsin began enforcing their own requirements Oct. 1. And about half a dozen states will start in the next two

But a number of big states, including California, Texas, New York and Florida, do not yet have similar collection requirements in

As a result, consumers shopping online from those states and others that have yet to act may not be charged sales tax on some websites for a little longer. Online shoppers in those states — particularly those making expensive holiday purchases like televisions, computers and luxury goods — may be motivated to try to purchase from a website that isn't charging them sales tax. While that may look like a sweet tax savings, shoppers are generally supposed to pay the tax to the state themselves, but few do.

Still, it's getting harder to find sellers that aren't collecting sales tax online, said lawyer Eric Citron, who was involved in the Supreme Court case. And Citron said it will become even harder in 2019, with more states putting in place expanded sales tax collection requirements. States also have websites such as eBay, Etsy and Amazon in their sights.

Amazon collects sales tax when customers purchase goods it sells, but third-party retailers selling products on Amazon make their own sales tax collection decisions. Sellers on eBay and Etsy also make their own decisions. Now states are working to require those large marketplaces to collect taxes on behalf of sellers using their platform.

"States tend to use the powers that the Supreme Court gives them, especially when it comes to collecting taxes," Citron

### S&P 500 slides into correction again in '18

U.S. stocks closed lower after a shortened session Friday, bumping the benchmark S&P 500 index into a correction, or drop of 10 percent below its most recent all-time high in September.

Energy companies led the market slide as the price of U.S. crude oil tumbled to its lowest level in more than a year, reflecting worries among traders that a slowing global economy could hurt demand for oil.

"Oil is really falling sharply, continuing its downward descent, and that appears to be giving investors a lot of concern that there's slowing global growth," said Jeff Kravetz, regional investment director at U.S. Bank Private Wealth Management. "You have that, and then you have the recent sell-off in tech and in retail, and then throw on there trade tensions and rising rates."


Losses in technology and internet companies and banks outweighed gains in health care and household goods stocks.

Trading volume was lighter than usual with the markets open for only a half day after Thanksgiving.

The S&P 500 index fell 17.37 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,632.56. The index is down 10.2 percent from its last all-time high set Sept. 20. The last time the index entered a correction was in February.

### Can Metra and Lake County fix reverse commuter's plight?

Joe the Millennial likes living in Lakeview. He can hop on the Brown Line or take a quick Uber to meet friends at his favorite sushi bar in River North. He loves his jogs along the Lakefront Trail. He digs being within walking distance of his neighborhood Whole Foods and his favorite sports bar.

But what about getting to and from his job? Unlike many of his peers, Joe doesn't work downtown. He's part of a growing wave of millennials who live in the city but work in the suburbs. That means a grinding commute in his car on the Edens, a bumper-to-bumper, soulcrushing hell every morning and evening rush hour.

Joe's not alone. Increasingly, millennials who have been flocking to Chicago lofts and condos do their 9 to 5 at suburban locations. One destination: Lake County, where major pharmaceutical companies like AbbVie and Horizon Pharma look to bolster their ranks with young workers.

The region's transit system gets workers from the suburbs to downtown jobs, but schedules are far from ideal for reverse commuters. For someone who works at AbbVie and lives in the city, there are no morning outbound express trains to get them to the Metra station nearest to AbbVie, in Lake Forest.

Now, though, reverse commuters may be in line for some relief.

Metra is teaming up with Lake County governments and businesses to test reverse commute service to Lake County. The twoyear pilot project will run two reverse commute trains on the Milwaukee District North Line. Metra and Lake County businesses will split the cost — about \$1.4 million.

If you think exploring solutions for reverse commuters is a niche whimsy, think again. More than 400,000 people commute every day from Chicago to jobs in the suburbs, according to data from the Regional Transit Authority. An estimated 34,000 of them head to and from Lake County. Only 12 percent of the 400,000 use mass transit. The vast majority plop in their cars and endure bottlenecked expressways every day, twice a day.

We're long beyond the era when **suburbia** was a mostly residential expanse. Suburban Cook County has 1.1 million jobs, the collar counties another 1.3 million, according to the Illinois Department of Employment Security. Chicago, IDES says, has 1.2 million jobs.

So the pilot project in Lake County is a good start on a good mission. But we'd like to see more brainstorming.

One of the biggest challenges for reverse commuters is that last mile between the suburban train station and sprawling office parks or corporate campuses. A handful of big employers sponsor shuttle service planners should see where that solution can be expanded. And if Lake County's pilot is a hit, Metra and suburban leaders should consider expanding reverse commute train service.

Moving more reverse commuters off expressways and onto mass transit obviously takes cars off roads. In myriad small ways, that would lessen travel complications for everyone else. It also would save time and fuel.

American motorists wasted 7 billion hours because of traffic delays in 2015, three times the amount lost in 1982, according to researchers at Texas A&M University. And consider the amount of fuel wasted as those drivers languish in traffic -3.1 billion gallons in 2015, compared with 500 million in 1982.

Making commutes more palatable also turns a reputational drawback into a selling point, important for a metro area that continues to bleed population. If Lake County and Metra can better engineer the reverse commute, the rest of this region should get on track.

It is imperative that we teach all students their worth. It is imperative that Chicago Public Schools builds students and families up by encouraging them to dream big, audacious goals. This is not the message that is communicated to West Side families when there are no high school International Baccalaureate programs available on the West Side. In the same vein, it is not the message that is communicated when there are so few top tier (Level 1 or 1+) seats available at the high school level on the West Side.

Currently, if you live on the West Side, your child will almost assuredly be zoned to a Level 2 or Level 3 high school. Think about that. By not offering I.B. programs or more selective-enrollment options, we are telling West Side kids their dreams don't matter. Our students deserve the same opportunities as any student in more affluent neighborhoods in the city.

I currently live in Austin, and I grew up on the West Side. Since I've lived in the community, we have never had many options for students to access an accelerated curriculum. These options are either nonexistent or at capacity. I want to see all students in Chicago offered the same opportunities, no matter their ZIP code.

There should be at least one high school I.B. on the West Side, just as there should be an I.B. option available to all students citywide who want that curriculum. I implore the district to grant an I.B. program to Michele Clark High School, if it is the best fit, and I urge CPS to continue transparent planning in the future.

The touchstone of the glorious Disney animation renaissance, "Beauty and the Beast" had eight masterful songs by Howard Ashman and Alan Menken when it was released as a movie: the likes of "Be Our Guest," "Beauty and the Beast," "Belle" and "Human Again." So brilliant was this material that then-New York Times critic Frank Rich said that "the best Broadway score of 1991

had, in fact, belonged to a cartoon. As a result, Disney Theatricals essentially shoved human beings inside those inspired animated creations and stuck the movie up on stage a couple of years later. And it worked brilliantly - so brilliantly, in fact, that the Disney suits worried that it would impossible to replicate. Fortunately, Julie Taymor soon came along with another strategy

"Beauty and the Beast" remains a huge title at the box-office — but new directors with fresh productions have to face a lot of challenges, not the least of which is the audience's expectation that young theatergoing princesses will experience something comparable to

the movie and the original theatrical staging, both of which were much the same. This frustrates many artistes who want to bring new vistas to material, even though Disney won't let them change a word.

You can see these tensions on full

display in the new production at Drury Lane, directed by Alan Souza, whose last endeavor here was "Joseph." Anything but relaxed, this tense, invulnerable show fights many of the fantasy aspects of the title: There is no storybook castle, relatively little humor and only minimal romance. With the exception of the terrific

Bri Sudia's Mrs. Potts (a real bright spot), few of the characters ever smile – even Cogsworth the clock (Nick Cosgrove) and Lumiere the candlestick (Tony Carter) mostly are serious souls. Mark David Kaplan, who plays Maurice, fights this mood, but he's often undermined. There are some momentary exceptions. But the show takes its main cue from the cover art on the program,

an image dominated by gilded darkness. This all is about as far from a day-glo Disney breakfast with a princess as any

has an excellent Belle in Erica Stephan, an actress whose charm reaches out beyond the chilly concept, and I warmed, eventually, to Brandon Contreras' very intense Beast, although even when he transformed himself, it still felt like Belle would need to find a marriage therapist to make a go of their

But the Gaston stuff struggles here, partly because the show doesn't make vou relax and know that Belle will always be able to outsmart this jerk. I suppose a less-comic Gaston (he's played by Mark Banik) adds to the tension and the drama, but I'm not sure that's worth all the stress. It's just really hard to stage "Beauty and the Beast" like it's not a comedy-romance when it is, in fact, precisely that. In its DNA. Sure, there is fear and evil abroad. But it's a celebration of human resilience that even little kids are supposed to be able to embrace.

This "Beast" seemed determined not to traffic in the colors of the daytime it seems always to be dusk in this particular staging, which does not make enough use of its choreographer, Ron De Jesus. And — with all due respect to the overall creativity and risk-taking, the uniformly excellent singing from the entire ensemble and the truly epic costumes from Ryan Park — I deeply missed that sunlit image of Belle running through her beloved little French provincial town, reading books, trampling on idiots, loving her wacky dad and living her best life.

### Field Museum toasts Chicago beer with history exhibit

There are surely very few people who believe Chicago brewing started with Revolution, or even with Goose Island.

But it's one thing to know about the city's history of sudsfriendly German immigrants and of "tied houses," bar buildings bearing old brewery logos in the masonry and dedicated to serving those beers. It's another still to have the 19th-century history of Chicago beermaking laid out right before you, and in a reputable scientific museum and every-

That's the function — or one of the functions, anyway — of "Brewing Up Chicago: How Beer Transformed a City," the new exhibition that brings lagers and doppelbocks into the area of the Chicago natural history museum occupied mostly by dioramas of deer-like mammals and a few big

Early on, we learn, this was a whiskey town, or, more accurately, a whiskey trading outpost. But then came the German immigrants William Haas and Andreas Sulzer, arriving in the wee village of Chicago in 1835 with "enough equipment to found the city's first successful commercial brewery," the wall label says.

The show goes from those

founding days up to the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition, which had the Ferris Wheel and electric light, yes, but also apparently a whole lot of beer. Adolphus Busch of St. Louis and Frederick Pabst of Milwaukee competed "bitterly," the text says, to be named the fair's best. (Knowing what those beers taste like today, I might have argued for an adverb that isn't so suggestive of

Pabst won, but, we are told, it did not earn a blue ribbon. Still, there is an actual Pabst blue ribbon on display, an artifact that used to adorn the brand's bottles - it wasn't always served in tallboy cans - and is a loan from the Pabst Mansion museum in Milwaukee.

The most intriguing chapter looks at the Lager Beer Riot of 1855, which saw a temperanceminded mayor cracking down on saloons and the Germans gathering in protest. The upheaval, one day in April of that year, led to shots fired by police, multiple injuries, one dead German protestor, and, as a result, a repudiation of the Know-Nothing Party and its one-term mayor, Levi

Although hosted by the FIeld, the exhibit actually comes from the nascent Chicago Brewseum. That non-profit, being developed by Chicago beer-historianaround-town Liz Garibay, hopes to have a building of its own by

Garibay is known for giving beer tours through her History on Tap website and, earlier, via the Chicago History Museum. She co-crafted the wider reaching "Beer Chicago" exhibition that debuted at the Elmhurst Historical Museum in 2015 and then moved on to the Chicago Public Library.

The Field is an apt host for this new show. Many cultural institutions do tie-ins these days to craft beer, partly because it melds science and history and something logical to serve at events, partly because it's a pretty reliable way to get young adults in the door.

But the Field has opened its stein lid the widest. At its restaurant taps you will find two beers crafted in partnership with the museum by the highly regarded Chicago beermaker Off Color. They are: the (impeccable) dryhopped lager Tooth & Claw, with a drawing of Field T. rex specimen Sue as its logo, and Wari, a unique purple-corn ale inspired by what scientists have learned about ancient South American

"Brewing Up Chicago" cannot serve beer. But it does a very good job making sure the actual beverage gets a starring role here. In a series of placards we learn that Chicago brewing began with ales, because they were easiest to make. Then came the lager styles favored by the Germans. As brewing professionalized, more lagers came along, and the American style moved toward "lighter and clearer" versions than you'd find in the homeland. Later still in the century, the golden, easy-drinking Czech pilsners came along think Budweiser or PBR as versions thereof — and came to dominate American beer to this

This is not an exhaustive show. It occupies just one room, from which it serves up quick takes on the history it explores. But it's detailed enough to whet your whistle for a cold one, which you can grab over in the museum bistro, and for more information, which the Brewseum will serve up one of these days.

### 'Grey's Anatomy' showrunner makes her TV directorial debut

After nearly 20 years of making a name for herself as a TV writer and producer on shows as varied as "Charmed," "Private Practice," "Shameless" and "Grey's Anatomy," showrunner Krista Vernoff has added another credit to her IMDB file. She recently made her television directorial debut with one of the darkest and most powerful "Grey's Anatomy" episodes of the season, titled "Anybody Have a Map?

Vernoff spoke about making her television directorial debut. The following is an edited transcript.

#### Q: Have you always had ambitions to direct?

A: I went to Sundance one year, and I saw Jill Soloway's "Afternoon Delight." I was so moved by that film. Jill and I came up in television together. And I spoke with her after, and I said, "Look, I'm just so blown away. I see you in this film. I see your vision and your voice, so totally ... it inspires me to not want to hand my work over to somebody else to actualize, but I am afraid to try directing it." And she said, "So many women are afraid to try directing, because we're afraid of the technology. We think we need to speak lenses, and we don't."

She basically told me to stop handing my work to men, to actualize it. I went away really inspired, and knowing I wanted to at least try.

It came to me one day, like a hot flash, almost. This vision for this short film, and I ran inside and wrote it down in, like, 20 minutes.

I immediately emailed it to Abigail Spencer, who's an actress I've worked on several pilots with, and said, "I want to direct this.

Do you want to star in it?" And she said, "Yes." Within a month, I shot that short film, mostly in my living room. I financed it myself. For the first time in my career, I didn't have any studio or network, notes or intervention. I had no one to please but myself. I just was proud of it, like at a deep, deep cellular level, because it felt utterly mine. But that was three years

#### Q: What motivated the decision to direct an episode of "Grey's"?

A: When I came back to showrun "Grey's Anatomy," pretty quickly (executive producer) Debbie Allen said I needed to get my butt back in the chair. I resisted it.

Because shooting a short film in your own living room is a completely different beast than a television show.

#### Q: Did the episode you directed present any interesting challenges?

A: We had to design a whole other hospital for my episode, and a whole other visual look, because I was doing this episode that was more like a movie. It wasn't on our standing sets. I made this, ironically, as hard as possible for myself. Debbie tried to make it easier on me. She tried to assign me a different episode.

But it was hard. We were all over town. We didn't have our regular crew. But boy, did I get a great script.

#### Q: It's a pretty dramatic episodic directorial debut considering your goal has been to make the show lighter.

A: Yes, it's the most serious, and most dramatic episode we have this season, which is another reason I chose it. I worked really hard to make "Grey's Anatomy" a romantic comedy again.

I love to write comedy, and I love to watch comedy, but I know that comedy is much harder to direct. I knew that I could get honest, dramatic, emotional performances. I've directed in theater, I know how to do it. But if an actor is missing a punch line, and you're on an eight- or nineday schedule, I wasn't sure that I would nail that. I'll try comedy next time.

#### Q: The question on everyone's minds is the future of the show. Ellen extended her contract through at least Season 16. Have those conversations happened? What is your forecast right now?

A: I won't begin to plan the end of the show until Shonda (Rhimes) and Ellen (Pompeo) and ABC all sit me down and say this is the end of the show.



### Bothered by photos of boyfriend's ex

Dear Amy: What do you think about former in-laws continuing to display photos of ex-spouses? I'm a divorced mother of one child, and my boyfriend is a divorced father of two. We are both in our 40s.

My grandparents kept a photo of me, my ex-husband and our child in their living room after we divorced. While my ex and I get along well, I felt the photo was a little disrespectful to my boyfriend and uncomfortable for me, so I asked Grandma to take it down, and she did.

My boyfriend has been divorced for five years, after his wife left him. It was a very toxic situation and continues to be so. His mother still keeps dozens of photos of his ex all over her house - some with the ex-wife by herself and some with my boyfriend when they were married.

The one and only time I spent the night at his mom's house, over a holiday, my boyfriend told me he was sorry for the pictures. We slept in the spare room under a giant photo of him and his ex holding hands and running across the finish line of a race.

My boyfriend was quite embarrassed. His mom has no relationship with the ex. I assumed he would speak to his mother, but he hasn't. The photos are still there, and he doesn't invite me to her home as often.

He and I have been together for four years, and my relationship with his mom is lovely, if not particularly close. I'm guessing this kind of thing just doesn't register as a big deal to many, but I find it kind of thoughtless. What's your perspective? – Confused

**Dear Confused:** My

perspective is that a grandparent might display a photo of her child and an ex-spouse if the grandparents or grandkids are also in the photo. A giant picture of ex-spouses holding hands and crossing the finish line of a race should be put away.

I have been in situations where photos of exes cause a surprising amount of distress, namely to children recovering from a toxic divorce. When their parents don't communicate with each other or with former in-laws in real life, kids don't want to see an estranged parent completely erased, but they aren't always comforted by these reminders of how things were, once upon a time.

The only issue here is why you haven't communicated with your guy about this and why he hasn't communicated with his mother. You should convey to him, "Honey, I know it is not my mom and not my house, but I'm wondering if you've spoken to your mother about the photos of your ex she has on display? She may not realize that these pictures make us uncomfortable."

After that, you should work hard to let this go. It is her home.

Dear Amy: My boyfriend and I have been together for nine months. I waited several months before I told him about my past, which is horrible.

He is still struggling with the fact that I "lied" to him for so long. He is also uncomfortable with some of the details. What should

### Irish key: Winning 1 week at a time

Victory over USC would clinch berth in national semifinals

SOUTH BEND, Ind. - Linebacker Drue Tranquill compared Notre Dame's playoff quest to climbing Mount Everest.

"You look at a season at Notre Dame and you have to go 12-0 to put yourself in a position to go to the playoffs, most likely," Tranquill said Tuesday. "If you look at it and say, 'Dang, we have to go 12-0,' that's a daunting task. If you look at it like, We have to be 1-0 at the end of every week, it doesn't look as daunting.
"It's similar to climbing Everest.

If you look at it like, 'Dang, I have to climb 29,000 feet,' or whatever it is, it's going to look daunting and you're going to hurt yourself in the present moment in whatever you're doing. It's the ability to say, 'We have to win today. We have to win this week.' And then you find yourself in a position where you're 11-0 and vying for a spot in the College Football Playoff."

The third-ranked Irish (11-0) are on the verge of their first trip to the CFP. Only rival USC (5-6) stands in their way, and the teams meet Saturday night at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

"We've put ourselves in a posi-tion," Tranquill said. "We've put ourselves in a position through our offseason training, through our commitment and dedication to one another and our preparation this

"The guys have earned 11-0. The guys have earned a national game on television against USC to close out the season. We're ready for that moment and we're ready to seize it."

Coach Brian Kelly has been transparent with the players about what's at stake.

'Burying your head in the sand and avoiding all of it and not understanding what's going on is not the way we've been doing it all year," Kelly said. "We'll continue to make sure they're aware of the situation, and then we'll go back to

### Wretched 2nd quarter costly in latest defeat

Wade, Heat win after tossing up 32-13 edge in Bulls' sickly stretch

The competition for worst quarter of this Bulls campaign is fierce, but Friday night's second quarter will be a season-long contender.

Iowa did that last week (134) yards and trounced the Illini 63-0. Illinois gashed Minnesota (430), Nebraska (383) and Rutgers (330) and won two of the three. (Its defense was horrendous against Nebraska.) Northwestern is stout up front with tackles Jordan Thompson and Fred Wyatt, among others, and linebackers Blake Gallagher and Paddy Fisher are among the Big Ten's top 10 in tackles.

#### 2. More smart play from QB1.

Clayton Thorson had a sneaky great game against Minnesota. His 230 passing yards were blah, but he was hyper-efficient, completing 15 of 21 passes without an interception. His efficiency rating (163.4) and yards per attempt (11) were season highs, and he ran for a 13-yard score on a nifty option keeper. Thorson, the first player in Big Ten history to pass for 10,000 yards and rush for 20 touchdowns, joked: "Maybe people will start to appreciate that I'm a dual-threat quarterback." Coach Pat Fitzgerald said Thorson, who threw up shortly before kickoff in Iowa City, had been under the weather the week of the Notre Dame and Iowa games. He clearly now is at full strength.

#### 3. Let Illinois lose the game.

The Illini do all the things that losing teams do — commit penalties (64.3 yards per game), throw interceptions (13), lose fumbles (10), drop passes, blow coverage, etc. There's no guarantee they will keep screwing up Saturday, but the Wildcats have to give them every chance to do so.

#### **3 WAYS ILLINOIS CAN BEAT NORTHWESTERN** 1. Hope Reggie Corbin is heal-

The junior has taken only 10 handoffs in the last two games, and Illinois has suffered from it. He had just one carry in the 63-0 loss to Iowa, and the Illini had their second-worst ground production (134 yards) of the season. Coach Lovie Smith hopes Corbin is healed enough from an ankle injury to play in the season finale. He would be the most challenging athlete Northwestern has to contend with if he suits up and has his typical explosiveness (see: the two touchdown bursts of at least 70 yards at Minnesota). Corbin averages a Big Ten-best 8.8 yards per carry and has four 100-yard games and a 98-yard game on his stat sheet.

#### 2. Let AJ Bush Jr. keep Northwestern off balance.

Bush will be among the most mobile quarterbacks Northwestern has faced this season. He can be dangerous on the ground, especially when he combines with Corbin. He has four 100yard rushing games and eight rushing touchdowns. Northwestern will want to make him pass often. Many of his passes are off target (52.8 completion percentage, five touchdowns, nine interceptions), and nearly as many are dropped. But he has shown a knack for big passes. He has thrown for more than 200 yards iust twice in the seven games in which he attempted more than five passes.

### 3. Play with pride.

It's the last game of the season against a rival, and the Illini were just steamrolled at home by Iowa. Illinois is out of bowl eligibility. If the Illini want fans to remember this team for something other than blowout losses, they'll need to put up a fight. The seniors haven't beaten Northwestern. Here's a chance to end the season with something to feel good about.

### Oklahoma, Texas in Big 12 title game

Kyler Murray threw three touchdown passes and ran for a score, and Oklahoma scored two defensive touchdowns to beat West Virginia 59-56 on Friday night in Morgantown, W.Va., and earn a spot in next week's Big 12 championship game.

The Sooners (11-1, 8-1) survived a wild and mostly defenseless affair that featured 1,372 yards of offense to earn a rematch Dec. 1 in Arlington, Texas, against rival Texas, which beat Kansas earlier Friday. The Longhorns beat Oklahoma 48-45 on Oct. 6 in Dallas.

Oklahoma also kept its College Football Playoff chances alive, while West Virginia (8-3, 6-3) lost to the Sooners for the seventh straight time since joining the Big 12 in 2012.

Murray was 20 of 27 for 364 yards and converted a late fourth down to seal a matchup of Heisman Trophy hopefuls. West Virginia's Will Grier threw for four touchdowns and a career-high 539 yards on 32of-49 passing. But Grier lost two fumbles, both of which were returned for touchdowns.

Washington 28, Washington **State 15:** Myles Gaskin broke free for an 80-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter, and the Huskies (9-3, 7-2) won their second Pac-12 North title in three years, beating the Cougars (10-2, 7-2) in a snowy

Apple Cup in Pullman.

Gaskin (170 yards, three TDs) found enough traction to carry the Huskies to their sixth straight win over the Cougars and into the Pac-12 title game Friday against Utah. It was the third straight year Washington denied Washington State the North title.

Washington State's Air Raid offense was mostly grounded by the blowing snow and Washington's sticky secondary. Gardner Minshew was 26 of 35 for 152 vards, and his longest pass to a wide receiver was 11 yards. (

### QB hurt as UCF's streak hits 24

TAMPA, Fla. — Central Florida wrapped up another perfect regular season, defeating rival South Florida 38-10 on Friday to extend the nation's longest winning streak to 24 games, but it was overshadowed by the loss of star quarterback McKenzie Milton to

a gruesome leg injury.
The Knights (11-0, 8-0 AAC) jumped to a 7-0 lead when Milton shook off an early interception and led the offense on a 97-yard scoring drive, the longest of the season, capped by a 14-yard throw to Gabe Davis.

On the next possession, however, UCF's season took a dramatic shift.

Milton scrambled in an attempt to convert on third down, but he crumbled to the ground after several USF players tackled him. He remained on the ground as the training staff rushed to attend to him.

The severity of Milton's injury was immediately clear to players. Left tackle Wyatt Miller kneeled with his hands on his head as Milton received treatment.

Players and coaches from both teams formed a semicircle around Milton as the medical cart made its way onto the field. After about 10 minutes, he was strapped onto an emergency backboard and placed on the cart.

He gave teammates and the crowd a thumbs up as he left the field.

Milton was transported to a Tampa hospital. UCF officials declined to provide further details about the extent of the injury.

"I haven't seen the injury," coach Josh Heupel said. "My immediate concern is his wellbeing. I told him that I loved him. He was aware and said the same thing back.

"It's hard. I'm proud of our kids and how they responded."

Darriel Mack Jr. replaced Milton at quarterback, but it was tailback Greg McCrae who stepped up in a big way. The sophomore finished with 181 yards on only 16 carries, including touchdowns of 40, 39 and 31

yards. While the Bulls (7-5, 3-5) closed the regular season with five consecutive losses, the Knights move on to next week's AAC title game against Memphis — a rematch of last season's 62-55 double-overtime thriller won by UCF.



### Playoff experience teaches coach value of keeping team fresh

Decembers have been dead at Halas Hall the last four years. As the calendar has flipped to the final page, the Bears have prepared to play out the string and turn their attention to the personnel and coaching problems that have led to double-digit losses.

That has not been Matt Nagy's reality. On the contrary, the Chiefs teams for which he was quarterback coach or offensive coordinator made the playoffs four times in five seasons from 2013 to '17.

In other words, Nagy has experience navigating a playoff push. And he's about to apply that to his new team.

He started by giving his players four days off after Thursday's 23-16 victory over the Lions extended their winning streak to five and gave them three NFC North wins in 12 days. Nagy sensed obvious benefits to some recharging time, especially considering the Bears' open date was the first weekend of October.

Some players, including injured quarterback Mitch Trubisky, were at team headquarters Friday anyway. When the full team returns next week, Nagy will have a plan for the final five games, the first of which is Dec. 2 at the Giants.

"Our practice reps are going to kick back a little bit; that's to save them physically," Nagy said. "The mental side of it, they've got to really be strong at that. They've got to understand that when they're watching tape, they've got to study even more tape. When they get every single practice rep, they can't go 75 percent. They've got to go 100 percent in

Nagy also challenged the coaching staff to avoid complacency and detectable tendencies in play calling and game strategy.

"We've got to try to stay one step ahead," Nagy said.

There's also the important understanding of the season's physical toll on players.
"Taking care of these guys; let them know we care how they feel physically,"

Nagy said. "Talk (to them). And you've got to stay motivated, and that shouldn't be

Not from a first-place perch, it shouldn't.

**Injury report:** The Bears don't have to decide on Trubisky's availability for the Giants game until next week. In the meantime, he'll receive daily treatment. Nagy and the Bears are optimistic he'll be able to practice Wednesday, and his progression will depend on honest communication between the training staff, coaches and Trubisky, Nagy said.

Blount and a pass to tight end Michael Roberts in the end zone was incomplete.

So the Lions were finally rolling on offense when they forced the Bears to punt after three plays and started with good field position on their 41-yard line with 6:09 remaining. They had played well to hold off the Panthers four days earlier to win at home, and they pounded the Patriots earlier this season at Ford

Bears coach Matt Nagy told his players they were going to encounter a different Lions team than the one they soundly defeated 11 days earlier at Soldier Field, and he was right. Even without two key offensive players - wide receiver Marvin Jones and running back Kerryon Johnson — the Lions were putting up the kind of battle the Bears expected.

All of a sudden, the Lions were in position to take over the game behind their offense and quarterback Matthew Stafford, who has led 32 game-winning drives when trailing or tied in the fourth quarter or overtime. Twenty of those have happened since the start of the 2014 season, the most in the NFL.

Maybe looking to steal a little of Stafford's momentum, defensive coordinator Vic Fangio dialed up a blitz on the game-changing play. Inside linebacker Roquan Smith, who had a sack earlier in the game, was coming. Fellow inside linebacker Danny Trevathan was keeping an eye on Blount, and when he didn't release immediately, Trevathan started to rush on the back side of the play.

The Bears started in a two-high shell with Jackson 11 yards deep at the Bears 48. He was creeping forward and was at the Lions 49 when the ball was snapped. With the blitz coming, Stafford locked on Roberts from the snap.

By the time Jackson reached the Lions 47, he was headed full speed toward Roberts with the instinctive knowledge that the ball was coming and the tight end would be helpless when it arrived. Jackson raced in front of Roberts and snatched the ball at the 41, and with such a huge head start, he was able to highstep it and turn around and go into the end zone backward.

"It was just a good read," Jackson said. "Me and (strong safety Adrian) Amos, we disguise very well, and I was on top of (nickel cornerback) Bryce (Callahan) and we do a lot of nickel blitzes. We just disguised, and I saw he threw to the flat and I just kept my eyes on him.'

Jackson is far from the fastest player on the field, but he broke on this throw before Stafford released the ball because his instincts are so strong and he trusts what he sees. It was the same thing Sunday when he read Vikings quarterback Kirk Cousins all the way and picked off a pass for Laquon Treadwell, returning it for a touchdown.

Jackson has two interception returns for touchdowns this season and a 65-yard

Jackson shows flair for game-changing plays fumble return for a touchdown at Buffalo, accounting for half of the team's defensive scores. He has five defensive touchdowns in his first two seasons (one interception, one fumble return in 2017). Brown held the Bears record with seven defensive touchdowns after his final season in 2008. Cornerback Charles Tillman would surpass that with nine. Jackson is more than halfway there, and he has played only 26 games since being a fourth-round pick out of Alabama.

"Winning by that touchdown with Eddie, he's had an unbelievable season so far," Nagy said. "One that I don't know if I've ever seen."

Jackson's four interception returns for touchdowns since the start of last season are more than 25 teams have. His five touchdowns since the start of 2017 are more than any other NFL defensive player and ties the most for a defensive player in his first two seasons.

The pace at which Jackson is making huge, game-changing plays is remarkable.

"He's improving still," Fangio said Tuesday. "He's a guy that has really good instincts and really good football IQ. He doesn't panic when he's out on the field, and when you can combine all of that together, you get good results."

Still improving. Those are words that will stick with you for a little bit.

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### Romo sees playoff run for Bears

Analyst says stalwart defense will boost postseason contender

"They're going to be in and this is a team you don't want to see because that defense, when it's cold out, if you're in an environment that, you know, isn't indoors and you're going against Chicago, this is going to be very difficult to move the ball consistently against them. "(But) you never know how this finishes up," said the former Cowboys quarterback who has, in his season-and-a-half as an NFL analyst, developed a reputation as a Cassandra of sorts with his knack for tipping plays.

"Those top two teams are real good. Chicago might barely be just under them, but I would also tell you that Chicago has the best defense of all these teams. You never want to see the best defense in the playoffs. I'll tell you, that's a team that can sneak in anywhere."

Not exactly the same as forecasting a run up the middle or a pass in the flat, but it may be interesting to check back on Romo-damus' prophecies in January.

**Short-rest test:** Bears players may not have been the only one challenged Thursday to return to full game-day strength after the quick turnaround from Sunday's victory over the Vikings.

Looking at you, armchair Bears fans. The adrenaline rush and high-ratings of Sunday's prime-time victory over Vikings on NBC-5 didn't translate to a surge in Bears viewership Thanksgiving.

CBS-2's Bears-Lions Thanksgiving telecast averaged 2 percent fewer Chicago-area TV households than Fox-32's Bears-Lions telecast just 11 days earlier. No one expected the Bears-Lions rematch

to approach the 34.4 household rating in the Chicago market the Vikings game for NFC North supremacy averaged in prime time. But Thursday afternoon's 27.5, which

translates roughly to 894,000 area homes, fell short of the 28.1 for Bears-Lions I on Nov. 11.

The Turkey Day road victory was the second-highest rated afternoon Bears game on Chicago TV this season, edging the 27.2 for their Oct. 14 overtime loss to the Dolphins, and fifth-best number locally overall through

Across all the nation's metered markets, CBS' national Bears-Lions II show averaged a 14.2 household ratings and 34 percent of the homes watching television.

### **Influential Texans** owner McNair dies

Robert "Bob" McNair, billionaire founder and owner of the Texans, died. He was 81.

One of the NFL's most influential owners, McNair had battled leukemia and squamous cell carcinoma in recent years before dying in Houston on Friday. The team didn't immediately release a cause of death, but said he died peacefully with his wife Janice and his family by his side.

When Houston lost the Oilers to Tennessee after the 1996 season, McNair made it his mission to return the NFL to the city. He formed Houston NFL Holdings in 1998, and on Oct. 6, 1999 he was awarded the 32nd NFL franchise.

The Texans began play in 2002. After several difficult building years as an expansion team, they won their first AFC South title and first playoff berth in 2011. They also won the division title a year later when they went a franchise-best

Mickelson made a 4-foot birdie putt on a specially set-up 93-yard par-3. The match at Shadow Creek Golf Club finished in the dark with lights set up around the hole.

Mickelson said to Woods after the match: "Just know I will never let you live that down. It's not the Masters or the U.S. Open, but it is nice to have a little something on you."

Mickelson was 1 up after 16 holes, but Woods tied it with a birdie from the fringe on the par-3 17th. Both birdied the par-5 18th and parred the first playoff hole before it went to the par-3 extra hole — which was pitch shots off the practice putting green that they kept playing until there was a

"You couldn't have made this event any better than it was," Woods said. "It was back and forth and very competitive on a golf course that was playing on the tricky

Only 700 invited guests were allowed to watch the event billed as golf's first pay-per-view broadcast. It was marred by technical difficulties with viewers unable to watch it on their televisions after paying \$19.95. Turner and Bleacher Report representatives sent out links on social media allowing people to view it for free on their computers and mobile devices.

Representatives from Turner didn't respond to requests from the Associated Press for comment.

The match was billed as a chance for viewers to watch an untraditional golf broadcast as both golfers and their caddies were mic'd. There was some banter between Woods and Mickelson early on but not much as the stakes increased.





### **ASK TOM**

Dear Tom,

I have always wondered, why do stars twinkle? – Allen Viccey

Dear Allen.

Stars twinkle because of their great distance from the Earth. Any given star is so far away that its light is literally a point in the sky. All of the light from that star comes through the Earth's atmosphere and to our eyes in exactly the same direction and is bent in exactly the same way by turbulence in the air. The star will "disappear" briefly when its light is bent away from our eyes, then reappear when its light is not bent off course on its way to our eyes.


By the way, planets in our solar system, because they are much, much closer to the Earth, appear larger and do not appear as points. Their light travels to our eyes along many different paths and is not all simultaneously bent away from our eyes by atmospheric turbulence, and consequently they do not twinkle.



# Full speed ahead: Shiffrin envisions busy schedule

By the end of last season, Mikaela Shiffrin was so drained she couldn't possibly imagine racing in that many events ever again.

Right up until this season, that

The two-time World Cup overall champion now envisions an even more frenzied pace. From downhill to super-G, from giant slalom to an array of slaloms along with the occasional combined, just sign her up.

Sure, she will take the occasional break to sharpen her technical skills or get some rest, but really there's no slowing her down these days. In an era of specialization, the 23-year-old from Avon, Colorado, keeps branching out and has become the rare six-event racer even if her peers wonder if she can keep it up.

"Ît's a challenge right now I'm willing and excited to take on," said Shiffrin, who will be a favorite in both the giant slalom and slalom races during a World Cup stop this weekend in Killington, Vermont. "That's also part of the deal — you have to be excited and motivated in the sport. That's one of the things keeping me motivated."

See, Shiffrin knows her winning formula doesn't necessarily involve speed events. Case in point: Take away her results from downhill and super-G last season and she still wins the overall by 293 points over Wendy Holdener of Switzerland. That's how dialed in Shiffrin's been at the slalom and

But she has a craving for more speed. The only hitch is each speed training session takes just a fraction away from her rhythm for the technical events, which might not be noticeable to anyone but her.

"Every day that I train downhill or super-G I'm thinking, 'That might just be one little millimeter of my quick twitch muscles going asleep for a little while," said Shiffrin, who won the slalom in Levi, Finland, last weekend and received a reindeer as a prize. "And then I'm always thinking, When am I going to get my slalom training in?'

"There's just a certain amount of preparation I need for every

The specialization route has worked wonders for Austria's Marcel Hirscher, who has captured seven straight overall World Cup titles. Hirscher dominates the slalom and GS so much, winning both disciplines last season, that it's hard to dethrone him. He was on the podium 16 times in 20 races — none in speed events. Shiffrin was on the podium 18 times in 26 races - with one downhill win and two more third-place finishes.

"Is it more challenging racing (all the events)? You bet," U.S. women's assistant coach Karin Harjo said. "There are only so many hours in a week and days in a year to really prepare at the highest

Especially for the downhill, where it's typically a four-day commitment given all the training

"It's a difficult task," U.S. racer Ted Ligety said. "But when you have people like Mikaela that have a good enough buffer in the slalom, they don't necessarily train as much in that area to stay on top. But if she does compete in this many events full-time, it will probably wear on her after a little bit. It's the reality of the time allocation to race that many races a year versus taking some of those downhill races off a year."

That's why Aksel Lund Svindal of Norway gave up the pursuit. He used to do all the disciplines at a high level until a crash in a downhill training run at Beaver Creek, Colorado, in 2007. After that, he steadily got away from the slalom. It was too much work to

test all the equipment. "The skis, the boots, the bindings, the down-pressure on the bindings — the evolution of the equipment makes it harder and harder," Svindal explained. "It separates the disciplines even far-

ther than before." His teammate Kjetil Jansrud also pointed out how this age of specialization has been a game

changer. "If you want to do all of them, there's just not enough time to train to the level of the people who specialize in one event," Jansrud

said. "The level is so high in every single event." Still, Shiffrin remains game for

This weekend, she competes in her two signature events — a giant slalom on Saturday and slalom on

Shiffrin has Olympic gold medals in both disciplines, winning the slalom at the 2014 Sochi Olympics and the GS at the Pyeongchang Games last February.

Last month, during the seasonopening giant slalom race in Soelden, Austria, she wound up third behind Tessa Worley of France. As it turns out, Shiffrin actually went on an offseason vacation in Martinique with a group that included her boyfriend, Mathieu Faivre, and Worley.

"I haven't ever seen any of my European competitors outside of the races - to see them in life, on vacation, and how they relax and

how they do things," Shiffrin said. "I was able to relate to them, realize they weren't all that differ-

ent from me. That was really cool." She has her upcoming World Cup race plans all mapped out.

Well, sort of. After Killington, there are speed races in Lake Louise, Alberta, along with super-G and parallel slalom competitions in St. Moritz, Switzerland (although she may not run the super-G). After that, she's

playing things by ear, with rest being the guiding factor, especially with world championships in Feb-

"I'm getting older and learning a lot about myself and what I need to feel confident in races," Shiffrin said. "For me, there's a formula of preparation that equals confidence and equals success. There's some amount of rest that goes in there that helps, too. Somehow, all those pieces fit together."

# Just like in politics, Brexit divides English soccer

LONDON — Just like the politicians, English soccer is divided by Brexit.

With four months until Britain withdraws from the European Union and no consensus over the terms of the split from the bloc, there is also uncertainty about the players Premier League clubs will be able to recruit.

With free movement of people from the European single market to work in Britain set to end, players from the continent could become subject to the same soccer-specific immigration requirements as counterparts from the rest of the world.

After a quarter-century of growth, the Premier League sees maintaining the free-flowing pipeline of talent from Europe into its clubs as essential for maintaining the appeal of the competition worldwide.

"It's working," West Ham coowner David Gold said. "Why would you change it?"

But the English Football Association is seizing on Brexit to try to ensure players eligible for its national team gain more playing time in the Premier League and build on the semifinal run at this year's World Cup in Russia.

Currently, the FA runs the visa system for non-European players in conjunction with the government's Home Office. Unless a deal is reached between the FA and the Premier League, those eligibility requirements could apply to any foreign player after Brexit in March.

Players from the top 50 FIFA nations are considered for work permits, with a sliding scale of appearances required — from 30 percent of games over two years for the 1-10 teams to 75 percent for 31-50 teams. According to FA research seen by The Associated Press, 65 percent of Europeans currently playing in the Premier League would have failed if the criteria were applied to them.

But for players who don't meet the threshold, clubs can seek an exemption by arguing the case for a work permit in front of a panel. The FA hopes to persuade the Premier League to scrap that system, known as the governing body eligibility endorsement.

Under the FA's post-Brexit proposals, Premier League clubs would be allowed to sign whoever they want from abroad but only be allowed 13 non-homegrown players in the squad. That number is an average based on the 262 non-homegrown players currently in the 20 teams.

"Brexit should not be used to weaken playing squads in British football, nor to harm clubs' ability to sign international players," the Premier League said in a statement.

Most of the 20 teams do not currently use their full quota of 17 non-homegrown players, a status which means they have not been affiliated to an English or Welsh club for three complete seasons or 36 months before their 21st birthday.

day.

According to the FA's research, which was presented to Premier League clubs last week, restricting them to 13 homegrown players last season would have affected only 42 player appearances out of more than 10,000. Only 24 were starts. From Premier League champion Manchester City, only backup goalkeeper Claudio Bravo would have missed out on his three appearances.

The FA calls this a "pragmatic" solution: Clubs could still sign whoever they want from Europe, but the freedom over recruitment is extended worldwide, as long as they shide by new sound limits.

they abide by new squad limits.

"The FA believes increasing access, but preventing an increase in current numbers of overseas players, would benefit all of English football," the governing body

said in a statement.

The limited opportunities for English talent at home were underscored when Jadon Sancho left Man City last year for Borussia Dortmund in Germany. The 18-year-old winger has since won the Under-17 World Cup and gained regular top-flight experience that saw him fast-tracked into Gareth Southerste's senior England side.

Southgate's senior England side. "I'm just grateful he's seen my progress in the Bundesliga," Sancho said. "My focus was getting

minutes as a player and playing first-team football, which is what I've done."

FA chief executive Martin Glenn pitched his plans at a meeting of clubs last week but the Premier League remains unconvinced that stronger quotas will have a positive impact on the national team.

"There is no evidence so to speak to support his proposal," said Gold, whose West Ham squad features 16 non-homegrown players. "We are very supportive of English football. We want it to be successful. But we don't want to be doing things that isn't going to work"

The FA leadership can't even rely on Southgate for support, despite less than a third of the players featuring in the Premier League before the international break being English.

"Most of the data I have seen suggests quotas on squads would not make a difference because you could still field a team outside the base of British players," Southgate

Lawyers have questioned the merits of the FA's quotas proposal.

"(It) is completely at odds with the rest of the immigration system which requires employers to only sponsor workers at certain salary levels and to have academic qualifications or skills," said Andrew Osborne, head of immigration at London-based law firm Lewis Silkin. "Non-football employers do not have freedom to recruit who they want subject to a numerical limit."

Premier League clubs, like European counterparts, are currently allowed to transfer 16- and 17-year-old players between countries in the region under an

exemption from FIFA regulations. But after Brexit, British clubs will only be allowed to sign foreign players over the age of 18, like the rest of the world. Manchester United, a record 20-time English champion, fears European rivals will be handed a competitive advantage.

advantage.

"If you have 16-year-olds going to play for them and if we have to wait until 18 there are clearly practical issues there," United chief financial officer Cliff Baty has said.

Premier League executive chairman Richard Scudamore endorsed the campaign to remain in the EU ahead of the 2016 referendum. That reflected the competition's focus is maintaining the allure to domestic fans and the global television audience, with broadcast rights generating more than \$3 billion per season.

"Access to talented footballers from across Europe has played a key part in the growth of the Premier League, with match attendance and global interest increasing significantly as high quality foreign players have taken their place in the competition with and against the best British and Irish players," the league said.

The government, which wants to end preferential immigration access for workers from the EU, uses the power of the Premier League to project soft power and promote British culture internationally.

"We have held positive discussions with government about the importance of access to European players for our clubs," the league said, "and the many cultural and economic benefits a globally popular Premier League brings to the U.K."

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
