## May's deal on Brexit fails again

Potential for chaotic exit looms after 3rd attempt flames out

LONDON — Prime Minister Theresa May's Brexit deal was beaten down Friday for an amazing, unprecedented and pitiful third time by the British Parliament, with all bets off now on when or how the United Kingdom will leave the European Union.

The EU had given Britain until the end of this week to approve the withdrawal agreement. Now Britain has until April 12 to propose a new way forward, or crash out of the bloc without a deal, or beg for a long extension.

May called the results of the day's votes "grave."

The leader of the Labour Party opposition, Jeremy Corbyn, called for a general election.

Within minutes of the vote, EU leaders scrambled to convene "crisis" talks April 10 in Brussels. The Europeans grow more anxious by the day that Britain's Conservative Party is going to wreck economic havoc on both sides of the English Channel.

Speaking after the vote, May observed the obvious, "once

## International dino battle

Field Museum disputes new study saying *T. rex* in Canada is bigger than Chicago's

If a new study is correct, Sue, the Field Museum's iconic *T. rex* and one of the world's great natural history artifacts, has been surpassed and Chicago will now have to accept Second City status in apex predator skeletons too.

Billed by the museum as the world's largest and most complete *T. rex* ever found, Sue is

smaller in size and weight than Scotty, a *T. rex* from Saskatchewan, according to a new paper by a team led by Canadian scientists and just published in the journal *The Anatomical Record*.

The specimen was discovered 28 years ago and was known to be a large *T. rex*, but the paper, years in the making, is the first full scientific description of it, and the first to specify the "largest" size.

Headlines in both the scientific and popular press hailed the news. "Paleontologists discover 'Scotty,' the world's largest *T. rex* fossil: 'The rex of rexes,'" said USA Today's.

But hold on a minute, says the Field, which has made Sue a centerpiece of its collection since 2000 and in December unveiled a new gallery designed especially for the 40-plus-foot-long, 90 percent-intact skeleton discovered in 1990 in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

## Mail scam leads to jail time

Man notified post office that HQ of UPS moved to his residence

The scheme by Dushaun Henderson-Spruce was astonishingly bold but ultimately harebrained: file a change-of-address form claiming that shipping giant United Parcel Service had moved its headquarters from a bustling business park in Atlanta to a tiny garden apartment in Chicago's Rogers Park neighborhood.

Not only did the change go through, it took months for anyone to catch on. In the meantime, so many thousands of pieces of mail meant for UPS executives and other employees poured into Apartment L2 that a mail carrier brought in a tub to hold it all.

It wasn't until Henderson-Spruce deposited nearly \$59,000 in UPS checks into his bank account in early 2018 that UPS learned of the scam.

On Friday, he pulled out a white sheet of paper and apologized to U.S. District Judge Charles Norgle in a clear voice. "At my young age, it might not be an excuse, but it does show I need help," said the 25-year-old, clad in a short-sleeved jumpsuit and with his ankles shackled. "Prison is not the place I should be."

Norgle imposed a sentence of one year in prison — essentially time served, because Henderson-Spruce already has been in custody for about 11 months.

Prosecutors said the fraud by Henderson-Spruce, who worked as a package handler for UPS in 2012, was "a serious

## Member of Ripper Crew released after 3 decades

A member of the murderous 1980s Ripper Crew began a new life of freedom just before sunrise Friday, traveling to Galesburg by bus and to Chicago by train after authorities released him from prison in west central Illinois.

Thomas Kokoraleis must notify police in the town where he plans to live within three days. Law enforcement sources said he is expected to try to get back on his feet in DuPage County with the

help of an undisclosed religious group in the Wheaton area.

Kokoraleis, now 58, had pleaded guilty in the 1982 murder of 21-year-old Lorraine "Lorry" Ann Borowski of Elmhurst, who was abducted and slain while walking to work in broad daylight. On Friday, members of her family said they will spend the rest of their lives looking over their shoulder.

"He could find us in a second," said Lorraine Borowski, 83, who

spoke tearfully during a news conference Friday in Rosemont about the terrifying final moments of her daughter's life. “I am afraid for my family and my community.”

“Her murderer did not receive the justice that he deserved, but I believe in God and I have no doubt that God will deliver the final judgment.”

The four-man group known as the Ripper Crew is believed to have killed as many as 17 women in the early 1980s, plus one man who was fatally shot in a random crime on the street. The nickname came from the gruesome details of their crimes — they sexually mutilated their victims and used body parts in cultlike religious rituals at the Chicago home of the ringleader, Robin Gecht.

Kokoraleis initially was sentenced to life in prison for Lorry Ann Borowski's murder, but he won a new trial on appeal because of legal errors, and in 1987 DuPage County prosecutors allowed him to plead guilty in exchange for a 70-year prison term. He served half that time.

Kokoraleis had been held at Illinois River Correctional Center in Canton, about 30 miles west of Peoria, and was eligible for day-for-day credit for good behavior under sentencing guidelines no longer in effect for murderers.

Members of some victims' families were outraged two summers ago when the Tribune first reported his scheduled release.

Their efforts helped lead to an 18-month delay in his original parole date, but authorities announced in late 2017 that they could not hold him beyond Friday.

Kokoraleis was set free without typical parole restrictions because he served his period of mandatory supervised release behind

bars after he was unable to find housing.

State officials said his new address will be a matter of public record on Illinois' sex offender registry because the murder he committed was sexually motivated.

But he is technically not a convicted sex offender, they said, and so will not have to comply with other rules that typically apply, such as boundary restrictions near parks, schools and day care facilities.

Authorities in Wheaton have been put on notice of his plans to live in town, according to a Tribune source. Another law enforcement source confirmed that Wheaton was his destination. Further details about what religious organization is assisting him were not yet available, but several local groups contacted by the Tribune denied involvement.

Mark Borowski, who was a young teen when his sister was abducted, also spoke against Kokoraleis' release at the news conference Friday. Family members said they got the phone call they had long dreaded about 6:30 a.m., confirming that Kokoraleis was free.

“I am shaking at the thought that this murderer is walking free among us,” Mark Borowski said through tears. “It makes me feel sick to my stomach that my mother and I feel that we need to constantly look over our shoulder. ... I hoped this day would never come, but unfortunately nothing more could be done to prevent his release.”

Famed Los Angeles civil rights attorney Gloria Allred, who has assisted the family since news broke in 2017 about Kokoraleis' upcoming release, urged Illinois authorities to write legislation barring convicted murderers and regis-

tered sex offenders from having contact with families of their surviving victims after they are released from custody.

She suggested it be called Lorry Ann's Law. “The family of Lorry Ann has suffered enough,” Allred said at the news conference.

Kokoraleis has two brothers who live in the northwest suburbs, but one of them told the Tribune this week that their landlord will not allow him to live with them. His other siblings live out of state. He also has two elderly relatives in Villa Park, where the Kokoraleis family lived when he was arrested in late November 1982. His parents are dead.

Those who know Kokoraleis — including mental health experts who evaluated him as part of a failed effort by authorities to have him civilly committed beyond his prison release date — say he is not sexually violent and has participated in religious ministry in prison and stayed out of trouble. They portray him as a follower with a low IQ who unwittingly inserted himself into the police investigation while trying to help a brother.

The brother, Andrew Kokoraleis, was the last inmate to be executed in Illinois. He died by chemical injection at age 35 on March 17, 1999.

As part of the 1987 plea deal, prosecutors dropped charges against Thomas Kokoraleis involving another woman who is thought to be the crew's first victim. Linda Sutton, 26, was found mutilated outside a Villa Park motel after the men abducted her about a week earlier near Wrigley Field in May 1981.

Besides crimes involving Borowski and Sutton, Thomas Kokoraleis admitted in 1982 tape-recorded

police statements to being present during the abduction of 30-year-old Shui Mak of Lombard. She vanished two weeks after Borowski's kidnapping after getting out of a car in the Hanover Park area following an argument with her brother. Her body was discovered months later in a South Barrington field.

Kokoraleis later recanted his confession, saying police fed him the details before the tape recorder started rolling. Authorities denied it, arguing he wasn't smart enough to memorize such descriptions even if they had tried.

Gecht, an electrical contractor and handyman who once worked for serial killer John Wayne Gacy, was the only member of the Ripper Crew who did not confess. Authorities say Gecht easily manipulated the others while giving them work as laborers. He is now 65 and will be eligible for parole in late 2042, when he would be 89.

The last defendant, Edward Spreitzer, 58, is ineligible for parole. Convicted of five murders, he was sentenced to death in 1986. But in 2003, then-Gov. George Ryan cleared out death row, commuting to life terms the sentences of all the state's condemned inmates. It was one of Ryan's final acts in office. Illinois abolished the death penalty some eight years later.

On Friday, the best friend of the slain Elmhurst woman said Thomas Kokoraleis' 35 years in prison was not long enough.

“He may be a follower, but he didn't stop it,” Liz Suriano said. “He had the chance to stop several murders of innocent young women and he didn't. He had a chance to stop what was happening and he didn't, and that shows you his character.”

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# May's Brexit deal flames out a third time

again, we have been unable to support leaving the European Union in an orderly fashion.”

May said, “I fear we are reaching the limits of this process in this House. This House has rejected no deal, it has rejected no Brexit, on Wednesday it rejected all the variations of the deal on the table and today it has rejected approving the withdrawal agreement alone.”

May's stripped-down version of her twice-defeated Brexit deal lost 344-286 in another “last ditch” attempt to exit from the

European Union.

The third losing vote for May came on the day Britain was due to “take back control” and depart the continental trading bloc.

A few thousand pro-Brexit demonstrators descended on London's Parliament Square to protest the delay. Some took part in a 270-mile “Leave Means Leave” march that started a week ago in the north of England.

The prime minister said before the vote, “There are those who will say, ‘the House has rejected every option so far, you'll probably lose, so why bother?’ I bother because this is the

last opportunity to guarantee Brexit.”

May offered to resign if her own Conservative Party would help push the deal over the line. And that self-sacrifice did convince some members to back it — but not enough.

The House of Commons voted only on part of the Brexit treaty: the 585-page withdrawal agreement. That's the part that spells out, in a legally binding way, how much Britain will pay to leave the European Union (\$50 billion), how the two-year transition will preserve the status quo for trade and travel (no change), and how Britain

and the European Union will treat each other's citizens in the interim (nobody gets kicked out of anybody's country).

The withdrawal agreement also includes the “Irish backstop,” an iron-clad guarantee to preserve the open, invisible border between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland — with trade-offs that have been a stopping point in the past.

Parliament did not vote Friday on the second part of the treaty, the political declaration, which sets out the aspirations for the future relationship on trade, security and borders.

## Community gathers for funeral of Chicago police Officer Rivera

23-year-old was fatally shot while off-duty

Neighborhood residents mourned in silence Friday morning before the funeral Mass for John P. Rivera, 23, an off-duty Chicago police officer killed last weekend.

Dozens of community members gathered outside the Church of the Annunciata, 11128 S. Avenue G, to show their support for Rivera's family, friends and fellow officers. Rivera worked as an officer in the Gresham District.

Rivera was fatally shot early Saturday while in a parked car in the River North neighborhood. A gunman fired several shots into the car, striking Rivera in the chest, arm and mouth and injuring another man who was in the car. The man was sent to Northwestern Memorial Hospital in critical condition but was expected to survive, officials said.

A female civilian and another off-duty Chicago police officer were also in the car, but were uninjured.

Menelik Jackson, 24, and Joivan Battle, 32, have been charged with murder and attempted murder in the shooting. They were being held without bond.

Hundreds of sixth-, seventh- and eighth-graders from Jane Addams Elementary joined in honoring Rivera before the start of the Mass, waving small American flags to honor the officer.

The students, led by Assistant Principal Daniel Alvarez, walked quietly along crowded sidewalks to the music from bagpipers.

"I see future officers standing there right now," Alvarez said.

A handful of the students have expressed an interest in joining the police force, he said.

"He is one of us," Alvarez said of Rivera.

Police spokesman Anthony Guglielmi expressed his condolences on Twitter, saying, "In his final act, he continued his exemplary heroism by protecting his friends from gunfire."

Santino Torres, who is from the East Side neighborhood, said

that he never met Rivera but knew him through a friend of his who cut Rivera's hair.

"What really makes me sad about it is his age," said Torres, who is 26. "Someone like him, he was an upstanding person. He would be the person that would usher the next era of police officers."

"My perspective on police officers is mixed," Torres said. "But he was on the good end. A lot of people in the community knew him. He was one of those guys that had his head on straight, he was going in the right direction."

Lorena Viveros stood outside on the sidewalk with a blue ribbon she made herself fastened in her hair. Viveros said she made it to honor the police force and said she also decorated her home with blue ribbons in honor of Rivera. Viveros, who lives in the East Side neighborhood, said Rivera's death affected her because she has a son who is the

same age as Rivera.

"As a mother, this is an awful feeling. I put myself in the shoes of his family and it breaks my heart. This is a young Latino man, and he was just starting his life," she said in Spanish. "When someone is a mother it's especially

hard."

Lines of officers in dress blues stood across the church prior to the Mass, some holding their white-gloved hands behind their back.

With the exception of the sounds from the bagpipers and helicopters flying in the sky, silence filled the streets outside the church.

The feeling in the air was solemn and respectful as mourners waited patiently outside, some taking photos.

A gray Cadillac hearse with two small Chicago flags on each side arrived on the scene. Two officers stood saluting the vehi-

cle. Officers removed their caps as they entered the church in a single-file line. Rivera's friends and family followed.

Ramon Arevalo, around the corner from the church, said he didn't know Rivera personally but said those in the community support police officers and other federal officers and will mourn those lost.

"There are a lot of police officers that are good, especially in this community," he said in Spanish. Arevalo said he has lived in the East Side neighborhood for 36 years and has attended what he estimates to be five funerals for fallen police officers.

Rivera was a graduate of Brother Rice High School and lived in the Far South Side neighborhood of Hegewisch.

The Mass was said by the Rev. Dan Brandt, a Chicago police chaplain. A wake was held Thursday.

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## Early voting is up from February

Chicago's early voting numbers are up from the February election but still behind the same point in the last mayoral race, according to Chicago election officials.

As of Thursday, 75,534 people had voted early in Chicago, and over 59,000 applied to vote by mail, according to Chicago Board of Election Commissioners spokesman Jim Allen.

At this time in February, with four days left for early voting, only a little over 60,000 people had voted early, according to numbers provided by the Chicago Board of Elections.

The early voting numbers fall short of the turnout for the last municipal election in April 2015, which had over 142,000 by the time early voting ended, according to numbers provided by the Chicago Board of Elections. However, this year's numbers could catch up to April 2015's in the final days, according to Allen.

"Chicago isn't on pace to set any local records for municipal turnout," Allen said in the email. "We'd certainly like to see well over 40 (percent) but it's too soon to say whether we'll get that."

Chicago's voter turnout for municipal elections is typically higher than other large cities, including New York, Los Angeles or Miami, each of which had voter turnouts of less than 25 percent in 2017, according to numbers provided by Allen. In the suburbs, the turnout is usually between 13 and 23 percent, Allen said in the email.

"Chicago will easily surpass those cities' turnouts, even with 151,000 more voters on the rolls than we had in 2015," Allen said in the email.

The ballots are short, only including the mayor, treasurer, and alderman in wards where the race went to a runoff, so Allen said the election administration has "exceptional capacity" to handle thousands more voters each day.

## \$17M CTA Belmont Blue Line station completed

The CTA has finished work on the redesigned Belmont Blue Line station in the Avondale neighborhood, a \$17 million project that includes a dramatic new white steel canopy.

The completion of the station is the biggest project so far under the \$492 million "Your New Blue" program to modernize and improve the O'Hare Branch of the Blue Line.

"This project, like the dozens of others completed by CTA under Mayor Emanuel, is more than just an investment in transit, it's also an investment in the surrounding community," said CTA President Dorval Carter, in a statement. Carter and Mayor Rahm Emanuel are expected to formally cut the ribbon on the station on Friday morning.

The station's canopy was designed by the Chicago architecture firm Carol Ross Barney. It resembles either a bird in flight or the top of a 1950s drive-in, depending on your perspective.

The Belmont station is one of the busiest on the CTA system, with 1.8 million entries to the Blue Line annually. It also provides connections to the popular No. 77 Belmont and No. 82 Kimball/

Homan bus routes, and is part of a gentrifying area on the city's Northwest Side.

The project is the first major renovation of the station since it opened nearly 50 years ago. Other improvements include a safer and modernized bus arrival and departure area, with LED lighting and additional overhead heaters; a prepaid boarding area, so riders can pay before they get on the bus; new LED lighting and repainting throughout the rail station; and new concrete platform decking, the CTA said.

What it does not include is an elevator to make it accessible for the handicapped. The CTA has said that the footprint of some stations makes this renovation difficult and expensive. The stations immediately northwest and southeast of Belmont, at Addison and Logan Square, are accessible for wheelchairs.

The agency has announced a plan to make the entire system accessible to people with disabilities over the next 20 years. It will cost \$2.1 billion, and the CTA does not yet have the money to pay for it. About 70 percent of CTA rail stations are accessible to people with disabilities.

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## 'Life didn't have to be like this for him'

Another 15-year-old shot dead on the street

For better or worse, nothing could separate Jamonty Clifton, a 15-year-old cycled through Chicago's foster care system, from his family.

There was a fleeting summer last year when Jamonty successfully pushed to live with Derek Brown in North Lawndale, down the street from three of the boy's younger siblings who had Brown's mother as a foster parent, Brown said.

But there was also Jamonty's habit of running away in search of his biological mother, who Brown said struggled with substance abuse and was the teen's sole "disruption." In 2018, Jamonty was reported missing six times, Chicago police said.

"He was a happy kid, and he wasn't provided with the right resources to save his life," he said. "Life didn't have to be like this for him."

Brown said he can only wonder why Jamonty was gunned down on a South Side street in the middle of the day.

A gunman got out of a gray sedan and argued with Jamonty before shooting him around 11:20 a.m. Thursday near a bus stop at 79th Street and Colfax Avenue, police said. Bullets hit the teen in the face, leg and shoulder, and he died at University of Chicago Medical Center. No one had been arrested as of Friday afternoon.

Jamonty was the second 15-year-old to be shot to death on the South Side this week. On Tuesday, Darion Strong, 15, was attacked seconds after he walked out of his Fuller Park home over the objections of his mother, authorities said.

Brown and his sister, Qiana Brown, said they don't know where Jamonty was staying when he was killed. The teen's most recent address was in the 7900 block of South Kingston

Ave., about a mile from the shooting, according to the Cook County medical examiner's office.

Both of them believe the teen should never have been shuffled through temporary homes given his penchant for disappearing. They blame the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services for what they said was inadequate supervision.

"(DCFS is) just as responsible for his death as this person who shot and killed him," Qiana Brown said. "They took him out of his mother's care to protect him, and they turned around and neglected him the same way she did."

DCFS spokesman Jimmie Whitelaw did not return a request for comment. Efforts to contact Jamonty's biological parents were unsuccessful.

Jamonty's death was especially painful for Derek Brown because during their time together, the teen appeared to be peeling away from his troubled past, he said.

Last summer, Jamonty agreed to enroll at a high school for the coming academic year. And he was an avid participant in Boxing Out Negativity, a boxing league Derek Brown runs for at-risk youths. He said he wanted to be a professional boxer — and was talented enough to make it happen, Brown said.

But Jamonty didn't stay with Derek Brown very long. Brown said he discovered the teen stole more than a dozen of his bikes that Brown lends to members of the boxing program. When confronted, the teen claimed he had been selling them to send money to his mother, Brown said.

Jamonty apologized and offered to get a job to recoup the cost of the bikes, which Derek Brown said he turned down. The two parted ways in July.

Later that month, Jamonty ran away from his next foster home.

But this time, he didn't go to his mother. Derek Brown said he found him outside his home, walloping one of his punching bags. "Hey, Dad," he greeted him.

In a heart-to-heart, Jamonty told Brown that before they met, he prayed to one day cross paths with a good couple that allowed him to be himself. The teen added, "It just dawned on me that my prayers was answered, and I messed it up."

Brown said he was able to persuade Jamonty to go home that day and they shook hands as police officers waited. The officers handcuffed him — a precaution that saddened Brown to watch — and walked him out with his head bowed down, fighting back tears.

It was the last time Derek Brown would see Jamonty. The scene of the boy being marched off in silence, save for the police radio, toward the back of a squad car was "almost like that was a funeral," Brown said.

Hours later, Brown and his family sat at the dinner table, where they passed dishes around in silence. No one spoke a word the entire night, he said.

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# Field disputes *T. rex* claim

"It's sort of a tempest in a teacup," said Pete Makovicky, the Chicago museum's lead curator of dinosaurs, when asked about the headlines tagging Scotty as the new size king. "When you look at it scientifically, you know, the two specimens are about the same size — or, we can say, statistically indistinguishable."

In other words, the most you can say about Sue vs. Scotty is that we now have two very large, very long-lived *T. rexes*, argued Makovicky, because of certain imprecisions in measuring fossils and extrapolating the weight of a flesh-and-blood animal from bones that have turned to stone.

Also, he added, there's a third big *T. rex* specimen at Museum of the Rockies in Montana that should be part of this grouping, too, since it has about the same femoral, or thigh-bone, circumference as the other two animals, a key measurement in estimating mass.

What's most meaningful, scientifically, about Scotty's size isn't so much any superlative but the fact that we now have three *T. rex* specimens of about the same size, suggesting that

the 40- to 42-foot-long and 20,000-pound range may have been the species' top-ping-out point.

"We're basically extending the range of what we know about *T. rex*," said Ryan McKellar, curator of paleontology at the Royal Saskatchewan Museum, which has a Scotty skeleton cast on display at its T. Rex Discovery Centre in East-end, near where Scotty was found, and in May will unveil a second Scotty replica at its main museum in the capital city of Regina. "It gives us a more complete idea of how big these guys got."

Scotty, like Sue, also exhibited significant evidence of injury on its bones, reinforcing the idea that *T. rexes* had to endure a lot to make it to maturity when they were alive some 67 million years ago.

But the public loves to know which is biggest, best or otherwise the most. So do the people who market museums to potential visitors facing scores of entertainment choices: "Our collection is home to the world's most massive *T. rex* skeleton," the website for the Royal Saskatchewan Museum says already. And so even do all but the most dispassionate scientists.

"It is certainly a thrill to stand next to the specimen,

to hold it in your hand, and know that you're looking at what is currently, at least, the largest known terrestrial carnivore of all time," said Scott Persons, a dinosaur paleontologist at the University of Alberta, the neighboring province of Saskatchewan, which is essentially north of Montana.

Persons is talking here about Scotty, the skeleton discovered by a high school science teacher in 1991 and named after the liquor the teacher and the RSM paleontologists he was with drank to celebrate finding it. It took so long to fully excavate the bones, separate them from stone and properly measure them because they were in sandstone that was particularly dense due to its high iron content, Persons said.

Persons was lead author of "An Older and Exceptionally Large Adult Specimen of *Tyrannosaurus rex*," the paper that makes the case for Scotty not only as bigger than Sue, but older too.

"Multiple measurements (including those of the skull, hip and limb) show that RSM P2523.8" — Scotty's specimen number at the Royal Saskatchewan — "was a robust individual with an estimated body mass exceeding all other known *T. rex* specimens," the paper says. It puts the number at

19,555 pounds, plus or minus 25 percent, which is about 900 pounds more than it calculates for Sue. (The Field's estimate for Sue's mass is "around 9 tons," or 18,000 pounds, Makovicky said.)

Despite the neutrality in its title, the paper is intent on making, literally, head-to-head comparisons with Sue. "In most skeletal dimensions, RSM P2523.8 is close to FMNH PR 2081," aka Sue, it says. Scotty "exceeds all known *T. rex* specimens (including FMNH PR 2018) in numerous measurements, including scapula blade width,

ilium length, proximal femur width, and tibia shaft width."

"We looked at this from a number of different angles. Obviously the best way to do it is the direct one-to-one comparisons through the various skeletal elements," Persons said. "When you look at everything from the shoulder to the hip to the leg to portions of even the toe bones, yes, Scotty the *Tyrannosaurus rex* comes out consistently just a smidgen-bit larger than Sue."

"Now that does not mean Sue is no longer a record-holding *Tyrannosaurus rex*," Persons added, "because of course, Sue still ranks as the most complete *Tyrannosaurus rex* skeleton that has ever been found and ever put on display."

Scotty is about 65 percent complete, meaning two-thirds of the original bones were found. Sue's 90 percent-complete status is profoundly important in ranking the quality of fossils, Makovicky said, and is also meaningful when it comes to measuring length.

But there are other issues that the Field paleontologist said suggest this is not a clear-cut case of one *T. rex* being bigger than the other. That key femoral circumference measurement favors Sue by one method but Scotty by the method used in the paper, he said, while in linear measurements "Scotty's femur has a smaller measured circum-

ference than Sue (1.7 percent), but is slightly longer (1 percent), the tibiae are an exact tie, and Sue's fibula is longer (3 percent). Scotty's hipbone is reported as just under 1% longer than Sue's."

The differences are tiny, he emphasized, comparable to what you would find in comparing the right- and left-side bones within one animal, and therefore, "speaking as a scientist the two specimens are statistically indistinguishable in size and thus tied for largest *T. rex*."

Persons stood by his paper's conclusions: "We're not claiming that this is a gigantic *Tyrannosaurus rex* that dwarves all the others," he said. "We are reporting the fact that this appears to be the oldest *Tyrannosaurus rex* based on the bone histology work. And based on the measurements and the different elements, it seems to be the largest."

It was McKellar, the Saskatchewan museum curator, who seemed to want to mediate any differences. "I'm hoping it's the beginning of sort of a friendly competition this way," he said. "A lot of these sort of dinosaur measuring things are a bit more in the spirit of fun. ... It gets the public excited about these sorts of discoveries and leads to a bit more sort of back-and-forth interaction between museums."

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## Mail scammer gets year in prison

offense" and could have been even worse since he obtained sensitive financial information on thousands of employees from his theft of the mail.

"This is no one-time lapse in judgment," said Assistant U.S. Attorney Jill Kolinski, who indicated that Henderson-Spruce tried to steal from anyone he could. "He was often successful."

In September 2017 he tried to deposit a counterfeit check for \$1 trillion into his bank account, Kolinski said.

"You said a trillion, correct?" the judge asked.

Even after authorities conducted a search of his residence and he knew law enforcement was "on to him," Kolinski said, Henderson-Spruce tried to divert mail from Harley-Davidson, the motorcycle manufacturer.

Henderson-Spruce's lawyer, assistant federal defender Amanda Penabad, pointed to her client's lack of criminal history and his prompt acceptance of responsibility for his wrongdoing, pleading guilty in February to a single count of mail fraud.

When authorities seized his bank account, all but \$7,000 of the stolen money was still there, she said.

Penabad also spoke about Henderson-Spruce's troubled childhood. He never had any contact with his father, she said, and his mother had numerous mental illnesses.

"Frequently, she screamed so loud the neighbors would call police," the attorney said.

After his mother was institutionalized, his grandmother and other relatives cared for him until he struck out on his own at 17, the attorney said. Unable to support himself financially,

he moved back in with his mother at 20 despite his reluctance to take on his mother's care, according to Penabad.

In a court filing this week, Penabad blamed "the constant stress from his mother's psychotic episodes" for Henderson-Spruce taking "drastic measures to try to escape his situation."

Penabad also noted in court that Henderson-Spruce's wrongdoing was not a sophisticated fraud.

"Things like writing a trillion-dollar check is more of a cry for help," she said.

"He has come to understand what the consequences are for this behavior," Penabad said.

According to the charges, Henderson-Spruce submitted a written change-of-address form in October 2017 requesting that the UPS headquarters address in Atlanta be changed to his one-bedroom apartment in the 6700 block of North Ashland Avenue in Chicago.

Henderson-Spruce did not identify himself on the form. However, the initials "HS" were written on the signature line at first but then scratched out and replaced with "UPS," according to the charges.

By January 2018, a UPS security coordinator had caught on to the fraud. The next day, postal inspectors interviewed Henderson-Spruce's carrier, who said "voluminous" amounts of UPS mail had been coming to the apartment for months, court filings show.

A week later, postal inspectors began retrieving some 3,000 pieces of first-class and registered mail addressed to UPS at Henderson-Spruce's apartment, according to the filings.

## Pope signs new law to prevent child sex abuse

Legislation covers Vatican City State, mandates reporting allegations

VATICAN CITY — Pope Francis has issued sweeping new sex abuse legislation for the Vatican City State and Vatican diplomats that requires the immediate reporting of allegations to Vatican prosecutors, as he seeks to create a model policy for the Catholic Church.

The mandatory reporting provision, while limited in scope to Vatican officials, marks the first time the Holy See has put into law requirements for Catholic officials to report allegations of sex crimes to police or face fines and possible jail time.

Francis also issued child protection guidelines for Vatican City State and its youth seminary, acting after the global sex abuse scandal exploded anew last year and The Associated Press reported that the headquarters of the Catholic Church had no policy to protect children from predator priests.

While the new norms cover only Vatican City State, affiliated institutions and the Holy See's diplomatic corps, they were still symbolically significant and were welcomed by a former seminarian whose case helped spark the reform.

"I see this as something positive," Kamil Jarzembowski said.

The law for the first time provides a Vatican definition for "vulnerable people" who are entitled to the same protections as minors under church law. The Vatican amended its canon law covering sex abuse to include "vulnerable adults" in 2010, but never defined it.

According to the new Vatican definition, a vulnerable person is anyone who is sick or suffering from a physical or psychiatric deficiency, isn't able to exercise personal freedom and has a limited capacity to understand or resist the crime.

The issue of whether "vulnerable people" can include seminarians, religious sisters or other adults who are emotionally dependent on clergy has come to the fore in the wake of the scandal over ex-Cardinal Theodore McCarrick, a once high-ranking American cleric who molested seminarians, and revelations of priests and bishops around the world sexually preying on nuns.

The new law covers all personnel who live in or work for the Vatican and any abuse that occurs in the Vatican, the 110-acre city state in the center of Rome and its other territories, as well as the Holy See's vast

diplomatic corps.


The Vatican's own ambassadors have figured in some of the most scandalous cases of sex abuse in recent years, with papal representatives accused of groping, distributing child pornography and sexually abusing minors in their far-flung posts.

The provisions to punish them criminally are now contained in the city state's criminal code, and are separate from the canon law that also imposes canonical penalties, such as defrocking, for predator priests worldwide.

The law now requires any Vatican public official who learns of an allegation of abuse within the law's jurisdiction to report it to Vatican prosecutors "without delay." Failure to do so can result in a fine of up to \$5,615 or, in the case of a Vatican gendarme, up to six months of prison.

Information obtained during confession is exempt from the reporting requirements, in keeping with Catholic doctrine.

"With this document, the Vatican wants to send a message that it takes these crimes seriously, wants to prosecute them, to avoid cover up, and also to create an atmosphere that prevents these crimes from happening in the first

place," said Ulrich Rhode, a canon law professor at Rome's Pontifical Gregorian University.

Anne Barrett Doyle of BishopAccountability, an

online database about clergy abuse, said any law that protects even a single child is to be applauded. But she faulted its limited scope as reinforcing the Vatican

claim that it is only responsible for protecting children in the city state.

"Let's hope (Francis) finds the courage soon to enact new, sweeping laws in this larger jurisdiction," she said.

Francesco Zanardi of the Italian advocacy group Rete L'Abuso (Abuse Network) echoed her call, saying: "If minors have the luck of being abused in the Vatican City State, their rights will be protected. Outside, we can't do anything."

Many of the law's provisions answer victim complaints about how they are treated by the church, while also ensuring that the accused are entitled to a defense and efforts to restore their reputations if claims are not substantiated.

The legislation requires that victims be welcomed, listened to and provided with medical, psychological and legal assistance, and sets the statute of limitations at 20 years past the victim's 18th birthday.

They must be kept apprised of the investigation, a significant point given that victims are usually kept in the dark about canonical sex abuse investigations.

Victims and their families are to be protected from any retaliation. Jarzembowski, who reported abuse at the Vatican youth seminary, was kicked out the following year.

## Trump threatens to close Mexican border next week

PALM BEACH, Fla. — President Donald Trump on Friday threatened to close America's southern border or large sections of it next week, a potentially drastic step affecting the economies of both countries, if Mexico does not halt illegal immigration "immediately."

"It could mean all trade" with Mexico, Trump said when questioned by reporters in Florida. "We will close it for a long time. I am not kidding around."

Trump has previously threatened to close the border, including at a rally Thursday night in Grand Rapids, Mich., but this time was different as he gave a timetable.

The White House did not immediately respond to questions about whether his possible action would apply to commercial and air travel, but a substantial closure could have an impact on cross-border communities from San Diego to South Texas, as well as supermarkets that sell Mexican produce, factories that rely on imported parts, and other businesses across the country.

The U.S. and Mexico trade about \$1.7 billion in goods daily, according to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which said closing the border would be "an unmitigated economic debacle" that would threaten 5 million U.S. jobs.

"If Mexico doesn't immediately stop ALL illegal immigration coming into the United States through our Southern Border, I will be CLOSING the Border, or large sections of the Border, next week," Trump tweeted. "This would be so easy for Mexico to do, but they just take our money and 'talk.'"

A senior Homeland Security official on Friday suggested Trump was referring to the ongoing surge of mostly Central American families crossing the border from Mexico. Many people who cross the border illegally ultimately request asylum under U.S. law, which does not require asylum seekers to enter at an official crossing.

The official said the U.S. might close designated ports of entry to re-deploy staff to help process parents and children.

Ports of entry are official crossing points that are used by residents and commercial vehicles. The official, who spoke to reporters on condition of anonymity, did not specify which ports the administration was considering closing, but said only that closures were "on the table."

Trump's declaration came a day after Mexican President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador said his country was doing its part to fight migrant smuggling. Criminal networks charge thousands of dollars a person to move migrants through Mexico, increasingly in large groups toward remote sections of

the border.

"We want to have a good relationship with the government of the United States," Lopez Obrador said Friday. He added: "We are going to continue helping so that the migratory flow, those who pass through our country, do so according to the law, in an orderly way."

Customs and Border Protection commissioner Kevin McAleenan said Wednesday that 750 border inspectors would be reassigned to deal with the growing number of migrant families, and the DHS official said Friday that the department was seeking volunteers from other agencies to help.

Democratic and Republican lawmakers have fought over whether there is a "crisis" at the border, particularly amid Trump's push for a border wall, which he claims will solve immigration problems, though a wall wouldn't keep out families who cross the border at official points so they can surrender and be detained.

Trump called on Congress to change what he said were weak U.S. immigration laws, which he blamed on Democrats. The Department of Homeland Security wants the authority to detain families for longer and more quickly deport children from Central America who arrive at the border on their own. The department argues those policy changes would stop families from trying to enter the country.

## Judge deals Trump a setback over business insurance plan

WASHINGTON — A federal judge has struck down a small-business health insurance plan widely touted by President Donald Trump, the second setback in a week for the administration's health care initiatives.

U.S. District Judge John D. Bates wrote in his opinion late Thursday that so-called association health plans were "clearly an end-run" around consumer protections required by the Obama-era Affordable Care Act.

On Wednesday, another federal judge blocked the Trump administration's Medicaid work requirements for low-income people. The legal setbacks came as Trump unexpectedly pivoted back to health care this week, promising a new plan to replace the ACA, commonly called Obamacare.

But many congressional Republicans don't want to have that fight again. Democrats are gleeful, seeing a chance to shift the national conversation to one of their top issues.

Justice Department spokeswoman Kelly Laco said in a statement Friday that the Trump administration disagrees with the judge's ruling on association health plans and is "considering all available options," including an appeal.

The plans at issue in Bates' ruling Thursday allow groups of small businesses and sole proprietors to band together to offer lower-cost coverage that doesn't have to include all the benefits required by Obamacare. The plans also can be offered across state lines, an attempt to deliver on a major Trump campaign promise.

But Bates wrote that key parts of the Trump administration's policy are "unlawful and must be set aside" because they go against established definitions of what constitutes an employer under a decades-old federal law that governs workplace health and pension benefits.

In particular, a decision by the administration that sole proprietors can be

counted both as employers and employees "stretches the statute too far," Bates wrote.

Trump has eagerly talked up the plans, claiming they're doing record business and promising small-business owners "you're going to save massive amounts of money and have much better health care."

But the plans don't seem to have had a major impact. The Labor Department regulation authorizing them only took effect last summer.

"There's been a few of these that have been announced," said Gary Claxton, an expert on employer health insurance with the nonpartisan Kaiser Family Foundation. "It hasn't been in effect all that long."

Claxton estimated that only a few thousand people may be covered by association plans at the moment. Initial estimates said 3 million to 4 million people eventually would enroll, compared with more than 160 million Americans covered by current employer plans.

New York Attorney General Letitia James, who joined other Democratic state officials in suing the Trump administration, said the judge "saw past the Trump administration's transparent effort to sabotage our health care system and gut these critical consumer protections in the service of its own partisan agenda."

Many state officials see federal insurance regulation of small-business plans as infringing on their own traditional authority.

The Trump administra-

tion, unable to repeal Obamacare in Congress, has tried to use its rule-making powers to open up a pathway for alternatives. In the case of plans for small businesses and sole proprietors, the administration's regulation granted them similar flexibility as enjoyed by big companies. Most large employer plans are not subject to state regulations, and the Obama health law did not make major changes to them either.

But Bates wrote that treating sole proprietors similar to major employers "creates absurd results." For example, said the judge, consider a hypothetical association of 51 sole business owners with no employees. Under the administration's rule, they would in effect be counted as having 51 employees. Not only that, each of the 51 working owners would also be counted as an "employer" although they have "zero" people working for them, the judge wrote. And the association also would count as an employer, for a total of 52 employers.

The GOP turmoil over health care has come as a boon to Democrats, who are looking to change the subject from special counsel Robert Mueller's conclusion that the Trump campaign did not conspire with the Russian government to sway the 2016 election.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi this week joined in unveiling legislation that would shore up and expand Obamacare, allowing more middle-class households to qualify for assistance paying their premiums.

## U.S. condemns deployment of Russian troops to Venezuela

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration on Friday condemned Venezuela's President Nicolas Maduro for what it said was his reliance on foreign military personnel to stay in power and renewed a warning to Russia against getting involved.

President Donald Trump's national security adviser John Bolton along with the U.S. special envoy for Venezuela Elliott Abrams said Russia's military presence in the coun-

try is destabilizing amid the country's political and economic crisis.

The U.S. estimates there are about 100 Russian troops in Venezuela, primarily working on the country's Russian-purchased S-300 air defense systems, which may have been damaged by widespread power outages.

Abrams also said the presence of several thousand Cubans, mainly in Venezuela's intelligence services, was troubling.

## Ga. House gives final OK to 'fetal heartbeat' abortion ban

WASHINGTON — Bucking intense opposition from abortion rights groups, citizens and doctors, the Georgia House gave final approval Friday to a "fetal heartbeat" abortion ban outlawing almost all abortions in the state.

The bill now goes to Republican Gov. Brian Kemp, who supports it.

The ultimate goal, like that of several GOP controlled states moving to enact the strict abortion

bans, is to get a case in front of the U.S. Supreme Court to challenge its 1973 Roe v. Wade ruling that legalized abortion nationwide.

Women in Georgia currently seek an abortion during the first 20 weeks of a pregnancy. A heartbeat can be detected in an embryo as early as six weeks, before many women know they are pregnant. Opponents have vowed a court challenge.

## In Ukraine, allegations of president, rival bribing voters

KIEV, Ukraine — Ukraine's interior minister has accused both the president and a former premier of waging campaigns that involve bribing voters ahead of Sunday's presidential election — a blunt claim seen as part of the increasingly vicious infighting in the top echelons of the government.

Arsen Avakov said his ministry is looking into hundreds of claims that campaigners for President

Petro Poroshenko and former Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko were offering money to voters.

Opinion polls show Poroshenko and Tymoshenko trailing comedian Volodymyr Zelenskyy, who stars in a TV series about a teacher who becomes president after a video of him denouncing corruption goes viral. A runoff is likely as no candidate is expected to win an absolute majority.



## At memorial, mosque survivor says he forgives N.Z. attacker

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand — A man who survived New Zealand's mosque attacks told a crowd of about 20,000 people on Friday that he forgives the terrorist who killed his wife and 49 others.

Farid Ahmed was speaking at a national remembrance service held in Christchurch to commemorate those who died in the attacks two weeks ago.

"I don't want to have a heart that is boiling like a volcano," Ahmed said. "A volcano has anger, fury, rage. It doesn't have peace. It has hatred. It burns itself within, and also it burns the surroundings. I don't want to have a heart like this."

Farid Ahmed spoke of the corrosiveness of hatred.

Ahmed said that while he didn't agree with the gunman's actions, his Muslim faith taught him that even the terrorist was his brother.

The name of Ahmed's wife, Husna Ahmed, was among the 50 read out by members of the Muslim community during a solemn part of the service.

It was the third major

memorial held in Christchurch since the March 15 slaughter of worshippers who were inside the two mosques for Friday prayers. Australian Brenton Harrison Tarrant, 28, has been charged with murder in the attacks.

The latest memorial service was a more formal occasion, with Australian Prime Minister Scott Morrison and other foreign dignitaries attending.

New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern, who wore an indigenous Maori cloak, said the world had been stuck in a vicious cycle of extremism which must end. She said her country had learned the stories of those impacted by the attacks.

## Defense, prosecutors ask judge to deport Butina

WASHINGTON — Attorneys for Maria Butina and U.S. prosecutors jointly asked a federal judge Friday to order the gun rights activist deported to her native Russia after she is sentenced on April 26 for conspiring with a senior Russian official to infiltrate conservative American

groups as an undeclared agent for the Kremlin.

Butina has sought removal since pleading guilty in December in a deal with prosecutors, agreeing to cooperate with the investigation into her efforts on behalf of the Russian government.

Butina, 30, earlier in the

case admitted to working at the direction of Alexander Torshin, a Russian former government official, and with an American political operative to forge connections with NRA officials, conservative leaders and 2016 presidential candidates, including Donald Trump.

## Autopsy: Child migrant death in custody due to infection

HOUSTON — An autopsy has found that a 7-year-old girl from Guatemala died of a bacterial infection while detained by the U.S. Border Patrol, in a case that drew worldwide attention to the plight of migrant families detained at the southern U.S. border.

The El Paso County Medical Examiner's office released a report Friday on the death of Jakelin Caal Maquin, 7. Jakelin died Dec. 8, just over a day after she and her father were apprehended by Border Patrol agents.

The report says traces of streptococcus bacteria were found in Jakelin's lungs, adrenal gland, liver and spleen. The autopsy says she faced a "rapidly progressive infection" that led to the failure of multiple organs.

Jakelin was one of two children to die in Border Patrol custody in December.

**Cabinet exit:** The head of the Small Business Administration, Linda McMahon, is stepping down from the role and will help President Donald Trump's re-election effort, he said Friday.

Trump announced McMahon's plans from his Palm Beach, Fla., estate. Sitting next to the former wrestling executive and Republican donor, Trump said she had done an "outstanding" job.

Trump said he would make a nomination soon.

McMahon and her husband, Vince, founded and built World Wrestling Entertainment, now a publicly traded sports entertainment company. She also poured \$100 million of her fortune into two unsuccessful bids for a U.S. Senate seat in Connecticut in 2010 and 2012.

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## Barr: Congress to get redacted Mueller report by mid-April

WASHINGTON — A redacted version of special counsel Robert Mueller's report on the Russia investigation will be sent to Congress by mid-April and will not be shared with the White House beforehand, Attorney General William Barr said Friday.

In a letter to the chairmen of the House and Senate judiciary committees, Barr said he shares a desire for Congress and the public to be able to read Mueller's findings, which are included in the nearly 400-page report the special counsel submitted last week.

While Barr said President Donald Trump would have the right to assert executive privilege over

parts of the report, Trump "has stated publicly that he intends to defer to me and, accordingly, there are no plans to submit the report to the White House for a privilege review."

Mueller officially concluded his investigation when he submitted the report last Friday. Two days later, Barr sent a four-page letter to Congress that detailed Mueller's "principal conclusions."

Mueller did not find that the Trump campaign coordinated or conspired with Russia, Barr wrote, and did not reach a conclusion on whether Trump obstructed justice. Barr said he and Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein decided on their own that Mueller's evidence was insufficient to establish that the president committed obstruction.

Barr said he is preparing to redact multiple categories of information from the report and Mueller is helping the Justice Department identify sections that will be blacked out.

Those include grand jury material, information that would compromise sensitive sources and methods; information that could affect ongoing investigations, including those referred by Mueller's office to other Justice Department offices and information that could infringe on the personal privacy and reputation of "peripheral third parties."

Barr said last week's letter detailing Mueller's "principal conclusions" was not intended to be an "exhaustive recounting" of the investigation.

"Everyone will soon be able to read it on their own," Barr wrote.

## Trump's pick for Fed post draws fire, praise

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's latest pick to help lead the Federal Reserve has received a rocky reception — with top economists raising several red flags about whether Stephen Moore is qualified to be a governor of the world's most influential central bank.

Moore is a former Trump campaign adviser who helped design the 2017 tax cuts and the co-authored "Trumponomics." The economists say Moore poses the distinct risk of injecting politics into an institution that strives to remain free of political influence when setting short-term interest rates that can determine the path of employment, inflation and overall growth.

"He's merely a propagandist, as far as I can tell," said Menzie Chinn, an economist at the University of Wisconsin. "He makes just egregious mistakes in fact and theory."

Even a prominent Republican economist criticized the choice of Moore after Trump's announcement last week.

"Steve is a perfectly amiable guy, but he does not have the intellectual gravitas for this important job," Harvard University economist Greg Mankiw said in a blog post.

Mankiw, a former chairman of the White House Council of Economic Advisers for President George W. Bush, added: "It is time for Senators (sic) to do their job. Mr. Moore should not be

confirmed."

Still, other prominent conservative voices are rallying to Moore.

The Wall Street Journal, for which Moore was once an editorial writer, has endorsed him in a new editorial, asserting that "he might be a useful counter to the group-think" among Fed officials. The endorsement asserted that the "remarkable cascade of derision and condescension" from academic economists on Moore's nomination is itself evidence that he should be a Fed governor.

Moore, who has been affiliated with multiple conservative groups, including the Heritage Foundation, has taken a series of controversial stances about the Fed, despite acknowledging that he still needs to learn about how the regulator works.

He previously said that the Fed should be scrapped in favor of the gold standard. He called on the Fed to hike rates during the Great Recession, a move that could

have further crippled the United States. And he recently said that Fed Chairman Jerome Powell should be fired for rate hikes last year that, in his opinion, undermined the gains from Trump's tax cuts.

The controversy took on a new dimension this week when it was reported that he had a lien of more than \$75,000 filed against him in January 2018 for unpaid taxes.

Moore did not respond to an interview request for this report.

A U.S. official familiar with the matter said Moore's background check, a requirement of the nomination process, was still underway. His nomination has not been sent to the Senate.

The official insisted on anonymity to discuss private conversations.

But the president is likely to stick with Moore after having been disappointed by his decision to make Powell chairman, said Dan Clifton, a partner at the advisory firm Strategas.

## Hawaii targets teen vaping, proposes flavored-liquid ban

HONOLULU — The first state to limit tobacco and electronic cigarette sales to people 21 and older is contemplating a new nicotine crackdown: outlawing flavored electronic cigarette liquids and flavored tobacco to combat a spike in teenage vaping.

Hawaii would be the first state to adopt such a ban under a bill before the Legislature. San Francisco was the first U.S. city to do so.

The proposal would ban flavored e-cigarette liquids such as Maui Mango and Cookie Monsta, along with cloves and other flavored tobacco products, but it would exempt menthol cigarettes and vaping liquids.

Supporters aim to make e-cigarettes less alluring to teenagers as studies show increasing numbers of high school and middle school students are becoming addicted to nicotine through vaping.

Battery-powered e-cigarettes typically heat flavored nicotine solutions into an inhalable vapor. They're more popular among teens than regular cigarettes, and most experts agree they're less harmful than cigarettes because the vapors don't contain tar and other cancer-causing byproducts of burning tobacco.

But there is virtually no research on the long-term effects of the chemicals in the vapor, some of which are toxic. And some researchers believe vaping will make kids more likely to take up

cigarettes.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration this month proposed restricting sales of most flavored tobacco products to stores that verify the customer's age upon entry or include a separate, age-restricted area for vaping products. The FDA said it would prioritize removing vaping products that clearly appeal to kids, such as those with packaging that resembles juice boxes, candy or cookies.

Students testified to Hawaii lawmakers last week that their classmates were vaping in bathrooms and isolated corners of campus. Some teens post social media videos of themselves exhaling plumes, the students said.

"I can't keep on walking into the bathroom at school and get hit in the face with a vape cloud that smells like cotton candy and not be able to work the rest of the day because of a headache," said Paige McCurdy, a sophomore at Kapolei High

School near Honolulu, in testimony at the Legislature. "It is affecting students, and it just needs to stop."


A 2017 Hawaii Health Department study found 16 percent of middle schoolers and 26 percent of high school students were users of e-cigarettes. The number of high school students experimenting with vaping jumped four-fold between 2011 and 2015, the study said.

A House committee exempted menthol from the bill because prohibiting the flavor would dramatically reduce the tax revenue the state brings in from menthol cigarettes.

Bill opponents say e-cigarettes play an important role in helping smokers of traditional cigarettes reduce or stop smoking. They cite a recent study in the New England Journal of Medicine showing e-cigarettes were nearly twice as effective as nicotine gums and patches at helping people quit.

#### Help drivers stay up-to-date

Two years ago, an Illinois state trooper pulled me over for not changing lanes while passing a traffic stop. He asked me if I had heard of Scott's Law. He explained it was enacted because a firefighter had been hit on the road during a traffic accident.

Having never heard of the law, I questioned why. It seems it is my responsibility to keep up with changes in the driving laws. I question how many Illinoisans take the time to do this. (I had not.) In reading about it, I was surprised to find that the law had been expanded in 2017 to include any vehicle with flashing lights.

## Illinois shut down Sterigenics because of ethylene oxide. Meanwhile, in Lake County ...

Famed architect Mies van der Rohe preached "less is more," but that doesn't apply to data-gathering — particularly when that data involves carcinogenic pollutants. Repeated air testing around the Sterigenics plant in Willowbrook showed elevated levels of ethylene oxide, a cancer-causing chemical. That led to Gov. J.B. Pritzker's decision to effectively order the plant's shutdown in February.

After the closure, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency inspectors conducted another round of air monitoring to determine ethylene oxide levels in the absence of emissions. As the Tribune's Michael Hawthorne reports, average ethylene oxide levels after the plant shut down were at least 50 percent lower than they had been. At testing sites closest to Sterigenics, the levels were more than 90 percent lower.

More data came Friday, when the Illinois Department of Public Health released study results that show elevated rates of Hodgkin's lymphoma and breast cancer in women in the area near Sterigenics.

That brings us to Lake County, where some residents are wondering *Hey, what about us?*

**Lake County has its own worries about ethylene oxide.** Two plants emit the chemical into the air under a legal permit: Medline Industries in Waukegan and Vantage Specialty Chemicals in Gurnee. Medline uses ethylene oxide to sterilize medical supplies. Vantage uses it in the manu-

facture of household products such as soap and shampoo.

As Hawthorne has reported, based on government reports, communities surrounding the Medline and Vantage facilities face some of the highest long-term cancer risks in the U.S., potentially because of pollutants in the air. In one area near Medline, the risk was nearly five times higher than the national average.

Yet both the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Illinois EPA are balking at conducting air monitoring tests for ethylene oxide emissions in Lake County, the Lake County News-Sun reported. The agencies don't think the risk is the same in Lake County as it is in DuPage, the paper reported.

How will regulators know unless they test?

Recall that it was additional testing done around Sterigenics in Willowbrook in November and December that preceded the decision by Pritzker and the Illinois EPA to suspend the plant's use of ethylene oxide, which the company uses to sterilize medical instruments, pharmaceuticals and food. Those tests detected apparent spikes in ethylene oxide even higher than levels detected before the company took additional pollution control measures last summer.

Air monitoring helps federal and state EPA officials, as well as people who live near such plants, to gauge the level of health risk created by the emissions. If tests show no serious health threat, they should allay resi-

dents' fears. Or, if levels of ethylene oxide are worrisome, the tests could prompt regulators to act.

**But balking at conducting tests leaves everyone in the dark.** That's foolhardy, particularly when you consider what's already known about ethylene oxide. The federal government classifies it as a known carcinogen. Chronic exposure is linked to leukemia, breast cancer and lymphomas. Some data suggest chronic exposure can also impair cognitive function.

The Lake County Health Department now says it plans to do its own testing. Lake County taxpayers shouldn't have to bear that expense. And the county shouldn't have to take on a job that federal and state EPA inspectors already have the expertise for.

People who live near the Lake County plants have the same worries about ethylene oxide as the residents of southeast DuPage County. They want to know what's in the air around them. They want to know it's safe for their kids to walk to school, to play at a local park. And they want the same attention to the problem that residents in DuPage County received. Friday's report from the Illinois Department of Public Health about cancer levels near the Sterigenics plant in Willowbrook will only intensify the Lake County residents' concerns.

Given that it's about the air they breathe, testing that air isn't a big ask.

### WHAT OTHERS ARE SAYING

Few universities today see themselves as a vehicle for learning virtues to live a full life. Most now aim to ensure a lucrative career for graduates and to signal social worth for them. Education has become more a consumer commodity and less a guide to civic values and moral progress. The mere acceptance into a top-flight school has become an end in itself followed by receiving a diploma that bestows status. ...

The answer to the illegal or unethical manipulation of admissions is to make sure schools are a community of learners — including teachers — dedicated to character formation, not just intellectual achievements. The message must go out to all staff in higher education that values such as honesty and trust are part of the entire school experience. They are a public good that can be nurtured in the thinking of young people. ... When schools provide constant models for integrity, they can inspire staff, students and parents to see education as developing qualities of thought. The incentives to cut corners should go away.

Under current law, states are allowed to regulate the right to abortion as long as their regulations do not impose an "undue burden." Many states have taken that as an invitation to discourage abortion. For example, some states have required pregnant women to get counseling, which includes descriptions not only of the procedure but also of fetal pain. (Many experts say that fetuses can't feel pain until the third trimester; most abortions take place in the first two trimesters.) They have required women to take and see an ultrasound, to make multiple visits to clinics, and to undergo significant waiting periods. ...

According to one study, administrative burdens increase the cost of abortion by 19 percent and decrease the number of abortions by 13 to 15 percent. One consequence appears to be an increase in the incidence of self-administered abortions. ... With the confirmation of Brett Kavanaugh, there is every reason to think that the Supreme Court will be increasingly receptive to the imposition of new burdens on women seeking abortions.

## Admirable craft, difficult truths

No clichés, just trapped up close in a filthy room with feral teenagers. A must-see for those with strong stomachs.

In Anna Jordan's "Yen," a British drama first seen at Manchester's awesome Royal Exchange Theatre in 2015 and enough to give nightmares to anyone who lives with young teenagers, two half-brothers live among the detritus of food, drink, video games and pornography. They have a dog, Taliban, locked in the back. They have a filthy bed. They have points of view. They have enviable records at Call of Duty. What they do not have is meaningful adult supervision; their mother is a dysfunctional mess and their fathers may as well not exist.

Plays and films revolving around unsupervised teens, espe-

cially boys, have a long history, the idea of the feral youth being a powerful societal terror, a symbol that, depending on the playwright's point of view, can be used to represent both the subjugation of the young and innocent by their neglectful elders and the raw cruelty of youth, untamed. In the best of these works — and I would put Jordan's play in that category — you feel elements of both.

"Yen" (the title references a Britishism for craving) is currently enjoying a unstinting little production in the studio space at the Raven Theatre under the dynamic direction of Elly Green. The setting, incidentally, is far removed from the work's American premiere in New York, where it garnered all sorts of attention

for hosting the professional stage debut of the young movie star Lucas Hedges. No stars here in this space carved out of an old supermarket, just admirable craft and difficult truths.

You might think of this show, which really is worth seeing by the strong of stomach, as a kind of reconstructive take on Chicago-style intensity; the acting work here is all first-rate and fully capable of inducing shivers of

recognition, but also avoids of all the clichés that present themselves in plays with characters reverting to primal behavior.

For the piece to work, you have to feel sympathy for the two young guys, 13-year-old Bobbie (Jesse Aaronson) and 16-year-old Hench (Reed Lancaster), forced to assume this parody of adulthood without the tools even to manage their own bodies. And you have to have at least a modicum of understanding for the boys' addled mother, Maggie (Tiffany Bedwell). But Jordan is also unstinting when she writes about the damage this situation can do, especially to the curious teenage girl, Jennifer (Netta Walker) who find herself embroiled in this toxic world of boy. As Walker beautifully under-

stands, her character tries to teach these guys a kind of normalcy, but it's impossible. They're too broken — and thus they are dangerous.

Aaronson, who is exceptional, walks that line between childhood longing and the dysfunction that follows when adulthood is granted too fast.

And one other note: the lighting design here, from Claire Chrzan, goes far beyond what you normally see or experience at this level of budget. It's another character in this play, an illumination of yen and consequence, daringly dark when it needs to be.

## Meet the Chicagoans pushing for gender equity in classical music

Oboist Ashley Ertz desperately wanted to see — or rather, to hear — change in the classical music she studied and performed.

"It's all from the same dead white guys. Our community here in Chicago is not just all white guys, so why is that all that we're performing?" said the DePaul University senior majoring in classical music. "We are content to hear male composers in the concert hall because we don't realize the amount of fantastic music written by female composers."

Ertz hopes to change that with 5th Wave Collective, a classical music ensemble she co-founded that celebrates female composers through performance and promotion. Since April 2018, the volunteer-based group of more than 115 musicians has performed works by more than 50 female composers via 12 concerts throughout Chicago.

The endeavor started as curiosity after one of Ertz's classes and turned into a spreadsheet of more than 800 female composers whose music incorporated the oboe. With so much music to play — and nobody playing it — 5th

Wave was born.

On Saturday, the group's concert will feature female composers who have lived in, and been influenced by, Chicago. It will include works by Florence Price and Augusta Read Thomas.

"We go through years of college just learning about these male composers because that's what's known, that's who was written about, that's who was documented," Ertz said. Others echo her push for gender equity and equality in the classical music scene.

Chicago Sinfonietta, the MacArthur Award-winning orchestra that champions diversity in classical music, released its new album "Project W: Works by Diverse Women Composers" to coincide with Women's History Month.

Produced by James Ginsburg on his Cedille label at Wentz Hall in Naperville in 2017 and 2018, it features premiere recordings of newly commissioned works by Jennifer Higdon, Brazilian-American and Chicago resident Clarice Assad, African-American Jessie Montgomery and Indian-American Reena Esmail.

"We at the Chicago Sinfonietta, sought out composers that we thought their voices need to be heard," said Mei-Ann Chen, the

group's music director. "We planned for this for about three years and really wanted our 30th-anniversary season to be about one of the most neglected groups in classical music, which is women composers."

According to data from the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, only 1.3 percent of works performed by professional orchestras in the U.S. during the 2016-17 season were written by women.

Ginsburg pointed to a Crain's Chicago Business article that mentioned that concertgoers could hear twice as many orchestral pieces composed by women in a single Sinfonietta program than in two full seasons of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. "That shows you just how much ground needs to be made up," he said.

Chen said many regional orchestras don't have the luxury of programming an unknown composer because of ticket sales dip, so does the financial health of the organization.

"(Women composers) always have been out there, but it's about this bottleneck of opportunities. There's only so much commissioning money available in the field," Chen said. "Whether the commitment is there to really

dedicate resources behind these deserving voices, that is the question."

She said that once a female composer's work has premiered in "one of the giants" — Chicago or New York — other orchestras are more likely to try it out. To that end, she hopes "Project W" will help the women on the album get added to orchestras' subscription programs on a regular basis.

Ertz believes the album is a great start to the movement and, like Chen, hopes seeing female composers on concert bills eventually becomes the norm.

She, Chen and Ginsburg agree on how to make that happen: Concertgoers need to contact their local orchestra and request more music by women.

"The transformation starts with the donors and audience members — saying we're not going to come unless we start hearing a more diverse representation of your community," Ertz said. "A lot of big donors don't know anything besides Bach, Beethoven and Brahms, so of course that's what they want to hear. But if you slowly sneak in a woman composer here and there, then they'll start to hear more and they'll be like: 'Can we hear some more of that?'"

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



# Agnes Varda: French New Wave pioneer

Death, the glorious filmmaker Agnes Varda once told an interviewer, did not scare her. She looked forward to it, in fact, "because then that will be that!"

And now, that is that. In her Paris home Varda died Thursday, at 90, from complications caused by breast cancer. She was surrounded by family and friends, according to a statement describing the Brussels-born multimedia artist, who first found success with photography, as a "joyful feminist" and a "passionate artist."

Few filmmakers any-

where enjoyed a heartier, more joyful third act than Varda. In 2017 she was awarded an honorary Academy Award — gallingly, the first to be given to a female director.

At the 2018 Oscars her exuberant road-tripping documentary "Faces Places," chronicling a roving photography project she embarked upon with friend and photographer JR, received a nomination, making Varda the oldest-ever nominee for any competitive Academy Award.

In that film, Varda tells her cohort she hates working with an itinerary. "Chance, she says, 'has always been my best assistant.'" For decades, across various media, Varda found new and revealing ways to allow chance to flower.

Her final documentary essay, "Varda by Agnès," premiered in February at

the Berlin Film Festival, where she received the honorary Berlinale Camera award.

Varda was probably best known for the disarming "Cleo from 5 to 7" (1962), a highlight of a career too often overshadowed by the French New Wave patriarchy as represented by Jean-Luc Godard, Francois Truffaut and others. For years she was labeled "the mother of the French New Wave," a label that managed to pay tribute to her while marginalizing her talent and opportunities. (She had a long, complicated, artistically fruitful marriage to director Jacques Demy, best known for "The Umbrellas of Cherbourg.")

Born to a Greek father and French mother in Belgium, her family relocated to France during World War II, near the sea.

Her feature filmmaking debut came in 1955 with "La Pointe Courte," done with a largely non-professional cast. It preceded the French New Wave as we know it by several years. A Variety review served as a harbinger of the sort of patronizing sexism Varda had to work around her entire career, sniffing that "the main aspect of this film is that it was made for \$20,000 by a 25-year-old girl."

I met Varda in 2015, on a sunny day at the University of Chicago Logan Center for the Arts patio. On her final visit to Chicago, she was the subject of a week-long retrospective show-casing her work as filmmaker, photographer and visual artist.

We talked about "Cleo from 5 to 7," a film made seemingly in real time, dealing with a Paris model waiting to hear about a potentially life-threatening biopsy result. The film itself ran about 30 minutes shorter than the title suggested, but the style was nonetheless real-seeming, spontaneous — Varda's poetic approximation of reality.

"The language of cinema is the ellipsis," she told me. "You know? I touch my luggage, and suddenly (in

the next shot) I'm in a train. I take my keys, then I'm home. But (with 'Cleo') I was dealing with continuous time and distance in a new way. We didn't cheat with the distance, the trajectory. People still study that film."

We talked about one of the retrospective's video installations, "The People on the Terrace," inspired by a photograph Varda made 51 years earlier, depicting a random group of people. Her film opened up that photo to imagine a scenario and a set of relationships among those people.

She said: "I'm most interested in the moment somebody goes out of the frame. Where do they go? Images are so important to me. I

love them. And I question them, all the time."

Varda and Demy took a chance on Hollywood, and Hollywood did not return the favor. Both directors had an eye for the next big thing: When Harrison Ford was not known by anyone, in the late 1960s, they spotted his potential (studio bosses said he had none). As a Guardian interview noted, Varda got to know Jim Morrison of the Doors. She cast him as an extra in her film "Lions Love."

She and five other people attended Morrison's funeral in 1971.

The director loved bright splashes of color, in her hair, her wardrobe and her life. Color, she told me, served as her "vitamins." She was diminutive of stature, but as she once told an interviewer: "I was always small. But only physically."

Her work came out of what was known as the Left Bank movement, as did the films of Chris Marker, Alain Resnais, Marguerite Duras and a few others. She experimented to the end. "I want to choose my life," a girl says in "Les 3 Boutons," one of her short films. Across seven decades of inquisitive, searching work, Varda asserted her place, value and choices, and how she saw life all around her.

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

## Ebertfest preview: Aretha Franklin doc, mob noir film

The 21st edition of Ebertfest, running April 10-13 at the glorious single-screen anomaly known as the Virginia Theatre in Champaign, marks the seventh festival since the April 4, 2013, death of its namesake, Roger Ebert. But his spirit can be detected, each year, in the films chosen; in the tributes offered by filmmakers and guests; and most obviously in the presence and stewardship of Chaz Ebert and Nate Kohn, who run the festival sponsored by the University of Illinois College of Media. Ebert was a proud of U. of I. alum.

This year's incarnation celebrates many things, among them the debut feature of the Wachowski siblings. The stars of "Bound," Jennifer Tilly and Gina Gershon, will introduce and discuss the neo-noir mystery. Opening night (April 10), festival-goers will get an early look at "Amazing Grace," the long-dormant 1972 concert featuring Aretha Franklin. Already seen in Los Angeles and New York, it's due for a limited theatrical release later in April, and will be streaming thereafter. But it promises to get Ebertfest off to a nice, hot, soulful start.

Sun-Times critic Richard Roeper, Ebert's long-time sparring partner on the nationally syndicated "At the Movies," is a guest of honor this year, part of the deal being his selection of two titles: "Almost Famous," the Cameron Crowe film, and "Sideways," co-starring Virginia Madsen. KANSAS CITY, Mo. — When White Sox manager Rick Renteria told reporters before opening day he wanted top prospect Eloy Jimenez to read “as little as possible,” it seemed like sound advice.

## Early-season lineups become a juggling act

Maddon must ensure that players stay sharp

ARLINGTON, Texas — Demoting Ian Happ to Triple-A Iowa hardly alleviated an annual issue for Cubs manager Joe Maddon.

Thanks to three days off in the season's first 13 days, Maddon must balance keeping his regular position players sharp with providing opportunities for his young reserves.

“I don't like to have guys sit too long, coming off spring training when they're playing regularly,”

Maddon said. “You need to get them out there to get that feeling going. Furthermore, I like buy-in. I like the fact that guys get a part of ownership. When they don't play for a long period of time, they lose that feel of ownership of owning it now.”

“I'm highly aware of that. We have some young players that need to be developed. It's still a juggling (act) with all of that. But it's important early to make sure everyone plays.”

Opening the season at an American League park allows Maddon to use the designated hitter to keep an extra position player sharp.

## Sox require more than just patience, optimism

“That’s part of the business, that’s part of the game. It’s part of what keeps you and keeps the fans in touch with everything that’s going on. We understand that.”

Rebuilds are never easy to go through or to cover. It takes a long time to determine whether it’s actually working, and until that happens there’s a lot of losing to chronicle.

Losing means less interest from fans, which in turn leads to lower TV ratings, fewer clicks on internet articles and more empty seats at the ballpark.

The Sox already are seeing the effects of the constant losing, including a reduction in coverage by the Tribune. ESPN.com has a full-time Cubs reporter but none for the Sox. The Sox’s flagship radio station, WGN-AM 720, sent no one to cover the season opener, while the only local TV stations that sent reporters — besides NBC Sports Chicago, which is partially owned by the Sox — were WGN-9 and FOX-32.

Whether these economic decisions by various media outlets make sense can be debated, but the truth is people generally are more interested in reading about or watching reports on teams that have a shot at contending.

The Sox haven’t been a contender since 2012, and even the most optimistic observers don’t expect them to be in the postseason hunt until 2020 or ’21 at the earliest.

It makes you wonder how much patience Chairman Jerry Reinsdorf has with the rebuild after a combined 195 losses the last two years.

“His patience is still the same,” general manager Rick Hahn said. “Fundamentally, and Jerry’s no exception to this, we’re all fans. So the frustrations or being sick of the losing element that everyone feels, we all feel as well, and Jerry’s no exception.”

“He wants to see progress, just like we all do. At the same time, he’s extremely well-versed of what we have in the farm system and very excited about what the future holds if these things continue to progress the way they have over the last couple years.”

Patience is fine. Optimism is cool. But what can the Sox do in the meantime to create more interest?

Step 1 already is in the books.

By giving Jimenez a roster spot they’ve promoted a bright young star with the potential of filling seats and generating media attention. Now it’s up to Jimenez to perform and for the team to ride on his shoulders.

No one said it’s fair, but Jimenez has to be as good as advertised for this franchise to get to where it needs to be. It’s Eloy or bust.

Step 2 is making a trip to the ballpark a fun experience. Sox marketing guru Brooks Boyer once told USA Today: “You try to make winning and losing as moot of an issue as possible.” But Guaranteed Rate Field isn’t a tourist attraction like Wrigley Field, so the Sox have to do more to make it a destination.

It’s already a kid-friendly place, with youth-sized diamonds in upper left field and the shower in the bleachers. This season’s big addition, Goose Island in the right-field bleachers, figures to be popular with beer-loving fans and gawkers not watching the game.

Step 3 is reducing prices on everything from tickets to concessions to parking to memorabilia. But that’s a step every rebuilding team should take, not just the Sox.

Step 4 is appealing directly to their South Side core, which Nicky Delmonico did by calling Cubs fans annoying at SoxFest. It didn’t help Delmonico make the team, but it certainly created media interest.

The latest marketing ploy was to give free Sox-themed tattoos to 30 randomly chosen fans, none of whom were members of the infamous Ligue family. Whether getting a tattoo of Southpaw, the Sox’s furbal mascot, is a sensible life decision is irrelevant to the Sox, who got some attention for the stunt.

Step 5 is having a sense of humor about the losing, knowing it’s only temporary. A local tabloid made a full-page photo illustration of Cubs President Theo Epstein walking on water at the start of the Cubs rebuild, and then came back with one of Epstein submerged under water after they lost 101 games in 2012.

Epstein laughed it off, then put a team in the playoffs three years later before winning a championship in 2016. The paper that didn’t buy into Epstein’s plan did a complete about-face. Maybe they should put Hahn walking on water to see if history can repeat itself.

Like the Cubs during their hard times, the Sox know winning ultimately is the best revenge.

But until that happens, they’ll have to deal with the issues consuming every rebuilding team.

# Darvish is back where it all began

Former Ranger must focus on middle innings, composure

ARLINGTON, Texas — Yu Darvish grew up in Japan, but he says most of his baseball development came during his 6½ seasons with the Rangers.

And now with a healthy right arm, Darvish’s stature with the Cubs could take a big leap Saturday night against the Rangers at Globe Life Park.

“It was a good spring training for him with his attitude and his work, and I’m glad his blister healed up in time,” Cubs President Theo Epstein said. “But the real work begins now. We all together start the work of competing day in and day out for the next seven months. It will be nice to see how he responds.”

There are two major checkpoints for Darvish, who was limited to eight starts last year because of an elbow injury.

The first is monitoring Darvish’s work in the middle innings — particularly the fifth when opponents batted .533 and saddled him with a 25.20 ERA.

“The big thing is to be healthy,” manager Joe Maddon said. “And the command of his stuff matters. I can envision (Darvish

throwing) six to seven innings when he’s on a good roll.”

Darvish said his blister is nearly healed completely and he believes he could throw more than 100 pitches Saturday night.

The other factor is composure, as this will mark the first time Darvish will face his former team and his first time back at Globe Life, where he posted a 31-19 record with a 3.60 ERA in 65 career starts.

Since the start of spring training, Darvish, who is in the second year of a six-year, \$126 million contract, has looked forward to the opportunity to face his former teammates.

“It means a lot,” Darvish said of the chance to pitch at Global Life. “This stadium has a lot of history, and I’m so happy to throw here in the opening series.”

Darvish didn’t hesitate to say which teammates he is most looking forward to facing.

“Elvis Andrus, Rougned Odor, Nomar Mazara, Joey Gallo,” Darvish said.

So essentially the entire lineup? “Exactly,” Darvish replied.

Darvish will try to make amends for a 2018 season in which he walked 21 in 40 innings and averaged only five innings per start before elbow pain stopped him.

But the Cubs won’t play another inter-league series in an AL park until April 30-May 1, when shortstop Addison Russell could be eligible to return from a 40-game suspension for violating Major League Baseball’s domestic-violence policy.

Happ’s demotion seemingly gives Albert Almora Jr. the opportunity to become the everyday center fielder and leadoff hitter. But one newcomer, infielder Daniel Descalso, is expected to get chances in the leadoff spot.

Maddon doesn’t want to overextend Ben Zobrist, who turns 38 on May 26. But Zobrist is one of the Cubs’ most polished hitters and may be needed to play right field when Jason Heyward shifts to center to replace Almora against tough right-handed pitchers.

“Everyone understands they’re part of a deep roster and they play for a manager who likes to find the best possible matchups on a daily basis and prioritizes that over an everyday lineup,” President Theo Epstein said. “In an honest moment, I think everyone would admit that gives us the best chance to win with the lineups and with the depth over the course of a season.”

The Texas series gives Maddon the opportunity to use Zobrist as the DH, which he did in on opening day.

For now, Maddon plans to write out the lineup cards for each series in advance instead of the morning before each game. But that could be affected by injuries, a change in the opposing starting pitcher and postponements.

“I’ll try not to jump the gun,” Maddon said. “I want to get this in place.”

Maddon already made one bold move Thursday by starting Mark Zagunis, who had only 19 major-league at-bats, over Kyle Schwarber in left field. But Maddon’s rationale was that Zagunis might fare better against Rangers left-hander Mike Minor, and the move paid off as Zagunis hit a tiebreaking double during a six-run fifth-inning rally.

“It’s something we’ve been trying to hammer home this offseason, and now is the buy-in from the whole group,” Maddon said. “And some days it’s going to be somebody else. The conversations have been very transparent and everyone is on board, so it was a very easy exchange between me and (Schwarber).”

The Cubs considered several veteran catchers this spring before settling on Victor Caratini, 25, as their primary backup to Willson Contreras despite only 38 major-league starts.

Contreras, 26, led the majors with 1,109⅓ innings caught last year and admitted feeling fatigued in the second half, when he batted .200 with only 11 extra-base hits.

Maddon, a former catcher, said Caratini is “absolutely a major-league baseball player” but admits there’s a balancing act between winning and developing players.

“We’re here to win right now, and while we’re doing that, we’re still developing some young players,” Maddon said. “We did that all last season kind of well.”

“It’s a constant battle.”

## Auburn dispatches top seed

Tigers beat UNC to move to Elite 8 for 1st time since '86

The first No. 1 seed has fallen in the NCAA Tournament — and it's North Carolina.

Fifth-seeded Auburn upset the Tar Heels 97-80 in the Midwest Region semifinal behind a barrage of second-half 3-pointers in Kansas City, Mo. And that sent the Tigers on to the Elite Eight for only the second time and first since 1986.

Chuma Okeke had 20 points and 11 rebounds before going down with an apparent knee injury midway through the second half. He was moving to the basket when his left leg bent awkwardly to the inside. Teammates and North Carolina players alike gathered around Okeke before he walked to the locker room with assistance.

Auburn led just 41-39 at halftime before taking over. The Tigers (29-9) hit 12 of 18 3-pointers after halftime and 17 of 37 for the game, scoring 56 points after halftime to take control by building a big lead.

Coby White and Cameron Johnson each had 15 points for the Tar Heels (29-7), who shot just 43 percent and made 7 of 28 3-pointers.

**Michigan State 80, LSU 63:** For all of Michigan State's veteran experience, its freshmen led the way into the Elite Eight.


Aaron Henry scored a career-best 20 and fellow frosh Gabe Brown had 15 as the second-seeded Spartans (31-6) beat third-seeded LSU in Washington to move on to the NCAA Tournament's East Region final.

Coach Tom Izzo's upperclassman-heavy team is one victory away from its first Final Four appearance since 2015.

Michigan State took it to LSU on the glass, outrebounding the Tigers 34-20. At halftime, Michigan State had as many offensive rebounds as the Tigers (28-7) had total boards, at times making it look like 5-on-4 when the ball came off the rim.

It didn't bounce off the rim much for the Spartans early as they took advantage of an LSU defense that left them uncontested 3-point shots. Michigan State had five 3s in the first 10 minutes alone, and LSU never adjusted defensively.

Tremont Waters scored 10 points during a 13-0 LSU run spanning the first half into the second to cut the deficit to four. Then Michigan State blew the game wide open with 3-pointers. The Spartans hit four of their first five 3-point attempts out of halftime.

Henry did his best Draymond Green impression as the do-it-all 6-foot-6 forward was all over the offensive end. He had eight rebounds and six assists and was 9 of 14 from the floor.

Brown came in averaging 2 points a game and scored more than he had in his past 11 games combined. Brown had just five points in the Spartans' past 12 games, but became a central figure against LSU.

Standout point guard Cassius Winston went toe-to-toe with Waters and finished with 17 points as one of four Michigan State players in double figures.

Michigan State faces the winner of the matchup between overall top seed Duke and No. 4 seed Virginia Tech in the regional final Sunday. This is Michigan State's fifth Elite Eight appearance in the past 11 years and 10th under Izzo.

## Green light for UNC's Little

After fighting flu-like symptoms earlier in the week, North Carolina freshman Nassir Little came off the bench and played against Auburn in its Sweet 16 game Friday night in Kansas City, Mo.

Little missed practice Wednesday in Chapel Hill and Thursday when the team arrived in Kansas City. Tar Heels coach Roy Williams said he could barely lift a fork when the team had lunch Thursday and there was "no way he can play" in that state.

A school spokesman said that Little had improved enough to participate in Friday's shootaround before being a game-time decision.

**Following Steph:** Purdue guard Carsen Edwards has shot his way into some NCAA Tournament territory marked off by Steph Curry during his Davidson days. Edwards is the first player since Curry to score at least 25 points in four straight tournament games. Curry's streak was five straight with at least 25 points in 2007 and 2008.

Edwards has picked up where he left off in the NCAA Tournament last year, when he scored 30 in a loss against Texas Tech. The junior guard opened this tournament scoring 26 against Old Dominion, followed up with a career-high in knocking off defending champ Villanova in the second round, then had 29 Thursday night in a 99-94 overtime win over Tennessee.

"He's a great shooter, and he comes off a lot of off-ball screens," Virginia freshman guard Kihei Clark said of Edwards. "I'm going to have to stay on his hip pocket and make sure I get a hand up and contest."

Edwards will have a chance to match that and another Curry streak in the South regional final against top-seeded Virginia if he can knock down at least four more 3s.

**Layups:** California hired Mark Fox as its new coach, just five days after firing Wyking Jones. Fox had a 286-176 record in 14 seasons as coach at Nevada and Georgia. He made the NCAA Tournament five times but never advanced to the Sweet 16. ... St. John's guard Shamorie Ponds will skip his senior season to enter the NBA draft. The school announced that Ponds intends to hire an agent. He'll leave as the school's fifth all-time leading scorer with 1,870 points in three seasons. ... Syracuse star Tyus Battle is not coming back for his senior year. In an open letter to fans published Friday in The Post-Standard of Syracuse, Battle made his decision after reports he'd leave surfaced when the Orange were eliminated in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. ... UCLA's leading scorer Kris Wilkes won't play under UCLA's new coach. The sophomore forward from Indianapolis has hired an agent and declared for the NBA draft.

## DeBrincat cements his elite credentials

2nd-year sniper reaches 40-goal mark, belying his draft position

Say, what's that thing that hockey players need to do to win hockey games?

Oh, yeah: They need to score goals.

The Blackhawks had a ferocious offense for nearly three months before the goals disappeared, and with them their chances of making the playoffs. After scoring five goals in two periods against the Maple Leafs on March 13, the Hawks scored just nine goals over 19 periods.

The Hawks beat the Leafs but went 2-3-1 in the following six games as they failed to score more than two goals in any game and were shut out against the Coyotes on Tuesday night. Whatever the reason, the offense returned in Thursday's 5-4 win over the Sharks, sparked by three first-period goals.

As coach Jeremy Colliton put it: "We remembered how to score."

Too bad they forgot how in the previous six games or the postseason might still be a possibility.

Here are three takeaways from Thursday night's win.

### 1. Alex DeBrincat hit 40 goals and he's just getting started.

Being a second-round pick is nothing to sneeze at. The NHL has plenty of stars who were passed over in the first round, including Hawks second-rounders Duncan Keith, Brandon Saad and Corey Crawford.

But DeBrincat never should have been a second-round pick. Despite remarkable numbers for the OHL's Erie Otters, he was available when the Hawks picked 39th overall in 2016 because of his size.

Maybe that tends to be true about some players. It wasn't true about the 5-foot-7 DeBrincat.

After scoring a pair of goals against the Sharks on Thursday, DeBrincat hit the 40-goal mark during his second NHL season and has 68 goals and 57 assists in 159 career games.

There are only three players from the 2016 draft who have more goals than DeBrincat — Auston Matthews, Patrik Laine and Matthew Tkachuk. They were taken first, second and sixth overall.

The eight players taken ahead of him in the second round — all of whom were about the same age as DeBrincat when the draft took place — have combined for two goals and two assists in 21 games.

Both of his goals Thursday against the Sharks were due to his incredible nose for the puck and shockingly quick shot. The first came during a Hawks five-on-three power play, when DeBrincat put back his own rebound, finding the puck in front of the net and backhanding it in before Sharks goalie Martin Jones could recover.

DeBrincat's second goal was more typical for him. It came when Dylan Strome found him in front of the net and he one-timed a shot with precision over Jones' shoulder.


"When you get to see him every night you realize the skill set he has is pretty special," Colliton said after the game. "That release (is) unbelievable, and when he does release it he puts it in a good spot. But to have 40 goals in his second season is tremendous."

### 2. Dylan Sikura is still searching for his first goal.

When the Hawks are finally mathematically eliminated, don't be surprised to see Sikura's ice time increase. The team is going to do whatever it takes to get him his first goal.

Sikura has offensive talent, that's clear. He also has been much better at getting open for chances over the last few weeks, particularly when he has been playing on the top line. But with no goals on 51 shots on net, Sikura hasn't shown anywhere near the quick release or ability to find the corners that DeBrincat has.

A case in point came during the first shift of third period when Sikura and Toews had a two-on-one. Toews drew the defender over before putting a perfect pass onto Sikura's stick. Instead of going with a quick release, Sikura settled the puck, then shot into the middle of Jones' chest.

### 3. Another scary Sharks moment for Corey Crawford.

It was about 3½ months ago that the Sharks' Evander Kane ran over Crawford at the United Center, giving Crawford a concussion that cost him more than two months.

There almost was a repeat of that early in the first period when Sharks forward Marcus Sorensen barreled toward the net and made no real attempt to halt his momentum before pushing Crawford toward the back of the net.

The collision wasn't nearly as violent as the one in December and Crawford avoided getting pushed back so hard that he might have hit his head on the ice or against one of the goal posts. It ended up being a two-minute penalty on Sorensen for goaltender interference.

But it once again illustrated the danger that Crawford — and every goalie — faces each time he takes the net.

## Health scare leaves Markkanen unfazed

Says 'I'm not worried' by heart incident as he works out with monitor

Lauri Markkanen's comedic chops remain intact. So there's that.

Addressing reporters for the first time since the Bulls revealed he is done for the season because of fatigue and a rapid heart rate incident, Markkanen didn't miss a beat when asked how he's feeling.

"Great," he said enthusiastically. "How about yourself?"

Markkanen worked out Friday while wearing a heart monitor, which the Bulls are using to gather additional information after their initial battery of tests and examinations checked out normal.

"I'm better," Markkanen said. "I'm not worried."

In fact, Markkanen said he planned to participate in the non-contact portions of practice and travel with the team over the season's final 13 days to act as if he's playing. He just won't, you know, play in actual games.

"We're trying to act like I'm living the normal NBA life and they're going to see how I react to that," Markkanen said. "I feel fine right now."

Markkanen stayed overnight Tuesday in Toronto after missing the second half of the loss to the Raptors. It's the second time this month Markkanen has experienced a rapid heart rate, although he clarified Friday the first experience that occurred during the four-overtime victory in Atlanta on March 1.

"That was really more flu-like symptoms. I felt pretty weak and kind of had a sore throat and really exhausted. So I thought, 'I'm just sick,'" Markkanen said. "I wouldn't think that those are related."

"In Toronto, I just felt kind of when you're running and you feel you're exhausted. It felt like I was at the end of a workout just a couple minutes in. It wasn't

scary but felt pretty weird. Hopefully this was a one-time deal."

Markkanen missed the first 23 games to a severe right elbow injury he suffered the first week of training camp. After playing in 68 games his rookie season, he managed just 52 this season.

"Last year was more of a problem because I missed two games, then I'd play 10 and miss another two," Markkanen said of dealing with various nagging injuries. "That was kind of frustrating. It's just total accident what happened to my elbow in September. I took a lot of pride, even if I had something small, just playing through it and not missing any more games. I know health is the most important. So I'm just frustrated that I can't play, but it is what it is."

Coach Jim Boylen said Markkanen was in "great spirits" when he entered the Advocate Center.

"I thought he looked good," Boylen said. "He was anxious to get going. That's the Lauri we are used to. I haven't sensed any fear in his body language. He'll go through this and hopefully he'll come out (with) no issues."

# Woods set for clash

Tiger stands in way of Rory's path to No. 1 ranking

AUSTIN, Texas — Tiger Woods sent fans into a frenzy Friday with a sublime stretch of golf that left them wanting more at the Dell Technologies Match Play.

And that's what they'll get.


Woods won four straight holes with three birdies and an 83-yard lob wedge that spun back into the hole for an eagle, carrying him into the weekend with a 4-and-2 victory over Patrick Cantlay.

"Just got hot right when I needed it," Woods said.

It gets even better: Next up for Woods is Rory McIlroy, the hottest player in golf.

McIlroy won his group by beating Matt Fitzpatrick, 4 and 2. Not only was it McIlroy's third victory in as many matches this week at Austin Country Club, he has never trailed and has led in 37 of the 42 holes he has played.

Woods and McIlroy have never faced with other in match play. The last time they squared off was in the

final round last year at the Tour Championship, where Woods capped off his comeback season with a victory.

"I just hope I put up a better fight than I did in Atlanta last year," McIlroy said. "I didn't have much of a game that day. But yeah, look, it's exciting. It's exciting for the tournament. I'm sure it's going to be exciting for us."

Henrik Stenson emerged from the group of major champions by beating Jim Furyk, while Matt Kuchar birdied the last hole to tie Jon Rahm and win his group.

The 16 group winners

advance to single elimination Saturday morning.

One match dwarfed them all. Woods hasn't competed in Texas since 2005, and he hasn't been in the Match Play since 2013. He had to beat Cantlay and have Aaron Wise knock off Brandt Snedeker to have any chance of advancing.

Woods gave away holes with a poor flop shot behind the sixth green and a mediocre chip on No. 8 to fall 2 down. Cantlay, whose tee shot on No. 9 took a hard hop and wound up in the ravine, still had a 1-up lead when it all turned on the par-3 11th.

Woods holed a 20-foot birdie putt to square the match. Then, he made a 7-foot birdie putt to take the lead and Wise took care of business.

McIlroy, coming off a victory in The Players Championship in his last start, has played so well this year that he has a chance to return to No. 1 in the world if he were to win this World Golf Championship.

He still has to win four matches, starting with a big one Saturday morning.

"We've played tournaments together, battled each other down the stretch at event, but never in a match-play situation," Woods said. "It'll be fun."

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


## Cold end to March, seasonable start to April



Dear Tom,  
Meteorologists often refer to temperatures as being above or below normal. How, where and when is "normal" determined?  
Bill Murray, Palatine

Dear Bill,  
In meteorology, a normal temperature at a specific location is the temperature obtained by averaging the daily mid-night-to-midnight (standard time) high and low temperatures at that location during the 30-year period currently defined as Jan. 1, 1981, through Dec. 31, 2010. New temperature normals are calculated every 10 years, with the next period to be Jan. 1, 1991, through Dec. 31, 2020. This recalculation is done to take into account the gradual changes in climate that may be occurring at a location. Normals of precipitation and the normals of all other meteorological variables are calculated using the same time period.

# Mavericks top landing spot for NBA free agents

The Knicks have been careful — other than the owner — to soften expectations for their summer makeover. While James Dolan went on the radio recently and confidently expressed his belief that the stars of free agency will come and have already indicated to the team of their intentions, team president Steve Mills and general manager Scott Perry have tried to explain all of the optimistic paths that the Knicks future can take.

In the hours after trading away Kristaps Porzingis, a deal that allowed the team to open up two max salary cap slots, the front office executives tried to temper the talk of Kevin Durant or Kyrie Irving and instead look at the big picture — and relieve the pressure that will press firmly on their shoulders this summer.

“I think this is still in line with what we’ve talked about from the beginning,” Perry said. “We talked about building with young players, building through the draft. We get back an exciting young player in the deal. We get back two future draft picks and then the fact that we do have some financial flexibility. I think if you study teams over the course of building like we’re doing, financial flexibility is an important part of that so that you can be opportunistic as you move forward.”

“We believe we haven’t reset our plan,” Mills added. “What we did were the things that were consistent with our plan. A by-product of what we did created \$68 million worth of room. We’re going to be prudent in how we use that room because we’re still consistent in building this team through the draft and with young players and when there is an opportunity to add a free agent, that certainly is one of the tools that we have in our tool box.”

Even if Dolan had cautiously held his tongue it might not have eased the pressure from the fan base who seemed willing to go along with a season that seems bound to be the worst in franchise history and even to trade away the franchise centerpiece in Porzingis. Financial flexibility is hardly the return that the fans consider a fair return for their patience.

But the reason for the caution from the front office is that even armed with \$74 million in cap space the decision is not in their hands. If Durant opts to stay with Golden State, shuttle down the coast to Los Angeles, join on in Brooklyn or, brace yourself, join Porzingis in Dallas, it’s his choice no matter how much cash the Knicks are desperately waving at him.

So we asked players and agents what makes the decision in the end if everyone has the cash, granting anonymity to them in exchange for what we hope is honesty. And some of it was what you would expect like a winning organization or a glamorous city, but also things as simple as the state of the art practice facility. Does Kyrie want to come home to New York? If so, players warned: Put a stop to all of the old friends with hands out as soon as you arrive.

Armed with some of that information and the probable cap space from [spotrac.com](#) here is a look at how the teams are regarded by the players they are chasing:

**30. Pelicans (cap space \$19.9 million):** A dismal arena and a star who openly is asking out, the least attractive spot in the NBA. The food is delicious, though.

**29. Pistons (no cap space):** Cold, gray and the move to a new arena only accentuated how few fans come to those games. No surprise that they have boldly made deals - trading for Blake Griffin is the only way he’s leaving L.A. for Detroit.

**28. Grizzlies (no cap space):** They could create space by waiving Avery Bradley’s partially guaranteed deal and if Jonas Valanciunas really disliked the blues. Players seem more intent on leaving than rebuilding, but Valanciunas is unlikely to find \$17 million someplace else. So capped out with a miserable roster is a lonely place.

**27. Magic (\$22 million):** A longer playoff drought than the Knicks and a second-class status in their own home state, but with a likable coach in Steve Clifford and a practice facility that players rave about, moving up the charts.

**26. Cavaliers (no cap space):** Look at the Cavs and then remind yourself, they are actually over the cap. Life after LeBron hasn’t exactly been all sunshine and there are few selling points in the rust belt for players. Even the practice site is nowhere near downtown.

**25. Timberwolves (no cap space):** If Jeff Teague somehow opted out of his \$19 million they could have room for an addition, but who’s braving the snow for a very uncertain franchise where the owner meddled and drove out the coach who’d brought them to playoffs?

**24. Suns (\$28 million):** A warm climate through the summer, a core of young talent, what’s not to like? The owner hasn’t exactly endeared himself, the team doesn’t even have a practice facility and there are already rumors that the first-year coach could be in trouble.

**23. Hornets (\$6.2 million):** The number could rise if Kemba Walker leaves, but if he leaves maybe they should just shut down the whole operation.

**22. Wizards (no cap space):** All their money is going to John Wall, who isn’t expected to play next year.

**21. Thunder (no cap space):** Paul George opted in, Kevin Durant left, so who can tell? But it’s a great crowd in a small market.

**20. Jazz (\$22 million):** Talented core, very good coach countered by snow and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints more prominent than the arena. Players who get here like it.

**19. Pacers (\$48 million):** It’s like a colder Oklahoma City, a small market that is a well-run organization. Nate McMillan does a great job as a coach and Victor Oladipo will return to lead a young core.

**18. Kings (\$37 million):** Who’d have thought it, but they are rapidly climbing up the rankings. A young core, lots of money and a new arena.

**17. Trail Blazers (no cap space):** If they had the money you’d think someone would like to join the talented backcourt. But no one has.

**16. Nuggets (no cap space):** I’m going to just say it’s coach Mike Malone and the young talent led by Nikola Jokic that makes them a draw and nothing to do with the mountains of the legal pot.

**15. Spurs (no cap space):** They are a shadow of the team they were, but Gregg Popovich is still there and players around the league love him.

**14. Bulls (\$23.8 million):** Look, it’s still the house that Jordan built even if the Madhouse on Madison seems a little like an asylum for different reasons lately. But there is young talent, a great city, a great arena and a state of the art practice facility across the street from the arena. I didn’t think I’d say this, but maybe they could use Phil Jackson.

**13. Raptors (no cap space):** The Kawhi Leonard free agency will be a test of just how alluring the city is. The Canadian dollar and the frigid winters are countered by one of the best counts in a beautiful city that was enough to convince DeMar DeRozan to pass up a chance to go home to Los Angeles - before he was traded.

**12. Bucks (\$19 million):** The priority is keeping their own

talent in place as they have compiled the best record in the league. But they could shuffle the decks around Giannis Antetokounmpo and add another star. New arena, a likable young star and the likely coach of the year has revitalized the city.

**11. Celtics (no cap space):** Keeping the core intact - and using them to try to ply Anthony Davis from the Pelicans in a trade - is the goal. The playoffs may tell what the future holds, but even Brad Stevens seems to be having trouble keeping all the talent happy.

**10. Hawks (\$53 million):** Dead crowd even in a remodeled arena, but players enjoy the nightlife in the city. Trae Young is a solid draw now, too, as he has picked up his play as the year has gone on.

**9. 76ers (\$41.2 million):** They are in pursuit of their own free agents - and there are a lot of them. If they opt to keep Tobias Harris, Jimmy Butler and J.J. Redick then this is your team for years to come. Butler seems the most likely to depart - but joining on with Ben Simmons and Joel Embiid isn’t a bad way to spend the next five years.

**8. Heat (no cap space):** They may be in cap space limbo now, but remember who started the super team trend. Miami is as enticing a city to live in for players as any in the league.

**7. Rockets (no cap space):** No state tax and if you can pry the ball from James Harden, Mike D’Antoni’s system lets you put up numbers that pile up like a pinball machine.

**6. Nets (\$54 million):** That number drops if they opt to keep D’Angelo Russell, but they have finally gotten on the right track. Kenny Atkinson makes players better, there is a young core, a shiny new practice facility and all

the kale you can eat.

**5. Lakers (\$43 million):** Magic Johnson, LeBron James and the whole “I love LA” vibe seemed like a perfect draw - and then Paul George and Kawhi Leonard showed no interest. The year has been a disaster, but LeBron will be leading the free-agent push and Klutch Sports has already been signing up potential targets.

**4. Knicks (\$74 million):** All the talk about the Garden as the mecca - it should have holy water flowing from the beer taps to make up for everything else. A practice site a miserable commute from the arena, the dysfunctional history that has lasted most of these players’ lives. But it’s New York City, a chance to name your teammates and so much money.

**3. Warriors (no cap space):** Over the cap already and that number could skyrocket if they keep their own free agents, Durant, Klay Thompson and DeMarcus Cousins. But they get this spot for consistently attracting talent to take low cost deals to be a part of the magic. Ownership, front office, coach and a new arena in downtown San Francisco make this the place to be.

**2. Clippers (\$59.7 million):** A free agent will walk into a room with the exuberant owner Steve Ballmer, players coach Doc Rivers and maybe Jerry West is in the room. What’s missing? Their own arena. Rumors abound that Kawhi Leonard is heading to the Clippers, which gives them the best two-way player in the game.

**1. Mavericks (\$52 million):** In Mark Cuban they have an owner who set the trend of pampering his players, they have an elite coach and no state tax. Oh, and you pair up with Luke Doncic and Porzingis.

# Perception changing on Capitals' Ovechkin

TAMPA, Fla. — The Capitals' bench stood to watch the puck slide down the ice, poised for an empty net goal late in Thursday night's game against the Hurricanes. It went just wide, and what's been a foregone conclusion for roughly half the season would have to wait at least one more night. Captain Alex Ovechkin didn't seem nearly as disappointed as everyone else. What could have been his 50th goal of the season missed by inches.

Even enemy arenas now often root for him to reach this feat or another milestone, wanting to witness some history.

"See how quick it changes when the team wins and we're doing good?" center Nicklas Backstrom said. "It's a different story."

After years of weathering criticism — for not winning a Stanley Cup, for not being committed to two-way play, for not being enough of a team player — the perception of Ovechkin has changed over the past year, from a great player who was considered flawed to simply a great player who's at last beloved by most. He won a championship, and he did it with the defensive detail and team game so many thought he was incapable of. Now, as Ovechkin is again on the precipice of 50 goals, he finally has the acceptance of the league and those around it. They celebrate what he has accomplished without also pointing out what he hasn't. At 33 years old, he can become just the third player in NHL history with eight 50-goal campaigns, joining legends Mike Bossy and Wayne Gretzky. He'll be just the fourth player to score that many goals in a season at this age or older.

"It's obviously not too difficult for him," Lightning captain Steven Stamkos said. "He's found a way to consistently produce in this league. He's a horse out there. He's a big, strong guy. His longevity has been amazing in terms of staying healthy and staying out on the ice and just producing. It's amazing to see. I'm sure he had some doubters out there that think it's going to stop, but he just finds a way."

"He's motivated, he loves to score goals, and with the shot that he has, when he shoots it, it's going to go in a lot of the time."

It's the magnitude of Ovechkin's longevity that has led to more appreciation as he's gotten older, similar to what happened with Jaromir Jagr as he continued to play past the age of 40. Players entering the league now are smaller and quicker, forcing the game to trend toward rapid puck movement, but Ovechkin is a vintage model in the midst of all of that. At 6-foot-3 and 235 pounds, he can play a physical style that's becoming rarer in today's NHL and still has an appeal for the purists. But his shot is still so mystifying that Ovechkin hasn't had trouble keeping up with the younger generation — and he's got the youthful enthusiasm and gap-toothed grin to still fit in with the kids.

"He's been that guy for so long," said 21-year-old Hurricanes sniper Sebastian Aho. "It's not just the one year he scores 50, it's like every year."

Said NBC Sports Network analyst Mike Millbury: "He is a physical throwback. We used to call it truck-driver strong. He's actually beefy and bold with a little bit of an edge."

Millbury was among Ovechkin's harshest critics throughout his career. The former NHL player, head coach and general manager called Ovechkin a coach killer and described him as "just a one-dimensional player." But he gushed about Ovechkin during the Capitals' Stanley Cup run last postseason, and he's continued to do so this year as Ovechkin surprised even some of his teammates by showing up to training camp in impressive shape after a short offseason that featured some very public partying.

"I've changed my mind on him a lot," Millbury said. "It's my job to be critical — analytical is a better word for it — but I've always admired his physical skills. He's just such a bull. His effort level on most nights was there physically, but not always mentally. I don't think he thought the game through thoroughly, and I won-

dered whether he would finally get it ...

"I thought there was a change in his approach, the little aspects of the game that mark a winner as opposed to an immensely gifted player. The little things like line changes, backchecking in the right spots, being willing to a block a shot at the right time, not spending three minutes on a shift."

When Ovechkin first stormed into the NHL as a 20-year-old, his talent dazzled, but he was scrutinized by the old guard for his flamboyant celebrations. Then after his production slumped to 32 goals during the 2010-11 season and he followed with 38 in 2011-12 — marks that would still be career years for most players — some

questioned his commitment off the ice. Others postured that it could just be the beginning of Ovechkin's decline. Ovechkin responded with 32 goals in 48 games the following year, the lockout-shortened 2012-13 campaign. He then put up three straight seasons with at least 50 goals. But he was flayed again for the team's shortcomings in the postseason.

"We had been losing a lot in the first, second round and stuff like that, and people wanted us to go further," Backstrom said. "Without that [success], you've got to get criticized. And it wasn't just him, it was the whole team. I just think that's normal. But it can change pretty quick in hockey."

These days, Ovechkin and his

teammates' raucous celebrations with the Stanley Cup were applauded, and his frequent milestones are no longer discussed with an asterisk. That he's been seen wearing a "Well I'm not Michel Jordan" hoodie is considered more endearing than arrogant, as was his confidence on Tuesday that he would score his 50th goal "next game." Checking off that final item on his bucket list has helped Ovechkin feel freer, too, even if he never paid much mind to what was being said outside of his own locker room.

Maybe his game isn't quite back to the level it was in the playoffs a year ago yet, but this could be the most complete play he's shown over the course of the regular

season. It hasn't gone unnoticed or underappreciated, including on the play Ovechkin nearly scored his 50th goal on Thursday night in Carolina. Seconds before he shot the puck down the ice, he blocked a slap shot by Hurricanes defenseman Jacob Slavin as his team defended a late six-on-five push.

"To me, 50, not 50, let's talk about the two-way play and talk about him blocking shots," Capitals coach Todd Reirden said. "When you go back to huge difference-makers in our run last year and our success this year, it's improved two-way play by him and that's why he's out there at the end in that situation to get that opportunity. He's growing a lot in that regard."

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ANOTHER LOOK: PRIUS AWD-E



Prius AWD-e is a 50-mpg hybrid that makes fuel economy fun

Since 1997, the Toyota Prius has continually grown its now infamous hybrid empire. Although not the first hybrid (think 1700s steam-motor carriage) or even the first hybrid sold in the U.S. (think 2000 Honda Insight), the Prius is the first mass market hybrid, the longest-standing one, and a global best-seller. More than 4.3 million Prius vehicles have been sold worldwide, a figure that excludes the expanded Prius family of Prius c, Prius Prime, and Prius v models.

Overall, though, Toyota car sales are down year-over-year by 11.6%, while crossovers/SUVs and trucks are up 10.1 and 16.3%, respectively. Low fuel prices don't encourage shopping for fuel-efficient vehicles either. But small cars still sell by the millions, and gas prices still fluctuate by the millions of barrels. So, the real question isn't why still sell a car—a hybrid, no less—but why take 22 years to offer an all-wheel-drive (AWD) version of it?

Track tested, drifting approved (sort of)

The new 2019 Prius is fun to drive, which is something I never thought I'd say in this universe or any alternate one (disclaimer: only the AWD-e version). The front-wheel-drive (FWD) model, unfortunately, is just more of the same. No surprises. No excitement. Just purpose (fuel efficiency) and performance (fuel efficiency). Prettiness doesn't equal fuel efficiency. Neither does dynamics, apparently. After all, four generations of Prius have us expecting the vehicle to handle in no other way, with the 2019 model being no exception. Except that it is.

Although not on sale until January, I recently test drove pre-production models in wintry Wisconsin. The air gave a chill, but there was nary a snowflake nor ice nor sleet nor freezing rain. So, the Toyota team improvised and created a snowy test track.

Complete with a 6%-grade hill, sweeping back stretch, speed bump, sharp corner, and S-curves, the full circuit offered enough stop-and-go zig-zagging to activate the AWD-e system, but it was a rather short course taking no more than 30 seconds to complete. Even less time with the FWD models, which weren't allowed on the icy incline. All the vehicles were equipped with standard low-rolling resistance all-season tires, by the way.

Still, if you do enough continuous laps at faster-than-you-should-but-totally-real-life speeds (which I did because, uh, research), then the little obstacle course proved its point: winter tires are a must during winter.

The Prius AWD-e, despite its dancing shoes, handled the increasingly slushy ice box rather well. There was no rollback when stopped on the hill, and taking the bumpy all-dirt back stretch at 30 mph proved the vehicle could handle a long curve with poise. At the 90-degree right-hand turn leading up the chicanes, there was some understeer, but this is a Prius, not a Porsche. The mini-autocross portion is where the smiles appeared because if you ever wanted to drift a Prius, now you can! Wut?

The coned-off section was built with tight, short turns and the Prius AWD-e slid some, which I attest to the tires, but I never once felt out of control. While I could sense the AWD system during my counter-steers, I didn't realize how much of an impact it made until lapping with a FWD Prius. Yikes.

Even with bypassing the mini-summit, I drove slower. I felt more body roll. I tapped the brakes more. I felt increasingly less confident in my abilities and the car's. Through the esses, life passed in slow motion with seemingly every light on the instrument cluster yelling at me. And then I got a little stuck when I stopped in the middle. Hi, wheel spin. Away from inclement weather, however, the FWD and AWD models essentially handled the same.

Same difference

The 2019 Prius is a mild refresh really, carrying over almost all its tech, including utilizing the same Toyota Hybrid Synergy Drive system. The powertrain remains a

1.8-liter 4-cylinder engine combined with two motor/generators. A continuously variable transmission is standard. Net output is unchanged at 121 horsepower and 105 lb.-ft. of torque. The Prius AWD-e might vary slightly due to its added weight. Toyota did not provide specific numbers but suggested any changes would be negligible.

A key difference between FWD and AWD Prius models is their battery packs. The standard Prius is equipped with a lithium-ion battery while the Prius AWD-e features a compact Ni-MH that is designed for cold-weather climates. Efficiencies are built into the AWD system itself as well.

The "e" in AWD-e stands for electric. Although a clunky term, it refers specifically to the independent rear motor, which powers the rear wheels from zero to 6 mph and then as needed at speeds up to 43 mph. This top speed was determined to be where peak fuel efficiency and performance begin to drop.

AWD-e also is an on-demand system (not driver-defeatable) and activates only when the vehicle systems sense a change in driving conditions. Additionally, the rear motor features no magnets, which decreases vehicle drag, thus providing high fuel efficiency.

The automaker estimates the Prius AWD-e to achieve 52/48/50 mpg (city/highway/combined). Impressive numbers, and not far off from the 54/50/52 mpg of FWD models. The Eco trim remains the family fuel snob at 58/53/56 mpg.

Facial treatment

Model year changes include redesigns to the headlights, fog lights, and taillights as well as updated front and rear fascias. The exterior also features two new Captain Planet-appropriate colors with Supersonic Red and Electric Storm Blue.

On the inside, finally gone are high-contrast white plastic panels, having been replaced with piano black inserts. Unfortunately, while not eye-searing, the gloss black sure attracts dust regardless of how clean the rest of the cabin is. Another minor but noticeable change is the placement of the heated front seat controls. No more reaching around the gear lever as the buttons have been repositioned to an ergonomically friendly location between the wireless phone charging panel and cupholders.

Lastly, the 2019 Prius trim levels now coincide with the rest of the Toyota lineup with L Eco, LE, XLE, and Limited. Gone are the numerical designations of Two, Three, and Four, which, intended or not, only remind me of the sound machine that is Gloria Estefan. Not that there'll be much use for AWD in Miami, which is why the Prius AWD-e is reserved for its high-volume core: LE and XLE.

As mentioned earlier, the state of the small car is no secret. Regarding the Prius liftback specifically, U.S. sales have slowed from the six-figure numbers enjoyed between 2005 and 2015, peaking at roughly 181,000 in 2007, to last year's 65,631 units. The downhill trajectory has continued into 2018 with Prius experiencing a 23.2% year-over-year decline through November.

Therefore, it makes strategic business sense for the now "low-volume" Prius to offer AWD at a price point the majority of consumers are likely to shop. Should buyers say otherwise, Toyota says it will acknowledge vehicle packaging as needed. AWD-e is expected to comprise 25% of total liftback sales.

AWD-e is not for everybody

The 2019 Prius will start at \$24,690 (including \$920 destination fee) with the L Eco trim. The Prius LE AWD-e will start at \$27,300. The as-tested price of the AWD-e vehicles I drove was \$29,740.

As to my "Why now?" AWD questioning, "Consumer demand," the automaker responded. Okay, but the Prius AWD-e has been available in Japan since 2016 yet makes its North American debut in 2019? So, why not at the same time?

The Prius will be pleasantly surprised as to how differently (e.g., fun! engaging!) the already super fuel-efficient Prius handles. Although it still looks kind of like a bean — a sleek bean — fuel efficiency finally isn't its only strong suit.

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
