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## Lightfoot sprints to take helm

Outsider becoming mayor with still-developing team of veterans and newcomers

Lori Lightfoot takes over as Chicago mayor on Monday after a seven-week sprint that saw her try to build an administration she can trust to run the city and promote her agenda while she also set out to mold the City Council by installing allies in key positions to try bringing change to the notoriously reform-averse body.

Just days before she was to be sworn in, Lightfoot hadn't filled several key posts in her administration. That has led to questions about just how different it will look from Mayor Rahm Emanuel's, at least at the outset.

"It was hard. Real hard," Lightfoot said of the quick turnaround to get her administration in place. "There are definitely some people who are going to stay. Some people are going to be stepping

Her top priorities include: Public safety and renewing confidence in government

When Lori Lightfoot takes office Monday as Chicago's 56th mayor, she'll inherit one of the nation's largest municipal governments with plenty of agencies to run and challenges to tackle. Here are the top four priorities she outlined in an interview with the Chicago Tribune.

Chicago has earned a national reputation for its rampant gun violence and fractured gang territories on the city's South and West sides. In 2016, homicides spiked to more than 750 followed by 670 in 2017, levels not seen since the mid-1990s. Following the Laquan McDonald shooting, the Police Department is slated to undergo substantial reforms as part of a consent decree that places oversight of those efforts with a federal judge.

"I have been really pushing not only law enforcement, but particularly them, but also other

## Mansion owners sue to stop school's plan to build gym

McCutcheon Elementary had finally secured \$10M from Chicago Public Schools

At the west end of Castlewood Terrace, a string of brightly dressed children follows a woman along the sidewalk, from the Boys and Girls Club to McCutcheon Elementary School. They line up outside a red door, next to a multicolored map of the United States painted over black pavement. They are skipping and laughing on this sunny May afternoon.

But on the cold days, when the young students put on their heavy coats and march down the block to use a rented gym, school volunteer P.C. Gooden Smiley sees them shivering and feels it is not right.

"It has always hurt my heart," said Smiley, who has lived in Chicago's Uptown neighborhood more than two decades and is on McCutcheon's local school council.

Without a gymnasium of their own, generations of McCutcheon

students have walked down the block and back to take physical education at the Pedersen-McCormick Boys and Girls Club. Now the school has finally secured \$10 million from Chicago Public Schools for a gym, but another obstacle has emerged: residents of a nearby row of large, historic homes who have filed a lawsuit to stop the project.

"There is definitely a race and a class issue going on here," said Gwyn Kram, who led the push for a gym during her two years as

McCutcheon's principal before leaving the school last year. "I feel I would be doing an injustice to my (former) students if I didn't name it for what it was."

Opponents of the gym say it's about other issues, citing concerns ranging from public safety to the character of their Castlewood Terrace neighborhood — a leafy enclave that was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2009 and where stately

## Tensions have put Saudis on alert

War not wanted, but kingdom will defend itself against Iran

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Saudi Arabia does not want war but will not hesitate to defend itself against Iran, a top Saudi diplomat said Sunday, after the kingdom's energy sector was targeted last week amid heightened tensions in the Persian Gulf.

On Sunday night, a rocket was fired into the Iraqi capital's heavily fortified Green Zone, landing less than a mile from the U.S. Embassy, further stoking tensions. No casualties were reported.

Adel al-Jubeir, the minister of state for foreign affairs, spoke after four oil tankers — two of them Saudi — were targeted in an alleged act of sabotage off the coast of the United Arab Emirates and days after Iran-allied Yemeni rebels claimed a drone attack on a Saudi oil pipeline.

"The kingdom of Saudi Arabia does not want war in the region and does not strive for that but at the same time, if the other side chooses war, the kingdom will fight this with all force and determination and it will defend itself, its citizens and its interests," al-Jubeir told reporters.

A senior Iranian military commander was similarly quoted as saying his country is not looking for war, in comments published in Iranian media on Sunday.

Fears of armed conflict were already running high after the White House ordered warships and bombers to the region earlier this month to counter an alleged, unexplained threat from Iran. The U.S. also has ordered nonessential staff out of its diplomatic posts in Iraq.

But President Donald Trump appears to have softened his tone in recent days, saying he expects Iran to seek negotiations with his

Emanuel’s legacy an array of good intentions and unfulfilled dreams

A month before his death, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. gave one of his most inspirational sermons. He called it “Unfulfilled Dreams.”

He reminded us of the many leaders who start out with the good intention of building a great temple. But they ultimately fail because they cannot finish what is unfinished. So the dreams the people entrusted to them are left unfulfilled.

Chicagoans might consider King’s words on Monday as Mayor Rahm Emanuel leaves office.

Eight years ago, as a new mayor, Emanuel set out to build a great city, promising to finish the work prior mayors had left undone.

“Today, more than any other time in our history, more than any other place in our country,” he said in his first inaugural address, “the city of Chicago is ready for change.”

Change is a familiar word. A trusted Chicago politician used it three years earlier as the bedrock of his successful presidential bid. Now, the man who had served as Barack Obama’s chief of staff was asking Chicagoans to trust him to fulfill our dreams.

“For all the parents who deserve a school system that expects every student to earn a diploma; for all the neighbors who deserve to walk home on safer streets; for all the taxpayers who deserve a city government that is more effective and costs less; and for all the people in the hardest-working city in America who deserve a strong economy so they can find jobs or create jobs — this is your day,” he swore.

In many areas, Emanuel is leaving our city in a better condition than it was when he took office in 2011. But he failed miserably in others, leaving many residents — particularly African Americans — dismayed that change was merely an empty promise, and their dreams yet again will be unfulfilled.

When Chicagoans look back, they might fondly think of Emanuel as a fierce fighter, who worked doggedly behind the scenes to make sure the Obama Presidential Center would bring its economic engine to the Chi-ago’s South Side, where it belongs. We might consider his drive to

eliminate food deserts in low-income communities and his success in getting Whole Foods to take a chance on Englewood. Some will see his determination reflected in their paychecks, when the city’s minimum wage goes to \$13 per hour in July. Young people will benefit from his ingenuity in opening Chicago City Colleges to high-achieving Chicago Public Schools students and low-income Catholic school students tuition-free.

And we will remember his bravery. When Donald Trump demanded that Chicago help federal agents round up immigrants living our city without documentation, our mayor steadfastly refused. He chose instead to put Chicago at the forefront of a national sanctuary city movement that set the standard for compassion.

There are many things for which Chicagoans can hold their heads up high. But there also epic social failures from which the pain runs so deeply that we cannot forget.

When we think of Emanuel, we will remember the closing of 50 public schools in mostly black and brown communities, the shuttering of much-needed mental health facilities in troubled neighborhoods and the years of unbridled gun violence that claimed thousands of lives, including our babies.

When we remember Emanuel, we will forever think of Laquan McDonald, the slain teenager who came to represent a vile culture of lies and cover-ups that extended from the Police Department all the way to City Hall.

And we will be drawn back to Emanuel’s unfulfilled promise to build a great city, a failure that was inevitable without closing the economic divide that created a substandard city for poor people of color within a vibrant city for the affluent.

It isn’t that Emanuel did not understand that the problems plaguing the most vulnerable neighborhoods were a threat to all of Chicago. He alluded to that in his inaugural speech.

The most challenging threats to Chicago’s future, he said, were “the quality of our schools, the safety of our streets, the cost and effectiveness of city government, and the urgent need to create and keep the jobs of the future right here in Chicago.

“In shaping that future, our children, and their schools, must come first,” he said.

The problem, as it turned out, is that he had no idea how to go about it. He never had a comprehensive policy to address the issues of segregation,

poverty, black male unemployment and economic disinvestment that threatened our schools, our safety and our overall quality of life.

In the midst of his failure, the U.S. Census Bureau estimates that more than 70,000 African Americans left Chicago between 2010 and 2019, continuing a black exodus in which 180,000 fled during the decade before. People working in the trenches of the black neighborhoods might have helped Emanuel reverse the trend, but he made little effort to bring them to the table.

Meanwhile, the positive fruits of Emanuel’s Chicago are on full display in the booming Loop. As the Tribune pointed out recently, his pro-business approach lured 59 corporate headquarters to Chicago. At the same time, 45% of black men between the ages of 20 and 24 have no jobs and are not enrolled in school.

Construction cranes tower over the city’s skyline in every direction, and suddenly stop. The cranes are a symbolic line of demarcation that separates the affluent from the poor, the hopeful from the apathetic and those who see our city as a mecca of opportunities and those who look around and see a history of neglect.

Emanuel’s decision in 2013 to close public schools in mostly disadvantaged neighborhoods was the beginning of his downfall. It was an early indication to African Americans that his idea of change was not compatible with theirs. The school shutdown had a chaotic ripple effect that further destabilized neighborhoods already in severe decline, and did nothing to improve the quality of education.

When Emanuel had the choice, he often took the less complicated route. Displacing 11,000 kids from their neighborhood schools was a quick fix for the serious underlying social and economic issues Emanuel was unequipped to handle. Recruiting businesses to the thriving Loop was much easier than luring them to neighborhoods that have nothing.

In fairness, the dual Chicagos existed long before Emanuel became mayor. But like the leaders before him, he could not merge them into one. In that regard, he failed our city, as every mayor has. Perhaps he concluded that such a complicated task is simply unfinishable.

So for many Chicagoans, life remains what King has called “a continual story of shattered dreams.”

## Authorities not alerted to early clues in Ochoa-Lopez slaying

When a newborn was brought to Advocate Christ Medical Center, the staff soon learned that the woman claiming to have given birth to the boy at home was lying. A physical examination of the 46-year-old woman showed no signs that she had been pregnant or had given birth. The baby she said was hers had arrived at the hospital on the evening of April 23 with brain damage, apparently from lack of oxygen, according to Chicago police and fire officials. Yet the hospital did not contact state child welfare officials until more than two weeks later, on May 9, days after police showed up at Advocate Christ asking about the baby, according to police and the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services.

State law generally requires hospitals to contact DCFS when there are concerns about a child's well-being or questions about custody. The hospital would not comment on why it waited so long to call authorities, citing "patient privacy."

"We have been cooperating with authorities, and as this is an ongoing police matter, we're referring all inquiries to local law enforcement," said Adam Mesirow, a hospital spokesman.

Chicago police say they never heard from the hospital, either, and only went there May 7 after getting a tip about the baby, who remained in the intensive care unit hooked up to life support.

A week later, prosecutors charged the woman who claimed to be the mother, Clarisa Figueroa, with strangling the real mother, 19-year-old Marlen Ochoa-Lopez, and then cutting the baby from her womb on April 23. Her body was found in a garbage bag in back of the home, where it had apparently been dumped shortly after the killing.

DCFS would not comment on what the hospital should have done. "I don't want to speculate," said Jassen Strokosch, a spokesman for the agency. "We don't know the circumstances of what was going on in the hospital."

Strokosch confirmed that DCFS was not notified about the case until May 9 when a "mandated reporter" — a person required by law to report suspected child abuse or neglect — notified the agency about the newborn.

The agency started a parallel investigation with police and made contact with the hospital. The boy was placed into protective state custody, Strokosch said, weeks after he had been brought to the hospital with no clear idea who his parents were.

On May 13, the agency allowed the protective custody to lapse once it became clear who the biological father of the boy was, Strokosch said. Custody of the newborn was then turned over to the father, 20-year-old Yovani Lopez, who was married to Marlen Ochoa-Lopez and also the father of their 3-year-old son.

Ochoa-Lopez's family has been critical of both police and the hospital, asking why someone didn't check sooner on who had really given birth to the boy.

Marlen Ochoa-Lopez, nine months pregnant, had gone to Figueroa's Southwest Side home to buy baby clothes. She had met Figueroa over a moms group on Facebook and had been to the house a few weeks earlier.

Police say Figueroa's daughter, Desiree Figueroa, 24, helped her mother strangle the teen with coaxial cable, and then the elder Figueroa used a butcher knife to remove the child. But the infant had problems breathing and paramedics were called to the home in the 4100 block of West 77th Place.

Fire officials said the boy was "basically blue," apparently from lack of oxygen. The elder Figueroa told them she had just given birth to the baby and she was taken to Advocate Christ along with the baby.

Once there, doctors worked on the baby while staff also checked Figueroa, according to prosecutors. They determined she was not the mother.

It's unclear whether Figueroa was still allowed to visit the baby in intensive care in the following days. According to prosecutors, Figueroa created a GoFundMe page asking for funds for the baby

and featuring a picture of the baby hooked up to a breathing tube and monitors. The page was eventually taken down, but it's not known when.

Chicago police officers also showed up at the Figueroa home when paramedics were called there, the Police Department confirmed.

Anthony Guglielmi, the department's chief spokesman, said police responded to a 911 call at the address with paramedics who met with a bloodied Clarisa Figueroa as she held baby boy on the sidewalk or street.

Paramedics took the lead and transported the baby and the elder Figueroa to Advocate Christ. Guglielmi said police followed the ambulance.

He said police and the paramedics thought they were transporting a woman who had just given birth.

The police involvement ended when Figueroa and the baby arrived at the hospital, Guglielmi said. The police filled out a "hospitalization report," documenting the need for medical attention for the woman and the baby at the hospital.

After that, "we did not receive any type of notification from Christ on the status or an update on Figueroa," Guglielmi said.

Guglielmi reiterated what police officials said Thursday when announcing charges in the case: The first connection detectives had between Clarisa Figueroa and Marlen Ochoa-Lopez was on May 7. That was when Ochoa-Lopez's friend alerted detectives to a Facebook group where Ochoa-Lopez had spoken to Figueroa about buying baby items.

Figueroa and her daughter were each charged with first-degree murder and aggravated battery. Clarisa Figueroa's boyfriend, Piotr Bobak, 40, was charged with concealing Ochoa-Lopez's death. All three were ordered held without bail in Cook County Jail. As of Friday, the baby remained in grave condition at Advocate Christ.

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## First case of measles confirmed in Chicago

A second case of measles in Cook County is the first in the city of Chicago and the eighth in the state of Illinois so far this year, according to health officials.

Elena Ivanova, a spokeswoman for the city of Chicago, confirmed the city's first case of measles in an email on Sunday. She said the patient "is an international traveler who was in several countries that are experiencing measles outbreaks."

The traveler came through O'Hare International Airport, and people across the city may have been exposed to measles Thursday or Friday, according to a news release. Health officials said exposure may have occurred:

- May 16 on public transit from Chicago O'Hare International Airport to the University of Illinois at Chicago campus
- May 16 in the Loop and Millennium Park
- May 16 at retail stores on South Canal Street and on State Street between Monroe and Randolph streets
- May 17 at UIC Student Center East

Ivanova said the city is working with the health care facility to notify all individuals who may have been exposed to measles.

"The Chicago Department of Public Health is working closely with the higher risk locations to identify all individuals who were likely to have been exposed and to make sure those individuals are immune or that appropriate prevention measures are taken if they are not immune," she wrote in an email.

Ivanova said Chicago has one of the highest measles, mumps

and rubella (MMR) vaccination rates in the nation. Most children and adults in Chicago are protected from measles, she said.

The earlier Cook County case of measles was in March. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, as of May 10 there have been 839 measles cases in the United States this year, more than any year since 1994.

Earlier this month, The Lancet Infectious Diseases published a study from researchers at the University of Texas at Austin, which listed Cook County as the most vulnerable county in the nation for a measles outbreak.

Ivanova said that among those traveling outside the U.S. or to sites in the U.S. with active outbreaks, the following individuals should receive vaccine:

- Infants 6 months through 11 months of age should receive one dose of MMR vaccine.
- Children 12 months of age and older should receive two doses of MMR vaccine separated by at least 28 days.
- Adults who do not have evidence of immunity against measles should get two doses of MMR vaccine.
- Adults with documentation of one dose of MMR vaccine should get a second dose.

Ivanova said the measles vaccine is safe and effective. It is also readily available in health care facilities including pharmacies and grocery stores throughout Chicago.

Measles starts with a fever that can get very high. Some of the other symptoms that may occur are coughs, runny nose, red eyes, diarrhea and a rash of tiny, red spots, Ivanova said.

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## Measure would prevent ICE detainees from being held in private detention centers

A push to ban privatized immigration detention centers across Illinois is headed for Gov. J.B. Pritzker's desk.

The state Senate approved House Bill 2040 last week, advancing the measure that would prohibit any unit of local government from entering into an agreement with a private company to operate a detention facility. The bill passed the Illinois House in April.

The measure was in large part a response to a controversial proposal by private, Virginia-based Immigration Centers of America to construct a detention center in Dwight, Illinois, about 80 miles from Chicago, that would house detainees for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

Local leaders opened the door for the proposal earlier this year, but the company would have to secure a federal contract before starting construction.

A spokesperson for Pritzker did not say if the governor plans to sign or veto the bill. His office issued a statement saying Pritzker believes Illinois "should be a welcoming state for immigrants and looks forward to reviewing the bill."

The bill comes as immigration continues to be at the center of a polarizing national debate. President Donald Trump for years has rallied for the construction of a wall along the southern border with Mexico. In recent days, Trump has taken a different approach to immigration by calling for a "merit" system that would give preference to people considered to be high-skilled workers.

A spokesman for Immigration Centers of America could not be reached for comment.

ICE, which is under the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, is currently seeking proposals for a company that would be able to house within 80 miles from Chicago's immigration court up to 1,000 men and women who are facing deportation.

The deadline for submissions to obtain the contract was recently extended to June 25.

The Illinois bill, if it becomes law, will amend the Private Correctional Facility Moratorium Act. It would prohibit the state or any local government agency from entering into an agreement with a private company over the detention of individuals.

The state for decades has already had a law that prohibits local, county and state governments from hiring private companies to incarcerate people in the custody of the Illinois Department of Corrections, the Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice or a sheriff. The bill awaiting Pritzker's consideration would expand that to include civil detention, which includes when immigrants are detained while facing deportation proceedings.

Fred Tsao, the senior policy counsel with the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, said immigration advocates have been talking with representatives from the governor's office to see how quickly the bill could be signed and become law, particularly because of the proposal in Dwight.

"We hope this bill sets an example for other states and other communities to say no to for-profit prison and immigration detention," Tsao said.

The effort in Dwight is the latest attempt within the last decade to construct a private immigration detention center in the Chicago area.

Private companies have tried to build facilities to house detained immigrants in Crete and Hopkins Park in Illinois; and in Elkhart County, Gary and Newtown County in Indiana. Opposition from immigration advocates and the community has followed the failed attempts.

Sen. Robert Peters, D-Chicago, was a sponsor of the bill and called private detention centers a "serious problem."

"I look forward to Gov. Pritzker signing this into law and putting an end to this inhumane practice once and for all," Peters said in a prepared statement.

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## Amita Health to reject \$5.6M in tax subsidies

A prominent faith-based health care firm said it would reject millions of dollars in tax subsidies for its Loop offices, a rare decision that arrived months after Mayor Rahm Emanuel's administration and the City Council approved the deal.

Amita Health, which now owns the former Presence Health hospital system, said Thursday that its decision to step away from finalizing an agreement for \$5.6 million in tax increment financing from the city would allow it "necessary flexibility to make non-clinical staffing decisions at its Chicago headquarters."

Amita did not elaborate on the nature of its staffing changes. An agreement with the city would have required the hospital system to comply with certain occupancy and jobs agreements — but also to operate and invest millions of dollars in a handful of neighborhood health facilities that include a West Side cancer center.

In a statement, Amita Health CEO Mark Frey said the company's decision "will not impact these projects."

"We remain committed to op-

erating these clinical facilities, all of which serve as vital points of care in the community," Frey said. "Additionally, AMITA Health will be maintaining a headquarters office at 200 S. Wacker Drive."

City subsidies for Amita's headquarters came out of a downtown tax increment financing district fund, as part of a common but occasionally controversial tactic that sets aside property tax revenue to spur development.

The politics behind this TIF agreement were far from routine, however.

Chicago's Ethics Board slapped embattled Ald. Edward Burke, the 14th Ward council member who is under federal investigation and has been charged with attempted extortion, with a \$2,000 fine after he participated in a fierce committee debate over the subsidy.

Presence Health Care had been a client of Burke's law firm.

Outgoing Mayor Emanuel's administration pressed to lock down council support for the TIF deal, which also had support from the NAACP and a union representing hospital workers.

But debate turned to hot-button abortion politics after some aldermen, Planned Parenthood and the American Civil Liberties

Union ripped the proposal because of the nonprofit's opposition to abortion and contraception.

The council approved the subsidy in January 2018 after an unusually tight vote. Presence was acquired by the Catholic hospital system Ascension in March 2018, making Presence part of Amita Health. In December, Amita Health said it requested an extension to finalize the subsidy deal.

"Upon further study of the agreement, AMITA Health has decided not to complete the paperwork required to finalize the Presence Health TIF agreement," Frey said in the statement.

Downtown Ald. Brendan Reilly, who opposed the deal, did not respond to requests for comment. City Hall also did not elaborate on the scuttled deal.

"As a result of the announcement, the city will be taking steps to terminate the agreement," Peter Strazzabosco, the deputy city planning commissioner, said in an email.

# Evanston requests proposals for use of historic mansion

Evanston officials opened the vacant lakefront Harley Clarke Mansion to media tours on Thursday, giving rare access to the property at the center of a heated local debate.

The inside look comes as the city is requesting proposals from those who might want to operate a business or nonprofit at the site. The request will be open for nine months and is set to close on Feb. 28, 2020, according to City Council reports.

Aldermen initially considered the option of selling the building to a prospective buyer, but Ald. Eleanor Revelle removed it from the motion that was finally approved in April.

As such, the city will retain ownership of the building and operate a long-term lease.

According to the proposal approved by aldermen, the lessee “will be required to invest in a substantial renovation of the property while maintaining the historic character of the building. Proposals must also address any parking issues, accommodate the existing public space and recreation area, maintain the Jens Jensen Gardens, and include a public component (e.g. cafe, museum, class, garden, etc.)”

Evanston currently pays about \$15,000 annually to maintain the mansion and gardens, and keep power flowing to the building, City Manager Wally Bobkiewicz said.

That figure does not reflect hourly wages for workers.

The mansion last served as a nonprofit art education center, and signs from the art school remain scattered around the building. Some announced “rejects and second chances!” near the former pottery space, while others reminded folks to pick up after themselves and keep work areas clean.

The mansion smells of musty wood, and the wood paneling on the walls and hardwood floors showed slight warping. Wood carvings wrap around the entryway staircase and fireplace.

The three-story building boasts large, community-type rooms that were previously used by both the art school and Sigma Chi fraternity, which once used the building as its national headquarters.

In the basement, arched entry-

ways curve over steps that seem to lead to a former library area or bar. Windows in the greenhouse stand about 12 feet tall, and ornate stonework and trellises frame the doorway, waiting for vines to curve around them.

Tall windows in the rear of the mansion present sweeping views of the lake.

The Harley Clarke Mansion is on Sheridan Road next to the Evanston lighthouse and just north of Northwestern University. Over the years, it has functioned as a private residence, fraternity headquarters and the nonprofit art education center.

The most recent efforts to revitalize the building and turn it into an environmental education center fell through in April 2018 when aldermen voted against a plan from the Evanston Lakehouse and Gardens, saying the nonprofit citizens group had not raised enough money to give them confidence that the plans would be successful.

That followed an effort in 2013 from Evanston resident Jennifer Pritzker to turn the mansion into a boutique bed-and-breakfast.

In the meantime, community members have been meeting regularly to brainstorm ideas for future uses of the mansion and how to make the best use of the space without requiring taxpayer dollars.

Evanston native and author Audrey Niffenegger has proposed turning the mansion into a book and art center and pledged \$500,000 to the effort.

The proposal period opened on Thursday and as of Friday afternoon no formal plans had been submitted, according to city officials.

The latest discussion on what to do with Harley Clarke comes after more than 80 percent of voters approved of a November non-binding referendum that asked whether the mansion should be preserved at little to no taxpayer expense.

It also followed aldermen’s decision in December not to appeal the Preservation Commission’s decision to deny the permit that would have been necessary to tear down the lakefront mansion, essentially stopping controversial demolition plans for the 91-year-old building.

up in an acting position. Look, there is no possibility that we could have hired the whole complement of people in the mayor’s office and new cabinet members in six weeks. It’s just not possible.”

Lightfoot’s transition is unique in recent Chicago history. Emanuel was a creature of Washington with a well-earned reputation as a hyperkinetic political wheeler-dealer who had an extra six weeks to put together his leadership team in 2011 because he didn’t need a runoff to win his first term. Before that was 22 years of Mayor Richard M. Daley, who came into office in 1989 as the scion of an already legendary Chicago political dynasty.

Lightfoot, by contrast, ran as an outsider who promised to upend the political establishment. Now she has to set up shop in that establishment.

She hired several key cabinet members in recent days, including chief of staff Maurice Classen and Chief Financial Officer Jennie Huang Bennett. Still, Lightfoot starts off likely to rely on lots of Emanuel administration veterans to literally keep the trains running on time.

“In a lot of these instances we’re looking at, we’ve done nationwide searches. Some worked out, some haven’t. I look at this not as May 20 is the deadline to have everybody in place,” she said. “We’ve got good, smart, able people in all of our agencies, and we’re going to continue the process of finding the right leaders to drive the kind of change that we need in a lot of these agencies. It’s going to be a mix of new and it’s going to be a mix of acting and existing people.”

In the city’s Aviation Department and at the Chicago Transit Authority, Lightfoot said she will stick with officials who bring skill sets particular to those jobs and the work already underway.

There’s an \$8.5 billion O’Hare International Airport modernization in the works, and big CTA projects are happening on the Red Line, the Brown Line and elsewhere in the transit system.

“Some people are doing a really good job,” Lightfoot added. “For example, (Commissioner) Jamie Rhee at Aviation. I’d be crazy to replace her. She’s phenomenal, and she’s in the middle of a massive project which she is all over. I have great confidence in Jamie. I’ve known Jamie for almost 20 years, so I don’t see there – and other places – where there is a need for change.”

“CTA is another area. (Commissioner) Dorval Carter is a pro. The more I know about him, the more I like. CTA has some challenges, but I think it’s important you actually have a transportation expert at the helm of that agency. So, I feel good about where we are. There will be other changes that we’re going to announce. We’re not going to get everything done by Monday, but that work continues.”

Her campaign pledge to be a change agent notwithstanding, Northwest Side Ald. Nick Spasato, 38th, said it’s smart for Lightfoot to rely on officials who already are in place.

“You start from scratch, it’ll be a hot mess over here,” Spasato said. “You have a lot of institutional knowledge here running these departments. I don’t see how you can say ‘You’re all gone, thanks for your service, I’m going to put a stranger in there.’ Change is going to take some time. It can’t happen overnight, certainly with commissioners, directors, that kind of stuff.”

On the City Council side, the new mayor set out to put new aldermen in charge of key committees such as Finance, Budget and Zoning, while leaving veterans in place in some others as she tries to line up the 26 council votes she needs to pass her plans. She announced her ideas Friday, after many aldermen spent weeks unclear about what she would do.

“I think it was a rocky start,”

veteran South Side Ald. Howard Brookins Jr. said of the Lightfoot transition. “I think it was a rocky start because the people who were in place at the transition did not have sufficient relationships with the existing aldermen to put aside fears that they may have of the unknown. And we hope that it gets better. But I think that’s a learning curve that any first-time elected official is going to have to go through.”

Lightfoot has spoken of the palace intrigue driven by veteran aldermen seeking to trip her up during the transition and keep their power. On Friday, she said embattled City Council power broker Ald. Edward Burke was behind at least some of it.

Burke, who was charged by federal authorities earlier this year with attempted extortion for allegedly trying to trade a restaurant permit in his Southwest Side 14th Ward for work at his tax appeals law firm, could not be reached Friday for comment. He has denied wrongdoing in the federal case.

“He clearly has a substantial amount of knowledge, and I don’t discount that. Was he messing around at the beginning? Yes, he was. No question about it. And did I send a very clear message that I wasn’t going to tolerate it? Yes, I did,” Lightfoot said.

“And we know a lot of people in common, and he sent a back-channel message that he wasn’t going to interfere with me. The proof will be in the pudding. He has a way of dealing. He’s got relationships with certain aldermen that he has cultivated in the way that he does. And given his history, he’s not comfortable with people who can’t be brought into his web.”

Lightfoot said Burke tried unsuccessfully to bring her into that web, via his power to slate candidates for judge. “I got the, ‘So do you think Lori would like to be a judge? We might be able to make that happen,’ ” she said. “That was about four years ago.”

city agencies to really step up,” Lightfoot said. “I’m going to be very visible Memorial Day weekend, but I’m pushing people to look at this as an opportunity to save lives and really think about everything that they can do to get out there, provide city resources, flood the zone in neighborhoods and areas in the city that we know from historical trends and data are the ones that are going to be most challenged throughout the course of the summer.”

“We cannot afford to do business as usual and think we’re going to get a different result,” she said. “I’m doing everything I can to move city government to focus on areas on the West Side and areas on the South Side that just seem like we haven’t made progress in tamping down the violence.”

### City finances

City Hall faces a looming \$1 billion pension hole that must be filled by 2023 along with a growing budget deficit. Both will require Lightfoot to come up with hundreds of millions of dollars in savings or tax increases by the time the city has to finalize its budget this fall.

“This is something where we need all hands on deck. Me and my team can’t solve this without engaging other stakeholders. Obviously, the City Council is important, the legislature is important, the governor is important. We have a lot of really hard choices that we’re going to have to make,”

Lightfoot said. “The last thing in the world I want to do is raise property taxes. Obviously, that’s a lever and a tool that’s available for us to generate resources, but we have been pushing my team to think much more creatively about a structural fix that is not just going to put a Band-Aid on the budget for next year, but really bring lasting change in the out years.”

### Restoring confidence in government

Lightfoot ran a change campaign and won 74% of the vote and all 50 wards in her April 2 runoff with Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle. The incoming mayor hammered Preckwinkle’s ties to embattled longtime Ald. Edward Burke, who faces an attempted extortion charge as part of an ongoing federal investigation at City Hall.

Lightfoot has vowed more transparency in her administration and plans to oust several veteran aldermen from committees to install more reform-minded allies on the City Council in those positions.

“I started with the premise that we needed to make some change, we needed to make sure City Council actually was functioning effectively and that it stands for legitimacy in a way that it hasn’t before,” Lightfoot said. “If you look at polling around City Council, they’re in the low teens. People don’t have confidence in the City Council, and in some ways, they’re the most important manifestations of how government functions in the city.”

“People know who their alderman is,” she said. “So, it’s important to me that we set up a committee structure where they’re actually going to do real work and we have people who are driving an agenda, not just my agenda, but being responsive to the needs of people in the city.”

### More equitable spending in all neighborhoods

A hallmark of Lightfoot’s mayoral campaign was a promise to bring renewed attention to long-struggling neighborhoods on the South and West sides, vowing to improve neighborhood schools, create jobs and foster economic development.

“I feel confident that we are going to see some movement and change in neighborhoods. I’m particularly focused on the West Side and parts of the South Side that I think are so far behind,” Lightfoot said. “We’re starting to engage in conversations anew with people in those neighborhoods about what the opportunities and resources are. It varies by area, but basic infrastructure that you’re really going to need to build a development plan around doesn’t exist. Things like not just good quality schools, but roads, vacant lots, IT and broadband access. Those things are lacking remarkably in parts of our city.”

“Being present, being visible, listening — a lot of these communities have quality-of-life plans I think we can build on,” she said. “But really, it’s just letting people know you care about them. That’s where it starts.”

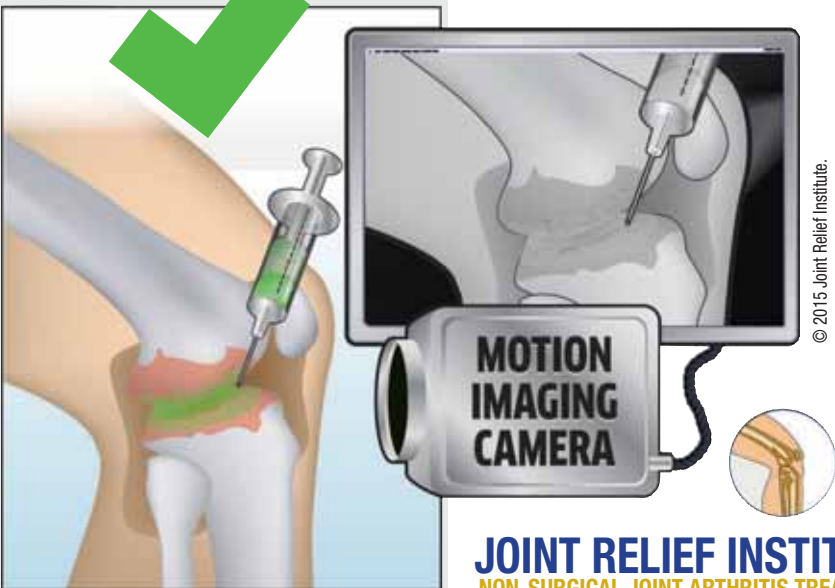

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# Judge, defense attorney question double standard

Say woman charged with filing false report isn't being treated like Smollett

Last month, a criminal case against a Hoffman Estates woman became tied to the legal drama surrounding Jussie Smollett when a judge, saying the situation “smells, big time,” asked why the woman was being “treated differently” than the actor by Cook County prosecutors.

And now the woman has acquired a new attorney to help her fight the felony charge of disorderly conduct for allegedly filing a false police report, the same crime Smollett was accused of in a 16-count indictment before charges against him were suddenly dropped.

Candace Clark, 21, said she is happy that an attorney has stepped up to take her case pro bono, though she is sorry that she has created extra media buzz around Smollett.

“They’re trying to bring his (Smollett’s) case back up, and I’m sorry about that, Jussie,” Clark said Wednesday in an interview at her Hoffman Estates residence.

But her new attorney, William E. Conway, believes

there is a double standard, echoing comments made last month by Circuit Court Judge Marc Martin.

“I want to emphasize that she doesn’t know anybody, she’s not connected,” said Conway, after he had filed an appearance Wednesday on behalf of Clark at the Cook County courthouse in Rolling Meadows. “We’re at this level of justice determined by whether someone is connected or not. Justice should be blind to that.”

Conway said he decided to enter the case after reading and seeing news reports in which Martin

criticized prosecutors for handling Clark’s case differently from Smollett’s.

Smollett, the “Empire” television actor, was charged earlier this year with filing a phony police report in Chicago in which he said he was attacked and beaten by two men shouting racial epithets. His felony case was dismissed in exchange for performing two days of community service and forfeiting his \$10,000 bail bond.

Clark was arrested in March and charged with felony disorderly conduct

for allegedly filing a false report “regarding funds that went missing from her bank account,” according to court documents. She had no prior criminal background in Cook County, authorities said.

Prosecutors offered Clark deferred prosecution, meaning she would have to make restitution, obtain a GED and appear in District 9 Court at 26th Street and California Avenue in Chicago monthly or biweekly over a period of time. The charges would then be dismissed.

Conway, a former Cook County assistant state’s attorney who prosecuted financial crimes, said the deferred prosecution for a first-time offender seemed harsh.

“The deferred prosecution is far more onerous than what Smollett had to do,” Conway said.

It was at an April 11 preliminary hearing in Clark’s case that Martin first referenced Smollett’s case.

“I’d like to know why Ms. Clark is being treated differently than Jussie Smollett,”

Martin asked prosecutors, according to a transcript of the proceedings. “It’s a disorderly conduct case (false) reporting — a lot less egregious than Mr. Smollett’s case. I have a problem with it. Why is she being treated differently?”

Prosecutors replied that cases were reviewed and charged based on the facts, the investigation and the position of the victims in this case, according to the transcript.

“Well, Ms. Clark is not a movie star, she doesn’t have a high-price lawyer, al-

though, her lawyer is very good,” Martin said, referring to the public defender who at the time was representing Clark. “And this smells, big time. I didn’t create this mess, your office created this mess. And your explanation is unsatisfactory to this court. She’s being treated differently.”

He added: “So, we’re making her go to Branch 9, but Mr. Smollett walks free. I don’t get that. ... I have a real problem with it. I know what Branch 9 is. It’s rigorous. I’ve issued enough warrants out of Branch 9 where people couldn’t comply and now they’re facing felony charges, no bond. It’s not right,” Martin said of the deferred prosecution plan.

Clark, who said she works the third shift at a Home Depot, has not been indicted on the charge yet, a formal step toward a trial or other disposition. In Wednesday’s hearing, Martin continued the case until June 6 to give Conway time to review the evidence.

“It’s surprising to me the difference between the way Smollett was treated and the way a third-shift worker at Home Depot is treated,” Conway said.

The city of Chicago is suing Smollett to recoup its expenses for the weekslong police investigation spurred by his report.

homes routinely sell in the \$1 million range.

Ed Kuske, president of the 32-home Castlewood Terrace Association, says the gym is unnecessary, fiscally irresponsible, a public safety risk and a danger to the character of the neighborhood and its historic designation.

His group filed suit in March against Chicago’s Public Building Commission, which manages public construction projects in the city. The association is seeking a judge’s order to stop construction of the proposed annex, arguing it would violate a setback restriction written into a century-old land covenant.

“If the Public Building Commission is permitted to carry out the proposed annex construction project, irreparable harm will be caused to each owner of real estate on Castlewood Terrace,” the complaint states. “The covenants and restrictions will be violated on an ongoing basis and the character and quality of life for homeowners on Castlewood Terrace will be negatively impacted.”

Though situated just feet from the relative wealth of Castlewood Terrace, McCutcheon is considerably more modest and diverse: As of last year, more than 90% of its student body was low-income, and about the same percentage was non-white, according to the school’s 2018 school report card. More than 16% of students were homeless,

and a quarter had a disability.

But Kuske strongly took issue with the notion that the disagreement has anything to do with race and class. He said Castlewood Terrace residents have always been supportive of the school and that some volunteer there.

“We support the gym if it doesn’t take away our property rights. If it was a race issue or something else, why would we be doing that?” he said. “Can’t you have different opinions on what’s the right project for the school without calling names? That never crossed anybody’s mind. ... It’s a ridiculous claim.”

The lawsuit targets construction on the south side, where the Castlewood rules apply, and Kuske said the neighborhood could live with a gym on the north side of the school, which is currently a parking lot for school employees. Castlewood neighbors have offered to designate parking spots on the crowded street for the employees, he said.

“We have a special place. ... Why destroy a historic district?” Kuske said.

Citing the pending lawsuit, a Public Building Commission spokesman, Bryant Payne, declined to comment on the plans and would not say whether the addition is being eyed for the north or south side of the school.

Having met with Castlewood residents during her time as principal, Kram said she was prepared for opposition.

“I wasn’t surprised, but I was also disgusted at the same time, that people

would spend money to block something that is so beneficial to children,” Kram said of the lawsuit.

Neither CPS officials nor current McCutcheon leaders commented for this story.

In a recent essay published in the Tribune, 46th Ward Ald. James Cappleman took up the school’s cause.

“McCutcheon does an admirable job educating the most vulnerable students in our community,” Cappleman wrote. “But now, the school finds itself with a new challenge: Its affluent neighbors.”

In an interview with the Tribune at his ward office about half a mile from the school, Cappleman said he was surprised at the level of resistance to what he sees as a necessity for the children who attend McCutcheon. He also sees it as an example of the disparities in resources among Chicago schools, the gulf that exists between the haves and have-nots.

Cappleman noted that the Boys and Girls Club gym does not have an elevator, meaning that students without adequate access have to be carried up and down its stairs. The school’s new gym would be linked to the main school and would have an elevator.

A new gym for McCutcheon could also be used for after-school and weekend programs for the community, funded by a five-year state grant the school has already been awarded, Kram said.

“I will push and push to have this gym,” Cappleman said.

Castlewood Terrace once connected Marine Drive on the east to Sheridan Road on the west. But now, access to Sheridan is cut off and a large patch of green space forms a dead end at the western end of Castlewood, with the school to the north and the Boys and Girls Club to the south.

Kuske argued that putting the gym in the middle would rob the historic block of its green space. Cappleman said people often sleep or litter in the grass, so the gym would displace those problems.

But not everyone on Castlewood is against the gym, and not all McCutcheon parents think it’s what the school needs.

Down the block from the school, Phil Torres took a break from mowing his lawn to talk about why he’s on the fence about the gym. He’s not in favor of the plans he’s heard, but he’s not entirely opposed to the idea more generally and said he needs more information.

“I think kids deserve a place to play,” Torres said. “Everybody deserves a nice safe place to play that they can get to. So I don’t have any issue with the sentiment, that they want a nice gym.”

Torres, whose children are in high school and did not go to McCutcheon, said he and others on the block are concerned the gym would signal an end to the contract between the school and the Boys and Girls Club, taking away from its budget.

“That would be a meaningful hit to the Boys and Girls Club that really plays an important anchor role

for the community,” Torres said.

In a prepared statement, the Boys and Girls Clubs of Chicago said that while it’s “always mindful of resources, our first and foremost concern is the youth we serve.”

Angie Doss, the parent of a McCutcheon first-grader, said she’d rather see other investments in the school before the district spends \$10 million from its capital budget on a gym. The school has more urgent needs, she said.

“I think they should put the funding in the school, doing the after-school programs,” she said. “They don’t have a tutor there. And they should have a tutor for all ages in that school.”

Melanie Velez, whose fourth grader and kindergarten go to McCutcheon, has also served on the local school council. The family moved to Uptown a few years ago because of its diversity and chose McCutcheon for similar reasons, along with changes Kram was making at the school.

She found out McCutcheon didn’t have a gym when her son, who is active and loves to play sports, started telling her about the walks to the Boys and Girls Club, and the times they didn’t go because of the weather. Sometimes, students from low-income families didn’t have warm enough coats, she said.

“There were times when they couldn’t go and they would be in their classrooms,” Velez said. “We had come from a school that did have a gym, so when he wasn’t able to, he was disap-

pointed.”

Christopher White’s 7-year-old son, a McCutcheon first grader, has autism. White worries about him wandering off or getting left behind on the way to and from the club, and about the school day being disrupted by the time it takes to don winter gear and walk back and forth to the gym. There’s also a sense of pride students could feel if their basketball team got to play on their own court, like most other schools.

Not having a gym in the school building, White said, is “like not having a cafeteria. ... It just doesn’t make sense they don’t have one.”

Velez and White both said some students don’t feel as comfortable at the club as at their own school.

“The school having something they can call theirs and be excited and be proud of is very important,” Velez said. “This would mean something for them. They can say hey we have a new gym, I want to play basketball, I want to play soccer.”

She called the resistance from the Castlewood group “heartbreaking,” noting that gentrification in the area is already making it harder for families to stay in the neighborhood.

“There’s an elementary school, there’s children here every day, why not give them a place?” Velez said. “I think the pushback, I guess it is a bit selfish. I think (the homeowners) are thinking about their benefit of not having it there, instead of helping the community.”

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# Park Ridge library to add historical context to mural

Depicts Native Americans ceding land to government

Amid the removal of historic Works Progress Administration murals from schools in Oak Park following complaints that they do not reflect the community's diversity, a Park Ridge WPA mural depicting Native Americans and white government agents is staying put inside the city's library — but getting some additional historical context, the library's director says.

Heidi Smith, executive director of the Park Ridge library, said printed pamphlets describing the history and restoration of the "Indians Cede the Land" post office mural will be updated to include expanded historical context of the scene based on information provided to the library last year by Julie Pelletier, an associate professor of indigenous studies at the University of Winnipeg. Pelletier served as acting director of Newberry Library's McNickle Center for American Indian and Indigenous Studies.

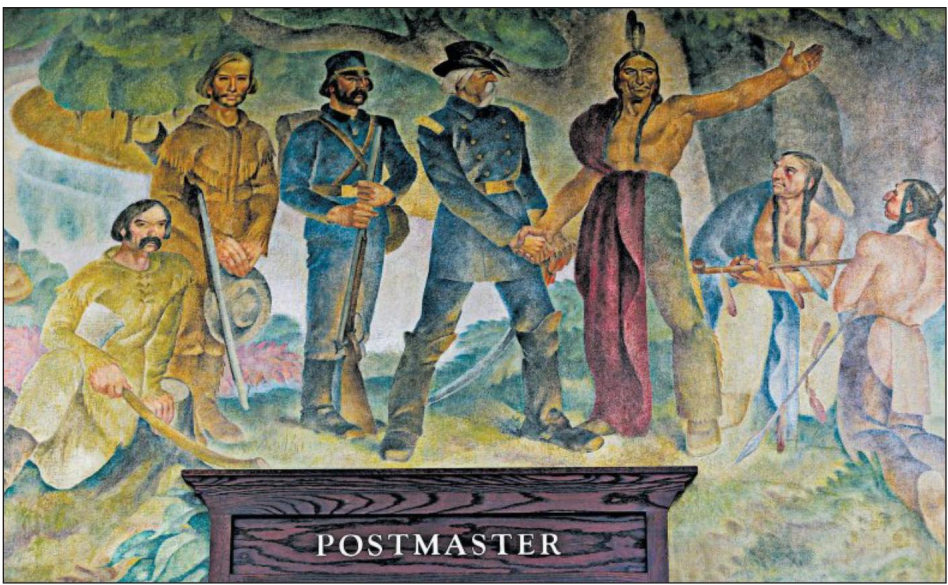
The additional information explains that when U.S. government treaties were

signed with Native American tribes, they often were not honored by the government, Smith said. Such information was recently added to the "news" section of the library's website.

"The act of ceding land by Native Americans was involuntary and typically done under duress," Pelletier's information states. "In return for vast tracts of land, tribes might be promised goods, money, reserved lands (reservations) and protection from encroaching settlers .... The Treaty of Chicago gained over a million acres of land for the United States. In return, signatory tribes received \$100,000 in trade goods, \$280,000 in twenty annual payments of \$14,000 each, and \$150,000 for the erection of mills, houses, etc. The treaty does not list any land to be held for the tribes so one wonders where the houses and mills would be built. The United States government often did not honor its treaties with Native Americans and most tribes do not receive what they were promised as payment for land cessions."

Officials said they did not yet know when the library's informational brochure on the mural would be updated to include the new language.

The oil on canvas mural,

painted by George Melville Smith and restored in 2013 through a volunteer-led fundraising campaign, hung for many years in the former Park Ridge Police Office at 164 S. Prospect Ave. According to the New Deal Art Registry, it was created in 1940 as part of a government program that commissioned art to be created for federal buildings.

Three other New Deal-era murals, created through the WPA Federal Art Project, have been or are in the process of being removed from schools in Oak Park after complaints were raised that the 80-year-old paintings featured no children of color, even though the school district today is diverse. The first mural to be removed depicted a scene of white children and parents enjoying winter activities. It was painted in 1937.

Smith acknowledged that upon joining the Park Ridge Public Library last year, she initially found its own New Deal mural—which shows a white uniformed officer in a handshake with a bare-chested native man—to be "a very beautiful, but challenging, piece of art" due to the subject matter.

"I think it has cultural and historical significance here in Park Ridge," Smith said of the mural. "I'm

thrilled we have it here in the library, but I also strongly feel it's our responsibility to educate and share the context — both when the portrait was created and the historical period in which it is meant to portray."

Smith said she reached out to Pelletier last summer around the time that moving the mural to the Quiet Reading Room was briefly considered. It was also around this time that a patron inquired if the mural was insulting to Native Americans and questioned whether it should have a "place of honor" in the library, Smith said.

Pelletier recently said that the library's initial description of the piece included wording that "acted as if the tribal people of that area had either simply handed over their land or been beaten into submission. I really encouraged [the library] to put context in place, to look at the long period of colonization — not just the unfair, but illegal, ways in which territory was taken from indigenous people — and to really keep that context clear so that people looking at the mural would understand it expressed a particular moment in history from a particular perspective."

That perspective, Pel-

letier said, is of white America, which, in the 1930s, was experiencing a time of "nationalistic fervor." Such feelings are reflected in the "Indians Cede the Land" mural, she said.

"The expression of Manifest Destiny is clear to my eyes. While the indigenous men are painted as physically powerful, they are bowing to the military might and right of settler colonial society," Pelletier said.

Pelletier acknowledged that the portrayal of Native Americans in such a prominent piece of art was "unusual" for the time it was created, but it was not necessarily an accurate portrayal.

"It shows them as 'noble savages' and that they have willingly moved out of the way for progress," she said.

It also shows indigenous people living in the past, in a seemingly different world than the white men, Pelletier said, although by the 19th Century, native people wore modern clothing of the time, spoke multiple languages and were "politically savvy."

"American Indians in the Great Lakes area had been intermarrying with, trading with and negotiating with settlers for 200 years," she explained. "So it's not like these folks showed up in

this community and the natives didn't know who they were. They had a pretty good idea of what the desire was: Land and for peaceful movement in the territory. They would have known they didn't have a lot of options."

The mural can also be viewed as offensive to native people, Pelletier acknowledged, which is why it is important to "put the mural into perspective" by considering the heightened nationalism of the period when it was painted and actual history of government treaties, she said.

Pat Lofthouse, a former library trustee who was involved in the mural's restoration effort, said she fully supports additional historical context accompanying the mural. At its dedication in 2013, the restoration group invited a Native American scholar who pointed out the "romanticism" of the piece and the fact that the indigenous people did not give up their land happily.

"It was always my intent that it be used for educational purposes to demonstrate Manifest Destiny," Lofthouse said of the mural.

The painting also reflects the attitudes of the time when it was created, she said.

"Now, with our heightened sensitivity, we realize the sacrifice of all people of color," Lofthouse acknowledged.

For Smith, the mural is one of many different viewpoints reflected among the materials that are available within the library.

"It's just such an exciting time to talk about what we believe in, why we believe in it and what we are going to do about the past that didn't respect many of those beliefs," she said. "We certainly don't want to forget it .... The more we talk about it, the more likely it is we can shed light on the actual experiences of the people who lived at that time."

## Trump: Unity for abortion battle

Anti-abortion wing's gains would be lost, he tweets

WASHINGTON — With Alabama's restrictive new abortion law stirring divisions on the right, President Donald Trump implored anti-abortion activists to stay united heading into the 2020 election even as he laid out where his personal views differ from the legislation.

In a series of tweets posted just before midnight Saturday, Trump said gains by anti-abortion activists will “rapidly disappear” if, as he put it, “we are foolish and do not stay UNITED as one.”

Trump did not state his stance on Alabama's law, underscoring the fine line a president seeking reelection is trying to walk between a conservative base that favors criminalizing access to abortion and potentially angering women already skeptical of him. The Alabama law forbids the procedure in almost all circumstances, including cases of rape and incest.

Trump laid out personal views that differ, saying he supports the right to an abortion when rape or incest is involved, or when the pregnant woman's life is at risk.

White House officials did not respond Sunday to emailed requests seeking additional comment on the president's position.

Disagreement among Republicans is becoming apparent over Alabama's law, and Trump sees Democrats

taking advantage of that.

House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy of California, the top Republican in the Democratic-controlled chamber, opposed the law, saying he supports exceptions for rape and incest and serious risk to the woman's life. Evangelist Pat Robertson, meanwhile, said the law is too “extreme” and not the best vehicle to attempt to force the Supreme Court to revisit — and possibly overturn — Roe v. Wade, the high court's 1973 ruling that established a woman's constitutional right to an abortion.

Several Democrats who are competing for the right

to challenge Trump in 2020 have come out against Alabama's law and other state moves to impose new abortion restrictions, vowing to protect abortion rights through national legislation or, if elected, their Supreme Court nominees.

Other state laws ban abortion once a fetal heartbeat is detected, which experts say typically happens around the sixth week of pregnancy, but is often before most women realize or confirm they are expecting a baby.

Trump tweeted that “We have come very far” on the anti-abortion front in the two-plus years since he took

office, noting the addition of more than 100 conservative federal judges and two Supreme Court justices “and a whole new & positive attitude about the Right to Life.”

His selections of Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh for the Supreme Court tilted the political makeup of the nation's high court to the right, and emboldened conservatives who believe the time is ripe for a court case to challenge Roe v. Wade.

Trump also claimed that “The Radical Left” is “exploding on this issue” and urged Republican unity on abortion to keep Democrats

from winning. Trump claims Democrats support abortion on demand, including ending pregnancies late in the term.

“We must stick together and Win for Life in 2020,” he tweeted.

Trump noted in the tweets that he holds the same anti-abortion position as Republican President Ronald Reagan, but that stance was not a lifelong one for the current Oval Office occupant. Hailing from liberal New York City and decades before aligning with the GOP as he neared a serious run for president, Trump favored abortion rights. He also supported

Planned Parenthood, a provider of women's health care services, including abortion.

Trump includes regular references in his speeches to what he says are the Democrats' extreme positions on abortion, including in formal settings like the State of the Union address and in the more freewheeling atmosphere of his campaign rallies.

Republicans believe the politics of abortion have shifted somewhat in their favor in recent years. But the near-absolutist nature of the most recent state-level bills has sparked concerns inside Trump's team that the issue could energize his critics and female voters, with whom the president has long struggled.

Polling suggests the abortion issue has the potential to stoke political engagement among both parties. The General Social Survey released last year found 64% of Democrats, but just 35% of Republicans, saying a woman should be able to have an abortion for any reason.

Vice President Mike Pence, a conservative Christian and abortion opponent, avoided taking sides when he was asked about the Alabama law during an appearance in Wisconsin last week.

Pence replied that he is proud to be part of a “pro-life administration,” adding that he and Trump “have worked to stand for the sanctity of life since the outset of this administration. And I know many states around the country are embracing life.”

Pence's spokeswoman, Alyssa Farah, on Sunday declined further comment.

## Labour's Corbyn nears OK on 2nd Brexit referendum

Opposition Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn moved closer to fully backing a second Brexit referendum, saying the public should be given a choice on any deal to leave the European Union.

Corbyn previously said the country should be offered a vote on Prime Minister Theresa May's Brexit deal. On Sunday, he seemed to echo his deputy Tom Watson, who has been calling for a vote on any Brexit package, including one proposed by the Labour Party.

“It would be reasonable to have a public vote to decide on that,” Corbyn told the BBC.

May blamed divisions within Labour on a second referendum for the collapse in talks between the party and the government on Friday, though Corbyn said the prime minister's refusal to soften her red lines were at fault. While the sides failed to find an agreement on a customs union, they found common ground on workers' rights, which May said she would include in a “new and improved” deal this week.

She will ask lawmakers

to back her fourth attempt at passing a Brexit deal early in June. Writing in the Sunday Times, May said she would make “a bold new offer” to members of Parliament. She also said her cabinet will on Tuesday consider a new series of indicative votes that could deliver a consensus in Parliament.

Corbyn said he wouldn't give a blank check to May's new plans, but would consider them very carefully. He was also doubtful whether another round of indicative votes could break the impasse.

Corbyn also appeared to back away from his previous pledge to end freedom of movement after Brexit, saying a Labour government would instead be prepared to negotiate the issue of British and European workers having the ability to work in each others' economies with the European Union.

His comments come ahead of Thursday's European Parliamentary elections, in which both the Conservative and Labour parties are trailing in the polls. The Tory party is polling at just 12 percent, according to the latest Opinion poll for the Observer newspaper, with voters protesting May's

failure to deliver Brexit three years after the referendum. The Brexit Party, led by Nigel Farage, topped the poll with 34 percent, followed by Labour at 20 percent.

May this week agreed to chart a path for resigning if she can't get her deal through parliament on its fourth attempt. That's spurred Tory hopefuls who want to replace her, including former foreign secretary and bookies' favorite Boris Johnson, who backs a no-deal Brexit.

But on Monday, a group of 60 Tory MPs will launch a campaign seeking to stop May's replacement from pursuing no deal, according to a person familiar with the plans.

The so-called One Nation Caucus, led by Work and Pensions Secretary Amber Rudd, will launch a declaration of 10 values Monday, rejecting “narrow nationalism” and calling for the U.K. to be a leader on the global stage.

The group also includes Nicky Morgan and Defense Minister Tobias Ellwood, who on Sunday ruled out running for leader. He criticized colleagues who appear to be using Brexit to boost their own popularity, instead of working in the national interest.

## Over objections, Swiss voters approve stricter gun laws

GENEVA — Swiss voters on Sunday approved a measure to tighten the Alpine nation's gun laws, bringing the country in line with many of its European partners despite the objections of local gun owners, Swiss media reported, citing official results.

Switzerland's public broadcaster said more than 63% of voters nationwide agreed to align with European Union firearms rules adopted two years ago after deadly attacks in France, Belgium, Germany and Britain.

The vote Sunday was part of Switzerland's regular referendums that give citizens a direct say in policymaking. It had stoked passions in a country with long, proud traditions of gun ownership and sport and target shooting. Switzerland, unlike many other European nations, allows veterans of its obligatory military service for men to take home their service weapons after tours of duty.

The Swiss proposal, among other things, requires regular training on the use of firearms, special waivers to own some semi-automatic weapons and serial number tracking system for key parts of some guns. Gun owners would have to register any weapons not already registered within three years, and keep a registry of their gun collections.

Supporters of the measure, who included the Swiss parliament and executive branch, said similar measures adopted by the EU after deadly extremist attacks are needed to ensure strong police cooperation and economic ties with Switzerland's partners in Europe's Schengen visa-free travel zone. They insisted it will not block law-abiding citizens from obtaining legal

guns, but would simply do more to track them.

Switzerland is not an EU member, but it is in the Schengen zone.

Opponents insisted the proposal would violate Switzerland's constitution and do little to fight extremism or crime. They said the weapons used in recent attacks in Europe weren't obtained legally. They argued the proposal cracks down mainly on lawful gun owners in Switzerland and rams through what they see as the latest diktat from Brussels.

Jean-Luc Addor, a populist Swiss People's Party lawmaker from the southwestern Valais region, said adopting the EU directive would be “unjust, freedom-killing, useless, dangerous,

and above all, anti-Swiss.”

“With no effect on the fight against terrorism, it will only hit honest, law-abiding citizens who possess legal weapons,” he wrote on his website. “It's the epitome of injustice.”

Switzerland hasn't faced major extremist attacks like those that have hit France, Belgium, Britain and Germany in recent years, leaving scores dead.

Ahead of the vote, most of Switzerland's major political parties — except for the populist Swiss People's Party — favored the measure, with support strongest among Socialists and Greens.

The rift on the issue has fallen along a rural-urban divide, with city dwellers more inclined to back the EU directive.

# Exit polls indicate Modi winning reelection in India

NEW DELHI — Prime Minister Narendra Modi appeared poised to win reelection in the world's largest democracy, according to exit polls released after voting ended Sunday in India's marathon national election.

Official results will be released Thursday. Exit polls in this nation of more than 1.3 billion people have a patchy record: Surveys have both underestimated and overestimated the strength of the winning party in the past.

But Sunday's exit polls suggested that Modi's Hindu nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party and its allies would win a majority of seats in the lower house of Parliament.

Modi, the most popular and polarizing politician in India, ran a campaign highlighting his tough stance on national security and making forthright appeals to patriotism.

Over the past five years, the Modi government has instituted a handful of economic initiatives, rolled out schemes to assist poor Indians and launched a nationwide cleanliness drive. But

it failed to deliver on its core promise to create jobs: The unemployment rate surged last year to a 45-year high.

The exit polls seemed to indicate that Modi's campaign strategy had paid dividends. Seven polls suggested that the BJP and its allies would garner between 287 and 340 seats, well above the 272-seat threshold for a parliamentary majority.

Two exit polls predicted that Modi's coalition would fall short of that mark.

The polls showed main opposition Congress party and its allies winning between 70 and 164 seats. Observers expected that opposition parties would try to cobble together a coalition of their own if Modi's party stumbled.

Some members of the opposition parties emphasized the unreliability of exit polls and the potential for surprises when results are announced Thursday.

Sunday was the seventh and final polling day in an election with nearly 900 million eligible voters that began April 11. The battle was bruising, as election authorities repeatedly stepped in to discipline candidates for violating rules on poll rhetoric.

The overall voter turnout was 66 percent, the same as in the 2014 national poll. In that election, Modi appealed to the aspirations of voters, promising development for all and the advent of "achhe din," or good days.

The current campaign was less about hope than fear: Modi projected himself as the only leader who could ensure the nation's security, pointing to the airstrikes he ordered in February on an alleged militant training camp inside Pakistan.

Meanwhile, senior BJP leaders engaged in anti-Muslim rhetoric. Amit Shah, the party's president, called Muslim migrants who enter the country illegally "termites." Yogi Adityanath, the radical Hindu priest who leads country's largest state, said opposition parties were infected with a "green virus" (green is a color traditionally associated with Islam).

The election was largely peaceful until its final days. In West Bengal, one of the most populous states in the country, the BJP was engaged in a bitter contest for votes with the local party that governs the state, the Trinamool Congress.

administration.

Sunday night's apparent rocket attack was the first such incident since September, when three mortar shells landed in an abandoned lot inside the Green Zone.

There was no immediate comment from the State Department or the U.S. Embassy in Iraq on Sunday's attack.

Reporters on the east side of the Tigris River, opposite the Green Zone, heard an explosion, after which alert sirens sounded briefly in Baghdad.

Iraqi military spokesman Brig. Gen. Yahya Rasoul said a Katyusha rocket fell near the statue of the Unknown Soldier, less than a mile from the U.S. Embassy. He said the military is investigating the cause but that the rocket was believed to have been fired from east Baghdad. The area is home to Iran-backed Shiite militias.

As tensions escalate between the U.S. and Iran, there have been concerns that Baghdad could be caught in the middle, just as it is on the path to recovery. The country hosts more than 5,000 U.S. troops, and

is home to powerful Iranian-backed militias, some of whom want those U.S. forces to leave.

The U.S. Navy said Sunday it had conducted exercises in the Arabian Sea with the aircraft carrier strike group ordered to the region to counter the unspecified threat from Iran.

The Navy said the exercises and training were conducted Friday and Saturday with the USS Abraham Lincoln aircraft carrier strike group in coordination with the U.S. Marine Corps, highlighting U.S. "lethality and agility to respond to threat," as well as to deter conflict and preserve U.S. strategic interests.

The current tensions are rooted in Trump's decision last year to withdraw the U.S. from the 2015 nuclear accord between Iran and world powers and impose wide-reaching sanctions, including on Iranian oil exports that are crucial to its economy.

Iran has said it would resume enriching uranium at higher levels if a new nuclear deal is not reached by July 7.

Energy ministers from OPEC and its allies, including Saudi Arabia and Russia, met in Saudi Arabia on Sunday to discuss energy prices and production cuts. Iran's oil exports are ex-

pected to shrink further in the coming months after the U.S. stopped renewing waivers that allowed it to continue selling to some countries.

OPEC and non-OPEC oil producers have production cuts in place, but the group of exporters is not expected to make its decision on output until late June.

The United Arab Emirates' energy minister Suhail al-Mazrouei told reporters he does not think relaxing the oil production cuts in place is the right measure. His comments suggest there's support within OPEC and other oil-producing nations, like Russia, to continue propping up oil prices after a sharp fall last year. Oil is now trading above \$70 a barrel and closer to what's needed to balance state budgets among Persian Gulf producers.

Saudi Arabia's King Salman, meanwhile, has called for a meeting of Arab heads of state on May 30 in Mecca to discuss the latest developments, including the oil pipeline attack.

The kingdom has blamed the pipeline attack on Iran, accusing Tehran of arming the rebel Houthis, which a Saudi-led coalition has been at war with in Yemen since 2015.

Report: Trump, Kushner bank transactions raised red flag

NEW YORK — Multiple transactions involving legal entities controlled by President Donald Trump and his son-in-law Jared Kushner aroused the suspicion of anti-money laundering specialists at Deutsche Bank in 2016 and 2017, according to The New York Times.

The specialists recommended the matter be referred to a unit of the Treasury Department that polices financial crimes, but bank executives re-

jected their advice, the newspaper reported on Sunday.

As a result, the “suspicious activity reports” about the transactions were never filed with the government, the New York Times reported.

The report didn’t give specifics about the nature of the transactions but said some of them involved money being transferred back and forth with foreign entities or individuals.

Report: Navy submariners kept list rating female crew, sex acts

Sailors aboard a U.S. Navy submarine circulated sexually explicit lists that ranked female crew members, an investigation found. The lists, first reported Friday by Military.com, were uncovered through a Freedom of Information Act request.

The 74-page investigative report reveals two lists — one with Yelp-like star ratings on the women and another containing “lewd and sexist comments” be-

side each woman’s name, according to Military.com.

In February 2018, the USS Florida became the second to integrate female members. The misconduct came to light four months later, when two sailors aboard the Florida brought the lists to a superior officer, reporting that they were stored on an internal computer network and updated regularly, Military.com reported.

In oil-rich Venezuela, mile-long lines to buy gas in major city

MARACAIBO, Venezuela — U.S. sanctions on oil-rich Venezuela appear to be taking hold, resulting in mile-long lines for fuel in the South American nation’s second-largest city, Maracaibo.

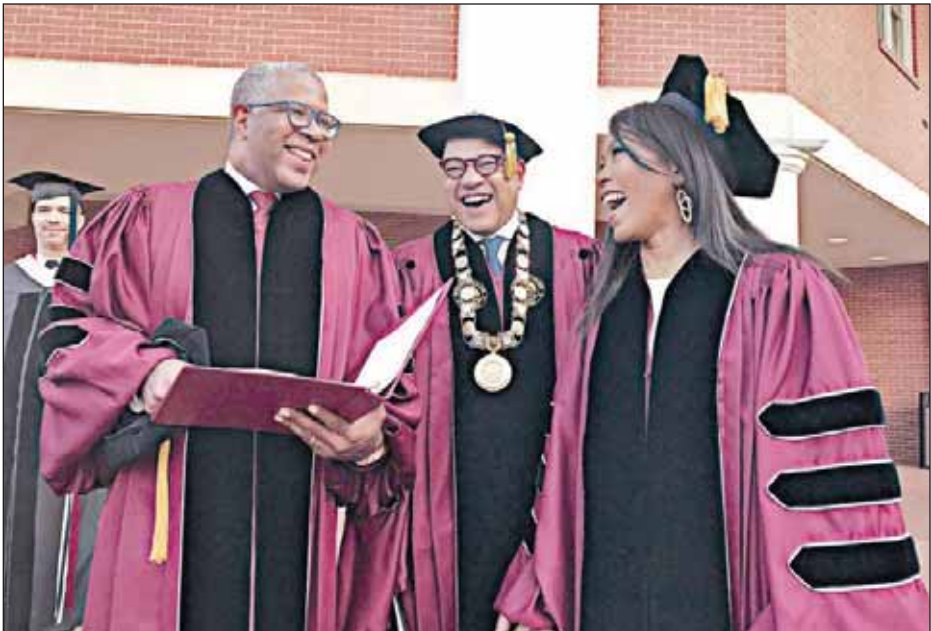
Some drivers said they’d had to wait almost 24 hours to fuel up, and people have been grabbing catnaps on the hoods of cars or in truck beds.

Nearing empty and stuck in line, infectious

diseases doctor Yoli Urdaneta said she couldn’t make her shift to treat patients.

“I’ve spent four days trying to get gasoline,” Urdaneta said. “But I couldn’t.”

Billionaire’s grant will wipe out Morehouse class’s student debt

ATLANTA — A billionaire technology investor and philanthropist says he will provide grants to wipe out the student debt of the entire graduating class at Morehouse College — an estimated \$40 million.

Robert F. Smith, this year’s commencement speaker, made the announcement Sunday morning while addressing nearly 400 graduating seniors of the all-male historically black college in Atlanta. Smith is the Founder and CEO of Vista Equity Partners, a private equity firm that invests in software, data, and technology-driven companies.

“On behalf of the eight generations of my family that have been in this country, we’re gonna put a little fuel in your bus,” Smith told the graduates. “This is my class, 2019. And my family is making a grant to eliminate their student loans.”

The announcement elicited stunned looks from faculty and students alike, before the graduates broke into the biggest cheers of the morning. Morehouse said it is the single largest gift to the college.

Smith, who received an honorary doctorate from Morehouse during the ceremony, had already announced a \$1.5 million gift to the school.

The pledge to eliminate student debt for the class of 2019 is estimated to be \$40 million.

In the weeks before graduating from Morehouse on Sunday, 22-year-old finance major Aaron Mitchom drew up a spreadsheet to calculate how long it would take him to pay back his \$200,000 in student loans — 25 years at half his monthly salary, per his calculations.

In an instant, that number vanished. Mitchom, sitting in the crowd, wept.

Plane crash in Honduras kills 4 Americans, 1 Canadian

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — Four Americans and a Canadian pilot were killed when a small plane went down off the coast of Roatan island in Honduras, officials said Sunday.

Armed Forces spokesman Jose Domingo Meza confirmed the nationalities of those who died in Saturday’s crash.

The Piper Cherokee Six plummeted into the Atlantic shortly after takeoff from the popular tourist destination of Roatan en route to the port of Trujillo. The military said in a statement that rescue boats with police divers and firefighters recovered four bodies within minutes of the crash, and transported another to a hospital, where he later died.

The U.S. State Department also confirmed the deaths of four U.S. citizens. They did not release names.

**In Indiana:** An explosion leveled a home in southern Indiana early Sunday, killing one person, injuring two others and leaving several nearby homes uninhabitable, authorities said.

Hours after the explosion shattered windows across a Jeffersonville neighborhood and sent debris flying onto roofs, lawns and cars, officials had not said what they believe caused the explosion.

Indiana State Police, Jeffersonville police and firefighters were at the scene, along with crews from Vectren, a natural gas provider.

Jeffersonville police Lt. Isaac Parker told The Courier-Journal that the house exploded just before 5 a.m. Sunday in the Ohio River city.

# Gov. Pritzker and DCFS, if parents refuse services, that's a red flag

When a 4 a.m. fire ripped through a Little Village carriage house last summer, firefighters found 10 children, mostly cousins ages 16 years down to 3 months, still in their sleeping positions. They had no chance to escape, fire investigators determined. No adult was home at the time.

Public records later showed the mother of five of the children who perished — the renter of the property — was the subject of more than 20 Department of Children and Family Services complaints since 2004. At least one complaint about lack of proper supervision stemmed from an incident in which one of her children, an 8-year-old who appeared to be autistic, was found darting into traffic. A separate 2015 investigation alleged she accompanied her teen daughter to a mall where they shoplifted, according to reports.

But most of the complaints DCFS investigated were labeled “unfounded.” And when the mother at one point suggested to investigators she was depressed and overwhelmed, DCFS tried to engage her in a program called intact family services. The program allows stressed families to stay together while offering home visits, counseling, child care help and parenting advice.

But the mother, according to DCFS, declined the offer of help. The family fell off the agency's radar. Until the fire.

Cases in which parents reject DCFS intervention after the agency receives repeated complaints and hotline calls — yet there's no emergency need to remove the

children — fall into a gray area that Gov. J.B. Pritzker and DCFS need to swiftly address. Should DCFS intervention be voluntary for families on the margin, troubled but not in imminent crisis? Or should parents who have been identified as problematic be forced to accept state services or, if they won't, temporarily lose custody of their children?

**A Pritzker-commissioned report** released last week from policy center Chapin Hall at the University of Chicago focused on the need to reform intact family services. Caseworkers who deal with high-risk families but can't engage them in services “may simply close the case,” the report says. It happens routinely.

“Right now, it's a dead end (for case-

workers),” says Dana Weiner, a lead researcher in the Chapin study and a long-time consultant on child welfare issues.

“Families may not even be refusing services, they may just be nonresponsive,” she said. “But then the only recourse is to call the hotline” for worried family members, for mandated reporters and for caseworkers themselves who don't know where else to turn while closing a questionable case.

That's too risky. DCFS needs a specific protocol that accelerates these cases to supervisors or to the court system, where parents can be compelled to participate, to be subjected to home visits, or risk losing custody.

**On Aug. 26, firefighters responded** to the carriage house, engulfed in flames, in the 2200 block of South Sacramento Avenue. They found the mother's five children in the burning, smoke-filled apartment: 3-month-old Amayah Almaraz, 5-year-old Ariel Garcia, 11-year-old Xavier Contreras, 13-year-old Nathan Contreras and 14-year-old Cesar Contreras, who lived another day before succumbing to his injuries.

Also killed by the fire: a close family friend, 16-year-old Victor Mendoza; 14-year-old cousin Adrian Hernandez, who died two days later; and three other cousins who were siblings, 3-year-old Alanni Ayala, 5-year-old Gialanni Ayala and 10-year-old Giovanni Ayala.

The mother of the three siblings, Priscilla Cobos, who had agreed reluctantly to

a sleepover because the cousins wanted to spend time together, filed a wrongful death lawsuit in March and an amended complaint in the case Thursday. It names as defendants the mother who rented the apartment and had faced numerous DCFS complaints, Yolanda Ayala, along with the city of Chicago, Ald. George Cardenas, in whose ward the carriage house was located, and the building's owners.

According to the lawsuit, Cobos left her children with Ayala “believing they would be safe, properly supervised and not subjected to danger.” But at some point, Ayala “left the children alone in the apartment, without proper supervision or care for their safety,” the lawsuit alleges. The cause of the fire remains undetermined. Fire investigators said it appeared to have started on a porch, possibly from an open flame.

The 10 children who perished should serve as an urgent, tragic reminder to Pritzker and to DCFS. The governor owns the agency he inherited, has pledged to make it better and will be judged accordingly. If we can suggest one directive he should give to the agency:

DCFS should more dramatically prioritize families that have provoked repeated complaints yet who refuse services. No one knows if more help for this family would have brought about a different result. But parents and caretakers who refuse state help after numerous complaints shouldn't fall off DCFS' radar. Those refusals should be glaring, red flags.

## ‘Hamilton’ will punch its ticket out of town after a history-making run

Chicago hadn't been incorporated when Alexander Hamilton died in 1804 after a duel with — well, you know. But this city has made a very hospitable home for the blockbuster musical based on his life.

Lin-Manuel Miranda's sung-and-spoken story of the “10-dollar Founding Father” has drawn enthusiastic audiences from Chicago Public Schools students to business travelers, from young suburban families to bus tours of retirees, all captivated by this tale of American history with a rhyme and a beat. Fans swarmed to buy tickets if they could and entered last-minute lotteries if they couldn't. Lincoln Park Zoo named a Bactrian baby Alexander Camelton.

**In return, the Tony-, Grammy- and Pulitzer Prize-winning show** raised the curtain more than 1,000 times and had an estimated \$1 billion economic impact on the city. That's quite a drop into the collective treasury from a single creative work.

Now we know that the Chicago production of “Hamilton” will close Jan. 5, 2020, after a run of three years and three months. Luckily, the show always goes on in Chicago, where the arts fuel after-hours activity in the Loop, light up storefront theaters in neighborhoods and draw millions of tourists each year.

More than half of the aggregate “Hamilton” audience comes from more than 100 miles away, says Broadway in Chicago President Lou Raizin. Anticipation of see-

ing blockbusters gives visitors a sense of excitement and propels them to put firm

travel dates on the calendar. Once here, travelers spend money on cabs, restaurants,

hotels and other attractions, paying taxes on all of it. Chicago tourism leapt to nearly 58 million visitors in 2018, and finding ways to keep that number high should be a priority for Mayor Lori Lightfoot, as it has been for her predecessor.

Tribune chief theater critic Chris Jones places the show's eventual gross ticket sales at close to \$350 million, which would be a record tally for a Chicago run. “Wicked” stayed longer, but tickets sold at lower prices.

**Chicago and “Hamilton” have been through a lot together.** The other name on the marquee — PrivateBank Theatre, as it was called on opening night — became CIBC Theatre after the bank was acquired. The cast belted out “Go Cubs Go” during a curtain call to celebrate the World Series win in 2016. To date, more people have seen “Hamilton,” a Broadway show by a native New Yorker, in Chicago than in any other city.

Now the producers of “Hamilton” want to end on a high note. Tickets to the show are no longer as hard to come by as they were a few years ago. Productions have opened in other cities. It's as yet unclear how “Hamilton: The Exhibition,” a museum-style temporary attraction at Northerly Island, will fare.

For procrastinators who have “Hamilton” on their to-do list but haven't gotten around to seeing it, now you have a deadline to catch this Chicago run. Don't throw away your — well, you know.

### WHAT OTHERS ARE SAYING

Like health care for all, affordable higher education, and high-speed rail, dense urban and suburban neighborhoods are the norm in virtually every wealthy country — except the U.S. Yet somehow, those who advocate for the preservation of the status quo of America's disastrous housing and land-use policy remain welcome in the progressive coalition, and in many places are actually seen as the most progressive voices.

It's absurd that the wealthiest and most liberal areas — the Marin and Westchester and Montgomery counties, the west sides of San Francisco and Los Angeles and Washington, D.C. — are among those that have fought hardest against density. Despite their tolerant cultures and compassionate politics, from the outside they look a lot more like gated communities with million-dollar entry fees.

A more equitable, sustainable society cannot be grafted onto a segregated, carbon-intensive landscape. The landscape itself will need to undergo a redistributive, greening process: Poor people will need to move into rich neighborhoods, residents of depressed small towns will need to move to major cities, and McMansions and SUVs will have to be traded for apartments and bus passes.

If the liberals who control the most dynamic cities and states really want to change the world for the better, they will have to accept living differently themselves.

## Illinois does not need to spend more than \$1B on school administration costs

Consider: \$544 per student. That's how much Illinois school districts spend on administrative costs every year. And that number keeps rising year after year. Not only does Illinois spend more than double the national average of \$266 per student, but Illinois spends more annually on administration costs than any other state.

According to research done by the Metropolitan Planning Council, New York (19.7 million people) spends \$349 per student, Texas (27.9 million people) spends \$129 per student, California (39.2 million people) spends \$95 per student and Florida (20.6 million people) spends \$78 per student.

If Illinois school districts could reduce their general administration spending to the national average, Illinois taxpayers would save about \$645 million per year. And since funding for education in Illinois is predominantly supported by local property taxes, those savings would likely mean smaller property tax bills for everyone. Or, that money could be spent to hire thousands of new teachers.

It's no secret that some Illinois school districts are incredibly top-heavy with administrators drawing big salaries. In fact, according to data from the Illinois State Board of Education, salary and benefits for Illinois school administrators in many cases exceeds \$200,000 per year.

Due to the way some Illinois school districts are structured, where separate elementary districts and a high school district all serve the same region, taxpayers in some areas of the state are actually funding the salaries of several sets of school administrators, instead of just one. This is commonly known as a dual district system,

and for taxpayers it is expensive.

In dual districts, the feeder elementary districts each have a superintendent and a set of school administrators while the corresponding high school district has its own superintendent and another set of administrators. Fifty-five percent of school districts in Illinois are considered dual districts, which is just one reason our state's property tax rates are so high.

And despite the new school funding formula putting record funding into our children's schools, property owners are still not receiving any sort of relief.

Research into what other states are doing to reduce costs shows that sharing services is a good way to save.

New York, which spends nearly \$200 per student less than Illinois does, utilizes administrative service sharing and encour-

ages school districts to share services through differential state aid.

And in Ohio, school districts have reported between \$45,000 and \$66,000 in annual savings just by sharing a treasurer.

Unfortunately, this issue is not only about saving taxpayers money; there are other arguably more important things at stake, too, such as improving student outcomes. Statistics show that students have better academic outcomes when there is a continuum of curriculum from kindergarten to 12th grade. That's because the same administration can plan the curriculum throughout the students' entire educational career.

For dual districts, issues may arise regarding coordination of curriculum and learning across separate districts with different governing bodies and adminis-

trative staff. In fact, through no fault of the student, there may actually be gaps in learning when a student moves from the feeder elementary district to the designated high school district within the same region.

That's why I have sponsored legislation that would give Illinois voters the opportunity to decide whether their school district should share its superintendent or other administrators with another school district.

Senate Bill 1287, which has passed the Senate but is stalled in the House Rules Committee and unlikely to move, would give residents in each school district the ability to pass a petition allowing for a referendum to go before voters asking if their school district should share administrative services with another school district. If voters in both school districts vote in favor, the two school districts would then share services. Currently, this option is only available by school board resolution.

In addition, 50% of the money saved would be required to go directly into the classroom and the other 50% would go back to the property taxpayers.

To be clear, this isn't a school consolidation bill. It simply gives taxpayers the option to share school administrators if they feel it fits the needs of their school district. Ultimately, school districts should answer to the taxpayers who fund them.

Sharing administrative services is proven to lessen expenses and provide better outcomes for students. So if legislators are serious about making our children a priority and reducing the property tax burden on homeowners, the House of Representatives should consider this legislation.

Few cities in the world are as synonymous with building and architecture as Chicago. We invented the skyscraper, built some of the world's largest buildings, reversed the flow of the Chicago River to protect our drinking water supply, and more, leaving generations to marvel at the city's drive to push the limits of design and engineering. Much has been made of Chicago's dire pension debt, population drain and concerning economic outlook, and real estate investors are right to be cautious. One recent industry survey of real estate investors ranked Chicago near the top of a global list of cities where investors planned to scale back their funding exposure in 2020.

Despite Chicago's well-documented challenges, the city's commercial development market is robust and thriving thanks to advantages other large cities lack.

Anyone who has worked as a builder in large cities outside of Chicago, as I have, understands the limits of the dollar. Congestion in and around major cities on the East Coast and the political and planning roadblocks that come with it are barriers to smart, efficient building and test a developer's patience at every turn. The same can be said for large and densely populated cities on the West Coast.

For experienced builders, Chicago surpasses more affordable cities such as Denver and Austin, Texas, where recent tremendous growth has outpaced not only the cities' physical infrastructure but also their ability to issue permits, process inspections and move projects forward on time. Access to skilled labor is a major problem, as are the subsequent construction defects, delays and legal disputes.

Chicago's attributes are readily apparent, and have helped fuel a decade-long downtown development boom that is the envy of most cities.

This sustained growth is made pos-

sible because the cost to live, build and work in Chicago is still affordable compared with the costs in other cities. The costs of living in the San Francisco Bay Area are 50% to 60% higher than in Chicago, and New York's are twice as high, according to the Council for Community and Economic Research's Cost of Living Index.

For builders, out-of-pocket construction costs are 18% less here than in New York and almost one-quarter lower than in San Francisco. Rent savings are also substantial, leading tech giants like Google, Facebook, Salesforce and Uber to announce plans for large-scale real estate build-outs in Chicago.

Chicago has far more available land to build on compared with other cities — consider the large-scale commercial projects in the South Loop, River North and Lincoln Park communities. We have enviable public transportation that can get commuters from the far suburbs to Union Station relatively quickly.

More than that, Chicago's engineering legacy is built on a classic Midwestern work ethic and top-notch Big Ten engineering programs that contractors

and engineers appreciate. There's a general feeling that hard work and perseverance pay off, and that has been the catalyst for some of our city's most ambitious projects.

Chicago's pension crisis and economic woes are complex. There are no quick or easy fixes. But instead of focusing on the negatives of Chicago's economic climate, and fueling anxiety over long-term fiscal health, it is better to work collaboratively to build the political will necessary to devise sensible and lasting solutions that will be the linchpin for further growth and development.

As Chicagoans, it's easy to take for granted the natural and man-made features that have made this city a global destination for engineers, architects and builders across generations. It's these rare resources — and our will to fix our most pressing economic challenges — that will define our future and continue a building resurgence that is worthy of our storied history.

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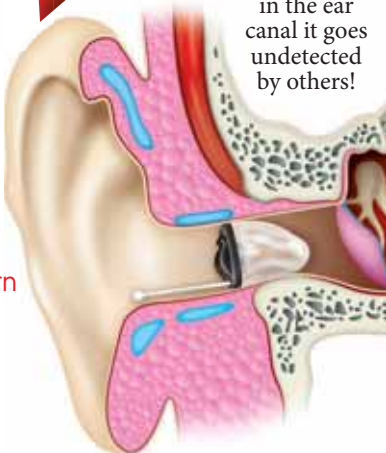
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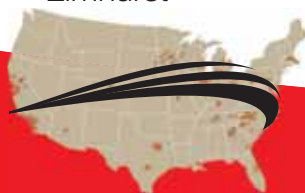

## Many workers feeling confident about retirement

The continued progress in the economy has made Americans more confident about retirement. Recent upbeat data from the government may explain why the good mood prevails.

April marked the 103rd straight month of job growth; wages are rising faster than the inflation rate, which should help people not only meet their monthly needs, but also to save more for the future. For investors, the first four months of the year were the best for the S&P 500 stock index since 1987.

All of those factors provided a positive backdrop to the Employee Benefit Research Institute 2019 Retirement Confidence Survey, which found about two-thirds of workers (67%) feel confident in their ability to live comfortably in retirement and more than 8 in 10 retirees (82%) are confident they will have enough money to live comfortably throughout retirement.

That's the good news.

However, like last year's results, we may feel good, but we have not gone the extra step to determine whether or not that feeling is grounded in reality. Only 42% of workers have tried to calculate how much money they will need to retire comfortably and just 29% have tried to calculate how much they will need to cover medical expenses.

Instead of planning and saving for retirement, the majority of respondents (80%) are planning to work after they officially retire. In fact, last year, 6.2% of those over age 65 were still in the workforce, more than double 1980, according to the non-profit USA Facts. But that's still a pretty small number.

And then there's the problem of competing attention for retirement savings. More than half of workers feel they are unable to save for retirement and for other financial goals at the same time, or that there are other financial goals more important than saving for retirement.

Seventy percent say their non-mortgage outstanding debt is the big problem, but a separate report from Bankrate.com points to another potential culprit: Parents may not be able to save more for retirement because they are busy helping out their Millennial and Gen Z kids.

In a survey of more than 2,500 adults, Bankrate found 50% of Americans say they have sacrificed or are sacrificing their own retirement savings in order to help their adult children financially.

Before you weigh in with judgment, Mark Hamrick, Bankrate's senior economic analyst, says the trend may not have to do with enabling the next generation, rather "it's a result of some of the ongoing financial challenges that many families face, some of which were caused by the financial crisis and the Great Recession."

Although wage gains have improved over the past year, there is evidence that adults who graduate amid a recession see lower earnings, a condition which can last for about a decade after graduation. Pile on top of that issue the fact that many of these adults are carrying the weight of student loans and you can understand why many parents want to help.

While some parents can afford shelling out money to their kids, others may be putting their own retirement security at risk by doing so.

It may be difficult to explain to your kids that mom and dad are unable to pitch in, but it could be easier if you say something like this: "Honey, I know this is hard, but I'm worried that if we don't do a good job saving and investing for our own retirement needs, you will be stuck taking care of us financially one day."

# SIGNS YOU'RE SMART

## One of them is thinking you're not always right

**A**mazon CEO Jeff Bezos says he thinks the number one sign of high intelligence is a willingness to change one's mind — a lot. He looks for people who can admit they are wrong and readily change their opinions.

Here are a few other signs that you may be smarter than you think you are:

### 1. You like to spend time alone

While people who socialize more tend to be happier, that's not true if you're highly intelligent. In that case, socializing with friends is not likely to increase your level of satisfaction with your life.

Researchers followed people between 18 and 28 years old and found the more frequently the average person socialized, the happier they were, but not the subset of people studied who were highly intelligent, according to the British Journal of Psychology.

The more they socialized, the less happy they were.

One theory is aspirational: The smarter you are, the more focused you will be on longer-term goals, and spending time with friends is distracting rather than helpful.

So if you like to spend time alone to work on a project, to learn something new, to write that business plan or to grind away at all the steps you need to take to reach your goals, don't assume you're a pathetic loner.

You may simply be smarter than the rest of us.

### 2. You don't think you have all the answers

We all know people who take a position, and then proclaim and bluster and pontificate while totally disregarding differing opinions or points of view. They know they're right, and they want you to know they're right.

Their behavior likely isn't an indication of intelligence, though. It's the classic sign of the Dunning-Kruger effect, a type of cognitive bias described by social psychologists David Dunning and Justin Kruger in which people believe they're smarter and more skilled than they actually are.

Combine a lack of self-awareness

with low cognitive ability and you overestimate your own intelligence and competence.

Wisdom is knowing that while you might know a lot, there's also a lot you don't know. Wisdom is trying to find out what is right rather than trying to be right. Wisdom is realizing when you're wrong and backing down graciously.

If you aren't afraid to be wrong, if you aren't afraid to admit you don't have all the answers, if you aren't afraid to say "I think" instead of "I know," then you're likely smarter than you think.

### 3. You like to curse

Conventional wisdom says people who swear tend to have limited vocabularies; the F-word is your favorite adjective because you don't have better modifiers at your disposal.

But, according to research from Marist College and the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts, "The ability to generate taboo language is not an index of overall language poverty."

Swearing appears to be a feature of language that an articulate speaker can use in order to communicate with maximum effectiveness. And actually, some uses of swearing go beyond simple communication.

So don't assume you're a vulgar nitwit because you like to use a few cuss words as adjectives and nouns and verbs, sometimes all in the same sentence.

### 4. You don't get up early

If you like to get up early, you're in good company: The Wall Street Journal says that 4 a.m. may be the most productive time of the day.

Yet research from the University of Sydney shows that night owls are more likely to have higher intelligence, better jobs and larger incomes than early risers. But that doesn't mean you have to wake up late to be successful. Or wake

up early.

Waking up at an arbitrary time won't help you succeed. Making a thoughtful decision to wake up at the time that's most productive for you is what matters.

### 5. You can delay gratification

Research shows a definite link between intelligence and self-control. In a study detailed in the Association for Psychological Science, participants chose between two rewards: receiving a smaller, immediate financial reward or receiving a larger financial reward at a later date.

People who chose to wait for the larger reward tended to score higher on intelligence tests.

Having the ability to objectively weigh two outcomes and choose the better option is an obvious sign of intelligence.

So if you're willing to exercise a little self-control in order to maximize the fruits of your effort, labor, investments, etc., you may be smarter than you think. And likelier to be successful.

### 6. You put things off

We all procrastinate at times. But few people would assume that putting off something important is a sign of intelligence.

But Adam Grant, a professor of management at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania and author of "Originals," sees procrastination as a key to innovation.

As Grant says, "The time Steve Jobs was putting things off and noodling on possibilities was time well spent in letting more divergent ideas come to the table, as opposed to diving right in with the most conventional, the most obvious, the most familiar."

So if you're putting something off just because you don't feel like working on it, that's one thing. But if you're putting something off because you don't feel you've found the best solution or the best path, that might be the smartest approach to take.

## Don't get hooked by phishing scams

Phishing schemes can come in the form of emails, texts, social media messages or phone calls that try to extract personal information from you or infect your device with malware.

These devious messages may address you by name, appear to come from a person or company you recognize and mimic the look and tone of communications from your bank, social media accounts or employer.

If you fall for a phisher's message and

click on its link or open its attachment, "your computer or phone gets owned by the bad guys," says Stu Sjouwerman, chief executive officer of KnowBe4, which provides security-awareness training. Criminals can monitor your activity, steal your log-in credentials, spy on you by turning on your camera or microphone remotely, hold your data for ransom and more.

To protect yourself, scan emails for visual cues that something is off, such as

grammatical errors, misspelled words or distorted company logos, says Brian Lapidus, of the security firm Kroll.

Examine the from email address to see if the user name and domain are recognizable, or if they contain typos, such as "@amazom.com." Hover over hyperlinks with your cursor to see if the link that pops up matches the web address in the message. Instead of clicking on links from emails sent by, say, your bank or brokerage, type the web address into a separate tab.

A fishy link may lead to a realistic mockup of the institution's website, complete with the padlock symbol and https — widely seen as signs of authenticity — in the URL, says Stacy Shelley, of PhishLabs, a cybersecurity firm.

Instead of opening attachments you don't recognize, use the "preview" function if your email has one to view them safely. Be extra careful when viewing email on a mobile device, where you can't hover over

a link or easily see a full URL after clicking on a link.

Equip your devices with anti-malware software and regularly install security patches and updates. Set up two-factor authentication where possible, and back up files once a month to the cloud, an external hard drive or memory stick in case your device needs to be wiped clean or a criminal holds your data for ransom.

If you become a victim, change the passwords to your financial accounts and other important websites immediately, preferably from another computer in case a keylogger is recording these new passwords on your compromised device. Run a malware detection tool, such as Malwarebytes, to see if your computer was infected.

Alarming studies have shown that a huge percentage of Americans are not planning for retirement and will not have sufficient income to maintain a decent standard of living as they grow old.

A Fidelity study found that 82% of Americans don't have a retirement plan, and almost half of older Americans have no money saved in retirement accounts, according to the U.S. Government Accountability Office.

A 2018 retirement savings survey from GOBankingRates found that 42% of Americans have less than \$10,000 saved. On average, adults 65 and older spend almost \$46,000 a year, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, so many future retirees will come up short.

The majority of workers in corporate America no longer have a defined-benefit pension plan. Employers for years have been phasing out these pensions in favor of 401(k) plans, which put the burden primarily on employees to contribute to these plans.

Unfortunately, many employees either choose not to contribute to a 401(k) or they contribute too little in order to receive the maximum corporate match.

There are other reasons why future

retirees will find it difficult to maintain their standard of living in retirement. The Social Security trust fund will face shortfalls by 2035, according to current government estimates. There will be fewer workers paying into Social Security and more people retiring and claiming benefits.

Congress will be forced either to reduce benefits or to raise taxes; either alternative will make it difficult for future retirees.

Although the unemployment rate is low, many are working part time and accordingly are not earning maximum credits for retirement. In addition, wages for many workers have not kept pace with inflation, making it difficult to contribute toward their retirement.

A common mistake among those who are contributing to their retirement plans is that they are being too conservative in their selection of investment alternatives. Because the stock market has been volatile recently, many retirement savers have reduced their allocation of common stock investments.

From a long-term perspective, this is a mistake. The average annual stock market return over the long term has been 10%, 7% after adjusting for inflation. Returns for other forms of investment have been much lower.

Accordingly, those who are concerned about growth in their portfolios, especially those who are 10 years or more away from retirement, should have a significant portion of their assets invested in common stocks.

I believe most investors should be using diversified index funds with low annual fees.

Another mistake is not making regular contributions to retirement accounts. Investors with IRAs, 401(k)s and other retirement accounts have the benefit of tax-deferred growth. From a long-term perspective, regular investment in retirement accounts is more

beneficial than nonrecurring investments in non-retirement accounts.

Too many people also fail to take advantage of health savings accounts. To be eligible for an HSA, you must be covered by high-deductible health insurance, and many Americans are.

HSAs have many tax advantages. Contributions are tax-deductible, and earnings are tax-deferred. In addition, you are not required to withdraw funds in your HSA each year. You can roll the funds over from year to year, continuing your tax deferral. Even in retirement, you can maintain your tax deferral without penalty as long as you use the funds for medical expenses.

There are other opportunities to retirement savers that are not used enough, including contributions to retirement accounts for non-working spouses. Employees over 50 also can make extra contributions to their IRAs, 401(k)s and other retirement accounts.

Most people who wait until their 50s or later to establish a retirement plan will find that they don't have sufficient time to save enough to ensure a comfortable retirement.

Many employers don't want to retain their employees until age 65, even if the employees wish to continue working until retirement. Employees should recognize that they may be forced to take early retirement.

Employees who are forced to take early retirement and want to continue to work may find that the employment opportunities are not appealing and require salary reductions and unimpressive benefits.

Establish a retirement plan now, look for ways to reduce your spending and make regular contributions to your retirement accounts.

Before you borrow for college, consider this

There's a bit of good news for those taking out student loans for the 2019-2020 school year. Rates on new student loans will fall about a half of one percent to 4.53% on the most popular Stafford undergrad loans.

The rates are set each spring, based on the 10-year Treasury note auction held in May. The new rate set each year continues for the life of the loan.

The rates on older loans remain unchanged over the life of those loans. That means those who borrowed last year will continue to pay slightly above 5% interest.

The recent overall dip in interest rates can be credited for this half-point decline on new loans that will soon be distributed. But think again if you believe that's a great deal.

Consider this: The U.S. Treasury department borrows to finance our government's deficit spending. They regularly sell 10-year Treasury notes (which you can purchase through TreasuryDirect.gov) with rates set in a public auction that is dominated by big institutional buyers. The current 10-year Treasury note auction allowed the government to borrow at a rate of 2.47%.

Read that line again: The U.S. government borrows at a rate of 2.47% — and then turns around and lends money to students at a rate of 4.53%.

Perhaps the government should just stop trying to make a profit on the student loans it guarantees.

The bankers who read this column will quickly point out the risk in making loans to students. But what's the real risk? Those federal student loans can't be erased through bankruptcy, and the government will eventually collect repayments, even if it must resort to taking the money out of your Social Security check.

Parents who borrow to put their children through college are socked with even higher rates, as are graduate students, including our next generation of physicians.

Here are the federal student loan rates for 2019-2020:

- Federal Stafford Loans for undergraduates: 4.53%. (Subsidized Stafford loans don't accrue interest while the student is in school at least half time. Unsubsidized Stafford loans accrue interest from the day the loan is disbursed.)
- Federal Stafford Loans for graduate students: 6.08%
- Federal Parent PLUS Loans: 7.08% (plus an additional fee of 4.24%)
- Federal Grad PLUS Loans: 7.08% (plus an additional loan fee of 4.24%)

That's right. Parents who go into debt on these loans to help their children pay for college will pay an astounding 7.08% interest to the federal government. Private loans may carry even higher rates. And both require good credit to qualify.

Parents who once relied on home equity loans can no longer deduct the interest on those loans if the money is used to pay for college. The latest tax reform closed the door on that helpful practice. So the full cost of college truly adds up for both students and parents.

Before you borrow, use the student loan repayment calculators at [www.Finaid.org](http://www.Finaid.org) or [www.SavingforCollege.com](http://www.SavingforCollege.com) to understand the true dimensions of the burden you are taking on. The calculator will estimate of the size of your monthly loan payments and the annual salary required to manage them without too much financial difficulty.

Alternatives may include attending a less expensive local community college and living at home for two years — saving a lot of money now and in repayment. It's not so much the current cost but the long-term burden of repayment that matters most. And that's the Savage Truth.

Passing on annuity to beneficiaries

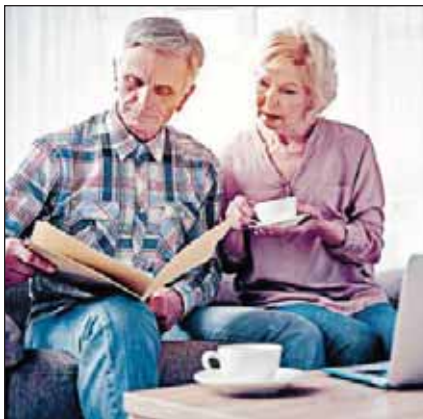

**Q: If we buy an immediate annuity, can we pass it on to beneficiaries indefinitely? We're looking to be able to pass along money to children and grandchildren and so on, but we're concerned about what happens to the account at the death of the owner.**

A: An immediate annuity can be held jointly by two people, and you can have payouts continue for as long as either person lives.

A couple can be joint owners, for example, or the annuity can be held jointly by a parent and a grandchild with payouts continuing for either person's lifetime. The younger the person included on a life annuity, the smaller the annual payouts will be.

Alternatively, you could add "period

certain" payouts to a life annuity. The annuity would pay out for as long as either joint annuitant lives or continue payouts to a beneficiary for a certain number of years, if both annuitants die within that period.

"Some insurers will write up to 30- to 50-year period certain annuities," says Hersh Stern, founder of ImmediateAnnuities.com. Ask your insurer about your options and how they affect the payout amount.

It's also a good idea to contact an estate-planning lawyer to find out if

there are other ways to accomplish your goal, such as by setting up a trust that could remain invested, pay out for even longer and give you more control over the terms.

**Q: I am retired, but my husband still works part-time. We see information about setting up a spousal IRA. Can my spouse contribute to my existing Roth IRA that I established when I worked?**

A: Yes. You generally need earned income from a job to contribute to an IRA for the year, but if your spouse works and you don't, he or she can contribute to an IRA on your behalf. The maximum contribution for each spouse is \$6,000 for 2019 (or \$7,000 if you're 50 or older), but the total contributions can't be more than your joint income from working for the year.

You don't need to open a new spousal IRA. If you already have the kind of IRA you want to contribute to (traditional or Roth), your spouse can add the money to your existing account.

Asking questions in a job interview is a smart move. It shows you're engaged and curious about the job and the office culture. But there is one question you should never ask.

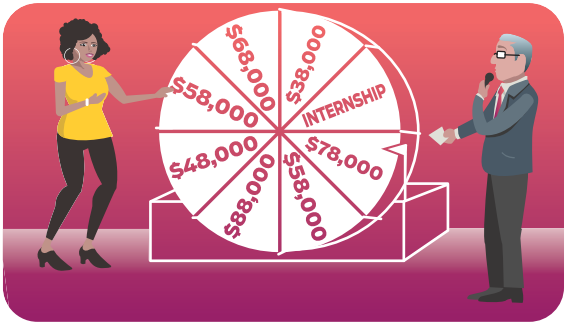


**What does the job pay?**

Hopefully, this will steer the conversation toward pay and benefits. But if it doesn't, you need to bite your tongue and avoid the urge to ask. If a salary range wasn't listed with the job posting, you will find out fairly early in the process what the job pays. The hiring manager likely will ask your salary requirements and he or she probably already has an idea of what you



are making based on your experience and the job you hold now. So be patient.

# How one company made 4-day workweek work

At one company in New Zealand, some employees no longer work on Fridays. Others don't work Wednesdays. But everyone is paid a full-time salary.

Perpetual Guardian, a statutory trust company with 240 employees, first tested a four-day workweek in early 2018, collaborating with academic researchers from two Auckland universities to study the impact on its business.

After the eight-week-long trial, employees reported lower levels of stress, higher levels of job satisfaction and a much greater sense of work-life balance. Just as significantly, despite the reduced hours, productivity didn't decline.

In November, the company decided to make the changes permanent. Andrew Barnes, the company's founder, has thus far seen no downside. "In fact, the company is performing better than it did last year."

Barnes had noticed employees struggling to maintain work-life balance when he happened upon research about average levels of productivity. One U.K. survey suggests that British workers are productive for only two hours and 53 minutes each day.

By giving people an extra day off, he theorized, they might be better able to manage the other demands in their lives, which could be distracting them in the office.

He tasked employees with creating their own plans to maintain and measure productivity.

"The teams themselves sat down and said, 'How do we make lots of little

changes that will enable us to deliver the outcome?" Barnes says.

Meetings were shortened or cut. People spent less time browsing the internet. Employees experimented with small flags on their desks to signal to co-workers that they were busy and shouldn't be disturbed.

"At the end of the trial, most people said they were better able to deliver their workload over four days than the five," he says.

Employees also reported feeling significantly more empowered than they had before the trial, more stimulated and satisfied by

their jobs, more confident in the company leadership and more committed.

Work-life balance scores increased from 54% to 78%. Job stress dropped 7 percentage points.

Employees began gradually making the transition in November, and by early this year, roughly half of the staff had opted in. The company ultimately expects three-quarters of employees to make the change.

"It's real flexibility, not buzzword flexibility," says Emily Svadlenak, who works as the company's one-person marketing department.

She now takes Fridays off, and she says that having more breathing space on the weekend makes the rest of the week easier.

Like other employees, she will have to meet certain performance standards to be able to opt into the program again at the end of the year.

Other companies, including multinational corporations, have approached Perpetual Guardian to learn more about the transition as they consider making similar changes. One is Wellcome Trust, a U.K. firm that is considering a four-day workweek trial with the

800 employees in its main office. Barnes is confident a larger-scale experiment will prove out the concept.

"If we were to have a country bold enough to really give this a go," he says, "I think we would find that actually there is not an adverse impact on the economy."

The idea is not new. In 1930, during the Great Depression, economist John Maynard Keynes predicted that we'd all have a 15-hour workweek "within 100 years."

In his own time, Keynes saw the rise of industrialization and assumed the trend toward more efficient

work methods would continue. Once a worker earned enough to pay for necessities, he suggested, he or she would opt to spend more time at home or in leisure, reducing the workweek to only two or three days.

As an attractive fantasy to beleaguered workers throughout the century, the idea never quite left the public consciousness. Even Richard Nixon, during his vice presidency in 1956, predicted that the four-day workweek was coming "in the not too distant future."

The idea remained just an idea for close to a century, until 1998, when France enacted the first of its two "Aubry" laws that reduced the national workweek to 35 hours instead of 39, with excess hours counting as overtime. (In subsequent years, revisions have eroded much of the original laws.)

Their aim was to reduce their 12% unemployment rate (at the time) through work sharing, but the success of the legislation got other countries revisiting their standard work schedules.

With the tech disruption evident in the 21st century — similar to the "conveyor belt" tech disruption of the 1920s that ushered in the five-day workweek — the idea continues to snowball.

Even business mogul Richard Branson supports the shift to a shorter workweek, stating in a blog post: By working more efficiently, there is no reason why people can't work less hours and be equally — if not more — effective. People will need to be paid more for working less time, so they can afford more leisure time. That's going to be a difficult balancing act to get right, but it can be done.

RUTH TENINGA ANDERSON | 1918-2019

Former head of CSO Women’s Association

Ruth Teninga Anderson, who was active in a number of nonprofit groups, headed the Chicago Symphony Orchestra’s Women’s Association for three years in the 1980s and earlier managed the resale shop at the Bethlehem Community Center Settlement House in Chicago.

“She was very devoted to the symphony and to music in general,” said Nancy Woulfe, a longtime friend and colleague from the symphony. “And she was a very hard worker. She never gave up on anything.”

Anderson, 100, died of natural causes on April 20 at the King Bruwaert House assisted living community in Burr Ridge, said her daughter, Leigh Anderson Rappole. She had resided in Hinsdale from 1954 until 2016.

Born Ruth Teninga in the South Side’s Roseland neighborhood, Anderson was the daughter of Cornelius Teninga, a longtime real estate professional who had headed his own firm, Teninga & Co., and who had been the president of the Chicago Real Estate Board.

Anderson attended the University of Chicago Laboratory School and then graduated from Fenger High School.

Anderson attended Wells College in central New York for three years before returning to the Chicago area and spending two years at

Northwestern University, where she earned a bachelor of science degree in 1940.

Right after college, Anderson worked at Montgomery Ward Inc. for about a year as a copywriter for the company’s mail-order catalog. She married Roger Anderson in 1941 and they lived in Massachusetts and Colorado while he was in the Navy during World War II.

Her husband was a homebuilder, and after the war she worked with him for four or five years as the interior designer for the model homes he built.

Anderson and her husband were active with Bethlehem Community Center, a settlement house that was located in an old church at 1853 S. Loomis St. in the Southwest Side’s Pilsen neighborhood.

“They’d go over there on a regular basis and get to know the people there and

have dinners,” her daughter said.

Anderson’s involvement at Bethlehem Community Center spanned eight years in the 1950s and 1960s. During her time there, she was in charge of the center’s resale shop, while her husband was president of the center’s board.

Anderson also active with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra’s Women’s Association for many years, serving as president from 1983 until 1986.

Woulfe recalled working with Anderson on organizing the association’s archives, when Anderson was in her 80s.

“She was very generous with her time and her talents, as well as her means,” Woulfe said.

Anderson’s other interests included the University of Chicago’s Great Books program and the Hinsdale Historical Society. Anderson also was the two-time women’s champion at the Hinsdale Golf Club in Clarendon Hills.

Roger Anderson died in 2005. In addition to her daughter, Anderson is survived by two sons, Geoff and Ross; three grandchildren; six great-grandchildren; and a sister, Loraine Teninga Plasman.

A memorial service will take place at 11 a.m. on Saturday, June 29, at Union Church of Hinsdale, 137 S. Garfield St., Hinsdale.

In 1506 Christopher Columbus died at 54 in Valladolid, Spain.

ferred to as Hamburger Hill by the Americans, following one of the bloodiest battles of the Vietnam War.

In 1970 about 100,000 people demonstrated in New York’s Wall Street district in support of U.S. policy in Vietnam and Cambodia.

In 1971 the album “What’s Going On” by Marvin Gaye was released.

In 1988 30-year-old Laurie Dann walked into a Winnetka elementary school classroom, where she shot to death 8-year-old Nicholas Corwin and wounded several other children. (After wounding a young man at his home, Dann took her own life.)

In 1989 comedian Gilda Radner died at 42 in Los Angeles.

In 1991 lawmakers in the Soviet Union voted to liberalize foreign travel and emigration. Also in 1991 the American Red Cross announced measures aimed at screening blood more carefully for the virus that causes AIDS.

In 1993 an estimated 93 million people tuned in for the final first-run episode of the sitcom “Cheers” on NBC.

In 1995 President Bill Clinton announced that the two-block stretch of Pennsylvania Avenue outside the White House would be closed permanently to motor vehicles as a security measure.

In 1996 the Supreme Court struck down, 6-3, a Colorado measure banning

laws that protect homosexuals from discrimination. In another decision, the court curtailed, 5-4, huge jury awards aimed at punishing or deterring misconduct.

In 1997 the Senate approved legislation to ban certain late-term abortions, but fell three votes shy of the total needed to override President Bill Clinton’s threatened veto.

In 1998 the House voted overwhelmingly to block future satellite exports to China. Also in 1998 the government unveiled the design for the new \$20 bill, featuring a larger and slightly off-center portrait of Andrew Jackson.

In 2000 the five nuclear powers on the U.N. Security Council agreed to eventually eliminate their nuclear arsenals, as part of a new disarmament agenda approved by 187 countries. Also in 2000 Red Bull won the Preakness Stakes, outpacing Kentucky Derby winner Fusaichi Pegasus. Also in 2000 flutist Jean-Pierre Rampal died in Paris; he was 78.

In 2002 East Timor became an independent nation. Also in 2002 paleontologist and author Stephen Jay Gould died in New York; he was 60.

In 2003 the United States banned all beef imports from Canada after a lone case of mad cow disease was discovered in the heart of Canada’s cattle country.

In 2004 Iraqi police backed by U.S. soldiers raided the home and offices of Ahmad Chalabi, an Iraqi politician once groomed as a possible replacement for Saddam Hussein.

In 2005 the U.S. military condemned the publication of photographs showing an imprisoned Saddam Hussein naked except for his white underwear, and ordered an investigation of how the pictures were leaked to a British tabloid.

In 2006 Iraq’s new unity government took office, five months after elections. Also in 2006 New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin was re-elected.

# Darvish isn't downplaying the moment

Cubs starter has high hopes for much-anticipated game

WASHINGTON — Yu Darvish raised the stakes of Monday night's matchup with Chicago "legend" Jake Arrieta before Cubs manager Joe Maddon could downplay them.

Three days after describing Arrieta as a "legend in Chicago," Darvish lifted his own expectations two days before his highly anticipated faceoff with the Cubs' 2015 National League Cy Young Award winner.

"I need seven (shutout) innings at a home game," Darvish said Saturday night. "That's it."

That's asking a lot of Darvish, who hasn't pitched seven innings in any of his 17 starts as a Cub. The Cubs, who signed Darvish 16 months ago after failing to come close to re-signing Arrieta, would settle for a repeat of his performance Wednesday against the Reds. In that game, Darvish struck out 11, walked none and allowed two runs in 5⅓ innings.

Limiting a potent Phillies lineup would help validate the Cubs' decision to give

# Guerrero gets the best of Sox, Herrera

Rookie puts Blue Jays ahead in 8th despite reliever's efforts

White Sox catcher Welington Castillo thought reliever Kelvin Herrera made a good pitch.

Vladimir Guerrero Jr. just came away with the better result.

Baseball's top prospect hit a go-ahead two-run homer in the eighth, and the Blue Jays beat the Sox 5-2 Sunday in front of 18,605 fans at Guaranteed Rate Field.

Guerrero broke a 1-1 tie with the homer to left. It came on an 0-1 inside fastball.

"I'm OK when my guy makes the pitch and the hitter gets him," Castillo said.

It was the rookie's fourth homer of the season — all coming in the last week — and second in the series.

"I don't try to hit homers," Guerrero said through an interpreter. "I just try to put good contact on the ball, and we'll see what happens."

## Not quite a battle of titans

Six thoughts on this week in baseball:

### 1. Monday's Wrigley Field matchup between Yu Darvish and Jake Arrieta is juicy for one reason.

The Cubs let Arrieta leave as a free agent after 2017 and used the savings to sign Darvish to a six-year, \$126 million deal. Obviously the Darvish contract hasn't worked out so far. He was injured for most of 2018 and is 3-6 with a 5.05 ERA in 17 starts with an 0.2 WAR, ranking 154th among 161 starters with 80 or more innings since 2018. But Arrieta, who wound up with a three-year, \$75 million deal with the Phillies, hasn't lived up to his billing either. He's 78th on that list with a 2.3 WAR since '18, going 14-15 with a 3.98 ERA. It's way too soon to give up on Darvish, and we've seen before that Arrieta is capable of going on a prolonged hot streak. But it's arguable the Cubs should've given Mike Montgomery — who went 5-5 with a 3.69 ERA as a starter in 2018 — the rotation spot vacated by Arrieta and used the \$126 million elsewhere.

### 2. MLB's hypocrisy is showing in the Ian Kinsler incident.

White Sox shortstop Tim Anderson was fined and suspended one game by MLB last month for inappropriate "conduct," namely yelling the N-word at Royals pitcher Brad Keller during an on-field skirmish after Keller plunked Anderson. Kinsler, the Padres second baseman, received no suspension after flipping off fans and reportedly yelling "F you all" after hitting a home run Thursday at Petco Park. According to baseball writer Scott Miller, MLB fined Kinsler between \$7,500 and \$10,000. Kinsler was unapologetic and insisted he was yelling to his teammates to fire them up. Sure thing. Kinsler should get one game at least for inappropriate conduct, just like Anderson. MLB's hypocrisy in doling out punishment is glaring.

### 3. Bryce Harper has a little over 12½ years left in Philly.

Is the honeymoon over in Philadelphia for Harper? After signing a 13-year, \$330 million deal with the Phillies, Harper came into Sunday's game against the Rockies hitting .211 (12-for-57) in May with two home runs and eight RBIs, while striking out 23 times. Harper was tied with the

Royals' Jorge Soler for the major-league lead in strikeouts with 61 and was hitting only .196 (18-for-92) at Citizens Bank Park, where to no one's surprise he already has been booed. "Yeah, I'd do the same thing," Harper said after being booed at home on April 30. Harper ranked 28th in WAR on Sunday, which at least was higher than Manny Machado, who ranked 40th after signing a 10-year, \$330 million contract with the Padres.

### 4. Scratch Sean Doolittle off the Cubs' wish list?

Doolittle may be the most coveted closer on the market in July if the Nationals continue to flounder in the National League East. The Cubs definitely could use another late-inning reliever, but Doolittle may not mesh well with manager Joe Maddon. After Maddon protested Doolittle's toe-tap during the ninth inning of Saturday's game, Doolittle responded to MLB.com: "In that moment, he's not doing anything other than rattle me. It was kind of tired. Sometimes he has to remind people how smart he is." Should we count Doolittle out of the picture, or would the Cubs' front office welcome a little creative tension in the workplace?

### 5. Once should be enough for Bob Costas.

Costas of MLB Network is a Hall of Fame broadcaster and a good guy, but it's

strange the Cubs invited him to conduct the seventh-inning stretch again Monday night at Wrigley. Costas already did it April 24 in a game against the Dodgers. Twice within a month? Really? Are the Cubs that desperate for singers? Recall that legendary broadcaster Vin Scully performed it once in 1998, the first season after Harry Caray's death, but declined the honor afterward. When I asked him why, Scully explained: "I did it once for Harry. If I did it twice, it would be doing it for me, and that wouldn't be right." Maybe Phillies President Andy MacPhail is available?

### 6. "Game of Thrones," baseball-style.

The Phillies were in first place in early August last year but finished 15-30 down the stretch in an epic collapse under first-year manager Gabe Kapler. The offense, which finished last in the majors with a .234 average, was mostly to blame. They're once again in first place at the quarter pole in 2019, but ranked only 18th in hitting through Saturday despite the additions of Harper, Jean Segura, Andrew McCutchen and J.T. Realmuto. If the Phillies collapse again, you have to wonder if Kapler would be retained in 2020. There may even be a free-agent manager available from Hazleton, Pa., a two-hour drive from Philly. Something to watch.

vately owned, privately managed, privately gained sports teams. We do it by being good fans. There has been plenty of academic research on it. My job was to represent A) the taxpayers and B) the city. And I'm not going to take the taxpayer money as dumb money. The taxpayers aren't there for a season. Their money is going to be there for a long time.

### Were the Cubs ever close to going to Rosemont as speculated back in 2013?

No. That was all poker. And, the last time I checked, the valuation of the team has done pretty well. Now more jobs are created, there has been economic development and I welcomed and promoted that.

### Was there compromise on both sides?

There were things we did, yeah, like with the new scoreboard, to monetize. I've got no problem. The plaza, the hotel, night games ... no problem. But I'm not going to write you a check to do that. The truth is they've been able to prosper, the city's been able to gain and the taxpayers didn't underwrite it.

### How was Wintrust Arena different regarding public funds?

(Emanuel originally earmarked \$55 million in city Tax Increment Financing for the project but maintains the arena was financed through \$82.5 million levied by the Metropolitan Pier and Exposition Authority and \$82.5 million from DePaul University.)

In the arena and McCormick Place, DePaul wrote us a check and the visuals to McCormick created a campus, new hotels, 1,500 jobs and more. Big difference.

### Why did a feud escalate between you and Blackhawks Chairman Rocky Wirtz?

I don't know. It went off the rails. I think the real final straw, so to say, was (the 2018 budget) when the city amusement tax for sporting events moved up to 9 percent. For entertainment it was 5. At those venues of United Center, Wrigley Field and Soldier Field, I went to the sporting number, from 5 to 9 percent, and I eliminated all amusement taxes for any venue that was 1,500 and less. Rocky joked that, "Now, I know what it's like to get checked into the boards." But it was comity — c-o-m-i-t-y. You know, Chicago used to give companies tax breaks for the skyboxes and I eliminated that to save \$4 million. I didn't think we should be underwriting corporations for entertaining clients. All this was consistent with my philosophy. Then, Rocky supported (2019 mayoral candidate) Paul Vallas and wrote a memo I shouldn't be attacking (President Donald) Trump, and

I'm not going to take political advice from him.

### Do you have a relationship with Rocky now?

No. I mean, I'll see him at hockey games and he's nice to me. But I don't think I'll be going to those any time soon.

### Why is it important to bring the Fire back to Chicago?

(Emanuel wouldn't confirm an agreement has been officially reached for the Fire to play their games again at Soldier Field. But an administrative source involved with negotiations expected an announcement this month confirming the Fire's move from Bridgeview, held up last week by an insurance issue.)

You're a Chicago team that should be playing in Chicago and you should have a fan base that reflects the team. Look at cities half our size supporting pro soccer. The Fire know it's in their self-interest to get here. Look at Atlanta (the United averaged 53,002 fans per game last year). We can do that. Give me a break ... This will be great for the city sports-wise and culturally.

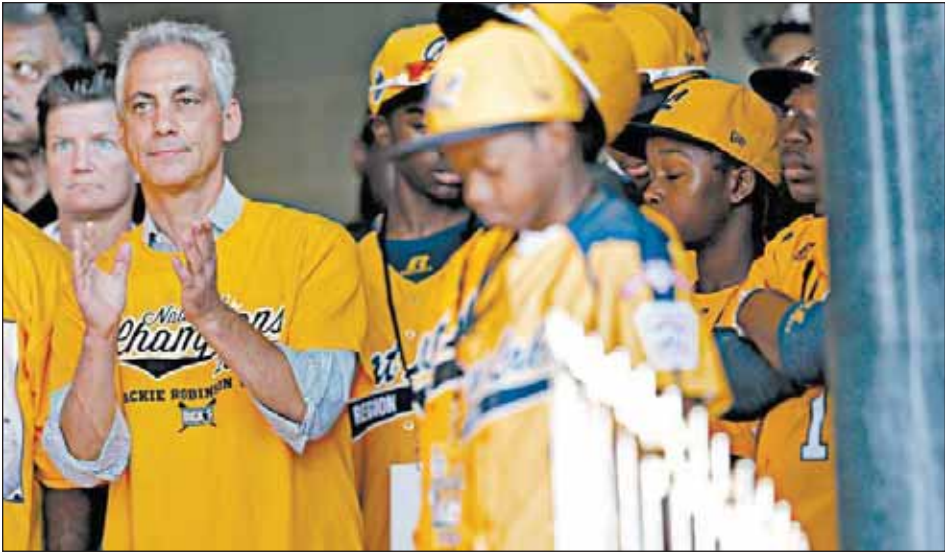
### What did you learn about the role of sports in Chicago during your tenure?

You know how people say politics are like sports in Chicago? Well, I'd like to have an offseason too. I don't. I need their same trainers too. ... But, seriously, when the Blackhawks won (in 2013 and 2015), when the Cubs won in 2016 and even some White Sox fans were rooting for them, and certainly seeing the way we embraced the Jackie Robinson Little League team (in 2014), I saw how sports can pull a city together in a way and transcend politics. That's powerful.

### How has Chicago Public Schools done in terms of providing ample athletic opportunities for kids who need sports as an escape from the violence of their neighborhoods and community?

Academically, we do that too with chess clubs and things like After School Matters, but in terms of sports, I believe we do because of coaches who are more than coaches. Look at Phillips Academy — the year they became the first CPS team to win state in football (in 2015) they had four homeless kids. At Solorio Academy, (which won the IHSA Class 2A boys soccer title in 2017), I think about 30 percent of those kids were Dreamers. Those are families, not just teams. Coaches are mentors, parents, aunts, uncles.

### Iowa became the 11th state to legalize sports gambling last week. Illinois is counting on legalization for Gov. J.B. Pritzker's first budget. What is your stance on legalizing sports gambling?

I have tough emotional pulls on that. I don't see the corrosive social downside on sports gambling that I do on casinos. I don't know a lot of people spending their Social Security checks on sports gaming the way I do in casinos. But I probably should shut my mouth because I don't know enough about it yet.

### But you do have thoughts on reforming big-time college sports?

Yes. I don't say I have this right yet, but it's something I've thought about: The NCAA should change so players can do something in their name philanthropically to remind them how fortunate they are and how their skill contributed to the community that supported them. Give money to something not necessarily for their personal wealth but their community. To me, that would be a win-win. Wherever you came from, these companies would give something to the community you came from to help other kids, a "Zion Williamson Basketball League." So, it's not personal wealth necessarily, but they'd get a reminder that they came from a community that supported them and this was their way of giving back to that community.

### Besides our own sports teams, Chicago became a bigger player at the league level during your tenure. For a guy not known for his sports fandom, you involved the city in a lot of major sports events. Why?

(Under Emanuel, Chicago played host to the NFL draft twice, the NHL draft, the NBA draft lottery, the Laver Cup, the MLS All-Star Game and struck a deal to stage NBA All-Star weekend next February.)

I didn't walk in and say, "What am I going to do about sports?" But, being the competitive punk that I am, I started realizing things like the NFL draft were appealing if other cities were involved. I said, "OK, I can't have the Super Bowl because the stadium is too small, fine." So, I started pushing (NFL Commissioner) Roger (Goodell).

### And Goodell was receptive?

(Grinning.) So, Roger was flying here to go to a game, and it was at the height of a controversy. He was unpopular everywhere he went. I called him while he was on the private plane landing at Midway and I said, "I'll meet you there and drive in with you so you can make the game on time. I'll walk in the stadium with you, drive you around in my car with me, whatever. I want everything to go right because I want the draft back here." He told me if I was willing to stand with him through that (mess) and prove everything I said I'd do, we can have the draft. (Bears board member) Andy McKenna called me the next day and said that was the best (damn) call you've ever made.

### Did getting the NBA draft lottery involve similar persuasion with Commissioner Adam Silver?

I told Adam. I'm a better brother than Ari (Emanuel, co-CEO of the William Morris Endeavor talent agency) so give me something, OK? We got the draft and All-Star Game. And I've got to be honest. I didn't always know all this stuff about sports, but I realized the value of sporting events like this, what they did for tourism, the feeling in the city and to bring national and international recognition. My only regret was not getting a Final Four because I go every year with my daughter. And I got the Big Ten basketball tournament back here. I love that. The Big Ten is big for this city.

### So you're saying you have interest in becoming the next Big Ten commissioner?

(Laughing) No, no, no. I'm saying if you're going to list things I helped bring here, make sure that's on it. Get it right.

A bit of a jam

Baez bruises heel but says he's OK after Cubs' victory

WASHINGTON — After losing shortstop Javier Baez to a bruised right heel Sunday night, the Cubs held on for a 6-5 victory over the Nationals.

Baez, who is batting .319 with 11 home runs and 31 RBIs, hurt his heel while charging a grounder and making an off-balance throw to retire Jeremy Hellickson in the third inning and left in the sixth.

Manager Joe Maddon and Baez, who has started all 44 of the Cubs' games at shortstop, said he could return as soon as Monday night's game against the Phillies at Wrigley Field.

"As of right now, I'd imagine that he can," Maddon said. "But I want to double check."

Said Baez: "I'm good." "It was right before I caught it," Baez said. "I didn't twist it. I just went too hard to the ground. My heel kind of got jammed a little bit. All good. It depends on how it goes (Sunday night), and I want to play (Monday). Joe is going to decide whether I play or give me a day. But I hope I don't need it. I'll be playing (Monday),

hopefully." Baez, who had played 395⅔ consecutive innings at shortstop to start the season, said the heel began to throb after he made a sweeping tag on Gerardo Parra at second base in the fifth.

Baez was pulled with the Cubs leading 6-1, and they needed 2⅓ scoreless innings from Steve Cishek to preserve the win.

It was Cishek's longest outing since joining the Cubs in 2018. Cishek threw a career-high three innings three times, most recently on May 4, 2012, for the Marlins.

"I started fading a little bit, so getting those ground balls (in the ninth) was huge," Cishek said.

Addison Russell, Baez's replacement, committed a throwing error on a weak grounder by Adam Eaton that set up a three-run homer by Anthony Rendon in the sixth.

It was the first appearance of the season at shortstop for Russell, the Cubs' starter at that position for the last 3⅓ years.

Cubs starting pitcher Kyle Hendricks retired the first 11 batters and didn't allow a hit for four innings. But he ran into trouble in the sixth and was pulled with runners at second and third with two outs. Reliever Brandon Kintzler induced Brian Dozier to hit a soft fly to left.

Hendricks entered the game with one earned run allowed in

his last 25 innings and had pitched at least eight innings in each of his three previous starts.

Howie Kendrick homered off Kintzler to start the seventh, cutting the Cubs' lead to one.

The Cubs drew three consecutive walks off Hellickson to start the game and took a 1-0 lead when Baez grounded into a fielder's choice. They added another run in the second on a single by Heyward, a double by Albert Almora Jr. and a sacrifice fly by Kyle Schwarber.

Rizzo led off the third with a home run, his 11th, that landed in the Cubs' bullpen.

Bryant was drilled in the left leg on a pitch from reliever Kyle McGowin in the fourth and fell to his knees before walking slowly to first. Bryant finished the game.

The victory allowed the Cubs to maintain a 1½-game lead over the Brewers in the National League Central. They return home to open a seven-game homestand Monday against Jake Arrieta and the Phillies.

■ The Cubs dropped their protest of Saturday night's 5-2 loss to the Nationals. Manager Joe Maddon said Sunday he wanted to make a point in protesting Nationals closer Sean Doolittle's toe-tap delivery. At the start of the season, Cubs reliever Carl Edwards Jr. was informed that a similar move was illegal.

Darvish a six-year, \$126 million contract one month before Arrieta signed a three-year, \$75 million contract with the Phillies.

"He wants to do well, and he wants to do well for us," Maddon said. "To be matched up (against) Arrieta, regardless of how much I try to downplay it, I know he's going to think about it. So just to go out there and pitch well at home will mean a lot to him.

"We're always here to support. From my perspective, it's just another game. But I can't discount whatever Yu might be feeling."

Kris Bryant said Darvish should feel comfortable around his teammates.

"We've all seen what Darvish means to us and what he's going to do the rest of the season," Bryant said. "We've seen highlights of that in his last start. He'll be fine."

His 11-strikeout performance against the Reds showed the skills that convinced the Cubs to pursue Darvish after the 2017 season. But Darvish's inconsistency (including 33 walks in 42 innings), combined with a right elbow injury that limited him to

eight starts in 2018, has given fuel to Cubs fans who yearned for Arrieta, who is 14-15 with a 3.98 ERA in 40 starts with the Phillies.

"Here's my take on it," Maddon said. "It doesn't matter. The result is going to happen. My best advice is for him to process it like he has been, because it's been good.

"We've just got to get him and the catcher (Victor Caratini) on the same page if they have a good game plan going. The result will be the result. If we can get just get him to process the day like he did the other day in Cincinnati, I'll take the result."

Darvish would like to pitch well at Wrigley, where he is 0-2 with a 6.38 ERA in four starts — including a six-walk outing in three innings against the Marlins on May 9.

But he'll have a hard time erasing memories of Arrieta's dominance at Wrigley, where he was 30-14 with a 2.31 ERA in 59 starts.

Arrieta's rise paralleled that of the Cubs — starting with his 2015 National League Cy Young Award, his two victories in the 2016 World Series, and his final start as a Cub in Game 4 of the 2017 National League Champi-

onship Series, when he pitched 6⅔ innings of three-hit ball to beat the Dodgers and briefly stave off elimination.

"I wish (Darvish) wouldn't pit it against Jake," Maddon said. "It's him against the Phillies. I want him to think that way."

Maddon said Darvish comparing himself to Arrieta is "a bad trap."

Darvish is 2-3 with a 5.14 ERA this season. Arrieta is 4-4 with a 4.09 ERA.

Darvish's pitch selection has been just as unpredictable as his results. Recently he has relied more on cut fastballs that have frozen hitters on both sides of the plate because of their sharp, late action to all quadrants of the strike zone.

"My best pitch was a slider before, but this year I feel more confident in the cutter," Darvish said. "The cutter is there all the time."

Maddon agreed. "It's almost like watching Kyle (Hendricks) when he throws that comebacker" to left-handed hitters, Maddon said of the movement. "It's kind of impressive."

Renteria wants to be sure with Jimenez

Eloy Jimenez is inching closer to returning to the White Sox.

The left fielder spent last week rehabbing at Triple-A Charlotte. He's recovering from a high right ankle sprain.

"He's been doing very well," Sox manager Rick Renteria said before Sunday's 5-2 loss to the Blue Jays. "He'll be here soon.

"We're just looking at making sure he's healthy. He's gotten his at-bats, he's working. Once everybody feels comfortable, I'm sure we'll see him here with us shortly."

The Sox optioned outfielder Nicky Delmonico to Charlotte after Sunday's game, possibly clearing a spot for Jimenez to return. They'll announce a corresponding roster move before Monday's game in Houston. Jimenez hit .318 with one double and one home run in five games with Charlotte. He had seven hits in 22 at-bats. He was not in Charlotte's lineup Sunday.

Jimenez suffered the injury April 26 against the Tigers.

In addition to playing left field, Renteria said the Sox could slot Jimenez in a time or two as the designated hitter.

Renteria indicated the Sox will ease Jimenez back into a full-time role because of how long he has been out.

"Even though he's gone down on the rehab assignment, it's not like playing every single day," Renteria said. "We want to make sure he's come through it well. ... But just throwing him out there every single day would be, probably, a little premature."

Delmonico batted .206 with one homer and six RBIs in 21 games after being recalled from Charlotte on April 22.

**Wait and see:** Renteria didn't have an answer when asked who Monday's starting pitcher will be.

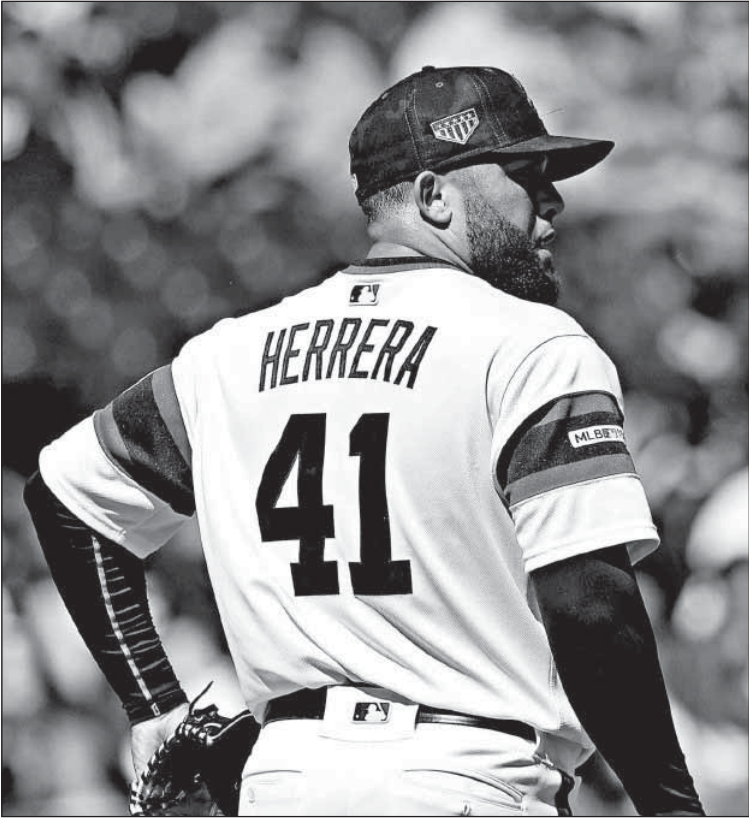
The Sox need to fill the spot after placing left-hander Manny Banuelos on the 10-day injured list with a strained left shoulder.

Renteria said the move was still "up in the air."

**Tough trip:** The Sox will play two first-place teams during the upcoming road trip.

They have four games at the AL West-leading Astros followed by three at the AL Central-leading Twins.

"We're going to play some of the best teams in the game of baseball," Renteria said. "When you look across the field and you see all the talent that they have, you're trying to measure up and see where you're at compared to those other clubs and the balance that they bring in different areas of their game."

the third.

"I didn't have my best command," Lopez said through an interpreter. "I fought through it. You recognize you don't have your best stuff, you just try to pitch through contact, just to try to get quick outs."

He faced McKinney again in the fourth in what became a turning point for his outing. The Jays loaded the bases with two outs. Lopez threw three consecutive balls to McKinney but battled back to end the threat with a strikeout.

Lopez took pride in pitching through that "difficult inning" and throwing two more scoreless innings before exiting.

"I could make adjustments and at least get through that inning and pitch six," Lopez said. "Even though I didn't have my best stuff, I was able to still get through six innings."

Sox manager Rick Renteria said Lopez showed his maturation while working out of trouble in the third and fourth.

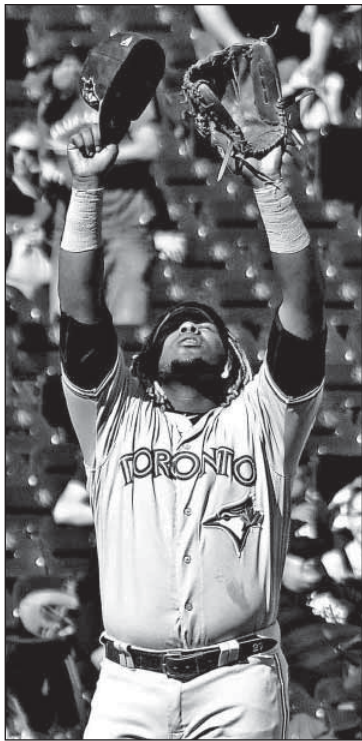
"He actually had back-to-back innings with significant traffic," Renteria said. "It's taxing, but he got through it. That is a huge sign when you don't have your best stuff or your best command and you're still able to navigate through that."

"Hopefully, as we saw in one of his better outings, he can get through it, execute and give you a really nice outing where he gets even further extended. It is a good sign."

In his previous start, in a win against the Indians, Lopez allowed one earned run on two hits in 7 2/3 innings Monday. He struck out six and walked two.

He wasn't as sharp Sunday but saw some positives.

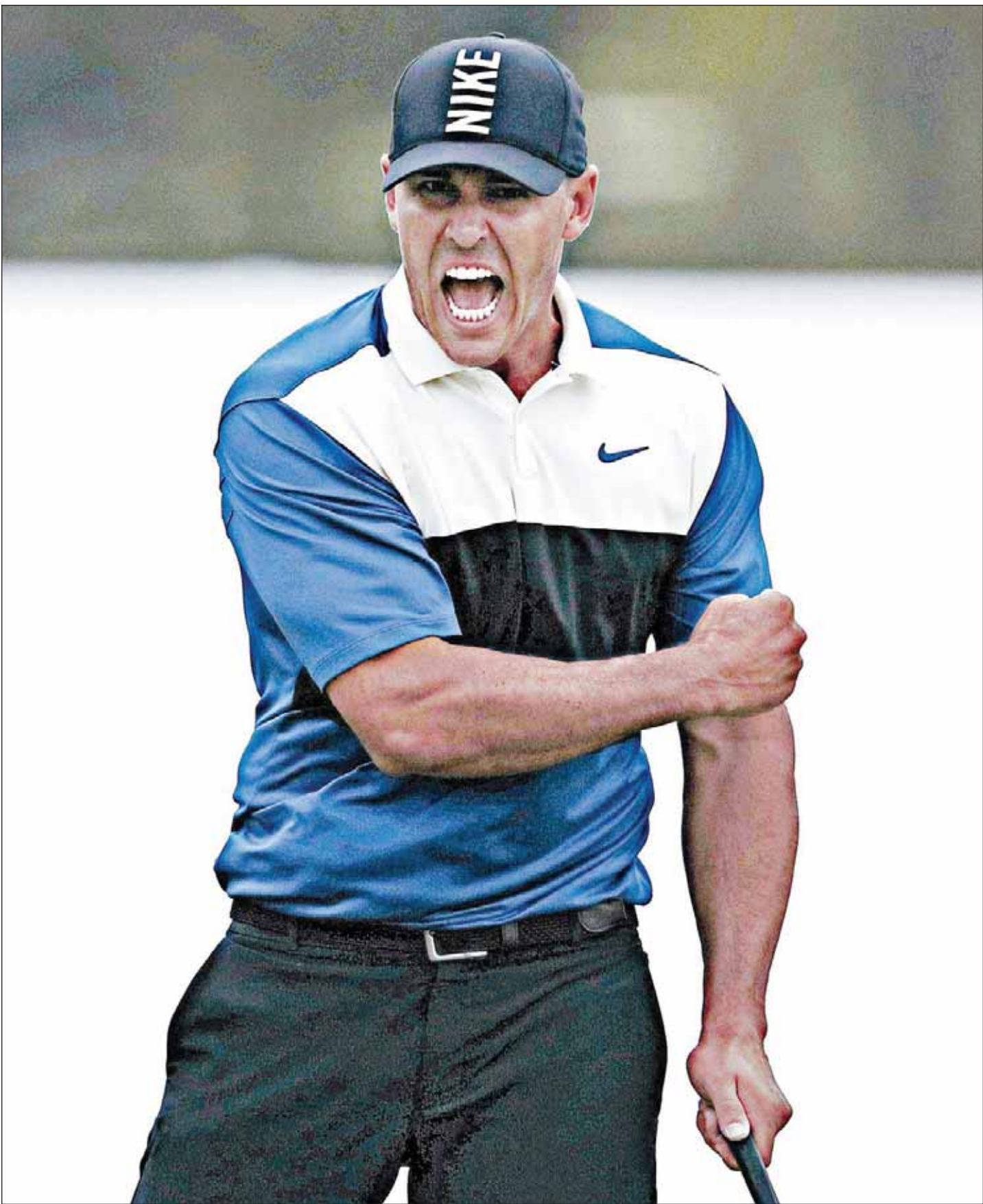

# Complete relief

Koepka nearly blows lead, but still holds off Johnson for 2nd straight PGA title

FARMINGDALE, N.Y. — Brooks Koepka took his place in PGA Championship history with a wire-to-wire victory, minus the style points.

In a raging wind that turned Bethpage Black into a beast, Koepka lost all but one shot of his record seven-shot lead Sunday. He lost the brutal Long Island crowd, which began chanting “DJ! DJ!” for Dustin Johnson as Koepka was on his way to a fourth straight bogey.

But he delivered the key shots over the closing stretch as Johnson faded with two straight bogeys, and Koepka closed with a 4-over 74 for a two-shot victory and joined Tiger Woods as the only back-to-back winners of the PGA Championship since it went to stroke play in 1958.

Koepka said at the start of the week that majors are sometimes the easiest to win. This one should have been. It wasn’t.

His 74 was the highest final round by a PGA champion since Vijay Singh won in a playoff in 2004 at Whistling Straits.

“I’m just glad I don’t have to play any more holes,” Koepka said. “That was a stressful round of golf. I’m glad to have this thing back in my hands.”

Koepka appeared to wrap it up with a gap wedge from 156 yards to 2 feet on the 10th hole for a birdie, as Johnson made his first bogey of the round up ahead on the 11th. That restored the lead to six shots, and the coronation was on.

And then it all changed in a New York minute.

Koepka missed three straight fairways and made three straight bogeys, having to make a 6-foot putt on No. 11 to keep it from being worse. The wind was so fickle that it died as he hit 7-iron to the par-3 14th that sailed over the green, leading to a fourth straight bogey.

The crowd sensed a collapse, and began chanting, “DJ! DJ! DJ!” as Koepka was playing the hole. Ahead of him, Johnson made birdie on the 15th — the toughest hole at Bethpage Black all week — and the lead was down to one.

That was as close as Johnson got.

His 5-iron pierced through a wind that gusted close to 25 mph, over the green and into a buried lie. He missed the 7-foot par putt, went long of the green on the par-3 17th for another bogey and had to settle for 69.

“Hit the shot I wanted to right at the flag,” Johnson said of his 5-iron from 194 yards on the 16th. “I don’t know how it flew 200 yards into the wind like that.”

Johnson now has runner-up finishes in all four of the majors, the wrong kind of career Grand Slam.

“I gave it a run,” he said. “That’s all you can ask for.”

Koepka returned to No. 1 in the world with a performance that defines his dominance in golf’s biggest events.

He becomes the first player to hold back-to-back titles in two majors at the same time, having won a second straight U.S. Open last summer 60 miles down the road at Shinnecock Hills. He was the first wire-to-wire winner in the PGA Championship since Hal Sutton at Riviera in 1983.

And what stakes his claim as one of the best in his generation was a third straight year winning a major. He joins a most elite group — only Woods, Phil Mickelson, Tom Watson, Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer have done that since the Masters began in 1934.

He now has four majors in his last eight, a streak not seen since Woods won seven out of 11 when he captured the 2002 U.S. Open at Bethpage Black.

Next up is the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, where Koepka defends his title for the second time. No one has won the U.S. Open three straight years since Willie Anderson in 1905. No one will doubt whether Koepka is capable the way he’s playing.

The 29-year-old Floridian is an imposing figure, a power off the tee and out of the rough with no obvious weakness in his game and the kind of mental fortitude that majors require. He needed all of it over the final hour of this one.

Koepka held it together at the most crucial moment. He piped his driver down the 15th fairway and two-putted for par. And he drilled another one into the 16th, which played the most difficult in the final round because it was into the wind.

Johnson hit 5-iron just over the green. The wind died enough 20 minutes later that Koepka hit 7-iron only to 50 feet and had another good lag putt to get par.

He kept it interesting to the end, three-putting the 17th as the lead went back to two shots, and pulling his driver on the 18th into fescue so thick it left him little choice but to lay up and scramble for par. Once his medium lob wedge settled 6 feet away, he could relax.

## Pagenaud keeps foot on the gas

Fresh off 1st win since ’17, he claims Indy 500 pole

INDIANAPOLIS — Simon Pagenaud keeps finding new ways to impress his team owner.

Last weekend, he rallied in the rain to end a 21-race drought. On Sunday, he put Roger Penske back on the pole for the Indianapolis 500. And he may not be finished.

Pagenaud traded high-fives and pumped his fist along pit row after earning the first Indy pole by a French driver in a century. He had a four-lap qualifying average of 229.992 mph to edge Ed Carpenter and Spencer Pigot and give Chevrolet a clean sweep of the front row for next Sunday’s race.

“Watching him run in that road race, in the water, I’ve never seen a run like that in my life,” Penske said after the team captured its 266th IndyCar pole. “And then to come out here and win the pole? We’ve got great momentum.”

The timing couldn’t be better for Pagenaud, either.

With his contract expiring at the end of this season and questions lingering about his future, the 2016 series champ has thrived this month on IndyCar’s biggest stage.

He won the IndyCar Grand Prix for his first trip to victory lane since the 2017 season finale at Sonoma. He earned his first pole since July 2017 at Toronto.

On Sunday, Pagenaud was the only driver in the nine-car pole shootout to top 230 on three of the four laps. He knocked a three-time Indy pole winner out of the top spot.

Carpenter wound up second with an average of 229.889. Pigot, who also drives for Ed Carpenter Racing, will start third at 229.826.

“This is truly what Team Penske does,” Pagenaud said. “They give us the best equipment. Quite frankly, (my driving is) at the very, very end of what made this possible. I’m just very honored to drive this No.22 Chevy Menards, which obviously was very incredible today.”

Teammates Will Power, the defending race winner, and Josef Newgarden, the 2017 IndyCar champ, didn’t record a single lap on the 2.5-mile oval over 229. Three-time Indy winner Helio Castroneves didn’t even make the shootout.

And now Pagenaud has positioned himself perfectly to extend Penske’s record to 18 Indy 500 wins — as he celebrates the 50th anniversary of his first trip to Indy as a team owner.

Plus, Pagenaud also can become the second straight driver to sweep the two Indy races — joining Power. The Australian achieved the feat last year.

The only real competition in qualifying came from Carpenter’s three-car contingent, which included Ed Jones of Dubai landing in the No. 4 starting spot.

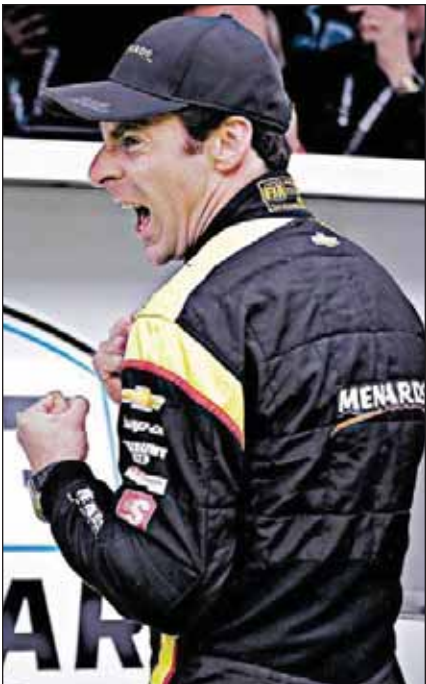
“To have Ed Carpenter cars starting second, third and fourth, I think that speaks volumes to the organization,” Carpenter said. “I really wish one of us would have ended up on pole, but I’m still really happy to be two, three and four. Simon just put in a really nice, long run. His car was so consistent. I couldn’t be that consistent, so, congrats to him.”

Pigot had the fastest car on Saturday and would have had the pole if rain had washed out qualifying.

But the track stayed dry just long enough for Pagenaud to take an even more trimmed out car around the track quickly and smoothly.

It was all he needed.

“I wouldn’t say I was doing a rain dance all day,” Pigot said. “As a race car driver, we love driving IndyCars to the limit and you definitely get a chance to do that here with qualifying. So, any chance we get to put four laps together here, it’s exciting. Unfortunately, it was a little short, but it was a great day.”

## Hope Solo moving on after both success, controversy

**H**ope Solo has moved on. She was in goal four years ago when the United States won the Women's World Cup in Canada. She will be a spectator when the team seeks to defend its title starting June 7 in France.

Solo was dismissed following the 2016 Olympics in Brazil after calling the Swedish team "cowards" for taking a defensive stance against the defending gold medalists — ending a laudable playing career that was also marred by controversy.

Solo's name will still be bandied about this summer, drawing both comparisons and questions: Would the United States be a stronger contender if it had the 37-year-old Solo, who was arguably still at the top of her game when she had her nasty breakup with U.S. Soccer? And her story will again be told.

Solo has no regrets, no apologies.

"I will tell you that I am really happy where I am in life, that I fulfilled everything that I wanted to fulfill on the field. If I would have retired without a World Cup trophy, I think I never would have been able to settle into my new lifestyle. But luckily we won that 2015 World Cup and I was able to win a couple of Golden Gloves, which was a personal goal of mine, and a couple of gold medals. I hold almost every goalkeeping record," she said. "I am not sure there is much more that I could have done."

Solo has been trying to reinvent herself, transitioning from athlete to activist. At the World Cup, she'll be part of the BBC's broadcast plans, an initiative called Change The Game that focuses on women's sports.

A focus of her post-playing career has been equal rights and pay.

Solo was among five star national team players who filed a complaint in 2016 with the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission that alleged wage discrimination by U.S. Soccer.

Although she was no longer with the team, she filed a lawsuit against the federation last August, alleging discrimination under the Equal Pay Act and the Civil Rights Act.

Players for the U.S. women's team filed a similar suit in March that accuses U.S. Soccer of "institutionalized gender discrimi-

nation" that includes unequal pay with their counterparts on the men's national team.

The USSF maintains the men's and women's teams have different collective bargaining agreements, and, as a result, different pay structures.

A hearing to join the two lawsuits is set for May 30.

"I realize that it's the hardest route to go is to fight, and continue to fight and to continue to lose out, honestly," she said. "I've lost out on endorsements because I'm an adversary to U.S. soccer. I've lost out on broadcasting opportunities because I'm an adversary to U.S. soccer. So these things are real. And I feel the financial burden, I feel the personal burden, I feel the burden within the media. But I do know that you have to fight to change the world."

Solo made 202 appearances with the national team with 153 wins and an international-record 102 shutouts. During the 2015 World Cup championship run, she allowed just three goals in seven games with five shutouts.

Her tenure with the national team abruptly ended the next year following the Brazil Olympics when the Americans were ousted by Sweden in the quarterfinals. Afterward, Solo called the team cowards. The blowback was immediate.

Although Solo maintains she apologized to Sweden, then-coach Pia Sundhage and even her own teammates, U.S. Soccer suspended Solo and terminated her contract.

The federation maintained the decision was based on a culmination of events. Solo was suspended for 30 days in early 2015 when she and husband Jeramy Stevens were pulled over in a U.S. Soccer-owned van, and Stevens was charged with DUI. She was benched after publicly questioning coach Greg Ryan's decision to start Briana Scurry against Brazil during the 2007 World Cup, which many saw as a slight against Scurry. And there was an off-field altercation with family members in 2014 that resulted in Solo's arrest, although charges in that case were eventually dropped.

Solo maintains the real reason for her dismissal is that she speaks out. Had she been a man, perhaps the punishment wouldn't have been so harsh and permanent, she said.

"People say I'm outspoken and I guess I used to think it was a word used to put me down," she said. "But now I look at it as a term of endearment, because being outspoken is hard. And being able

to speak about what you see as the truth, I think it's very difficult, because we as athletes are oftentimes taught to deal with the media in a way that is very just kind of predictable."

In the intervening years, Solo was among the candidates who ran for president of U.S. Soccer but lost to current President Carlos Cordeiro.

She has worked with a youth soccer club in Los Angeles, Tudela FC, as well as Street Soccer USA, a national nonprofit that seeks to look at community-level ways to address poverty through soccer. The program has spread to 15 cities and has helped some 15,000 kids and adults.

The national team has also moved on, and will take Alyssa

Naeher, as well as goalkeepers Ashlyn Harris and Adrianna Franch, to France. All three face inevitable comparisons to Solo, fair or not.

In an AP interview earlier this year, Naeher said she can't get wrapped up in the debate.

"At the end of the day, I can only control me, control who I am, the type of player I am, the way that I play and the way that I carry myself," Naeher said. "That's the great thing about this sport and the position specifically, is that there is no black and white way to go about it. We're all different and we all bring our own personality and uniqueness to the team and to the position."

Solo has settled into a comfortable life with Stevens on 50 acres in North Carolina, where she has a vegetable garden and there's room for the couple's dogs — and chickens — to roam.

As for her future, there is one thing Solo probably won't ever do again.

"I think we all know the answer to that question, I am not going to play again. I have not retired because, well, I got fired," she said. "I hope one day U.S. Soccer will give me the respect that every other player has received, which is a retirement game. And hopefully one day I'll be able to actually, formally retire and say goodbye to all my wonderful fans."

## Riderless horse’s bizarre run emblematic of track, sport in state of crisis

BALTIMORE — A pipe burst, so not all the toilets worked. The grandstands past which the horses parade en route from the barn are so decrepit, they were closed. The city of Baltimore is suing the owners of Pimlico Race Course, which is probably the second-most well known suit in the world of horse racing, because the owner of the horse that was disqualified as the winner of the Kentucky Derby is fighting — in federal court — to get that decision overturned. Friday afternoon, a horse collapsed after the finish of a race here. She died on the track.

That enough to capture the state of a sport and the venue that hosts one of its crown jewels? Well, if you thought you saw a riderless horse sprinting the wrong way — through a maze of animals and people, after the Preakness Stakes concluded — it wasn’t one too many black-eyed Susans. Fits right in, doesn’t it?

“I think we’ve covered bizarre already,” said Mark Casse, the trainer of War of Will. “This is the life we live, each and every day. We always have curveballs thrown at us on a constant basis.”

It’s worth noting that on a beautiful Saturday evening, War of Will won the Preakness. That information will be available in record books in perpetuity. Even 22 minutes afterward — the span of time in which stewards at Churchill Downs reviewed a violation on Maximum Security, who crossed the Kentucky Derby finish line first, and gave the victory to Country House — Saturday’s result stood. Chalk one up for normalcy.

Yet a question that better encapsulated the day — better than, “Is this redemption for War of Will, blocked by Maximum Security’s wayward trip in the Derby?” — was: Can a horse without a rider win a race?

The answer is no. But it doesn’t mean Bodexpress didn’t try.

“To him, this race was just a game,” said Kaymarie Kreidel from atop her horse, Hunter. “And I was unfortunately the one that ended the game for him.”

Kreidel wasn’t supposed to be a character Saturday. Yet here she was, barreling down Pimlico’s front stretch as War of Will’s owners and trainers and hangers-on began their celebration on the track. Bodexpress was on the loose, so Kreidel had one thought: “He’s mine. That horse is mine.”

In the aftermath of Maximum Security straying wide in the final turn of the Kentucky Derby, there was little consensus other than this: Thank whoever you pray to that no one — man or horse — was hurt, because it could have been the sport’s most calamitous on-track incident.

That’s saying something for this sport, which is, without hyperbole, in peril. From December to March, 23 horses at famed Santa Anita Park in California died. Another died Friday, the same day the filly Congrats Gal collapsed after a race here. So many of the 131,256 people that came to Pimlico on Saturday had some knowledge of these tragedies, and if they didn’t, they had time to check their phones while they waited in line for the bathrooms, some of which were compromised because of a burst pipe two days earlier.

The Stronach Group, which owns both Pimlico and Santa Anita (in addition to other tracks), is tussling with both the city

and the state to move the race from the only home it has ever known. I’m not an expert — or even a novice, frankly — in horse racing. But I covered baseball at RFK Stadium. I know a venue that’s no longer suitable for hosting major events (notice I refrained from saying “dump”), and Pimlico is no longer suitable for hosting major events.

“If it doesn’t move forward at all, it’s the worst, right?” said Tim Ritvo, the chief operating officer of the Stronach Group. “It’s status quo, and I don’t think anybody wants that.”

So there’s the backdrop to this year’s Preakness: a local crisis involving this city’s marquee sporting event — one that dates back to this very site in 1873 — that folds into the national crisis that encompasses the entire sport. Oh, and both Maximum Security and Country House — the two celebrities involved in the Derby controversy that thrust the sport to territory it

rarely occupies, the national discourse — skipped the Preakness.

And then John Velazquez, an experienced jockey who has won four Triple Crown races, got into the gate aboard Bodexpress.

“He was just not behaving good in the gate,” Velazquez said. “He was not settling really well. He got me against a wall in the gate, and obviously when the doors opened, I was kind of up like right from the start. I kind of jumped sideways, and I had my feet out of the irons, so I lost my balance — and I went off.”

So did Bodexpress, running the race without a rider. This would be funny if it wasn’t so dangerous. Casse was focused on War of Will but couldn’t help but notice the jockey in the dirt, the horse off on its own.

“I used to always tell my riders, ‘Good luck, good luck,’ until a few years ago we had a horse go down and get hurt,” Casse said. “And from that point on, I always just

say, ‘Be safe.’ ”

Enter Kreidel. For 16 years, the 47-year-old was a jockey all over Maryland. She has served as a full-time “out rider” — the men and women atop horses who are entrusted with the safety of both jockeys and horses during races — for seven years at both Pimlico and Laurel.

She wanted to secure Bodexpress before the first turn. The horse preferred to run the race. So Kreidel was caught. She couldn’t insert herself to corral the wayward horse and interfere with the race — even though the horse, galloping alongside the field, was by definition interfering with it.

“A loose horse can cause other loose horses and cause accidents,” Kreidel said. “... When they’re loose, it’s kind of like the light switch turns off, and they don’t really think about anything but just running free and wild.”

A mile and 3/16ths is the trip the field took, and there was Bodexpress the whole way. Here’s the kicker, though: As people began to filter back on the track, he turned the other way and barreled back down the front stretch. It must have looked some combination of thrilling and silly from afar. It was, on the track, some combination of chaotic and scary.

Kreidel eventually thought she had the horse pinned against the rail. Problem: She reached, and he took off — the other way. The chase continued at full gallop, a wild West scene in what’s supposed to be a prim-and-proper world. The hero: Kreidel, who swooped in and roped the horse.

“I saw a shot, and I gunned it, and I grabbed it,” Kreidel said. “And then I just had to weave in between the people and the horses, because it was a bit crowded.”

Horse racing seems a bit chaotic at the moment. Sometimes that’s tragic. Saturday, it seemed more typical. This old track has its history. But in what might be one of the last Preaknesses staged here, 2019 will be the year a horse ran the race without a rider, and that fit the current state of the sport.

## Charming I.M. Pei’s spectacular buildings

What a life I.M. Pei had — and what a contribution he made to architecture and the world’s cities.

The New York-based Chinese American architect, who died last week at the ripe old age of 102, brought high-end modernism to the masses with his museums, civic buildings, urban housing and skyscrapers. He even designed beautiful airport control towers like one at Chicago’s O’Hare International Airport.

Pei was invariably described as charming, diplomatic and elegant, a nod to his finely tailored suits and round-rimmed glasses.

He was also fiercely determined, a quality he needed to withstand the firestorm of criticism that greeted his ultimately triumphant 1984 plan to insert a 71-foot-tall glass-and-metal pyramid in the courtyard of the Louvre.

He also could be marvelously self-deprecating. Once, when I interviewed him, he brought up an unfavorable nickname for Chicago’s University Apartments, a pair of 10-story concrete slabs he’d placed in the middle of East 55th Street, unintentionally subjecting residents to pollution from passing cars.

The nickname of that early 1960s project: “Monoxide Alley.”

Pei could afford to make fun of himself. He won every major honor an architect can win, including the 1983 Pritzker Architecture Prize, the field’s highest honor, awarded by Chicago’s

Reeves' 'John Wick 3' dethrones 'Avengers'

The box office has a new king and his name is John Wick. The third installment of the hyperviolent Keanu Reeves franchise has taken the top spot at the North American box office and ended the three-week reign of "Avengers: Endgame."

Studios on Sunday say "John Wick: Chapter 3 — Parabellum" has grossed an estimated \$57 million in its opening weekend. Not only did it far exceed expectations, but it's a franchise best that nearly doubled the opening of the second film, which itself doubled the opening of the first film from 2014.

The audience, in other words, is growing exponentially for this series about a talented assassin who never seems to get a break. This time, there's a \$14 million price tag on his head.

Internationally, "John Wick 3" earned \$35.2 million from 66 territories.

"Avengers: Endgame" slid to second place in its fourth weekend with \$294 million. Domestically, where the film has grossed \$711 million, it's now second only to "Star Wars: The Force Awakens" (\$937 million). Globally, with \$2.6 billion, it's still second to "Avatar" (\$2.8 billion).

Terminal illness greeted with a shrug

**Dear Amy:** Three years ago I was diagnosed with ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. When I am sitting, it's not always noticeable that I have a terminal illness with a dim future. For various reasons, I have needed to tell people what I am facing. Most who know me usually respond with tears in their eyes. I've learned to accept that and help them feel better about my future by explaining how I feel.

A small but significant number of people, however, have said, "Well, we're all dying of something!"

I never know what to say to those people and wonder if you had some advice on how to handle what I feel is a rude perspective to present to someone with a terminal illness.

— Not Dead Yet

**Dear Not Dead:** This is a very tough thing to face, and I'm very sorry you are experiencing this, now.

Recently, a friend who is facing a life-threatening illness told me she'd heard the same thing: "We're all dying of something" — from her therapist, no less. Weeks later, the remark still bothered her.

And now I wonder if this is a trend of some kind. A Buddhist thinker is credited with this quote:

"We're all dying. It's only a matter of time. Some of us just die sooner than others." This is a push toward understanding and accepting the universal experience of mortality.

Friends and acquaintances might be trying to lead you toward a profound acceptance of your own death. However, this is not their job. (I assume

you would appreciate a quiet and sincere, "Oh, no. I'm so sorry to hear this," followed by an attitude of listening.)

Supplying an unsolicited lesson on mortality is a strange way to greet another's tough and tragic news. "We're all dying of something" sets up a false equivalency. For one thing, ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis) is a particularly cruel disease. The "something" you're dying of is actually worse than most other fatal "somethings."

If you were feeling cynical, you might respond: "How about we trade? I'll take the thing you're dying of and you can have the thing I'm dying of."

A less cynical response is: "That strikes me as a strange thing to say to me."

**Dear Amy:** I suspect that my dad is cheating on my stepmom. I was looking on his iPad (with his permission), when a few messages from someone I'll call "Shelly" popped up.

I have seen my dad text with her before, but I never saw what they said. I assumed she was a consultant of some kind.

However, she sent my dad an emoji that clearly expressed affection and called my dad "babe."

I was shocked and concerned. Am I being too paranoid, or should I mention this to my stepmom? I don't have all the facts and would hate to bring up false information. However, if this were true, my stepmom would be crushed. Is it my place to bring this up? Help!

**Dear Crushed:** People who are cheating don't

usually lend out their devices freely, because they know that evidence would be visible to anyone using it. That's why one red flag of cheating is when a person becomes secretive and possessive of their communication devices.

All the same, it is not appropriate for a friend or colleague to send flirtatious emojis or to address a married person as "babe."

Your father is the person to address. Say a version of: "Dad, what the heck ...?" He might be embarrassed (that's OK). He will undoubtedly provide an explanation. It is up to you whether to believe it.

billionaire Pritzker family.

The citation for the prize spoke to his widespread impact: "Teoh Ming Pei has given this century some of its most beautiful interior spaces and exterior forms. The significance of his work goes far beyond them: for his concern has always been the surroundings in which his buildings would rise."

Indeed, while Pei is typically celebrated as a creator of buildings that resemble sculptural objects, he also excelled at urban design, particularly in his early career when he worked for the flamboyant New York developer William Zeckendorf.

Even allowing for the car fumes that bothered the residents of University Apartments, it can be observed that Pei and Chicago architect Harry Weese, with whom he worked on

the redevelopment of Chicago's Hyde Park neighborhood, achieved a significant success. Departing from the urban renewal norm of wiping out existing neighborhoods to make way for isolated housing projects, they wove two- and three-story townhouses into Hyde Park's urban fabric. In doing so, they laid the groundwork for the area's ongoing revival.

It's somehow fitting that

Pei died in a year that marks the 100th anniversary of the Bauhaus, the German design school that replaced Victorian clutter and Edwardian pomp with a less formal, clean-lined functionalism.

After fleeing Nazi Germany, Bauhaus founder Walter Gropius became chair of the architecture department at Harvard's Graduate School of Design, from which Pei graduated

with a master's in 1946. The Bauhaus approach suffused Pei's work, though he ultimately moved beyond it.

The most famous of his buildings — deservedly so — are the Louvre Pyramid, which forms a spectacular entrance to underground galleries Pei added to the once-overstuffed French landmark; the National Gallery of Art's East Wing, where visitors join with a monumental Calder mobile to animate a sun-washed atrium; and the Bank of China Tower in Hong Kong, whose expressed diagonal structure, like that of Chicago's former John Hancock Center, braces the building against the wind and supports most of its weight.

Significantly, Pei did not require princely budgets to make construction into art. A prime example is the prototype air traffic control towers he designed for the Federal Aviation Administration in the early 1960s. The O'Hare tower, the tallest of the bunch at 150 feet, combined the basic elements of the prototype — a topside cab, a shaft and a base building — into a thin, gracefully flaring form that anticipated a bell tower Pei would later design in Japan.

The O'Hare tower, built in 1970 alongside the O'Hare Hilton, is still

standing and used for monitoring airfield operations, according to Lauren Hoffman, a spokeswoman for the city's Department of Aviation. A taller tower built in the '90s became the airport's main control post.

To be sure, Pei was not a leading thinker, like the mystical Philadelphia architect Louis Kahn, who famously said he'd asked a brick what it wanted to be (the brick supposedly replied: "an arch.")

Nor was Pei an aesthetic radical, like Los Angeles architect Frank Gehry, who harnessed digital technology to make such exuberant, seemingly chaotic

statements as the Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao, Spain, and the Pritzker Pavilion in Millennium Park.

Critics turned thumbs-down on some of Pei's buildings, like the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland, which seemed to them a recycled melange of forms Pei already had used.

"Too much of it is shallow, showoff architecture, the kind you see at a world's fair or a theme park," Boston Globe architecture critic Robert Campbell wrote of the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame when the building opened in 1995. "No real risks have been taken. And that feels wrong for rock."

Pei's best designs, however, were as elegant and as quietly forceful as the man himself.

Balancing form and finance, engineering and art, he stretched modernism in new directions, beyond sober functionalism. In the process, he helped revitalize cities in America and around the world. That's quite a legacy, even accounting for such slip-ups as "Monoxide Alley."

# A baffling ballet with brilliant dancing

If, like me, your only knowledge of Eifman Ballet of St. Petersburg is the company's 2017 trip to Chicago for "Red Giselle," the North American premiere of artistic director Boris Eifman's "The Pygmalion Effect," on view through Sunday at the Auditorium Theatre, is bound to be a conversation starter.

In what might be the exact opposite of "Red Giselle," "The Pygmalion Effect" is a comedy loosely based on the Greek myth Pygmalion. There's a psychological underpinning to the myth of a sculptor who falls in love with his statue called the Pygmalion effect, in which one's expectations of another person can affect their behavior — like a self-fulfilling prophecy for people.

The myth has been portrayed countless times, in all forms of artistic expression. Perhaps the most familiar is a play by George Bernard Shaw, which was later the inspiration for the Broadway musical "My Fair Lady," plus Julia Roberts in that iconic red dress in "Pretty Woman." Eifman's interpretation plays pretty close to this iteration of the myth, in which a young girl living in poverty is molded into a professional ballroom dancer.

The girl, a boisterous and bumbling character named Gala, and her chummy father, Holmes, are living hand to mouth in the city slums with a raucous group of fun-loving paupers. This dynamic duo, portrayed Friday and Saturday by Lyubov Andreyeva as Gala and Dmitry Fisher as Holmes, solicits carriage rides on the ritzy side of town to make ends meet, and come across a glamorous ballroom competition featuring champion dancers

Leon (Oleg Gabyshev) and his partner Tea (Alina Petrovskaya).

A mistake costs Leon and Tea the title, leaving Tea in serious doubt of her partner. Sensing an opportunity, Holmes, who is also a flirty, philandering drunk, sells Gala off as the next great ballroom champion.

She's anything but that, in what has to be the goofiest role ever created for a ballerina. Andreyeva flops and fumbles around, unteachable until Leon transforms her into a mechanical doll with the help of a light-up space helmet (you read that right).

As you might expect, Gala's now flawless execution wins her top prize,

and Leon's heart, too. Gala's inevitable return to her pals on the other side of town offer the most depth of this plotline as she feels pulled in both directions, deciding who, what and with whom she wants to be. Particularly poignant are a gorgeous pas de trois for Leon, Gala and Holmes, and Gala's curtain-closing solo on a park bench.

This is a great company, Eifman is a great and thoughtful choreographer, and these dancers are amazing. The extraordinary sets (by Zinovy Margolin), lighting (by Eifman and Alexander Sivaev) and costumes (by Olga Shaishmelashvili) place the ballet in an ambiguous city filled with gorgeous art deco

opulence. And it's worth mentioning that Eifman Ballet isn't shy about taking risks and pushing the envelope. There's not a pointe shoe in sight; the choreography is a mix of classical ballet, contemporary dance and hyperbolic ballroom technique. The rousing group dances are the highlight of the evening, and it's a thrill to witness Andreyeva's dramatic range and crisp technique when Gala's slapstick side is stripped away.

Eifman is not one to hold back. His dramas are super dramatic, and in the case of this comedy, the gags are piled on thick. Best of the night, by far, is an Angel on a hoverboard descending on Holmes, to encourage

him to avoid temptation.

But this a bizarre and often flummoxing ballet, despite an easy-to-follow, digestible plot. Some of the jokes are unnecessarily crass: a shower scene with Leon's three maids scrubbing his bare bottom, a feigned erection when Gala falls on his crotch, and an ongoing tiff with Tea, for example ... poor Leon. The score is a mix-tape of Strauss, a vast catalog of waltzes, galops and polkas by Johann Strauss, Sr. and his sons Johann II, Josef and Eduard. The addition of Mozart's "Piano Concert No. 23" for Gala's ending solo is an odd one, having spent the whole of two hours with the Strauss family. It's not an unwel-

come change — honestly there's a limit to how much Strauss one can hear in an evening — but a random and abrupt one that leaves the audience nonplussed as the main curtain closes.

Perhaps the best strategy is the same one I brought to Alexei Ratmansk's "Whipped Cream" in April (coincidentally, a ballet set to music by yet another — unrelated — Strauss): Don't think too hard, try to embrace "The Pygmalion Effect's" ostentatious kookiness, and enjoy this ballet's amazing stagecraft and exceptional dancing.

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## New CBS season includes sitcom from 'Big Bang Theory' creator

NEW YORK — Broadcaster CBS is pushing the boundaries — gently — next season, as it and other networks navigate the rise of streaming. A change-of pace sitcom from "The Big Bang Theory" creator Chuck Lorre and a drama starring Edie Falco of "The Sopranos" will join a lineup that also brings former CBS stars back into the fold.

Among the comeback kids is Billy Gardell, who played opposite Melissa McCarthy in CBS's "Mike & Molly" and stars this fall in Lorre's "Bob Hearts Abishola." Gardell plays a Detroit compression sock salesman who falls for his Nigerian-born cardiac nurse. His co-star is Nigerian actress Folake Olowofoyeku, whose credits include "Transparent."

CBS Corp. executive David Nevins described the sitcom as "a different flavor" for Lorre but true to his brand, which includes CBS's "Mom" as well as "The Big Bang Theory," which ended last week after 12 seasons.

"Bob Hearts Abishola" is about "two adults in middle-age who are sort of unexpected," Nevins said, and resonates with what he called "Norman Lear-ish themes," a reference to the groundbreaking producer of "All in the Family." "When it comes to finding new voices, CBS will take a chance on anyone who is already on CBS," the network's late-night host Stephen Colbert joked in a brief set for ad buyers who gathered last week for a presentation of the 2019-20 schedule.

"As you can see, despite Lindsey Graham's advice, I honored my subpoena to be here today," he said, throwing one of the political barbs that are a regular feature of his top-rated "Late Show."

Other familiar CBS

faces: Pauley Perrette, a former "NCIS" fan favorite, goes for laughs in the midseason sitcom "Broke"; Patricia Heaton ("Everybody Loves Raymond") stars as a late-blooming medical intern in the comedy "Carol's Second Act;" and Marg Helgenberger ("CSI: Crime Scene Investigation") is part of the courthouse drama "All Rise."

The latter two are fall entries, along with "The Unicorn," a comedy about a widower (Walton Goggins) who's stepping gingerly into dating.

Falco, who played a mobster's wife in "The Sopranos" and a drug addict in "Nurse Jackie," shifts gears in midseason's "Tommy," playing a former NYPD officer who becomes the first female police chief in Los Angeles.

**Household name producers:** Lorre isn't the only high-profile producer contributing to CBS' lineup next season.

Fall drama "Evil" is from Michelle and Robert King, the husband-and-wife team behind former CBS hit "The Good Wife" and the CBS All Access series

"The Good Fight." The psychological mystery examines the root of evil "along the dividing line between science and religion," the network said.

Producer Dick Wolf, who supplies a veritable warehouse of shows to NBC with his "Chicago" franchise and "Law & Order: SVU," could be trying for the same at CBS. He's following up the drama "FBI" with midseason's "FBI: Most Wanted," with stars including Alana De La Garza and Keisha Castle-Hughes.

**Say goodbye:** Not every revival sticks the landing. "Murphy Brown" with Candice Bergen was one season and done, and joining canceled series that include "Happy Together," "Fam" and "Life in Pieces."

It remains to be seen whether the end of "Murphy," a hit for CBS back in the '80s and '90s, puts a damper on the revival-reboot trend. Among its successes are "Will & Grace" and "The Conners," salvaged from the "Roseanne" reboot put into jeopardy by its namesake star's racist tweet.

filled a mission from God. A World Series triumph in 2016. A cataclysmic event now the subject of a new musical with a score by Michael Mahler and a book by Jason Brett. Lead produced at the Royal George Theatre by the former state senator William Marovitz and quietly blessed by rights-holding Cubs officialdom, “Miracle” fully achieves its simple aim under Damon Kiely’s direction: to be tune-fun, nostalgic, family-friendly catnip for big old softie Cubbie fans.

If you want to wear your Kyle Schwarber shirt out on the town, and then use it to wipe your tears and blow your nose as you blubber into your Old Style, then I have the show for you. Never heard of Schwarber? Go across the street for that post-apocalyptic drama at Steppenwolf.

But if you made a quiet pilgrimage in the fall of 2016 to a grave of a loved one, a W flag in your pocket and a well of complicated emotion in your heart, you will look out at the Royal George mainstage and find kindred spirits singing lyrics that will tug at your Cub-loving soul.

All you need to know is the titles of the numbers to get the mood (well, I’ll add Mahler’s accessible song-writing talents): “The Cubby Bear Blues,” “Break the Curse,” “Coulda Beens” and, inevitably, “#FlytheW”

The musical style varies a bit, but it’s always within hollering distance of Steve Goodman.

I must pause now for disclosures. This critic lives in walking distance of Wrigley Field. His teenage offspring has been going to this ballpark almost since birth and connives daily to get back there. On Nov. 2, 2016, his dog put on her Cubs shirt and it rained. And he stood for an hour or more in the lobby of Tribune Tower on the following morning, grinning as all those copies with “At Last!” ran out the door — a headline, with its subtle Etta James referent, he considers to be the greatest two words of journalism in the history of the Chicago Tribune.

Plus the show producers had stacked some decks on opening: Ryne Sandberg was in the lobby; the late

Harry Caray’s wife, “Dutchie,” was down the row. The broadcasters Walter Jacobson and Bill Kurtis showed up decked out in Cubs gear from head to toe. These were not normal aesthetic circumstances.

You have to know all that because if you aren’t a Cubs fan, this show is not for you. If you prefer Guaranteed Rate Field or wherever, you will find these proceedings bathetic. This is a show that, were it staged anywhere other than the North

Side of Chicago, would disappear faster than a legitimate Sheffield rooftop in which the Cubs have no financial interest.

Any star rating you might see attached to this review applies only to Cubs fans. This is not a joke. There is only one group for whom the show is recommended.

(OK, in total fairness, one of Mahler’s best songs, “I Hate the Cold,” applies citywide and is notably witty in its understanding of the annual damage done by springs that tease and taunt while delivering only heartache.)

You want the premise? You haven’t guessed? OK. Bar-owning, Cubs-loving, Irish-heritage guy (Brandon Dahlquist) has Cubs-loving wife (Allison Sill), an ailing but spunky Cubs-loving Pops (Gene Weygandt) and a dynamic, ’tweenage Cubs-loving

daughter (Elise Wolf, alternating with Amaris Sanchez). The pressures are mounting on this old-school, family-owned Wrigleyville bar (kind of like the demolished Higgins on Racine or some such joint). An evil developer (Michael Kingston) has made an escape offer. Friends like a lawyer (Jonathan Butler-Duplessis) and a good-spirited pal named Babs (Veronica Garza) offer advice and encouragement.

Who can sell tradition, they sing. But who can spend their lives waiting for next year, they sing in response.

If only ...

Ah, yes, 2016. Spoiler alert.

What you get then is an often-witty if wildly sentimental book (Marovitz and Julian Frazin conceived the idea), stacked to the upper deck with Cubs gags, some fine songs in that Cubs-y tradition and enough heart to carry the night. You can see everything coming, but it’s fun when it arrives.

And, crucially, the show has baked-in footage of the actual World Series (and some of the games leading up to it), using sophisticated projections by Mike Tutaj.

The performances are all of a genre, but many of them come from top-drawer Equity actors like Dahlquist, Butler-Duplessis, Sill and Weygandt, and Wolf is full of life. The set by Collette Pollard is of that famous genre known as Wrigleyville realism (look for the gallery at the Art Institute), with enough Cubs logos to rival the

Cubby Bear.

Everything is focused on a sentimental good time for Cubs fans, emphasizing the team’s multi-generational reach and its long-standing place in the hearts of North Siders known for tolerance, tears and forgiveness. All obstacles are merely speed-bumps on the road to Waveland glory and a happier climax to our limited time on this stale promontory.

You should know by now if this is for you, right? I had a whole lot of fun, although the show’s main structural problem is that Brett and Mahler actually have written an old-time musical that needs an ensemble, but Marovitz failed to hire one. That issue means that you have to deal with there being, like, virtually no customers in this bar, even when the Cubs are in the playoffs, which defeats its own premise. Even Cubs fans might chuckle at that one.

As compensation, you’ve got a bunch of Cubs-fan characters of all stripes to care about. And a shot at reliving the past, which tends to be more certain than any future, Javier Baez or no Javier Baez.

If there’s an old-time Cubs fans near to your heart, though, who doesn’t get out so much, this one might have more weight and import than either you or I think. I saw some evidence.

before it started.” The line stretched out of the hall. By fight time, more than 300 students had turned out, and many more were turned away. The University of Chicago is just that kind of school.

After the Callards sparred for a hour — calmly, intimately, but without revealing a great deal of salacious information (at Ben’s insistence) — students started peppering the ex-couple with questions, about monogamy, marriage as a contract, personal sacrifice, and even sex. Their chat continued more than three hours, ending after midnight.

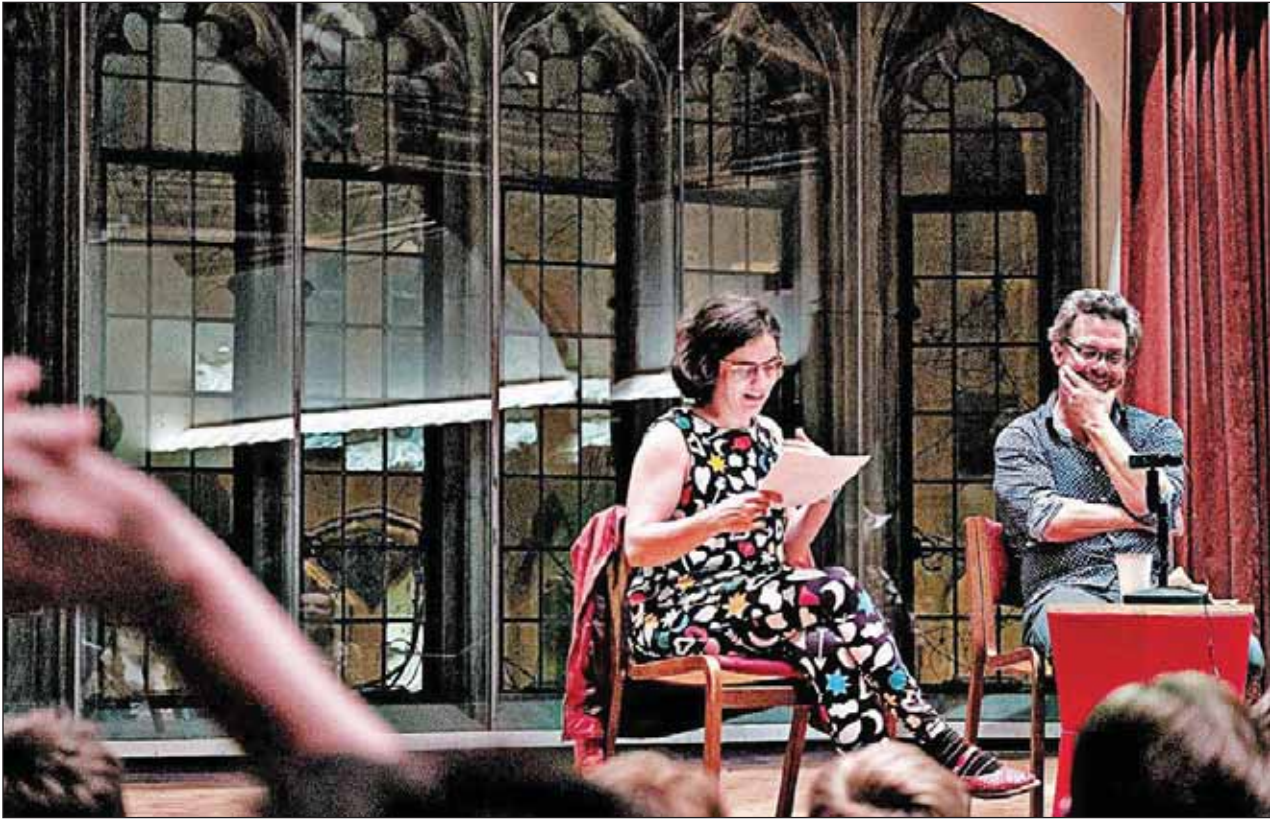
“Ben found it exhausting,” Agnes said.

“Emotionally exhausting,” Ben said later.

They had made lists of questions to ask each other, though with her first punch, Agnes knocked her ex-husband off-balance. “Just before the event, he called and said he couldn’t get his questions printed. I said OK, just email it to me. He said, no, no, he’d bring his computer. I said don’t sit onstage reading from a computer! Email it! I wouldn’t read his questions! And we went back and forth for a while, until it was obvious, he clearly didn’t believe that I wouldn’t peek at his questions. And so I started Night Owls that night by telling the printer story, and then I asked: ‘So, Ben, what is trust, and why is it important in marriage?’ ”

William Weaver, the philosophy department administrator, was standing just outside the room, handling the line of students: “When Agnes asked her first question, there was this huge roar.” And it was gratifying. “Because I think there’s a sense on campus that philosophy will never be the hip thing. But with help from Night Owls, maybe we are?”

**Four years ago, the second floor of the university’s Stuart Hall,** the home of the Department of Philosophy, was gutted by a fire. Today, at the end of a long hallway on that floor, Agnes Callard’s office seems to sprout and bloom from the aftermath of the embers. She’s quick to say that is a misconception, and that her office would look the way it looks regardless of the fire. Yet, it’s hard to see it any other way: Her office is an eruption of arts and crafts and colors and shapes and mirrors and trees made of yarn that reach to the ceiling and

branch out, as if it were ductwork in Dr. Seuss’ office. Even her rows of philosophy books have been shelved according to the primary color on their spines.

“I look at this and I see restraint,” she said. “I spent a lot of time making one yarn tree when I should have been doing philosophy. The real plan was for a forest of yarn trees!”

Looks like a Montessori playroom, I said.

She said students either say nothing at all and don’t seem to notice, “or they assume I created a kind of therapy space!”

Needless to say, at a university known for its seriousness and rigor, Agnes Callard leaps out. She and Ben are among the most popular professors on campus, but where he is private, she is open, speaking in cheerful gushes of sentences that collide and create exclamation points. I said she reminded me of conspiracy nuts on the bus, only lucid.

She thanked me.

On a table was a poster of seven cartoon seals, being used to promote the last Night Owls of the school year, May 25. The topic: Death. Get the joke? Seven seals? Ingmar Bergman’s meditation on mortality, “The Seventh Seal”? The event is being billed around campus as “UC: Where Death comes to have fun!” Death?

Ha?

“Not to say you couldn’t do Night Owls anywhere,” Hoskins said, “but we have a student body who came to this school exactly so they could go to these kind of social events.”

Night Owls’ debates have

touched on “Do minds exist?” and “Should you strive to live without anger and sadness?” To an extent, there was an audience for this already present. The university has about 180 philosophy majors, or roughly 100 more than comparable institutions. And, according to Weaver, since he was a student himself here in the 1980s, the university has been taking slow, steady strides toward developing a social, less inward-looking student population.

Night Owls has been one popular response to that — and we’re talking standing-room only audiences here. Night Owls is designed for students; that said, if there’s room, they tend not to turn anyone away.

Agnes Callard said that when she created the series in 2017, inspired by a similar program at St. John’s College in Maryland, she was told if a dozen students came, it was a hit. She had an assistant bake two-dozen cookies to hand out at the door. About 120 students came. Last winter, during the polar vortex, 200 came. The topic that night?

“Economics vs. Philosophy: The Battle for Your Soul.”

Philosophy, like poetry, has had a long reputation as an insulated academic echo chamber, accessible and appreciated mainly by the least practical-minded among us.

But also like poetry, philosophy can be an elemental drilling-down to the bedrock of an idea. Callard, who is the philosophy department’s director of undergraduate studies, thought the university

needed a series that reintroduced philosophy back into the wild, something that brought the non-philosopher and philosopher together.

“I think there’s an idea people have about philosophy and people who do philosophy,” she said, “and sometimes that image is why people get into it. But there’s also the reality of philosophy classes — which are often a somewhat arbitrary selection of topics, because that’s where the history of the subject always focused. I wanted Night Owls to feel like what you thought philosophy is, before you found yourself in a class and actually had to do it. I wanted philosophy to speak to an outside world, and take steps to lead people to it.”

And so, for May’s evening of death, Callard debates Daniel Morgan, chair of the Department of Cinema and Media (the event starts with a screening of “Seventh Seal”); when Night Owls returns in the fall, Callard will debate Helen DeWitt, acclaimed author of “The Last Samurai,” on the question: “Why are Some People Weirder Than Others?”

“I think Agnes, in a short time, turned Night Owls into a keystone of intellectual life in Hyde Park,” said Ben, “because she’s applying a simple idea of showing what philosophy offers — what philosophers bring to the table.”

The result is an ode to the classic late-night dorm-room rap session of yore, the sort, Agnes said, where “tiredness works like drunkenness, and the longer the conversation goes,

the more you become loopy and entertain weird thoughts.”

The Night Owl on anger and sadness, for instance, veered from anger and sadness as mental illnesses — because, as Agnes says, they offer distorted pictures of what you care about — into the clarifying necessity of a white-hot rage.

“I had never thought about anger in those ways,” said Nur Banu Simsek, a senior philosophy student from Virginia, “and ever since, I’ve been talking about anger, and the conundrum (of needing anger, despite the headaches it creates). A pre-med friend of mine said, ‘You can’t be angry all the time! Your body will reject it! Hypertension!’ And I was like, ‘Yeah, yeah — but the moral side!’ Really, it’s the kind of thing that I came to UChicago for.”

We were sitting in Callard’s office. The professor mentioned the human rights faculty wanted to do a Night Owls conversation on the tragedy of mass incarceration. “But I’m not sure everyone always understands that we are not here to play advocate — or even find solutions to hard subjects.”

“I think some outside the department (of philosophy) get frustrated with Night Owls for that,” said Simsek. “They say that, after three hours of talk, it’s all talk and no action.”

“Yes, it is,” Callard said. “It is all talk. That’s the point.”

**It’s nearing midnight in April** and Callard is debating Chris Blattman, an economist and political scientist noted for his stud-

ies of poverty and violence in Africa, Central America and Chicago. The vibe, as promised, is vintage dorm-room heavy lifting, multiplied by 100 or so participants, slouched across chairs, their legs curled into stomachs, stretching their arms in exhaustion, or sitting rapt, their hands cocked, ready to reach out for a question.

The topic, broadly, is “Why Is There Organized Violence?” As in war, crime, etc. They begin with the simple concept of order, and what order looks like, and how it is fractured.

Blattman says he has children who, given a border, tend to cross it. “If my 6-year old hits his sister, he gets a job. He may end up with six jobs, but it’s an offer of redemption.”

Callard asks, Are you oppressing him?

“Well,” Blattman says, “I am an autocratic state.”

From there they ping into the multiverse (“Maybe you shoot the Archduke Ferdinand a thousand times in a thousand universes, but only in one World War I breaks out”), the rationality of anger, whether violence is a natural state, not an aberration. And then the questions come, and come, and come, about what “Games of Thrones” gets right with structural violence, about the morality of drone strokes, about whether you can claim to understand someone’s motives and still be legitimately furious with them.

As the hours wear on, questions grow not illegible but confusing, grandiose. The large room inside Fulton Hall, a recital space with vaulted ceilings and large arched windows, takes on a stillness. It overlooks the Midway park along 59th Street and the light outside grows inky and the street lamps shine halos of rain. The later the hour, the more it really does seem here that the rest of the world has gone to bed, all but these few, still hashing out its problems.

Philosophy students are 2-to-1 male, yet here, the make-up is close to parity; and though Night Owls draws a lot of philosophy students, there’s chemistry majors, budding economists. Students come and go, hands loaded with complimentary cookies and coffee; some stay for hours, others leave after 15 minutes, their seat filled a moment later. Blattman’s voice grows hoarse. Debates trail off.

A man snores in the front row, tilted, gape-mouthed.

And Agnes Callard keeps going.

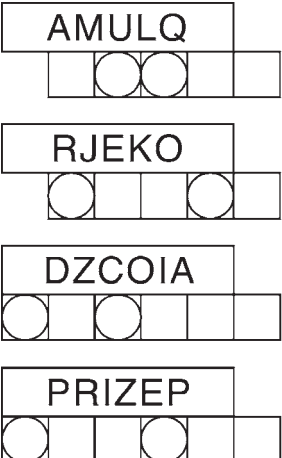
