



## 12 killed in Virginia shooting

Police kill man after exchange of gunfire in 'devastating day'

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. — A longtime city employee shot and killed 12 people and injured five others after opening fire late Friday afternoon in the public works building where he worked, police said. The shooter was then killed by officers after firing at them.

One officer was shot during the exchange, but was saved by his bulletproof vest, Police Chief James Cervera said during a news conference a couple of hours after the shooting.

Cervera said the shooter shot "indiscriminately" using a .45-caliber handgun with a suppressor.

The shooter was described as a disgruntled employee of the Public Utilities Department, Cervera said.

Police did not release the shooter's name. "This is the most devastating day in the history of Virginia Beach," Mayor Bobby Dyer said. "The people involved are our friends, co-workers, neighbors and colleagues."

Friday's rampage is believed to be the worst mass killing in Virginia Beach's history. Prior to this week, a shooting on June 30, 1994, held that distinction: Four people were shot to death.

The White House issued a statement saying that President Donald Trump had been briefed on the shooting "and continues to monitor the situation."

Democratic presidential hopefuls New Jersey Sen. Cory Booker; South Bend Mayor Pete Buttigieg; and California Sen. Kamala Harris, were also among those who condemned the shooting Friday.

Megan Banton, an administrative assistant, was in the building Friday when the gunman began firing shortly after 4 p.m.

She said her supervisor pulled her and others into an office and shoved a desk against the door while Banton called 911.

"It felt like forever," Banton, 30, said. Banton said some people in the office were crying; others appeared nervous while some stayed silent.

"You never think this is going to happen to you. When it happens to you, it's totally different," she said.

Banton said she texted her mother, telling her that they were waiting for police. "Thank God my baby is OK," Banton's mother, Dana Showers, said.

Arthur Felton, an 18-year employee in the planning department, was also inside when the shooting started.

He evacuated after a coworker heard

## Recreational pot OK'd by lawmakers

Indecision on other items likely to force session into weekend

SPRINGFIELD — Illinois lawmakers voted Friday to legalize the recreational use of cannabis effective Jan. 1, but House Democrats acknowledged other items on the aggressive agenda put forth by new Gov. J.B. Pritzker likely would force them to miss their midnight deadline to adjourn the spring session.

The announcement that lawmakers would push into overtime represented an embarrassment to Pritzker and Democrats after his election in November ushered in a renewed era of one-party rule in Springfield after four years of partisan gridlock under Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner.

Still pending was action on several major proposals backed by Pritzker, including a state spending plan for the

budget year that begins July 1; Senate consideration of a bill that would enshrine a "fundamental right" for a woman to have an abortion; a massive public works construction program; and a significant expansion of gambling and legalized sports betting.

One symbol of the contentious atmosphere was the reaction by rank-and-file Republicans to a state budget plan of more than 1,500 pages that was crafted by a group of legislators behind closed doors. It was plopped on lawmakers' desks midmorning Friday, just hours before they had planned to adjourn for the summer.

"The process here is horrific," Republican Rep. Grant Wehrli, of Naperville, said during an afternoon hearing on the

budget that lasted more than three hours. "We should all be embarrassed by this process."

Democrats blamed Republicans for excessive speechmaking and accused them of trying to draw the process out after midnight. That's when the rules require that three-fifths of lawmakers in each chamber are needed to pass legislation with an immediate effective date, rather than a simple majority. Democrats have supermajorities in each chamber but want Republican votes to provide some political cover.

"Negotiations are going on right now on some of this stuff," said Democratic Rep. Robert Martwick, of Chicago. Republicans, he said, "have this sense that well, you could have done this stuff

## Drug trafficking crackdown along 'Heroin Highway'

Police install cameras along Eisenhower on West Side



Some 20 cameras have been put into operation in the past several weeks along the Eisenhower Expressway on Chicago's West Side in an attempt to crack down on drug trafficking — and the violence that comes with it — along what authorities have long called the "Heroin Highway."

The announcement — by public safety officials at a news conference on an Eisenhower overpass — comes as federal, state, county and city law enforcement grapple with waves of overdoses caused by the powerful painkiller fentanyl mixed with heroin and other substances.

The cameras have been installed along about a 7-mile stretch of the Eisenhower — from downtown to Oak Park — due to the expressway's notoriety as an access route for drug users from the suburbs and elsewhere to travel to the West Side for their fix.

"The homes and businesses near the Eisenhower Expressway have particularly suffered from the sale of illegal drugs to the point where the area has become known as the Heroin Highway," Chicago police Superintendent Eddie Johnson told reporters

on the overpass at Congress Parkway and Leavitt Street.

Officials said the cameras — equipped with license plate readers — will focus on vehicles whose owners are wanted for crimes primarily related to drug activity and the violence tied into it, not speeding motorists, Johnson said.

"To be perfectly honest, you look at this traffic out here today, I'm not sure that speeding is really an option on the Eisenhower," he quipped Friday afternoon in

reference to the bumper-to-bumper east-bound traffic.

But drug users traveling to the West Side on the Eisenhower will be targeted by the cameras as well, officials made clear.

The cameras are funded by the Chicago High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area, a federal agency that helps local police departments combat drug-related offenses, and operated by the city's Office of Emer-

## In Smollett case, 'recuse' up for debate

Attorneys argue definition, need for special prosecutor

Attorneys sparred for nearly an hour Friday over whether to appoint a special prosecutor in the Jussie Smollett controversy, a tussle that in large part centered on the definition of the word "recuse."

When Cook County State's Attorney Kim Foxx's office said in February that she was recusing herself from the Smollett investigation, that was an admission that she had a conflict of interest, argued Sheila O'Brien, the former state appellate judge pushing for the special prosecutor.

"She indicated early on she could not fulfill her duties and said the word 'recusal,'" O'Brien told Judge Michael Toomin. "We're asking the court to interpret that action by her — said in her official capacity as a state's attorney of this county to the people of this county, to the press — that when she said that word, that's what it means."

The appointment needs to be made

earlier. That's not true. The way the process works is whittle this down, you negotiate it, you get to a point and you throw it on the board and you hope you have the votes at that last minute. So they're the ones that are sort of delaying everything."

The three-hour debate over legalizing marijuana, part of the "think big" agenda Pritzker campaigned on, was emblematic of how slowly things moved in Springfield on Friday. After the 66-47 House vote, Pritzker issued a statement in which he promised to sign a bill that he said offers "the most equity-centric approach in the nation."

"This will have a transformational impact on our state, creating opportunity in the communities that need it most and giving so many a second chance," Pritzker said in his statement.

With the governor's signature, Illinois would become the first state to create a commercial recreational marijuana industry through the legislature rather than by voter initiative.

Supporters hailed the measure as an acknowledgment that the prohibition of marijuana has failed, and they argued that the bill will begin to address decades of racial disparities in the prosecution of drug crimes by directing Pritzker to pardon those with previous convictions for low-level possession.

"Prohibition hasn't built communities. In fact, it has destroyed them," said sponsoring Rep. Kelly Cassidy, D-Chicago. "It is time to hit

the reset button on the war on drugs."

The bill takes effect Jan. 1 and would allow residents age 21 and older to legally possess 30 grams of cannabis, 5 grams of cannabis concentrate or 500 milligrams of THC contained in a cannabis-infused product. Nonresidents could possess 15 grams of cannabis. It also would create a licensed cultivation and dispensary system.

Opponents raised concerns that the bill will increase teen use of marijuana and result in more people driving while high, as well as health concerns.

"If this bill passes, a giant, big-money industry will commercialize another harmful, addictive drug in our state," said Rep. Marty Moylan, a Des Plaines Democrat and outspoken opponent of legalization.

Legalizing marijuana is expected to generate \$57 million in general revenue in the coming budget year and \$30 million for a cannabis business development fund. That's far less than the \$170 million Pritzker projected in his spending plan, but budget negotiators have said they aren't counting on any of that revenue.

Lawmakers also were considering a massive gambling bill that included a major casino in Chicago and smaller casinos in the south suburbs and Waukegan. The bill also would open up slots for Chicago's airports and the state's horse racetracks and legalize sports betting.

The Chicago casino would be privately owned and the city would get one-third of all tax revenue from it. The casino would have up to 4,000 gambling positions — slot machines or seats at a gaming table — while other new and current casinos could increase their gambling positions from 1,200 to 2,000. It also would allow horse tracks to have 1,200 gambling positions.

For sports betting, licenses would go to all existing and newly authorized casinos as well as horse racetracks and sports venues with license fees ranging from \$3.2 million to \$10

million.

For the first year and a half, bettors would have to create an account at a licensed gambling facility and then could make deposits online afterward. After 18 months, three online licenses would be created at \$20 million per license. Fantasy sports wagering firms could partner as an online vendor at casinos, racetracks or sports venues.

A lottery sports wagering program also would be created.

Sports leagues would not get any of the cut, and wagering on Illinois college teams would be prohibited by the legislation.

Lawmakers also were considering a \$40.1 billion spending plan for the budget year that begins July 1.

Democrats said the plan would increase by \$25 million the \$350 million annual boost in public grade and high school funding required under last year's rewrite of the formula used by the state to dole out money to schools.

It also would provide an increase of \$66 million, or 5%, to funding for public colleges and universities, many of which were devastated during the state's historic budget impasse under Rauner. Also included were a \$50 million increase in funding for Monetary Award Program awards for students from low-income households and a \$10 million increase in non-income-related Aim High grants for student achievers.

The legislators were avoiding some of the smaller tax hikes Pritzker had proposed to fund the operating budget.

But tax increases, including a \$1 increase in the levy for cigarettes, a doubling of the state's 19 cent-per-gallon motor fuel tax and higher fees for license plates and driver's licenses were part of the revenue sources for a \$45 billion multiyear public works improvement program for roads, mass transit and public building and university repair and renovation.

For transportation-related projects, the proposal

would double the state's motor fuel tax, increase the \$101 license plate fee to \$151 annually and charge electric vehicles \$248 a year rather than the current \$35 for two years.

Separately, the bill would allow municipalities in Cook County to levy a 3 cent-per-gallon motor fuel tax.

For building construction projects, it would increase the state's \$1.98-per-pack cigarette tax by \$1; impose a tax of 6% daily and 9% monthly on garage and lot parking; and increase by 50 cents to \$1.50 the real estate transfer tax for each \$500 of a property title transferred to a new owner. It also would double the maximum document fee auto dealers can charge for closing a car sale to \$300 and capture state revenues from expanded gambling and sports betting.

Of the transportation funding, 80% would be used for highway projects and 20% for mass transit, including the Chicago-area Regional Transportation Authority, Metra and the CTA.

Also part of the budget talks is a provision that would allow the state to enter into contract negotiations with the developers of a \$3.8 billion transit center as part of a mega-development along Lake Shore Drive across from Soldier Field.

Landmark Development is proposing a 34-acre development over train tracks between McCormick Place and the Field Museum. Under Landmark's proposal, the company and investors would cover the upfront costs of building the transit center, and the developer and the state would together pay off the remaining costs over 20 years using new tax revenue, leasing income and other funds. The state then would assume ownership of the center, which would bring together CTA, Metra and Amtrak trains, and collect all the revenue generated.

## Zion pair on trial on charges of aiding Islamic State

Feds say two were on FBI radar; defense alleges entrapment

There's no question Edward Schimenti and Joseph Jones were supporters of radical Islam.

The two buddies from far north suburban Zion had drawn the FBI's attention for years for their social media posts, including calls for the slaying of nonbelievers, videos of gruesome beheadings and propaganda by the Islamic State group espousing worldwide jihad.

Federal prosecutors say Schimenti and Jones converted their talk to action in 2017 when they helped train and equip a man they thought was going overseas to fight in Syria for the Islamic State group, also known as ISIS, even supplying him with cellphones they thought would be used as bomb detonators. The man turned out to be an undercover FBI informant.

"Even though (Schimenti and Jones) themselves weren't traveling abroad to fight for ISIS, they were helping the cause in their own way," Assistant U.S. Attorney G. David Rojas told a federal jury Friday in his opening statement as the trial for the two friends got underway in earnest.

Attorneys for Schimenti and Jones, meanwhile, say it was the federal government that went too far, targeting the pair because of their admittedly extremist views

and entrapping them through a series of undercover agents and informants who pressured them to actively support terrorism.

While the images and ideas that Schimenti and Jones — both U.S. citizens — shared might be "unsavory, scary or offensive," it's constitutionally protected speech that doesn't amount to a crime, Schimenti's attorney, Stephen Hall, told jurors in his opening remarks.

"Edward Schimenti likes to talk and talk and talk and talk and talk," Hall said. "He was an internet troll, hiding behind a computer screen, sending offensive videos over social media."

Schimenti and Jones, both 37, are charged with conspiracy to provide material support to a terrorist organization, an offense carrying up to 20 years in prison upon conviction.

Schimenti also is charged with lying to the FBI when he allegedly told agents in a video-recorded

interview after his arrest that the man they'd dropped off at O'Hare International Airport was flying to the Middle East to be reunited with family, not fight for the Islamic State group, court records show.

The trial before U.S. District Judge Andrea Wood at the Dirksen U.S. Courthouse is expected to last two weeks.

According to a 77-page criminal complaint filed in April 2017, Jones, also known as Yusuf Abdullaq, and Schimenti, who also went by Abdul Wali, pledged their allegiance to the Islamic State group and advocated on social media for violent extremism in support of the terrorist group.

In meetings with informants and undercover agents in Chicago and across the suburbs, the two were captured speaking in glowing terms about ISIS-inspired events, including the 2015 attacks in Paris in which gunmen killed

128, according to the complaint.

In recorded conversations, Schimenti also spoke wistfully of having the Islamic State group's stark brand of Islamic law implemented in the U.S., saying he'd like to see homosexuals dropped from the top of Willis Tower and the ISIS flag "on top of the White House," the complaint said.

The investigation began in September 2015 when an undercover agent posing as a motorist arrested in a traffic-related incident approached Jones at the Zion Police Department, where Jones was being interviewed about the recent slaying of a friend, according to the charges.

That agent in turn introduced Jones and Schimenti to others posing as devotees of the Islamic State group, including an informant they knew as Mohammed who told them he was going to the Middle East to join Islamic State ranks, according to the charges.

In February 2017, Schimenti took the informant to a gym in Zion to train for the battlefield, the complaint said. Remarkably on his own weight problem, Schimenti said on an undercover recording from the gym that what mattered most in jihad was "hand-to-hand" combat skills, not physical fitness.

"Man, you know I'm all big, fat," Schimenti said. "But (God willing) the brothers will just have me be the one to cut the neck."

Although the charges do not allege the two participated in any violence, Schimenti talked with the informant about future plans to attack the Naval Station Great

Lakes in North Chicago, a short distance from his home, the complaint alleged.

The recordings and social media postings detailed in the complaint made it clear that both Jones and Schimenti knew they were likely being watched by federal investigators but went along with the plot anyway.

Agents were indeed watching on April 7, 2017, as Schimenti and Jones dropped off Mohammed at O'Hare, according to the charges.

"Drench that land with they, they blood," Schimenti allegedly said as he and Jones saw the man off at the airport.

On Friday, prosecutors called as their first witness an FBI terrorism expert who testified about the rise of the Islamic State group. During his testimony, prosecutors played part of an Islamic State propaganda video showing terrorists clad in all black standing behind six captured Kurdish fighters on their knees and whispering prayers.

Prosecutors stopped the video as the terrorist narrating it in English held a large knife up to the throat of one of the captives.

In his opening statement, Jones' lawyer, James Vanzant, urged the jury not to get distracted by the violent images. What mattered, he said, was Jones and Schimenti were induced by the government into committing a crime.

"We're not here to decide whether ISIS does terrible things. They do," Vanzant said.

## Rescued dogs from Oklahoma arrive in Chicago

K-9s moved in wake of tornadoes, flooding

Paw by paw, about 30 dogs rescued from Oklahoma emerged from their crates with the help of volunteers as they arrived at their temporary home in Chicago.

"Atta boy," a volunteer said as one of the dogs got out of a van Friday morning. Some of the dogs wagged their tails and appeared excited as they were petted by volunteers, while others needed help and were carried out of the vans.

The dogs — varying in age and breed — arrived at PAWS Chicago's medical center in the Little Village neighborhood after making a 15-hour trip by car from Oklahoma with volunteers from the organization. In the past week, Oklahoma experienced two tornadoes — one near Oklahoma City and another in a suburb of Tulsa — and flooding in Muskogee County caused the evacuations of more than 2,400 people, The Associated Press reported.

Paula Fasseas, the chairperson of PAWS Chicago, said the organization sent a team of volunteers and medical staff to Oklahoma this week after reaching out to rescue groups there and learning there was an overflow of animals. In total, the group is rescuing about 60 animals, including cats and dogs.

"So what happens in times like this is people will come to the shelters and they'll just say, 'I can't do this anymore, you have to take my animal or this is my mother's animal, I can't keep it anymore,'" Fasseas said.

"Then people will also come and say 'I'm leaving, can you keep it for two weeks, I want to come back when I'm on my feet or when

the emergency is over," she said.

The Anti-Cruelty Society is also planning to bring about 180 rescued cats and dogs to the Chicago area. The group partnered with the Humane Society of United States to fly the animals from the Tulsa area to Chicago. They were expected to arrive Friday to undergo further medical evaluations.

One of the organizations PAWS worked with was Fort Gibson Animal Control, which is in Muskogee County where flooding has been reported. The dogs also came from the Humane Society of Cherokee County and other rescue groups in Oklahoma, according to PAWS Chicago.

The influx of animals after a natural disasters causes shelters to run out of space, Fasseas said.

Stacy Price, senior director of animal operations for PAWS, part of the team that traveled to Oklahoma this week, said the number of animals that needed homes was "overwhelming." Some of the animals the team examined were too sick and were sent to a local veterinarian for help.

"Anyone who was healthy and rambunctious, we loaded up and brought back," Price said.

Most of the puppies brought to Chicago were living outside and never got vaccines. Some of the older dogs didn't have much

general care during the first part of their lives, Price said.

Once they arrive in Chicago, the dogs undergo a medical evaluation. Dr. Barbara Kompore, of PAWS, evaluated two puppies on Friday, Custer and Carter, who are Labrador mixed-breed dogs. Among the things PAWS checks for are ticks near the ears. They

check a dog's mouth to figure out its age, Kompore said.

The puppies will go to foster homes to allow time for vaccinations and get healthy enough to be spayed or neutered, Price said. Other animals could be healthy enough to be adopted sooner, Price said.

Friday, the dogs settled into

their new digs inside the PAWS Chicago building. One dog peered out his window, overlooking a bustling 26th Street. Volunteers set out water, food and toys for the animals.

"Eat your food sweetie, it's right under you," a volunteer said to one of the dogs.

Eventually the dogs will be moved to the organization's adoption centers.

"What's really nice is we are able to get them a loving home that they will have attachments (to) because that's our goal, that they really feel loved and that they're protected for their life," Fasseas said.

## Task force: After harassment scandal, county needs training, protocols

A new report says offices controlled by Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle need updated protocols, better training and more transparency to respond to discrimination and harassment allegations.

That includes a call for the county to compare its employment policies with other jurisdic-

tions and publicly disclose data from its Equal Employment Opportunity office. That office also should change its procedures to ensure it is following up on complaints, and identify a range of potential discipline that could arise during an investigation.

The recommendations come after Preckwinkle's office established an anti-harassment working group in October amid misconduct allegations that

prompted the dismissal of John Keller, the county president's former chief of staff.

In September, Preckwinkle said she fired Keller for engaging in "inappropriate behavior on his personal time," a disclosure that arrived just before the launch of her failed mayoral bid.

But Preckwinkle knew of concerns regarding Keller's conduct six months earlier, the Tribune reported.

Preckwinkle's ensuing task force — made up of county employees, outside attorneys and consultants — released its review of county policies on Thursday. Its findings include results from an anonymous survey of some 1,500 employees, or slightly less than 60 percent of workers who received the survey.

"It is a top priority of my administration to create a workplace where employees and

members of the public are treated with respect and support," Preckwinkle said in a statement.

"The recommendations from the Working Group are thoughtful and practical and we already have implemented some of the action items and are working on the long-term recommendations."

now, since Foxx did not go on to formally withdraw her office and request a special prosecutor as the law requires, O'Brien said.

But Assistant State's Attorney Cathy McNeil Stein, voicing opposition to the petition on behalf of Foxx's office, said Foxx was not using the word "recuse" in the formal legal sense.

"Recusal" has a broad meaning that means you step away from the case," said Stein, who noted that Foxx "walled herself off" from the Smollett prosecution after recusing herself. "Recusal and actual conflict of interest are two completely different (things). ... It is wrong for the petitioner to say one thing means the other."

Toomin said he plans to rule on the issue June 21.

Before arguing over the appointment of a special prosecutor, the two sides spent another hour discussing a flurry of motions O'Brien had filed in recent weeks — requests that prosecutors called "absurd and completely meritless."

Toomin shot down O'Brien's attempts to boot Cook County prosecutors off the case; denied her permission to take depositions of Foxx and her top deputy; and rejected her multiple motions to transfer the case to another judge.

When O'Brien tried to respond after Toomin ruled that another judge would not hear the case, Toomin grew sharp, making it clear who still ruled from the bench.

"You're not running this courtroom," he told the former judge.

"Either you're going to go on to the next motion, or you will sit down."

O'Brien's attempts to take sworn testimony from Foxx and others are improper under the rules, charged prosecutors, who accused her of playing to the media.

"If you take what Ms. O'Brien is saying, that would mean any citizen if they didn't like a decision, if they didn't like what the state's attorney said in the press, would be able to come in, conduct discovery, bring the state's attorney in (under oath)," Stein said.

O'Brien sought the special prosecutor after Foxx faced fierce criticism over her office's dismissal of all charges against Smollett with little explanation less than three weeks after he was indicted on charges he staged an attack on himself.

In her petition, O'Brien highlighted how Foxx recused herself early in the investigation after communicating with a Smollett relative — only to later claim that it was not a recusal "in the legal sense" that would have required the entire office to withdraw from the prosecution.

Communications later released to the Tribune showed Foxx had asked police Superintendent Eddie Johnson to turn over the investigation to the FBI after she was approached by Tina Tchen, a former chief of staff to first lady Michelle Obama. A spokeswoman for Foxx's office said at the time that a Smollett relative was concerned about leaks from Chicago police to the news media.

O'Brien alleged that Foxx's actions created "a perception that justice was not served here, that Mr. Smollett received special

treatment."

Both county prosecutors and Smollett's attorneys have said the petition is legally flawed and that a special prosecutor would duplicate efforts already undertaken by Cook County Inspector General Patrick Blanchard. At Foxx's request, Blanchard agreed last month to investigate the office's handling of the short-lived Smollett prosecution.

Smollett, who is African American and openly gay, found himself at the center of an international media firestorm after he reported in late January being the victim of an attack by two people shouting racist and homophobic slurs.

But Smollett was charged with 16 felony counts of disorderly conduct after Chicago police determined that he had agreed to pay \$3,500 to two brothers he knew to stage the attack.

gunshots.

"I never thought this would happen in my building," Felton said.

Police initially said that 11 people had been killed and six injured in the attack. Later Friday, Cervera said a 12th victim in the shooting died on the way to the hospital.

Relatives of victims were told to gather at the Princess Anne Middle School for updates, even as representatives from the medical examiner's office were headed to the scene.

Paul Swain, 50, was among those who arrived at the school to reunite with loved ones who were in the building during the shooting.

He said he saw his fiancée from across the parking lot, clearly in an agitated state.

"I think she knew some of the people," he said.

Friday's shooting added another city to the growing list of places affected by a mass shooting. It is the deadliest since February, when a warehouse employee in Aurora, opened fire after being told he would lose his job. That gunman killed five people and injured five police officers before dying in a shootout with law enforcement personnel.

The shooting sent shock waves through Virginia Beach, the state's largest city and a popular vacation spot in southeastern Virginia.

Gov. Ralph Northam, who visited the scene Friday night, called it a "tragic day for Virginia Beach and our entire Commonwealth."

Public Works spokesman Drew Lankford, who works in the Operations building, left the office Friday afternoon to get a haircut. While he was gone, his daughter called and said there had been a shooter in his work building.

His daughter, who works in the City Hall building, said security told everyone to get under their desks. He rushed back to the office and saw officers taking cover behind parked cars with their guns drawn.

City Councilwoman Barbara Henley had just pulled up to the City Hall building when she heard sirens and saw police cars.

As she parked her car, she noticed city employees standing outside using their cellphones. Someone told her there was a shooting and she should leave. Henley had just gotten back in her car when she heard a voice shout, "Get down!"

People scattered. Henley said she'd never seen a similar situation at the Municipal Center, adding that security was recently "beefed up" in the City Hall building as a result of shooting incidents across the nation.

Cervera, the police chief, said it was too soon to provide details of the suspected shooter or how it unfolded, though it appeared to be quick. He said officers entered the building shortly after the first calls and confronted the gunman.

"The suspect was immediately confronted. ... Our citizens can rest easy tonight," Cervera said. "We do not have someone out in the community to do more harm."

agency Management and Communications.

Nick Roti, who heads the Chicago HIDTA, said he hopes more cameras and license plate readers will be installed along the Eisenhower as well as other Chicago-area expressways.

A former Chicago police official, Roti suggested that the vast network of police surveillance cameras on the West Side may have created a "balloon effect," causing some drug activity and

violent crime to be pushed to spots along the expressway. But with the addition of the cameras along the Eisenhower, Roti expressed hope that would impact shootings in those areas.

"We're not using these as like an overall kind of 'Big Brother.' We're going to pick out individual cars on the expressway," Roti said. "They'll probably primarily be used during investigations to actually prove that someone went down on the highway as part of a drug investigation. And then obviously, the very important part of it is also the shootings ... that go along with it."

Chicago police have struggled

over the years finding ways to combat the open-air drug markets on the West Side and their contribution to violent crime.

In 2017, police illustrated the link between violence and drug dealing by displaying maps at its headquarters with red dots for each shooting and blue dots for 911 calls of drug overdoses.

The West Side's Harrison patrol district, among the most violent of the city's 22 police districts, was littered with blue and red dots next to or on top of one another.

Complicating the challenge facing law enforcement is the re-emergence of the painkiller fentanyl — mixed with heroin and

other drugs — leading to more overdoses, many of them fatal.

During one week in April, fentanyl was blamed for 17 overdoses on the West Side that resulted in four deaths.

In fall 2015, the powerful narcotic was suspected of playing a role in as many as 75 overdoses in a three-day span in the city. Before that, the last major outbreak involving fentanyl occurred in the mid-2000s in Chicago.

Roti warned Friday that users face increased risks because they may be buying drugs with greater amounts of fentanyl and mixed with other narcotics.

"Fentanyl is being mixed into

types of different opiates and narcotics by drug traffickers with no rhyme or reason," he said. "People with an opioid-use disorder have no idea what they are ingesting, and there is a high likelihood that fentanyl will be present in wildly varying percentages."

To treat overdose victims on the spot, more Chicago police officers have been carrying Narcan, a brand name for naloxone that reverses the effects of opioids. Paramedics also distribute the medication.

# Trump sticks to Mexico tariff threat

US businesses warn of dire effect amid immigration action

WASHINGTON — Despite pushback from U.S. business, Mexico and Capitol Hill, President Donald Trump doubled down Friday on his threat to slap a 5% tariff on Mexican imports unless America's southern neighbor cracks down on Central American migrants trying to cross the U.S. border.

U.S. manufacturers said the tariff, set to take effect June 10, would have devastating consequences on them and American consumers.

U.S. stocks tumbled on Wall Street in response to Trump's planned action.

"Imposing tariffs on goods from Mexico is exactly the wrong move," said Neil Bradley, executive vice president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which is exploring legal action in response to the tariffs. "These tariffs will be paid by American families and businesses without doing a thing to solve the very real problems at the border. Instead, Congress and the president need to work together to address the serious problems at the border."

In a further display of the Trump administration's determination to slow unauthorized migration from Central America, dozens of Homeland Security agents and investigators will deploy to Guatemala, according to U.S. officials with knowledge of the plans.

The Department of

Homeland Security personnel will work as "advisers" to Guatemala's national police and migration authorities, and they will aim to disrupt and interdict human smuggling operations, the officials said Friday, speaking on the condition of anonymity.

U.S. authorities hope that the effort will cut off popular routes to the United States and deter migrants from beginning their journeys north through Mexico.

Plans call for at least several dozen DHS agents and investigators, and one DHS source briefed on the plans said approximately 80 U.S. law enforcement personnel will deploy as part of the mission.

Acting DHS Secretary Kevin McAleenan has advocated for the more muscular DHS presence and finalized the agreement with President Jimmy Morales and top Guatemala officials during meetings this week in Guatemala City.

Trump has previously vowed to cut off aid to Central America in an effort to pressure the region's leaders.

But McAleenan has urged more — not less — cooperation with Central America, and his plan to assign personnel from U.S. Customs and Border Protection and Homeland Security Investigations to work alongside Guatemalan police amounts to an at-

tempt to put more weight behind the approach.

The U.S. agents likely would deploy to Guatemala and its border with Mexico for weeks at a time in an "advisory" role. U.S. security personnel assigned to Guatemala are typically authorized to carry weapons.

Meanwhile, Mexican President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador dispatched his foreign secretary to Washington to try to negotiate a solution to the threat of new tariffs.

Mexico has stepped up raids on migrant caravans traveling through the southern states of Chiapas and Oaxaca this year. It has deported thousands of migrants and frustrated thou-

sands more who wait endlessly for permits that would allow them to travel legally through Mexico.

Administration officials have said Mexico could prevent the tariffs from kicking in by securing its southern border with Guatemala, cracking down on criminal smuggling organizations and entering into a "safe third country agreement" that would make it difficult for those who enter Mexico from other countries to claim asylum in the U.S.

Trump said the percentage will gradually increase — up to 25% — until the migration problem is remedied.

"Mexico has taken ad-

vantage of the United States for decades," Trump said in a tweet. "Because of the Dems, our Immigration Laws are BAD. Mexico makes a FORTUNE from the U.S., have for decades, they can easily fix this problem. Time for them to finally do what must be done!"

Keeping the economy rolling also is critical to Trump's re-election, and the business sector was not happy with the president's planned tariff on Mexican imports.

"These proposed tariffs would have devastating consequences on manufacturers in America and on American consumers," said Jay Timmons, chief executive officer of the National Association of Manufacturers. "We have taken our concerns to the highest levels of the administration and strongly urge them to consider carefully the impact of this action on working families across this country."

Some of Trump's fellow Republicans in Congress opposed the tariff.

The tariff threat comes at a peculiar time, given how hard the administration has been pushing for passage of the USMCA, which would update the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Sen. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, a usual Trump ally and chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, slammed the president's action, saying it was a "misuse of presidential tariff authority" that would burden American consumers and "seriously jeopardize passage of USMCA."

## Spelling bee crowns 8 champs amid buzz it was too E-A-S-Y

OXON HILL, Md. — There were warning signs throughout a marathon day of spelling that this Scripps National Spelling Bee would not conclude like any other in the event's 94-year history.

Rishik Gandhasri sensed it as he stepped to the microphone for the ninth round of Thursday night's prime-time finals, when he was one of eight spellers remaining onstage. "Just out of curiosity," Rishik asked pronouncer Jacques Bailly, "do you happen to know what time it is?"

It was 11:18 p.m. Forty-five minutes later, Rishik was a champion. So was Erin Howard. So were Saketh Sundar, Shruthika Padhy, Sohuh Sukhantankar, Abhijay Kodali, Christopher Serrao and, finally, Rohan Raja. The eight co-champions closed out the bee by spelling 47 consecutive words correctly.

Erin was the first champion without South Asian heritage since Evan O'Dorney in 2007.

All eight received the full winner's freight of \$50,000 in cash and a new, custom-designed trophy, because Scripps simply could not come up with words diffi-

cult enough to challenge them.

There was plenty of concern after the bee ended in ties three years in a row, from 2014-2016, that the very best spellers might be too good for the bee. Scripps came up with a written tiebreaker test of both spelling and vocabulary. After two years in which the test wasn't needed, bee officials decided it was too burdensome on the spellers and got rid of it.

The rules going into this year's bee called for, at most, three co-champions. A contingency plan for even more winners was developed on the fly Thursday afternoon, after bee officials evaluated spellers' performance in the early final rounds.

It took more than 5 hours to narrow the field from 50 kids to 16.

"We didn't go into the competition tonight not knowing that this was a possibility," said Paige Kimble, the bee's executive director.

Bailly, the longtime pronouncer and the public face of the bee, broke the news to a stunned crowd in a convention center ballroom outside Washington after the eight eventual champs had gone through two consecutive perfect rounds.

"Champion spellers, we are now in uncharted territory," Bailly said.

There would be three rounds, Bailly said, and anyone who got through them would be a champion. No one came close to missing a word.

For the winners, fatigue was the only real concern.

"I'm very glad they stopped where they did," said Shruthika, a 13-year-old from Cherry Hill, New Jersey.

"I feel like there was no better way to do it," said Saketh, who's 13 and lives in Clarksville, Maryland. "I don't know if I would've won if they kept going."

But there were murmurs of discontent among the ex-spellers and spelling experts in the crowd. The words, they said, were just too easy. Naysa Modi, last year's runner-up, was in tears as the confetti fell.

She said the winners were deserving, but the final words weren't tough enough for them, or her.

Among the words that earned spellers a share of the title: "auslaut," "palma," "cernuous" and "odylic."

"This would never happen at my bee," said Rahul Walia, founder of the South Asian Spelling Bee, where Sohuh defeated Abhijay for the title last year.

## Dems ask intel chiefs to help monitor Barr's review of probe

WASHINGTON — The top Democrats on the House and Senate Intelligence committees notified the nation's spy chiefs Friday that they intend to closely monitor efforts by Attorney General William Barr to review the government probe of President Donald Trump's 2016 campaign — and expect them to inform lawmakers about the extent to which their agencies are cooperating.

House Intelligence Committee Chairman Rep. Adam Schiff, D-Calif., sent letters to the heads of the CIA, FBI, NSA and the Director of National Intelligence, demanding in-person briefings to discuss what materials Barr has sought thus far and that copies are to be shared with the committee. He insisted, too, that they notify the panel in advance if Barr intends to declassify anything, noting when they disagreed with his orders and why.

In a separate letter, the Senate Intelligence Committee's top Democrat, Sen. Mark Warner of Virginia, asked the spy chiefs to "immediately" inform the panel "if you see signs" that Barr's inquiry risks compromising intelligence-gathering sources and methods, affecting relationships with foreign liaisons, or adversely impacting the intelligence community's workforce.

He also asked that they notify the panel of any "selective declassification" that appeared politically motivated.

Trump last week granted Barr "full and complete authority" to declassify government secrets, and directed the intelligence agencies to comply swiftly with the attorney general's audit of their work related to the 2016 election. The move has outraged congressional Democrats, who

continue to clash with the White House over its refusal to cooperate with their investigations of the president, while unnerving current and former FBI officials and those in the intelligence community who have denied Trump's claims that "spying" was conducted on his campaign.

Barr's inquiry "represents a disturbing effort by the President and the Attorney General to politicize the Intelligence Community and law enforcement," Schiff wrote in his letters, saying Trump and Barr were "engaged in a public campaign to further a conspiracy theory" and that their efforts could undermine national security.

Barr has been criticized by former FBI director James Comey, among others, for also using the term "spying" to characterize how investigators monitored some Trump campaign advisers who had contacts with Russians. His critics maintain that such surveillance was a proper part of a counterintelligence investigation.

In an interview that aired Friday on "CBS This Morning," Barr stated that investigations surrounding Trump's 2016 campaign were "unprecedented" and crossed "a serious red line." "People have to under-

stand, you know, one of the things here is that these efforts in 2016, these counterintelligence activities that were directed at the Trump campaign, were not done in the normal course and not through the normal procedures as far as I can tell," Barr said. It's difficult, he added, "not (to) feel that there was gross bias at work."

Barr appeared to be referencing anti-Trump text messages exchanged by former FBI counterintelligence official Peter Strzok and former FBI lawyer Lisa Page, who were involved in the bureau's probes of Trump and his political opponent, Democrat Hillary Clinton.

Republicans in Congress have argued that the texts are evidence of bias within the FBI, though a Justice Department inspector general's report released last year concluded that while some individuals might have expressed their political leanings and opinions, bias had not affected the Clinton probe.

Barr scoffed at concerns that he might compromise intelligence-gathering, noting he would declassify material only in "an exceptional circumstance" and in consultation with the agencies. But he didn't swear off the possibility of making some material public.

## Expert says Assange showed signs of 'psychological torture'

GENEVA — An independent expert for the U.N.-backed Human Rights Council who visited Julian Assange in a London prison says the WikiLeaks founder "showed all symptoms typical for prolonged exposure to psychological torture."

The U.N. human rights office said Friday that Nils Melzer, the special rapporteur on torture, visited Assange on May 9 with two medical experts in

examining potential victims of torture and ill-treatment.

U.S. authorities accuse Assange of violating the Espionage Act over publication of secret documents.

Sweden wants to question him about sexual misconduct allegations.

Assange lived in Ecuador's Embassy in London from 2012 until he was arrested in April after Ecuadorian officials withdrew his asylum status.

## Police: Suicide car bomb targets US convoy in Afghan capital

KABUL, Afghanistan — A car bomb targeting a U.S. convoy exploded early Friday in an eastern Kabul neighborhood, leaving four Afghan civilians dead and three wounded and lightly wounding four American forces, authorities said. It was the second suicide attack in as many days to rattle the Afghan capital.

The suicide bomber struck as the convoy passed through Kabul's

eastern Yakatot neighborhood, where U.S. and NATO forces maintain complexes. Facilities operated by the Afghan National Security Forces located nearby.

In a telephone interview, a Taliban spokesman took responsibility for Friday's attack.

On Thursday, six people were killed when a suicide bomber blew himself up outside an Afghan army training center,

## Record floods breach Arkansas levee, spill over 2 in Missouri

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Relentless flooding in the central U.S. Friday inundated communities and damaged or spilled over levees on three major rivers in two states.


The fast-flowing Arkansas River smashed a 40-foot hole in a levee in western Arkansas, causing water to spill into a nearby community. In northeast Missouri, a levee was overtopped on the Mississippi River, and another

levee was topped on the Missouri River in the central part of the state.

The flooding has been building for days because of heavy rainfall upstream.

In Arkansas, the levee breached at Dardanelle, about 60 miles northwest of Little Rock.

Yell County officials had anticipated the breach and urged residents in the nearby Holla Bend area to evacuate Thursday.

## Judge says Missouri clinic can keep providing abortions

ST. LOUIS — A judge issued an order Friday to keep Missouri's only abortion clinic operating over the objections of state health officials, delivering a courtroom victory after a string of setbacks in state legislatures around the U.S.

St. Louis Circuit Judge Michael Stelzer said Planned Parenthood's St. Louis clinic can continue providing abortions despite the Missouri health department's refusal to renew its license due to a variety of patient safety issues. He said the temporary restraining order was neces-

sary "to preserve the status quo and prevent irreparable injury" to Planned Parenthood.

With the abortion license set to expire at midnight Friday, Planned Parenthood pre-emptively sued this week and argued that the state was "weaponizing" the licensing process. Planned Parenthood said that absent court intervention, Missouri would become the first state without an abortion clinic since the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 Roe v. Wade ruling that legalized the procedure nationwide.

The clinic's license "shall not expire and shall remain in effect" until a ruling is issued on Planned Parenthood's request for a permanent injunction, Stelzer's ruling says. A hearing is set for Tuesday morning.

In refusing to renew the license, Missouri's health department cited "failed surgical abortions in which women remained pregnant" and legal violations.

"Today is a victory for women across Missouri, but this fight is far from over," Planned Parenthood Federation of America CEO Dr. Leana Wen said in a statement.

## Hungary to extend search time in boat sinking

BUDAPEST, Hungary — As divers descended Friday into the Danube, Hungarian authorities predicted it would take an extended search to find the 21 people still missing after a boat carrying South Korean tourists collided with a cruise ship and sank into the river in Budapest.

Seven people so far are confirmed dead and seven others were rescued.

Divers in full equipment went into Danube but were unable to inspect the wreckage of the boat due to the extremely murky waters and heavy currents from recent rains. Officials said it could take days to

recover the 70-year-old boat, which was built in the former Soviet Union.

Just hours after Wednesday night's collision, the body of one victim was found nearly more than 7 miles downstream from the site of the accident. The wreck is located more than 20 feet deep.

## US Catholic Church sees rise in claims of sex-abuse

NEW YORK — The U.S. Roman Catholic Church says allegations of child sex abuse by clerics more than doubled in its latest 12-month reporting period, and that spending on victim compensation and child protection surged above \$300 million.

The annual report of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops was released Friday. It says that from July 1, 2017, to June 30, 2018, more than 1,300 adults came forward with over 1,400 allegations of abuse.

That was up from nearly 700 allegations in the previous year.

The report says Catholic dioceses and religious orders spent over \$300 million during the reporting period on payments to victims, legal fees and child-protection efforts. That was up 14% from the previous year and double the amount spent in the 2014 fiscal year.

**In Iran:** Nuclear inspectors reported Iran continued adhering to its 2015 accord with world powers, giving European nations room to pursue their troubled efforts to prevent a total collapse of a pact facing intensifying U.S. pressure.

International Atomic Energy Agency monitors said Iran's inventories of enriched uranium and heavy water remained below the thresholds allowed under the 2015 agreement, according to a restricted report seen by Bloomberg News.

The IAEA conducted snap inspections "to all the sites and locations in Iran which it needed to visit," read the atomic watchdog agency's 6-page report that was circulated Thursday among diplomats in Vienna.

## Rush hospital temporarily closes units

Report: Mental health patients' safety of concern

Rush University Medical Center has temporarily closed its three inpatient mental health units following concerns from the state about patient safety.

Rush, one of the city's major academic medical centers, closed the units in late March after the Illinois Department of Public Health found deficiencies in how the hospital protects its psychiatric patients from harming themselves through hanging or strangulation, according to a department report done on behalf of the federal govern-

ment.

Rush spokesman Charlie Jolie said the department was visiting the hospital to investigate an earlier data breach, and while there also looked into a complaint about an attempted suicide. The state's report includes details about a woman who was a psychiatric inpatient at Rush in March when she punctured her neck with a ballpoint pen.

About five patients were transferred to other facilities, Jolie said. The units have about 70 beds, he said.

The units are undergoing renovations to correct the situation. Rush was already planning renovations in response to similar concerns raised earlier by the Joint Commission, which accredits hospitals, according to a

recent Rush financial filing.

"We were in the process of addressing those issues but decided to close the units to allow construction workers the full access needed to complete renovations more quickly and with less patient disruption," Jolie said in an email.

Construction is expected to wrap up in late June, and Rush plans to reopen the units upon approval from the state Department of Public Health.

The state health department visited again after the units' closure and found that "the immediate jeopardy to patient health and safety" was gone, but Rush was still out of compliance, according to an April letter from the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services to the

head of Rush University Medical Center. Rush has until June 30 to come into compliance or could risk no longer being able to participate in Medicare.

Jolie said it's been more than 20 years since a patient

has died by suicide in the unit at Rush.

An estimated 31 to 51 psychiatric inpatients die by suicide in the U.S. each year, and hanging is the most common method when hospital patients kill themselves,

according to a study published last year in The Joint Commission Journal on Quality and Patient Safety.

Hospitals with inpatient mental health units are required by the federal government to minimize hanging and strangulation risks as a condition of receiving money from Medicare.

The state department found a number of issues at Rush, including protruding door hinges, furniture that was not attached to the floor, and bathroom sinks that stuck out from the walls with open space under them "which could potentially allow the sink to be used for hanging," according to the state's report.

## Lawmakers pass bill to help Medicaid patients keep coverage

Legislation looks to help hospitals get paid faster

After years of criticism from patients and hospitals, Illinois lawmakers have passed a bill aimed at fixing a slew of problems within the state's Medicaid system.

Illinois residents on Medicaid — a state- and federally funded health insurance program that serves the poor and disabled — have complained of trouble enrolling and staying in the program. The state has long had a backlog of applications, and many Medicaid members

say they wrongly lost coverage when they had to renew it.

And last year, many of the state's hospitals began lamenting the system through which private insurers and organizations that administer Medicaid benefits were paying them. Hospitals said that those insurers — part of the state's Medicaid managed care system — were frequently denying their claims for payment and paying them late, forcing hospitals to redirect valuable dollars. The state's Medicaid managed care system, which is supposed to improve care, was expanded and revamped last year under former Gov. Bruce Rauner.

The bill that passed the

Senate on Thursday night takes aim at those issues. It passed both houses unanimously and now heads to the governor for his signature.

About 2.9 million Illinois residents are on Medicaid, with about 2.1 million of those in Medicaid managed care.

The bill would require the state to review the process through which Medicaid members renew their coverage and simplify how Medicaid members can prove their incomes, to make sure they're still eligible.

It would also require Medicaid managed care organizations to expedite payments to certain types of hospitals; require the Department of Healthcare and

Family Services to implement a dispute resolution process and be the final decision-maker when hospitals and the insurers disagree about payments; and allow the department to buy technology to better understand claims and disputed claims made to the managed care organizations.

The Illinois Health and Hospital Association said in a statement Friday that the bill "lays the foundation to begin addressing" hospitals' biggest concerns with payments from Medicaid managed care organizations.

The association said denials from Medicaid managed care organizations, along with late payments, put "extreme financial pressure on

hospitals and jeopardizes access to care for all Medicaid beneficiaries."

The Illinois Association of Medicaid Health Plans also supports the measure, with Executive Director Samantha Olds Frey saying it will bring greater transparency to the system, helping to make sure "we are talking to one another as health plans and providers rather than at one another."

Improving the process by which Medicaid members can renew coverage will also help bring down denials, she said. Now, many claims are denied because Medicaid members get kicked off Medicaid during that renewal process, without them or doctors knowing it, she said.

"It's incredibly disruptive to their health care and their trust in the program and their trust in the system," Olds Frey said.

The state has long had a backlog of applications for Medicaid and Medicaid renewals, called redeterminations. Those backlogs, however, have started to shrink. In May, the state had a backlog of 106,504 initial applications for Medicaid coverage that were taking more than 45 days, down from 141,479 in February. The state had a backlog of 164,501 renewal applications that were 60 days or more behind, as of March.

## Fans deserve more protection from foul balls

Cubs hitter Albert Almora Jr. was in anguish Wednesday night in Houston after his line-drive foul ball struck a young girl. He knew immediately after making contact that he'd sent a dangerous projectile into the stands. "I want to put a net around the whole stadium," he said.

That's an idea Major League Baseball should consider. Foul balls are part of the game, and part of the fun. But only when a hitter's mistimed swing delivers a lazy pop fly in your direction and — *I got it, I got it* — you make a heroic barehanded grab.

#### Line drives are something else.

Major league foul balls can come off the bat at speeds that exceed 100 mph. Bats go flying too.

A Bloomberg News report in 2014 found that 1,750 major league fans are hurt by foul balls each season. In 2017 a toddler sitting with her grandparents at Yankee Stadium was struck in the face by a 105 mph foul that broke her nose and orbital bones and caused bleeding in her brain.

Last year, a 79-year-old woman at Dodger Stadium was hit in the head and died several days later.

Baseball stadiums rely on protective netting to keep fans safe, but only seats behind home plate or just up the line are included. In response to serious incidents, MLB last year extended the coverage area to the far ends of dugouts at minimum. That isn't good enough. The girl at the Houston Astros game was sitting in the area just beyond the visitors dugout. The woman in California was hit by a ball that cleared the top of the netting.

#### Attending a game has become more dangerous

because pitchers throw harder and hitters are stronger. Stadiums, meanwhile, are seating fans closer to the action. Most fans don't have the reaction time of a pro athlete. And, it should be noticed, fans may not even be paying attention to the game. They're eating hot dogs, filling out their score cards or looking at their phones.

Team owners face competing pressures: Of course they have an obligation and a desire to keep attendees safe. But fans who pay a lot of money for prime seats don't want an obstructed view, or lost opportunities to catch a ball. The most passionate advocates for more extensive netting may be the players, who understand the damage a baseball can do. Almora was devastated by the scene of the girl being rushed up the aisles.

The solution to this problem, as with many things pertaining to baseball, involves physics and probabilities. It's clear too many screaming liners are hurting people. Whether protective netting needs to be extended another 20 feet, or all the way to the foul poles, to protect more fans, can be calculated. The nets may have to be raised a few feet as well.

Baseball's a great game. It should be safe to attend. MLB and team owners should do more to protect their fans from injury — and protect their players from distress.

North Korean leader Kim Jong Un finds himself at a pivotal fork in the road. ... Pyongyang is running short on world leaders to turn to for relief from crippling sanctions. With famine on the horizon, due to a 1.4 million-ton shortage in grain supplies this year, brinkmanship diplomacy can take North Korea no further. ... At this juncture, only North Korea's closest ally is capable of providing Kim with the key to embracing economic reform without nuclear weapons, ensuring a bright future for the region for generations to come. ...

If China were to provide sufficient economic aid to stabilize North Korea in the shocks that would follow denuclearization, Kim could take full advantage of the opportunity to reform the system, open up the economy and integrate it with the world economy, creating a new source of domestic legitimacy and ensuring internal security for the regime. ... Staring down the impending famine

and unrelenting economic sanctions, Kim must decide which way to turn: toward economic crisis, humanitarian calamity and ultimate illegitimacy, or toward reformation of the system and the establishment of permanent prosperity.

To follow in the footsteps of its closest ally, North Korea needs a blueprint for economic development, as this is the only measure which can ensure domestic legitimacy and internal security — and Xi Jinping is the only head of state who holds the key to unlocking this path.

# The Queen of Tape

Anna Dominguez creates pop culture, sports pieces by using only that item

It took nine years of dedication to the sticky stuff known as tape, but Anna Dominguez is stepping into the artist's spotlight.

The Gold Coast resident recently had her first permanent piece unveiled at the St. Jane Hotel — a 4-by-4 piece that highlights the building's intricate architecture and gave a nod to the namesake of the location, Jane Addams, founder of Hull House and social activist, via quotes: "Nothing could be worse than the fear that one had given up too soon, and left one unexpended effort that might have saved the world."

The Queen of Tape has arrived. And she's bringing her brand of female empowerment with her in her tape works that meld her love of sports, art and pop culture.

"I always knew in my heart that I wanted to be an artist," she said. "I was making art one day and I just said, 'I'm kind of tired of all this normal stuff. I need to find something different to make stuff with.' So I walked to the art store and they had four rolls of colored tape. I started to play around with them and lay them down on the canvas.

"My first piece was of the Chicago skyline. I got a lot of great feedback from friends and family, so I just kept doing it. Nine years later, I went from doing simple skylines to doing intricate faces."

Dominguez, 32, a Dominican University graduate, has since created art for Brian Urlacher, soccer star Carli Lloyd, former star of "The Big Bang Theory" Kaley Cuoco and soon will be delivering her artwork of Serena Williams to the tennis phenom. A look at her site shows the celebrities she has featured in her works.

"I drew her face from an image, and her hair is filled with words of empowerment in nine different

languages," Dominguez said of her Serena image. "I thought that was important because we're not just trying to empower women here, we're trying to empower women around the world."

Referrals and commissions keep coming in and now, sponsored by ShurTech (manufacturer and marketer of adhesive tape and consumer home and office products), Dominguez is setting her sights on living up to the name she coined for herself.

"When I started this, no one else was doing this and I thought what is the highest power of a woman in the world?" she said. "I thought it was queen, so I just try to live up to it."

Her signature is a heart with wings and a crown or the letters Q and T with a crown.

"When I started nine years ago, there was no genre, there was no name for it really, and I just called it 'tape art' or 'taping,'" Dominguez said. "Now I noticed the

other day that people are hashtagging #tapeart and it's a thing now — it's like a new form of art and it's getting a name now."

Dominguez has made a name for herself through persistence.

She remembers wanting to be sponsored by ShurTech and kept reaching out to the company to get its attention. She finally got it and now has access to all kinds of tape and colors that come out — masking, desk, painters, packaging, electrical, duct. In her studio,

she currently has 42 different colors.

"I have really grown in skill," she said. "I make faces out of tape better than I draw them, which is really weird. I sketch them first and I use that sketch as my blueprint. I'll use my tracing paper that I draw on as my blueprint, and when I cut it I bandage it back up with clear tape so it doesn't rip into shreds as I'm using it. So I literally use every kind of tape — that's how I've been able to blend colors, get different shades and just expand the variety of tape that I have."

St. Jane Hotel owner Carrie Meghie commissioned Dominguez to do a piece for the hotel after she gifted Meghie's charity with some artwork years ago. Dominguez's talent came to mind when Meghie was looking for art for the hotel.

"When we recently renovated and rebranded the hotel, it was a real opportunity for us to pick some unique and interesting pieces and find some artists who really spoke to us," she said. "We're doing something interesting and supporting local too."

Dominguez has come a long way since she used art as a way of therapy to distract her while being in the foster care system as a youth. Now with her brand of art, she's trying to make inroads in the art world for more female muralists in the Chicago area.

"We have to break that barrier," she said. "I know a lot of talented female artists, and the recognition is not there. I'm definitely trying to make that pathway."

"I want to be an example to other girls, other women and people in general and prove that you can be an artist, make money, live off of it and be a great example for the community and help people with your art."

'Stravinsky & The Joffrey Ballet' ★★ 1/2

# First-time collaboration between the Joffrey, CSO

This was no ordinary night at the CSO.

The Chicago Symphony Orchestra has invited dancers to the stage at Orchestra Hall on a handful of occasions, but surprisingly, a collaborative concert with the Joffrey Ballet hadn't taken place — until now. So it was with giddy delight that I entered the hall Thursday to find the musicians seated atop the marley — a commonly used vinyl surface for dancing — and a platform with chairs and music stands built at the back of the stage.

This wide-ranging program of orchestral works by Rossini and Ravel waited until Act 2 for the highlight of the evening: an ensemble of CSO musicians climbed atop the platform to play, while a handful of Joffrey dancers whirled in front, personifying two Stravinsky suites: "Dumbarton Oaks" and "Pulcinella."

Maestro Matthias Pintscher opened the evening with a brisk take on Gioachino Rossini's Overture to "The Barber of Seville." Whimsical solos abound in this recognizable jaunt — make sure to watch trombonist Charles Vernon near the end; you won't be disappointed.

Two selections by Maurice Ravel round out the dance-free pieces, with "Mother Goose" completing the first half and the angelic "Pavane for a Dead Princess" tucked between the Stravinsky works in the second. Both of these, originally composed for piano, have beautifully rich orchestration which foreshadow the impressionist composers of the next generation. A murky, mysterious line of low strings and contrabassoon lay the ground floor of "Mother Goose," from which extraordinary flourishes pop out — from the horns and woodwinds, of course, but fantastical sound effects also come from the violins striking their strings.

Among ballet audiences, Igor Stravinsky is known for his ballets, the most popular of which are "The Rite of Spring," "Firebird" and "Petrushka." "Pulcinella," by contrast, is a score heard less often, a bright and cheery romp compared to the relative brashness of his other ballets. "Pulcinella" marked Stravinsky's shift toward neoclassicism.

Ballet nerdism aside, it makes sense that Christopher Wheeldon might opt in to Stravinsky, and given Joffrey's long-standing affection for the choreographer, it makes sense that they'd choose his 2008 work "Commedia," set to

the "Pulcinella" score. It's an adequate closer for this program, an abstract work which winks at commedia dell'arte in the dancers' jester-styled unitards.

It might be the complete opposite of "Bliss!" a world premiere by local choreographer Stephanie Martinez which opens the second act. Accompanied by Stravinsky's sparsely appointed "Dumbarton Oaks," Martinez tries to excavate the guts of this multilayered score which was, unlike the other Stravinsky work, not originally intended for dancing.

Martinez pulls from a grab bag of styles, including ballet, jazz and

even hip-hop, with some goofier moments giving the sense of a band of bumbling boys bro-ing out on a bright summer day. Not to be forgotten, the cast's two women — Yumi Kanazawa and Anais Bueno — hold their own with a cute and sassy duet and extraordinary partnering as the group of men tangle them up and over themselves.

But Orchestra Hall proves to be an awkward space for dancing; with neither wings nor beefy stage lighting, these pieces look casual, unfinished and less polished than they could or should be. But I'm not trying to say this

program was a failure by any means. If our city's largest and most celebrated performing arts institutions aren't collaborating, pushing themselves, getting uncomfortable and sharing audiences, then what are they doing?

"Stravinsky & The Joffrey Ballet" continues through Saturday at Orchestra Hall, 220 S. Michigan Ave., \$47-\$252 at 312-296-3000 and www.cso.org.





## Cousin may cut ties with dying kin

**Dear Amy:** I am the youngest first cousin in a very large family. I grew up in a different state but visited the family frequently until my father's death in 1986.

I intentionally strayed from my relatives because our views drastically differ. Many of them are high school dropouts with multiple children from many different relationships. They also rely heavily on public assistance as a means of support. I do not condone this, especially when an individual is capable of employment. My spouse and I are married for 28 years with two grown children. They are both college graduates going on to pursue their master's degrees.

The family is well aware of my health issues and my mantra about life. They have mocked me for completing a college degree as an adult student with the desire to attend law school in my mid-40s.

Four relatives are in their 70s with various health problems, including stage four cancer. I want to help out because I am the youngest, despite the distance and my health issues. Overall, they do not call, write or ask how I am on any occasion when I have reached out to them.

My husband said to cut off ties like before. He sees how upset I become after talking to them. Is it OK to break ties with a relative who is terminally ill?

**Dear Fed Up:** After so much time living far from family and having (what seems like) minimal contact, why cut ties now, just

before your relative's death? Do you feel it is important to make a final punishing statement to this dying family member as you exit from your extended family?

You seem conflicted. On the one hand, you are both judged and judgmental. On the other, you say you want to help. And yet you present practical reasons that helping (in person) would be impossible. I think you might feel better about all of this if you both kept your distance and offered some emotional and familial support.

Many of us are loosely encased in families composed of some people we would not choose as friends. This presents a huge challenge but also the potential for being the decent, kind, expansive and emotionally generous person you might take pride in being.

I suggest writing a warmly worded letter to your dying family member. Enclose an old photo (if you have one), and share a happier/less-odious memory of time spent with that person (if you have one). If you can't manage a shred of compassion toward a dying person, then you might not be the upstanding person you claim to be.

**Dear Amy:** Yesterday I was standing in line at a local ice cream place and a fake service dog attacked me. It was a tiny dog. It didn't bite through my pants, and the dog's owner (an employee) came out and moved its rope to a different place.

This is in Marin County, California. Everyone here thinks their dogs are service dogs. This one was

wearing a vest, but it was tied to a tree, not helping a disabled person. People like this cause problems for people who really need service dogs.

I have also encountered so-called service dogs off leash. How is this helpful? Why are people so self-centered around here?

**Dear Once Bitten:** If the animal that bit your pants was a genuine service animal, then what was it doing being roped to a tree? It would have been legitimate for you to ask the dog's human: "Excuse me, but aside from biting customers, what service is this dog performing?" A word to the manager also might have been in order.

Many states are pushing legislation to curb the onslaught of faux service or "comfort" animals. Surely their presence undermines the important work legitimate service animals perform.

People who don't have children have the right to weigh in when they see appalling behavior!

# Eddie Izzard goes all-in on politics

Near the end of the first of his two nights of shows at the Chicago Theatre on Thursday, the British comedian Eddie Izzard let out a kind of goodbye to all this: "This might be my last tour," he said, "before politics."


Izzard — a nouveau Glenda Jackson, sprinkled with Al Franken — has made his political ambitions clear for years. He did so on his "Force Majeure" tour in 2014. He did so at the United Center in 2010, when he was on a quest to prove stand-ups could fill arenas. I even remember him mentioning such ambition in "Sexie" in 2003.

I've seen Izzard six times in Chicago over 20 years —

and once, in 1998, when he was still a nobody in New York. Every time, he has revealed his formidable, poly-lingual intellect behind the very elaborate dressing. He always has seen himself as much as a public intellectual as a comic.

But this show, "Wunderbar," felt different. It's less flashy than the others (the signature opening *son et lumiere* show notwithstanding) and is composed merely of Izzard himself, with intermission.

There is a coherent world view — "be brave and curious, not fearful and suspicious" — and you can intuit Izzard gravitating toward a political manifesto as, to use his words, "a radical moderate," meaning he is positioning himself as

a pro-European voice in an age of Brexit. His point of view, he said, expressing much of it in English, French and German, is that our time on this planet is

short and that you might as well do positive things before you "explode."

"And we all explode," he said.

Early in his career, Izzard was often coy about his trans identity, emphasizing individuality and rarely attaching himself to anyone else who might be in the same situation. But that has vanished.

He has politicized ("weaponized," he said) his trans self. He came out years ago, he reminded us, but he has made further changes. None of that is

exclusionary or lacking in humor.

"The boobs are from IKEA," he said at one point, alluding to their coming with assembly instructions ("took me years to get them level"). But the guts of his show revolve around opposition to the "1930s politics" that, he said, have taken a grip on broad swaths of the both the U.K. and U.S.

Longtime fans will also see more of his early personal biography — moving from Yemen to Northern Ireland to England and escaping a life of accoun-

tancy in Sheffield, for god's sake.

He is more emotional more than I've seen him before. Izzard lost his mother years ago, and she often has haunted his shows. But "Wunderbar" also has much of his father, recently deceased. In fact, the most moving part of the show involves Izzard retelling his father's last joke (it involves a rabbit entering a butcher shop looking for a carrot and it is a doozie).

I was also tickled by a riff on how dogs bark — Izzard seemed most fascinated by canine surety. You never hear a dog bark tentatively or with conditions. A pooch with something to say has the courage of conviction. It felt as if Izzard, a keen observer in high heels, was taking notes.

"This century could be either the last century for humanity," he said, "or it could be the first."

A member of the British parliament — whatever that will look like after the next, yet-unannounced general election — might well get elected on that slogan. And Izzard has been connecting with voters for years.

## Second cast member jumps to 'Walking Dead' spinoff

"The Walking Dead" universe is expanding — and shrinking — at the same time.

With a third series and three TV movies on the horizon at AMC, spinoff "Fear the Walking Dead" returns this weekend and a second character from the main zombie apocalypse show will soon cross over.


Austin Amelio, who played villain-turned-double agent Dwight on "The Walking Dead," is making his move to "Fear," which launches its fifth season Sunday night. He joins Lennie James, whose Morgan came aboard the spinoff last season.

Though the actors had become pals in real life, there was some confusion over how Morgan and Dwight would react to meeting in "Fear" — and not just because the characters had belonged to opposing groups that were once mortal enemies. As it turned out, they'd never actually interacted on "The Walking Dead."

"We had been in scenes together, but our characters had never spoken, which is very interesting," James said. "Myself and Austin got together and sat down and plotted out our mutual histories and what we might have known about each other. We never interacted."

Fans of "The Walking Dead" first met Morgan in the series premiere in 2010. He helped out main protagonist Rick Grimes, then joined his group in later seasons.

Dwight was introduced in the main show's Season 6 as a member of the villainous group The Saviors, led by Negan. Dwight resented Negan for sleeping with his wife, Sherry, and for his general abusiveness, so he secretly turned on him and aided Rick's group

until Negan was defeated.

We last saw Dwight heading off to find Sherry after a member of Rick's group spared his life but insisted he leave and never return to that area of the southeast. He'll presumably meet up with Morgan on "Fear" further west, where the spinoff is set.

"I think because of the battle with Negan and the role that Dwight played in that, Morgan would have been privy to some of the subterfuge that was going on there," James said. "We had been in maybe two scenes, but they were huge battle scenes or crossing paths. We kept trying to find someplace where we nodded or shook hands or were in the same room together, and there just wasn't. So it was really exciting when that happened over here."

Morgan, who lost his wife and son to zombies on "The Walking Dead," has

struggled with mental health, at times wanting to kill all of his enemies and at other times, refusing to kill anyone in the brutal world.

This season of "Fear" sees him going out of his way to help strangers. "We're going to see what kind of leader Morgan might turn out to be or might not turn out to be," James said, "how much responsibility he's able to take on, but also what responsibility for other people he's able to take on and what the price of that might be for him."

"A lot of that journey to helping people, for not just Morgan, is an attempt to try and heal yourself," James added. "He's very open about the fact that his helping other people isn't just a benevolent act. It's also about feeling like it's possible to make up for some of the things he's done in the past."



Rosenberg is the son of Michael and Debbie Rosenberg, both leading American players and contributors to the game of bridge on many levels. Among their many activities in support of bridge, they are both avid supporters of youth bridge in the USA. In recent years, Kevin has been forging an expert reputation of his own.

This deal was played in a pairs competition, where an overtrick or an undertrick can make all the difference.

South won the opening club lead with dummy's ace and led a heart. Kevin smoothly played the queen and South covered with the king, winning the trick. Look at this from declarer's point of view. What was the likely layout of the trump suit? Two possibilities came to mind. East could have the obvious ace-queen doubleton, or West might have ducked his ace with ace-nine-four-three, hoping South would play a heart to the jack next.



### Garcia back with vigor

Outfielder on tear since missing time with sore shoulder

Leury Garcia hated missing time.

The White Sox center fielder sat Sunday against the Twins and Monday's suspended game against the Royals as he recovered from a sore right shoulder.

"You don't want to be out of the lineup, it was unfortunate," Garcia said Friday via an interpreter. "Things happen. I'm just trying to keep moving forward and doing the things I'm doing right now."

## Almora feels the love after scary foul ball

ST. LOUIS — Albert Almora Jr. stayed in his hotel room Thursday trying to process the events of the previous 24 hours.

"I didn't move from the bed," he said Friday before the Cubs-Cardinals game at Busch Stadium.

Almora's foul liner down the third-base line struck and injured a young girl in the stands Wednesday night at Minute Maid Park, causing him to break down in tears. She was taken to the hospital, the Astros said in a statement after the game.

Almora had no update on the girl's condition Friday and said the family has asked for privacy.

"Obviously we're going to respect that," he said. "When they're ready, if they're ready, I'll do whatever I can to put a smile

on the girl's face and the family's face."

In the aftermath of the incident, Almora has found himself in the spotlight. The emotional reaction by the 25-year-old outfielder was replayed on national news broadcasts, and Almora was trending on Twitter.

That's why he spent most of Thursday in bed, talking with family and friends who offered support.

"I was on the phone most of the day," he said. "Great support system. I woke up with endless amounts of text messages from family and friends. What I experienced with my teammates,

## Cubs slugging home runs — but victories remain elusive

ST. LOUIS — The Cubs were on the verge of setting home-run records, but their recent power surge hasn't translated to wins.

They entered Friday night's game against the archrival Cardinals with 23 home runs in their last eight games, tying a franchise mark set 58 years ago. They already had set the franchise record for most home runs in a calendar month with 51.

But they were only 3-5 in that stretch despite hitting eight homers in losses to the Astros on Monday and Tuesday. They hit two solo homers Wednesday, accounting for the offense in a 2-1 win.

"Home runs are great — they're going to come," Anthony Rizzo said. "You can't try to force them. But it's the little things —

getting the guys over from second, third — is what it takes everyone to the next level.

"You're not going to (hit homers) all year. I'm sure even though the Red Sox were the best team last year, they went through spurts. It's just the ebb and flow of the season."

The biggest issue for the Cubs was one of their staples — producing with runners in scoring position. They were 0-for-15 in their final two games in Houston.

They entered Friday hitting .257 overall but only .244 with runners in scoring position — the only team in the National League that had a higher overall average compared with RISP.

And of the Cubs' 92 home runs this season entering Friday, 51 were solo shots. Javier Baez hit all 13 of his home runs from the

# Rain rally: Higa leads after delay

She stays on top with late birdies; round suspended

CHARLESTON, S.C. — Mamiko Higa of Japan birdied three of her final six holes following a nearly two-hour weather delay to shoot an even-par 71 and maintain a one-shot lead Friday in the suspended second round of the U.S. Women's Open.

A day after shooting a 65 for the lowest debut round in tournament history, Higa was a stroke behind Jessica Korda when thunderstorms and lightning caused play to be suspended at the Country Club of Charleston. When things resumed, Higa rediscovered her first-round touch to regain the lead over Korda at 6 under with a 14-footer on her final hole.

There were 45 players on the course when play was halted due to darkness. They'll finish Saturday before third-round play starts.

Korda shot a 68, her lowest score in 38 career rounds in the major tournament.

American amateur Gina Kim had a 72 to join Celine Boutier of France at 4 under. Boutier had four holes to play.

Lexi Thompson and Nelly Korda, Jessica's younger sister, were among four players at 3 under. Thompson has two holes to play, and the younger Korda three. Also at 3 under were American Jaye Marie Green and South Korea's Jeongeun Lee6. Green shot a 68 and Lee6 — who adopted her unique name after the Korean LPGA dubbed her with it because five other players had registered with the same name — a 69.

Two-time U.S. Women's Open champion Inbee Park was among a group of eight at 2 under after her second straight 70.

World No. 1 Jin Young Ko was at even par after a 70 while defending tournament champion Ariya Jutanugarn was a 2 over with two holes left.

Higa struggled through much of her round before the rains came. She immediately got going after the long break by rolling in an 11-foot birdie putt to tie Korda at the top. Higa's final two birdies on the par five fifth and ninth holes regained the lead for her each time.

Higa stumbled with a three-putt bogey on the seventh hole to again fall into a tie with Korda. But on the her final hole with darkness closing in, Higa confidently struck from 14 feet to head into the clubhouse with the 36-hole lead at the season's second major.

"Because I could finish up a tough day with a birdie," she said through an interpreter, "and so I was so happy?"

Jessica Korda finished her bogey-free performance — just her fifth sub-70 showing in 38 career rounds of this major — well before thunderstorms caused a nearly two-hour weather delay.

Jessica Korda, playing in milder morning conditions, did not get her round going until making a birdie on the par-5 15th hole — she opened on the back nine — and followed that with another on the par-3 17th.

# Kaymer seeks big-time boost in confidence

DUBLIN, Ohio — Two-time major champion Martin Kaymer is tied for the lead going into the weekend at the Memorial, and whether he wins is not what drives him.

He knows his game is close enough that he can.

Kaymer kept it simple Friday with birdies on all the par 5s, a tee shot to 10 feet on a dangerous right pin at the par-3 12th and a bogey on his final hole at Muirfield Village for a 4-under 68 that gave him a share of the lead with Troy Merritt (66) and Kyoung-Hoon Lee (67). They were at 9-under 135.

Jordan Spieth had a 70 and was another shot behind.

Tiger Woods had a chance to be a lot closer to the mix than seven shots except for the par-5 15th. He was in the shaggy rough on a hill above the green in two, and took five to get down for a double bogey. Woods had to settle for a 72.

Kaymer is coming up on the five-year anniversary of his last win, and that wasn't just any victory. He demolished the U.S. Open field at Pinehurst No. 2 by eight strokes, this one month after he beat the strongest and deepest field in golf at The Players Championship.

And then he was gone. "I distract myself," Kaymer said. "I listen too much to others, and also a bit of belief. Sometimes, you would think I win so many big tournaments I should have so much belief in myself that I can win any week. The last two years, I was just not there. I just didn't believe that I could win the tournament I'm playing."

# Moore's 'time' to step up arrives

Bruins call on defenseman to fill in for injured Grzelczyk

ST. LOUIS — John Moore is ready for his closeup and the chance to make an impact in the Stanley Cup Final.

Moore is expected to replace injured defenseman Matt Grzelczyk in the Bruins' lineup for Game 3 against the Blues on Saturday night. Grzelczyk is in concussion protocol and didn't travel with the team, and Moore took his place in practice Friday alongside Connor Clifton.

"This is why you train, why you prepare, why you take care of yourself," Moore said. "When you're called upon, it's time to do your job."

The series is tied 1-1.

Moore for Grzelczyk is one of a couple holes being filled with injuries and a suspension affecting the plans for coaches Bruce Cassidy of the Bruins and Craig Berube of the Blues. Bruins first-line center Patrice Bergeron and Blues first-line winger Vladimir Tarasenko are confirmed to play in Game 3 after each one missed practice for maintenance, but the lineups have to change slightly.

The Blues will be without important grinder Oskar Sundqvist after their only

active player with a Cup ring was suspended one game for boarding Grzelczyk and knocking him out of Game 2 on Wednesday night. Zach Sanford is expected to go in the lineup for his first playoff action since the first round, though Berube wouldn't confirm that and said injured forward Robert Thomas was a "possibility" to play.

Neither one can replicate exactly what Sundqvist does for the Blues.

"Does a lot of good things for us on both sides of the puck," Berube said. "Good penalty killer, center, wing, great defensively and has produced for us, too. Good player."

Sanford hasn't played since Game 3 of the Jets series April 14. That's an even longer layoff than Blues winger Robby Fabbri, who replaced Thomas in Game 2.

"The guys who haven't been playing have done a good job of holding each other accountable," Sanford said. "We've been skating, working out. It's a little different when you get into a game."

Moore knows all about this stage after playing for the Rangers in the 2014 Cup final against the Kings.

"It's definitely one of those things you can take a deep breath, make sure you're focused," Moore said. "There are a lot of distractions at this stage of the playoffs. If anything, I feel I'm more mature to handle that and be focused on my job."

# Champs in new territory

Warriors confident despite their first 1-0 finals deficit

TORONTO — Steve Kerr has seen a little of almost everything during his wildly successful five-year run as coach of the Warriors.

This, however, is something new. For the first time, Kerr and the Warriors are staring at a 1-0 deficit in the NBA Finals. They've trailed in series before, faced plenty of adverse moments along the way, but this is the newest challenge for a franchise trying to join the short list of clubs that have won three consecutive championships.

"The experience helps," Kerr said Friday, a day after the Raptors struck first. "Winning multiple championships helps because you have seen it all. There's also just the knowledge that you've been here before. You've been down. We have been up 3-1 and lost a series. We have been down 3-1 and won a series. Everything in between. So nothing is going to catch these guys off-guard."

That's his hope, anyway. There was a clear air of confidence from the Warriors even in the very first moments after the loss Thursday night. They knew they didn't play particularly well, and lost by only nine. They trailed most of the way, yet still were within striking distance plenty of times. They seemed far from rattled.

"No matter what, our sights were coming in that it's a long series," Warriors star Stephen Curry said. "And Game 2 is an opportunity for us to right the wrongs and get a big win and go back home."

No one needs to explain to the Warriors that a win Sunday completely shifts the narrative.

And even though the axiom has always been that Game 1 winners usually go on to win the series — and that is still the case — it seems that a 1-0 deficit isn't as daunting to teams as it once might have been.

Since the league went to the 16-team

format for the 1984 postseason, Game 1 winners have never been as vulnerable as they have seemed to be this year. In the 14 series this year that preceded the NBA Finals, six Game 1 winners wound up losing their series. That's never happened before in this format.

In the 2010s, Game 1 winners have gone on to lose a series 31% of the time. In the 2000s, it was 25%; in the 1990s, 15%.

**Durant out, Iguodala likely:** Kevin Durant, the reigning two-time finals MVP, is going to miss Game 2, and Andre Iguodala's health is of at least mild concern to the two-time defending champions as well.

Iguodala, the 2015 finals MVP, had an MRI on Friday on his left leg after he was hurt late in Game 1. Durant, who has a strained calf and last played May 8, was ruled out by Kerr in an expected move.

"I guess we've been holding out hope, but might as well say it. It's near-impossible for him to play on Sunday," Kerr said.

Iguodala expects to play, and the Warriors said his MRI came back clean.

# Pippen accuses 5-year-old of defacing mansion

The legal battle over a trashed mansion between NBA Hall of Famer Scottie Pippen and lawyer-turned-stand-up-comic Lindsay Glazer Woloshin isn't over yet.

Earlier this month, Pippen amended his lawsuit to accuse an unexpected person of vandalizing his Fort Lauderdale, Fla., mansion: Glazer Woloshin's 5-year-old daughter. The amended lawsuit says the girl defaced his property with crayons and markers and that her vandalizing ways show Glazer Woloshin and Jacob Woloshin failed as parents.

It also added negligence and vicarious liability to the original accusations of conversion and breach of lease.

Pippen is suing for \$109,317.62 to reimburse his trust, Scottie M. Pippen Revocable Trust, for the damages done to the six-bedroom mansion.

The story behind the lawsuit started back in September 2017.

After Hurricane Irma tore through South Florida, the Woloshins were looking for temporary housing because their home had been damaged by the storm.

Glazer Woloshin entered into a rental agreement with Pippen's trust to move into his fully furnished mansion, which was on the market for about \$10 million.

The pair moved in with their daughter, a lab dog, a cat and a nanny/housekeeper.

She paid a \$50,000 security deposit, but the original lawsuit suggests that it wouldn't come close to covering the damage to the mansion. Some of those damages were allowing animals to pee on anything they chose, damaging the front gate and destroying "countless cabinets and drawers," the suit says.

The Woloshins' attorney, Marc A. Kuperman, told the Daily Business Review that his clients acknowledged that some damage may have been done to the home, but nothing close to what the lawsuit alleges.

Kuperman told the newspaper that there was no need to put the child in the lawsuit.

## Almora's support 'endless'

the way they came around and were there. ... Whenever I reiterate this is a family, that's what I mean.

"That's what comes to mind. Everybody can be happy and all jolly when things are going well, but when the stuff hits the fan and the people that are around show up, that's when it counts."

The incident has rekindled the debate about whether protective netting should be extended at major-league ballparks.

MLB in 2018 convinced teams to extend the netting in their parks to the ends of the dugouts after a rash of foul-ball incidents the last few years. But now some players are calling for the netting to be extended all the way down the line.

Asked Friday if he's optimistic a change will result from the incident, Almora said he hopes MLB does the right thing.

"I hope this never happens again, so whatever the league has to do to make that happen," he said. "I don't think any kid that goes to a baseball game with their parents or a loved one should worry about making it out unhealthy."

"I don't think that should ever cross their mind."

While everyone's thoughts are with the girl and her family, the Cubs also were concerned with Almora's mental state. Manager Joe Maddon said he was "ready to go either way" if Almora had decided to come out of the game Wednesday.

"I thought it'd be great if he could get back out there, and he did," Maddon said. "So that was the harder part."

"He's a wonderful young man, emotional, sensitive. What's wrong with that? He cares. And he's family man. He's got kids. All those things are factored in, and it really proves to people that may be watching, that's what our guys are all about and where their heart is at."

"I'm very proud of how he reacted in the moment and even more proud he was able to gather himself and come back and play."

Almora said Friday he felt fine, though he was still a little shaken over the incident.

"I thought I was going to be a lot worse, honestly," he said. "But this isn't about me, man. I'm not in the hospital. It's tough to answer these questions when it's something that affects a little girl and her family. That's what's really should be important."

"When it comes to me, with the support I've gotten, it's tough not to be in a good place where all I've done is try to know how she's doing. ... People are praying for me. But I'm healthy. My mind is OK. I'm OK, and it's thanks to my teammates and my family."

It's difficult to be a pro athlete these days. Many are stereotyped as rich, pampered young men who care only about their images, stats and bank accounts. They live in a fishbowl, and any mistake can leave a permanent mark on their careers, making them a subject of derision for weeks, months or years.

Maybe that's why Almora's reaction struck a chord with so many fans across the country. Breaking down in public after accidentally injuring a child showed he's only human.

Almora always has been a well-liked player in his five years with the Cubs, but suddenly fans who never had heard his name before could empathize with him over an incident he had no control over.


Almora said the reaction has been "nothing but positive" but he repeatedly reminded the media gathered by his locker: "It's not about me."

"I've been blessed with the people around me," he said. "As tough as it's been it has made me a better person, I think, and it's opened my eyes to other things. I never want it to happen again. I wish it wouldn't have happened, but you take it in stride and move forward."

"Hopefully all is well and she's going to make a full recovery, God willing. Something I'll never forget for the rest of my life."

"I'm not going to say I'm going to try and turn this into a positive, but right now all I've seen, all I've experienced is love and care. And that means the world to me."

cleanup spot, but 11 have come with the bases empty.

Part of that has been due to the production of the Nos. 2 and 3 hitters, Kris Bryant and Anthony Rizzo, who have combined to hit 18 of their 28 homers with runners on base.

But the lack of clutch hitting and the solo home runs have been more revealing recently.

"Part of that has to do with the pitchers," Maddon said. "What do they do when there's no one out there?"

"Are they more apt to throw you a fastball in a spot or a pitch in a spot you can deal with? Whereas with runners on base, everyone raises their levels mentally."

"I don't know the specific answer. My thin slice would be that pitchers are more cautious with runners on base as opposed to (no one) on base. Maybe from the hitters' perspective, maybe he's more wide-throttle and doesn't worry about it as much."

"If I had to cull it down, it's probably because when there are runners on base or in scoring position, pitchers can match you differently when there's nobody on base."

At the same time, Maddon pointed to a balancing act batters must be aware of as pitchers try not to fall behind in the count.

"A lot of times in that moment, be ready for that first pitch because that will be the best one you'll see," Maddon said.

"Although my refrain has been to be patient in an RBI situation. The first pitch is open all the time, but it's something you've got to

know you can get the job done in that moment.

"As the count gets deeper, you've got to protect your weakness first and let your strength take care of itself. These are the things we talk about, like looking to the middle of the field. But I'd imagine if you broke down another pitcher's repertoire when he gets people on base, it will change and be fewer (straight fastballs) and more off-speed breaking balls on the periphery."

So somewhere there's a happy medium, as in Wednesday's game when Schwarber led off with a homer and Bryant added a solo shot that provided enough cushion for Kyle Hendricks.

"Home runs are big — they deflate the other team," Rizzo said. "The solo (homer) isn't as bad if you ask pitchers, but (homers) with two guys on can deflate a guy. Our goal is not to hit homers. It's to have good at-bats."

## St. Louis fans not forgiving Bryant

ST. LOUIS — Kris Bryant didn't have to worry about exchanging greetings with Yadier Molina on Friday at Busch Stadium.

That's because the Cardinals placed their All-Star catcher and leader on the 10-day injured list, retroactive to Wednesday, with a strained tendon in his right thumb.

Molina suggested Bryant was a "loser" on his Instagram account one day after Bryant joked to a crowd at the Cubs Convention in January that St. Louis was a "boring" town.

Bryant received a mild chorus of boos Friday in his first at-bat, which resulted in a hit off the glove of third baseman Matt Carpenter.

Before the game, Cubs manager Joe Maddon seemed amused by the attention given to Bryant in the wake of his quip.

"It's curious to me why that ever becomes a topic of conversation," said Maddon, adding that he doesn't take offense to people referring to his hometown of Hazleton, Pa., as boring.

"Beauty lies in the eyes of the beholder. It's no big deal."

"Do you like St. Louis?" a columnist asked Maddon.

"I like Chicago a lot," Maddon said, smiling.

**Hold on, Strop:** The Cubs hadn't decided whether to activate right-handed reliever Pedro Strop, who threw two scoreless innings on only 13 pitches combined Tuesday and Thursday for Triple-A Iowa.

"It's all about the number of appearances and days testing his legs," Maddon said of Strop, who has been out since suffering a Grade 2 strain of his left hamstring May 6 and has had a history of problems with both hamstrings.

"As you're bringing him back, you don't want to mess up the finish line."

Strop is expected to take over the closer duties once he is activated from the injured list.

In other bullpen news, Tony Barnette (right shoulder) is scheduled to start a minor-league rehab assignment Saturday for Iowa. Alan Webster (radial nerve irritation) and Xavier Cedeno (left

wrist) resumed throwing in Arizona.

**Call to "CarGo":** The signing of outfielder Carlos Gonzalez to a minor-league contract Thursday was designed to give the Cubs more veteran flexibility while buying additional time for Ian Happ at Iowa.

"He's another left-handed hitter to utilize against a good right-handed pitcher," Maddon said. "It's obvious when he's able to play and he's here, it's significant to start three lefties (in the outfield)."

Gonzalez, 33, is expected to spend little time at Iowa before joining the Cubs. The Indians released him Sunday after he hit only .210 in 105 at-bats.

But he is a three-time National League All-Star with a lifetime .845 OPS.

As for keeping Happ at Iowa, Maddon said "it's about a young player still learning his craft and getting better at what he's doing."

Happ is hitting .230 with eight home runs, 30 RBIs and 59 strikeouts in 187 at-bats, but he's 8 for his last 22 with seven strikeouts.

ented he is.

"He's just starting to shine now. We're glad that everybody's able to see the type of player that he is."

Garcia had nine hits in 13 at-bats and scored six runs during the three-game tear — all Sox wins. His average jumped from .273 to .302.

"I've made a few little adjustments because I needed to get more on base," Garcia said. "I've been able to be on base thanks to the adjustments I've made."

Garcia has provided a boost to the top of the lineup, having led off in 44 of his first 45 games.

"Get on base, no matter how," Garcia said of his mindset. "I know I have a great hitter behind me."

Garcia has been particularly productive at Guaranteed Rate. He had a .465 average with 20 hits in 43 at-bats in the team's last 12 home games. He had eight multihit games during that span.

Renteria also lauded Garcia's versatility. Garcia has made 33 starts in center field, five in right, four in left, two at shortstop and one at second base this season.

"You're probably getting to see him play a little bit more than in past years, the fact that his flexibility offers us the opportunity to play him in different positions even though he's been primarily playing center field," Renteria said.

Regardless of where he plays, Garcia is concentrating on continuing the roll.

"Just keep my focus," Garcia said. "Keep the plan that I've been following."

**Castillo update:** Catcher Wellington Castillo is taking steps to return from the seven-day concussion list. Renteria said Castillo caught a bullpen session Friday.

"(Friday's) the day we had to go through and get him cleared," Renteria said. "We'll have to make the decision at some point either (Friday night) or (Saturday)."

The Sox placed Castillo on the concussion list May 25 and promoted Seby Zavala from Triple-A Charlotte. Zavala made his third appearance and first home start Friday. He struck out in each of his five at-bats last weekend against the Twins.

Zavala has picked up plenty of advice this week, including to learn the hitters as quickly as possible.

"It's a dream I've been dreaming since a little kid," Zavala said of playing in the major leagues. "Being able to achieve it is a big accomplishment, not only for me but for my family. All the sacrifices they've made for me paved the way."

# #97 Hugh Gallarneau

Speed made 2-way player valuable weapon in 1940s

Hugh Gallarneau's father forbade him from playing football at Morgan Park High School on the South Side, but his speed became a key component in the offensive and defensive backfields of some of the best teams in Bears history.

Instead of playing football for the Mustangs, Gallarneau joined the swim team and worked in the stockyards as a teen during the Great Depression. He earned an academic scholarship to Stanford and decided to try out for the football team there. He helped the Indians to an undefeated 1940 season that ended with a victory in the Rose Bowl, then was drafted by the Bears the following spring.


In his first two seasons, the Bears went 23-2, winning the 1941 NFL title and losing the title game in 1942. He joined the Marines and fought in the Pacific the next two years, earning a Bronze Star Medal, before coming back to the Bears for three more successful seasons, including the 1946 title campaign.

"He wanted to quit football on top," his wife of 42 years, Nancie, told the Tribune's Don Pierson after Gallarneau's death in 1999. "He just loved playing football, especially for George Halas. He said Halas was a hard dealer but always fair. Hugh loved to deal too."

Gallarneau was one of the fastest players on the great Bears teams of the 1940s. His greatest moment was an 81-yard punt return for a touchdown in a Western Division tiebreaker game against the Packers in 1941. His touchdown gave the Bears the first six of 30 straight points after they had fallen behind 7-0. They won 33-14.

The following week they claimed their fifth championship and second in a row with a 37-9 win against the Giants at Wrigley Field.

Gallarneau led the NFL with eight rushing TDs in 1941 and was second with six in 1946. He led the '46 champs with 476 rushing yards on 112 carries. In 1946 he was

named first-team All-Pro by Pro Football Illustrated and made the New York Daily News' second team.

In his five seasons, Gallarneau scored 35 regular-season touchdowns: 26 rushing, seven receiving, one interception return and one fumble return.

After his career Gallarneau went into business and was an executive for Marshall Field and Hart, Schaffner and Marx before retiring in 1986. He died at 82 in 1999 in Northbrook.

# Trubisky better prepared to be a take-charge guy

Helfrich says of QB: 'The air about him is way different'

The progress reports on Bears quarterback Mitch Trubisky have been predictably positive this spring. Trubisky is making strides in Matt Nagy's offensive system, and his increased comfort is obvious to teammates and coaches.

As receiver Allen Robinson noted Wednesday, Trubisky now has a firm enough grasp of the offense and a fuller understanding of the playbook to be able to skillfully dissect defenses. Rather than simply searching for completions, Robinson said, Trubisky is seeing where the defense can be exploited and identifying where the biggest potential gain is on each play.

Bears offensive coordinator Mark Helfrich spoke with reporters Wednesday at Halas Hall and chimed in with his assessment of Trubisky's growth. Here are the highlights from that session.

## On Trubisky's progress from May 2018 until now

It is literally night and day in all the right ways. Our standard for him is extremely high. But as far as knowing what he's supposed to do, what the defense is doing, manipulating protections, it's just the air about him. It's way different, and everybody has observed that in various ways. Therefore people around him are playing better.

## On how last year's Halas Hall drumbeat of being patient with Trubisky's growth will change now that he is leading a team with legitimate Super Bowl expectations in 2019

I hope he just keeps playing to the drumbeat. I don't know who had the drumbeat or what exactly that was, but it's just about getting better — every single one of us. And supporting him, supporting getting the ball in the right places at the right time. And that's it. All we want to do is be better. As long as that keeps happening, we're moving in the right direction in every phase of quarterbackology. He needs to keep making those strides. That's a many-faceted deal. There's other people involved in that, coaches and players. So far, so good.

## On Trubisky's growing on-field chemistry with Robinson

It's just legitimizing everything they've done. They need that visual evidence of seeing the ball thrown, seeing the ball caught, feeling the rhythm, feeling the timing of everything — the concept, the throw and the catch, the protection. Last year, I thought A-Rob did an unbelievable job when he wasn't in there. You could hear him talk to himself all the time about a route adjustment or a coverage — all the things he was thinking through. But to do it with your guys is a different thing. The chemistry between them was clicking at a pretty good rate toward the end of the

season. Those are guys we need. That combination has to pay dividends for us.

## On how the air around Trubisky is different

Again, hopefully in every way. And we're not talking about some guy who we want to drastically change, right? We want to bring out everything that's in him and more. He's a highly competitive guy. He's a highly self-critical guy, which is a good thing at times. It's a great thing at times. And sometimes, he needs to just flush it and move on and blame it on somebody else. But (it's) just the way he carries himself. Last year at this time, you're going, 'OK, you're getting (this) personnel. I have to think about that for a second.' Now it's just chest up, communicate, 'Hey, you get over here now.' The operation just has a much different level of confidence.

## On how Trubisky is becoming a teacher to the new offensive players

Absolutely he's teaching. And communicating. That's one thing, again, when you're going through that (learning process of an offense) the first time, you tend to go internal. You try to survive with what's your world, not 'Hey, dude! I need you right here to do this.' And that's much more of what he's done, what the other receivers have done, what the other running backs have done who have been here. They've done a great job with these young guys of coaching them up. ... I think the confidence, the real confidence, the genuine confidence, is starting to develop.





### Laborer

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago is preparing to hire a small number of laborers over the next four years. These jobs are in Cook County at plants that treat sewage. There are no jobs in downtown Chicago. People in these jobs may work in unpleasant surroundings and are exposed to unpleasant odors.

You must show your Social Security Card and photo identification (with your birth date) at the basic skills written test. Failure to show these documents may result in disqualification from the Laborer examination process. You must be at least 18 years old by July 14, 2019.

#### How we will hire Laborers:

- As previously announced, the Illinois State Lottery Pick 4 (evening) game from Sunday, May 19, 2019 was used to get the numbers for the Laborer lottery list. (The Illinois State Lottery has no interest in the way the District hires people.)
- The winning numbers are 0428. The Fireball number may not be used to substitute a number.
- If the last four digits of your Social Security number are between 0428 and 0928, you will have until June 14, 2019 to file an application for Laborer.
- Applications must be filed by the following method:  
Submitted online through the District's Online Employment Center at [www.districtjobs.org](http://www.districtjobs.org). Applications must be submitted by 11:59 p.m. Central Time on the closing date, June 14, 2019, in order to be considered.
- All communication with applicants during the selection process will be by email. It is the applicants' responsibility to check their email for important notifications from the District during the selection process.
- Applications from anyone whose numbers do not come between 0428 and 0928 will be disqualified. You must show your photo identification (with your birth date) and Social Security Card at the basic skills written test to confirm you have the winning numbers or are within the range of the winning numbers plus 500. Failure to show these documents may result in disqualification from the Laborer examination process.
- Candidates must be able to read and understand simple instructions at approximately the sixth grade level and be at least 18 years old by July 14, 2019.
- In the event that more than one applicant has the same last four digits of their social security number, ties will be broken by the date and time of application submission.
- A short list of candidates, based on their rank in the lottery, will be asked to take a basic skills written test which is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, August 10, 2019. Candidates will receive more information about the basic skills written test if they are placed on the lottery list and are within the selected range.
- A short list of candidates who pass the basic skills written test, based on their rank in the lottery, will be interviewed. Interviews are tentatively scheduled between the dates of September 3 and September 13, 2019.
- Candidates who pass the interview will be eligible for hire as a Laborer. Appointments will be made from the rank ordered eligible list. The eligible list has a duration of four years.
- If you are offered a job, you will take a physical exam, including a drug test, criminal history background investigation and an evaluation of your ability to meet the specific physical demands of the job.
- If you are hired, you will have a one-year probation period (250 days worked).
- If you are hired, you must have a valid Illinois driver's license within six months of the date of appointment.
- If you are hired, you must live in the boundaries of the District within six months of completing probation. (The District covers about 90% of Cook County.)
- The hourly rate for a Maintenance Laborer B is \$26.93.

## Soon to sign, where will Keuchel, Kimbrel land?

Right at midnight, as Sunday turns to Monday, an unintended, secondary phase of free agency will commence in baseball. Some seven months after the free agent market first opened, lefty starter Dallas Keuchel and closer Craig Kimbrel will be free to sign with any team — finally — without that team losing a compensatory draft pick as a result.

It was never supposed to take this long.

But as the markets for Keuchel and Kimbrel, both 31 years of age, stagnated through the winter months, and then the spring — with neither player willing to sign for below their asking prices, and teams having to weigh the cost of both the player and the draft pick and slot money they would have to give up — the date June 2, the day before the 2019 MLB draft and the date the draft-pick penalties expire, loomed ever larger.

It is doubtful either of these highly decorated pitchers would have chosen this path — remaining unsigned some two months into the 2019 season — at the outset of free agency. But at a certain point, the nearer we got to June 2, it became a useful, winning strategy: Allow the pressures of a developing pennant race and the natural attrition of pitchers (through injury and underperformance) to create a frenzied atmosphere, in which almost every contending team can now say they need either Keuchel or Kimbrel, or both.

It is possible handshake agreements already exist between one or both pitchers and one or two teams, which would be announced after midnight, when the draft-pick penalty expires. It is also possible one or two bold teams could undercut the market, ahead of the midnight cutoff, by signing one of the pitchers and viewing the draft-pick penalty as the cost of snatching him out from under the others.

But assuming neither is true, and the stroke of midnight brings the expected bidding frenzy and an eventual resolution to this bizarre saga, here are three questions that still need to be answered:

1. Which team(s) will win the Keuchel and Kimbrel sweepstakes?

Keuchel, the 2015 American League Cy Young winner and a workhorse who has averaged 200 innings (regular and postseason combined) the past five seasons, could benefit from a bidding war of sorts between the rival New York Yankees and Tampa Bay Rays, who are currently jockeying for the AL East lead.

We say “of sorts” because the Yankees have one of the game’s largest payrolls, and the Rays one of its smallest — which would give the Yankees a massive advantage. But there are also indications Keuchel might accept a hefty one-year deal, then try his luck at free agency again this winter, in which case the Rays — who are currently making do with a rotation of Blake Snell, Charlie Morton and “openers” on the other days — might stand a chance.

This much remains true: a motivated Yankees team — which entered the weekend with four starters (Luis Severino, CC Sabathia, Jonathan Loaisiga and Jordan Montgomery) on the injured list — would be difficult to outbid under any scenario.

Other contenders in need of a front-line starting pitcher include the Milwaukee Brewers, Minnesota Twins and Philadelphia Phillies. But the industry consensus is that Keuchel winds up in the Bronx.

With Kimbrel, the best closer of his generation, the market should be no less vibrant, with nearly every contender in need of another back-end-of-the-bullpen arm. That includes blue-bloods such as the Chicago Cubs, Los Angeles Dodgers and Boston Red Sox (and wouldn’t it be something if Kimbrel winds up back in Boston, where he won a World Series ring in 2018?), as well as the Atlanta Braves and San Diego Padres (both of whose uniforms Kimbrel has worn in the past).

The guess here is that Kimbrel winds up in Atlanta, where the defending NL East-champion Braves, after some modest off-

season spending, entered the weekend three games behind the division-leading Phillies following a two-game sweep at the hands of the Washington Nationals.

2. How soon will they be ready to pitch?

Both Keuchel and Kimbrel reportedly have been keeping to regular throwing schedules that mimic their typical regular-season schedules, with Keuchel throwing simulated games of around 100 pitches every five days to build up his arm strength and Kimbrel throwing more frequently in shorter stints. At least one of Keuchel’s simulated games was open to major league scouts, and the Yankees were among the teams reportedly present.

Keuchel’s agent, Scott Boras, told MLB.com this week his client would only need a week in the

minor leagues to get himself ready for big league games. That sounds a bit optimistic, as a one-week assignment would allow for only two starts. Tack on a third minor-league start, and you would be looking at two weeks and change before Keuchel would be ready to start in the big leagues. That sounds more realistic.

Kimbrel, it stands to reason, would require a similar time frame — say, five to seven minor-league relief appearances over a two- to three-week period — to get himself into regular-season shape.

The good news for the contenders that acquire Keuchel and Kimbrel: their 2019 odometers will be starting from zero somewhere around mid-June, meaning their arms should still be relatively fresh when October rolls around.

3. Is this situation a problem for

baseball?

The short answer: yes.

The qualifying offer/draft-pick compensation system — where teams can extend a one-year qualifying offer (\$17.9 million in 2018) to a pending free agent, and receive a draft pick as compensation if the offer is rejected and the player signs elsewhere — was well-intended, with the goal of leveling the playing field by compensating small-market teams who lose their best players to free agency and penalizing large-market teams that swallow up the best free agents year after year.

But as the game has skewed younger, the value of draft picks and slot money has soared, and it is the players who have suffered as a result.

While Keuchel and Kimbrel are extreme examples, other players

have been affected by the rules in years past — most notably third baseman Mike Moustakas, who, after the 2017 season, rejected the Kansas City Royals’ qualifying offer, found no takers on the free agent market and wound up signing back with the Royals the following March on a one-year deal for less than half the qualifying offer’s value.

Clearly, the system needs to be tweaked, if not done away with completely — and this will almost certainly be a topic of discussion in the next round of talks between union and league negotiators. Injuries already do enough to rob the game of some of its best players (where have you gone, Aaron Judge?) without a broken economic system sidelining perfectly healthy stars for almost half a season.

# Racing needs reforms, but not from lawmakers

Thoroughbred racing, more than all other sports, confronts the human participants with their own characters. In any other game, you're responsible only for yourself. But racing is all about the handling of the horses: At the heart of the contest is the matter of trust, the sacred obligation to do decently and right by a reliant creature. It's the thinnest of lines between a meaningful pursuit and an abuse. The minute a horse's best advocate is a Washington lawmaker is the minute that line has been crossed.

It should not take Congressional action or another call for a moratorium on racing at Santa Anita by Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., to force certain basic and comprehensive reforms on thoroughbred racing. In fact, it's absolutely critical that reforms be voluntary and self-imposed, or racing will lose any real excuse for its existence. The owners of Santa Anita Park have recognized this and instituted some excellent measures in response to 26 horse deaths in a season. But they were essentially piecemeal reactive responses to a rash of fatalities that repelled the public, and they have not been fully accepted by other tracks, nor has the question of what's causing these deaths been solved.

You always hear that nobody loves the horses more than their handlers. But when are they going to show it? If they can't muster the will to organize and institute a national governing body with a uniform program of protections for horses and penalties for abusers, then they don't really love them. They just like and enjoy them, until they have to dispose of them.

The best advocate for a thoroughbred is not a congressman. Reps. Andy Barr, R-Ky., and Paul Tonko, D-N.Y., have proposed the Horseracing Integrity Act, a bill that would regulate the game by law and institute World Anti-Doping Agency-like drug testing. But it should never come to that; anyone who would prioritize the horses' best interests only because of a law doesn't belong in the sport.


The best advocates are the many breeders, owners, trainers, jockeys, hot walkers and grooms, who feel deep partnership and kinship with the horses. One of them is my old friend David Israel, former chair of the California Horse Racing Board. Israel, a former journalist who served six years on the board through 2013 and currently owns a horse trained in Bob Baffert's barn, long has advocated for a "voluntary" national governing body, "led by a commissioner with regulatory authority to implement penalties," on every issue from medication to animal welfare and jockey safety to track conditions.

Israel, who is working on a book about his experience with Baffert, and who has watched handlers stroking the legs of their charges, contends, "No animals in the world receive better care than thoroughbred horses who are in the care of good, honest, hard-working trainers and their grooms and hot walkers. I've spent years on the backstretch without a vested interest, just observing. Kids aren't scrutinized that closely. Children."

Poor cosmetics of the sport have obscured those people. Instead, the public sees appalling statistics on the prevalence of breakdowns, combined with frightening visuals like the criminally overcrowded Kentucky Derby field scrumming in the mud and a horse bolting riderless in the Preakness.

Thoroughbred racing's best hope for survival is a moral blockade by these good handlers of horses, a movement from within to ostracize non-cooperators in reform. Powerful coalitions of horsemen such as the Jockey Club and the Water Hay Oats Alliance have backed Congressional legislation only because they despaired of persuading fiefdoms such as Churchill Downs to submit willingly to a national governing body. But the Santa Anita tragedies may be changing that.

As the Jockey Club pointed out in a paper, thoroughbred racing is

a balkanized sport with tracks in 38 states, from Churchill Downs to Del Mar, operating under different rules, which "denies the industry the ability to affect dynamic and effective change."

In practical terms, this made it almost impossible to resolve issues such as the overuse of Lasix, a diuretic administered to horses on race day to make them lighter and faster, a "performance-enhancing drug cloaked as a therapeutic medication," according to the Jockey Club. A lot of horsemen have long believed Lasix weakens young horses biomechanically and contributes to breakdowns. Only in the wake of the disastrous Santa Anita season did the major tracks agree to phase it out, restricting its use on 2-year-olds in 2020 and eliminating it from stakes races in 2021. And it's still

not unanimous: Just 86% of tracks signed on.

According to Israel, a national governing body is needed to deal with an even more likely contributor to breakdowns: overmedication by breeders seeking to build up yearlings "with steroids or whatever else they're putting in them" in order to sell them at auction. Buyers want a brawny youth with flashy times. Israel sees youngsters that are unnaturally fast for their tender age, and "I don't know how they're getting there," Israel says. "I think they mess around with the younger horses to make them muscled and shiny and faster, when it might not be the most propitious time to do that."

There likely is no single cause of the cluster deaths at Santa Anita: It's a systemic problem of horses

overbred and overmedicated, being overworked and over-raced on a track that was "sealed" after absorbing too much rain and therefore over-hard on them. As the Jockey Club pointed out in its report, "It would be a mistake to view the Santa Anita fatalities as an isolated situation — spikes in the deaths of horses have occurred at other tracks and they will continue to occur without significant reforms to the horse racing industry."

The problem is that it will be difficult to get at the full explanation given the current construction of racing. Without a governing body that demands "full transparency into the medical treatment, injuries and health of all racehorses," according to the Jockey Club, "today, we can't fully see what is going on with a horse

because of differing state and track practices, antiquated practices, and purposeful deceit about what drugs are given to horses at what times."

Surely, the pressure to reform horse racing should be greater from inside the sport than the pressure from outside, whether from animal rights groups, or Congress, or journalists. Horsemen talk all the time about the deep ethical component of their work, the beauty and mystery of training creatures that are not autonomous.

This is part of the draw for the audience.

The only thing that makes thoroughbred racing a meaningful exercise as opposed to a barbarity, is the right relationship between horses and handlers. No one from the outside can legislate that.
