



## Smollett special prosecutor ordered

Judge says Foxx erred in ceding responsibility; 'Empire' actor could be recharged, still faces suit

A Cook County judge on Friday ordered the surprise appointment of a special prosecutor to investigate the sudden dismissal of all charges against Jussie Smollett, saying the short-lived prosecution may have been legally invalid from the beginning.

Judge Michael Toomin ruled that State's Attorney Kim Foxx had the right to withdraw herself from overseeing the prosecution of the onetime "Empire" actor but

held no legal authority to then delegate that responsibility to her top deputy.

With the deputy holding no real authority, the Smollett case made its way through the court system without a prosecutor at the helm, the veteran judge said.

"There was no master on the bridge to guide the ship as it floundered through uncharted waters, and it ultimately lost its bearings," Toomin wrote in the 21-page opinion. "... The unprecedented irregularities identified in

this case warrants the appointment of independent counsel to restore the public's confidence in the integrity of our criminal justice system."

The decision marked a victory for Sheila O'Brien, a former state appellate judge who sought the special prosecutor in largely a solo effort, and a political blow for Foxx, the first-term officeholder who is seeking reelection next year.

"We'll get the truth, the whole truth, under oath, and that's what this is about," O'Brien told a throng of reporters in the lobby of the Leighton Criminal Court Building.

It also represents bad news for Smollett, who potentially could be recharged by a special prosecutor. The whole episode has been costly for Smollett, who won't return to his role for the final season of the Fox series "Empire." He also faces a lawsuit from the city of Chicago seeking to recoup the cost of police overtime for investigating the incident, and his attorneys have been sued for defamation by two brothers who claim Smollett paid them to help stage an attack on him.

Foxx's office had opposed the appointment of a special prosecutor.

## Chicagoans prepare for immigration raids

With the possibility of widespread immigration raids in Chicago and in other major cities this weekend, some city officials and community activists began mobilizing support for immigrants, including tak-

ing to the streets to hand out cards about rights and setting up a 24-hour hotline.

During the Friday evening rush hour, Ald. Carlos Ramirez-Rosa, 35th, and Ald. Rossana Rodriguez, 33rd, passed out "Know Your Rights" cards at the Kimball Brown Line station in Albany Park, a community that activists worry could be a

target.

"We know that Donald Trump has made good on his promise to have ICE conduct raids on immigrants," Ramirez-Rosa said.

After President Trump said federal officials would begin large-scale deportations soon, news outlets beginning with The Washington Post reported

Friday that Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials planned raids in 10 cities, including Chicago. The raids were expected to target families with existing deportation orders.

The aldermen said they fear Albany Park could be targeted because of the large number of Central American refugees

who live in the neighborhood.

"We believe one immigrant taken from the community is too many," Rodriguez said.

Ramirez-Rosa said he and other immigration advocates met with Mayor Lori Lightfoot's administration Friday afternoon to develop a more

## 11 homicides result in gang indictments

Incidents date to 2006 on South Side, Indiana

Seventeen members of the Latin Dragon street gang were charged in a sweeping indictment unsealed Friday morning alleging the group is responsible for 11 murders and 23 other shootings, stabbings and assaults that date back to 2006, including the shooting deaths of two 10-year-olds on Chicago's South Side almost 10 years apart.

The investigation into the street gang, whose ties in the city's Southeast Side go back decades, was prompted by the death of 10-year-old Gustavo Garcia in the summer of 2017. His death came at the beginning of an escalation of a gang conflict between Latin Dragons and Latin Kings after a federal indictment earlier that year decimated Latin Kings gang leadership in the area.

In Mooseheart, male takes care of eaglets after female's death

In the middle of an asphalt parking lot, atop a dead pine tree, lives a bald eagle that has endured real-life plot twists worthy of the steamiest soap

opera.

The female of the Mooseheart bald eagle pair, already a local celebrity in the western suburbs, was presumed dead after an eagle was killed in a May 29 car accident. Fans watched anxiously from outside the grounds of the Mooseheart Child City & School, where the eagle and her life mate had built their

nest.

Would the remaining eagle, thought to be the male of the pair, feed the two hungry eaglets, who were still too young to fly?

Would the eaglets even survive?

"We went down to watch every night after work, and the

# Man gets 20 years for stabbings

**Naperville couple were attacked as they slept in 2015**

A Naperville man convicted of stabbing a couple as they slept was sentenced to 20 years in prison Thursday after he apologized for the trauma he had created.

Zachary Machnikowski, 22, said he had not acted out of revenge against William and Mary Lenk for something their daughter had said about him on the night of the attack, although he did offer that to police as an excuse to explain the attack.

"It was a cowardly thing to do, and I am sorry for that," he said before DuPage County Judge Liam Brennan sentenced him.

In his closing argument, Machnikowski's attorney Jay Fuller called the attack

inexplicable and said it came during a low point for his client who has mental illness and was abusing drugs and alcohol on the night of the attack.

The attack took place at the Naperville home of William and Mary Lenk about 1 a.m. March 31, 2015. Machnikowski entered the home looking to steal alcohol but ended up attacking the Lenks with a kitchen knife as the couple slept.

At the hearing Wednesday, William Lenk said he was awakened by his wife's screams and fought off Machnikowski, who fled from the home.

William Lenk recalled yelling, "You're not going to kill me," to Machnikowski. "That night will forever be etched in my mind."

The couple suffered lac-

erations and stab wounds, but their injuries were not life-threatening.

Earlier, Machnikowski had been at a small party whose guests included Mary's Lenk's 16-year-old daughter. After his arrest, Machnikowski told authorities that the daughter had made disparaging comments about Machnikowski's looks at the gathering.

In court, though, he said that wasn't true and that he was scared and trying to offer some rationalization for his actions. He and the daughter were acquaintances, and Machnikowski had been in the Lenk home once about a year before the attack, authorities said.

He eventually pleaded guilty to attempted murder and home invasion, and he

faced a minimum sentence of 12 years and a maximum term of 60 years in prison.

Prosecutors asked for a 40-year term.

"He committed great violence without motivation and without explanation, and he terrorized a family he barely knew," Assistant State's Attorney Nancy Donahoe told the judge. "He acted out of rage without provocation. He simply chose to do this."

Donahoe said the court had heard a great deal about Machnikowski's substance abuse issues and mental illness trouble, but, the prosecutor noted, he had received services and spent three stints in rehab, and had been given resources that he had chosen to waste.

ator, arguing it would duplicate the efforts of the county's inspector general's office, which has been investigating the controversy since April. But Foxx requested the IG's probe, raising questions about its independence in some eyes.

In a brief statement Friday, Foxx didn't answer the most pressing question: Would her office appeal Toomin's decision to a higher court? Instead, she simply said she "respectfully" disagreed with the judge's decision.

Smollett, who is African American and openly gay, found himself at the center of an international media firestorm after he reported in late January that two men attacked him near his apartment building in the Streeterville neighborhood, slipping a noose around his neck and shouting racist and homophobic slurs.

But Smollett was charged on Feb. 20 with disorderly conduct after Chicago police determined that he had agreed to pay \$3,500 to the two brothers to stage the attack. On March 8, he was indicted on 16 counts of disorderly conduct alleging he lied to police.

Less than three weeks later, however, Foxx's office made the stunning announcement that all charges had been dropped against Smollett with no explanation at an unannounced court hearing.

Weeks earlier, Foxx had recused herself from overseeing the prosecution after communicating with a Smollett relative. Later, her office claimed Foxx had not recused herself "in the legal sense," a move that would otherwise have required the

entire office to withdraw from the prosecution.

But Toomin shot that argument down in his ruling Friday.

"What was intended by Ms. Foxx, and what indeed occurred, was an unconditional legal recusal," the judge wrote. "... Essentially, she announced that she was giving up all of the authority or power she possessed as the duly elected chief prosecutor; she was no longer involved."

Foxx named her first assistant, Joseph Magats, as "acting state's attorney" over the Smollett prosecution, but Toomin held that she had no authority to do so. No such title exists, the judge pointed out.

Smollett's case was "purported to have been brought and supervised by a prosecutor serving in the stead of our duly elected State's Attorney, who in fact was appointed to a fictitious office having no legal existence," Toomin wrote.

The special prosecutor, yet to be named by Toomin, will have a wide mandate. The individual may investigate "the actions of any person or office involved in all aspects of the case,"

Toomin said, and could recharge Smollett or bring an indictment against anyone else if there were reasonable grounds to do so.

Toomin's decision to appoint a special prosecutor came as a surprise in part because he had clashed with O'Brien at previous court hearings.

At the last hearing in late May, Toomin shot down O'Brien's attempts to boot Cook County prosecutors off the case, denied her permission to take depositions of Foxx and her top deputy and rejected her multiple motions to transfer the case to another judge.

When O'Brien tried to respond at the time after Toomin ruled that another judge would not hear the case, Toomin grew sharp, making it clear who still ruled from the bench.

"You're not running this courtroom," Toomin, 81, who has been on the bench for nearly 40 years, told the former judge. "Either you're going to go on to the next motion, or you will sit down."

From the start, O'Brien said she had no agenda "other than seeking the truth and restoring public

confidence" in Foxx's office and Cook County courts.

In her petition for a special prosecutor, O'Brien wrote that Foxx's actions "create an appearance of impropriety, a perception that justice was not served here, that Mr. Smollett received special treatment."

O'Brien made much in her petition of Foxx's purported recusal.

Communications later released to the Tribune showed that early in the investigation Foxx had asked police Superintendent Eddie Johnson to turn over the probe to the FBI after she was approached by Tina Tchen, a former chief of staff to first lady Michelle Obama. A spokeswoman for Foxx's office said at the time that a Smollett relative was concerned about leaks from Chicago police to the news media.

Further communications turned over last month include texts from Foxx saying she was advised to recuse herself only because of false rumors she was related to Smollett.

## Prosecutors to appeal Loop terror plot sentence

Man got 16 years in plan to blow up bar, but 40 years were sought

The U.S. attorney's office on Wednesday announced plans to appeal the 16-year sentence handed down last month to Adel Daoud in a plot to detonate a 1,000-pound car bomb outside a crowded Loop bar seven years ago.

Prosecutors had requested a 40-year sentence for Daoud, who pleaded guilty last November to terrorism charges in a rarely used legal arrangement that allowed him not to admit wrongdoing but to acknowledge that prosecutors had enough evidence to convict him. He also was convicted of soliciting the murder of the

undercover FBI agent in the case and later stabbing an inmate in the federal Loop jail who'd drawn a cartoon of the Prophet Muhammad.

In imposing the 16-year prison term at Daoud's sentencing in May, U.S. District Judge Sharon Johnson Coleman said she was essentially dealing with a different person from the "awkward" and giggly suburban Hillside teen who first appeared before her in 2012.

By law, U.S. Attorney John Lausch had until Thursday to file a notice of appeal to the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

The rare move by prosecutors to appeal a sentence further prolongs what already has been one of the longest and most unusual terrorism cases in Chicago history.

The case was delayed for nearly

two years after Daoud, who had been prone to frequent outbursts in court and once accused the judge of being a reptilian overlord, was found mentally unfit for trial before being sent to a federal facility for treatment.

Daoud's attorney, Thomas Anthony Durkin, has often accused the government of goading a mentally fragile American-born teen into a horrific plot instead of seeking alternative ways to defuse the situation.

On Wednesday, Durkin called the move to appeal the sentence "cruel, wrongheaded and stupid."

"This is nothing more than the U.S. attorney's office trying to protect itself and the FBI from the decisions they made in the investigation and prosecution of this

case," Durkin said.

A spokesman for Lausch had no comment.

The U.S. attorney's office has appealed only a handful of sentences in the past decade, and success has been hit or miss.

In 2010, the 7th Circuit reversed the sentence of probation given to former Ald. Edward Vrdolyak for a real estate fraud conviction. A district judge later resentenced Vrdolyak to 10 months in prison.

But the same court in 2015 upheld the probation sentence given to Ty Warner, the billionaire creator of Beanie Babies who evaded nearly \$6 million in federal taxes by hiding income in Swiss bank accounts.

Daoud first came under FBI scrutiny in 2012 after analysts posing as terrorists exchanged

messages with the teen and eventually got him to meet with an undercover agent, who was purportedly their "cousin" interested in waging jihad.

Over several months, Daoud and the agent met a number of times in the Chicago area to discuss potential targets for an attack, including movie theaters, a suburban mall and military recruiting centers, according to prosecutors.

Daoud was arrested Sept. 14, 2012, after he parked a Jeep he thought was packed with explosives outside the Cactus Bar and Grill, then walked to an alley about a block away.

FBI agents swarmed in after he twice pressed the phony detonator.

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## Pritzker creates census office

Order also establishes advisory panel for statewide outreach

With the 2020 census nine months away, Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed an executive order Thursday creating an office designated to help with statewide outreach efforts.

The order will allow Pritzker to appoint two coordinators for the office, which will be housed under the Illinois Department of Human Services, and create a 12-person advisory panel. The office and panel will divvy up funds for local groups to do census outreach, particularly in hard-to-count communities. The operating budget for fiscal year 2020 allocated \$29 million to the Department of Human Services for census outreach.

At stake for the state are billions of dollars in federal funding directly tied to population figures determined by the census, according to a study by the George Washington University Institute for Public Policy. The population figures are also used for redistricting and Illinois could lose one or two congressional seats after the 2020 census, experts have previously said.

Census data released this month showed the metro Chicago area lost an estimated 22,000 residents from 2017 to 2018 — marking the fourth consecutive year of population loss.

Pritzker didn't detail how quickly the office will be put together or when groups could start applying for grants to do census outreach.

"We need to get these funds out

the door as soon as possible," Pritzker said.

Pritzker said he thought the state was behind in terms of census outreach and blamed it on his predecessor, Bruce Rauner.

"Even with all the work that has been done by organizations and advocates, the previous administration failed to make this a priority," Pritzker said. "There were not enough resources concentrated on the count and little to no effort to prepare."

April 1, 2020, is the designated census day, but the decennial count will start as soon as January in remote parts of Alaska. Across the country, households will be able to respond to the census form online, by phone or by mail starting in March, according to the bureau.

Illinois lawmakers had previously created an Illinois Complete Count Commission under the Illinois secretary of state's office. Earlier this year, the secretary of state's office gave 18 groups and

cities grants for census outreach totaling nearly \$1.5 million.

David Druker, a spokesperson for the secretary of state's office, said the commission will work with the advisory panel, and he said it made sense for the Human Services Department to be the agency handling the grants.

"We see this as a positive step," Druker said.

He said much of the work done by the commission has been done on a voluntary basis or by adding duties to workers within the secretary of state's office.

"We had hoped that there would have been more funding early on," Druker said by phone Thursday. "We think the commission is making strides."

Next year's census for the first time will allow households to respond through an online form. But a controversial question that could ask people if they are U.S. citizens has dominated much of the discussion around the 2020 census. The U.S. Supreme Court is

expected to issue its decision on that question by late June.

Sen. Omar Aquino, a Chicago Democrat, described the citizenship question as a form of bullying by President Donald Trump's administration. But he said state officials want to ensure every resident is counted in the census.

"We will not allow that in the state of Illinois," Aquino said as his voice rose. "We are a welcoming state and this governor is standing for all."

If the question makes it onto the form next year, Pritzker said the state will work with local groups to reach immigrants on a one-on-one level.

"So we are going to work in every community, door to door, we are going to be working with people in the communities to make sure that people feel safe when they are filling out this questionnaire," Pritzker said.

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## Feds rest their case in killing of scholar

PEORIA — Federal prosecutors have rested their case in the trial of a former University of Illinois student who could get the death penalty if convicted of killing a scholar from China.

Brandt Christensen's lawyers called his ex-wife as a witness Friday. Michelle Christensen told jurors that Christensen showed her a bloodstain on a mattress and claimed it was from a bloody nose.

The 29-year-old Christensen is accused of luring Yingying Zhang into his car in 2017 and killing her at his apartment. Prosecutors say she was raped, choked and stabbed. Her body has not been found.

Christensen's lawyers told jurors that he killed the 26-year-old Zhang, but they dispute some details about why he did it. They're hoping they can persuade the jury to reject a death sentence if he is convicted.

In testimony Thursday, Christensen's ex-girlfriend talked about recordings she made of conversations with him, including one at a vigil for Zhang in which he recounted killing Zhang, who he said was his 13th victim. She testified on Thursday during her former boyfriend's trial for the kidnapping and murder of Zhang.

Despite his boasts, FBI agents have testified that no evidence has been found to link any other victims to Christensen. Christensen's defense attorneys admitted on the first day of the trial that Christensen killed Zhang but have insisted he wasn't being truthful when he said he'd killed other people.

## Illinois Supreme Court suspends Brodsky's law license

Move against attorney for Drew Peterson comes amid probe

Chicago attorney Joel Brodsky, who gained national notoriety for his representation of wife killer Drew Peterson, has been indefinitely suspended from practicing law amid an investigation into a series of bizarre antics that have drawn the ire of opponents and judges alike.

The move to yank Brodsky's license before the completion of the investigation was necessary because he allegedly "engaged in conduct that threatens irreparable injury to the public and to the orderly administration of justice," said a recent filing by the Illinois Attorney Registration and Disciplinary Commission, the state regulatory agency responsible for disciplining lawyers.

The Illinois Supreme Court agreed, writing in a one-page order issued Wednesday that Brodsky was "suspended from the


practice of law immediately and until further order of the court."

Brodsky had filed a written response arguing that he should be given the opportunity to present his case to the ARDC hearing board before being hit with "the extreme and perhaps career ending step of entering an interim suspension," records show.

Brodsky also said that many of his current clients would be "irreparably harmed" by his suspension, including a mother accused of aggravated battery to a child who is set to go on trial next month. Other clients include a man seeking a new trial due to alleged Chicago police torture, a complex corporate dissolution case and a child-custody case set for trial in two weeks, he said.

Brodsky could not immediately be reached Wednesday for comment.

The suspension comes less than a week after Brodsky received some relatively good news in Chicago's federal court, where an administrative panel cut his year-long suspension from practicing there in half.

Long known for his brash style, Brodsky garnered national attention for his representation of Peterson, the former Bolingbrook police sergeant convicted in 2012 of murdering his third wife, Kathleen Savio, in 2004. Peterson also was a suspect in the 2007 disappearance of his fourth wife, Stacy Peterson, who has never been found.

A 22-page filing to the ARDC last year detailed three cases involving reported misconduct by Brodsky and included a number of excerpts from emails allegedly sent by Brodsky to rival attorneys and others.

"How do you even call yourself a lawyer? You are an embarrassment to the profession," read one 2017 email from Brodsky, according to the filing.

In other emails, Brodsky allegedly described a parent in a co-parenting case as "very mentally sick" and in need of "serious help." The complaint said he sent those emails to the couple involved, opposing counsel and "various personnel" in two school districts where the couple's child might have attended school.

In an insult-laced letter sent to a rival attorney in a divorce case, Brodsky said the lawyer "appears to be learning disabled," implied that the rival has a drinking problem and sarcastically asked if the attorney has gay "feelings" for his client, the filing alleged.

In federal court, Brodsky got himself in hot water with U.S.

District Judge Virginia Kendall in a mundane lawsuit involving a used Infiniti SUV.

Brodsky's over-the-top behavior in that case — all but accusing a witness of inventing a son and saying his rival attorney was running a "criminal enterprise" — prompted Kendall to order him to undergo anger management training and pay a whopping \$50,000 fine.

At a sanctions hearing last year, Brodsky made an emotional apology to the court and the men whose reputations he had attacked, acknowledging that he had "gone too far."

"I sincerely apologize to this court for anything that I have done that caused distress in this case," Brodsky said. "I know that I have to be better in controlling my frustrations."

Brodsky has since sued the attorney who represented him in the sanctions hearing for malpractice, alleging the attorney failed to call a single witness on his behalf.

first couple of nights we never saw the parent feed them," said Dave Soderstrom, a freelance photographer who has documented the drama at the Illinois Birding Network Facebook page.

"The parent spent almost all of its time flying down the river, up a little higher than normal, in big circles, like it was looking for its mate. It was really sad to watch," he said.

Even at a time when eagles are doing well in the Chicago area, with 35 nests in the six-county region, the Mooseheart eagles stand out due to their decision to build their home just 50 yards from a fairly well-traveled road. During prime viewing season, more than a dozen cars of eagle watchers can sometimes be seen parked outside the school. Wildlife photographer Gordon Garcia, a retiree who lives in Bartlett, said he has photographed the birds about 1,000 times.


Soderstrom, 60, of St. Charles, also has taken thousands of photos.

The Mooseheart eagles were enjoying a successful breeding season, during which they shared both hunting and egg-sitting duties, when an eagle was struck by a car a few miles from the nest, at Orchard Road and Oak Street in Aurora Township. Cathy Pollack, a biologist at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, said a woman saw an eagle swoop down in front of a car, apparently diving for roadkill.

After the car drove on without stopping, the woman saw the eagle had been injured and was lying in the road, Pollack said. The woman used her car to block traffic and shield the eagle, and the bird was still alive and holding up its head when police came. One of the North Aurora police officers who arrived on the scene told Soderstrom that he tried to comfort the stately bird, picking it up and rubbing its back.

The eagle folded its wings, put its head down on its chest, and eventually closed its eyes, Soderstrom said.

"People were really sad when they heard. I got (messages) from people who were crying about it,"

he said.

The eagle's body was taken to the National Eagle Repository in Commerce City, Colorado, where Native Americans can request feathers for religious uses.

Pollack said it's unclear whether the driver of the car that hit the eagle even knew that he or she had struck the bird. To purposely kill a bald eagle is a crime, she said.

For three days after the eagle's death, Soderstrom and his friends closely watched the surviving eagle, which they believed to be the male due to factors such as the bird's relatively high tolerance for human activity. It's fairly easy to distinguish the male and female in an eagle couple when they sit side by side; the female is about 25% bigger, Pollack said. But with a

lone eagle, it can be difficult to tell.

On the third day after the eagle's death, a photographer got video of the surviving eagle bringing the eaglets a fish, and Facebook followers rejoiced.

The discovery that the surviving eagle was likely the female, not the male, came when local photographers began looking more closely at their many photos of the eagles, even blowing them up to observe the details. Subtle differences, such as how far back the beak extended, indicated to many of the longtime eagle watchers that the survivor was the female, Soderstrom said.

In yet another soap opera plot twist — some eagle watchers have suggested the saga should be titled "As the Eagle Turns" — a second adult eagle appeared on the scene

about a week ago.

Intent on protecting her young, the Mooseheart eagle squawked at the interloper and chased him away. But the other eagle, who appears to be a male, returned, and returned again, and the female began to respond more favorably, Soderstrom said.

"The other night, it flew in and they actually flew together," Soderstrom said. "They weren't right next to each other, but they were kind of following each other for a while."

Pollack said that based on a Facebook description of the birds perching in the same tree, the visiting eagle could very well be a suitor.

A lone eagle will in some cases pair up with a single parent and help raise the other parent's

young, she said.

But at this point, it appears that the Mooseheart eagle is doing fine on her own. Well-fed and rambunctious, the eaglets are hard at work practicing their flying skills, Soderstrom said.

"They flap their wings and they kind of jump up and down, and they get some air," he said. The eaglets, who are big but a bit disheveled, without a mature bird's pomp and plumage, will get a few inches of air, then a foot, then 2 feet, before falling back to the nest.

"We're really happy to see they're almost ready to fly," Soderstrom said.

"One of these days, we're going to go there and we'll see them in a neighboring tree. That could happen any day now."

Ten-year-old Gustavo, known as "Tavo" to friends and family, was in an SUV with two other adults, one of whom was a relative, when authorities allege that then-16-year-old Justin Anaya fired shots into the vehicle, aiming at a rival gang member. Tavo was hit and died that night at Comer Children's Hospital. Tavo's friends and relatives had a car wash to raise money for his funeral.

"This homicide spurred this investigation," U.S. Attorney Thomas Kirsch said at a news conference Friday morning at the federal courthouse in Hammond, Ind. "On the same night ... Ralph Mendez Jr. and other gang members killed 49-year-old Mike Whitford ... who was an unintended victim of Latin Dragon Nation gang violence."

The death of Whitford, a pizza delivery worker, was also at the hand of Dragon gang members, Kirsch said. Those two shootings came two weeks after four Dragon gang members are alleged to have initiated a takeover of a Latin King territory by shooting at rivals.

At the time of Garcia's death, Chicago police said the shooting stemmed from a conflict between the Dragons and the Latin Kings

and that some members of the Latin Kings had "flipped" Dragon members after a previous federal indictment against Latin Kings on the city's Southeast Side. They were enticed with guns and ordered to shoot at remaining leadership, Chicago police sources said.

Authorities also accused Latin Dragon gang members of being responsible for the death of 10-year-old Nequiel Fowler, who was shot while tying the shoes of her

blind 5-year-old sister. Dragons were firing at Latin Kings when they shot the girl in September 2008. The 5-year-old, unaware that her older sister had been shot, hung onto a gate and called out for her sister, authorities said.

Four men faced state charges and were convicted in connection with Fowler's slaying, though they were not charged in the indictment unsealed Friday.

Eight of the seventeen members are alleged to have commit-

ted murder, and 43 separate victims were identified as part of the investigation.

Mendez Jr. is also accused of killing someone near 98th Street and Avenue H about two months before he allegedly killed Whitford. A number of the Dragons indicted Friday morning were previously Latin Kings, Kirsch confirmed, but he wouldn't elaborate on when they flipped.

Mendez Jr. is also accused of shooting someone in October 2014, causing permanent paralysis. Then, a couple of months later, he appeared alongside other Latin Dragon members in a Facebook video sent to the victim in which one of the members flashes a gun and says, "We put you in a wheelchair."

In listing allegations against members of the Dragons to support the a criminal conspiracy charge, federal authorities made extensive use of evidence from Cook County Jail. The most recent act of violence listed in the indictment alleges that Anaya jumped on a rival gang member who was handcuffed and injured his rival and two sheriff's deputies during the attack, in late May.

"The Sheriff's Office is proud to have played a key role in the investigations that led to indictments for these crimes, including the heinous slaying of 10-year-old Gustavo Garcia," a statement from

the office said.

Anaya and Alec Nathaniel Aguilar, 20, were also alleged to have killed Manuel Salazar on the day after Thanksgiving in 2017 on the Far South Side of Chicago. Both were in custody on state charges when the indictment was unsealed Friday. Like in the shooting of Gustavo, Aguilar allegedly was the driver and Anaya the shooter. They fled into Indiana after the shooting, the indictment alleges.

Mendez Jr. already was in custody but his father, Ralph Daniel Mendez, 44, also part of Friday's charges, was taken into custody after a federal SWAT team raided his home Friday morning, according to a law enforcement source. The indictment accuses him of carrying a gun in 2013 while he was out on parole for a murder committed in the late 1990s, for which he was sentenced to 28 years in prison. The elder Mendez also appeared as an authority figure in the indictment. He's alleged to have been sought out for permission when other Dragons needed to be disciplined.

The indictment unveiled Friday was the fourth superseding indictment against the organization. Seven of the 17 members charged Friday were previously under indictment.

"robust response" on the part of the city if the raids take place.

During the meeting, both aldermen said they asked the Chicago Police Department to refuse to work with ICE and to contact local community groups and aldermen if they were notified of any impending enforcement from ICE.

In a statement released Friday, Lightfoot said that she had spoken to police Superintendent Eddie Johnson, who confirmed that ICE did not have access to the Police Department's databases.

"I have also personally spoken with ICE leadership in Chicago and voiced my strong objection to any such raids," Lightfoot said in the statement. "Further, I reiterated that CPD will not cooperate with or facilitate any ICE enforcement actions. Chicago will always be a welcoming city and a champion for the rights of our immigrant and refugee communities, and I encourage any resident in need of legal aid to contact the National Immigrant Justice Center."

A Chicago police spokesman tweeted a statement Friday confirming that the department would not participate in any deportation raids.

Across the city, immigrant rights groups began to mobilize Friday in response to the announcement of the expected raids.

Lawrence Benito, executive director of the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, said the group doesn't want to create alarm or panic, but is taking seriously the possibility of ICE raids in the city.

Benito said his group has reached out to officials at the local, county and state levels to ask law enforcement to not cooperate with federal agents, particularly because of various immigration sanctuary laws that have passed in the state.

"We believe there is no way that they can pull off a large raid of this magnitude without cooperation with local law enforcement," Benito said by phone Friday.

In Illinois, local law enforcement can't detain people solely on the basis of their immigration status without a judicial warrant. Chicago's Sanctuary City ordi-

nance bars police from letting immigration agents have access to people in local custody. It also prohibits on-duty police officers from talking with ICE officials before a person is released from custody, or allowing ICE agents to use local police facilities for investigations.

"Do not open your door if an ICE agent comes knocking," Rodriguez said in a statement released Friday. "Law enforcement officials need a warrant signed by a judge to enter your home, and ICE warrants are not signed by judges."

Cecilia Garcia, a Chicago immigration activist, said she believes the raids across the country could "beef up" Trump's reelection campaign for 2020, but could also devastate immigrant communities.

Fiona McEntee, a Chicago-based immigration lawyer, said that clients inundated her office Friday requesting help in anticipation of the ICE raids. Even people not specifically targeted by ICE agents could be caught in the agency's net, she added.

"If they happen to come across someone else who wasn't part of their list, they'll be put into proceedings," she said.

The Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights set up a 24-hour hotline people can call to seek legal help or social services if a relative is arrested, Benito said.

"We have a rapid-response team ready to help families and individuals who are impacted," Benito added.

The Lincoln United Methodist Church, at 2242 S. Damen Ave. in the Heart of Chicago neighborhood, plans to have a meeting after Sunday's service, informing community members about their rights in case federal agents show up at their homes, Garcia said. She added that community groups are also trying to help families create an emergency plan in case their relatives are arrested.

Another activist, Julie Contreras, plans to have a similar meeting with the immigrant community in Waukegan. Contreras said Friday that she'd fielded about 100 phone calls from people asking what to do if family members are taken into custody.

On the Far North Side, Ald. Maria Hadden's office was coordinating with Protect Rogers Park, a coalition of community members that aims to protect marginalized people, to pass out

flyers with information, according to a newsletter to residents of the 49th Ward.

Formed in 2017 after Trump was elected president, the group has become a network of neighbors who alert each other whenever an ICE agent is spotted in the neighborhood. About 50 volunteers are dedicated to responding to ICE raids, though the group hasn't had a verified raid since it was created.

"We hope we never have to respond to an ICE raid, but we are ready," said Gabe Gonzalez, a member of Protect Rogers Park.

As part of the group's canvassing this weekend, Gonzalez said he wants to tell his neighbors that they don't have to open their home to a federal agent unless the officer has a warrant.

"We are just going to stay vigilant and hopefully our neighbors will continue to be safe," Gonzalez said.

Ramirez-Rosa urged Chicago to unify to support immigrants, arguing the possibility of deportation for some can bring harm to all.

"A threat on undocumented Chicagoans is a threat on the entire city and our entire community," Ramirez-Rosa said.

# Iran call painted as restraint

Trump says he axed military strikes due to likely death toll

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said Friday the U.S. was “cocked and loaded” to retaliate against Iran for downing an unmanned American surveillance drone but he canceled the strikes minutes before they were to be launched after being told 150 people could die.

Trump’s tweeted statement raised important questions, including why he learned about possible deaths only at the last minute.

His stance was the latest example of the president showing reluctance to escalate tensions with Iran into open military conflict. He did not rule out a future strike but said in a TV interview with NBC News’ “Meet the Press” that the likelihood of casualties from the Thursday night plan to attack three sites in Iran did not seem like the correct response to shooting down an unmanned drone earlier in the day in the Strait of Hormuz.

The aborted attack was the closest the U.S. has come to a direct military strike on Iran in the year since the administration pulled out of the 2015 international agreement intended to curb the Iranian nuclear program and launched a campaign of increasing economic pressure against the Islamic Republic.

Trump told NBC News that he never gave a final

order to launch the strikes — planes were not yet in the air but would have been “pretty soon.”

He said military officials came to him about 30 minutes before the strikes were to be launched and asked him for his final approval. Before signing off, he said he asked how many Iranians would be killed and was told approximately 150.

“I thought about it for a second and I said, ‘You know what? They shot down an unmanned drone, plane — whatever you want to call it — and here we are sitting with 150 dead people.’ That would have taken place probably within a half an hour after I said go ahead. And I didn’t like it. I didn’t think it was proportionate.”

In Iran, Gen. Amir Ali

Hajizadeh, the head of the Revolutionary Guard’s aerospace division, told reporters on Friday that a U.S. spy plane with around 35 crew members was flying close to the unmanned U.S. Navy RQ-4A Global Hawk that was shot down, but that Iran chose not to target the manned aircraft. He said Iran warned the drone several times before downing it with a missile.

In his lengthy morning tweet, Trump defended his stance on Iran amid criticism from Democrats who accuse him of having no strategy. He said he pulled out of the 2015 Iran nuclear deal, which gave Tehran sanctions relief in exchange for pledges to rein in its nuclear program, because the agreement only temporarily blocked Iran from

having nuclear weapons. Trump said the nuclear deal also did not stem Iran’s support of militant groups or restrain its ballistic missile program.

He said his exit from the deal and the re-imposition of sanctions on Iran has crippled its economy.

“I am in no hurry,” he said. “Sanctions are biting & more added last night. Iran can NEVER have Nuclear Weapons, not against the USA, and not against the WORLD!”

The overnight events, however, were a stark reminder of the serious risk of military conflict between U.S. and Iranian forces as the Trump administration combines its “maximum pressure” campaign of economic sanctions with a buildup of American troops

in the region. As tensions have mounted in recent weeks, there have been growing fears that either side could make a dire miscalculation leading to war.

“We are in an extremely dangerous and sensitive situation with Iran,” House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said Friday. “We must calibrate a response that de-escalates and advances American interests, and we must be clear as to what those interests are.”

The Trump administration has increased economic pressure on Iran for more than a year. It reinstated punishing sanctions following Trump’s decision to pull the U.S. out of an international agreement intended to limit Iran’s nuclear program in exchange for relief from earlier sanctions.

Citing Iranian threats, the U.S. recently sent an aircraft carrier to the Persian Gulf region and deployed additional troops alongside the tens of thousands already there. All this has raised fears that tensions could push the U.S. and Iran into an open conflict 40 years after Tehran’s Islamic Revo-

lution. The downing of the huge drone over the Strait of Hormuz prompted accusations from the U.S. and Iran about who was the aggressor. Iran insisted the drone violated Iranian airspace; Washington said it had been flying over international waters.

The dispute has raised fears that an open conflict between the U.S. and Iran is on the horizon. Some lawmakers insisted the White House must consult with Congress before taking any actions.

Pelosi said no specific options for a U.S. response were presented at Thursday’s meeting between top national security officials and congressional leaders at the White House.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said, “The administration is engaged in what I would call measured responses.” And late Thursday, House Republicans on the Foreign Affairs, intelligence and Armed Services committees issued a statement using the same word, saying, “There must be a measured response to these actions.”

# Mass migrant roundup may start on Sunday

ICE raids will target thousands of families in up to 10 cities

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump has directed U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents to conduct a mass roundup of migrant families that have received deportation orders, an operation that is likely to begin with predawn raids in major U.S. cities on Sunday, according to three U.S. officials with knowledge of the plans.

The “family op,” as it is referred to at ICE and the Department of Homeland Security, is slated to target up to 2,000 families facing deportation orders in as many as 10 U.S. cities, including Houston, Chicago, Miami, Los Angeles and other major immigration destinations, said the officials, who spoke on the condition of anonymity to describe the law enforcement operation.

Acting DHS Secretary Kevin McAleenan has been urging ICE to conduct a narrower, more-targeted operation that would seek to

detain a group of about 150 families that were provided with attorneys but dropped out of the legal process and absconded.

McAleenan has warned that an indiscriminate operation to arrest migrants in their homes and at work sites separating children from their parents in cases where the children are at day care, summer camp or houses of friends and not present for the raids. He also has maintained that ICE should not devote major resources to carrying out a mass interior sweep while telling lawmakers it needs emergency funding to address the crisis at the U.S. border.

Trump has been determined to go forward with the family operation after tweeting Monday that the immigration raids were coming “next week” as a first step toward his pledge for “millions” of deportations. The White House has been in direct communication with acting ICE director Mark Morgan and other ICE officials, circumventing McAleenan, three officials said.

DHS and White House officials did not immediately respond to requests for com-


ment.

ICE has been preparing agents and equipment for the operation, which is expected to unfold across several days, officials said. Discussions about the scope of the operation continued Friday at ICE, DHS and the White House, two officials said.

The agency is planning to use hotel rooms as temporary staging areas to detain parents and children until all the members of a family are together and ready for deportation. Officials also acknowledge that they might arrest individuals they cannot immediately deport — known as “collateral arrests” — and likely will release those people with ankle monitors.

Morgan, deputy ICE director Matt Albence and others are eager to begin the operation despite the risk of a public backlash against an agency after calls to “Abolish ICE” intensified in the wake of the administration’s failed “Zero Tolerance” crackdown last year that separated more than 2,700 children from their parents.

ICE agents have limited intelligence on the locations of the families with court-ordered deportations be-

yond their last known addresses. But White House and ICE officials believe agents will be able to make many “collateral arrests” by vacuuming up foreigners living in the country illegally at or near the target locations.

Large-scale immigration enforcement operations are typically kept secret to avoid tipping off targets, but Trump’s tweet Monday blew the cover off the roundup in advance. That the operation was revealed publicly stunned law enforcement officials, and they believe it gave them more latitude to discuss the raids.

Some within DHS and ICE say the president ap-

pears to be using the operation for political purposes as he begins his reelection bid. Law enforcement officials worry that by publicly discussing the plan, Trump has undermined the chances of capturing those on the target list, as it likely pushed migrants with deportation orders underground.

But others say the president’s advance warning was welcome because of the public distrust generated by “Zero Tolerance.”

“Zero Tolerance” was not telegraphed and didn’t come out very well, so now the idea is to make sure everyone knows what’s coming,” said one senior adminis-

tration official. “The thinking is ‘Let’s do this a different way, by explaining that these are people with final removal orders who have refused to go.’”

Morgan and others at ICE insist the operation is crucial to uphold the integrity of the U.S. immigration system. There are nearly one million immigrants in the United States who have been issued deportation orders, they say, and ICE is averaging about 7,000 deportations from the U.S. interior each month.

According to the DHS, fewer than 2% of families who arrived from Central America in 2017 have been deported.

# Fire, 3 explosions rock Philadelphia refinery

PHILADELPHIA — A fire and explosions at the largest oil refinery on the East Coast sent a massive fireball into the sky and shook nearby homes before dawn Friday, though authorities reported only a few minor injuries.

The blaze broke out at the Philadelphia Energy Solutions Refining Complex around 4 a.m., spokeswoman Cherice Corley said. News and amateur video

showed the fireball bursting into the sky about 20 minutes later.

Nearby residents were asked to stay inside, and roads around the complex were closed.

Aerial footage from early afternoon showed most of the flames appeared to be extinguished but firefighters were still working the scene.

Five refinery workers were treated for minor injuries.

The cause of the fire was still unclear. Corley said three explosions, felt for

miles away, went off as the fire worked its way through pipes carrying fuel across the complex. It happened at the Girard Point refinery, one of two at the PES complex in southern Philadelphia.

Deputy Fire Commissioner Craig Murphy said the blaze started in a tank that holds a mix of propane and butane and that the flames are being fed by a main but that it’s not safe for workers to access the valve to shut it off.

He added that it’s safer to

burn off the fuel rather than fully extinguish the blaze, because the gases would still be flowing into the atmosphere.

Philadelphia Energy Solutions says the 150-year-old oil refining complex processes 335,000 barrels of crude oil daily. The refinery turns the crude into gasoline, jet fuel, propane, home heating oil and other products.

It was the second blaze at the refinery this month. No one was injured in a June 10 fire.

## Thousands in Hong Kong demonstrate against police

HONG KONG — Hong Kong's protest movement shifted its focus to the territory's embattled police force after thousands of demonstrators surrounded the department's headquarters Friday.

The tense standoff came a day after student groups demanded Hong Kong Chief Executive Carrie Lam fully retract an extradition bill that many viewed as a threat to the city's autonomy and for her to open an independ-

ent investigation of police conduct at a violent protest June 12.

The Hong Kong government issued a statement Friday that did not address the demands but did say it respected the public's right to procession and assembly while urging them to act "peacefully and rationally."

An independent investigation wasn't necessary, Lam said, because existing channels for complaints already exist.

## After no-show, House panel to subpoena Russia-born exec

WASHINGTON — The House intelligence committee says it will subpoena Russia-born business executive Felix Sater after he did not appear for a scheduled interview Friday to discuss his behind-the-scenes role in Donald Trump's effort to build a skyscraper in Moscow during the 2016 presidential election.

House Intelligence Committee Chairman Adam Schiff said the com-

mittee will subpoena Sater after he "agreed to appear this morning and he did not show up."

Sater's lawyer, Robert Wolf, said he missed the interview for "unexpected health reasons" but "looks forward to voluntarily appearing at the next rescheduled date."

Sater worked with Trump's former personal lawyer, Michael Cohen, on a deal to build a Trump Tower in Moscow.

## US blacklists 5 Chinese groups working in supercomputing

WASHINGTON — The United States is blacklisting five Chinese organizations involved in supercomputing, calling them national security threats and cutting them off from crucial U.S. technology.

The move Friday by the Commerce Department could complicate talks next week between President Donald Trump and his Chinese counterpart, Xi Jinping, aimed at de-escalating a trade dispute

between the world's two biggest economies.

The five organizations placed on the so-called Entity List are the Wuxi Jiangnan Institute of Computing Technology, supercomputer maker Sugon and three Sugon affiliates.

The organizations are involved in China's push to develop exascale high performance computing that can assist its military modernization.

## Missouri rejects renewal of license for lone abortion clinic

ST. LOUIS — Missouri's only abortion clinic lost its license to perform the procedure on Friday, though it remains open at least temporarily under a judge's order.

The state Health Department notified the Planned Parenthood clinic in St. Louis that its abortion license will not be renewed. A letter from the state cited "serious and extensive" deficiencies.

The state's decision came at the deadline set by St. Louis Circuit Judge Michael Stelzer. During a brief hearing, Stelzer said a preliminary injunction he

previously issued would remain in place, meaning the clinic can continue to perform abortions at least until he issues a final ruling outlining the next steps. He offered no timetable for that ruling.

The fight between the Republican-led state government and Planned Parenthood has raged since the Missouri Health Department allowed the clinic's license to lapse effective June 1. Stelzer ruled earlier this month that the state needed to be more definitive and set the Friday deadline to either approve or deny the license.

The fate of the clinic has drawn national attention because Missouri could become the first state since 1974, the year after the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision, without a functioning abortion clinic.

The state has said concerns about the clinic arose from inspections in March and that Planned Parenthood corrected just four out of 30 cited deficiencies.

M'Evie Mead, director of Planned Parenthood Advocates in Missouri, said the Health Department's concerns were addressed with "medically accurate and thorough responses."

## Ore. senators face fines for fleeing, threaten to sue

SALEM, Ore. — Republican state senators in Oregon continued a high-stakes game of brinkmanship Friday with Democratic lawmakers, saying they are prepared to sue if the Senate president goes through with a threat to impose a \$500 fine for each day they delay a vote on a

landmark climate plan.

Senate Majority Leader Ginny Burdick said Republicans have no legal course as the fine is explicitly written in statute.

Gov. Kate Brown deployed the state police Thursday to try to round up 11 Republican senators who fled the Legislature — and

in some cases, the state — to thwart the passage of a cap-and-trade proposal that would dramatically lower greenhouse gas emissions by 2050. The GOP caucus wants the plan to be sent to voters instead of being instituted by lawmakers — but negotiations with Democrats collapsed.

## Thousands call for climate action, target German mine

AACHEN, Germany — Thousands of students from across Europe protested Friday near a coal mine in western Germany, urging governments to take bolder action against climate change.

Organizers said up to 20,000 protesters from 16 countries took part in the rally in Aachen, near Germany's border with Belgium and the Netherlands.


It comes a day after European Union leaders failed to agree upon a plan to make the bloc's economy carbon neutral by 2050. Several large European countries — including Britain, France and Germany — have backed the target, but coal-reliant countries in the east, such as Poland, blocked consensus on the proposal, which entails an almost complete phase-out of fossil fuels. Friday's protest took place near the site of one of Germany's biggest lignite coal mines.

**In Mexico:** Mexico and El Salvador signed a cooperation agreement Thursday that includes a \$30 million Mexican donation for reforestation in the Central American nation, amid increased pressure from the United States to slow a surge of migrants traveling through Mexico toward the U.S. border.

The project to reforest some 124,000 acres, with the expected creation of 20,000 jobs, was presented as Salvadoran President Nayib Bukele met his counterpart Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador in southern Mexico, where tens of thousands of mostly Central American migrants have crossed into the country. Lopez Obrador said similar pacts are in the works for Guatemala and Honduras.

## Airlines react to Iran downing of drone

Routes changed as planes could be misidentified

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Airlines rerouted flights Friday to avoid airspace near the Strait of Hormuz after Iran shot down a U.S. military surveillance drone there and American aviation officials warned that commercial jetliners could be mistakenly attacked amid tensions between Tehran and Washington.

Long-haul carriers Emirates and Etihad were among those that changed flight routes in an area that is home to major hubs of global air travel. That could further imperil the bottom lines of Gulf long-haul carriers, which already have faced challenges under the Trump administration.

“The threat of a civil

aircraft shootdown in southern Iran is real,” warned OPSGROUP, a company that advises airlines, citing as an example the downing of a Malaysia Airlines jetliner over eastern Ukraine in 2014, killing all 298 aboard.

The Federal Aviation Administration warned of a “potential for miscalcula-

tion or misidentification” in the region after an Iranian surface-to-air missile on Thursday brought down a U.S. Navy RQ-4A Global Hawk, an unmanned aircraft with a wingspan larger than a Boeing 737 jetliner and costing over \$100 million.

The FAA gave a similar warning in May to commer-

cial airliners of the possibility of Iranian anti-aircraft gunners mistaking them for military aircraft, something dismissed by Tehran some 30 years after the U.S. Navy shot down an Iranian passenger jet, killing 290 people.

Iran had no immediate reaction to the U.S. announcement.

The FAA said its warning would affect the area of the Tehran Flight Information Region. An FAA map showed that area extending from Iran's southern border roughly a dozen miles out to sea along the Persian Gulf, the Gulf of Oman and the Strait of Hormuz, the narrow connection between the two bodies of water through which 20% of the world's crude oil passes.

“FAA remains concerned about the escalation of tension and military activity within close proximity to high volume civil air routes and Iran's willingness to use long-range (surface-to-

air missiles) in international airspace with little to no warning,” the agency said. “As a result, there is concern about the potential for misidentification or miscalculation, which could result in the inadvertent targeting of civil aviation.”

The overall impact of the directive is rather minimal, said Ian Petchenik, a spokesman for the flight-tracking website Flightradar24, because avoiding that small portion of Iranian airspace is fairly simple from a technical perspective.

The few airlines affected would simply take northerly or southerly routes to avoid the area. He estimated that 100 flights might be affected in a 24-hour period.

But Henry Hartevelde, a travel analyst at Atmosphere Research Group in San Francisco, said longer routes put in place after the 2014 Malaysia Airlines disaster added about 90 min-

utes of flying time — and critically, fuel burn — in each direction for flights between Europe and parts of Asia.

Qantas said it would reroute its London flights to avoid the Strait of Hormuz and Gulf of Oman. British Airways, KLM, Malaysia Airlines and Singapore Airlines said their flights would avoid the strait. Lufthansa said it would avoid both the Strait of Hormuz and the Gulf of Oman, as well as nearby land. However, it said it would continue its flights to Tehran.

Emirates, the long-haul carrier in Dubai near the Strait of Hormuz, told AP it was “rerouting all flights away from areas of possible conflict.” Its sister airline, the low-cost FlyDubai, said it “adjusted some of the existing flight paths in the region as a precautionary measure.”

Etihad, based in Abu Dhabi, also said it would “change a number of the flight paths we operate.”

## Feds sue to block proposed merger of Chicago printing firm

The Department of Justice filed an antitrust lawsuit Thursday to block the proposed merger of Quad/Graphics and Chicago-based LSC Communications — the two largest printers in the U.S. — alleging it would raise the prices of books, catalogs and magazines.

Wisconsin-based Quad announced in October it would buy LSC in an all-stock deal valued at \$14 billion, including the assumption of debt. The Justice Department alleges the

merger would eliminate beneficial competition between Quad and LSC, putting a “significant share” of the U.S. printing market under one corporate umbrella.

“By eliminating the ‘intense rivalry’ between these two firms, the proposed merger would deny their customers the benefits of competition and likely increase the price and reduce the availability of products from popular magazines,” the Justice Department said in the lawsuit, which was filed in Chicago federal court.

The complaint alleges that Quad's proposed acquisition of LSC would end a price war between the two companies, where multimillion-dollar signing bonuses, lower printing prices and quality improvements benefited both publishers and consumers. Combining the two largest providers of printing services would lead Quad to “reduce printing capacity, reduce printing quality and raise the prices of its printing services,” the Justice Department alleged in the lawsuit.

LSC was spun off from legacy Chicago printing

company R.R. Donnelley in 2016. Quad and LSC provide similar services, including printing and distributing magazines, catalogs and books. In 2018, Quad's revenues were \$4.2 billion, while LSC's revenues were \$3.8 billion. Aggressively bidding against each other for clients reduced profit margins, leading the companies to seek “pricing stability” through the proposed merger, the lawsuit alleged.

Both companies said they will fight the lawsuit, touting cost-saving synergies in the proposed merger, and point-

ing at digital competition as the real threat to print publishing.

“Our goal is to make print a more effective and affordable media option to that of digital giants such as Google and Facebook,” Joel Quadracci, Quad's chairman, president and CEO, said in a news release. “The DOJ does not appear to recognize the competitive effect of digital media on the print industry.”

LSC also pledged to contest the Justice Department suit, citing excess capacity in the printing industry and the rise of digital competition.

In its lawsuit, the Justice Department downplayed the threat of digital competition, saying “publishers and their customers will continue to demand printed magazines, catalogs and books in the future.”

The Justice Department lawsuit is seeking to permanently block the proposed Quad-LSC merger and prevent “any other transaction that would combine the two companies.”

#### Cancer patients need opioid relief

The war on opioid addiction is clearly justified given that from 1999 to 2017, there have been 700,000 deaths from opioid overdose. In 2017, 70,200 people died from overdoses. In response to the growing opioid crisis, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in 2016 developed guidelines for primary care physicians who prescribe opioids for chronic pain outside active cancer treatment, palliative care and end-of-life care.

While CDC directives are clear, the unintended consequences are that cancer patients are being impacted by restrictive governmental regulation on opioid prescribing. Many patients are receiving only a fraction of the opioid dose prescribed. Treating cancer physicians often get calls from a pharmacist questioning the dose and quantity of the opiate prescribed.

The grim reality is that advanced-stage cancer patients as well as patients with sickle cell disease will never achieve pain relief with non-opioid analgesics. Therefore, opioid therapy is the only recourse. The risk of opioid-related death is very low in cancer patients.

Cancer and sickle cell patients have enough burdens to deal with. They should not be judged or stigmatized because of needing opiate therapy. Unintentional barriers to appropriate pain control should not be imposed on these vulnerable patients.

## Can nesting plovers enjoy summer in Chicago?

Two piping plovers have chosen to nest in Chicago, doing their part to save a federally endangered species. Mom and Dad — known as Rose and Monty — have been busy mating and laying eggs on Montrose Beach.

**This happy occasion** comes with an urban complication: Montrose Beach is a busy, noisy place in summer. That's great for Chicagoans, potentially stressful for ploverians. On Aug. 23-24 a large-scale, two-day music festival, Mamby on the Beach, is scheduled for that location. Somewhere around those dates the chicks would be expected to begin flying.

The Chicago Audubon Society and other advocates argue that the music festival shouldn't be allowed to disrupt a fledgling bird family. They want to ban large concerts at Montrose Beach. Jerry Mickelson of Jam Productions, the festival promoter, says he doesn't want to hurt the chicks and is working on a contingency plan to shift the concert locations about 1,100 yards away, the Tribune's Morgan Greene reports.

There are just about 70 pairs of plovers in the Great Lakes popula-

tion. The good news here is that lots of people have taken an interest in the birds. Volunteers are guarding the Montrose Beach nest in shifts. Environmental groups are advocating for the plovers. Their advocacy is backed by federal law: The plover has been protected under the Endangered Species Act since 1986.

The question is whether the Chicago Park District, Jam and the others can keep the birds safe while allowing city life to go on as planned. With luck, these won't be the only plovers to ever summer in the city. It's a good sign for the future of the species, in fact, that Monty and Rose are nesting on the North Side, just east of Lake Shore Drive in proximity to Uptown.

Obviously, life isn't easy for these birds. Plovers are small and sandy-colored with black markings. Blending in with the beach is a natural line of defense. Their nests are simply hollows in the sand, lined with rocks and shells. Monty and Rose's first clutch of eggs was removed from the beach as a storm loomed and are being cared for by the Lincoln Park Zoo. Their second nest is in a potentially safer area.

**To keep the birds safe**, the concert promoter would indeed need to shift the festival site and/or take other precautions including adding sound barriers to prevent the startled bird parents from fleeing their nest.

These would not only be the right things to do, they would be in likelihood required by federal law. In Sandy Hook, New Jersey, earlier this month, federal officials canceled an annual summer concert series after discovering a piping plover nest, reports public media station WHYY.

Mickelson said: "We'll follow the guidelines that we have to follow to make sure these birds are protected." That's the right sentiment, and again, it comports with federal law. The plovers must be kept safe. Ideally, officials work with the promoter and others to look out for the birds and also allow the festival, which is expected to attract 20,000 concertgoers.

This could be a valuable lesson in accommodation. With some hospitality and a little bit of luck, more plovers will discover just how delightful Chicago can be in summer.

### WHAT OTHERS ARE SAYING

The Harvard admissions committee is the epicenter of the meritocracy. In the meritocracy, winners win. If you get a straight-A average, that proves you have mastered the art of learning math (or at least mastered the tests that are supposed to measure these things). Moral formation is not like learning math. It's not cumulative; it's inverse. In a sin-drenched world it's precisely through the sins and the ensuing repentance that moral



It's hard to know if Kyle Kashuv has learned from his repulsive comments, but if he has, wouldn't Harvard want a kid who is intellectually rigorous and morally humble? Wouldn't it want a student who could lend a hand to all the perfect resume children who may not have yet committed a disgrace, but who will?

## Generations unite

'Toy Story 4' director Josh Cooley was 15 when he saw the first movie. Now he's the person in charge

In 1995, a 15-year-old aspiring cartoonist named Josh Cooley walked into a movie theater in his hometown of Livermore, California, bought a ticket to a much-buzzed-about new animated film called "Toy Story" and had his mind forever blown to infinity and beyond.

"I had always wanted to be in animation for as long as I could remember," Cooley says. "But it was unlike anything I'd ever seen."

The first feature film to be entirely computer-animated, "Toy Story" was unlike anything *anyone* had ever seen, and the movie's success would kick off a beloved trilogy and set the template for all of Pixar Animation Studios' smashes to follow.

Now, 24 years later, that onetime would-be cartoonist whose career path was shaped in part by Sheriff Woody and Buzz Lightyear has inherited the keys to the toy chest as the director of "Toy Story 4."

"Toy Story 4," in theaters June 21, arrives nearly a decade after 2010's "Toy Story 3" put what many thought would be the final punctuation mark on a series that has grossed nearly \$2 billion worldwide and earned a slew of Oscars. The film sets Woody and his plaything friends off on a fresh adventure when their new owner, Bonnie, creates an arts-and-crafts toy she names "Forky." As Woody tries to save Forky from an existential crisis, he is reunited with lost love Bo Peep in a local

antique shop and finds his way toward a new purpose in life.

Even as it brings together familiar characters including Woody (voiced by Tom Hanks), Buzz (Tim Allen) and Bo Peep (Annie Potts) with new ones including Forky (Tony Hale), stunt-motorcyclist action figure Duke Caboom (Keanu Reeves) and plush-toy duo Ducky and Bunny (Keegan-Michael Key and Jordan Peele), "Toy Story 4" unites two generations of Pixar talent.

Key players at the studio who originally brought the franchise to life, including Andrew Stanton and Pete Docter, have teamed up with people like Cooley, who grew up with the "Toy Story" movies.

"This movie definitely bridged that gap," says the 39-year-old Cooley, who is making his feature debut with the picture. "We had people on this film that worked on the original 'Toy Story,' like my production designer Bob Pauley, who designed Buzz Lightyear. Then we have artists on this film that actually showed us pictures of themselves when they were 6 years old dressed as Buzz Lightyear for Halloween."

In wake of "Toy Story 3," which ended with an air of finality when the toys' owner, Andy, went off to college, few expected the franchise to continue. But even before the film was released, Stanton — who has had screenplay or story credit on every "Toy Story" movie — quietly started discussing ideas for where the series could potentially go with fellow Pixar brain trust members John Lasseter, Docter and "Toy Story 3"

director Lee Unkrich.

Eventually, they settled on the notion of bringing back the porcelain figurine Bo Peep, who was most prominent in the original "Toy Story" but absent from "Toy Story 3," as a helper of lost toys who could guide Woody toward his next chapter.

"Andrew, John, Pete and Lee kind of had a pact that they didn't want to put an idea forward for a 'Toy Story 4' if they didn't all agree that it was the right thing to do," says producer Mark Nielsen. "The [project] always had Bo Peep at its core. The code name we had for it inside the studio from the very beginning was 'Peep.'"

Having worked his way up through the Pixar ranks, first as a storyboard artist on films including "Cars" and "Ratatouille" and then as a writer on "Inside Out" and the director of the short "Riley's First Date," Cooley was initially brought on to co-direct "Toy Story 4" with Lasseter, who had directed the first two films in the series. But in July 2017, Lasseter announced he was stepping away from directing to focus on his executive responsibilities at Pixar and Walt Disney Animation Studios.

Later that year, after allegations of sexual misconduct surfaced against him, Lasseter took a leave of absence. He left Pixar and Disney at the end of 2018, though he retains a story credit on "Toy Story 4."

For Cooley, learning he was assuming the directing reins of the film on his own was a shock to the system.

"When I took over, we hadn't really cracked the story completely yet," Cooley

says. "I was told by everybody, 'Just question everything that we've got so far. Don't feel like you need to hold onto anything.'"

"The thing that really unlocked it was when we came up with the idea of having Woody grow enough to complete his arc. He's always been so there for a kid and he was always telling everybody, 'That's our job.' To have him realize that [life] doesn't just have to be in this bedroom, that it can be bigger than that — once we had that, we thought, 'OK, now there's some real juice to this story.'"

Combining the passion and energy of the younger generation with the hard-won institutional knowledge of the older one provided what Rivera calls "a creative insurance policy over the film."

"Our attitude of being around from the early ones is, 'We have to protect the studio and make this great,'" he says. "Their attitude is, 'We have to protect our childhood. We don't want this messed up.'"

As for where the "Toy Story" franchise could go from here — if indeed it goes on at all — Cooley says he's happy to let things unfold in their own time.

"There's been no talk of a fifth movie," he says. "For me, I feel very happy with the ending of this film. I feel like it completes Woody's arc completely. But at the same time, at Pixar we have this kind of 'never say never' [attitude] because you never know what great ideas can come about."

## Zendaya and Hunter Schafer aren't afraid to raise eyebrows

"Nobody is getting their head cut off," Zendaya says. She's referring to the hubbub over her latest project: "Euphoria," HBO's unflinching portrait of teen life.

It's true. There aren't the beheadings viewers came to expect from "Game of Thrones." But that doesn't mean the new HBO drama isn't raising eyebrows.

The first episode includes a drug overdose, an unsettling statutory rape scene and a sexual encounter involving unsolicited choking. "Euphoria" has spurred controversy ahead of its June 16 premiere for its gritty use of sex, drugs and nudity to illustrate the grown-up situations Generation Z must navigate.

Schafer, are deep in discussion about the need for a dark, uncensored exploration on teen life — an antidote to the glossier version typically pushed on television.

"This show is in no way to tell people what the right thing to do is," Zendaya, 22, says. "This is not 'The Moral Message Show.' This is to inspire compassion among people for other human beings and to understand that everyone has a story you don't know about, a battle that they're fighting that you don't understand."

"I don't find the show shocking, but there will be people who do."

"But I also think that's what being a teenager is," Schafer, 20, adds. "Finding the middle ground between being an adult and being a kid and that transition. I think one of the hardest parts is finding yourself in adult situations but not knowing how to

navigate them. And that makes people uncomfortable — because it is uncomfortable."

Based on the Israeli series of the same name, "Euphoria" was adapted for HBO by Sam Levinson (the son of filmmaker Barry Levinson) and counts rapper Drake — a graduate of the more wholesome teen series "Degrassi: The Next Generation" — as an executive producer. Levinson, 34, pulled from his own troubled youth and battle with anxiety, depression and addiction to opiates in creating the series.

"I think people like to kind of put their head in the sand when it comes to some of these conversations," Levinson says in a telephone interview. "And there's such a generational disconnect."

"It's not like 30 years ago, when one generation could provide at least a bit of a road map for the next generation. Life now moves at such a fast speed. I think we're all adapting at the same time, so it's difficult to give any kind of real advice to the younger generation about how to navigate the world."

While "Euphoria" features an ensemble of teen characters, it centers on the intimacy that develops between Rue and Jules, who become each other's confidantes and advocates amid the pressures of adolescence. The series is full of hefty material for Zendaya and Schafer to dig into: Zendaya's Rue is a high school student fresh off an unsuccessful stint in rehab who can't stop her destructive compulsions. Schafer's Jules is a trans girl who recently moved into town and is battling her own demons, including a habit of spending her nights having sex with closeted older men and a harrowing past of self-harm.

"I think Rue and Jules are soul mates," Zendaya says. "Whether that's questionable. But I think that at a point in time, there's a connection that nobody else will be able to understand but them and they'll always have it. ... There's a lot of beauty in it, but there's also a lot of toxicity."

"They become each other's alternative

to the toxic elements in their lives" is how Schafer describes the relationship between the characters.

Stepping into the roles was its own coming-of-age tightrope for the young actresses.

A Disney Channel darling since the age of 13 in 2010's "Shake It Up," Zendaya (whose last name is Coleman) was facing a transition in her career. During breaks from her subsequent Disney gig, "K.C. Undercover," she built a list of credits that took her beyond the bounds of Mickey Mouse.

She appeared in 2017's "Spider-Man: Homecoming" as Peter Parker's love interest, MJ — a part she'll reprise in the forthcoming sequel "Spider-Man: Far From Home." She also starred in 2017's big-screen musical "The Greatest Showman." But plotting her post-Disney career after "K.C. Undercover" came to an end in early 2018 proved daunting.

For Schafer, "Euphoria" marks her first TV series. The Raleigh, N.C., native had been working in New York as a model for fashion heavy-hitters such as Dior and Marc Jacobs. She was set to go to fashion design school when she saw a casting call on Instagram seeking a trans actress for the

series.

"I was a little scared about being trans and falling into an archetype," she says. "But after getting a few scripts, it started to make more sense to me and started to resonate even more."

Beyond the shocking nature of the series, the two hope "Euphoria" provides a sobering window into the anxiety and stress facing young people today.

"I think a lot of people don't understand how intense and complicated it is to be a teenager today," Schafer says. "I think a lot of parents see their kids on their phones and think they're a [damn] zombie."

"Rue says in the first episode something like, 'We just showed up here without a map or compass.' And it's true because we don't know what the ... we're doing," Zendaya says. "Nobody actually knows what they're doing."


"Imagine growing up in social media and being a child. It's not easy. It's confusing and it's uncomfortable. It's a lot of things. It's created by the very people that call us the zombies or whatever. It's like, we're the byproduct of this."



## Parents push back against piercings

**Dear Amy:** My husband and I are raising four children. For many years, we have had a rule about piercings. Our daughters had to wait until they were 12 to pierce their ears. We felt that this was an age where they had some accountability for taking care of their ears. Each of our daughters has chosen to pierce their ears.

Our 19-year-old daughter now wants a second piercing. I was sort of OK with it, but my husband is not. She admitted that this piercing was just a start and that there would be others. This tactic upset me, as I am not a fan of multiple piercings. I sold hepatitis C treatments and know that unsafe piercing carries risks. Our daughter is training to be a nurse, and I think multiple piercings are unprofessional.

Is it wrong of us to say that when she moves out and supports herself, she can do whatever she wants, but while she is living at home, we'd appreciate her respecting our views?

— Concerned Parents

**Dear Concerned:** With your daughter living at home, you and your husband can lay down whatever limitations you want ... as long as you don't mind conveying to her that while she is with you, YOU will be in control of her choices related to her body.

I don't believe that this is a positive message to send to a young woman. It is possible that your emphasis on these limitations is one reason your daughter wants to push them.

The advantage of piercings over tattoos, for example, is that they are rela-

tively easily reversed. The Center for Young Women's Health (youngwomenshealth.org) has a comprehensive list of possible complications related to piercing. I suggest that as you discuss this, you and your daughter review this information together.

Your daughter is training to be a nurse. As she matures, she will understand the professional limitations presented by piercings, and then she could choose to keep or remove them, based on what her goals are.

**Dear Amy:** I have a best female friend. I also have a boyfriend. He teaches in a town over 2,000 miles away. He visits and stays with me every summer.

He sometimes says things that sound like he thinks I prioritize my relationship with my BFF over him. I see my friend for breakfast once a week (we both work a lot), and when my boyfriend visits, my friend and I still have our weekly breakfast, but a shorter version.

My best friend is married to a guy who lives with her year-round, and I understand that right now my guy only has about four months a year to spend with me, so time is scarce.

I factor this limitation into my breakfasts with my friend, but she has saved my life (or at least my sanity) numerous times, and maintaining the friendship is important to me. Is there a way I can prove to my boyfriend that I value our relationship and take it very seriously, without feeling like I'm shafting a friendship that means a lot to me?

**Dear Friend:** Your question speaks to me, because (unless I'm traveling) I've been meeting with the same group of women at a local diner for breakfast every week for 30 years.

If you are working hard and also have an active domestic life, this breakfast meeting might be the only time you have to put your own life into perspective through telling your story. This weekly experience recharges and refreshes you. It is therapeutic.

According to you, you make concessions to your boyfriend by truncating your breakfast meetings. If he is so idle that he is bothered by you spending 90 minutes or so each week with your friend, then maybe he needs to get busier.

If he questions your right — and need — to do this, then you could ask him to choose for you: You can meet with your friend once a week, or enter therapy.

**Dear Amy:** A reader asked how to respond when offered a dish he doesn't like. My boilerplate response is, "Wow, that's very interesting!" People rarely press for details. It can be applied to situations such as ugly children, pets, vacation photos, etc. Works for me!

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## Showtime's 'City on a Hill' plays up its Boston backdrop

The first names that appear in the credits sequence of "City on a Hill" belong to executive producers Ben Affleck and Matt Damon, which makes almost too much sense, given where the new Showtime series takes place. Set in 1990s Boston, and originating from an idea Affleck pitched creator Chuck MacLean, the show explores rampant corruption and casual racism plaguing the city's law enforcement.

MacLean shares the two A-listers' Boston cred, having grown up in the suburb of Quincy, Mass., before attending Emerson College and briefly writing for local newspapers. His cops-and-robbers drama, which centers on an interracial partnership between a racist FBI agent (Kevin Bacon) and a new-in-town assistant district attorney (Aldis Hodge), aspires to accomplish something in

the vein of David Simon's HBO series "The Wire," as several critics have pointed out. MacLean's show features considerably more Catholic guilt.

The result is a show that, however authentic, so intensely embraces Boston film and television tropes that its characters might as well hop on the T to Braintree with cups of Dunkin' Donuts coffee in hand. Here's a closer look at how that played out in the first episode, which aired Sunday night.

**The accents:** As the unscrupulous FBI agent Jackie Rohr, Bacon speaks like his mouth is full of gravel. It's a miracle none of the rocks fall out when he stretches his A's, as South Boston natives do. "You fohgettin' what state yuh livin' in, pal?" he says at one point. "This is Massachooetts!"

The best accents in "City on a Hill" are arguably showcased by the Ryan family — the morally ambiguous Frankie (Jonathan

Tucker, who's also from Boston) and his younger brother, Jimmy (Mark O'Brien). Frankie is the brains behind the armored car robbery that kicks off the show, and Jimmy, who has a drug problem, tries to persuade his older brother

to let him in on the next heist: "Brotha, come on," Jimmy pleads. In return, Frankie orders Jimmy — several times — to "get in the cah!"

An honorable mention goes to two women at the beauty salon where Frank-

ie's wife, Cathy (Amanda Clayton), works. One of them asks, "Did you heah about the thing in Revere?" Her friend responds, "What, the dead ahmed cah gahhds?"

**The sports:** Hockey reigns supreme among all ages, as is established by Frankie and Cathy's young daughter running into the beauty salon with a bloody nose and announcing that it was "Johnny O'Malley with a hockey stick" who inflicted the wound. Even the episode's title gets in on it. "The Night Flynn Sent the Cops on the Ice," a story Rohr tells while smoking outside a funeral home, references a "bloody brawl" at a Boston Bruins-Montreal Canadiens game in the mid-1980s, when Raymond Flynn was mayor.

And then there's football. When Decourcy Ward (Hodge), the disciplined attorney who arrives from Brooklyn to get things on track, asks someone why Rohr gets away with so

much, Ward learns that Rohr is regarded as though he were "the FBI's Doug Flutie." Flutie is a football player who gained prominence after his historic "Hail Flutie" touchdown pass helped the Boston College Eagles beat the University of Miami Hurricanes during a 1984 game.


**The geographical references:** In an effort to persuade Frankie and his fellow armed, masked robbers not to kill him, a witness tells them that he's from D Street, likely referring to the projects located in Southie: "All's I'm saying is that I grew up with it!" he cries. "I'm not gonna rat anyone out!"

Several characters also name-drop Charlestown, the working-class, largely Irish neighborhood from which Ben Affleck's 2010 crime thriller "The Town" got its name.

Intrigued? Just wait for the second episode, titled "What They Saw in Southie High."

## Audiobooks worth a listen: Two novels and a history




**"The Lost Man"** by Jane Harper, Macmillan, 11 hours

Like its predecessors, Jane Harper's third novel is set in Australia — this time on a remote cattle station in the outback, where Cameron has been found dead near an old gravestone far from the homestead and 8 kilometers

from his car. This is cruel, sun-blasted terrain that will kill a man without water or shade in less than a day. Why did Cameron wander away from his vehicle, well-stocked as it was with supplies? The solution lies in the past, secrets from which emerge slowly, shedding light on the characters and relationships of his two brothers, wife, mother, deceased father and others. And what of the young Englishwoman Cameron may or may not have raped in his youth? The answers are both shocking and believable. The novel's strong sense of place and personality is handily conveyed by Australian voice actor Stephen Shanahan who narrates this thoroughly engrossing book in a no-nonsense Aussie accent.



**"Good Riddance"** by Elinor Lipman, Dreamscape, 8 hours

Elinor Lipman's latest comic romp begins with Daphne Maritch decluttering her cramped Manhattan apartment and discarding her late mother June's cherished possession, the 1968 high school yearbook for which she was adviser as a 23-year-

old teacher. Over the years June attended every class reunion, annotating the student photos with generally catty — and a few mysterious — remarks. The yearbook is snapped up from the building's recycling bin by the unlovely, would-be documentary filmmaker Geneva Wisenkorn, intent on making a film on the subsequent fates of the students, now in their 60s. Daphne objects; Geneva doggedly holds on to the book — and soon scandalous secrets from the past erupt, generating a vastly entertaining screwball comedy held together with improbabilities. Mia Barron delivers the tale in a pleasant, low-pitched, faintly rueful voice — entirely in tune with Daphne's predicament. Witty, dippy and daft, we have here a genuine, guilty pleasure.



**"How to Hide an Empire: A History of the Greater United States"** by Daniel Immerwahr, Recorded Books, 17:30 hours

Narrator Luis Moreno delivers Daniel Immerwahr's sprawling, fascinating book in a calm, teacherly voice. Here we find a United States

whose territory extends far beyond what we see in the familiar map. This is a tale of acquisition and expanding borders, of wresting land from indigenous peoples. Moving through history and from topic to topic, Immerwahr covers a wide variety of subjects — including experimentation with drugs on subject populations, the use or torture against dissidents and rebels, the proliferation of U.S. military bases and stations around the globe and the dominance of the English language in computer coding. For all the depressing material, the book is lively and revelatory in identifying the connections that created and bind the American empire.

**“The Old Man & the Gun”** (7 p.m., 11:05 p.m., HBO): Robert Redford earned warm reviews and a Golden Globe nomination for his performance as career criminal and prison escape artist Forrest Tucker in writer-director David Lowery's 2018 dramedy that is loosely based on a 2003 New Yorker article. Casey Affleck, Sissy Spacek, Danny Glover and Tom Waits also appear. Upon completion of the film in 2018, Redford, 82, announced his intent to retire from acting.

**“To Have and to Hold”** (7 p.m., 11:01 p.m., Lifetime): When her former high school crush, the handsome and now wealthy Joe, asks her to marry him, Alice is so stunned and happy she doesn't blink when he starts to mold her into the perfect socialite wife. # The gonzo marketing behind ‘Secret Life of Pets 2’

“The Secret Life of Pets” was based on a simple premise: What are your furry friends up to when you're not around? That, and people's never-to-be-underestimated love of their animals, turned the 2016 animated movie into an \$875 million global hit. For the sequel, which hits theaters this weekend, Comcast Corp.-owned Universal Pictures and Illumination Entertainment have gone to extreme lengths to exploit that formula in their marketing efforts.

The studios have courted publicity from Kim Kardashian West and her dog Sushi, dozens of pet “influencer” accounts on Instagram and the hairdo chain Drybar, which is offering free blowouts for dogs at designated “Barkbars.” (Four-legged customers in Manhattan and West Hollywood can select from a menu of styles based on characters from the movie, including “The Gidget”: “Big hair, lots of volume.”)

A recent episode of the ABC series “The Bachelorette,” produced by Warner Bros., promoted the “The Secret Life of Pets 2” by having the male contestants do a photoshoot with cute animals. Bachelorette Hannah Brown watched in a secret room to see whether the men would flirt with the show's attractive animal handler and makeup artist as they got ready to pose with the critters.

“I guess you could call this the secret life of Hannah's guys,” said Demi Burnett, a former “Bache-

lor” contestant who appeared in the episode to explain the 10-minute segment.

A stretch for the sake of product integration, perhaps.

But such unlikely cross-promotions have increasingly become the norm for studios hyping their films in an entertainment market saturated with popular franchises including Marvel Studios' “Avengers: Endgame” and Walt Disney Studios' “Aladdin.” The crowded multiplex — not to mention competition from prestige cable dramas, streaming and video games — have forced studio marketing departments to step up their game.

It's now commonplace for studios to spend more than \$100 million to market their biggest movies. And the omnipresent tie-ins and partnerships — which get films promoted in fast food chains and on grocery store items — can generate up to \$400 million worth of additional publicity. An average consumer can expect to be exposed to a movie's marketing efforts more than 50 times before the film comes out, said marketing expert Gene Del Vecchio.

“They want to make sure every member of the audience is bombarded with messages,” said Del Vecchio, who wrote the book “Creating Blockbusters” and teaches entertainment marketing at USC's Marshall School of Business. “When you're battling against other behemoths, you have to use every tool you can.”

The stakes are high for “The Secret Life of Pets 2,” which hits theaters two

weeks before the highly anticipated Pixar sequel “Toy Story 4.”

“Pets 2” is expected to gross \$50 million to \$60 million Friday through Sunday in the U.S. and Canada, according to people who have reviewed pre-release audience surveys. That would be a solid start for the \$80 million film, but still down significantly from the first “Pets,” which opened with a massive \$104 million domestically.

“Sometimes, the market expands to accommodate two similar films, and sometimes it doesn't,” David A. Gross, a film industry expert who runs the consulting firm Franchise Entertainment Research Inc. Hence the need to generate as much attention as possible before opening weekend.

Flooding every available advertising space is a familiar concept for “Pets 2” animation studio Illumination, the NBCUniversal-owned company behind the “Despicable Me” franchise and its “Minions” spinoff. The yellow, gibberish-spewing Minions from those movies have been used to sell Tic Tacs, paint and Chiquita bananas.

But even in an industry packed with out-of-left-field branding initiatives, some of the stunts for “Pets 2” have stood out. In a paid Instagram post last week, for example, Kim Kar-

dashian West put up a photo of herself in a revealing black dress, next to a jarring image of her fluffy dog in the same outfit.

“Guess who's trying to be the family favorite... SUSHI!!!!” read the caption for the post, which got 3.4 million likes. “Do your pets compete for attention when there's a new [baby emoji] in the house?”

No demographic is left untargeted. The studio created a Snapchat filter that would allow users to give their dogs and cats animated mouths and voices in the app. An ad featuring Chloe the cat played before the online premiere of Taylor Swift's video for her song “Me.”

Ads shown during the NBA playoffs featured players Ben Simmons of the Philadelphia 76ers and Paul George of the Oklahoma City Thunder with their dogs. “Secret Life of Pets 2” booked 16 ad spots during the first four games of the NBA Finals.

The studio also reached out to operators of popular pet accounts on Instagram, offering free swag in exchange for promoting the movie.

Corrine Scheffers, a 35-year-old underwriter near Kalamazoo, Michigan, was contacted by a person working on the “Pets 2” campaign who asked her if she would be willing to post about the movie through the account

she created for her 5-year-old Maltipoo, Cooper, for National Pet Day.

Scheffers, whose 10-year-old stepdaughter is a fan of the original “Pets” movie, agreed. She received a package with a set of bright red “Secret Life of Pets 2” bandannas to put on Cooper and her new puppy, Kenna, along with a list of suggested hashtags to use in her post. Cooper and Kenna have roughly 9,370 followers, qualifying them as “micro-influencers.” While working with such small accounts isn't necessarily new for advertisers, they can be a clever way to reach specific target audiences, such as pet-lovers, according to marketing

experts.

It seems unlikely that such posts could do much to boost a film's box office prospects. But the modern Hollywood strategy is to advertise everywhere, all the time, and that now includes your pooch's Instagram account.

“Social media has become such an important thing for advertisers,” said Scheffers, who says she was not compensated beyond the “Pets” apparel. “Plus, what's not to love about cute animals in oversized bandannas?”



North's jump to four spades showed a terrible hand with a spade fit and 0-3 high-card points. South didn't need much to have an adequate play for slam, so he carried on anyway.

South won the opening heart lead with his ace and took a moment to plan the play. Dummy didn't have much, as advertised, but the doubleton diamond and the nine-eight of trumps provided hope. One line of play was to cash the ace of clubs and then lead the queen of clubs.



If an opponent took his king, there were enough clubs in dummy to discard three of declarer's diamonds. This would need a trump split of no worse than 3-1. It was possible that the opponent who won the king of clubs could play another club for his partner to ruff. South could ruff high, of course, but there would no longer be enough clubs in dummy to discard three diamonds. The diamond finesse would then be needed.

South found an elegant improvement on this line. At trick two, South led the queen of clubs! West could win with his king but could do no damage to the contract. Should West duck his king, South would play to ruff two diamonds. This line needed clubs no worse than 4-2 and spades no worse than 3-1. No finesse would ever be needed. Well done!

## Future's now

3rd pick Dach given chance to make team this year, eventually succeed Toews

BY JIMMY GREENFIELD

VANCOUVER, British Columbia — The shock wasn't nearly as big as it would have been if Jack Hughes or Kaapo Kakko had fallen out of the top two spots, but when the Blackhawks announced the selection of Canadian forward Kirby Dach with the No. 3 pick on Friday at the NHL draft it still turned some heads.

Most draft experts believed the Hawks were leaning toward center Alex Turcotte

or defenseman Bowen Byram. All along, general manager Stan Bowman and vice president of amateur scouting Mark Kelley have said they were focused on taking the player they believe has the best long-term NHL future.

That player turned out to be Dach, a powerful and skilled 6-foot-4, 198-pound center with a right-handed shot who won't turn 19 until next January and should only get stronger.

"It's pretty surreal," Dach said. "I'm kind

of at a loss for words of what just happened. But it's awesome to be picked by the Blackhawks."

The Hawks passed on Turcotte, who grew up in the Chicago area, and Byram as well as forwards Dylan Cozens and Trevor Zegras, all of whom will be compared and contrasted with Dach for years to come to determine if the Hawks made the right choice.

## Bulls likely to pick up the pace with White

Boylen 'wants to play faster,' and 1st-round pick should help coach accomplish it

BY K.C. JOHNSON

Coby White has lived all of his 19 years in North Carolina, but the newest Bull showed he's not just quick on the court when asked about his imminent move to Chicago.

"I know it gets cold in the winter," White said without hesitation Thursday night. "Other than that, I know it's a great city."

Luckily for White, he'll be indoors the majority of the time, working to speed up the learning curve it takes to become an NBA point guard after the Bulls selected him with the No. 7 draft pick.

"I learn quickly," the 6-foot-5 White said. "And I think size at my position will translate well in the league, along with my speed, getting up and down the court, my shotmaking ability and ability to create my own shot and to playmake."

White, who said he has been working to change speeds more effectively, isn't the only one who will be on a learning curve. Jim Boylen already has put in work to improve the offense and is eager to implement it in his first full training camp as a head coach.

The Bulls, hampered by injuries, ranked 20th in pace last season and 23rd after Boylen replaced Fred Hoiberg.

"Jim wants to play faster," executive vice president John Paxson said Thursday night. "Jim has a philosophy (that) the multiple-ballhandler system is something that lends itself to playing faster because you can grab the ball off the board hopefully and guys can push it themselves."

## Rizzo runs into trouble — and Cubs pay price

Overruns 2nd in 8th inning, wastes solid outing by Darvish

Yu Darvish was sensational Friday. At the plate.

He batted 1.000, boosting his batting average to, well, .107.

But his pitching was merely average, and Brad Brach and Mike Montgomery combined to allow a run in the seventh. That proved to be the difference in a 5-4 loss to the Mets that made for an unsatisfying afternoon at Wrigley Field.

The Cubs' real culprit, though, was some sloppiness on the basepaths.

Albert Almora Jr. got picked off first to end the sixth. And in the eighth, Anthony Rizzo was on first when Willson Contreras blooped a single into left field. With two outs, Rizzo should have been satisfied with advancing one base. But he got caught in a rundown between second and third.

"It's his read," manager Joe Maddon said. "There's no help coming from the third-base coach. And Anthony's a really good base runner; he's outstanding. But he knows. He knows that."

Rizzo slumped down after being tagged out, his hands on his knees.

"Too much aggressiveness," he said. "Just a bad play on my part."

# Dishing on Gafford

Helping fans get to know Arkansas forward whom Bulls took in 2nd round

BY TIM BANNON

It seems as if Coby White, the Bulls' first-round draft pick out of Duke, is getting all the attention.

So here are few things to know about the Bulls' second pick, the 6-foot-11, 233-pound Daniel Gafford, out of Arkansas.

#### 1. He's from Lou Brock's hometown.


Gafford was born on Oct. 1, 1998, in El Dorado, Ark., 59 years after Brock, the Hall of Fame baseball player, was born there. Coming out of high school, Gafford was the top-ranked player in the state and 11th power forward nationally. As a senior in 2017, he led the El Dorado Wildcats to a 28-5 record and a second-place finish in the state tournament. Donna Axum, Miss America 1964, also is an El Dorado High grad.

#### 2. And his hometown is proud.

His hometown held an NBA draft watch party Thursday night. "It's not every day that somebody from El Dorado makes it real big, so anything we can do to show children growing up right now that it doesn't matter that El Dorado is a small town, you can still go out and pursue your dreams," said Joanna Benson, who organized the event.

#### 3. Tall runs in his family.

His mom, Teresa Frazier, is 6-3 and his dad, Wayne Gafford, is 6-4. He has four

siblings. Gafford has a 32.5-inch standing vertical leap and a wingspan of 7 feet, 2.5 inches, 12th longest in the draft.

#### 4. No shorts, no tryout.

Gafford was the tallest kid in junior high as a sixth grader and he was urged to try out for the seventh-grade team. "I would have," he told the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette, "but on the day of the tryouts, I forgot my shorts. I figured (the coaches) wouldn't think I was responsible enough to play basketball. When I realized I forgot my shorts, I went home instead of going to tryouts." But he tried out the next year and the rest is history.

#### 5. Marching band helped his footwork.

In addition to basketball and football, which he played until ninth grade, he played the clarinet and then drums in the high school marching band. According to USA Today, Gafford credited the experience dancing and marching in the band with helping to develop his skills on the court. "It was fun," Gafford told the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette. "My cousin and a lot of my friends were in the band with me. We had a good time. We were popular because we could liven a place up."

#### 6. Not a one-and-done.

Gafford had been projected to be picked in the first round of the 2018 draft, but he decided to return to Arkansas for his sophomore year. "Obviously, this is great news for us," coach Mike Anderson said at

the time. "He's the centerpiece to what we are doing here, and this gives him the chance to build on the tremendous freshman year he had. Daniel is a special player and the sky is the limit for him."

#### 7. He skipped the NIT to declare for the draft.

As a sophomore, he averaged 16.9 points, 8.7 rebounds and 2.0 blocks per game. Arkansas lost in the first round of the SEC Tournament and finished 17-15. The team was invited to this year's NIT, but Gafford had other plans. "Daniel Gafford has put his name in the draft, will hire an agent and will not participate in the NIT," Anderson said. "He could have left last year, but he came back and developed, got better, and I think he'll be a first-round draft pick." Arkansas lost to Indiana in the second round of the NIT.

#### 8. How John Paxson views him.

"He's a defensive rolling center, high energy, can run the floor," Paxson, the Bulls executive vice president, said. "He's very athletic. His rebounding numbers, analytically, his shot-blocking numbers were really high. He played in a really difficult conference and produced. Again, he's a young man that's going to have to earn his stripes. But we like him as a basketball player." Gafford finished his college career, playing in 67 games, averaging 14.3 points, 7.4 rebounds with a 63.5 field-goal percentage.

Byram went fourth to the Avalanche and the Kings took Turcotte at No. 5. After the Red Wings surprisingly took defenseman Moritz Seider, the Sabres grabbed Cozens with the seventh pick.

Dach isn't age-eligible to play in the AHL with the Rockford IceHogs and likely would have to return to the Western Hockey League's Saskatoon Blades if he doesn't earn a spot on the Hawks roster. He had 73 points (25 goals, 48 assists) in 62 regular-season games for Saskatoon then added five goals and three assists in 10 games during the WHL playoffs.

As expected, Hughes, an American center, and Kakko, a Finnish winger, went first and second to the Devils and Rangers, respectively.

If Dach is ready to make the leap, the Hawks should have an opening for him as the third-line center behind Jonathan Toews and Dylan Strome if Artem Anisimov is traded as expected. Last year's No. 3 pick, Jesperi Kotkaniemi, made the leap straight to the NHL and had 34 points in (11 goals, 23 assists) in 79 games for the Canadiens. The last Hawks draft pick to be on the opening-day roster in their draft year was Patrick Kane, who was taken first overall in 2007.

"As a player and competitor you want to play at the next level as quick as you can, so it's obviously a goal of mine to get there," Dach said. "But we'll see."

The long-term plans for Dach are more

important to the Hawks than what he may contribute next season. It's expected he'll one day assume the reins as the top-line center from Toews, who is coming off arguably his best season but recently turned 31 and has 1,001 NHL games behind him, including 128 playoff games.

There seemed to be a favorite du jour as draft week approached and even while Turcotte and Byram maintained their status as lukewarm favorites there would be occasional buzz that Cozens, Zegras or Dach was pulling into the lead.

"I'm pretty excited to be going to a city with an Original Six team and get to learn from a couple guys in Jonathan Toews and Dylan Strome, both centerman to kind of mentor me," Dach said. "It's going to be

awesome."

Momentum started to shift to Dach on Friday as the start of the draft approached. When Bowman arrived at the podium he put an end to the drama that began two months ago when the Hawks defied the odds and moved from the 12th spot to the third thanks to the draft lottery.

Dach, who compared his game to that of Jets center Mark Scheifele, knows he still has plenty to work on.

"You can never be good enough," Dach said. "Everything you can work on all the time. I'm always trying to fine-tune my game and get better at the next level. I've got a lot of work in front of me this summer. Just sit back and enjoy the next couple of days and soak all this in and have fun."

"But you need a commitment to running. And I don't think we've always had guys committed to running. And that will be something from training camp and hopefully this summer (that) I know Jim wants to emphasize."

White's speed projects to play one part. But he's not the only addition. Paxson for the first time spoke publicly about Chris Fleming, whom the Bulls hired from the Nets to be Boylen's lead assistant coach.

"He has a very bright offensive mind and believes in quicker pace and some of the action out of that that I think will be really good for our team," Paxson said.

Paxson downplayed a question about whether White is more of a scorer or facilitator and said he envisions some lineups in which White plays alongside Kris Dunn. In today's NBA, the top point guards are either primary scoring threats, can shoot effectively or both.

"He can run, is fast, can spot up and shoot it, so we're trying to build a team to play effectively in today's modern game," Paxson said. "That means versatility in a lot of different areas. Coby can play both (guard) positions. In today's game, I don't know how many pure points we really have anymore. Most really good point guards have an effective scoring component to them."

White called his meeting with Boylen his "best individual meeting" with a coach throughout his pre-draft process. They watched film together, which, in Paxson's words, was filled with "some good, some not so good."

So in one way, White and Boylen already have begun to work.

"Jim's care factor for our players, organization and team is very, very high," Paxson said. "From what both of them described, Jim especially, it was just a good basketball conversation. We had an opportunity to talk to Coby just a little while ago, and Jim brought that up and he's anxious for more."

"The great players want to learn, they want to be coached, they want to feel that you're invested in them. And our guys feel that. It's pretty obvious right now that our guys understand what Jim's philosophy is. He is going to coach them hard. But they also have to know that you're doing it for the right reasons, and Jim is good at that."

While the top four in the Cubs' order did little, Darvish and No. 9 hitter Addison Russell were the offensive stars. Russell cranked a two-run homer into the left-field bleachers and Darvish went 2-for-2.

Batting eighth, Darvish made Maddon look wise by slapping a two-out RBI single to right in the second. The Wrigley Field crowd of 41,078 went nuts, breaking out the "Yuuuuuu!" chant.

Darvish singled again in the fifth, scoring on Russell's fifth home run.

But staked to a 4-3 lead, Darvish allowed his second homer, a towering sixth-inning blast by Michael Conforto.

That left Darvish with — all together now — a no-decision. It was his 10th straight, extending his team record in that odd category.

"I'm not losing. I'm not winning," he said. "It's weird."

More than 40 years have passed since a pitcher earned so many consecutive no-decisions. The Phillies' Randy Lerch took 10 straight in 1977.

Darvish struck out six and walked two

Friday as he continues to put his early-season wildness behind him. His fastball velocity was down a bit, but Maddon said his split-finger fastball was really good.

"Physically, I'm really pleased with the way he is pitching," Maddon said. "There is nothing to complain about."

But if a no-decision streak means anything, it's that you're generally not great ... or terrible.

Twice on Friday, Darvish surrendered leads. As a result, he has not earned a decision since April.

"I need," he said, "10 consecutive wins."

# Cubs shed no light on Alzola's future

The day after the greatest moment of Adbert Alzola's young life was still a time to revel in what was, rather than break down what will be.


"We have an idea, yes," manager Joe Maddon said Friday. "But we're not ready to disclose it. It's still in the discussion stage. And we want to talk to the players first."

Alzola outpitched Chatwood in Thursday night's 7-4 victory over the Mets. Chatwood gave up two earned runs, six hits and a walk in four innings. Alzola allowed one hit, a solo homer, and two walks in four innings. Chatwood needed 73 pitches to record 12 outs; Alzola, 55.

"But don't discount what Tyler did," Maddon said. "He pitched mainly with his fastball and put the ball on the ground a lot."

Last season Chatwood walked almost a batter an inning.

"This year he is throwing strikes, up to

97 mph," Maddon said. "So a lot of good stuff going on there too."

Perhaps even more special was the moment Maddon came to the mound to remove him in the ninth.

"Outstanding job," Maddon told him.

Alzola bro-hugged his teammates and walked off the field to a standing ovation with his cap in hand, saluting the crowd.

"The best thing ever," he said Friday.

Alzola, 24, became the first Cubs pitcher to earn the win in his major-league debut since Ryan O'Malley in 2006.

"You have to enjoy it," he said, smiling at nearly every question. "If you don't enjoy it, it's not worth it to be here."

**Extra innings:** Hendricks is playing catch and general manager Jed Hoyer said he is "feeling good," but there's no schedule in terms of his rehab. Said Hoyer: "We just want to get him back on the mound as the dominant Kyle Hendricks and not rush him back. There's no reason to do that this time of year." ... Maddon said much the same about Craig Kimbrel, the closer-to-be who was scheduled to make his second appearance Friday night for Triple-A Iowa: "I'm a big proponent in listening to Kimbrel. He knows his body. Of course I want him here. But I'm not in a hurry."

# Rangers can win but can't draw

Weather great, team good — but prohibitive cost major factor in keeping fans away

ARLINGTON, Texas — The Rangers are baseball's biggest surprise, but the scariest part of this season is that air conditioning may not fix what truly ails this franchise.

On Wednesday, summer finally made it to town with weather only the equator would love. Until Wednesday, Mother Nature planted our home with a mild kiss of spring weather. Despite that fact combined with a good baseball team, you are not going to the Ballpark in Arlington to watch a good team that wins.

We were told one of the primary reasons the Rangers needed a new park was because fans want air conditioning. That once the air was cool, they will come. So that's why Tax Hike Friendly Park will open next year when a perfectly good park will essentially be vacated.

The Rangers even tweeted on Wednesday a drawing of the new place with the caption, "@GlobeLifeField is gonna be cool ... literally."

As someone who plans to be entombed in an air conditioner permanently set at 68.5 degrees, just in case I do wake up, I share this desire.

The problem: The air here in DFW has been cool since the start of the season, and the eyeball test says that ain't enough. Entering a weekend series against the visiting White Sox, the Rangers averaged 26,353 fans per game in this, the last year of the Ballpark in Arlington.

Actually go to a game and you can see that figure is inflated.

We have reached a point when fans are saying "No mas" to paying for the insulting price to attend a big-league game. The cost to attend a big-league game is too much, and teams are now seeing that. No new stadium can fix that, and neither will air conditioning.

I love baseball, but I can't blame any ball fan who turns on Netflix, Hulu, Amazon Prime, or another, cheaper, entertainment alternative rather than attend a big-league game.

Attending a baseball game should feel like fun rather than extortion.

The Rangers rank 16th in MLB in attendance. For a team that's winning for the first time in three years, the Rangers should rank about 10th.

At this rate, the Rangers will draw a bit more than 2 million fans. Typically the Rangers need to draw about 3 million fans to ensure a profitable season. This reality is normally a reason why owners change on an average of every seven years; operating a big-league club is expensive, and most ownership groups grow tired of the costs.

We live in the fastest-growing region in the U.S., and yet here we are.

The team wins, the players are good guys, the stadium is now "nostalgic," and the weather is cooperating.

The Rangers entice fans with a giveaway promotion for almost every game, to complement an endless amount of food options. The club does a good job of making the game fun once you walk in.

If you want to say Arlington is the problem, go ahead. If you want to say that baseball is the problem, feel free. Those are safe guesses.

Do not deny the price of going to the game as a factor.

The Rangers, as well as every other team, continually increased the price of attending a game at a rate that far exceeded the standard living increases an average family will receive.

Eventually, as much as we love sports, in particular baseball, every wallet has a limit.

Too many good options exist to pay a premium price for a product that is available 81 nights a year.

When Tax Hike Friendly Park opens next year, the attendance issue will be "fixed." Our desire to consume new things and take in the new-car smell will override everything else.

But if the Rangers trot out a winning team, and the air is 72 degrees, and the place isn't full, we'll know it was never the stadium.



# #76 Johnny Lujack

Notre Dame star succeeded Luckman as Bears starting quarterback in the late '40s

Johnny Lujack came to the Bears in 1948 straight from the cover of Life magazine. He had led Notre Dame to the 1943 national championship, served in World War II in the Navy the next two years, then returned to South Bend to win two more national titles and the Heisman Trophy. The Associated Press named him its athlete of the year for 1947.

The Bears picked Lujack fourth in the 1946 draft and figured he would take the quarterback baton into the 1950s from Sid Luckman, who led four championship teams in the '40s.

For four years, that looked to be the case. Lujack backed up Luckman as a rookie in 1948 while playing defensive halfback. He snagged a league-leading eight interceptions, including three in the first half of his first game, a 45-7 rout of the Packers.

In 1949 he beat out Luckman for the starting job, and for the next few years the Bears had more quarterback talent than any team in the NFL. They picked Bobby Layne third in the 1948 draft, and they added George Blanda in the 12th round the next year.

Luckman, Layne and Blanda all ended up in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Lujack started over all three.

Coach George Halas' trust in Lujack initially was rewarded. He led the NFL with 2,658 passing yards, 23 touchdowns and 8.5 yards per attempt in '49. He was named to the Pro Bowl after the next two seasons and was voted first-team All-Pro in 1950, when he led the league with 11 rushing touchdowns. In those four years he passed for 41 touchdowns and rushed for 21, and he made 130 of 136 extra-point kicks.

He still owns the Bears record for most passing yards in a game: 468 with six touchdowns in a 52-21 rout of the Chicago Cardinals on Dec. 11, 1949, at Wrigley Field.

Lujack was a star off the field as well. He signed an endorsement deal with Wilson, making a percentage from each sale of his signature line of footballs. In the summer of '49 he starred in an ABC radio program, "The Adventures of Johnny Lujack," which was recorded at WGN studios and ran three days a week for 13 weeks. The Tribune reported that Lujack's off-the-field ventures pushed his yearly earnings to \$100,000.

It's not hard to see why Halas chose the wholesome Lujack as the quarterback of the future over the hard-partying Layne, whom the Bears traded to the New York Bulldogs in 1949. He ended up in Detroit a year later, though, and tipped the balance of power in the Western Division from the Bears to the Lions.

Layne led the Lions to three championships in the 1950s and retired as the NFL record holder in passing yards and touchdowns. In his autobiography, Halas called trading Layne his biggest blunder. Blanda remained a Bear for 10 seasons but started only 23 of his 115 games with the team before becoming a star in the AFL with the

Houston Oilers and Oakland Raiders.

Meanwhile, Lujack retired in 1952 to join the staff of legendary Notre Dame coach Frank Leahy.

A combination of factors led to Lujack playing his last NFL snap at age 26. He had suffered injuries to his shoulder and knees that never quite healed properly, and they were starting to take their toll on his play. Many opined that his move to Notre Dame was set up so he could angle to become Leahy's successor, a claim Lujack denied.

Then there was money. Halas wasn't one to open his wallet when he found it unnecessary, and Lujack wasn't one to perform for below market value. They had butted heads during negotiations over Lujack's rookie contract, which came in at four years and a reported \$18,000 per year, making him the second-highest-paid Bear behind Luckman before he had played a game.

When that contract was up, the parties struggled again to reach an agreement, and although Lujack claimed money wasn't a reason for his retirement, he never played again.

Edward Prell wrote in the April 3, 1952, Tribune: "It was no secret that Lujack was dissatisfied with the course his career took last season when he was sidelined much of the time for an unsung quarterback, Steve Romanik. And it was no secret, either, that Halas felt Lujack was paying too much attention to outside enterprises to produce at full efficiency on the gridiron."

When Notre Dame picked Terry Brennan to succeed Leahy in 1954, Lujack left coaching. He moved to his wife Pat's hometown in the Quad Cities, and with father-in-law Frank Schierbrock, he owned a car dealership that became one of the Midwest's largest sellers of Chevrolets.

Lujack, a native of Connellsville, Pa., was the first of the great quarterbacks from western Pennsylvania, followed by Blanda, Johnny Unitas, Joe Namath, Joe Montana, Dan Marino and Jim Kelly. He also earned varsity letters in baseball, basketball and track at Notre Dame after turning down a baseball contract from the Pittsburgh Pirates out of high school.

Lujack still lives in Bettendorf, Iowa, and winters in Indian Wells, Calif. At 94, he is the oldest living Heisman winner.

**Will Matt Nagy run the ball more or fewer than 15 times per game?**

The Bears had fewer than 25 rushing attempts (including quarterback runs) only twice last season. They had a season-low 15 in the Nov. 22 victory in Detroit. They had 22 in the Nov. 11 victory over the Lions at Soldier Field. There will be a greater commitment to the ground game this season with Mike Davis and third-round pick David Montgomery. But it's going to vary with the game plan week-to-week and let's be clear: Nagy is a former quarterback who likes to see the ball in the air.

**There are only so many offensive possessions in a game. How will Matt Nagy balance spreading the ball around with so many weapons and a player's desire to get more run? Even with just the RBs, no way Run DMC can all get equal carries. Same with WRs.**



## Storms to usher in extended period of warmth

### LOCAL FORECAST

Dear Tom,  
When was Chicago's coolest Father's Day? Has it ever been cooler than the previous Mother's Day?  
— Nick Recchia, River Grove

Dear Nick,  
Although the normal high for Father's Day runs in the lower 80s, the variability of Chicago's weather has generated high temps ranging from 55 on June 18, 1950, to 95 on June 20, 1971. When considering the minimum temperature, the lowest Father's Day minimum has been 38 on June 21, 1992. This year's 60 was chilly, but last year's was hot at 93. Occurring five weeks earlier, Mother's Day is usually cooler, but there have been exceptions. In 1956, the city logged its hottest Mother's Day at 89 degrees, edging out the Father's Day high of 87. The last time Mother's Day was warmer was in 2005 with a high of 85, while Father's Day reached 78.

# Agency still in business

FBI probe into corruption likely over, firm operating under different name

ENGLEWOOD, N.J. — With tinted windows, no signage and a slightly cracked brick facade, the small, nondescript building on an otherwise nondescript street in this New York suburb seemed unusually modest for a sports agency that had negotiated hundreds of millions' worth in contracts for NBA players, including Kevin Garnett, Kyle Lowry and Serge Ibaka.

But Andy Miller viewed ostentatious offices as a waste of money, according to those who worked for him, so it was here, and not in the lobby of some high-rent Manhattan high-rise, where federal agents gathered one morning in September 2017.

When the FBI raided ASM, Miller's agency, amid a then-sprawling Justice Department probe of the basketball black market, it prompted speculation Miller and others at his agency would soon join Adidas officials and assistant college basketball coaches already facing criminal charges. A few months later, Yahoo published images of documents the FBI took that day, spreadsheets that appeared to show ASM made payments to people close to dozens of former college basketball players.

More than a year and a half later, however, the Justice Department's basketball investigation appears to have ended without producing a criminal charge against Miller or anyone else at ASM. It's likely the only former ASM employee to face criminal penalties will be Christian Dawkins, the former ASM recruiter convicted of several felonies

relating to trying to funnel money to top high school and college basketball players. And while Miller has unofficially retired as an agent of NBA players, his agency continues to operate, just under a new name.

How did Miller and the others Dawkins helped land new clients avoid charges? It's a question that has persisted through the NBA agent community, and angered those close to the people facing prison time for trying to pay college basketball recruits.

"It's outrageous that a 22-year-old kid could be charged, prosecuted and off to prison based on things he did exclusively for his bosses," said Steve Haney, Dawkins' attorney. "It's unthinkable. It makes no sense or logic on any level."

Miller, through his attorney, declined to comment for this story.

A spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office in the Southern District of New York, which oversaw the investigation, declined to comment. According to interviews with several NBA agents — some of whom formerly worked for ASM, all of whom spoke on condition of anonymity — the theories of how Miller avoided prosecution fall along several lines.

Miller could be cooperating with prosecutors, and providing evidence against others, but this theory appears the most unlikely. Attorneys close to the case believe the investigation is over, and no one else will be charged.

More likely, some of Miller's current and former colleagues believe, prosecutors didn't have the same smoking gun evidence against Miller they did against

Dawkins, whom the FBI had on wiretapped phone calls and videotaped sting meetings discussing paying people to steer recruits to specific colleges.

In the spreadsheets later published by Yahoo, the FBI had strong evidence of Miller overseeing an operation that paid college players and their family members and friends. But the legal theory underpinning the entire Justice Department investigation — that arranging these payments constituted fraud, and victimized the schools these players attended — required evidence the payments were intended to influence a college commitment. In Miller's case, the spreadsheets do not indicate any interest in where the players went to college, as long as they signed with ASM if they made it to the NBA.

"The model at ASM is pretty much consistent with, at least from my interpretation, the model of almost every agency that's recruiting or signing NBA basketball players, which is to identify the talent as young as possible, sometimes as early as ninth grade; cultivate, ingratiate yourself with the family, the player, the handler," Dawkins testified in May. "I don't really think anything is wrong with paying players."

On the stand over parts of two days in May, Dawkins summarized his career in the agent world. The Saginaw, Michigan, native, and son of a longtime high school and college basketball coach, Dawkins began working for ASM when he was 21. Dawkins previously had been working as a recruiter for International Management Advisors, a Cleveland-based financial services firm seeking to work with NBA players.

In 2016, however, IMA discovered Dawkins essentially had been double-dipping for several months, earning his \$50,000 an-

nual salary from IMA and traveling the country as a recruiter while actually steering players to sign with Miller, who also was paying him, according to a lawsuit IMA filed against Miller. The suit was settled; and no terms were made public.

Once on board at ASM, Dawkins displayed an ability to forge connections with people close to future NBA players. Among the players he helped recruit for ASM, according to Dawkins, were Fred VanVleet, Malik Beasley and Jarell Martin. Usually, money was involved, he testified.

"And you and a number of employees, agents, and attorneys, in fact, were breaking rules at ASM, would you agree?" a lawyer asked Dawkins at one point.

"Yeah. Everybody was paying players," Dawkins replied.

Later, Dawkins was asked who provided the money he was using to try to land recruits.

"Everything that I did was ASM company money. I didn't have any money to pay people," he said.

"So Andy Miller had you do his dirty work for him. Would you say that's true?"

"That's fair to say," Dawkins replied.

A few months after the FBI raid, Miller relinquished his certification with the NBA Player's Association, which polices agent activity. While it long has been suspected that paying to land recruits is widespread, it violates NBPA rules, and is grounds for the union decertifying an agent.

Miller has remained mostly out of the public eye since. His agency, meantime, continues to operate under a different name: YouFirst, the European agency that bought a stake in ASM in 2011. The agency continues to represent ASM's former top clients — Kristaps Porzingis, Myles Turner and

Serge Ibaka — but does not appear to have landed any of the top picks in Thursday's NBA Draft.

Headquartered in Madrid, Spain, YouFirst represents more than 500 athletes and coaches, primarily in basketball and soccer, and does business in 10 countries, according to a 2014 Sports Business Day interview with company co-founder Juan Asia.

According to three former ASM employees, YouFirst executives in Spain were well aware of Miller's recruiting tactics, but it doesn't appear to be a violation of NBPA rules to know your colleagues are paying recruits. The NBPA declined to comment for this story.

When Yahoo published the payment spreadsheets the FBI took from ASM, some of the pages contained words in Spanish. According to former ASM employees, this was because YouFirst accounting staffers in Madrid needed to approve of ASM's expenses.

YouFirst officials in the U.S. and in Madrid have not replied to a series of voicemails and emails over the past year, including another email and phone message this week.

Last July, when a reporter walked into the old New Jersey office for ASM, two employees in their 20s were unpacking boxes. ASM signage still lined the office, along with signed jerseys of some of Miller's most high-profile clients: Garnett, Lowry, and Chauncey Billups.

One of the YouFirst employees — Josiah Pinto, who runs online marketing for YouFirst, according to his website — took down a reporter's contact information and said he would pass it along, while declining to answer any questions about ASM.

"We're not ASM anymore; we're YouFirst," Pinto said. "I'm sure you know the story."

# Nassar fallout widespread

A look at some of those affected by the massive sexual-assault scandal

Michigan State University's authorization Friday of what officials said will be an independent investigation into the handling of sexual assault complaints against now-imprisoned former sports doctor Larry Nassar is the latest development stemming from the case.

Numerous people have been charged, fired or forced out of their jobs during the investigations into the once-renowned sports doctor. He was sentenced to decades in prison after hundreds of girls and women said he molested them under the guise of medical treatment, including while he worked for Michigan State and Indiana-based USA Gymnastics, which trains Olympians.

Here's a look at some of the individuals and organizations that have been affected:

## Michigan State

— A U.S. Department of Education report sent to the university in December 2018 said its failure to detect and stop sexual assaults by Nassar indicated a lack of institutional control.

— Lou Anna Simon: The university president and school alumna resigned in January 2018 amid growing pressure. She denied any cover-up by the university. She since has been charged with two felonies and two misdemeanors. She is accused of lying during an interview last year when investigators were trying to determine how Nassar got away with sexual assault for so long.

The MSU governing board later hired former Michigan Gov. John Engler. He resigned amid fallout from remarks he made about some victims of Nassar and was replaced by Satish Udpa, the school's executive vice president for administration.

In May, MSU named Dr. Samuel Stanley Jr., a medical researcher who has led Stony Brook University in New York for nearly a decade, as its next president.

The school has settled lawsuits totaling \$500 million.

— Mark Hollis: The athletic director called his departure last year a retirement, but he, too, faced pressure to leave.

— Kathie Klages: The former head gymnastics coach resigned in 2017 after she was suspended for defending Nassar over the years. Klages was charged with lying to investigators. If convicted, she could face up to four years in prison. She has denied allegations that former gymnast Larissa Boyce told her that Nassar had abused her in 1997, when Boyce was 16.

— Brooke Lemmen: The former school doctor resigned in 2017 after learning the university was considering firing her because she didn't disclose that USA Gymnastics was investigating Nassar. A state Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs investigation cleared her of any violations in November.

— William Strampel: The former dean of the university's College of Osteopathic Medicine was charged in March 2018 amid allegations that he failed to keep Nassar in line, groped female students and stored nude student selfies on his campus computer. Strampel, who has also been named in lawsuits, retired June 30, even as Michigan State was trying to fire him. He was found guilty June 12 of neglect of duty but acquitted on a more serious criminal sexual conduct charge.

— Bob Noto: The university in February 2018 announced the departure of its longtime vice president for legal affairs. The school called it a retirement. Noto had been Michigan State's general counsel since 1995.

## USA Gymnastics

— Rhonda Faehn: The former senior vice president of the organization was dismissed in January by the University of Michigan after working for just a few days as a coaching consultant for its women's team. She was fired after an outcry over her hiring. USA Gymnastics parted ways with Faehn as senior vice president in May 2018 after she was criticized by Nassar's victims for not contacting authorities about potential abuse concerns.

Valeri Liukin stepped down early last year after less than 18 months as coordinator of the women's national team for USA Gymnastics.

— Valeri Liukin: The coordinator of the women's national team for USA Gymnastics announced in February 2018 that he was stepping down, less than 18 months after taking over for Martha Karolyi. Liukin said that while he wanted to help turn around the program, "the present climate causes me, and ... my family, far too much stress, difficulty and uncertainty."

— USA Gymnastics said in January 2018 that its entire board of directors would resign, as requested by the U.S. Olympic Committee. The USOC then took steps to decertify the gymnastics organization that picks U.S. national teams, and USA Gymnastics filed a Chapter 11 bankruptcy petition as it attempted to reach settlements in the dozens of sex-abuse lawsuits it faces and to forestall its potential demise at the hands of the USOC.

— Steve Penny: The former president and CEO of the organization resigned under pressure in March 2017. He was replaced by Kerry Perry, who took over in December 2017. Penny pleaded not guilty in October to a third-

degree felony alleging he ordered the removal of documents relating to Nassar from the Karolyi Ranch in Texas.

— Less than a year after being hired as USA Gymnastics' president and CEO, Perry resigned in September after the USOC questioned her ability to lead the scandal-rocked organization.

— Former California U.S. Rep. Mary Bono was hired in October as the interim president for USA Gymnastics only to resign four days later. Bono said she felt her affiliation with the embattled organization would be a "liability" after a social media post by Bono criticizing Nike and former San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick drew widespread scrutiny within the gymnastics community. Six-time Olympic medalist Aly Raisman also questioned Bono's association with a law firm that advised the organization on how to handle portions of the Nassar scandal.

— Ron Galimore: The longtime USA Gymnastics chief operating officer resigned in November but denied any wrongdoing in the Nassar scandal. The Indianapolis

Star reported in May that an attorney hired by USA Gymnastics directed Galimore to come up with a false excuse to explain Nassar's absence at major gymnastic events in the summer of 2015. The organization was looking into complaints against Nassar at the time.

## Twistars Gymnastics Club

— John Geddert: The owner of the Michigan club was suspended last January by USA Gymnastics and announced his retirement. He was the U.S. women's coach at the 2012 Olympics. Geddert has said he had "zero knowledge" of Nassar's crimes.

## Karolyi Ranch

— USA Gymnastics said in January 2018 that the Texas ranch where a number of gymnasts said Nassar abused them would no longer serve as the national training center. Owners Martha and Bela Karolyi have since sued the USOC and USA Gymnastics, seeking damages for a canceled sale of

the property. They also have been named in lawsuits.

— Debra Van Horn: Texas prosecutors in June filed sexual assault charges against Nassar and Van Horn, a trainer who worked at his side at the Karolyi Ranch and also worked at USA Gymnastics for 30 years. She was charged with second-degree sexual assault of a child. The local prosecutor said Van Horn was charged with "acting as a party" with Nassar.

## U.S. Olympics Committee

— Scott Blackmun: The CEO resigned in February 2018, citing difficulties with prostate cancer and the federation's need to move forward to deal with the sexual abuse scandal. There had been calls for his departure.

— Alan Ashley: The USOC fired the chief of sport performance in December in the wake of an independent report that said neither he nor Blackmun elevated concerns about the Nassar allegations when they were first reported to them.
