



## CTA fires operator involved in fatality

Says in-cab video shows 'failure to devote attention to duty'; victim was trying to retrieve phone on tracks

The CTA has fired the operator of a train that struck and killed a woman who climbed down on the tracks last month to retrieve her phone.

The operator was looking away from the tracks ahead of him for

about 12 seconds before the June incident at the 69th Street Red Line stop, according to a video recording taken inside the train cab and provided by the CTA in response to a Freedom of Information Act request.

In the video, the operator is seen laughing and appears to be

pointing at someone or something outside the train side window. He then abruptly stands and exits the cab.

Felon N. Smith, 37, of the 6600 block of South Maplewood Avenue, was pronounced dead shortly after the incident, which happened on the afternoon of June 27.

"The employee's behavior is unacceptable and in violation of CTA's policy and procedures," CTA spokesman Brian Steele said.

The employee was fired last week for "failure to devote attention to duty and ensuring safe train operations," Steele said.

The CTA did not identify the employee, who had been a rail operator since 2006 and had no previous safety violations.

Steele said that operators are supposed to be focused on the track ahead.

Steele said it is impossible to say if the operator could have stopped

the train on time if he had been paying attention.

"There are myriad factors that contributed to this incident," Steele said. "It's impossible to answer that question."

Steele noted that trains do not have the ability to make immediate stops because of their momentum. A single 5000-series "L" car weighs 55,000 pounds or 27.5 tons,

## Impeach Trump? Dems in dilemma

House panel files suit, presses ahead with investigation

WASHINGTON — Midway through the first year of their House majority, Democrats have yet to vote to impeach President Donald Trump. And maybe they never will.

The House recessed Friday for a six-week summer break without opening impeachment proceedings, the Democrats no closer to taking a vote than they were when they swept to power at the start of the year, a searing blow to liberals in the aftermath of former special counsel Robert Mueller's halting testimony on Capitol Hill.

Yet the House Judiciary Committee filed a fresh lawsuit Friday, its lawyers arguing they need documents from the Trump administration as they pursue questions of impeachment. It mentions the word impeachment 76 times.

The committee chairman, Rep. Jerrold Nadler of New York, said his panel is pressing ahead with investigating the president, with or without a formal House vote.

"I think too much has been made of the phrase impeachment inquiry," Nadler said Friday.

"We are using our full Article I powers to investigate the conduct of the president and to consider what remedies there are," he said, referring to the Constitution. "Among other things we will consider are obviously recommending articles of impeachment."

The action underscores the tensions among a House majority that's trying to have it both ways, preserving the idea of impeachment while avoiding a potentially risky vote.

Speaker Nancy Pelosi brushed back criticism that she's "running out the clock," as about 100 Democrats in the 435-member House favor opening an impeachment inquiry, according to a tally by The Associated Press.

"We will proceed when we have what we need to proceed,

## They're ugly and cranky — and getting a boost

Illinois students raise, release endangered alligator snapping turtles

North America's largest freshwater turtle can grow to more than 240 pounds, with a slimy, algae-crowned shell, gaping jaws capable of snapping a broomstick in half, and a hooked beak, perfect for slicing up prey.

The alligator snapping turtle has been described as a monster, a dinosaur throwback and, in a newspaper headline, "the big ugly."

But don't tell that to Catherine Zdunek. Smiling wistfully during a recent interview, Zdunek ran fingers tipped in lavender nail polish over the dry, spiky shell of a young alligator snapper named

Roger. "This one was my little baby," Zdunek, 18, said of the 7-inch turtle, which she helped care for this past year as a student

at Chicago's Whitney Young Magnet High School. Roger indulged his human admirer by sitting still, his eyes open, his fearsome jaw

politely shut.

Zdunek put her hand to her heart: "I think he likes me!"

Hunted almost out of existence in Illinois, the alligator snapping turtle is getting a second chance from an unlikely source: Students throughout the state have taken the fierce-looking creatures to heart, raising the turtles in classrooms until they're old enough to have a chance against natural threats such as otters and wading birds. Then, in a first-of-its-kind partnership with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), the turtles are released into the wild.

At least 460 alligator snapping turtles have been released by IDNR in the past five years, or are slated for release in August.

Of those, over 100 were raised

# Imprisoned cancer patient seeks pardon

Montgomery man had ordered 42 pounds of THC-infused chocolate

A Montgomery cancer patient who is serving a four-year prison sentence for ordering 42 pounds of THC-infused chocolate in 2014 has petitioned Gov. J.B. Pritzker for a pardon or to have his sentence commuted so he can receive treatment at home.

Thomas J. Franzen, 37, has been in prison for over a month and is not getting the medical care he was promised, according to a new petition filed by attorney David Camic.

Franzen has lost 20 pounds during his time in prison, according to his attorney.

Authorities flagged suspicious packages delivered to Franzen, and on Valentine's Day 2014, he was arrested after authorities received a search warrant and waited for him to open the package containing the THC-infused chocolate sent from a California address.

Franzen has been battling various forms of cancer since high school and was using the drugs to self-medicate, Camic previously said.

Kane County prosecutors argued that Franzen was a drug dealer. Police found .25 grams of suspected cocaine,

102 grams of marijuana and hash oil, along with ledgers they believed were related to drug sales during the search of his home in February 2014.

Camic said Franzen had ledgers because he was working as an authorized eBay reseller for consumer products such as shoes and art.

The petition for a pardon was sent to the governor's office on Wednesday, and a representative there said they are reviewing it at this time.

The petition details Franzen's difficult childhood and his 11-year battle with various forms of cancer.

"Although Mr. Franzen acknowledges that his actions were not legal at the time of this use, he felt he had little choice but to import the edibles as their use allowed him to maintain his daily regime," Camic wrote in the petition.

The petition included 19 letters of support from friends, his employer and relatives, including Aurora Deputy Mayor Chuck Nelson, who wrote as an individual to show his support.

"I can only imagine the challenges that these type of requests present to you," Nelson wrote. "Therefore, I humbly ask that you consider a sentence commutation which will allow Tom to return home and

receive the medical care he desperately needs."

Franzen was one of the first Illinois residents to receive a medical marijuana card in 2016.

"Thomas Franzen has been nothing but a stand-up patient every time he visits the dispensary and if he is able to find relief from medical cannabis for dealing with cancer, especially at such a young age, I would hope he would receive every opportunity to use it," wrote the general manager of PharmaCann North Aurora in the petition.

On the day following his plea in the case, the state of Illinois authorized the personal use of small amounts of marijuana, largely under a push from the governor.

Tony Scott, of Sycamore, wrote in the petition that Franzen's use of cannabis matched the spirit of the legislation.

Initially, Franzen faced a 12- to 60-year sentence. Instead, he pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of marijuana possession, a felony that carries a minimum prison term of four years. Franzen can have his sentence cut to two years for good behavior. He is staying at Stateville Correctional Center in Crest Hill.

so an eight-car train would weigh 220 tons.

A video posted on social media early this month shows Smith standing on the northbound side of the platform before she climbs down to pick up an object that authorities later identified as a dropped cellphone. As Smith climbs down, a security officer with a dog emerges from behind another part of the platform, then slowly begins to walk toward Smith in the six seconds it takes her to climb down to the tracks.

Steele said the guard spoke to Smith, who begins to move briskly up the tracks and past the guard as he stands on the platform with the dog.

The video shows Smith heading in the direction of the train, moving toward a point where the platform ends, when she was struck.

Steele said the guard, an employee of AGB K-9 Security Inc., followed protocol in calling out to the woman and promptly notified CTA after the train struck her. Steele said that because of the noise levels at the station, which runs on the median of the Dan Ryan Expressway, the guard and other customers were not immediately aware of the imminent danger of the approaching train.

The guard went on medical leave after the incident. Steele said he has not returned to work on CTA property since the incident.

Smith's sister, Brandy Martin, told the Tribune that Smith had been returning from downtown carrying food for herself and her three chil-

dren when she received a call that she'd passed training for a job as an insurance broker. So Smith decided to reverse course, got off the southbound train and, while waiting for the northbound train, was speaking with her children on the phone when it dropped.

Steele said that all rail operators have to go through refresher training, and an incident like this will be used to remind operators to stay focused on the right-of-way.

"We take instances like this very seriously. ... The actions depicted in this video do not reflect the overwhelming majority of the men and women who operate CTA trains," Steele said.

not one day sooner," Pelosi said Friday during her weekly news conference.

"Everybody has the liberty and the luxury to espouse their own position," she said, "and to criticize me for trying to go down the path in the most determined positive way."

Pelosi said she has "no complaints" against those pushing for impeachment. Their advocacy, she said, "only gives me leverage."

With the House unable, or unwilling, to impeach Trump, it intensifies the pressure on the party to figure out how to defeat the president in the 2020 election.

House Democrats capped their 200th day in the majority with a long list of bills — on raising the minimum wage, strengthening immigration protections — that give voters a view of how their party would govern in the White House. An outside group started running ads, including on Fox News this week, to promote their agenda.

"These people are clowns," Trump said Friday in remarks at the White House. "The Democrats are clowns."

As if to shore up the left flank, Pelosi met earlier Friday with liberal lodestar Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez of New York in an apparent easing of tensions with the "squad" of newcomers as they pursue shared goals.

Ocasio-Cortez's spokesman called it a "very positive and productive meeting about progressive priorities."

Pelosi said, "What we're advocat-

ing for is a progressive agenda for our country?"

Yet no sooner had Pelosi stepped away from the lectern than members of the Judiciary Committee stepped up to declare they were essentially well on their way to impeachment proceedings.

"This is an impeachment investigation," said Rep. Eric Swalwell, D-Calif., "whether we should recommend articles of impeachment to our caucus."

Freshmen Rep. Veronica Escobar, D-Texas, said, "I think especially as folks go home, my hope is that, in addition to talking about all the important kitchen table things that we all came here to work on, that there is an honest discussion within our own communities about whether we can continue to tolerate a lawless president."

Asked whether he favored impeachment, Nadler took a long pause.

"We may decide to recommend articles of impeachment at some

point; we may not. It remains to be seen," Nadler said.

The committee's court filing Friday was an effort to obtain secret grand jury material underlying Mueller's report.

The court petition is among a half-dozen legal actions the House is taking against the Trump administration as part of Pelosi's step-by-step strategy of building a case against the president. The Democrats contend that Trump is obstructing Congress's constitutional ability to conduct oversight of the executive branch by withholding documents and preventing witnesses from testifying.

Democrats, including Pelosi, often note that the third article of impeachment against Richard Nixon was his obstruction of Congress.

Next week, Nadler is expected to file a lawsuit to try to enforce a subpoena against Donald McGahn, the former White House counsel and a key Mueller witness. It challenges the administration's claim that its former employees have "absolute immunity" from testifying before Congress.

So in some ways the House is well on its way to impeachment without having to vote on it, as it conducts investigations and files lawsuits to build its case.

"Impeachment isn't a binary thing that you either are or you aren't," said Rep. Mary Gay Scanlon, D-Pa.

"What we've been doing is starting a process where we're engaging in an investigation to see if we should recommend articles of impeachment," she said. "It's a process. We started it some months ago in some ways."

## Bail denied again for teacher accused of abuse

CPS instructor jailed since February arrest

A Chicago Public Schools teacher charged with sexually assaulting a student he tutored was again denied bail Friday and was returned to the Cook County Jail, where he has been held since his arrest in February.

Previous judges have ruled that Jason Gil, 42, should be denied bond because of the potential threat to the community and to the girl he is accused of sexually

assaulting and abusing during his time as a teacher at Waters Elementary in Ravenswood Gardens.

In court Friday, where Gil appeared wearing a tan jail uniform, prosecutors again read the allegations against him, pointing out to Cook County Circuit Judge Aleksandra Nikolich Gillespie that she was the fourth judge to hear his requests for bail. But they asserted the facts of the case have not changed.

While arguing for Gil to be granted bond, which would allow him to be released while he awaits trial if he's able to put up 10%, his attorney Barry Sheppard said he

was not minimizing the severity of the charges, calling the case "difficult to defend against."

But Sheppard said Gil is not at risk of fleeing or failing to show up to future court dates, and noted: "This is not a homicide case."

The judge, however, said she had the authority to deny Gil bond, and after hearing the facts, that was her decision.

Gil faces charges including criminal sexual assault, aggravated criminal sexual abuse, solicitation and possession of child pornogra-

phy, and grooming. Authorities allege that Gil began grooming the girl when she was 12, engaged in sexual activity with her multiples times when she was 13 and 14, and asked the girl, who was a student at Waters, to send him naked pictures of herself. Gil has pleaded

not guilty.

After Friday's hearing, several of Gil's family members and other supporters left the courtroom, his mother tearing up as she spoke briefly to reporters of her disappointment. She said her son was

not a threat to the community.

Laura Sorce, who identified herself as a former colleague of Gil, said she was "sick to my stomach" that he was denied bond.

"It's unfair," Sorce said.

More than 150 parents and other members of the school community signed a letter earlier this month asking prosecutors not to negotiate a lenient plea deal for Gil.

They wrote that if Gil is found or pleads guilty, any potential sentence "must hold him to the highest standard of culpability."

## US reps question detention at O'Hare

Three citizen girls were held by border protection agents

Seven Democratic members of Congress from the Chicago area have sent a letter to the head of U.S. Customs and Border Protection, seeking information on how many U.S. citizen children whose parents are immigrants have been held in the agency's custody.

The letter was prompted by an incident last week in which three Chicago girls were held for more than 12 hours at O'Hare International Airport after returning from a month-long vacation in their parents' native Mexico.

The girls traveled with a

relative who was barred from entering the U.S. because she had the wrong type of visa, a spokesman with the border protection agency said last week. The sisters are U.S. citizens, but their parents are not, and feared that, if they showed up at the airport, they would be placed into deportation proceedings.

The girls' mother, who has asked that only her first name of Sylvia be published, sought help from the Mexican Consulate in Chicago, triggering a wave of support from immigration advocates and elected officials, including Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot. Officials from the federal agency confirmed they had planned to put the children in the custody of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services if a parent had

not picked up the girls.

U.S. Rep. Jan Schakowsky, D-Evanston, happened to have landed at O'Hare the same day and sought to intervene. She was among the seven members of Congress who penned the letter seeking answers about why the girls were held and if similar situations have happened in the past.

"How many U.S. citizen children have been detained by CBP in the past year?" the representatives ask in the letter. "How long were each of these children detained? In how many of these cases did CBP know that the detained U.S. citizen children had undocumented parents?"

A spokesman for the federal agency declined to comment Friday on the letter.

The representatives are also

seeking information about what policies the agency has for releasing minors to people other than their parents, and how many parents of U.S. citizens were placed in deportation proceedings after being asked to pick up a child from border protection custody. In addition, the elected officials inquired about what happens to children whose parents are deported and how many, if any, children have been turned over to state protective services.

U.S. Reps. Bill Foster, Bobby Rush, Robin Kelly, Mike Quigley, Sean Casten and Jesus "Chuy" Garcia also signed the letter.

In the recent O'Hare case, the girls' brother had tried to pick them up. Later, Mony Ruiz-Velasco, an attorney and executive director of PASO West

Suburban Action Project, tried to retrieve the girls with a letter signed by the mother and notarized.

Eventually the girls were handed over to their mother after an agreement was reached that she would not be taken into custody.

Last week, a spokesperson for the federal agency said officials could not verify whether the mother actually signed the letter Ruiz-Velasco presented. The girls were not released to the brother because he wasn't considered a legal guardian, the spokesman said last week.

The O'Hare incident happened as immigration advocates were bracing for large-scale sweeps by ICE that didn't materialize in Chicago.

## Officials: Letters about Social Security numbers target immigrants

A federal government practice of notifying employers when the names of workers do not match their Social Security numbers that was brought back by the Trump administration this year indirectly targets immigrant communities already paralyzed with fear of immigrant enforcement, Chicago elected officials and union leaders said Thursday.

During a news conference Thursday at the Chicago Teachers Union Center, speakers warned Chicago employers against disciplining workers when they receive what's known as a "no-match" letter.

The letters are sent when an employee's name and Social Security number does not match the Social Security Administration's records. Incorrect information can prevent an employee from receiving benefits.

The practice is another attack on the immigrant community by the Trump administration, the officials said.

"There has been a lot of immigration raids that didn't happen, intentionally spreading unnecessary fear in immigrant communities, said C.J. Hawking, executive director of Arise Chicago, a labor organizing center that works with immigrants. "While this did not happen, there have been attacks on immigrants in what we would term silent raids, displacing working often from long-held jobs through the insidious measure of no-match letters."

Hawking said her organization had been contacted by hundreds of workers who feared their employer might discipline them after receiving letters.

The Social Security Administration has mailed the letters to more than 575,000 workers since it started sending them again in

March, according to an agency spokesman. After years of immigration advocates and unions voicing concerns about the letters, the Obama administration had stopped issuing them in 2012.

Dalia Martinez, a food production worker in the Chicago area, said her employer gave her and some of her coworkers 60 days to resolve any discrepancies with the Social Security Administration after the company received letters.

Martinez declined to give the name of the company.

Martinez said the workers consulted with Arise Chicago and sent a letter to the company, telling them that there was no need for them to take action against any employees.

The company then rescinded its 60-day rule, she said.

The purpose of the letters is to match an employee with their benefits, said Chris Williams, an

attorney with the National Legal Advocacy Network.

"This is not an issue between the employer and the Social Security Administration," Williams said.

The notices discourage employers from taking action against an employee and instruct them on how to correct the misreported information.

"You should not use this letter to take any adverse action against an employee, such as laying off, suspending, firing, or discriminating against that individual, just because his or her SSN or name does not match our records," the Social Security Administration writes to employers in a sample letter on the agency's website.

"Any of those actions could, in fact, violate State or Federal law and subject you to legal consequences."

Despite the letter explicitly warning employers against disci-

plining workers, most employers "get nervous" when they receive a letter from a federal agency said Remy Snead, an attorney at the Prinz Law Firm, which specializes in employment law.

"They think there might be a liability for them hiring or continuing to employ an employee, so they want to rid themselves of the liability," she said.

There are many reasons for the mismatch between names and Social Security numbers, including clerical errors, unreported name changes and inaccurate or incomplete employer records.

"Nobody should be afraid to go to work," state Rep. Aaron Ortiz, D-Chicago, said. "I'm here to remind all employers that no-match letters are not indicative of immigration status or work eligibility."

students from Collins Academy — points out significant locations in the neighborhood, from historical landmarks, gardens and businesses to schools and other places that represent a positive side of North Lawndale.

Neighborhood lines can act as unspoken boundaries between Chicagoans. With the tours program, My Block, My Hood, My City, a nonprofit organization, tries to expose outsiders to a taste of the struggles and joys of North Lawndalians through the eyes of young people who live there.

“North Lawndale is full of cultural history, and we want to give young people the opportunity to share that testimony,” said Jahmal Cole, the founder of the nonprofit. “They’ve got pride — this is my block, this is my hood, this is my city.”

Before that Saturday, some of the group hadn’t set foot in the neighborhood. The visitors came from other Chicago neighborhoods or suburbs, while one family was visiting from Boston and another woman brought her nieces who were visiting from Germany.

To teens who frequent Sal’s, North Lawndale is more than the high crime rate.

“On news, you only hear the negative aspects of North Lawndale, they don’t tell you all the good,” said Amari Bell, 17, one of the tour guides. “One tour, a lady was telling us she didn’t

feel safe because she was in this neighborhood and then after she left she felt safe because she was with us and we told her more about our neighborhood.”

Keyandre Spann’s family has been in the neighborhood for generations. He has led six tours so far this summer and hopes the tour will broaden the way others view his neighborhood.

“We’re a family community. Everybody close, they know each other,” said Spann, 17, who will be a senior this year at Collins Academy and has been involved in the group since his sophomore year.

The tour guides, who are all incoming seniors at Collins Academy except Johnson, are paid a stipend of \$105 a week. To design the tour, the teens chose sites they believed represented their community.

They usually give two tours a week during the summer, practicing for hours to memorize facts and tell their own stories.

Residents of North Lawndale have voiced enthusiasm about the tours, said. On the very first one, Stone Temple Baptist Church’s pastor came out to speak with the group in front of the building.

“It’s not just about taking people on tours of North Lawndale,” said Nathaniel Viets-VanLear, program coordinator for the group. “It’s about encouraging North Lawndalians to have pride in their community.”

The public tours started last summer and have grown in popularity, said. Companies can book private tours of the neighbor-

hood. In June, the group took new Chicago Police Academy graduates on a tour.

Although they hit most of the usual spots, the police tour included group discussion to explore tension between youths and police, Viets-VanLear said.

“Their only interaction with police was through violence,” he said.

But the tour put them on equal footing, allowing the police officers to “see people how they are every day, hanging on their porches” and allowing the youths to see officers humanized, Viets-VanLear said.

Tours begin at the Green Tomato Cafe, a restaurant that is the unofficial home base of My Block, My Hood, My City, where new group members are taught a call to attention.

A leader says, “Ago!” The rest of the group responds, “Ame!” The words, borrowed from a West African language, mean “Listen!”

and “I am listening!” At each stop, one of the teens grabs the megaphone, calls the group to attention and rattles off facts about the site.

Several stops recognize Martin Luther King Jr.’s legacy in North Lawndale, where he lived in 1966. During a recent tour, the group paused in front of Stone Temple, where King spoke about equitable housing, and the Dr. King Legacy Apartments, affordable housing opened in 2011.

At Stone Temple, Johnson told the group about the history of the church, which was built in 1925 as a synagogue, pointing out the Stars of David that remain carved into the facade.

Bell, who grew up in Garfield Park, said the tours give her the chance to meet new people and break out of her shell. Pausing in front of a community garden, Bell shared the story of the “Lawndale gardener,” a single woman who started the garden. It’s now maintained

by residents, Bell said, inviting tourists to walk through and taste the plants.

“This shows a good example of how one good influence can inspire the community as a whole,” Bell said.

My Block, My Hood, My City adopts this small-influence attitude toward greater neighborhood change, said Hollis Turner, who lives in Edgebrook and volunteers frequently with the organization.

“It’s so simple, it’s block by block, it’s incremental,” she said during the tour.

Cole founded the organization, incorporated as a nonprofit in 2016, when he realized while volunteering at Cook County Jail that young inmates could see Willis Tower through the windows of their cells but had never been to the building.

In addition to bringing visitors inside its world, the group gives teens the opportunity to explore other parts

of Chicago and beyond. The group has gone on industry field trips, including to Google’s Chicago campus and a trading firm, and to Washington, D.C., and other cities. The group will visit Alabama this summer.

The trips are funded through T-shirt sales, donations and ticket sales from the neighborhood tours. This year the group will host a community 5K run Aug. 18 in Marquette Park. Tickets for the summer tours can be purchased for \$40 on the organization’s website.

Next summer the organization plans to establish youth-led tours in other South and West side neighborhoods.

“Chicago is unfortunately one of the most segregated cities,” Cole said. “To make our city better, we need more people to step outside their comfort zones and get exposed to more professions, more places, more cuisines, more cultures.”

in Illinois classrooms, and over 360 were purchased through the student effort, Operation Endangered Species, which obtained a \$100,000 grant from State Farm in 2012. The student group used some of the grant money to purchase turtles for the state, which is running a broader turtle release program that includes the students and partners such as the Peoria Zoo.

“Operation Endangered Species really helped us get this off the ground,” said IDNR endangered species program manager Joe Kath.

With the final year of raising turtles in classrooms now complete, Baylee Ritter, who helped start Operation Endangered Species as a sophomore at Pontiac Township High School, said that this is a “pinch-me” moment.

“You don’t have to be on television. You don’t have to live in a rainforest to make a difference in your community’s ecosystem,” said Ritter, 22, now global youth coordinator for World

Oceans Day.

“You don’t have to have a million dollars to bring a species back and rehabilitate it and reestablish it. Students — me and my friends — with very, very little money, and honestly, little confidence, were able to start something that has made such a huge difference, personally, professionally and for these turtles.”

Before a 22-pound female was captured and released in southern Illinois in 2017, the last time an alligator snapper was found wild in the state was in 1984. But the great beasts were once common here, living in

the murky depths of downstate rivers and streams. They can eat fish, smaller turtles, snakes and vegetation, and have little pink wormlike appendages on their tongues that aid them in hunting.

The turtle will open its mouth and wiggle the “worm” appendage enticingly. When a fish swims over to investigate, the turtle clamps down its jaws on its prey.

The turtles can reach more than 240 pounds and live 70 years. In the wild, they play a defining role in their local ecosystems, in part by eating invasive fish.

“They serve a very important purpose of keeping things in balance,” Kath said.

Operation Endangered Species began with Baylee’s father, Pontiac Township High School environmental science teacher Paul Ritter, who jokes that he was a bouncer at the 2011 Illinois Science Teachers Association annual conference. Actually, as president-elect

of the association, Ritter was responsible for shepherding a high-profile guest speaker through an autograph session.

The speaker, herpetologist Brady Barr of TV show “Dangerous Encounters With Brady Barr,” hit it off with Ritter, and soon the crocodile hunter and the science teacher were brainstorming a school project on cocktail napkins. Students, the duo decided, could help save an endangered species by raising specimens in the classroom.

Ritter and Barr favored reptiles for the project, and Ritter, a big believer in student input, brought some options back to his students, including Baylee.

The students brainstormed and did some research, Baylee said, and the alligator snapping turtle made a strong first impression: “They are the most ugly-cute things I’ve ever seen in my life.”

But what sealed the deal was a classmate’s blunt observation, “That thing has a face that only its mother could love.”

“We were sold,” Baylee recalled. “A lot of people want to save the panda, they want to save the dolphin, they want to save things that are traditionally cute. The alligator snapping turtle is not that, and I think that’s what made us really want to protect it.”

Alligator snapping turtles once ranged from eastern Texas to Florida, and north to southwestern Illinois and southern Indiana, but hunting and trapping took their toll. Turtle soup has been

popular in the U.S. since the Revolutionary War era — it was President William Howard Taft’s favorite food, and starting in the 1920s, Campbell’s offered a canned version, according to History.com.

The turtles, which are more common in Mississippi and Louisiana, have been classified as endangered in Illinois for decades. But by 2005, their habitat in southern Illinois had improved — due to decades of conservation efforts — to the point that Kath wondered if the turtles could be successfully reintroduced. He did extensive research and worked on a detailed initial plan.

When Ritter contacted IDNR for help with his own budding turtle project in 2011, the two men joined forces. Pontiac teachers worked with students to write up detailed protocols for classroom care and monitoring.

Ritter and his students applied for a \$100,000 grant from the State Farm Youth Advisory Board, receiving it in 2012. The first class of turtles entered Pontiac high school that year, and the program rapidly spread to other schools. This past year, 10 schools, including Heartland Community College, Parkside Junior High in Normal and Lemont High School, raised alligator snapping turtles for release into the wild by the state.

Among the many students who took the turtles’ cause to heart were Zdunek and Nicole Meimaris, 18, who, as freshmen at Whit-

ney Young, began calling major corporations to inquire about grants.

“We got hung up on,” recalled Meimaris with a laugh.

But over four years, they honed their skills, raising \$22,000 from sources such as SeaWorld, the Lexus Eco Challenge, the Awesome Foundation and Patagonia Chicago.

Zdunek went the extra mile when Roger got sick with a respiratory infection, taking him home for two stretches totaling six weeks, and giving him shots. He seemed to grow accustomed to her during that time, she said. She could pick him up and clean him, and he wouldn’t snap or try to get away.

Alligator snappers will snap if threatened, and bites can cause serious injury; but some say their temperament is at odds with their menacing appearance.

In truth, they’re “very docile,” said Kath, who has walked around a large one while gathering data: “It didn’t strike; it just lay there.”

Common snapping turtles, he said, are actually more difficult to work with: “They just have a real mean temperament.”

For Zdunek, an entering freshman at Northwestern University, a recent meeting with Roger and another alligator snapping turtle named Ringo was bitter-sweet. The turtles, who are being cared for by Whitney Young science teacher Todd Katz this summer, are on track to be turned over to IDNR in December for release next year.

State wildlife officials will continue to release the turtles for two more years and to monitor their progress; the goal is to eventually have them breed in the wild and become a self-sustaining population. But the emphasis now is on releasing older turtles that are closer to breeding age, so Operation Endangered Species is moving on to a new cause: the endangered Hine’s emerald dragonfly. Classes will raise the devil crayfish, which creates burrows used by the dragonflies.

At Whitney Young, students are branching out with a project focusing on the piping plover, an endangered shore bird.

Zdunek said she’ll be sad to see Roger and Ringo go, but she holds out hope that one day she’ll meet her scaly friends again.

“Maybe I’ll see them in the wild for some reason, and they’ll remember me,” she said.

“That would be awesome.”

## Court backs Trump on border wall funds

Justices' 5-4 ruling allows shift of money from the Pentagon

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on a 5-4 vote Friday night revived the Trump administration's plan to use \$2.5 billion in Pentagon funds to build part of the wall project along the southern border.

The court's conservatives set aside a U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit ruling for the Sierra Club and a coalition of border communities that said a reallocation of the Defense Department money would violate federal law.

The unsigned ruling by the Supreme Court said the government "made a sufficient showing at this stage" the groups did not have proper standing to challenge the transfer of money.

The justices' decision to lift the freeze on the money allows President Donald Trump to make progress on a major 2016 campaign promise heading into his quest for a second term. Trump tweeted after the announcement: "Wow! Big VICTORY on the Wall. The United States Supreme Court overturns lower court injunction, allows Southern Border Wall to proceed. Big WIN for Border Security and the Rule of Law!"

In a 2-1 decision earlier this month, the 9th Circuit majority noted that a stalemate between Congress and the president over the issue prompted the longest government shutdown in history. The judges reasoned that Congress made its intentions clear by allocating

only about \$1.4 billion for enhanced border protection.

The lower court said the public interest was "best served by respecting the Constitution's assignment of the power of the purse to Congress, and by deferring to Congress's understanding of the public interest as reflected in its repeated denial of more funding for border barrier construction."

After Congress' decision earlier this year, Trump announced plans to use more than \$6 billion allocated for other purposes to fund the wall.

Environmentalists and the Southern Border Communities Coalition immediately filed suit to block the

transfer of funds. Democrats in the House of Representatives filed a brief supporting them.

U.S. Solicitor General Noel Francisco told the Supreme Court that the 9th Circuit ruling was wrong.

"The sole basis for the injunction — that the Acting Secretary exceeded his statutory authority in transferring the funds — rests on a misreading of the statutory text," Francisco wrote.

He was referring to Patrick Shanahan, the acting defense secretary at the time.

Francisco said that the challengers did not have proper legal standing to challenge the transfer of funds. He added that even if they did, their "interests in

hiking, birdwatching, and fishing in designated drug-smuggling corridors do not outweigh the harm to the public from halting the government's efforts to construct barriers to stanch the flow of illegal narcotics across the southern border."

The money was transferred from Department of Defense personnel funds in response to a request from the Department of Homeland Security. Federal law allows such transfers for "unforeseen" reasons and for expenditures not previously "denied by the Congress."

The administration contends that Congress did not reject the specific expenditures at issue.

The challengers said

Congress was clear.

"Congress recently considered, and rejected, the same argument defendants (the government) make here: that a border wall is urgently needed to combat drugs," said the brief from lawyers at the American Civil Liberties Union, which represented the groups.

"If defendants were nonetheless permitted to obligate taxpayer funds and commence construction, the status quo would be radically and irrevocably altered."

The brief from the House of Representatives agreed.

"The administration refuses to accept this limitation on its authority, as clearly demonstrated by

Acting White House Chief of Staff Mick Mulvaney's statement that President Trump's border wall "is going to get built with or without Congress," House general counsel Douglas Letter wrote. "Under our constitutional scheme, an immense wall along our border simply cannot be constructed without funds appropriated by Congress for that purpose."

And Letter said that the administration's view of who is within the "zone of interest" to have standing to sue is "in reality, an argument that no one can challenge the conduct at issue here."

### Syria frees US citizen captured during bid to visit every nation

Syrian officials have released a U.S. citizen they had held captive for two months, his family said Friday.

Sam Goodwin, 30, was last seen by a security camera May 25 in Qamishli, Syria, heading toward a regime-controlled neighborhood of the city, according to a Kurdish security official. Goodwin had crossed the border from Iraq into northeast Syria hours earlier as part of an attempt to

visit every country.

Lebanon's security chief, Abbas Ibrahim, intervened to secure Goodwin's release, his parents, Thomas and Ann Goodwin, said in a statement. They wrote that their son was healthy.

Northeast Syria, which is controlled by the U.S.-allied Kurds, is the safest part of Syria. But the Syrian government still controls an airport there and neighborhoods in two major cities.

### Trump says he's not bothered by latest N. Korea missile tests

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said he's not bothered by North Korea's decision to fire two short-range missiles this week that rattled its Asian neighbors.

When a reporter asked him about the missile tests, Trump said Friday that "short-range" was the most important word. He said North Korea fired "standard" missiles many countries possess. They were the first weapons

North Korea has launched in more than two months.

The missile tests come as U.S. and North Korean officials struggle to set up nuclear talks after a recent meeting on the Korean border between Kim and Trump that seemed to provide a step forward in stalled negotiations.

Trump said his relationship with Kim remains good and that the missile tests were not a warning to the U.S.

### US officials: Iran test-launched a medium-range missile

WASHINGTON — Iran test-launched a medium-range ballistic missile inside its borders, U.S. officials said Friday, defying Trump administration demands that it curtail the weapon program and demonstrating its intent to further push back against U.S. sanctions.

The test came amid heightened tensions between Iran and the West, mainly over the safety of commercial shipping in

the Persian Gulf and the Strait of Hormuz.

Hogan Gidley, a White House spokesman, called the test launch an example of Iran "acting out" as a result of intense pressure from U.S. economic sanctions, but also said President Donald Trump wants to begin conversations with Iran's leaders.

Iran has responded to stepped-up U.S. economic sanctions with a variety of military moves.

### Fake claims of child abuse by UK elite bring 18-year sentence

LONDON — A man who falsely claimed he was abused by members of a pedophile ring at the heart of the British government was sentenced Friday to 18 years in prison.

Carl Beech, 51, was the key witness in a prominent investigation of sexual abuse and slaying allegations involving British politicians, military generals and senior officials in the intelligence services.

Beech was convicted of perverting the course of justice, fraud, voyeurism and possession of indecent images.

"He derived sexual

pleasure from graphically describing the violent sexual abuse of young boys," prosecutor Tony Badenoch said of Beech's motives. "He enjoyed the attention and celebrity."

Beech approached police in 2012 with a fantastic tale of drugs, sex and power at the higher echelons of power. It was a sensitive time, coming amid a wave of revelations that Jimmy Savile, a popular BBC presenter between the 1960s and early 2000s, had sexually abused hundreds of children and women.

London's Metropolitan Police service spent \$2.5

million to investigate the "VIP ring" that Beech alleged was active in the late 1970s and early 1980s.

Though the stories were fabricated, he managed to convince senior police officers, journalists and politicians he was a victim.

When doubts arose about Beech's credibility in 2016, police searched his home and discovered hundreds of images of children being sexually abused and that he had installed a camera in a toilet to film a young boy.

Police closed the investigation in 2016 without a single arrest.

### Judge tosses teen's \$250M suit against paper

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — A federal judge has thrown out a Kentucky teen's lawsuit accusing the Washington Post of falsely labeling him a racist during an encounter with a Native American man at the Lincoln Memorial.

Nicholas Sandmann, a student at Covington Cath-

olic High School, sued the newspaper for \$250 million in February, alleging that it had engaged in "targeting and bullying" and modern "McCarthyism."

The actions of Sandmann and his classmates were intensely debated after video and photographs

emerged of them wearing "Make America Great Again" hats near a Native American man playing a drum.

Federal Judge William Bertelsman ruled that there may have been "erroneous" opinions published, but they are protected by the First Amendment.

### Italy report: American a suspect in cop's death

ROME — The Italian news agency ANSA, citing unidentified investigators, said an American tourist has allegedly confessed to killing a policeman in Rome.

Earlier Friday night, national police said prosecutors were questioning two American tourists about 20 years old who were lodging near the scene of the fatal stabbing before dawn of Mario Cerciello Rega by a suspect in the alleged theft of a bag with a cellphone inside.

ANSA reported the Americans reportedly stole the bag of a drug dealer who had swindled them. It said the owner called police to say he arranged a meeting with the thieves to get the bag back. When officers arrived, there was a scuffle and Cerciello Rega was stabbed.

The national police said they couldn't immediately confirm the alleged confession.

**In Mexico:** A man posing for a photo next to a towering hill of soap suds floating atop a heavily polluted waterway was found dead Friday, five days and 30 miles downstream after he fell into the quivering mass and disappeared.

The man apparently had asked a co-worker to snap a picture of him standing next to the suds that tower 20 feet high when he fell in, officials said.

Authorities in the central state of Puebla said excess detergents from homes that drain into streams feeding the Valsequillo reservoir caused the soap bubbles to accumulate. The streams also carry all sorts of household waste and the toxic brew eventually finds its way into the Atoyac River.

# A grim task after 'worst Mediterranean tragedy'

Libya forces recover the drowned; 150 migrants feared dead

CAIRO — Libya's coast guard recovered dozens of bodies of Europe-bound migrants who perished at sea as search operations continued Friday, a day after up to 150 people, including women and children, went missing and were feared drowned when their boats capsized in the Mediterranean Sea.

A top U.N. official described Thursday's shipwreck as "the worst Mediterranean tragedy" so far this year.

The Anti-Illegal Immigration Agency in the Libyan capital said that up to 350 migrants were on board the boats that capsized off the town of Khoms, about 75 miles east of Tripoli.

The migrants included nationals from Eritrea, Egypt, Sudan and Libya, the agency said. Libyan officials said more than 130 have been rescued since Thursday.

One of the survivors, from Eritrea, said his vessel

started to capsize after an hour of sailing. Most of the migrants on board were women, he said, and most of them drowned.

"All of them (who drowned) were ladies; only two girls rescued themselves," he said, speaking on condition of anonymity for fears for his safety.

Two other survivors, reached at a disembarking facility in Tripoli, told The Associated Press over the phone they had each paid between \$200 and \$400 to smugglers who promised they would reach Italy's shores by sunset Thursday.

Ahmed al-Tayeb, a 32-year-old from Sudan, said he was on one of three boats that capsized an hour after setting off from Libya on Wednesday night.

Egyptian Mustafa Mahmoud, 26, said Libyan fishermen were the first to come to their rescue. "I saw lots of bodies, dozens, in the water," he said. "Most of them were children and women who were not able to swim."

At least a dozen of the survivors were taken to a hospital in Khoms while the rest were transferred to different detention centers, including Tajoura, located

near the front lines of the fighting between rival Libyan factions, the Libyan officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to talk to the media.

The Tajoura detention center was hit by an airstrike on July 3 that killed more than 50 people and raised new concerns over the treatment of migrants in Libya. The U.N. refugee agency has, to no avail, demanded the center be closed.

"This is putting intentionally the life of these people at risk," Vincent Cochetel, UNHCR's special envoy for the Central Mediterranean tweeted Friday.

The U.N. migration agency said later Friday that once they arrived, the 84 migrants were turned back from the detention center and were instead being "released gradually" into the town of Tajoura.

Separately from the shipwreck, Ayoub Gassim, a spokesman for Libya's coast guard, said it had intercepted three rubber boats off Tripoli on Thursday, carrying 269 Europe-bound migrants, including nine women and two children. The 269 were taken to

refugee camps in Tripoli, Gassim said.

Amnesty International called on EU leaders to "show some courage" and reverse their decision to halt migrant rescues in the Mediterranean — appealing to nations to change their approach and not "condemn those who survive to detention in Libya."

"People are still risking their lives to come to Europe," said Amnesty's Massimo Moratti.

The European Union has over the past years partnered with Libya to prevent migrants from making the dangerous journey by sea to Europe. Rights groups say

those efforts have left migrants at the mercy of armed groups or in squalid detention centers that lack adequate food and water.

The EU released a statement Friday saying it was deeply saddened by the tragedy off Libya's coast and added that "sustainable solutions for search and rescue are urgently needed in the Mediterranean."

However, it also said "Libya's current system of managing irregular migration and arbitrarily detaining refugees and migrants has to end."

U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres reiterated that "Libya is not a safe

country of asylum" and stressed that "refugees must be treated with dignity and respect, and in accordance with international law," U.N. deputy spokesman Farhan Haq said Friday.

After the NATO-backed uprising that toppled and killed longtime ruler Moammar Gadhafi in 2011, Libya became a major conduit for African migrants and refugees seeking a better life in Europe. Traffickers and armed groups have exploited Libya's chaos since Gadhafi's overthrow, and have been implicated in widespread abuses of migrants, including torture and abduction for ransom.

## British malware author who stopped '17 virus spared jail

MILWAUKEE — A British cybersecurity expert who admitted writing and selling malware was spared prison Friday by a judge who said the misconduct was outweighed by his help in stopping a worldwide computer virus in 2017.

Marcus Hutchins, who was hailed as a hero for his role in stopping the "WannaCry" virus, was sentenced to time served by U.S. District Judge J.P. Stadtmueller. The judge noted Hutchins had pleaded guilty and accepted responsibility for his work on the malware years earlier.

"Mr. Hutchins turned the corner with regard to the conduct that led to these charges," Stadtmueller said.

Hutchins, 25, served just a few days in jail after being arrested in Las Vegas in 2017, but had been required to stay in the U.S. while his case was pending.

Hutchins spoke briefly Friday, apologizing to his victims: "I deeply regret my conduct and the crimes I was involved in." His attorney said Hutchins intended to return to Great Britain.

FBI agents had been investigating Hutchins for years before his arrest. Less than two months after his claim to fame, they arrested him and accused him of creating malware to steal banking passwords.

Prosecutors in Milwaukee had made no specific sentence recommendation, and noted that Hutchins had accepted responsibility for his actions during a plea deal in April, and they also gave him credit for his role in finding a "kill switch" to the WannaCry virus.

He had faced up to 10 years in prison.

Hutchins no longer develops malware attacks and works to stop them, but that does not diminish the seriousness of what he did, prosecutors said. While his case was pending, prosecutors barred Hutchins from returning home, so he worked as a cybersecurity consultant in California.

"Like a man who spent years robbing banks, and

then one day came to realize that was wrong, and even worked to design better security systems, he deserves credit for his epiphany. But he still bears responsibility for what he did," prosecutors said.

Hutchins was indicted on 10 charges for developing two pieces of malware and lying to the FBI. Prosecutors said Hutchins conspired to distribute the malware — UPAS Kit and Kronos — from 2012 to 2015 and that he sold Kronos to someone in Wisconsin. He also "personally delivered" the software to someone in California, prosecutors said.

Hutchins initially pleaded not guilty to all charges and was scheduled to go on trial this month.

As part of the deal, Hutchins pleaded guilty to two charges for creating Kronos — and an updated version of UPAS — and conspiring to distribute it. In exchange, prosecutors dismissed the other eight charges.

"As you may be aware, I've pleaded guilty to two charges related to writing malware in the years prior to my career in security," Hutchins said in a statement on his website after the plea deal was announced. "I regret these actions and accept full responsibility for my mistakes. Having grown up, I've since been using the same skills that I misused several years ago for constructive purposes. I will continue to devote my time to keeping people safe from malware attacks."

Kronos was "used to infect numerous computers around the world and steal banking information," prosecutors said, without providing an exact number. It's unclear how much Hutchins profited from creating the malware, but in online chats the FBI intercepted on November 2014, Hutchins lamented he had only made \$8,000 from five sales. Hutchins said he thought he would be making around \$100,000 annually by selling Kronos with one of his conspirators, who is named in the indictment only by his aliases, "Vinny," "VinnyK" and "Aurora123."

## Kroger, Meijer suspend deliveries from farm in response to videos

Kroger and Meijer have announced they are suspending milk deliveries from Natural Prairie Dairy in the wake of newly released undercover video showing alleged mistreatment of cows at the organic farm.

Natural Prairie Dairy, a large family-owned operation with some 14,000 cows in northern Texas, supplies raw milk for use in the private-label organic brands of several retailers, including Ohio-based Kroger, parent company of Mariano's. The farm is in the midst of building another dairy for 4,350 dairy cows, in Newton County in northwest Indiana, to boost distribution to customers in the Midwest and on the East Coast.

In video released Tuesday by animal welfare group

Animal Recovery Mission, workers at the Texas farm are seen kicking cows or prodding them with screwdrivers and dragging cows that struggle to walk with ropes tied around their heads. Some cows are shown tied with their heads to their flanks and carried with front-loaders.

Animal Recovery Mission was also behind the viral undercover videos of calves being kicked, hit and dragged at Indiana's Fair Oaks Farms, which resulted in criminal charges against three workers and led several retailers, including Jewel-Osco, to pull the farm's flagship product, ultrapasteurized Fairlife milk, from their shelves.

Chicago-based Fairlife suspended milk supply from Fair Oaks Farms after that video was released and recently completed third-party audits of all of its farms. Fairlife does not

source milk from Natural Prairie Dairy, the company said.

In a statement, the owners of Natural Prairie Dairy said the video is "heavily edited" and "produced by a group whose stated goal is to abolish all American dairy farms." Owners Donald and Cheri De Jong said "some of the sequences warrant internal and external investigation."

One worker has been suspended pending an investigation, law enforcement was invited to visit anytime and independent third-party auditors were visiting the farm this week to examine its organic operations and animal welfare practices, they said.

Kroger, one of the largest supermarket chains in the country, said it was suspending the supply of raw milk from the farm for its products, pending an audit by the National Dairy Far-

mers Assuring Responsible Management (FARM) program.

Kroger said it has alternative supplier sources and will continue to sell its organic milk.

In a statement, Meijer spokesman Frank Guglielmi said, "At this point, Meijer is not receiving any milk product from the farm identified in the most recent video."

The industry-led FARM program, run by the National Milk Producers Federation and Dairy Management Inc., said it was investigating the situation and a third-party audit would be conducted. But unlike with the Fair Oaks Farm video, the FARM program suggested the images shown in the Natural Prairie video did not constitute abuse.

## McDonald's sales growth surges in 2nd quarter

NEW YORK — McDonald's newly modernized restaurants and growth in delivery helped the world's largest hamburger chain serve up the biggest increase in global sales at established locations during the second quarter in seven years.

The Chicago-based chain reported a 6.5% gain in sales at locations opened at least 13 months. It marked the biggest gain since the first quarter of 2012 when it posted a 7.3% increase. It was also its 16th consecutive bump in comparable-store sales globally.

In the U.S., second quarter comparable sales increased 5.7%. That gain reflected the successful national and local deal offerings including the two for \$5 Mix and Match incentive, newly remodeled stores and strength in its core menu items like Big Macs and Quarter Pounders, the company said.

McDonald's has been investing in a number of initiatives to help it stay on top of the highly competitive fast-food market. Last week, it announced it was adding DoorDash as a new delivery partner, ending an exclusive agreement with UberEats.

The hamburger chain's partnership with DoorDash will start Monday in the Houston region in

more than 200 restaurants. McDelivery launched in the U.S. in 2017, and globally it has grown to a \$3 billion business for both McDonald's and franchise restaurants, the company said.

The chain also is updating its locations with self-order kiosks to help increase convenience.

"By engaging our guests on their terms, whether it's through delivery, an enhanced dining experience at one of our Experience of the Future restaurants, or through our evolving digital offerings, we're becoming a better McDonald's," Steve Easterbrook, CEO and president of McDonald's, said in a statement.

McDonald's Corp. also is under pressure to make its workplace safer for employees. It said in May that it was enhancing training and offering a new hotline for workers in response to mounting allegations of sexual harassment. That came as the labor group Fight for \$15 filed 25 sexual harassment charges against McDonald's with the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. The American Civil Liberties Union and the Time's Up Legal Defense Fund are providing legal support.

## Rosemont-based Wintrust acquires the parent of Countryside Bank

Wintrust Financial Corp. is on an acquisition spree.

The Rosemont-based bank has agreed to acquire SBC Inc., the parent company of Countryside Bank, for \$90.5 million — Wintrust's most expensive deal this year. Countryside Bank operates six Illinois banking offices in the communities of Countryside, Burbank, Dari-

en, Homer Glen, Oak Brook and Chicago. Wintrust hopes to close the deal by the end of the year.

President and CEO John Wheeler's father, Jack, founded Countryside Bank, originally named State Bank of Countryside, in 1975. The bank had about \$594 million in assets, \$411 million in loans and \$509 million in deposits as of March 31.

Wintrust's announcement

comes after just one month after it announced plans to buy STC Capital Bank for about \$48 million. In February, Wintrust agreed to acquire Oak Bank for \$46 million.

Wintrust CEO and President Edward J. Wehmer said in a statement that the move is part of the company's plan to expand its community banking presence in Chicago's west suburbs.

In its second-quarter earnings report, Wintrust recorded an increase in assets, loans and deposits, which the company attributed to the Oak Bank acquisition. The company's net income slipped to \$81.5 million as of June 30, from about \$90 million in the same quarter a year earlier.


Women often do the heavy lifting at work and at home, but glass ceilings, bias and male chauvinism have conspired to keep them "in their place." That's changing, especially in politics.

## Has the U.S. bulletproofed its elections?

# NYET

In a day of testifying on Capitol Hill, former special counsel Robert Mueller spent much of his time declining to address matters raised by House members. But he was strikingly forthright on one issue. "Over the course of my career, I've seen a number of challenges to our democracy," he said. "The Russian government's effort to interfere in our election is among the most serious."

His report noted that the Kremlin meddled in the 2016 election in "sweeping and systematic fashion." Asked by Rep. Will Hurd, R-Texas, if the Russians might try again, Mueller replied, "They're doing it as we sit here, and they expect to do it during the next campaign." Mueller also warned that other countries could follow suit.

On Thursday, he got backup from the Senate intelligence committee when it released a bipartisan report outlining just how broad and alarming those past efforts were. "The Russian government directed extensive activity, beginning in at least 2014 and carrying into at least 2017, against U.S. election infrastructure at the state and local level," the committee concluded.

It cited the testimony of Michael Daniel, President Barack Obama's cybersecurity coordinator, that all 50 states were targeted. It also found that the election infrastructure was "sorely lacking" in safeguards and that even today, "some of these vulnerabilities remain."

Illinois got special attention in the report. The Russians broke into the state voter registration database, gaining access to as many as 200,000 voter registration records and obtaining names, addresses, birth dates, driver's license numbers and partial Social Security numbers.

The intruders, said the report, "were in a position to delete or change voter data, but the committee is not aware of any evidence that they did so." Not exactly comforting, is it?

There are ways to make election systems more secure. Among those the committee suggests are regular security audits, two-factor authentication for access to state databases and backup paper ballots. Among the steps to be avoided: online voting, because "no system of online voting has established itself as secure."

Director of National Intelligence Dan Coats recently appointed intelligence veteran Shelby Pierson to a

newly created position to oversee election security to "bring the strongest level of support to this critical issue." Congress has also provided \$380 million to help states replace old voting equipment and take other cybersecurity measures. Democrats say that's not enough, but The Washington Post reports that regardless, "it would be difficult to make substantial upgrades in time for the 2020 elections."

It's probably beyond the capability of the Russians or other governments to actually change the outcome of an election without being discovered. But Alex Stamos, director of the Stanford Internet Observatory, says they wouldn't have to.

It would be much easier, he told NPR, simply to "cause complete chaos on the day of the election and to create an information environment in which half the country believes that they didn't lose fair and square, that they lost because a foreign adversary hacked voting machines."

It's hard to overstate the need for vigilant action to protect the 2020 elections from foreign interference. The health of American democracy depends on it.

### WHAT OTHERS ARE SAYING

How did he look? (Old, halting, at times confused). What did he say? (Not enough). How did he say it? (Monosyllabically, whenever possible). The first stretch of Robert Mueller's grueling marathon testimony had barely ended when the national commentariat concluded that he'd had just about his worst day since an AK-47 round pierced his thigh in Vietnam 50 years ago.

"DAZED AND CONFUSED" was the *Drudge Report's* blaring headline. But the Twitter verdict of NBC's sober-sided Chuck Todd was almost as severe: "On substance, Democrats

got what they wanted," Todd wrote. "But on optics, this was a disaster."

*Optics* — the kryptonite of the modern media age, the glimmering, crystalline material that can subsume substance at every treacherous turn. ...

If Mueller's testimony frustrated Democrats — and delighted the Trump White House — it's because he repeatedly refused to be drawn into either partisan talking points or legal and constitutional hypotheticals. His staff had warned the committees that he would not so much as read aloud from his own report if

asked, and at one moment, he pointedly declined even to utter the word *impeachment* as a remedy for presidential misconduct. ...

The Navy commendation that Mueller won for his combat action in April 1969 in Vietnam noted that "although seriously wounded during the firefight, he resolutely maintained his position." The same could be said, for better and worse, of his career-capping appearance — all right, performance — on Capitol Hill: It was much more than a mere show.

# He's got our favorite songs

Ahead of album release, Chance the Rapper turns Garfield Park Conservatory into a club

Who can turn the Garfield Park Conservatory into a club for nearly 500 people on a Thursday? Chance the Rapper.

To mark the release of his highly anticipated "debut album" "The Big Day," the rapper teamed with streaming service Spotify to throw a party of sorts. The atmosphere? A celebration of life, from the patrons to the plants housed within the conservatory's Horticulture Hall.

Announced Wednesday night across his social media platforms, Chance shared a link to RSVP for the free event organized to hype the album's drop. The location was shared with confirmed registrants, and fans were admitted on a first-come, first-served basis. The line outside still wrapped around the block long after doors opened at 9:30 p.m.

As a bar area set-up just outside the Hall's doors worked to appease an anxious crowd of what was billed to include "biggest fans, influencers and media" ahead of the scheduled 10:30 p.m. start time, rumors swirled among the crowd: Had Chance even arrived yet? Was the album really done? Would he have any surprises in store for the evening? They'd have to wait.

At 10:38, another set of doors opened to a DJ and a room lit in red. Bodies poured into the space, quickly exposing the limitations of the location — from bulky stage

set-up to poor sight lines for those that weren't included in the first 100 let in. Fans pushed and pulled each other through the sea of limbs and low-hanging, oversize plants while trying to keep sponsored vodka and Hennessy cocktails in their glasses instead of on the floor.

As the DJ ended his set at 11:15, there was still no Chance the Rapper, but some of the conservatory's greenery had seen better days.

"The Big Day," released at noon on Friday, is the rapper's first full-length, solo release in three years and his first, proper studio LP. 2016's "Coloring Book" mix-tape catapulted him into the mainstream, bringing accolades such as MTV VMA "moon men" and three Grammy awards, after building name recognition among fans and critics with previous tapes "Acid Rap" (2013) and "10 Day" (2012). "Coloring Book" went on to become the first release ever to chart due to streams, spending 33 weeks on the Billboard 200 chart, peaking at No. 8, and cementing Chance as one of the most successful independent artists in music.

While he's been far from keeping a low profile — releasing a string of singles including "I Might Need Security" and "Wala Cam" in 2018, acting in director Austin Vesely's horror-camp, pizza film "Slice," and getting married to longtime girlfriend Kirsten Corley, to name a few —

"The Big Day" is brand new territory to tread.

In the same series of tweets where he announced the release of his forthcoming LP back in February, Chance explained what separates it from previous releases.

The Social Experiment, his longtime band featuring trumpeter Nico Segal, keyboardist/producer Peter Cottontale and drummer Greg "Stix" Landfair Jr. took the stage at 11:49 p.m. Then, with the flash of a camera, Chance the Rapper appeared; his voice quickly drowned out by his rapturous audience as everyone sang along to his latest single, the playful "Groceries."

Performing 10 songs in just under 40 minutes, including "10 Day" standout "Brain Cells" (of which the rapper admitted he

forgot the words), and "Acid Rap" fan favorites "Favorite Song" and "Cocoa Butter Kisses," Chance's excitement was palpable, the energy in the room infectious. It's hard not to root for him, for he has a quality that may solely belong to him at this point — Chance the Rapper will make you smile, even if you don't want to.

"I'm not supposed to talk a lot because I got a short set tonight," he said, finally addressing the adoring faces looking back at him. "My name is Chance the Rapper, I'm very excited to be here. Tomorrow is the Big Day."

After "Groceries," the only other new track the rapper debuted for fans was "track two," "Do You Remember?" His now-signature blend of R&B and gospel made a bit spacey, with

piano that breaks into upbeat production, "Do You Remember?" fits in the vein of songs like "Same Drugs," where the sadness of letting go and committing what feel like previous lives to memory converge with growth and optimism for the future.

This, Chance the Rapper seems to embrace the most.

Speaking about his marriage and expanding family (he and wife Corley are expecting their second daughter), as well as his musical empire and the notions around what it means to "do it on your own" in 2019, the artist was sure to let his supporters know they're also included in his plans for his blessings.

"I really truly did this for y'all. As long as our relationship stays mutual, this can go on forever," he said. "Regardless of what happens tomorrow, I'm glad we'll finally, finally meet."

# Chance is all grown up with 1st studio LP 'The Big Day'

After years of anticipation and several months of hints, hype and promo, "The Big Day" has arrived. It's the title of what Chance the Rapper is calling his first official album, the follow-up to the Grammy-winning 2016 mix-tape, "Coloring Book."

Though the music is plentiful — 19 songs, three skits, 22 tracks in all — the details are skimpy at this moment, but after a handful of listens a few conclusions can be drawn. "The Big Day," which is available on most streaming platforms, is very much in keeping with the mannish-boy vibe projected by the handful of singles Chance has released in the last year, including last year's "65th and Ingleside" and the recent "GRoCERIES." These songs conflate his newfound responsibilities as a husband and father with memories of childhood innocence, a mix that humanizes the rapper even as his career tran-

scends music.

He's not just a rapper from the South Side anymore, but a producer of stadium concerts (including the Special Olympics 50th concert last year at North-erly Island) and open-mic events for teen artists at the Chicago Cultural Center. He's also a political activist who led a march of fans at one of his concerts to an early voting site during the last presidential election, a philanthropist who donated \$1 million to Chicago public schools, and a would-be publisher who last year bought Chicago journalism website Chicagoist, which has announced it will "relaunch later in 2019."

"The Big Day" gazes inward, with touches of the soul, gospel and dance textures that have consistently given Chance's music a buoyant glow. It picks up where "65th and Ingleside" left off, which traced the evolution of the relationship between Chance and his wife, Kirsten Corley, and the

South Side neighborhood where they first started hanging out. "GRoCERIES" celebrated domesticity, the notion that the grown-up with a wife and family isn't far removed from the kid who made Kool-Aid and invented dance moves in his mother's kitchen.

Corley and Chance were married in March, have a 3-year-old daughter and are expecting a second child, and they figure prominently in the new album. There's a wistful tone to many of the songs, a longing for what was, and an appreciation of certain values (loyalty, longevity) and relationships (family, friends) that matter most going forward.

"Do You Remember" connects long-ago summers to the image of Chance playing with his daughter on a swing, and the now-26-year-old rapper's determination to outlast the "27 Club" of musicians, actors and artists who died in their 27th year. In contrast to the reverie of "Do You Remember," Chance ramps up the beats

per minute in the Chicago step-dancing vibe of "Eternal" and the house bounce of "Ballin Flossin," which overflow with optimism.

"We Go High" qualifies as the most eye-opening track, with Chance apparently addressing a difficult period in his relationship with Corley over a melancholy soundscape: She was "tired of the rumors, every room had an elephant ... She took away sex, took me out of my element ... I tried to do the single-dad mingle dance at the club ... I just want the shine back ... (but) a new coat of paint don't make the stain go away."

The couple's ultimate reconciliation presents its own set of challenges, with a skit in which Chance is hilariously lectured by an elder: "He's up and ready to take over the whole globe, the kid's got big, big, big plans ... (but) do you have health insurance? A retirement plan? And you need to start saving money."

In some ways, these notions of domesticity, planning ahead, being responsible are not the ingredients out of which pop-star careers are typically made. But Chance's grown-up ideas are delivered with a childlike zeal. Is it corny? Some of it undoubtedly will be perceived that way. But Chance isn't pretending to be someone he isn't, which is why "The Big Day" isn't so much a traditional hip-hop album as a soundtrack for an as-yet unstaged Broadway musical.


In the closing "Zanies and Fools," a gospel choir and African percussion project a distinct "Lion King" vibe. Even as Chance rails against the history of oppression faced for centuries by African Americans he pushes for a better world. "It's possible, so possible." In other words, "Hakuna matata."



## A big move brings on a big sadness

**Dear Amy:** I moved to a new state for my husband's job a few months ago.

I was lucky enough to find a job in my field, but I'm miserable at work (because of the job itself and because of the people I work with), and it's bleeding over into our home life.

I know you're supposed to explore a new city and find exciting things to do, but nothing interests me enough to want to deal with the traffic and crowds. I'm trying to join groups to meet people, but no luck so far.

I can't stop thinking that the best part of my life is over, and it's downhill from here. I went to see the behavioral health provider at my doctor's office, but she recommended meditation, and it's not helping.

My husband is trying to be supportive, but he sees this new city as "objectively better" than the previous one and keeps reminding me that other people would be happy to be here and to have my job.

How long should I try to stick this out for my husband before pulling the plug and looking for jobs somewhere else? He doesn't want to move again, but said he'll do it if I can't be happy here.

**Dear Unhappily:** You mention "pulling the plug and looking for jobs somewhere else," but it seems logical that you should start your effort toward change by looking for a new job where you are.

It is extremely challenging to embrace a new place and new people if you spend roughly 40 hours a week miserable at work.

Meditation can certainly help you to cope with stress, but it won't help you solve your happiness problem. And your husband's reaction ("Other people would be happy to be here and to have your job") isn't particularly helpful — in fact, statements like this mainly make you feel like a jerk for being dissatisfied.

If you found a job you liked more, staffed by people you felt better about, you would begin to integrate more fully into your city. In the meantime, you would benefit by meeting with a therapist. Global unhappiness of the kind you are experiencing is often about more than what is on the surface. And talking all of this through with a neutral professional could help you strategize about realistic next steps.

**Dear Amy:** Twenty-one years ago, I met my best friend. We lost touch after high school and then found each other again about 10 years later and picked up right where we left off! We had a falling-out and in the midst of the argument she insulted my abilities regarding my passion. This was like a stab in the heart. It was so devastating that I questioned all the progress I've made over the past few years.

I can't seem to forget it, even though she admitted she only said it to hurt me. We have since mended our friendship. She thinks everything is fine now and I don't know how to tell her that I really haven't gotten over it. I feel like I cannot talk about my passion with her anymore, and it's a HUGE part of my life. What next?

**Dear Devastated:** Your friend insulted you unjustly — because she wanted to hurt you? Who does that? This is not how besties behave. Friends say unkind things to one another and sometimes hurt one another, but to insult you just in order to hurt you?

It is natural, and expected, for your friend to want to carry on as if nothing has happened. To admit this and apologize would require her to consider the true consequence of her hurtful comment, which is to shake the foundation of your confidence.

You should open this up for discussion, and present her with the opportunity to apologize for her unkindness, and ask you for forgiveness. Her apology and your forgiveness will open you up again.

**Dear Amy:** "Undecided" loved her career but felt pressured to have children. I wanted to share my experience.

My husband and I chose not to have children and have never regretted it. We have had wonderful careers and have traveled the world together. We feel we've contributed a lot to society, without adding children to it.

## Broadway's dazzling take on 2001's 'Moulin Rouge'

These days, most Broadway theatergoers don't so much want to see a show as take a warm bath inside of one. We crave relief from our growing terror of physical intimacy and our technology-fueled loneliness. What used to pass as immersive theatrical entertainment is, as we end this panicked second decade of the 21st century, no longer immersive enough. The bar has risen.

Ergo, "Moulin Rouge! The Musical." Yes, baby, you're a firework.

Exploding all night long. Here we have an old-fashioned Broadway musical about a louche Parisian nighter (windmill, can-can dancers) founded in the 19th century, the kind of melodramatic writer-meets-actress story of struggling bohemian artists and tragic romance that's been popular at least since the days of Giacomo Puccini and Alexandre Dumas, "Cabaret" and "Camille."

Here we also have a decadent live translation of Baz Luhrmann's widely beloved 2001 movie musical, an intense, anachronistic extravaganza starring Ewan McGregor and Nicole Kidman that stuffed then-contemporary pop anthems inside a letterbox of gorgeous retro-red velvet — or, in most cases, bits of pop anthems, Luhrmann's cinematic aesthetic being as frenetic and commitment-averse as it was sensual and romantic.

"Moulin Rouge," actually, was a heck of a prescient movie, drawing its energy from the great Technicolor musicals, sure, but also pointing toward the song sampling, mashed-up decade that was to come. It celebrated the feeling of falling in love without bothering with the annoying bits of actual relationships.

The musical at the Al

Hirschfeld Theatre — with a new book by John Logan, direction by Alex Timbers and choreography by Sonya Tayeh — has two dominant attractions.

One is the sheer number of songs to be heard, at least in part. Reportedly, there are some 70 musical numbers (or fragments thereof) featuring the work of 161 songsters from Edith Piaf to Mick Jagger, as arranged by Justin Levine. If you don't like Bernie Taupin, stick around for Beyoncé Knowles.

Many of these songs were written after the film (Katy Perry was still a teenager in 2001), so that adds interest as you wonder what might be coming next. Some of the time, the effect of a particular song arrival is comic, as in "Mamma Mia!" At others,

the creative team is hoping for a deeper engagement that impresses upon you the timelessness of romantic longing.

The show's second calling card is Derek McLane's set, an eye-popping extravaganza that most people would associate more with the Las Vegas Strip (which is not a pejorative), and that has more red hearts than a Walgreens store in early February. The confetti cannons pop, it feels, about every 30 seconds.

And the show doesn't so much start as begin to happen, once you have had your fill Instagramming the show's huge logo and forging seemingly legal selfies with the decorously placed performers. There is a preshow without the "pre"; we're all just at this

cool thing together, and it is implied that we should be privileged to partake. Sure. The real joint never had a costume designer like Catherine Zuber nor lights like the show put on by Justin Townsend.

Is there any genuinely complex feeling in "Moulin Rouge"? Not that much, frankly, and what there is arrives courtesy of Karen Olivo, playing the sad-eyed Satine and doing her considerable best to humanize not so much a character as a piece of iconography. She's underused vocally, especially in Act Two. But it's a powerful lead performance, not that you pull much for her relationship with Aaron Tveit's wooing Christian, who is invulnerable, tunelessly disconnected and very much part of the

scenery, which might well have been the smartest way for him to go.

Mercifully, no Valentine's card can fully swallow Danny Burstein, whose Harold Zidler (the owner of the joint) has received Logan's best, flourishing writing and who is consistently a delight to watch. The supporting players, including Sahr Ngaujah as Toulouse-Lautrec, are all fine. They don't get much to say; there's lots of songs to fit into the night.

As a stage show, "Moulin Rouge!" could use more narratively conscious direction, and for all the expansive locations, you don't really feel like you are flying through Paris and up to the moon, as was the case with the film. The transitions are less inven-

tive than the destinations. But this material does give permission to Tayeh to change things up minute by minute, to the point where the choreography-design fusion rocks you back on your feet, especially in the second act.

This is grand date-night pastiche, a unifying communal playlist, an omnisequential dip into a sensual ocean with a few hundred nervous fellow travelers, no worries, being happy, selling tickets.

## Schultz to lead broadcast museum

Chicago journalism veteran picked to be institution's executive director

As the Museum of Broadcast Communications continues to remake itself as a smaller, leaner operation, it has picked Chicago journalism veteran a Susy Schultz to be its new executive director, the museum announced Friday.

"I am so excited to be at the helm of this amazing museum," said Schultz, in a statement. "It is a Chicago gem. I look forward to working with the board in developing a strong curriculum to discuss the history, the impact and the relevance of broadcast and digital media."

For the past six years, Schultz has been president of the nonprofit Public Narrative, which has aimed to train aspiring journalists and neighborhood nonprofits to help get a broader range of stories told.

Schultz worked 14 years at the Sun-Times, through much of the 1990s, as a reporter, columnist and critic and has taught journalism at Columbia, Northwestern and Roosevelt. She has also headed the Chicago Department of Public Health's communication department and served as advocacy and communications director at the Chicago Foundation for Women, according to her Public Narrative biography.

"She also has demonstrated the ability to initiate and foster robust partnerships and strategic alliances with community, journalists, sponsors and donors," said David Plier,

board chairman, in the news release. "We are equally impressed with Susy's leadership experience and skills, which align so well with the goals of our museum as we move into the next chapter."

Schultz joins MBC on the heels of it selling the third and fourth floor of its 360 N. State St. building, a move that puts the museum on firm financial ground, officials said at the time of the sale, in March.

Going from 25,000 feet of exhibition and event space to about 12,500, the museum of late has been featuring pop culture-focused exhibitions. "Saturday Night Live: The Experience" was popular beginning in 2017. "Louder Than Words: Rock, Power and Politics," a show developed by the Newseum in Washington, D.C., and the

Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, is up now, and "Stay Tuned: Rock on TV," a different show from the rock hall, should take its place in October, officials said.

Meantime, the museum next year plans to remodel its primary exhibition space on the second floor and remake its central exhibition on television history, Justin Kulovsek, vice president of innovation, has said.

Bruce DuMont, a local broadcaster, founded the broadcast museum in 1982 and opened it to the public in 1987 in the River City condo complex. Between being situated in River City and moving to State Street in 2012, it was in the Chicago Cultural Center.

## Another follow-up to Lifetime's 'Surviving R. Kelly' in the works

Filming is underway on a four-hour follow-up to Lifetime network's Emmy-nominated docuseries "Surviving R. Kelly."

Network representatives announced Tuesday that "Surviving R. Kelly: The Aftermath" is expected to include interviews with psychologists and more accusers. Some interviews took place in Chicago. A premiere date was not announced.

Federal indictments against Kelly were made public in New York and Chicago this month. The R&B singer and members of his inner circle are accused of a scheme to groom and sexually exploit young girls and cover it up. Kelly is being held without bond at the Metropolitan Correctional Center in the

Loop. He will be brought to New York for an Aug. 2 hearing on racketeering charges. The 52-year-old South Side native has denied the charges against him.

The abuse allegations were highlighted in the six-hour docuseries "Surviving R. Kelly," which

premiered in January. Millions tuned in to the TV special, and it received an Emmy nomination last week for outstanding informational series or special. A two-hour follow-up, "Surviving R. Kelly: The Impact," aired in May.

South in today's deal was Bob Hamman, from Texas. Hamman is considered by many to be the greatest player of all time. allowed West to hold the lead. It was very difficult for West to see the importance of leading a major suit at trick three, which was necessary for the defense to be in control. West innocently reverted to diamonds by leading the king and Hamman took over.

Hamman ruffed the diamond and crossed to the ace of hearts to ruff another diamond. A trump to dummy's queen allowed Hamman to ruff dummy's last heart. A spade to the jack drew the trumps and left Hamman in the right hand for a club play. East rose smartly with his 10. But Hamman's club spots were too good. He simply covered the 10 with the queen, losing to West's king. West had the unhappy choice of leading a club into Hamman's ace-nine or yielding a ruff-sluff. Hamman had 10 tricks and his contract either way. Nicely played!

## Zobrist to return after minors stint

Cubs hoping veteran will provide versatility; Holland added in trade

MILWAUKEE — Theo Epstein addressed the Cubs' need for a left-handed reliever Friday by acquiring veteran Derek Holland from the Giants. But the team's biggest acquisition could come well after Wednesday's 3 p.m. trade deadline yet in time for a one-month run for the playoffs.


Epstein said versatile veteran Ben Zobrist, who has been on the restricted list since May 8, will start a minor-league assignment next weekend with the intention of rejoining the team.

"We're excited he's going to give us everything he can to try to help the team down the stretch,"

the Cubs president said before the team faced the Brewers at Miller Park. "We're thrilled by the news, happy for him, happy for us. We understand there are still a lot of steps that must happen. We think there's a chance he'll come back and help our depth."

"He brings unique things to the table in the clubhouse and on the field. We hope for our sake and his he's able to complete this process and contribute."

Zobrist, 38, has performed baseball activities since he and his wife, Julianna Zobrist, filed divorce papers in separate states in early May. Zobrist, who hasn't played since May 6, will remain on the restricted list but can play on a minor-league assignment for up to 30 days. The Cubs merely need add Zobrist to the 25-man roster

## Zobrist could mean a fairy-tale ending

MILWAUKEE — Will Ben Zobrist's likely return to the Cubs next month provide a Hollywood ending to a season that has played out like a long-running soap opera?



Mack, Smith emphasize teamwork, improvement on 1st Bourbonnais trip

BOURBONNAIS — Khalil Mack made his way onto campus with wide eyes Thursday, driving his Lamborghini truck toward training camp check-in and trying to get a feel for his home-away-from-home for the next three weeks.

Mack's first impressions of Bourbonnais and Olivet Nazarene University?

"It's smooth, man," Mack said. "Yeah. I'm still taking it all in. I'm looking around and getting a feel for everything. It looks like it's going to be a lot of fun out here."

As for what Mack heard from teammates about the Bears' camp home since 2002?

# #41 Richie Petitbon

Key element of Bears' best secondary ever, he went on to coach in NFL

BY WILL LARKIN

Richie Petitbon's easiest interception was his greatest.

The strong safety held the Bears record of 37 picks for 23 years until Gary Fencik passed it by one in 1986. Petitbon grabbed many of them using his 6-foot-3 height to reach over receivers or his sprinter's speed to maneuver around them.

On Dec. 29, 1963, all he had to do was wait for a falling wobbler. With two seconds left in the NFL championship game and the Bears nursing a four-point lead, Giants quarterback Y.A. Tittle reached back for a desperation heave to the end zone. The ball found its way to Petitbon, who cradled it in to clinch the 14-10 victory.

In his column in the next day's Tribune, David Condon wrote: "That catch was payday at the mill, Christmas at home, the kiss from the best gal, a double shot of 100 proof. This was the fuse that put the Bear fans into orbit."

The interception was the fifth of the day for Tittle by five Bears. Petitbon followed picks by Bennie McRae, Larry Morris, Dave Whitsell and Ed O'Bradovich as the Bears' dominant defense harassed the Hall of Fame quarterback into his worst day as a pro.

Giants receiver Del Shofner came into the title game with 64 receptions for 1,181 yards and nine touchdowns, and the Bears secondary shut him out. Frank Gifford had 42, 657 and seven during the season and three for 45 and a score against the Bears. Tittle passed for 36 touchdowns and 14 interceptions at a time when good quarterbacks broke even in the two categories. His ratio in the final was 1-5.

Coordinator Clark Shaughnessy molded the great defense, and his successor, George Allen, perfected it. Shaughnessy, an innovator on offense and defense, put in a system in which a basic defense was called, then a separate set of signals were relayed to Fred Williams for the line, Bill George for the linebackers and Petitbon for the backs. He also let his defensive backs play a combination of man-to-man and zone to confuse the offense.


Allen popularized the nickel defense, replacing a linebacker with an extra defensive back on passing downs.

"When it comes to football, Clark Shaughnessy is the only one I'd call a true genius," Petitbon told Warner Hessler of the Newport News (Va.) Daily Press on Aug. 29, 1993. "As with most geniuses, some of Clark's stuff was off the wall. ... George took Clark's good stuff and threw out the bad."

One result was the Bears' best secondary ever. Petitbon, free safety Rosey Taylor and cornerbacks McRae and Whitsell all possessed speed, power and intelligence, and they worked tremendously in tandem. In the 1963 season they combined for 29 interceptions: Taylor with a league-high nine, Petitbon with eight and Whitsell and McRae with six apiece.

"We were doing a lot of things that nobody had done before," Petitbon told the Tribune's Dan Pompei on Sept. 1, 2013. "We caught the league napping on some things. The credit has to go to George Allen on that."

The Bears drafted Petitbon in the second round with the 21st pick in 1959, and he

played every game for them in the next 10 years. He had been a star quarterback at Tulane, and even though Bears coach George Halas planned all along to use him as a defensive back, he let Petitbon play one series as a quarterback in a 1959 exhibition game.

His one pass was dropped by Lionel Taylor, and Halas cut Taylor and moved Petitbon permanently to defense. Taylor went on to become an All-Pro with the Broncos of the AFL, and Petitbon became one of the NFL's best safeties.

"Had the ball been caught, things might have been different," Petitbon told Hessler. "I feel I would have been a good quarterback. With a legitimate shot, I could have made it."

Petitbon, the son of a French immigrant, originally planned to become a dentist. He started studying for the profession while on a track-and-field scholarship to Loyola University in his hometown of New Orleans.

His hands proved too large to comfortably perform a dentist's delicate tasks, and track wasn't going well for him either as Loyola switched him from the 100- and 220-yard dashes to the grueling 440.

"After a few of those, I figured football couldn't be that tough," Petitbon told Hessler. "So I walked across the street to Tulane and asked if that football scholarship was still available. It was."

His speed served him well in his new sport. Petitbon's 37 interceptions came with a Bears-record 643 return yards. In 1962 he ran back six picks for 212 yards, including a team-record 101-yarder against the Rams on Dec. 9. In 1963 he gained 161 yards on eight interceptions.

Petitbon was named to the Pro Bowl after the 1962, '63, '66 and '67 seasons, tied with Dave Duerson for the most appearances by a Bears safety. Petitbon and Taylor were named the first-team All-Pro safeties in '63, and they're considered the best duo in team history ahead of Fencik and Doug Plank, Fencik and Todd Bell, Fencik and Duerson, Mark Carrier and Shaun Gayle and Mike Brown and Tony Parrish.

In 1985, 1994 and 2005, Tribune panels named Petitbon and Fencik the starting safeties on their all-time Bears teams.

Petitbon reunited with Allen twice after the Bears assistant left to become a head

coach, first with the Rams in 1969-70 and then with the Redskins' "Over-the-Hill Gang" in 1971-72.

While his career as a player was outstanding, Petitbon was even better as an assistant coach. The Redskins' Jack Pardee hired him to coach his secondary in 1978, and in 1981 the team's new coach, Joe Gibbs, named Petitbon his defensive coordinator. Gibbs ran the offense and Petitbon the defense for three Super Bowl champions, and Petitbon was added to the team's Ring of Honor in 2011.

"Few in NFL history knew defense like Richie Petitbon — knew how to play it, knew how to coach it," longtime Dallas Morning News columnist Rick Gosselin wrote in a Dec. 10, 2018, piece calling for Petitbon to be considered for the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Nearly half of the league's teams at some point requested to interview Petitbon for head coaching positions, and he turned down all inquiries except two. His hometown Saints hired Jim Mora over Petitbon in 1986, and the Bears chose Dave Wannstedt in 1993.

Petitbon became a head coach after 16 years as an assistant when the Redskins named him Joe Gibbs' successor in 1993 after Gibbs retired to focus on his NASCAR team. Petitbon went 4-12 in his only season before the Redskins fired him. He never returned to coaching, and the 81-year-old still is enjoying retirement.

For his Bears teammates, Petitbon's success on the sidelines was not a surprise. "Richie had this funny way of talking, and I remember he was a smart player," defensive end Doug Atkins told Hessler. "You know, it seemed like he studied football a lot more than the rest of us."

earlier this week during an appearance on WMVP-AM 1000. "But I've learned it's in the middle of nowhere and there's nothing to do."

Grab your dorm key, Roquan, and settle in. Matt Nagy, Chuck Pagano and the rest of the Bears coaches will make sure there's plenty to do between now and Aug. 11.

"It's just the camaraderie, coming together, getting better as a team," Mack said. "That's what this is all about."

For the record, the last time Mack was in training camp was 2017. With the Raiders. In Napa, Calif.

And the last time he slept in a dorm was back during his early playing days at the University at Buffalo. So, yes, it may take a few days to get used to this new setup.

While Mack missed all of camp last summer, stuck in a contract standoff with the Raiders, it's safe to assume — in the words of Initech's Peter Gibbons — he wasn't exactly missing it.

Still, the All-Pro edge rusher understands how things are different this year and asserts he's ready to fully invest in making certain a special Bears defense remains that way.

Mack knows the groundwork that can be laid in camp and senses this team has the ideal combination of cohesion, focus and determination to chase the biggest of goals.

"You can see it," Mack said. "Especially last year. But that's in the past. We can't really measure (ourselves) off last year's success. It's a new year, new focus, new team. Ultimately, we're hungrier than we were last year. I'm speaking for myself as well. I'm way hungrier than I was last year."

With a big goal-little goal approach, the first step is squeezing the most out of this first weekend of practices. Mack made his way through a light practice Friday afternoon, will get a much more vigorous session

Saturday and then jump into full pads Sunday.

As terrific as the defense was last season, leading the NFL in takeaways and points allowed, it's easy to forget neither Mack nor Smith set foot in Bourbonnais in 2018. Smith didn't sign his rookie contract until 29 days after camp began, missing 16 full-team practices and countless walk-throughs and meetings.

Mack, meanwhile, didn't board his flight for Chicago until Labor Day weekend, when Bears general manager Ryan Pace executed the earth-shaking trade to enliven an already sturdy defense with one of the game's most ferocious pass rushers.

This time around, Mack and Smith will be with their defensive teammates from the get-go. And there are widespread expectations that both playmakers will be barrels of TNT for the defense.

Mack didn't hesitate in saying he believes Smith can become an All-Pro this season. Mack, meanwhile, continues to draw praise from teammates on both sides of the ball.

"He's one of those players who fits perfectly into our culture," quarterback Mitch Trubisky said. "He makes people around him better. He makes the defense better because he raises everybody's level of focus and intensity, competitiveness."

Trubisky used the phrase "all-in" in describing Mack's focus. In Bourbonnais, that means the established star must work through camp to fully understand everything that comes with new coordinator Pagano's defense.

It's learning the new terminology and digesting the schematic principles. It's adding new wrinkles to his game and making sure he remains dialed in on self-improvement as well as the unit's growth.

"You have to think about it in terms of being a student in the game," Mack said.

Mack has enjoyed Pagano's personable

nature and senses the new coordinator has a knack for utilizing his players' strengths. That will be a big test for Pagano, trying to connect and build trust with players who have tasted high-level success as a group without him.

But Pagano will also be aided by the talent he has been given and the eagerness to learn that some of his best players exhibit on a daily basis.

"That's just a part of me. I want to be the best," Mack said. "A part of being the best is working hard along with (your) talent. That's what I've been taught throughout my whole career. Hard work beats talent when talent doesn't work hard."

Mack can easily relay that message to Smith, who is thrilled the drama and tension of last year's contract holdout is in the distant past. Now it's all about football, about long days at camp, about taking last year's success and viewing it through the proper frame.

Like Mack, Smith may be new to Bourbonnais. But he's eager to be here.

"I had a pretty solid year last year and we had a pretty solid year," Smith said. "But that's not the standard here. We're trying to get rings. That's the thing."

## Nagy finds compromise on Cohen's camp arrival

BOURBONNAIS — The Bears held their first training camp practice Friday, a scripted workout that was less than full speed. Before the tempo and intensity pick up Saturday and the pads come on Sunday, here are two things we learned at Friday's session.

**1. Matt Nagy found a middle ground with Tarik Cohen's flashy — if not dangerous — training camp entrance.**

The second-year coach hammers the mantra "Be you" to his players, and Thursday he got what he asked for when Cohen came screeching into Olivet Nazarene University on a Polaris Sling-shot.

The open-topped, Batmobile-looking vehicle was enough to draw attention on its own. Cohen took that up a level by peeling out on the campus' roads. So how did the Nagy feel about all that?

"I plead the Fifth," he said Friday.

Nagy acknowledged he talked with the third-year running back about his entrance. After all, the coach frowns on actions that spotlight an individual over the team. Recall that Nagy, when asked in January about kicker Cody Parkey's appearance on NBC's "Today" show, said, "We always talk about a 'we' and not a 'me' thing."

Clearly, though, there's a scale on which Nagy evaluates each case. Nagy respects Cohen's personality, which meshes with the wild arrival at camp. And it's no small detail that Cohen is an All-Pro player.

Nagy noted how Cohen brings levity to meetings while handling a heavy workload mentally and physically. The Bears consider him one of their most diligent players in practice.

"Tarik will make fun of himself at times, but he's also going to brag a little bit," Nagy said. "But he's a pretty good football player and he makes me a better coach in the things that he does."

**2. Rookie receiver Riley Ridley strained his right hamstring.**

The fourth-round pick out of Georgia, left midway through practice.

"You knock on wood a little bit," Nagy said, "but as you go through these camps you have those. Luckily we have an unbelievable training staff ... and those guys will do a great job of getting him back."

Safety HaHa Clinton-Dix is already in that rehabilitation process while on the physically unable to perform list. He watched Friday from the sideline. Nagy indicated Clinton-Dix is "close" to returning but did not specify a timetable.

# Back, refreshed

## Happ returns with upbeat attitude after stint in Iowa

MILWAUKEE — Ian Happ rejoined the Cubs with plenty of recent success at Triple-A Iowa and an upbeat attitude that impressed team President Theo Epstein.

“He’s been a team-first player at Triple A,” Epstein said Friday night, four months after the Cubs optioned a disgruntled Happ to Iowa. “He’s been an accountable, outstanding member of the organization.”

Happ started in left field and batted sixth against the Brewers

on Friday night in the opener of a three-game series at Miller Park.

Happ, 24, had 39 home runs and an .801 OPS but struck out 296 times in his first two major-league seasons. A rough spring training led to his demotion, and he admitted it was “difficult to be away from the teams and away from these guys, but there were a good group of guys down there.”

Happ praised the Iowa coaching staff and minor-league instructors who helped him correct his flaws. In the last 10 games, he hit .333 with three home runs, 10 runs, nine walks and only six strikeouts.

Happ said he maintained a positive attitude in Triple A.

“It’s a job,” Happ said. “Be a professional. When you’re asked to do something, asked to get

better, you do your job.”

Happ played mostly center field with Iowa but also the corner-outfield spots and at second base. He worked in the infield almost daily before games.

“Wherever they need me, that’s where I’ll be available,” Happ said.

Happ could receive regular playing time against left-handers. He hit .270 from the right side with Iowa but only .230 from the left side.

“I still think we project well against lefties, but we’re at that point in the season where we haven’t done it,” said Epstein, alluding to the possibility that Happ could play more or that he could acquire another bat. “We have to contemplate some tweaks to get production.”

by Aug. 31 for him to be eligible for the playoffs.

Zobrist was batting only .241 in 83 at-bats when he left the Cubs.

The announcement of Zobrist’s plans to return occurred on a news-packed day that included the Holland acquisition and Ian Happ’s return to the Cubs as part of a radically different lineup that they hope generates enough offense to alleviate some of Epstein’s need to add a hitter for the stretch run.

“They’re big games,” said Epstein, referring to the stretch of nine consecutive matchups against the Brewers and Cardinals, including the first six on the road. “We only have a couple months left and we’re in a tight race. Those games really matter. The team that plays the best against the division the rest of the way probably wins the division.”

“They’re meaningful games. The games before the deadline seem to take on greater meaning, too, because you’re trying to assess where you are and the other teams are.”

And manager Joe Maddon was ready to pull out all the stops in an effort to keep at least a share of first place with the Cardinals entering Friday’s opener against the Brewers and left-hander Gio Gonzalez, who limited the Cubs to two hits in 5 2/3 innings in a 7-0 win at Wrigley on May 10.

Catcher Willson Contreras batted leadoff for first time this season and fourth time in his

career. Kris Bryant returned to the No. 2 spot while Javier Baez moved from second to cleanup.

Happ, making his 2019 Cubs debut after batting .333 with only six strikeouts in his last 33 at-bats with Triple-A Iowa, started in left field and made a sliding catch to end the first. But he struck out on a 90-mph fastball to end the second.

The Cubs also made adjustments to their rotation that will have some long-term implications for the NL Central race.

Ace Jon Lester, who missed Wednesday’s start because of a fever, will start Saturday. That move pushed fellow left-hander Jose Quintana back to Sunday with the likelihood Quintana and Cole Hamels will face the Brewers in a series next weekend at

Wrigley Field. Hamels, recovering from a strained left oblique suffered June 30, will make his final rehab start Sunday for Iowa.

“I like it,” said Quintana, who will get seven days’ rest before Sunday’s start. “I get a couple more days. It makes for better preparation, and I understand we want the matchups that are best for us.”

Epstein also shunned any speculation that infielder Addison Russell has played his final game as a Cub after being optioned Wednesday to Iowa.

“It’s nothing he can’t bounce back from, but we had to make a move,” Epstein said. “That move doesn’t necessarily carry any kind of permanence other than the fact we expect him to be back.”

# Four games sum up 2nd-half struggles

Sox have lost 11 of 14, been outscored by 32 since All-Star break

Lucas Giolito had allowed one home run in his previous four starts heading into Thursday’s game against the Twins.

Nelson Cruz hit a mammoth 473-foot homer off Giolito in the first inning at Guaranteed Rate Field. It was the first of three homers for Cruz, and one of four homers Giolito surrendered in the 10-3 loss.

“It is a tough outing, I just got hit really hard,” Giolito said. “But I feel really good, body feels really good. The stuff was there. Velocity was up throughout the course of the game. Just move on from it and attack the next one.”

It’s been a tough stretch, to say the least, for the Sox.

They have lost 11 of their first 14 games since the All-Star break and had been outscored 75-43 in the process.

The Sox are missing injured shortstop Tim Anderson (sprained right ankle) and left fielder Eloy Jimenez (bruised ulnar nerve). They also aren’t hitting with runners in scoring position, going 22-for-115 (.191 average) in the last 17 games. And the starting pitching, aside from Reynaldo Lopez, has been inconsistent.

“Everybody knows how important (Anderson and Jimenez) are,” Sox manager Rick Renteria said before Friday’s game at Guaranteed Rate Field. “And everybody that we have is trying to do the best they can filling in and doing a nice job. Listen, we are trying to do what we can in terms of trying to stay in ballgames.”

“Most of the week or 10 days that everybody can see, we’ve had some trying situations in terms of the rotation getting through ballgames. Everybody has tried to do the best they can, as well as the pitchers. It’s one of those things that happens in baseball. It happened to happen to us coming in after the All-Star break.”

Here are four games that sum up the second-half struggles.

### 1. July 13: A’s 13, Sox 2

Dylan Covey made his return from the injured list. It didn’t last long.

Covey allowed six runs, four hits and two walks in two-thirds of an inning as the A’s scored seven runs in the first.

Covey and Ross Detwiler have

taken turns in the second half trying to aid the back end of the rotation. Detwiler allowed five runs in 2 1/3 innings July 18 against the Royals. Covey allowed five runs in six innings Tuesday against the Marlins.

### 2. July 16: Royals 11, Sox 0

The pregame buzz surrounding Dylan Cease’s second big-league start quickly evaporated when Jimenez collided with Charlie Tilson as both outfielders tried to track down a fly ball in the first inning.

Jimenez went down in pain and left the game.

The Sox miss Jimenez’s power. At the time of his injury, his 17 homers were the most for an American League rookie.

As for the rest of the night, the Sox made three errors in one of their sloppiest games of the season.

### 3. Tuesday: Marlins 5, Sox 1

The Sox won two of three against the Rays, including a thrilling 2-1, 11-inning contest on July 20.

They won the series opener against the Marlins. But the Sox dropped the final two games, combining for just seven hits.

Caleb Smith retired the first 17 batters on the way to a combined two-hitter.

The Sox entered Friday with just four runs on 14 hits in their last three games.

### 4. Thursday: Twins 10, Sox 3

Giolito had his All-Star form July 20 against the Rays, allowing one run and seven hits in 6 2/3 innings. But he allowed seven runs on seven hits in five innings Thursday. He has a 6.38 ERA in seven starts since June 19.

Giolito said the Twins didn’t miss when he made mistakes over the plate with his fastball.

“Hitters are doing a better job when I do miss now than in the first half,” Giolito said. “I think I got away with a lot more in the first half.”

# Seeing ‘good signs of progress’ from Jimenez

White Sox manager Rick Renteria said he continues to see “good signs of progress” from left fielder Eloy Jimenez, who is on the injured list while recovering from a bruised right ulnar nerve.

“He came out and did some early work, did some throwing, did his early work from the cages,” Renteria said before Friday’s game against the Twins at Guaranteed Rate Field.

“He’s going to take a regular routine of batting practice, a minimum of two rounds, and if he’s good, (he’ll) finish it out. We’ll see how he’s doing (Friday night) and continue to evaluate and see how close he is to trying to return.”

Renteria did not want to speculate on when Jimenez might return “because I don’t know how he’s feeling after the full day of work (Friday).”

“I’ll talk to the trainers at the end of the day to see if he’s felt any residual effects and then have a better idea (Saturday),” Renteria said.

Renteria said it’s possible Jimenez could see some time at designated hitter. He said Jimenez threw “comfortably” to the bases Friday.

“Obviously very measured, but (he) was able to get out there and do that,” Renteria said. “We’ll see how he’s feeling at the end of the day. Usually you don’t feel anything in the moment; you feel it later. We’ll see where he’s at.”

Renteria received a positive report on shortstop Tim Anderson, who is rehabbing his sprained right ankle with Triple-A Charlotte. Anderson had two hits, two RBIs and scored once Thursday in his second game with the Knights. He went 5-for-8 (.625) with three RBIs in his first two games.

Anderson last played for the Sox on June 25. He led off and played shortstop again Friday for the Knights.

“Both results and how he feels physically, he’s doing well,” Renteria said. “If I remember right, he’s going to go nine (innings) and then we’ll have a day off for him and then go from there and see how he’s doing.”

“He sounds great. He sounds like he’s doing very, very well.”

## Elliott a no-show at Cowboys camp

## Two-time rushing champ wants new deal right away

Cowboys running back Ezekiel Elliott wasn't on the team plane Thursday when it departed Dallas for training camp in Oxnard, Calif., and didn't show up for the morning physical or the conditioning run Friday, officially meaning he's in a holdout.

The two-time NFL rushing champion has two years left on his rookie deal, but he wants to get paid immediately just as Rams running back Todd Gurley did last year in agreeing to a 4-year, \$60 million contract extension.

Elliott can be fined \$40,000 for each day of training camp that he misses. And he would lose the opportunity to earn an accrued season if he doesn't report by Aug. 6.

Speaking at a news conference, Cowboys owner and GM Jerry Jones said that Elliott officially was late.

"We expect everybody that's under contract to be here at camp," he said.

Cowboys VP Stephen Jones said that he's in discussions with Elliott's agent on a new contract.

"We feel optimistic that things usually work themselves out," Stephen Jones said.

The Cowboys have said they plan on signing Elliott to an extension but prioritized him behind new deals for quarterback Dak Prescott and Amari Cooper because they're heading into the final year of their contracts.

**Wagner lands big deal:** The Seahawks and four-time All-Pro LB Bobby Wagner agreed to terms on a three-year extension through 2022 worth \$54 million with \$40.2 million guaranteed, ESPN reported.

The deal, which Wagner, 29, negotiated himself, makes him the league's highest-paid inside linebacker.

## IN BRIEF

**Colleges:** Connecticut agreed to pay a \$17 million exit fee to the American Athletic Conference, so the school can rejoin the Big East next year. AAC bylaws stipulate any school seeking to leave the conference must give 27 months' notice and pay a \$12 million fee, but the sides negotiated the higher fee for UConn to leave sooner. The Huskies will join the Big East in all sports except football, men's and women's ice hockey and rowing. UConn also announced its football program will become an independent in the FBS in 2020.

**Cycling:** Julian Alaphilippe lost his yellow jersey in exceptional circumstances as Egan Bernal took control of the Tour de France after organizers made the rare decision to stop Stage 19 in the Alps after 37 miles because of a hailstorm. Two days before the race ends on the Champs-Elysees in Paris, the Colombian pure climber snatched the coveted tunic with a tremendous attack in the punishing climb to the Col de l'Iseran, the Tour's highest point at 9,090 feet. Down in the valley, the sudden and violent storm caused a landslide and made the roads too dangerous, leading governing body ASO to stop the race. Tour director Christian Prudhomme immediately announced that times would be taken at the top of the mountain, where

**Rams reward McVay, Snead:** Coach Sean McVay and GM Les Snead received their rewards for their two-year transformation of the defending NFC champion Rams.

McVay, 33, and Snead, 48, agreed to contract extensions through 2023.

Financial terms of the contracts weren't disclosed.

**Giants lose Coleman:** The Giants announced Friday that wide receiver Corey Coleman tore his ACL during the first practice of camp Thursday.

The 25-year-old former first-round Browns draft pick was on the verge of a career resurrection entering his second season with the Giants. Now he has to hope he can recover in time to be himself in 2020.

**Garoppolo can practice:** Quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo will be cleared for full-team drills but will ease into his workload and will not play in at least the 49ers' exhibition opener, coach Kyle Shanahan said Friday as training camp opened in Santa Clara, Calif.

Garoppolo suffered a torn ACL last season in Week 3.

**Daniels wastes no time:** The Lions and former Pro Bowl defensive tackle Mike Daniels agreed to a one-year, \$91 million contract with \$7.8 million guaranteed, ESPN reported.

Daniels, 30, was released earlier this week after seven seasons with the Packers.

# Toews: It's 'exciting' as Hawks retool again

Robin Lehner, Calvin de Haan, Olli Maatta introduced themselves to fans for the first time — and in some cases met their new teammates.

De Haan, acquired from the Hurricanes, isn't worried about fitting in on or off the ice.

"For me on the ice it's all the same kind of stuff," de Haan said. "It's shoot, pass, score. You skate around, you do whatever, you body-check. That's stuff easy. It's the off-ice stuff takes a bit of getting used to. Knowing guys (and) what their routine is. Do they play Xbox, what do they do for fun, stuff like that."

Here are four other takeaways from Day 1 of the convention:

## 1. Patrick Kane and Toews like what they see in top pick Kirby Dach

Adam Boqvist and Dach, the Hawks' top draft picks the last two years, were the only prospects brought to the Waldorf Room to talk with the media.

Boqvist electrified crowds at last week's development camp, but considering the Hawks have a crowded group of veteran defencemen, he is probably going to start the season with Rockford.

Dach is a different story. The Hawks have better forward depth than they did a year ago, but general manager Stan Bowman has said repeatedly he intends to give Dach, the No. 3 pick last month, a chance to make the team. Kane has liked what he has seen.

"He's one of those guys that looks like he can skate well for a big guy but he can also control the puck really well," Kane said. "Long reach, so you can see the comparisons when they talk about him maybe being like a (Ryan) Getzlaf type of player. But it seems like he can skate really well too. It looks like he has a big, athletic build. Looking forward to seeing what those guys can do in camp and let it play out the way it is."

So could Dach make the opening-day roster? Toews isn't counting him out.

"He's one of those guys that could probably step in this year and cause a stir in training camp," Toews said. "I'm excited to see what he can do. I'm not trying to add any pressure to him but I got the feeling he's got that mindset he's going to come in and not move over, not get out of the way for anybody and he's going to want to make our team right off the hop."

## 2. The Andrew Shaw love is real


Conventiongoers erupted when Shaw was introduced Friday, reclaiming his role as a fan favorite just a few weeks after returning to the Hawks in a trade with the Canadiens.

Truth be told, he's also a favorite of his teammates — even if they're reluctant to admit it.

"It kills me to throw out compliments to Shawzy right away, but you have to," Toews said. "We all know what he meant to our team. When we knew he was not coming back to our team a few years ago, there was a void and a feeling we were going to have without him in the locker room."

"He's just such a competitor and the way he plays is a huge part to his personality. He's a high-energy guy who the fans love for good reason. He'll run through a brick wall for his teammates and he brings so much in the locker room."

Veteran Brent Seabrook couldn't hold

back his affection for Shaw.

"He's one of the great guys in the game," Seabrook said. "He's one of those guys that always brings energy, whether it's on the ice or off the ice. You need those guys around to spark things. The season gets long. The season gets dragged out. You're in some dark cities, some snow and weather and all that kind of stuff. A guy like Shawzie really brings that energy, that fire."

## 3. Collin Delia said all the right things

The player affected the most by the Lehner signing was Delia, who was in line for the backup-goalie job until Lehner's arrival. They don't come more mentally tough than Delia, who sharpens his mind by making leather goods and is preparing to open a store in Chicago.

He likely will need to keep an eye on it from Rockford, though, because he'll probably open the season as the IceHogs' starting goalie.

"If anything it was reinvigorating," Delia said. "If this is what I want to do, if this is the business I want to be involved in, things like this are going to happen. I've met Robin. He's a great guy. I'm really excited to pick his brain on a lot of goaltending things. He had a great year last year. He went through a lot. To see him come out on top and have such a great year statistically is really inspiring for me. I can learn a lot from him."

## 4. Where is Corey Crawford?

leave baseball while dealing with a divorce to speculation on Joe Maddon's uncertain future, this season has been one long Tarantino-esque drama.

If the Cubs had played up to their capabilities on the field, no one would've minded a little off-the-field controversy.

But with the team as unpredictable as the wait time for your Uber driver, the Cubs don't need any more distractions down the stretch.

Zobrist's departure came on the same day as Russell's return, so it only makes sense that Russell's demotion to Triple-A Iowa on Wednesday would coincide with the news of Zobrist's return. That's Cubs symmetry.

Epstein said Russell could also return, in spite of some observers' doubts about his ability to focus in a pennant race.

"We expect him to be back," Epstein said.

There's also no guarantee Zobrist will be with the Cubs by Aug. 31 to be eligible for the postseason roster, but the Cubs are counting on it.

"We have complete and utter trust in Zo the person and Zo the professional," Epstein said.

But if Zobrist is not playing up to standards, there's always a chance he could hang it up instead of returning and hurting the team. There's no reason to believe he can't get back to his old self, but no one is ageless, not even a guy who rides his bike to work in his uniform.

How will this affect Epstein's approach to Wednesday's trade deadline? Should he forget about looking for another bat if Zobrist is on his way?

Epstein said it won't affect anything. Zobrist still has to have a successful rehab.

"We hope to have great depth and that he'll be a big part of that," Epstein said. "But it's not something we're going to hang our hat on (and) say our position-player mix is completely settled because

Ben is going to attempt to come back for us."

And of course the Cubs have other issues, including the bullpen, which had a 4.69 ERA in July entering Friday's game against the Brewers, which ranked 18th in the majors. The Cubs did acquire left-hander Derek Holland on Friday, which is like putting a Band-Aid on a shark bite.

"We're still looking for upgrades," Epstein said. "If the right opportunity presents itself, we'd love to get another weapon from the left side."

Craig Kimbrel has gotten the job done as closer, but another right-handed setup man would be nice, especially if Pedro Strop, who has a 7.27 ERA in July, continues to struggle. His outing Monday in San Francisco, the third blown save in six appearances, was particularly worrisome.

"It reads badly," Maddon said. "I get it. The optics aren't good."

Maddon added, "It wasn't awful by any means," while conceding Strop's velocity was down.

"The answer is no, I'm not overtly concerned," he said. "You'll probably see him (being used) earlier. But it's (Brandon) Kintzler, Strop, (Steve) Cishek. I'm just going to look at where the lineup is falling and try to make my best guess."

That's all anyone can expect a manager to do, but with the season and his future in Chicago on the line, Maddon's best guess better be a good one. Brad Brach also has been ineffective, and Carl Edwards Jr. was deemed unusable after one outing and sent back to Iowa.

Maddon can't beg for bullpen help, but Epstein surely realizes he can't win a World Series with only Kintzler and Cishek getting the ball to Kimbrel.

There are five more shopping days until the deadline, and upgrades will be available if the Cubs are willing to give up some youth.

A Hollywood ending remains possible if the Cubs make the right revisions. Sweetheart, get Theo rewrite.

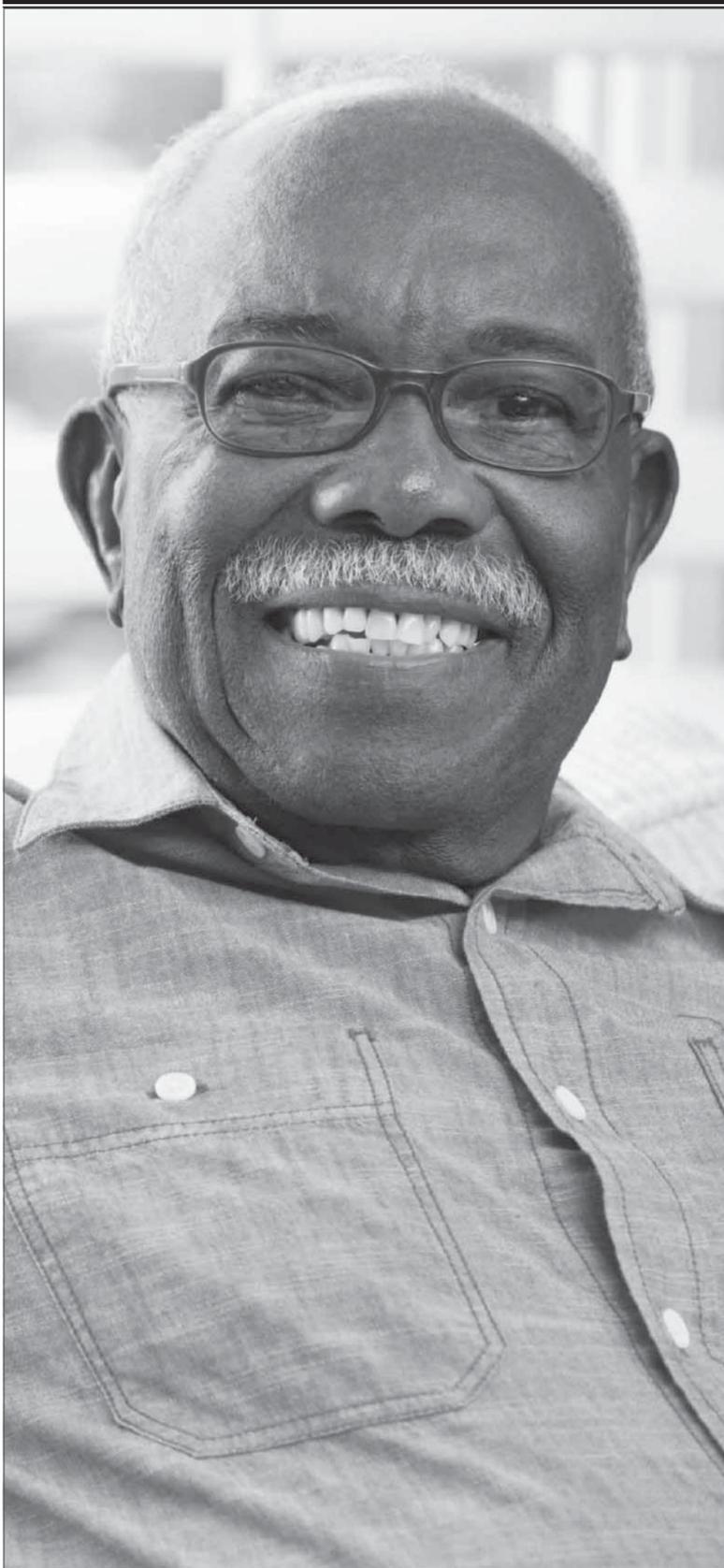





Last Saturday, the temperature went from the 90s to the 70s in just a few minutes. Is there a name for this sudden temperature drop?

Dear Ted,  
A product of Chicago's proximity to Lake Michigan, sudden northeast wind shifts result in large, rapid temperature drops, especially near Lake Michigan. The most dramatic drops occur in spring when the lake is still quite cold, with the mercury often tumbling from the 60s and 70s into the 30s and 40s as the northeast winds surge inland. While not a technical meteorological term and having nothing to do with pneumonia, this sudden wind shift and temperature drop is often referred to as a "pneumonia front." The term was first used in the 1960s and was coined by Rheinart Harms.

# Hill's return a bad signal

Chiefs, Goodell prove NFL's discipline policy as baffling as ever


The NFL is back, and so — cringe — is Tyreek Hill. The two are tied, sadly, in a complicated knot. It's difficult to celebrate the early stages of a new season without fretting the uneasy re-emergence of the troubled star wide receiver.

After a disturbing offseason that included a child abuse allegation and police investigation into his three-year-old son's broken arm, Hill is free to resume his career with the Kansas City Chiefs. Last week, the NFL opted not to suspend Hill, just as prosecutors in Johnson County, Kansas, previously had declined to charge him because of insufficient evidence. Both the league and law enforcement officials stopped short of absolving Hill of any wrongdoing, careful to protect themselves by intimating the case is too muddled to make a definitive judgment.

So, on Friday, he reported to Kansas City's training camp. On Saturday, he will return to practice with a team whose championship aspirations are built around an extraterrestrial offense that Hill elevates with his speed and creative playmaking.

Patrick Mahomes, with limitless zeal and talent, became the face of the franchise in 2018 after his record-setting first season as a starting NFL quarterback. But Hill is the truest representation of the team the Chiefs have created. On the field, they are as fun and carefree as any team the sport has seen. Behind the thrills, however, they are a ticking time bomb of character risks.

This season might be their best chance in 50 years to win a championship. While their eyes are focused on the Lombardi Trophy, they won't be winning any morality awards. I don't think their intent is to ignore character and view troubled players as market inefficiencies that give them a team-building advantage. Their situation is much more nuanced and includes coach Andy Reid's

heartbreaking family history and redemptive desire to be a father figure to players who desperately need one. Where others see headaches, Reid sees potential and hope. But as a franchise, the Chiefs have eschewed caution way too much of late.

They were burned by Kareem Hunt after TMZ released a video last November of the star running back shoving and kicking a woman in a hotel. They ended up releasing Hunt. Three months later, the latest Hill incident started making news. The Chiefs response? On April 23, they gave up three high draft picks to trade for Frank Clark and then gave the defensive end, who was arrested for domestic violence and dis-

missed from the Michigan football team in 2014, a new contract that included \$63.5 million in guaranteed money.

Kansas City is either the most understanding organization in football or the most callous when it comes to domestic violence. No matter the Chiefs' intentions, the cost of doing business in this manner is that they now epitomize the NFL's long history of cluelessness in curbing the violence of its athletes, particularly toward women.

In a sport that fosters aggression in the workplace and then expects players to push the off-button after hours, some of the issues seem impossible to tame without providing adequate and

consistent life-skills training. Although this was a problem long before Roger Goodell became the commissioner 13 years ago, it hasn't helped that he requested and received extreme disciplinary power, only to use it in such an inconsistent manner that you cannot comprehend the message, if any, that the league is trying to send. Goodell's desire to have this power was an overreaction to negative publicity of the players' off-field problems. And in just about every disciplinarian case, he seems to make decisions long after gauging public opinion.

Even though he is so obsessed with protecting the image of the NFL, he still loses because people don't respect such reactionary leadership. Goodell gave himself a chance to set a standard. In practice, he created a burden. True or not, everything is the commissioner's fault, and it bothers him. At times, it seems like he is enacting make-up call judgments.

Can't punish Hill? OK, suspend Seattle Seahawks defensive tackle Jarran Reed six games for a lower-profile incident that happened two years ago. The NFL is soft on domestic violence, and then it's not. Soft, not. Soft, not. If you can't send a clear message, I guess it's better to jam the signal altogether.

Of course, Hill's case was especially complicated. The long and toxic relationship between Hill, 25, and former fiancée Crystal Espinal made it impossible to get to the truth. Four years ago, Hill was kicked off the Oklahoma State football team and later pleaded guilty to domestic assault and battery by strangulation of a pregnant Espinal. He ventured to West Alabama, resurrected his draft stock enough for the Chiefs to take him in the fifth round and became an instant NFL star. Three seasons later, he has amassed 5,125 all-purpose yards, including 3,255 receiving, and 30 career touchdowns. The NFL is currently blessed with many unique, put-'em-in-space hybrid athletes, but few players put as much pressure on a defense as Hill does.

But he's at least a one-time abuser, and he might be a serial offender. Reid alluded to some

rehabilitative efforts that the Chiefs have required of Hill, and the NFL referred to "clinical evaluation and therapeutic intervention." The NFL made it clear there's still a chance Hill could be punished for his most recent incident if new information comes to light. There's also a sense that, with Hill avoiding suspension this time and undergoing treatment, he is on a short leash.

For now, Hill will play. He received the benefit of the doubt despite the 11-minute audio recording of an argument with Espinal. While he didn't admit to a crime on the tape, he did leave you with one horrifying impression of him. That impression remains three months after an initial release of the recording.

In the most infamous segment, Espinal told Hill their son is terrified of him.

"You should be terrified of me, too," Hill replied, adding a derogatory five-letter word to maximize the threat.

In the NFL's eyes, those words weren't enough to punish him. People often say inappropriate things to each other during arguments. But it was harrowing to listen to Hill, who had admitted in court to abusing the same woman, lose his temper in such a way.

But he is free to play football again, and Kansas City is dreaming the biggest dreams. The Chiefs remain the most exciting team in the NFL, and at the end of this season, they just might be the best, too.

"We're comfortable with Tyreek coming back here," Reid said earlier this week.

Of the many words you can use to describe Hill's return, "comfortable" would be at the bottom of many lists.

Perhaps the Chiefs will be fine. Perhaps Hill, who is playing for a lucrative contract extension, will be on his best behavior. Perhaps their electric style will find a way again to overshadow their character concerns. But they won't always be comfortable to watch. They won't be fun and carefree.

Their problems are much heavier now, and at the same time, their potential greatness seems quite fragile.

# Tanking by teams isn't a strategy — it's fan abuse

Never tear down a Major League Baseball team and try to rebuild it from rubble. Not if you have any sane alternative. Especially not now.

A half-dozen teams are trying this approach at this very moment, a number that makes it certain that almost all will fail. By the July 31 trade deadline, more teams will decide whether to be "sellers." Some will be tempted to go from "sellers" to outright rummage sale while chasing a trend that's left the station.

Washington Nationals fans have avoided this disgraceful display, at least for this season, with their team's recent rush from disgrace in May to a wild-card spot now. But in 2020 or '21, if the Nats stagger early, you can be sure that, coast to coast, and in Washington, too, you'll hear wails just like the ones two months ago about how the Nats would be "smart" to consider trading Max Scherzer, Anthony Rendon and others, for kids. By '22 will it be: What are we offered for Patrick Corbin or Trea Turner?

Snap out of it. Don't listen. It's dumb enough to tear down a roster that is already rotten or old or both. But it's idiotic to rip up a team that has a chance to make the playoffs, even as a wild card, especially in the first era in MLB history when six teams already are trying to race to the bottom. With more to come? What is this, the shameless NBA where tanking's been the dirty big lie for years?

The idea of trying to lose 100 to 115 games, while claiming it's a long-term plan for glory, always has been a long-shot notion, seldom born out in actual baseball experience. Of the current 30 teams, 20 have never in the past 50 years lost more than 200

games in consecutive seasons, at least not after you exclude their early expansion-team days. Yet those 20 teams have won 33 of the past 50 World Series, exactly the ratio you'd expect if there was no difference between having a Horror Era and never being truly awful at all.

With the Orioles (on a pace for 111 losses entering Friday's games), Tigers (111), Royals (103), Blue Jays (101), Marlins (101) and Mariners (98) all in the same mud hole wrestling to get the same No. 1 overall draft pick next season, we're watching a bull market in stupidity. And cupidity, too, since all those teams think that they can still make a safe cynical profit, thanks to revenue sharing, no matter how bad they are.

As for trades, all these bottom feeders are fighting over the same ever-smaller pool of available prospects in a sport full of analytics-driven front offices that (cor-

rectly) worship young cheap players. What a joke: A sport full of horrid teams who think they're being smart until they call a good team and try to trade their mediocrities for a nice Class AA prospect. The answer: Do you think we're fools? We want the same kind of players you do — and we're not giving you any of ours.

This "Get Awful to Get Great" method has led to a few brilliant successes in the past, such as the 2011-13 Astros who deliberately lost 106-107-111 games to get No. 1 overall draft picks, while also trading vets for minor league prospects. They won the 2017 World Series.

The worst-to-first trick also has worked, partly by accident, for teams like the 1988-90 Braves who lost 300 games, then reached the playoff 14 seasons in a row.

But those are the exceptions. In the past 50 years, losing usually

leads to more losing. A lot more losing. I've watched it up close too often in Baltimore. In 1987-88, the Birds lost 202 games. Full rebuild mode. In the 31 seasons since, the Orioles have won 90 games just three times. At one point, they had 14 straight losing seasons. Why did Washington get a team? Because the Orioles devalued their brand so much that there was nothing for MLB's other 29 owners to protect by keeping a team off Baltimore's doorstep.

Baseball has seldom seen a darker hour for its core concept of maintaining the integrity of the game. Commissioner Rob Manfred is either asleep or complicit.

Too many teams are now breaking their implicit vows to the public. They're making a profit through the back door as money gushes into the game from revenue streams, many of them generated over the internet, which are divided 30 ways. For generations, fans have believed that they were "in it together" with their teams. Bad times made everybody miserable — fans, players and owners alike. Now, only the fans take it in the neck.

If a pro sport can have a virtue, a character-building trait, then it is the way towns and teams agree, without ever saying a word, to have a lifetime's worth of patience with each other. The team is only a winner about half the time and, in bad years, the fans don't come out in the same numbers. But nobody gets mad.

Everyone waits for the big puzzle to fit together with the right players, manager, chemistry, health and luck. In a 30-team sport, the odds are your team will win, at best, one or two World Series in your lifetime. If you're just in it for parades, you made a bad choice. Owners who are in it for the buck are sad cases, too. Already rich, they miss the larger

point.

Underlying the whole saga is the premise that, as long as it makes any sense, the team always will try to win. Sometimes, like the Phillies of a decade ago, a team is too loyal to most of its stars, and they get old together. But fans can forgive that. Now, the Phils are back in the picture without trying to lose 105 games for years.

There are circumstances when a tear-down may be the best of the available rotten options. But it's rare. As the trade deadline approaches, clubs will be counseled to trade — and trade with a vengeance. Clear the decks. Cut payroll. Guarantee a profit for years. Rebuild in a few seasons — well, maybe . . . if you're very lucky. But more likely, you'll just stink for years and pick the public's pocket.

How do the teams with the most devoted fan bases view losing — and especially horrible demoralizing 100-loss seasons?

The Boston Red Sox have had only one season with more than 93 losses since 1934. Baseball-loving Cincinnati has seen only one Reds team lose 100 games since its inception in 1882. Baseball in Los Angeles draws huge crowds. Sure, it's sunny. But entertainment competition is huge. The Dodgers and Angels, in a combined 121 seasons in L.A., have had only one team that lost more than 95 games. The Yankees, a special case to be sure, haven't lost 100 since they were the Highlanders in 1912. The "best fans in baseball?" Maybe St. Louis. The last Cardinal team to lose even 95 games was in — come on, guess — 1913.

There's a pattern here. You better think twice before following the current greedy disingenuous fad to tear down your team to the foundations to "rebuild." No, better think 10 times — at least.







# The 19-foot GMC Yukon XL just the right size for big families

Some may find the 2019 GMC Yukon XL as big as a house. At just under 19 feet long, they're not far off.

But it's just right for folks with big families, a slew of friends, a boat, horse or small home to lug around. It can seat as many as nine, tow up to 8,300 pounds and accommodate a virtual ton of cargo with 39 cubic feet of space in the back — and nearly 122 cubes with the second and third rows folded down.

All that enormous capability comes with sacrifices: maneuvering in mall parking lots and fuel economy, for starters.

At first glance, the Yukon XL, especially in Jet Black with gloss black wheels, looks like some sort of VIP or federal vehicle — or even maybe a hearse. It has a blacked-out honeycomb grille, gloss-black wheels and myriad chrome accents.

At nearly 6,000 pounds, it needs a brute of an engine. Not to worry: a 6.2-liter V-8 that cranks out 420 horsepower and 460 pound-feet of torque. Yeah, that's enough to squeal the wheels and run to 60 mph in 6.4 seconds. A trailer brake controller and sway control help stabilize a load of more than four tons.

Beyond all the beef, what is notable about the top-line Yukon XL Denali is its surprisingly comfortable ride for a body-on-frame truck. It excels in both comfort and smoothness on the highway, but GMC's Magnetic Ride Control keeps it steady on corners, too. It electronically adjusts suspension at all four corners to smooth bumps and dips in the road surface.

The lightweight steering offers pretty good feedback and enables tight U-turns for a truck of these proportions. Stopping from 60 mph is done in an impressive 139 feet — that's equal to many family sedans.

A 10-speed automatic transmission is smooth shifting and it has cylinder deactivation, which closes down half the cylinders when they are not needed on the highway. Still, EPA estimates for the 2WD come in at 14 mpg city, 23 highway for a combined 17 mpg.

Driving this mammoth requires caution and patience in congested areas, but Denali offers lots of assistance. Besides great visibility from within, it has rear-view camera with cross-traffic alert, front and rear parking sensors and blind-spot monitoring.

So how tough is it to climb up into? Not as bad as you'd think, with the help of optional power running boards and grab handles on the front pillars. Once inside, you'll find front seats are elegant and comfortable and are trimmed with heated/cooled perforated leather. Same for the second row bucket seats.

The driver keeps track of pertinent data via a head-up display on the windshield as well as a reconfigurable virtual instrument display. And the rearview mirror converts to a rear-vision camera so headrests nor cargo can hamper the view.

Denali gets GMC's smooth infotainment system, operable via steering

wheel controls or 8-inch color touchscreen with voice recognition. It comes with Bluetooth and is Apple CarPlay and Android Auto-capable. A 4G LTE Wi-Fi hotspot can accommodate up to seven devices.

For long drives there's enough to keep everyone entertained, starting with a 10-speaker Bose Surround Sound audio system. An optional rear entertainment system with DVD player, wireless headphones and HDMI port can silence the kids for hours.

One more handy item of note: Access to the cargo area can be done through a rear lift-gate window alone, a rarity these

days.

With a sticker that approaches \$80,000, here's a money-saving tip: For 2019, the 6.2-liter engine with Magnetic Ride, once reserved only for the Denali, is available as an option on the SLT trim.

Either way, you'll soon discover the powerful Denali commands attention on the road — especially in the blacked out version. Folks seem to glance over and yield the right of way, either because of its left or they weren't quite sure who could be inside. Could be somebody important, or maybe just the in-laws from the north again.


