



## Impeachment saga's 1st act is a subpoena salvo

Pompeo told to submit documents as Dems probe president

WASHINGTON — House Democrats took their first concrete steps in the impeachment investigation of President Donald Trump on Friday, issuing subpoenas demanding documents from Secretary of State Mike Pompeo and scheduling legal depositions for other State

Department officials.

The subpoena issued Friday demands that Pompeo turn over by Oct. 4 documents pertaining to Trump's dealings with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy.

"Your failure or refusal to comply with the subpoena shall constitute evidence of obstruction of the House's impeachment inquiry," Foreign Affairs Chairman Eliot Engel, D-NY, Intelligence Committee Chairman Schiff and Oversight Committee

Chairman Elijah Cummings, D-Md., wrote in a joint letter to Pompeo.

At the end of a stormy week of revelation and recrimination, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi framed the impeachment inquiry as a somber moment for a divided nation.

"This is no cause for any joy," she said on MSNBC.

At the White House, a senior

## Mobster gets 14 years for extortion

Prosecutor: Family 'terrorized' for not paying 'juice' loan

A reputed Outfit soldier was sentenced to 14 years in federal prison Friday for threatening and beating a suburban businessman he claimed owed him \$100,000 and then hiring a goon to torch the debtor's car and house when he wouldn't pay up.

Robert Panozzo Sr., 59, pleaded guilty in June to one count of extortion, admitting in a plea agreement with prosecutors that he embarked on a four-year effort to collect the "juice" loan debt beginning in 2005.

The sentence was handed down Friday by U.S. District Judge Philip Reinhard in federal court in Rockford, according to a spokesman for the U.S. attorney's office.

In asking for a stiff sentence, prosecutors wrote in a recent court filing that Panozzo "terrorized" the extortion victim and his family for years, culminating with separate arsons at the man's home when his wife, daughter and three young grandchildren were asleep.

"It really scared everyone!" the victim told authorities after one of the fires, according to the filing. "None of us could sleep, the kids would cry every night, afraid they were going to die from another fire."

The sentence Friday will be served concurrently with Panozzo's 18-year prison sentence handed down earlier this year for his Cook County conviction in a sweeping racketeering conspiracy.

In that case, Panozzo and longtime associate Paul Koroluk admitted to heading a crew that took part in wide-ranging crimes that included home invasions, armed robberies, burglaries, insurance fraud and prostitution.

With good behavior, Panozzo, who has been in

## Hockey players make (n)ice gesture for trooper's family

Balancing Act

Parker Hara, Jack Elbaum and Sam Shachtman, all hockey players for the Highland Park Giants, were headed to a tournament in Darien on Jan. 12. It was snowing. They passed a car accident on Interstate Highway 294. They didn't think much of it.

On their way home from the tournament, hours later, lights from emergency vehicles still

flashed in the snow.

"Clearly something more serious had happened," Hara said. "We didn't find out the whole story until the next day."

Illinois State Trooper Christopher Lambert, 34, was killed at the scene. He had just finished his shift and was heading home to Highland Park when he stopped to help at the site of the three-vehicle crash. Authorities say Scott Larsen, a 61-year-old Wisconsin man, tried to pass the accident scene on the left shoulder and struck Lambert. Larsen has been charged with reckless homicide.

"It became extremely personal to us," Hara said.

Lambert lived in their town. They witnessed the scene where

he was killed. They heard later that the family he was helping was also headed to a hockey tournament, though they didn't know any of the players.

Lambert was an Army veteran who served in Iraq and Haiti. He was a Dayton, Ohio, native who started serving with the Illinois State Police in 2013. He was married to Halley Martin Lambert. They had a baby girl, Delaney.

Six days after he died, hundreds of people attended Lambert's funeral at Willow Creek Community Church.

And then life returned to normal around Lambert's family, even if it would never again be

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custody for more than five years, would be eligible for release in 2026.

Panozzo was a longtime soldier of Albert "Little Guy" Vena, the reputed Grand Avenue boss, according to prosecution testimony at a mob-related trial in 2014.

According to his 17-page plea agreement in the federal extortion case, Panozzo loaned a McHenry County businessman — identified only as Victim 1 — \$40,000 in 2005 and then followed up with "additional loans."

At a meeting at a restaurant in Palatine in 2006, the businessman handed Panozzo an envelope with \$25,000 in cash, according to the plea agreement. He believed that was his final payment, but Panozzo let him know he still owed \$100,000 in interest on the loans.

That October, after the victim had not paid, Panozzo and his associate, Joseph Abbott, confronted the businessman at work, beating him and causing

"injuries and contusions to Victim 1's head," the court filing said.

Panozzo was later sentenced to prison for a burglary conviction and couldn't collect on the debt. Once he was released in 2008, though, Panozzo began calling Victim 1 demanding repayment, the filing said.

In February 2009, Panozzo paid Abbott \$1,000 to set fire to a Dodge Caravan that was parked in the victim's driveway, according to the filing. Two months later, Abbott "used an incendiary device" to set fire to the victim's garage and several nearby trash cans, the filing said.

Panozzo acknowledged in the plea agreement that he paid Abbott about \$4,000 or \$5,000 to "blow up" the victim's residence.

Abbott has pleaded guilty to extortion and is awaiting sentencing, court records show.

The victim, meanwhile, told authorities "it took years of restless nights" to get over the terror brought on his family by Panozzo, according to the prosecution filing. To this day, he said, he checks his car

before starting it.

"I am still scared for our safety, as they know so many people," the victim was quoted in the filing as saying.

Raised in the old Italian American enclave known as "the Patch" on the Near West Side, Panozzo and Koroluk have criminal histories that stretch back decades, court records show.

In 2006, they were both sentenced to seven years in prison for a string of burglaries targeting tony north suburban homes that netted millions of dollars in jewelry and other luxury items. Police at the time described the burglars as some of the most sophisticated they had ever seen, from disabling state-of-the-art alarm systems to cutting phone lines.

Panozzo and Koroluk were arrested in a dramatic sting in 2014 after the two posed as cops to rob what they thought was a cartel stash house on the Southeast Side.

They kicked in the door and grabbed stacks of drugs — only to be arrested by Chicago police and federal agents who had wired the house for audio and video surveillance and watched

from above with an FBI spy plane.

Panozzo's name surfaced repeatedly in the bizarre 2014 trial of Steven Mandell, a former Chicago cop and death row inmate who was convicted of plotting to murder and dismember a suburban businessman.

According to trial testimony, Panozzo introduced Mandell in July 2012 to an associate during a lunch meeting with other mobsters at La Scarola, a popular Italian restaurant on West Grand Avenue. The associate wound up cooperating with the FBI, wearing a wire as he pretended to go along with the plan to kill the Riverside landlord.

For weeks, the FBI watched through a hidden camera as Mandell outfitted a Northwest Side storefront he jokingly referred to as "Club Med" with an industrial sink, butcher table and other equipment needed to chop the body to pieces.

Mandell was arrested in October 2012 as he arrived at the victim's office with plans to kidnap him. He is serving life in prison.

normal within it.

That didn't sit well with the three boys, all seniors at Highland Park High School.

"We felt an obligation to step up and help," Elbaum said. "Just looking at the story, we had so many connections to it."

They contacted Lambert's wife.

"We wanted to learn what it was like for her to go through this and to get to know a little more about Chris," Hara said. "We wanted to better understand what her wants and needs were, and how we could help."

She told them she discovered she was pregnant with their second child a few days after her husband's funeral. (The baby was born recently.) She told them she wanted, more than anything, to raise awareness about Scott's Law, which calls for

drivers to slow down and stay clear of stopped emergency vehicles that display warning lights.

The law is named for Chicago Fire Department Lt. Scott Gillen, who was struck and killed by a driver on the Dan Ryan Expressway in 2000 when he was working at an accident scene.

Two more state troopers were killed after Lambert died: Brooke Jones-Story was struck and killed by a truck driver in March near Rockford, and Gerald Ellis was killed just days later when his car was struck by a driver traveling the wrong way on the Tri-State Tollway.

The boys got to work. They had "Scott's Law" wrist bands made and started handing them out at school.

"We thought what better place to educate drivers, especially new drivers, than in a high school," Hara said.

They set up a GoFund Me page. It raised close to \$13,000.

They started planning an event.

It should involve hockey, obviously. It should raise money, but it should also raise awareness about Scott's Law, they figured.

On Saturday, they'll host Skate for Scott's Law, a 2 1/2-hour open skate at Centennial Ice Arena in Highland Park.

Secretary of State Jesse White is expected to attend, and the Jesse White Tumblers are scheduled to perform.

"It's been really cool to change the focus of the event from just supporting the family to also raising awareness for Scott's Law," Shachtman said. "We want to help make sure it's a law that everybody knows."

In addition to securing a spot for the event, meeting with Lambert's wife, tracking down the secretary of state, getting wristbands made and setting up a GoFundMe, the students have also been hitting up local businesses for food, drinks and other donations for Saturday's event.

I'm impressed by their scheduling gymnastics and, even more so, their hearts. I told them as much.

"It just seemed like the right thing to do," Shachtman said.

"Obviously being seniors in high school, we're busy sometimes," Elbaum said. "It can be challenging to carve out some time to help. But it's completely worth it. Especially when we see everyone there on Saturday, knowing they're all there to help the Lambert family, it will feel completely worth it."

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administration official confirmed a key detail from the unidentified CIA whistleblower who has accused Trump of abusing the power of his office.

Trump, for his part, insisted anew that his actions and words have been "perfect" and the whistleblower's complaint might well be the work of "a partisan operative."

The White House acknowledged that a record of the Trump phone call that is now at the center of the impeachment inquiry had been sealed away in a highly classified system at the direction of Trump's National Security Council lawyers.

Separately, Trump adviser Kellyanne Conway told reporters that the

whistleblower "has protection under the law," something Trump himself had appeared to question earlier in the day.

Still at issue is why the rough transcript of Trump's July 25 phone call with Ukraine's president was put on "lock down," in the words of the whistleblower. The CIA officer said that diverting the record in an unusual way was evidence that "White House officials understood the gravity of what had transpired" in the conversation.

The whistleblower complaint alleges that Trump used his office to "solicit interference from a foreign country" to help himself in next year's U.S. election.

In the phone call, days after ordering a freeze to some military assistance for Ukraine, Trump prodded Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy to dig for potentially damaging material on Democratic rival Joe Biden and volunteered the assistance of both his personal attorney, Rudy Giuliani, and U.S. Attorney General William Barr.

Pelosi refused to set a deadline for the probe but promised to act "expeditiously." The House intelligence committee could draw members back to Washington next week.

At the White House, it was a senior administration official who acknowledged that the rough transcript of Trump's conversation with Zelenskyy had been moved to a highly classified system maintained by the National Security Council. The official was granted anonymity to discuss sensitive matters.

White House attorneys had been made aware of concerns about Trump's comments on the call even before the whistleblower sent his allegations to the intelligence community's inspector general. Those allegations, made in mid-August, were released Thursday under heavy pressure from House Democrats.

All the while, Trump was keeping up his full-bore

attack on the whistleblower and the unnamed "White House officials" cited in the complaint, drawing a warning from Pelosi against retaliation.

Late Thursday, Trump denounced people who might have talked to the whistleblower as "close to a spy" and suggested they engaged in treason, an act punishable by death. Then on Friday, he said the person was "sounding more and more like the so-called Whistleblower isn't a Whistleblower at all."

He also alleged without evidence that information in the complaint has been "proved to be so inaccurate."

Pelosi told MSNBC, "I'm concerned about some of the president's comments about the whistleblower."

Rep. Joaquin Castro, D-Texas, a member of the intelligence committee, said the president calling whistleblowers spies is "just grotesque."

"If you ask me, I'd like to hear from everybody that was mentioned in that whistleblowers report. I like to hear from Rudy Giuliani, from the attorney general. I think Mike Pompeo has explaining to do as well as the State Department."

Trump's Friday comment questioning the whistleblower's status seemed to foreshadow a possible effort to argue that legal protection laws don't apply to the person, opening a new front in the president's defense, but Conway's statement seemed to make that less likely.

The intelligence community's inspector general found the whistleblower's complaint "credible" despite finding indications of the person's support for a different political candidate.

Legal experts said that by following proper procedures and filing a complaint with the government rather than disclosing the information to the media,

the person is without question regarded as a whistleblower entitled to protections against being fired or criminally prosecuted.

"This person clearly followed the exact path he was supposed to follow," said Debra D'Agostino, a lawyer who represents whistleblowers. "There is no basis for not calling this person a whistleblower."

Giuliani, already in the spotlight, was scheduled to appear at a Kremlin-backed conference in Armenia on Tuesday, but late Friday he backed out. The agenda, first reported by The Washington Post, had showed him speaking at a session on digital financial technologies. Russian President Vladimir Putin also was scheduled to participate in the conference.

Giuliani said Friday evening that he was no longer planning to attend the meeting. "I didn't know Putin was going," he said in a brief interview, adding in a text: "Discretion is the better part of valor."

Republicans were straining under the uncertainty of being swept up in the most serious test yet of their alliance with the Trump White House.

"We owe people to take it seriously," said Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., a onetime Trump rival who is now a member of the intelligence committee.

"Right now, I have more questions than answers," he said. "The complaint raises serious allegations, and we need to determine whether they're credible or not."

A swift resolution to the impeachment inquiry may not be easy. The intelligence committee is diving in just as lawmakers leave Washington for a two-week recess, with the panel expected to work while away. One person familiar with the committee's schedule said that members might return at the end of next week.

## Veteran cop testifies about gang feud that led to death

Chicago police officer details violence dating to 2010 at trial for 9-year-old's shooting

A veteran Chicago police officer who considered a gang expert testified Friday how a long-simmering feud between two gang factions in Chicago's Gresham neighborhood escalated after rivals were suspected of fatally shooting one member and wounding his mother.



"It was even more fierce, the hatred," Officer Matthew Kennedy told Cook County jurors after not only Tracey Morgan, a member of the Bang Bang Gang/Terror Dome faction of the Black P Stones, was fatally shot, but his mother also was wounded.

Morgan's brother, Corey, and Dwright Doty are on trial on charges that they retaliated weeks later by targeting 9-year-old Tyshawn Lee, whose father, Pierre Stokes, was then a ranking member of the Gangster Disciples' Killa Ward faction, according to Kennedy.

Cook County prosecutors allege Doty won Tyshawn's trust at the basketball court at Dawes Park, lured him to a nearby

alley and shot him repeatedly at close range while Corey Morgan looked on from a black SUV in November 2015.

Kennedy said the violence between the two gang factions goes back to at least 2010 when he started working in the Gresham police district.

"They were fierce enemies," he said. "There was a lot of violence."

Kennedy estimated the Bang Bang Gang/Terror Dome faction had 30 to 50 members in the Gresham area at the time,

far less than Killa Ward's more than 100 members.

After Tracey Morgan's killing, Kennedy testified, he talked to informants and people in the neighborhoods.

"They were highly upset," he said of Morgan's gang. "I received information that they felt Killa Ward did that."

Kennedy braced for retaliation.

"History has shown it in the (Gresham) District, yes," he said.

With Kennedy on the stand, prosecutors displayed photos of Corey Morgan and Doty to show their gang allegiance.

In one photo, Doty made gestures meant to show disrespect to the Killa Ward faction, Kennedy said. Other photos showed Doty with tattoos that he said showed his affiliation with the Bang Bang Gang/Terror Dome faction.

On cross-examination by Danita Ivory, one of Doty's attorneys, Kennedy acknowledged he had never heard of Doty before helping investigate Tyshawn's slaying.

One of Morgan's attorneys, Thomas Breen, questioned Kennedy about if gang members take orders from higher-ranking members.

The traditional hierarchical leadership structure in gangs doesn't really exist anymore, the officer said.

As far as members taking orders from superiors, Kennedy said, "it's been washed away."

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## Judge gives ex-teacher release on house arrest

Suburban educator charged with sexual abuse of boy, 14

A federal judge agreed Friday to release on house arrest a former suburban teacher charged earlier this week with sexually abusing a 14-year-old boy for months.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Sidney Schenkier ordered Dayna Chidester, 51, held on electronic monitoring at her stepfather's north suburban home and forbade her from contact with the alleged victim or anyone younger than 18 other than her own child.

Prosecutors had sought to hold her without bond, arguing she posed both a danger to the community and a risk to flee given the sexual abuse of a minor charge that carries a mandatory minimum sentence of 15 years in prison if convicted.

Schenkier called the allegations "very sad and very troubling" but cited her lack of criminal record and the willingness of her family members to act as a custodian to help ensure she follows the bond restrictions.

"The nature and circumstances of the offense are serious," the judge said. "Nobody can say otherwise."

Chidester's attorney presented an evaluation performed by a licensed psychologist finding her actions were motivated by a lack of intimacy in her own marriage rather than to fulfill a sexual desire.

The judge also set an unsecured bond at \$250,000 and required that her husband or stepfather co-sign it, meaning they'd be at risk of losing that much money if she violated terms of the house arrest.

Chidester was arrested by FBI agents Wednesday on a charge alleging she had sex with the boy at her home, her car and in suburban hotels between September and December 2018.

A former teacher at Reed-Custer High School in far south suburban Braidwood, Chidester had been free on a \$1 million bond on sex abuse charges filed in Will County in January stemming from the same investigation.

The state charges were dropped Wednesday.

According to the 13-page criminal complaint, authorities in Will County were alerted in December that a Reed-Custer student had been exchanging texts with Chidester about her sexual relationship with the victim, who did not attend the school.

After identifying the alleged victim, Will County investigators searched his cellphone and found nude photos of Chidester as well as more than 9,000 text messages between the two beginning last September, according to the complaint.

In a videotaped interview on Jan. 2, the alleged victim told investigators he had engaged in sex with Chidester "15-20 times" and that both had exchanged sexually explicit photos of themselves, the complaint alleged.

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## Illinois museum first in world to return art to aboriginal groups

The Illinois State Museum will be returning Australian First Nation artifacts in its collection to the aboriginal communities they were acquired from nearly a century ago, according to the museum and the Australian government.

Representatives from the Bardi Jawi and Aranda communities will travel to Springfield next month to pick up 42 artifacts, including boomerangs, shields, spears, and body ornaments, as part of an initiative funded by the Australian government to repatriate overseas artifacts called the Return of Cultural Heritage Project, according to a news release from the museum.

It's the first institution in the world to return artifacts for the project, according to both the museum and a release from the Australian government.

"Cultural artefacts are uniquely connected to the place they are created. That connection to country should be honoured by returning artefacts home," Ken Wyatt, Minister for Indigenous Australians, said in a news release. "Repatriating artefacts is an important process that promotes healing and reconciliation, and ultimately fosters truth-telling about our history."

The artifacts, including dentalium, or tusk shell, necklaces collected from the Bardi Jawi aboriginal community, were collected by University of Chicago linguistic anthropologist Gerhardt Laves when he did fieldwork with Australian aboriginal communities from 1929 to 1931, according to the museum. How Laves acquired the artifacts is unknown, said Brooke Morgan, curator of anthropology

at the museum.

The U. of C. transferred the artifacts to the Illinois State Museum in 1942, according to the release. They were last on display in the museum in 1981.

Morgan said the museum began communicating with the Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies in December to coordinate the repatriation. The institute used Laves' notebooks, which are kept in the institute's archives in Australia, and cross-referenced them with pictures of the artifacts sent by

the museum to confirm which communities the artifacts came from.

Not all artifacts that were collected by Laves will be returned next month as some artifacts have not yet been identified, Morgan said. But the museum is returning all artifacts requested by the Australian institute.

Next month's repatriation won't be the first time the museum has returned artifacts. In 2007, the museum returned a set of Kenyan wood carvings after the museum learned they were stolen.

## Itasca finds site to host meeting on Haymarket

After postponing one meeting and canceling a second, Itasca has finally found a venue big enough to accommodate the crowd eager to weigh in on the Haymarket addiction treatment center aiming to come to the village.

Mayor Jeff Pruyn announced Friday that the gymnasium of Lake Park High School's west campus, 500 W. Bryn Mawr Ave. in Roselle, will host the meeting at 7 p.m. Oct. 16.

He cautioned, though, that it probably will not be a one-night affair.

"Since this application will likely take several Plan Commission hearings, we are working to secure additional dates at the same location," he said in a statement.

The proposal to bring a 200-bed treatment center to the village — by taking over a building that now holds a struggling Holiday Inn — has met fierce resistance. Hundreds of residents last week marched to a Plan Commission meeting with signs opposing the project, forming a crowd so large that the venue, Peacock Middle School, couldn't hold them all.

The meeting was postponed until this coming Wednesday, only to be canceled entirely when village officials couldn't find a nearby venue that could hold a crowd expected to be around 2,000 people.

# COD board reaches deal with faculty union

College president lauds tentative contract as good for students, educators, institution

The College of DuPage reached a tentative four-year contract agreement late Thursday night with the union representing more than 300 full-time faculty members.

The deal must be ratified by union members and approved by the COD board by Oct. 18. A ratification date has not yet been scheduled.

College of DuPage Faculty Association President Shannon Toler, in a statement announcing the settlement, thanked the administration for working with the union to reach a fair deal.

"The agreement puts students first and recognizes teaching matters," Toler said in the statement. "We are hopeful both CODFA and the (board of trustees) will vote in the near future to ratify the agreement."

College President Brian Caputo said both the union and the board secured a good deal of what each wanted, which is what bargaining entails.

"It's a good contract for everyone," he said. "It was just a win."

The agreement will be good for students, faculty and the institution as a whole and gives the everyone involved the capacity to

elevate the college to the next level, he said.

One of those areas, Caputo said, is in the college's push for its Guided Pathways program, which helps students identify a path to college or a career and groups courses so students maximize their time while at COD.

Faculty will become more involved in the process, he said.

In addition, "we gave them a very generous compensation package," the college president said.

The deal includes inflationary increases of 2.4% during the first year of the contract, 2.3% the second year and 2% in the last two years, Caputo said. This is in addition to annual step increases within each of five salary ranges.

In addition, the terms also call for faculty members to provide periodic updates to grades via the college's automated learning management system, giving students a better understanding of their academic progress.

COD Board Chairman Frank Napolitano said the compensation package underscores "the college's commitment to its faculty members who are among the highest paid throughout the country."

The average full-time

professor salary for a nine-month period at College of DuPage is \$125,039. This is based on data from the Chronicle of Higher Education comes from the U.S. Department of Education's Integrated Postsecondary Data System for 2017-2018 academic year.

The administration also says the college's average salary for the rank of professor is the highest reported by any of the 879 comparable institutions and 58% higher than the

national average.

Forty percent COD instructional faculty are at the professor pay range.

The college's Human Resources Department reports 70% of faculty association members earned more than \$110,000 and 47% of CODFA members earned between \$130,000 and \$183,500 based on salary statistics from fall 2018 through summer 2019. The figure includes base salary, overload and summer pay.

Napolitano said the

agreement will help the college's efforts "to attract and retain highly-qualified educators our students and community have come to expect."

"Our goal throughout the negotiations was to give our faculty a fair contract that balanced CODFA's needs with those of our students and community members," he said in the statement.

Contract negotiations began in March, and a federal mediator was brought in when talks

stalled in August. The current contract expired Aug. 14.

Earlier this month, the union voted overwhelmingly to authorize a strike should federal mediation hit an impasse. The strike vote was CODFA's first in nearly 25 years.

A strike was averted when a deal was struck at 10 p.m. in the fifth and final scheduled mediation session Thursday.

"That's the worst; I'm just going to wear mine."

Parents at Lincoln feel frustrated about the school's decision to cease Halloween celebrations for a few reasons, including being left out of the decision-making, a lack of clarity on why the decision was made, and how the school is

planning to move forward.

The heart behind the decision, according to a statement from Michelle Cooney, Lincoln's school principal, was to honor the school's value of equity and to be inclusive of all students within the community, particularly those who do not celebrate the holiday.

"As part of our school and district-wide commitment to equity, we are focused on building community and creating inclusive, welcom-

ing environments for all," said Cooney in a statement via email. "While we recognize that Halloween is a fun tradition for many families, it is not a holiday that is celebrated by all members of our school community and for various reasons. There are also inequities in how we have traditionally observed the holiday as part of our school day. Our goal at Lincoln is to provide space and opportunities for all students to be part of the

community — not to create an environment that may feel exclusive or unwelcoming to any child."

Bajric said she and her husband "feel strongly" about the decision and the reasoning.

"Halloween is a cultural American holiday, and it's being canceled because of religious groups," she said. "We're a Bosnia and Muslim immigrant and refugee family. Halloween, when we moved (to Chicago) from a different country, was one of the greatest things."

Bajric, who came to Chicago from Bosnia in 1995 with her family, went to a Chicago public school for elementary school, and for her, Halloween was "a way to assimilate," she said. Her parents worked two jobs, sometimes gone from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., she recalled, and celebrating Halloween at school was often the only taste she got of the holiday.

"I didn't get to celebrate the other holidays," said Bajric, who remembers Halloween at school being "the best day ever" for her. "Halloween was my way of being like the other kids. Other students from other countries (at Lincoln), they get to feel like the other kids and participate in a cultural holiday."

While Bajric understands being sensitive to different views, cultures and religions, she said, she also feels a responsibility to stand up for those kids who may be in similar situations as she was during her childhood.

"They're trying so hard to make everything inclusive that they're excluding a lot of students," she said. "They're excluding those kids from having a Halloween, or low-income kids whose families work crazy hours."

Information about the decision was sent to parents during the 2018-2019 school year, according to the statement from Cooney, informing parents that last school year would be the final Halloween celebration taking place during the instructional day.

"We did this a year in advance to allow our community time and space to process this change," part of the statement said. "We acknowledge that this might feel like a loss to some."

Even with advance notice, some parents still feel the news is fresh.

Mark Gruber, a dad of three in first, third, and fifth grades at Lincoln, has been a room parent for five years and says he missed the communication. "It's been a big surprise this year," he said.

Gruber says the principal and administration are "very good and very kid-focused," yet he "couldn't

disagree more" with the staff's decision being rooted in equity purposes.

"I don't think that's a good reason, that's not a way society works," he said. "If one kid is offended, we want to try to include that kid and come with solutions, but to say we need to change our behavior in a significant way over a Halloween celebration, it's hard to take."

A lot of parents were in the dark about the decision, according to both Bajric and Gruber, and they each wished parents would have been more involved to help come up with other solutions.

"If you want to be inclusive," Gruber began, "have a conversation and get input from all members of the community. It's very hard in public school, but it was just decided and that's why people are so upset — it was just decided. Bring out ideas and discussion about how can we move forward that tries to meet as many needs as possible, not change (our behaviors and traditions) for the views of a few people. That's not the way society works."

A "Principal's Coffee" was held Thursday morning to give parents a chance to talk about ideas for new traditions connected to Halloween. It became a broader conversation, said Jenna Porter, Lincoln's PTA president, about "how we're responsible for our own language."

"Ms. Cooney shared a lot about what was her agenda for the year, how they're doing community building, how the PTAs involved in community building," said Porter.

There is a lot of conscious work happening at a district level, and within the school, Porter said, to combat some of the stereotypes and views people have of each other's races. "There's all this work being done to take five steps forward," she said. "That was kind of the message today."

In lieu of a Halloween party, the students will have a "fall celebration" on Nov. 1.

Some school districts throughout Chicagoland have ended special events related to Halloween.

St. Charles Community Unit School District 303 has lessened Halloween celebrations in recent years, said spokeswoman Carol Smith, due to a variety of reasons, including an awareness of students with severe food allergies and differences in cultural beliefs. Still, many of the elementary schools in the district do have Halloween parties at the end of the day, and while some schools do not allow costumes, the ones that do have restrictions, said Smith.

In Elgin-based School

District U-46, some of the elementary schools do not plan special events around Halloween since some students don't mark the day, and the administration wants to be inclusive of all students, said Mary Fergus, director of school and community relations.

"It feels unfair to everyone," said Bajric about the cancellation of the full Halloween activities at Lincoln. She's fearful of what the schools will cancel next, she said, and wonders if the district is headed in the direction of no holidays to be celebrated at school altogether.

Lincoln's choice to end Halloween-related activities was not a district decision, nor is there a district policy on the celebration of Halloween, said Melissa Messinger, director of communications for the Evanston/Skokie School District 65. "A number of our schools have moved away from traditional Halloween celebrations in recent years and a few more are implementing this year," she said.

The district leadership team released a similar statement to Lincoln's in support of its schools: "As part of our school and district-wide commitment to equity, we are focused on building community and creating inclusive, welcoming environments for all. While we recognize that Halloween is a fun tradition for many, it is not a holiday that is celebrated by everyone for various reasons and we want to honor that. We are also aware of the range of inequities that are embedded in Halloween celebrations that take place as part of the school day and the unintended negative impact that it can have on students, families, and staff. As a result, we support our schools that are moving away from Halloween celebrations that include costumes and similar traditions."

"When you're a young kid and from a different country," said Bajric, "you want to take part to fit in with the class — that's what it was for me at least. I'm afraid they're going to take away the little things where kids will feel accepted."

Gruber wonders what message the cancellation is sending to the children. While he thinks the community should be respectful of differences, he said, he doesn't think those differences means one group is obligated to change its behavior.

"To take away (Halloween) in the name of a few people who don't celebrate, this is completely wrong," he said.

### Feds crack Medicare gene test fraud ring

35 charged in \$2B nationwide scam targeting seniors

WASHINGTON — Federal agents took down an alleged Medicare scam Friday that exploited seniors' curiosity about genetic medicine by enticing them to get their cheeks swabbed for unneeded DNA tests. Medicare was billed \$2.1 billion.

Dubbed "Operation Double Helix," the crackdown targeted telemedicine companies, doctors and labs, in a joint effort by the Justice Department, the FBI, U.S. attorneys' offices, and the Health and Human Services inspector general. Thirty-five people were charged around the country.

The alleged fraud flourished at a time when many people are getting DNA tests to trace their family heritage.

Fraudsters preyed on people's fears of harboring genetic markers for cancer. However, genetic testing is not routinely used to screen for cancer.

"A decade ago, it would have given Medicare beneficiaries pause if someone wanted to get a swab from their cheek of their saliva," said Shimon Richmond, who heads the inspector general's investigative division. "Today people know and recognize what (genetic testing) is, and they think 'I can get that done, and I can get it done for free and find out if I have health issues that I need to address.'"

It's a bad decision, Richmond said. Not only does it put the patient's Medicare ID in the hands of fraudsters who can then keep reselling it for illicit purposes, but it can potentially compromise unique details of an individual's make-up.

Another downside: Medicare might deny future coverage for genetic testing when it's really needed, since the patient's record would show such an analysis was already done. Patients should only have genetic testing if their own doctor orders it, officials

said. The alleged scheme worked like this: Officials said a telemarketing or in-person "recruiter" would convince a Medicare enrollee to take a genetic test, assuring them that the program would pay the full cost. The patient would provide their Medicare information. A doctor in league with the fraudsters would approve the test, and collect a kickback from the recruiter company. A lab participating in the scheme would run the test, bill Medicare, and share pay-

ments collected from the government with the recruiter.

Bills to Medicare connected with the scam typically ranged from \$7,000 to \$12,000, Richmond said, with some much higher. In many cases the patient never got a report back, or the results provided were incomprehensible.

There was no single organization behind the fraud. Friday's operation targeted defendants in Florida, Georgia, Louisiana and Texas, the Justice Department said. Nine doctors

were among those charged. Others included owners of telemedicine companies and testing labs.

Medicare enrollee Linda Morris of Parker City, Indiana, said she was roped in at a conference on aging well. The retired high school teacher got her cheek swabbed by one of the many health vendors at the event.

"Their ploy was, 'Get a mouth swab and we can analyze how well your system synthesizes the drugs you are taking,'" she said. "It never crossed my mind there was anything wrong

with this."

Then her Medicare statements started coming in, showing charges as high as \$33,000. The program paid almost \$10,000.

Morris said she was never billed, and was never sent results. When she looked up the address for the test vendor it was "a house on a back road."

"I feel stupid, and in the meantime, I'm furious," Morris said. Health fairs, church events, and senior centers are magnets for the fraudsters, officials said.

Dennie Krivokapich of Farmington, New Mexico, said he almost sent in his cheek swab following a telemarketing pitch. The retired accountant is a three-time cancer survivor and concerned about his future risk. The company sent him a kit, but the paperwork that came with it made him suspicious.

"The physician who requested it was not my physician," said Krivokapich. The marketing company kept calling him, until he blocked the number.

Government-backed anti-fraud organizations known as the Senior Medicare Patrol have been trying to spread the word about genetic testing scams. Retired federal investigator Jennifer Trussell, a consultant to the groups, said fear of cancer is the scam artists' most effective tool. "These are bad actors trying to take advantage of good medicine," she said.

Experts say part of the problem is that Medicare is required to pay medical bills promptly, which means money often goes out before potential frauds get flagged. Investigators call that "pay and chase."

#### Iran frees UK-flagged tanker; Rouhani hints at talks with US

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran on Friday released a British-flagged oil tanker it had seized in July, while the country's president, returning from an annual United Nations meeting, said he had been told the United States had offered to lift sanctions if Tehran returned to the negotiating table over its nuclear program.

The Stena Impero left on Friday morning, heading to Dubai where its crew would disembark,

the vessel's Swedish-based ship-owning company Stena Bulk said. Iran seized the tanker July 19 in the Strait of Hormuz.

Iranian President Hassan Rouhani, upon returning to Tehran, said the leaders of Germany, France and Britain had told him the U.S. was prepared to lift the sanctions if Iran agreed to negotiations on the nuclear deal. But he added the sanctions must be lifted before talks could begin.

#### Protesters in Haiti burn buildings in push to oust leader

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — Thousands of protesters seeking to oust President Jovenel Moïse attacked businesses and government buildings across Haiti on Friday, creating chaos on the streets after a weeks-long shutdown of vital services that has damaged the country's ailing economy and shaken the president's already tenuous position.

In the capital, Port-au-Prince, hundreds of oppo-

sition supporters ransacked a police station used by a special tactical unit, hauling out office furniture and even Kevlar vests and ammunition in the city shantytown of Cite Soleil. An Avis car rental office and Western Union branch were also attacked and burned.

Several houses were burned, and groups of protesters hurled rocks at police, who responded with tear gas.

#### Dem senator: NRA acted as Russian 'asset' in run-up to 2016

WASHINGTON — A Democratic senator charges in a new report that the National Rifle Association acted as a "foreign asset" for Russia in the run-up to the 2016 election, and that NRA insiders provided access to the American political system to advance personal business interests.

The report by Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., says NRA leaders may have violated tax laws banning use of

organization resources for personal benefit.

The report, based on an 18-month investigation, found that NRA leaders "engaged in a years-long effort to facilitate the U.S.-based activities" of Russian nationals Alexander Torshin and Maria Butina, who is serving 18 months in prison after admitting she covertly gathered intelligence on the NRA at the direction of Torshin, a former Russian lawmaker.

#### Greta: Grown-ups mock kids because world view threatened

TORONTO — Swedish teenager Greta Thunberg said Friday she doesn't understand why grown-ups and world leaders would mock children and teens for communicating and acting on science, responding to attacks on her campaign as students conducted a second wave of global protests demanding action on climate change.

When asked about President Donald Trump and others who have mocked her, the 16-year-old activist said they likely feel their world view and interests are being threatened by climate activism.

"We've become too loud for people to handle so people want to silence us," she said at a rally in Montreal after meeting Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau. "We should also take that as a compliment."

The youth climate movement has drawn criticism from some who accuse the students of overreacting and say they would be better off going to school. In an apparent sarcastic jibe at Thunberg this week, Trump tweeted: "She seems like a very happy young girl looking forward to a bright and wonderful future. So nice

to see!"

Thunberg told the crowd in Montreal that "We will do everything in our power to stop this crisis from getting worse even if that means skipping school or work. The people have spoken. And we will continue to speak until our leaders listen and act."

Her comments came as fears about the impact of global warming on younger generations drew protests in Germany, India, Spain, Portugal, Sweden and the Netherlands, a week after hundreds of thousands rallied worldwide before the U.N. summit.

#### Hundreds freed from torture building in Nigeria

LAGOS, Nigeria — Hundreds of boys and men have been rescued from a building in northern Nigeria where they had been beaten, starved, sexually assaulted and chained, police said Friday.

Visible marks on their bodies showed that some had been tortured, a police

spokesman in Kaduna State said as shocked authorities tried to track down the families of what appeared to be some 400 victims.

Police carried out the rescue on Thursday following a tip. It was not immediately clear what led to police being contacted, or how such alleged abuses

managed to go unnoticed.

The building's owner told police the children had been brought by their families to learn the Quran or because they had problems such as drug addiction. The owner and six others who were said to be teachers have been arrested, the police spokesman said.

#### Judge blocks indefinite custody of migrants' kids

WASHINGTON — A federal judge in Los Angeles has blocked the Trump administration from activating new regulations that would have dramatically expanded its ability to detain migrant children with their parents for indefinite periods of time, dealing a blow to the president's efforts to tamp down unauthorized border crossings.

U.S. District Judge Dolly Gee issued the permanent injunction Friday, hours after hearing arguments from the Justice Department and advocates for immigrants in a long-running federal case in the Central District of California.

Justice Department lawyers had urged Gee to allow the Trump administration to withdraw from the Flores Settlement Agreement, a 1997 consent decree that sets a 20-day limit for detaining migrant children in some shelters.

**Stopgap:** President Donald Trump has signed a temporary government-wide funding bill that staves off the risk of a government shutdown through Nov. 21.

The measure signed Friday buys additional time for lawmakers to work to unclog a \$1.4 trillion bundle of yearly spending bills that is hung up amid fights over Trump's border wall and abortion. Those measures face a variety of obstacles, and it's not clear whether Congress will pass them.

The bill had passed the Senate by an 82-15 vote. Democrats blocked Senate Republicans from advancing an almost \$700 billion defense measure, a move designed to leverage broader negotiations on domestic programs.

# A poignant holiday for Pa. community scarred by massacre

There will be some differences — and some constants — as the New Light congregation observes Rosh Hashana, the Jewish New Year, for the first time since three of its members were among 11 Jews killed by a gunman nearly a year ago at a Pittsburgh synagogue.

The man who last year blew New Light's shofar, the ram's horn trumpet traditionally sounded to welcome the High Holy Days, was among those killed. Richard Gottfried, 65, a dentist nearing retirement, was one of the congregation's mainstays in reading the haftara, a biblical passage that follows the Torah reading.

In Gottfried's place, the shofar will be blown this year by the congregation's rabbi, Jonathan Perlman. And the venue for the services will not be the Tree of Life synagogue, the site of the massacre. All three congregations that shared space there have been worshipping at neighboring synagogues since the attack Oct. 27, 2018.

However, Perlman's wife, writer Beth Kissileff, said the congregation plans no changes in the substance of its services over the two-day holiday that starts Sunday evening.

"I feel conducting Rosh Hashana prayers as we have in the past is a form of spiritual resistance," Kissileff said. "Part of our defiance of what the shooter was trying to do is to conduct our religious lives with as much normalcy as possible."

A week ago, looking ahead to the New Year holiday, Kissileff wrote a first-person article for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency describing how her congregation was coping.

Referring to the shofar, she said the horn's sounds are intended to resemble wailing.

"That won't be hard; there is plenty to wail about this year," she wrote. "We need to hear this wailing, and be induced to wail ourselves, so that we can change."

She also noted that many members of the congregation, which numbers about 100 families, deepened engagement in their faith and

their community over the past year by attending services more regularly, learning or relearning the skills needed to serve as cantors, or making an effort to learn Hebrew.

As Rosh Hashana arrives, Kissileff wrote, "All American Jews, shocked to our core at the resurgence of violent anti-Semitism here — a country to which our ancestors immigrated as a haven from such things in the rest of the world — will hear the shofar as a wail and scream."

"However, this deep trauma we have experienced also means we can and need to think about how as a community we can attempt to work through the trauma to achieve meaningful growth," she added. "It is not uncomplicated, but Rosh Hashana is

coming, and we all have the opportunity to begin again — however difficult."

She suggested that surviving members of the congregation could honor those who were killed by doing good deeds in their name. She cited slain congregation member Melvin Wax as a role model, recalling his efforts to organize hurricane relief and encourage people to register to vote.

"Those of us who knew the people killed, we just want to honor their memories by continuing to value the things they valued and connect to the traditions the way they did," she said.

Leaders of Tree of Life's three congregations have been planning for commemorations Oct. 27 to mark the passage of one year since the massacre.

# Ex-officer: I wish neighbor killed me

DALLAS — A former Dallas police officer testified Friday about the night she killed an accountant who lived in the apartment right above her, telling jurors that she has to live with the guilt every day and that she wished their roles were reversed.

Amber Guyger, who is charged with murder, tearfully said she was sorry about killing Botham Jean, 26, in September 2018, explaining that she mistook his fourth-floor apartment for her own right.

"I hate that I have to live with this every single day of my life and I ask God for forgiveness, and I hate myself every single day," Guyger, 31, told the packed courtroom.

She said she wished "he was the one with the gun" and had killed her. "I never wanted to take an innocent person's life. And I'm so sorry. This is not about hate. It's about being scared that night," she said.

Guyger testified that upon returning home in uniform after a long shift, she put her key into what she thought was her door lock and the door opened.

Fearing it was a break-in, Guyger said she drew her service weapon and stepped inside to find a silhouetted figure standing in the dark.

"Let me see your hands! Let me see your hands," she said she told the man, but she said she couldn't see his hands and he began coming toward her at a "fast-paced" walk.

Guyger said he yelled, "Hey! Hey! Hey!" right

before she opened fire.

"I was scared he was going to kill me," she said under questioning by her lawyers on the trial's fifth day.

When prosecutors asked why she didn't back away and radio for help once she suspected a break-in, Guyger said that entering the apartment "was the only option that went through my head."

The September 2018 shooting attracted widespread attention nationally because of the strange circumstances and because it was one in a string of shootings of unarmed black men by white police officers.

Prosecutors have questioned how Guyger could have missed numerous signs she was in the wrong place and suggested she was distracted by sexually explicit phone messages with her police partner.

Prosecutors also say Jean was no threat to Guyger, noting that he was in his living room eating a bowl of ice cream when she entered his apartment.

# Recalling Hugo, the 1st modern US hurricane in 1989

COLUMBIA, S.C. — From evacuating hundreds of thousands of people from the coast to live TV coverage in the shrieking wind and rain, 1989's Hurricane Hugo might have been the first U.S. storm of the modern age.

When it slammed into South Carolina just minutes before midnight on Sept. 21, 1989, Hugo's 135 mph winds made it the strongest storm to hit the U.S. in 20 years and its \$9.5 billion of damage made it the costliest storm in the nation's history.

The 20-foot wall of water that surged inland just north of where the eye made landfall in Charleston is still an Atlantic Coast record.

Hugo has been surpassed over the past 30 years both in strength and damage by other hurricanes — from Andrew to Katrina to Harvey and Michael.

But the Category 4 hurricane has few peers, especially in South Carolina where it gouged a wide path of damage from expensive beachfront homes on the Isle of Palms to the thousands of trees toppled in Charlotte, North Carolina.

"I'll never forget the look on the governor's face when he got off the phone with the Hurricane Center and they said it wasn't changing course and was just getting stronger," said Warren Tompkins, chief of staff for Gov. Carroll Campbell, who died in 2005.

"His face was as white as a sheet. He said 'It might go to Cat 5 and it's going to hit the whole coast and we are going to be wiped out. We probably ought to pray,'" Tompkins said.

Hugo had a history before South Carolina. The storm crippled and nearly crashed a Hurricane Hunter plane as a Category 5 east of the Caribbean. It destroyed 85% of the buildings on St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands and killed 12 people and did \$1 billion in damage to Puerto Rico.

Those images were beamed back to South Car-

olina, where the fear of a growing storm in the warm Gulf Stream waters off the coast led Gov. Campbell to an unprecedented decision. Instead of allowing local beach governments to do their own evacuations, he issued a statewide evacuation order.

People had 24 hours or less to evacuate because Hugo was closing in fast. Nearly 250,000 people left. Campbell briefly reversed all lanes of Interstate 26 out of Charleston when it appeared people would be caught on the highway in the storm.

Thirteen people in South Carolina died in the storm. But even though the ocean washed completely over Isle of Palms — almost over the second story of some buildings — none of the barrier island's 3,700 residents were killed. They had nearly all left.

"We lost more people after the storm than during the storm," former State Law Enforcement Division Chief Robert Stewart said. "Fires, electrocutions, trying to cut down trees."

Twenty-two people died cleaning up after Hugo in South Carolina.

The extent of the destruction led Campbell to do something else modern governors have followed after hurricanes. He begged for federal assistance and to get the military involved in cleaning up and restoring power.

"Tensions subside as the lights go on. You could see it. Things would calm down a little when people had power," Tompkins said.

## Fiat Chrysler to pay fine for overstating sales

DETROIT — Fiat Chrysler is paying \$40 million to settle with U.S. securities regulators who say the automaker misled investors by overstating its monthly sales numbers over a five-year period.

The Italian-American company inflated sales by paying dealers to report fake numbers from 2012 to 2016, the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission alleged in a complaint.

Fiat Chrysler agreed to pay the civil penalty and to stop violating anti-fraud, reporting and internal accounting control regulations, the SEC said Friday in a statement. The automaker did not admit or deny the agency's allegations, the

statement said.

"This case underscores the need for companies to truthfully disclose their key performance indicators," Antonia Chion, associate director in the SEC's Enforcement Division, said in the statement. She noted that the new vehicle sales figures give investors insight into

the demand for an automaker's products, a key to assessing the company's performance.

Fiat Chrysler said it has reviewed and refined its sales reporting procedures. It said the payment will not have a large impact on its financial statements. The agency said the au-

tomaker boasted about a streak of year-over-year sales increases into 2016, when the streak was broken in September of 2013.

When the company disclosed the sales scheme in 2016, it said that it had a "reserve" stock of cars that had been shipped to big fleet buyers such as rental car companies but not recorded as sales.

The SEC said employees called this database of actual but unreported sales the "cookie jar." The company dipped into those sales to stop the streak from ending, or when it would have missed other sales targets.

Fiat Chrysler said it now records sales as soon as vehicles are shipped to customers. It has also taken steps to ensure that a sale is immediately subtracted

from its books when it finds out the deal was scuttled because the buyer backed out or couldn't get financing.

The SEC probe is another in a long string of legal troubles for Fiat Chrysler. It also faces federal investigations into illegal payments to union officials through a training center, and a criminal probe into allegations that its diesel-powered trucks were programmed to cheat on emissions tests. The company has denied cheating, but federal prosecutors charged an engineer earlier this week and said he conspired with others.

In June, Fiat Chrysler's U.S. sales chief sued the company alleging that it withheld 90% of his pay package because he testified in the SEC's inquiry into its sales reporting.

Reid Bigland alleged that Fiat Chrysler violated Michigan's Whistleblower Protection Act, retaliating against him because of his testimony.

Bigland, who is still with the company, alleged in his lawsuit said that he inherited the sales reporting system when he took over the top sales job in 2011. When a dealer sued the company over the reporting system in 2016, Fiat Chrysler reported problems to the SEC, according to the documents.

The company, in its motion to transfer the case to federal courts, tried to cast doubt on Bigland's whistleblower claims. It said Bigland acknowledges that Fiat Chrysler reported the problems itself and that he didn't testify voluntarily before the commission.

## Car2Go ending rental car pilot by the end of the year

Car2Go, a rental car company that was the target of multiple thefts this past spring, said it will pull out of Chicago on Dec. 31.

Car2Go started its carshare pilot in Chicago in July 2018 and has 400 cars here, mostly on the North Side. The service allows its rental cars to be picked up in one part of a city and dropped off in another, with members unlocking the cars using a mobile app.

It had to temporarily suspend service this past spring because of thefts of multiple Mercedes-Benz cars, which resulted in charges against 21 people. Police said that scammers

used the Car2Go app to steal cars, and as many as 22 luxury vehicles were recovered.

A spokesman for the company said the theft incident had nothing to do with the decision to pull out of the city. Chicago proved to be a complex market and required more of an investment than it was able to make, Kendell Kelton Car2Go's North American communications manager, said in an email. The company boasted in October 2018 that it had more than 10,000 members in the city.

"While we still believe that Chicago is well-suited for free-floating carshare, we underestimated what was necessary for our busi-

ness to grow in this market at this time," Kelton said.

Car2Go is also pulling out of Calgary, Portland, Denver and Austin, Kelton said. It will continue to operate in New York City, Washington, D.C., Montreal, Vancouver and Seattle. Kelton said those cities "present the clearest path to free-floating carshare success."

Car2Go differed from other car rental companies in that cars could be parked anywhere within an approved zone, instead of being returned to a designated parking location. About half of Car2Go's cars in Chicago are two-passenger smart cars while the other half are Mercedes-

Benz sedans and SUVs.

The service operates in an area roughly bounded by Foster Avenue on the north, Homan and Kimball avenues on the west and Cermak Road on the south. Portions of Lakeview and Lincoln Park are not in the program because aldermen were concerned about parking.

Kelton said parking issues did not play into the decision to leave Chicago.

Kamron Moore, 41, a Car2Go member from Lincoln Square, said he was "absolutely" going to miss the service, especially since Car2Go is ending operations at a time of year when winter weather makes it harder to bike.

He said the car-sharing company Zipcar is not a good option for him, because there aren't any cars nearby. "I might have to take a look at buying a car," Moore said.

## At restaurants, a threat to tipping?

A recent Chicago Tribune article on tipping and the minimum wage misses the mark. ("Tipping your servers 15-20% is standard. But what if Chicago requires they get paid full minimum wage?" Sept. 23, 2019.)

I've worked in the full service restaurant industry for 34 years — first in Indianapolis and now in Seattle. Being a server is a "something new every day" kind of job, both challenging and rewarding. The industry is known for its schedule flexible and income potential — you get back what you put in. As a server, you're guaranteed minimum wage, but experience and work ethic can bring you much more in the way of tips. In my own personal experience, I have made anywhere between \$25 to \$50 an hour, even in states like Indiana where the tipped minimum wage is lower.

My greatest hardship in the industry came after my current home of Seattle adopted the policy that Chicago is now considering — a \$15 minimum wage and no tip credit. My employer was forced to transition to a no-tipping model, which reduced my take-home pay considerably. I still haven't recovered, but I'm one of the lucky ones; other restaurants in town have closed entirely. Chicago should learn from Seattle's negative experience rather than try to emulate it.

the value of boundaries

In Chicago restaurants  
and hotels, what's  
the tipping point?

From City Hall, running a restaurant may look simple: Make good food, charge reasonable prices, get good Yelp reviews and then rake in the profits. From the office behind the kitchen, though, it doesn't look so easy — and lawmakers in Chicago and Springfield are only making it tougher.

**Anyone doing business in the city** has to deal with high sales and property taxes, heavy regulation and even corruption. A 2019 national survey of small business owners gave Illinois an F for licensing obligations and a D for regulations. On top of these headaches, the state has acted to ramp up the minimum wage from \$8.25 an hour to \$15 an hour in 2025. The Chicago City Council recently passed an ordinance placing needlessly strict requirements on how companies schedule their employees' hours.

Then there is the latest proposal in the City Council, which would require employers to pay tipped workers the same minimum as other workers. Currently, Chicago's minimum for tipped employees is \$6.40 an hour, compared with the \$13 regular minimum in the city. The tipping proposal is part of a broader proposal to raise

the city's minimum wage to \$15 by 2021.

The idea behind the two-tiered formula is that tipped employees will earn much if not most of their earning from gratuities, which can be considerable and which serve as an incentive for cheerful, efficient service. Some bartenders and servers make hundreds of dollars a night in tips.

Under this system, Illinois leads the nation in the percentage of customers who tip and ranks near the top in the generosity of tips. If the city were to require the full minimum wage for these employees, employer costs would rise, and customers would most likely reduce their tips, or stop them entirely, particularly if establishments add a mandatory service charge to bills.

Facing much higher payroll expenses, affected restaurants and hotels would face pressure to raise prices and reduce staff, perhaps by automating tasks such as ordering or by cutting back on hotel room service. Servers who prefer the status quo would be deprived of an option they value, as well as some of the money they currently earn. Some servers, of course, would make more money — but most likely, some of those in line to get a

boost would lose their jobs.

**A robust job market is the best way to foster** the economic interests of servers and other workers. It expands opportunities and pushes up wages. In that realm, unfortunately, Illinois is underperforming.

Since the worst days of the Great Recession, the total number of jobs in the United States has risen by 20%. But Illinois has lagged far behind, with just a 6% increase. The populations of both Chicago and Illinois have been steadily declining, partly because job seekers find more abundant opportunities elsewhere.

A higher minimum wage for tipped workers would give some of them a raise and some of them a pay cut. It would make it even harder for the businesses that employ them to bring in enough money to keep their doors open.

**Given the prospect of even higher taxes in a city and state** with terrible debts and pension obligations, employers already ask whether it makes sense to start a business in the city or state, or to keep an existing one where it is. This change would be one more reason to think the answer is no.

President Trump deserves to be impeached. But the prospect terrifies me, and it should terrify you, too. ...

# Both bold and intimate

## Muti launches epic Beethoven symphonies cycle before a packed Orchestra Hall

The world will be celebrating Beethoven's 250th birthday next year, but Chicago got started on Thursday night.

Before a large audience in Orchestra Hall, with even the terrace seating behind the stage packed, Chicago Symphony Orchestra music director Riccardo Muti launched the ensemble's season-long cycle of the complete Beethoven symphonies. The project will be released on recordings, marking Muti's third such traversal, after versions with the La Scala and Philadelphia orchestras. Because Muti is now 78, this likely will be his last recorded thoughts on a monument of the symphonic repertoire.

But listening to Muti conduct the CSO in Beethoven's Symphonies Nos. 1 and 3 ("Eroica"), you realized that this wasn't about Muti. For his performance of these works, plus Beethoven's "Consecration of the House" Overture, was straightforward and utterly faithful to the scores — and to the stylistic traditions they represent. Muti made

emotional and intellectual impact, in other words, thoroughly within the framework of Beethoven's writing, not by distending it to serve his own expressive needs.

That's not a fashionable approach in our era of willful maestros, but it yielded moving performances, nowhere more than in the funeral march movement of the "Eroica." This orchestral essay served as the evening's anchor and indicated how deeply Muti and this orchestra can probe Beethoven's profundities.

No sooner did Muti establish a slow but stately tempo than we heard principal oboe William Welter's plaintive lines piercing the orchestral fabric. The depth of orchestral tone that followed and the rhetorical ardor that Muti drew from the ensemble affirmed the distinct chemistry that conductor and instrumentalists have achieved as they proceed into their 10th season together.

Certain portions of this movement amounted to an outcry, yet without distortions of tempo or dynamics. As the movement progressed, the interpretation took on an

epic scale, the basses growling, the upper strings magisterial in fugal passages. Tragedy both stated and implied radiated from the movement's final pages, which also held moments of whispered intimacy.

Intense lyricism and sweeping gestures defined Muti's treatment of the opening movement, cast in a moderate tempo that emphasized grandeur over haste. The controlled orchestral virtuosity of the scherzo and the robust, life-affirming qualities of the finale represented a dramatic resolution of all that had come before. Above all, this was a carefully paced "Eroica," culminating with a climax that left no doubt we had come to the apex of a long and rigorous journey.

With its opening chords, Beethoven's Symphony No. 1 points to a new direction in orchestral writing, its harmonic instability and rhythmic dynamism foreshadowing the composer's innovations yet to come. Muti's performance of the opening movement emphasized pristine textures, meticulous articulation and gentle lyricism. The strings sang sweetly in the second movement, and the conductor underscored the dance motifs of the minuet. A sense of joy and exuberance — albeit within the parameters of early Beethoven style

— drove the finale, the entire movement delivered with a smile.

Muti opened the program with Beethoven's "Consecration of the House" Overture, which served as a regal curtain-raiser for the season's entire Beethoven cycle.

With images of Beethoven's ferocious scowl plastered across the Orchestra Hall lobby, it was clear whose music and never-say-die sensibility would dominate the season ahead.

Bring it on.

# On black voices, or lack thereof, on the football field

Loy A. Webb, a Chicago playwright of notable talent and an attorney who now writes for television, made a big splash in Chicago and New York with "The Light," a play that starts out as a sultry rom-com, only to put its central African American couple through the wringer that is contemporary America, a place and time haunted by its past.

Her next premiere — a small show taking place right now in a basement in Berwyn at North Berwyn Park District's relentlessly ambitious 16th Street Theater — is about college football. So in the first few minutes, you think that Webb has moved in an entirely new direction.

But that's not true. "His Shadow," which is ably directed by Wardell Julius Clark, centers for 90 minutes on a college-football

recruit known as Teeny (Charles Andrew Gardner), a capable if diminutive player who nonetheless has to live in the shadow of his famous older brother, "Juice," a huge star at an unnamed gridiron powerhouse school. Teeny has ended up with a scholarship in a place everyone in the show calls "Middle of Nowhere, USA," but he at least has been made quarterback. So for much of the play, you think you are watching a family drama about a younger sibling finding his own path.

It does not work out that way. A great truck is roaring down the American freeway with Teeny in its flashing headlights.

Plays about sports are notoriously difficult to stage — especially about football, an epic game that needs people, equipment and space. Clark and Webb wisely go in the exact opposite direction, telling this story with only three

characters. Teeny stays Teeny throughout, but the actors Marcus D. Moore and Anna Dauzvardis play all the other characters, from a coach to a teammate to a fellow student. The space, intriguingly designed by Sydney Lynne, is like a football field in miniature: the result is pretty cool in that Clark and Lynne have come up with a visualization of how everything starts to close in on a character who wants most to run free, ideally into the end zone. Remarkably, you actually believe

that football would be going on here if you peeled back all of these walls and screens, which is exactly how Webb has written Teeny to feel.

Much of that is due to the empathetic Gardner, an underrated actor in Chicago capable of great vulnerability but also the kind of driving force that this play needs. He comes up with a crucially excellent performance at the core of a richly performed play.

With its moral lessons, political

commitment and focus on fraternal angst, "His Shadow" strikes me an ideal play for young people, the kind of work that could and should tour to schools, especially given the simplicity of this staging. As with "The Light," Webb has homed in on something in the news — Colin Kaepernick's battles with the National Football League obviously influenced the writing. But she's really writing here about how black athletes so often are not given a voice, nor the space and time to breathe and find themselves within what's often a physical sacrifice of life-altering proportion. And the play is arguing this is not a problem confined to the NFL: colleges desperate to win are complicit.


If you have a student athlete at home, as do I, this will get them thinking and talking about how to navigate their future, or better protect their compatriots.



Unfortunately, we do not receive the photo from the younger daughter-in-law, so I have to text my son and ask him for the pictures, which we eventually receive.

I pay when we go out together, but I never hear a thanks from her, the grandchildren or our son.

We love being with them and don't want to hinder our relationships. We see them often and have helped them financially, with no thanks.

How can we cope with this?

**Dear Hurt:** Your son, his wife and children don't seem to be behaving up to your standard, and it is up to you to tell them.

The issue with the back-to-school photo is petty. I assume this has become a stand-in for how disrespected you feel in other ways.

You seem to lay your disappointment at the feet of your daughter-in-law, and yet your son is a member of this family — and you raised him. Surely he shoulders some responsibility for his family's poor manners.

If you want these family members to behave differently, then you should respectfully ask them to. You can say, "We love you all but feel unappreciated. We feel you aren't grateful for our generosity because you never express it. We'd appreciate a 'thank you' when we extend ourselves to you and the kids ... when we pick up the check, send gifts and support you financially. Being thanked would mean a lot to us."

And then, depending on how they respond, YOU could choose to behave differently. If you don't want to finance their various ventures because of their perennial lack of gratitude, then stop. If their behavior doesn't change and you choose to continue, then do so in a spirit of generosity, where the generosity itself is its own reward. If you do this, then you don't get to complain about their ingratitude.

**Dear Amy:** I am one of those people who is always working on ways to improve myself. I will start a fitness routine, a healthy eating routine, or a "sort and tidy" routine, but will give up fairly quickly.

I'm wondering if you have any ideas for how to get new routines to stick.

**Dear Bard:** Like you, I seem to have a pattern of trying new routines and — looking on the bright side

— you have to imagine that your health and life might be worse if you didn't make these ongoing efforts.

I think the answer is to develop routines that are easier to stick to than these larger-scale ideas. I recently read a book called "Atomic Habits: An Easy & Proven Way to Build Good Habits & Break Bad Ones" (2018, Avery), whose author, James Clear, made at least one suggestion that stuck with me. He calls it "habit stacking." You take one positive (or neutral) habit you already have — like having a cup of coffee in the morning — and you "stack" a new habit on top of it. So after you have your coffee, you wipe a kitchen counter (or do one pushup). Developing new small habits and unlocking smaller achievements will lead to more. As the author points out, the power of "compounding" will make your mini improvements major over time.

**Dear Amy:** "Surprised" took issue with your view on who should pay the bill: older parents or their adult children.

Amy, my husband and I have financial problems and have made some bad choices. We are doing our best, but no, we cannot pay for our older parents when we go out.

## Goldblum is a traveling doctor on a grisly mission

The antithesis of any notion of cinema as an uplifting art, Rick Alverson's movies are psychic sores without Band-Aids: open wounds left to fester and disconcert, but which nonetheless sporadically possess a fascination as showcases for the willful neglect of what makes us human. Across a trio of unsettling indies recently — his off-putting odysseys into performative irreverence "The Comedy" (2012) and "Entertainment" (2015), and now the grimly anti-nostalgic period drama "The Mountain" — Alverson has carved out a bleak niche of feel-bad Americana.

"The Mountain," in particular, which stars Jeff Goldblum and Tye Sheridan, feels expressly made for our what's-happening age in which the country is

riven by those who see a glorious past worth reliving, and those who wonder if we can ever move forward with our sanity intact. To which Alverson and co-writers Dustin Guy Defa and Colm O'Leary have responded with a mid 20th century-set downer centered on a traveling lobotomist, based on a real figure at the time. Dr. Wallace "Wally" Fiennes (Goldblum) is a medical professional whose psycho-surgical calling is to meet the problem of human frailty with an ice pick to the brain through the eye, and expect a pat on the back in return for his good works. Because, you know, the '50s.

Our way into the story, however, is through a young ice rink worker named Andy (Sheridan) who al-

ready looks detached from life, with his mother having been institutionalized, and his skating teacher dad (Udo Kier) an impassively domineering presence. When Andy's path crosses with Wally, who obliquely introduces himself as one of his mother's physicians (see previous paragraph), he displays a nurturing vibe toward Andy. Soon, Andy has accepted a job from the doctor touring asylums with him and taking photographs of his procedure, which Alverson spares us from watching (thank goodness) but which haunts nonetheless when we see the aftermath. Fiennes says he's merely helping return patients to "an innocuous state." Unsurprisingly, given the time, most of those being lobotomized are women.

But the pair's travels also reveal that Wally's technique is becoming less and less popular, which starts to

wear on the eccentric doctor's pride. When he accepts a private invitation by a peculiar, gruff Frenchman (Denis Lavant) to perform a lobotomy on his daughter Susan (Hannah Gross), for whom Andy develops feelings, we sense a turning point in what till now has been a travelogue of institutional misery. But Alverson, a committed formalist whose antiseptic still images, beautifully captured by Lorenzo Hagerman, are more slideshow than narrative, isn't interested in your

desire for a resolution that makes sense. He'd rather take the chunk of atmospheric gloom still clinging to his directorial paintbrush and make sure he gets that last corner filled before sending you away.

"The Mountain" isn't for everybody, but for the art-house faithful who like their critiques of American soullessness made with a humming austerity, this one's a painstakingly designed and visually transfixing beaut. Goldblum fans can revel in a part so suited to the lanky

actor's haughty oiliness that he practically leaves a film on your short-term memory after each scene. Sheridan, on the other hand, is so folded inward as to be nearly invisible at times, but then again there's the sense he's meant to be that way under Alverson's direction. "The Mountain" is, after all, a look back at a time when individuality was a curse with a scientifically harsh solution. It's only appropriate that it unfold with its own distinctive aura of exquisite sterility.

## 'Villains' stars talk about the act of fear

Bill Skarsgård and Maika Monroe, stars of the new movie "Villains," are talking about two different aspects of fear.

In the low-budget thriller, they play Mickey and Jules, a pair of B-grade Bonnie and Clyde-style crooks who pick the wrong house to rob and end up on the receiving end of some terrifying and life-threatening moments.

Both actors have dealt with the acting part of fear for past jobs. Monroe starred in the horror film "It Follows"; Skarsgård has

played the ominous Pennywise in the two recent "It" movies.

With Skarsgård, the question is whether it is tougher as an actor to portray a deep state of fear or scare the living daylight out of someone. He laughs and says it's a hard call to make because it depends on the moment.

"In the case of this film, the character is very different from who I am in life so to me, in reading the script and trying to wrap my head around the script, there (are) a lot of challenges," Skarsgård says. "He's this kind of lovable idiot and it is a very comedic, over-the-

top performance. Playing scared is one thing and can be played in a lot of different ways.

"In this movie, every time my character was supposed

to be scared, he was inherently funny. I have never played a character like this before and that was one reason I wanted to do this movie."

As for how she deals with getting across fear, Monroe understands the emotion because she learned to deal with it as a professional kiteboarder. She found being scared is something that has to be ignored if there is any hope of getting good at the sport.

As for working in the horror genre, she has seen there's a challenge to showing the right amount of terror.

"You have to dig deep and draw on whatever you have in you," Monroe says.

There are moments where it's not clear if "Villains" is a pure horror film, a supernatural thriller or simply a twisted morality play.

That was a big reason Skarsgård was attracted to the project.

"This is a movie that is hard to define or put into one box," Skarsgård says.

"That was the charm I saw in the script in the first place. There are all of these different elements and it plays in all of these different genres. It made for an original film and also an enjoyable viewing experience."

The film has a feel of a stage production because most of it focuses on the interaction of the two couples with the majority of the scenes in one house.

Monroe says working with the veteran actors in the cast (Jeffrey Donovan and Kyra Sedgwick) made the long, dialogue-heavy scenes a lot of fun to play.

"I also felt like I learned so much working with them," Monroe says. "It was an incredible experience that I have not felt that often. Shooting long scenes is definitely more complicated, but I almost enjoy it more just because you can stay in it."

# Avril Lavigne proves she’s still pop-punk royalty

With a toss of her hair and pop of her hip, Avril Lavigne smirked at her audience. “Don’t pretend, I think you know I’m d—precious,” she sang, delivering her “Hey Mickey”—esque 2007 single “Girlfriend.” “And hell yeah, I’m the (expletive) princess!”

She’s still a “princess” — a pop-punk princess, to be precise.

In 2002, 17-year-old Lavigne led the way for pop music to get a bit grungier, delivering a middle finger with chipped black nail polish, bubblegum sneer and skater aesthetic in place of the high-gloss, tightly choreographed, teen boy fantasy of the female pop star. Her debut album, “Let Go,” noted for its authenticity and viewed as an industry disruption, went four times platinum, making it the top-selling debut of the year while also inspiring an entire generation of young women to sport neckties with tank tops and, for many, becoming a gateway artist who gave them their earliest taste of punk’s influence.

That youthful, free-spirited delinquency continued to carry through the albums that succeeded “Let Go,” even as sweeping, lovelorn piano ballads worked to offset it. But in 2014, a year after releasing her self-titled fifth album and not long after her 30th birthday, Lavigne was diagnosed with Lyme disease and music was placed on the back burner. There was a time she, and her fans, thought she would die.

Five years later, Lavigne’s on the tail end of her “Head Above Water” tour — her first since being diagnosed — which hit the Chicago Theatre on Thurs-

day night in support of her sixth studio LP (released in February) of the same name. It was also the eve of her 35th birthday — we know this because she was serenaded with “Happy Birthday” not once, but twice.

Opening her hour and 15-minute set with the new album’s title track, the artist who once feared losing her voice sounded strong and clear in delivering the emphatic ballad, which she has said came to her as she lay in her mother’s arms, feeling as if she was drowning, like a fist-pumping fight song. While resilience was the theme of the evening, there was a noticeable sense of urgency to not dwell too much on the emotional intensity of her latest work. As soon as the song ended, even before the applause died down, the lights dimmed as Lavigne disappeared for an outfit change and her five-piece band plunged into an extended lead into “Happy Ending” from her sopho-

more album “Under My Skin.”

From then on, it was classic Avril — trading her flowing, white dress and tiara for guitar, leather-look pants, combat boots and a black, bedazzled T-shirt with super-size magenta ruffled sleeves, as she delivered power poses and pouts. Less than halfway through, the maturation that anchored the beginning of the show felt like a dream.

“I want you to have the best time tonight!” she said, addressing the crowd. “Whatever kind of day you had, just lose yourself in the music and have fun with us, all right?”

As country-tinged stomper “Here’s to Never Growing Up” rang out, it

was as if Lavigne had turned back the years in a matter of minutes. “Complicated,” her breakthrough single, came just four songs into her 15-cut set, while new song “Warrior” was lost amid a run that included “Breakaway” (written by Lavigne, but made popular by Kelly Clarkson), “Keep Holding On” and “When You’re Gone.”

Though the theater proved a fitting venue for her singer-songwriter presentation, it, at times, felt like getting a peek at sound-check — stop-and-go pacing continuing as bursts of choruses would dissolve into instrument tinkering, and other songs just simply ended. Lavigne never occupied the same seamless “pop machine” performance vein as her counterparts, where sequencing is used to tell a story, evoke suspense or drama. She instead opted for a much more straightforward approach to her live show. Thursday felt like a first attempt at something grander that was just out of reach.

In the middle of “Hello Kitty,” everything stopped. The LED screen displaying montages of music videos past and present, hot-pink skulls and stars in the night sky went black and the band stood silently on stage. The pause lasted barely two minutes, but it felt like 20.

But Lavigne, nearly two

decades into her career, brought it home in the end. If you can suspend reality, her immortal teenager vibe is as infectious as ever and, despite everything, feels like the artist as her most authentic self. The one-two punch of the angsty “He Wasn’t” and buoyant, misogynist-lite “Sk8er Boi” probably would’ve given way to crowd surfing had the venue not been seats-only.

A two-song encore saved the best for last. After taking to the piano for “Fell in love with the Devil,” the soft sound of violin led into arguably the best song in her catalog, “I’m With You.” Her voice soared, slight yodel inflection echoing softly before being swallowed up by the thousands of voices singing back at her. While Avril Lavigne didn’t necessarily take her audience by the hand to take them somewhere new, they’re definitely still with her.

Today's deal, from a European team competition, offers interesting points in both play and defense.

At both tables, declarer won the opening club lead with dummy's queen and led a low diamond to their 10. At this table, West ducked! This was a good play, as West retained an entry in the event his clubs were ever set up, and it misled declarer about the location of the ace. Believing the ace to be with East and not wanting a club led through his ace-jack, South led the queen of spades. East won with his ace and led a club, ducked to West's king, and West continued the suit. South went back to diamonds, but West won his ace and cashed his established club. The jack of spades and the queen of hearts were both poorly placed for declarer, and the contract went down one.

At the other table, West won with his ace of diamonds at trick two and shifted to the nine of spades. This defense might have succeeded also, but the play went low from dummy, low from East, and low from declarer! Nothing else would have been better, but who can blame West for leading another spade? South now had three spade tricks, two heart tricks, three diamond tricks, and two club tricks. An overtrick! Nicely played.

### Future uncertain, but Maddon's fine

Despite poor finish, he's 'had a blast'

ST. LOUIS — If Joe Maddon is worried about his future as his time as Cubs manager possibly nears an end, he isn't showing it.

"I'm having a pretty good time still," Maddon told a large group of reporters Friday night, including two national writers who suggested his demise is imminent.


"And I will. The future has not been decided yet. But quite frankly I'm feeling pretty good."

The Cubs brass traveled from Pittsburgh to St. Louis for the season's final series against the Cardinals, and everyone from President Theo Epstein to Maddon to a few players insist the manager's fate hasn't been decided. The Cubs failed to reach the playoffs this season for the first time in Maddon's five years with the team.

Nevertheless, Maddon elaborated on his past and recent accomplishments with the organization, suggesting he initially will be content if he and the Cubs part ways. His contract runs out after the season.

"When you get to do what I do every day, and you get to do it here, under the circumstance of what we've done over the last several years, it's hard to get upset or get down," Maddon said. "Why would you permit a game to drag you down like that? I feel really good about the future, very strongly about the future — whether it's on or off the baseball field. ... It's been wonderful."

### Dach looking to prove he belongs


The injury occurred three days before training camp started. Instead of competing for a roster spot, Dach wasn't even allowed on the ice.

A few hours after stepping off the Hawks' charter flight from Chicago to Berlin, Dach took the ice Friday at Mercedes-Benz Arena and practiced alongside Jonathan Toews, Patrick Kane, Brent Seabrook and other players he grew up idolizing.

"Coming in as a high draft pick and a young guy, you want to prove that you belong here and I didn't get a chance to do that," Dach said. Week 3 hero Gabriel ruled out, which leaves door open for another speedster to step up



# No time for ND to be feeling sorry for itself

SOUTH BEND, Ind. — There is no margin for error now for No. 10 Notre Dame.

Coming off a 23-17 loss at No. 3 Georgia that silenced many doubters, the Irish (2-1) find themselves in must-win mode every week if they want to climb back into the College Football Playoff discussion.

The task begins Saturday at home against No. 18 Virginia (4-0).

"This is an opportunity to kind of define who you are," coach Brian Kelly said of his players. "Clearly, they know what's at stake for them. They're playing a really good football team that's nationally ranked. Virginia has their attention."

It should. Atop the ACC's Coastal Division at 2-0 thanks to comeback victories over Pittsburgh and Florida State, Virginia is coming off another game in which it fell behind. Old Dominion scored the first 17 points before the Cavaliers answered with 28 consecutive points.

The Cavaliers' 3-4 defense is tied with Florida for the national lead with 20 sacks and is ranked 14th with 263.8 yards allowed per game, including just 75 on the ground. That's no relief for a Notre Dame team that rushed for only 46 yards against Georgia.

Virginia's linebackers are an active bunch: 6-foot-7, 235-pounder Charles Snowden had 15 tackles and two sacks last week, while Zane Zandler returned an interception for a touchdown and Matt Gahm and Jordan Mack combined for another 19 tackles.

Their efforts allowed quarterback Bryce Perkins (210 total yards and two touchdowns) to lead the comeback.

"(Perkins) is explosive ... extremely dangerous with the ball in his hands," Kelly said. "It's a really good defense ... schematically sound. A great challenge for our football team."

Virginia coach Bronco Mendenhall, whose BYU teams lost three times at Notre Dame Stadium — twice to Kelly — knows

what to expect. Led by junior quarterback Ian Book, the Irish are averaging 300.7 passing yards and 39.3 points despite the results against the Bulldogs.

"Numbers are misleading sometimes," Mendenhall said. "They're strong offensively ... and I've seen the ball consistently being moved when they want to run it against whomever they play."

With Jafar Armstrong out after abdominal surgery, senior Tony Jones Jr. (148 yards) and Book (145) have handled the running load for Notre Dame. They should get help from the return of sophomore Jahmir Smith, who scored two touchdowns against Louisville before suffering a turf-toe injury.

Junior Avery Davis, sophomore C'Bo

Flemister and freshman Kyren Williams could get more touches as well.

Perkins (193 yards) and sophomore Wayne Taulapapa (152 yards, five TDs) are the only Cavaliers over the century mark on the ground.

Virginia will be trying to post the ACC's first win against a ranked Irish team at Notre Dame Stadium. Notre Dame is 20-0 at home against ACC opponents when ranked.

"We have an opportunity to put our mark on college football," Perkins said, "do all the things that we said we came here to do and just come out from the start and play aggressive."



Maddon stressed his preference is to return to the Cubs, who entered Friday in the midst of a season-high nine-game losing streak to face a rival Cardinals team trying to win the National League Central title.

"I cannot be more eager for the day than I am right now," Maddon said. "This year's been weird. Our record is not good and we're not in the playoffs, but I've had a blast."

But directing the Cubs to four straight playoff appearances, including three consecutive NL Championship Series and the 2016 World Series title — their first since 1908 — and helping change the culture of an ill-fated franchise and pessimistic fan base likely won't be enough.

Despite Maddon's willingness to become more invested in his team — from reading "Millennials for Dummies" in the offseason to supervising and participating in situational-hitting drills during spring training — the 2019 Cubs fell short of expectations.

"Quite frankly, there isn't anything I'd pinpoint," Maddon said regarding any regrets. "I like what we've done a lot."

"This year has been difficult for a lot of reasons, but even those who were critical of last year, why would you be?"

One former Cubs coach said in midsea-

son that Maddon "has prevented a lot of brush fires" in dealing with players.

"(Maddon) is a great person," said pitcher Yu Darvish, who rebounded from an injury-plagued 2018 season to become one of the NL's top pitchers in the second half. "Not only is he a great manager, but especially last year (to the) beginning of this year, he was so patient with me. That's why I feel really good right now — because of him."

Maddon's self-confidence prompted one reporter to suggest he might not be out of work long if the Cubs sever ties.

"I'm not conceding anything right now," said Maddon, who said he's excited about driving to his hometown of Hazleton, Pa., with his wife, Jaye, to visit his mother, sister and friends shortly after his fate is decided.

"What's better than that?"

Maddon was pleased to hear that Cardinals second baseman Kolten Wong said Maddon brought "swagger" to the rivalry when he took over in 2015 by comparing the Cardinals to fictional mobster Tony Soprano after Anthony Rizzo was hit by a pitch. The Cubs went on to upset the Cardinals in the 2015 NLDS and dominated them under Maddon until this season.

"I remember the first year, and the Cardinals were beating up on us early, and I know (Pedro) Strop gave it up, and everyone is piling on," Maddon recalled.

"By the end of the year, I was telling reporters it's going to change. And it did."

# Late letdown no way to sell new network

ST. LOUIS — The Cubs' famous "wheelbarrow full of money" strategy was supposed to work like this:

Business operations chief Crane Kenney creates revenue streams through the Wrigley Field renovations and a

new TV network, and then dumps the money from an imaginary wheelbarrow at the feet of baseball operations president Theo Epstein to put back into the team.

The Cubs win, their fans get an all-Cubs, all-the-time TV station and everybody's happy.

Kenney made the "wheelbarrow" remark during an interview with BusinessWeek in 2015, and the media frequently regurgitated it, much like Epstein's comment threatening a "reckoning" after the 2019 season.

But as the Cubs ended their 72-year-old association with WGN-TV on Friday night and looked ahead to their new Marquee Sports Network, a monkey wrench surprisingly was thrown into their best-laid plans.

A season-ending collapse that ended the Cubs' playoff hopes, the probable exit of manager Joe Maddon and the possibility of some big-name stars being dealt have altered the dynamics of the network's 2020 debut.

They'll still be the Cubs. But they may not be the Cubs we've grown accustomed to watching over the last five years.

An epic meltdown like this is no way to promote a new TV network, and like "Roseanne" after firing star Roseanne Barr, the producers of Cubs telecasts might have their work cut out for them trying to sustain interest, depending on which way this winter goes.

Epstein reiterated this week that the Marquee Sports Network isn't going to affect the Cubs' baseball operations budget next year.

"The new TV deal, at least for the first few years, basically means the exact same thing for us as the old deal," Epstein said Wednesday in Pittsburgh. "The first few years will basically replicate the old deal, and then with potential for real growth."

But if the Cubs want fans to pay an extra \$6 to \$7 per month to their favorite cable operator instead of cutting the cord and simply listening to Pat Hughes and Ron Coomer on the radio, they certainly have to put together a winner, right? And maybe get some "sexy" players to get more eyeballs on the telecasts?

Go ahead and laugh. But when Epstein was Sox general manager in Boston, Red Sox ownership wanted him to do just that because of TV viewership was down.

"They told us we didn't have any marketable players, that we needed some sizzle," Epstein told Boston Globe columnist Dan Shaughnessy. "We need

some sexy guys. Talk about the tail wagging the dog. This is like an absurdist comedy. We'd become too big. It was the farthest removed from what we set out to be."

So maybe the Cubs can go out and get some more marketable players to help them rebound? Would fans enjoy watching Yasiel Puig lick his bat?

Epstein said there will be no similarities between the old Red Sox and the new Cubs.

"That won't be an issue here," he said. "The baseball decisions will be unrelated to any TV considerations, I think. I know Crane and the guys are really excited about this project and the network, and they understand it's a long-term thing and it's going to grow. It's not dependent on the number of wins we have next year."

"Obviously we want to win as many games as we can. We want to win the World Series. But it's not because of the TV network. That's the goal. It's unrelated. There's a wall between baseball decisions and anything related to the TV network."

That's encouraging. Build the wall, Theo, and keep Crane on the other side. Meanwhile, the Cubs said goodbye to WGN in quiet fashion, just as the network said it would.

WGN-TV Cubs producer Marc Brady said recently that they didn't want to call attention to themselves during their final telecasts because the Cubs were in a pennant race, and they felt fans wanted to focus on the games instead of watching old highlights they've probably seen 100 times.

That was laudable. And for a while, it was probably the right move.

But with the Cubs in a historic free-fall down the stretch, it would've been perfect baseball symmetry to splice in a bunch of 1969 highlights between pitches of Friday's game at Busch Stadium, which turned out

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to be meaningless for the visitors, who entered with a season-high nine-game losing streak.

While the 2019 collapse doesn't compare to the famous '69 fold, it did feature a cast of characters everyone knew well on a one-name basis.

Rizzo, Bryant, Javy and Schwarber are as familiar to today's Cubs fan as Ernie, Billy, Ronnie and Fergie were back in the day.

Maybe it doesn't matter to you what station the game you're watching is on. That's OK.

But for those of us who grew up watching the Cubs on WGN every day, when they were part of your afternoon routine of coming home from school and flipping on the game, the end of the era is sad indeed.

Good luck to the Marquee Sports Network, which can provide die-hard fans with more Cubs content than they ever imagined — at least if they can afford the monthly cable bill.

And thanks to WGN, which did include some memorable highlights in Friday's telecast, for chronicling the Cubs all those years. Whether heartbreaking or tear-jerking, those moments are forever etched in our memories.

WGN spread the gospel of Cubs baseball from generation to generation, for better or worse.

## Hahn sets offseason wish list

GM's 2020 vision includes upgrades in rotation, RF, DH

Every general manager has a wish list. White Sox GM Rick Hahn plans to address some areas of need in the offseason, namely starting pitching, a right fielder and a designated hitter.

Hahn looked back at the 2019 season and ahead to 2020 during a news conference Friday before a scheduled doubleheader against the Tigers at Guaranteed Rate Field was called because of rain.

"We certainly didn't get much from an offensive standpoint out of right field or DH over the course of this season," Hahn said. "Many of our young outfielders aren't quite ready to fill that void in right field. That could well be an area we need to go outside to address."

"As I went through the three starters in (Lucas) Giolito, (Dylan) Cease and (Reynaldo) Lopez that we expect ... to be part of this come opening day and the possible addition of (Michael) Kopech, the eventual addition of (Carlos) Rodon and some of our other young players, (that) still leaves the opportunity to potentially solidify the rotation. I would put that on the likely to-do list this offseason too."

First baseman Jose Abreu, who leads the American League with 123 RBIs and the Sox with 33 home runs, will be a free agent. Abreu, 32, has made it clear he'd like to return.

"With Jose, we've heard his thought that even if we don't resign him he's going to resign himself, (and) we've heard (Chairman) Jerry (Reinsdorf's) thoughts about he's always going to wear a White Sox uniform. I don't think they are going to be teaching this in negotiation classes in college any time soon," Hahn said with a laugh.

"But my takeaway from all that is that there's a strong desire on both sides to figure out a way to keep Jose in a White Sox uniform."

Hahn didn't specify when touted prospects Luis Robert and Nick Madrigal might join the team. Robert is the top prospect in the organization and Madrigal is ranked No. 4, according to MLB.com. Both ended 2019 with Triple-A Charlotte.

"I would say based upon their seasons, probably have Luis a tick ahead of Nick in terms of projected arrival time," Hahn said. "But we'll see how they show up in camp and how that unfolds. We can sit here and say that similar to Eloy (Jimenez) a year ago we expect Luis Robert to be playing center field for most if not all of the 2020 season. Nick Madrigal playing second base? Probably most of the 2020 season. But let's wait and see how he comes to camp and what this offseason holds."

Hahn said it was a "little premature on 'everyone coming back' conversations" in terms of manager Rick Renteria's coaching staff.

"We need to sit down and finish up with Ricky the evaluation of where we're at," Hahn said. "Certainly when we assembled this staff, we wanted it to be filled with guys with roots in player development so that they were able to teach our young players and hold them accountable and set standards. And we're certainly very pleased with how that's unfolded. We'll deal with specific staffing issues once the season's over."

Hahn wasn't ready to say the Sox are going to compete for a championship next season. But he sees their window opening.

"We're entering the next stage, and that's going to involve continued growth and a path toward heightened competitiveness and far more compelling baseball," he said. "How quickly we get to the most important stage, that being winning, it's premature to say right now."

"We have to wait to see what the rest of this roster looks like, and then over the course of the early part of the (2020) season see how the young players continue to grow before we can start saying, 'This team's ready to win a championship.' But we're moving to that next stage. It's time now to start having that progress toward a winning team on an annual basis, a championship-caliber team ultimately."

## Darvish wants to stay in command of his control

ST. LOUIS — After becoming one of the most dominant pitchers in the National League in the second half of 2019, the Cubs' Yu Darvish has one concern for 2020.

"I'm looking forward to spring training and see how my command is," Darvish said. "That's the (first thing). But I have a lot of confidence right now."

Darvish went from a question mark in the first three months to the Cubs' most reliable starter in the second half. After

averaging 4.54 walks per nine innings to go with a 5.01 ERA in the first half, Darvish walked only seven batters in 81 2/3 innings and posted a strikeout-to-walk ratio of 16.8 to 1 in the second half.

"I have 20 reasons," Darvish said for his turnaround.

He credited manager Joe Maddon, President Theo Epstein, general manager Jed Hoyer and several other staffers for their patience and help in transforming his fortunes.

Darvish said he spoke to more team-

mates this season and felt more comfortable after spending his injury-plagued 2018 season as a near reclus.

He will maintain his offseason program of heavy weightlifting and not throwing until January.

Darvish reiterated he's unlikely to opt out of his contract, which has four years and \$81 million remaining.

"My kids and wife love Chicago, especially the kids," Darvish said. "They care only about the Cubbies. I don't think (I'll opt out)."



# Arriving in style to prepare for season

Hawks take luxury jet to finish preseason in Europe

BY JIMMY GREENFIELD

BERLIN — The standard charter jet the Blackhawks use to whisk them around North America is more Four Seasons than Holiday Inn.

Leg room is never an issue, and the seats are cushy. But no flight during a season is longer than four hours. The Hawks' direct flight Thursday from Chicago to Berlin was about nine hours, a long time for an athlete to stay comfortable.

To try to alleviate the discomfort that can accompany overseas flights, the Hawks chartered a jet with large, fully reclining seats. It also had two couches that quickly became the most popular spots on the plane.

"I think (Alex DeBrincat) claimed one of the couches," Jonathan Toews said. "I don't know how that happened. Called dibs. Veteran seniority, I guess."

Even flying in the lap of greater luxury than usual couldn't halt the inevitable issues with a long-distance ride.

"We were probably a lot more comfortable than you were," Andrew Shaw told a reporter who took a commercial flight to Berlin. "And it still wasn't that comfortable."

Coach Jeremy Colliton wanted to hold a practice at Mercedes-Benz Arena in Berlin, where the Hawks will play an exhibition game against Eisbaeren Berlin on Sunday, but didn't want to push things. So Friday's training consisted of little more than some light skating and what was intended to be a casual 4-on-4 game.

"We've been traveling for a few hours now and we had to skate," Colliton said. "You've got to get out there after that type of trip and ... adjust to the time change. ... They had some fun, and it's a good atmosphere out there. They're competing and that's important."

"I also think with the big ice, to play those type of games, small-ice game, it helps you get used to the spacing. There's some more room out there, so they got some reps. ... That'll help them in the next couple of days."

What also will help prepare them for the season — which opens Oct. 4 against the Flyers in Prague — is simply being together.

"We got a lot of new guys," Shaw said. "To get to know each other, it's a good thing and ... a really neat experience with playing overseas. A couple team events along the way."

"It's going to be good for us." ■ Defenseman Connor Murphy and forward Zack Smith are nursing minor injuries and will not play Sunday.

Jeremy Colliton said. "He'll adjust to the speed, and that's why having him part of the full group today was a good step for him."

"Obviously, there wasn't a lot of structure out there. We just kind of got the legs going and played a little four-on-four tournament. But that would still be good for him, and (Saturday) we'll practice. Excited to have him here."

Dach may have just started practicing, but he has spent a lot of time around the team the last three months. He met a lot of the veterans during the development camp in July, and while sidelined at the start of camp, he wasn't invisible.

"I've been around the guys for a couple weeks and got to know everybody," Dach said. "So it's not too nerve-wracking getting out there. But obviously you get excited sometimes and realize there's real NHL superstars on the ice and it's a privilege to be out there."







Weather more typical of mid-October arrives as rain tapers off.


Residual light showers, patchy drizzle early. Showers may persist much of the morning S-E of the city. Temps upper 50s N. Shore-mid 60s city and S.

High temperatures reached the low 90s across central Illinois Friday, while Chicago-area readings peaked in the 60s. Southwest winds lifted the steamy air to our south into clouds that produced rainfall amounts in excess of 6 inches, prompting a flash flood warning south of Interstate 88. Tennis ball-size hail pelted Grant Park, Illinois. Storms are to subside and settle south of the metro area by Saturday as cool, northeast winds lock in. More storms are possible across Chicago Saturday night and early Sunday as tropical air returns.

I am always miserable when the weather is cloudy, rainy and gray. I am 54 years old, and this has been a problem for a long time.  
Ralph London, Chicago

Dear Ralph,  
You have expressed a feeling that has considerable validity. Researchers looked at weather records and medical data of 274,000 patients in Sweden between 1998 and 2013 and came to the startling conclusion that there was an increased risk of heart attacks during periods of cold weather, especially when the temperature dropped lower than the middle 30s.

Several possible explanations were presented: People tend to exercise less and eat more unhealthy foods during extended periods of gloomy weather. Another possible explanation: Arteries tend to narrow and blood pressure increases when the weather is gloomy.

# A Giant farewell

## Likely Hall of Famer Bochy to retire Sunday

SAN FRANCISCO — Bruce Bochy once took a bat to a flat-screen TV during a Giants team meeting to make a point to his players. It just took a few more swings than he expected because it didn't break on the first attempt as he had figured.

"It's not like a regular TV where it shatters; it just went thud," Bochy recalled this week.

Such moments of madness were rare for Bochy, who is known more for his even-keel temperament, and that made them all the more meaningful. While his legacy in San Francisco will always be capturing those three World Series titles in a remarkable five-year span, Bochy's reputation for fairness and having a genuine way of dealing with players has been of utmost importance to him during a decorated 25-year managerial career.

"My hope is they know I care," said Bochy, who wraps up what has certainly been a Hall of Fame career this weekend. "I don't always get it right as far as communicating. I know there have been players who questioned how fair I was, too, and that's going to happen in this job. If most of the guys feel that (I was fair), it makes me feel good. I appreciate that. That means a lot to me."

Bochy has spent the last 13 seasons with the Giants after 12 in San Diego, where he guided a Padres club led by Hall of Famers Tony Gwynn and Trevor Hoffman to the 1998 World Series. The Padres got swept by the Yankees. He never got fired along the way, joking he beat the Padres to it when he departed for their NL West rival up north.

A former first-round pick catcher who played nine major-league seasons with the Astros, the Mets and the Padres, he opted to announce his retirement plans early in spring training to avoid any distractions for his club considering he faced regular questions about his future. He manages his last game Sunday.

Bochy arrived in the Bay Area just ahead of home run king Barry Bonds' final season of 2007. He managed Bonds through his successful pursuit of Hank Aaron's all-time home run record, choosing when to rest the

seven-time NL MVP and when to push him amid the daily pressures of chasing the record.

Another Barry, Barry Zito, will never forget Bochy's respectful approach in telling the left-hander — earning a team-high \$18.5 million at the time — that he wouldn't make the playoff roster in 2010, when the Giants went on to capture their first World Series title since moving West in 1958. They made it an every-other-year thing after that, winning titles again in the even years of 2012 and '14.

"Such a professional," Zito said. "Boch is so composed. It's almost like it doesn't mean anything anymore when guys are yelling, but with Bochy he's always so composed, so when he did get mad or raise his voice — or take a baseball bat through a flat-screen TV — then you'd listen. He did that once. It was probably '08."

"He had to have very difficult discussions with me about leaving me off the roster in 2010. He was always just so amazing at handling his players. He always treated me with respect, even though a lot of times I didn't deserve respect in the game at those times."

Bochy, to this day, respects how Zito immediately got back to work despite the

disappointing news. The 2002 AL Cy Young Award winner with the A's, Zito came back from that to help the Giants win the 2012 title.

Others have noticed from afar how Bochy handles the tough matters.

"We have shared and exchanged ideas and thoughts over the years from a managerial basis," said Pirates manager Clint Hurdle, who played against Bochy and also managed regularly against him while with the Rockies. "Watching from afar, the number of quality, elite players that have gone through here, they all speak glowingly of him on their way out. I don't know if anybody bats 1.000. He bats close to 1.000."

"I also think he's remained true to himself in his core beliefs. He's a good baseball man, and I think he has over time learned how to adapt, to improvise and overcome. I have nothing but the utmost professional and personal respect for him. It's a Hall of Fame career. It's a Hall of Fame manager. San Francisco and San Diego I think will both look back, they're feeling it now, at what a wonderful opportunity they had to share the career with him."

Repeatedly, Bochy has trusted his gut based on a player's track record over time rather than looking at one bad day or slump.

"In his 25 years as a big-league manager, Boch never had a team that underperformed," recalled Tim Flannery, Bochy's ex-teammate and longtime third base coach in both cities. "He never was given a team that was supposed to win a division, win a pennant or win a World Series, but he always got the most out of his teams, his players, his coaches."

"He trusted the length of the season to allow players to be the best they could be by giving them every chance, every opportunity, while believing in them and putting them in the roles they needed to be in, and in what he needed from them to win as a team."

Bochy understands what it takes to be a role player in the game too. He was a career .239 hitter with 26 home runs and 93 RBIs.

"Sometimes the tough moments are some of the most cherished memories, because people do things in tough times and that experience being in the trenches and supporting each other, you grow very firm bonds and very strong bonds," said Rangers outfielder Hunter Pence, who lost his starting job with the Giants in 2018.

"You just appreciate all the work and all the effort, just his whole character. Playing for him and being around him, he lights up the room — he's funny, he's fun, he's smart and he gives you every opportunity to succeed. And I'm thankful for all of these things, not just one."

Similar to the Zito situation, Bochy said one of his toughest conversations ever came in early August with Joe Panik, to let the second baseman know he was being designated for assignment. It never gets any easier to let a player go.

"You may think it does, but it's part of the job," Bochy said. "This was one of the more difficult ones. I really like Joe, I respect him, of course appreciate everything he's done here. I'm not going to lie — this was a very tough one, but it should be. You spend as much time as we all do together and for as long as we've been together, it's going to be tough. If it's not, you're not human."

Bochy's approach has remained fairly simple: "I try to treat people the way I would want to be treated. I kind of have to remind myself of that. It's not an easy game."

## NCAA is short on respect

Bad business model to govern by fear in corruption probe

Over the last two years, as corruption in men's college basketball received federal scrutiny, it became painfully clear the NCAA lacked two common governing powers: fear and respect.

To have ideal authority, the latter is vital; the former is necessary on occasion. But possessing neither? It made the NCAA, the supposed protector of amateurism, seem like a sheriff trying to keep order with a water gun and paper handcuffs.

The FBI investigation and ensuing trials didn't shock as much as they confirmed a black market that had been under a veil for too long. The stunning part was the audacity with which bagmen, agents, agent runners, shoe company executives, coaches, parents and guardians allegedly operated, and none of them seemed too concerned about the wrath of the NCAA.

Why? Because they saw the NCAA as the biggest hustler of them all, profiting unfairly off rules it refused to adjust and creating a rigid, difficult-to-enforce system that birthed these shady, underground business dealings.

"You can't defraud a school," Christian Dawkins scoffed during his trial. Dawkins, a former aspiring agent, was convicted in May of bribing assistant coaches to steer their players to his sports management company.

"I don't even know how that's possible by players getting money. The school's getting money. It's ridiculous."

In various forms, you kept hearing about the impotence of the NCAA during this federal probe. Now, months removed from the peak of the scandal, the NCAA has had time to investigate, reflect and take action. In June, it sent word that six schools would receive a notice of allegations for Level I violations. This week, Kansas, one of the sport's most pedigreed programs, was notified of three Level I violations, a lack of institutional control and a head coach responsibility charge against Hall of Famer Bill Self.

It has been a busy week for the NCAA. It also banned Georgia Tech from the NCAA tournament for a year and put it on probation for four years as part of a punishment package for Josh Pastner's program, which was accused of having two boosters provide impermissible benefits, including an all-expenses-paid visit to a strip club for a recruit.

So the NCAA strikes back now, stretching its powers as far as they go, hoping to restore order and credibility. Self and Kansas vow to fight the organization, setting the stage for a long legal battle that could define the NCAA's level of authority. If the NCAA gets its way, it will make an example of the Jayhawks, which means that other high-profile programs involved in the FBI probe — Arizona, Louisville, Auburn, LSU, Southern California and Oklahoma State among them — should be worried.

There has always been this belief, mostly unsubstantiated, that the NCAA was unwilling to go after too many of its greatest programs because, well, follow the money. The so-called blue bloods are good for business. But this time, the level of corruption is too significant. Order must be established — or re-established — or created from scratch. Fear is necessary, and as long as the NCAA doesn't overreach and violate its bylaws in trying to maximize its disciplinary power, it should scare a few more teams right, at least for a while.

But what about respect? It's far more elusive.

Fear will make more schools fall in line, but respect makes them stay in line. NCAA President Mark Emmert can flex the organization's muscles a little. But that's different from creating an environment in which the majority of institutions — and those who deal with the schools — believe in the system, trust its fairness and go out of their way to maintain its integrity. That kind of respect may be too aspirational, but it can be achieved only through reform.

Now isn't the time for the NCAA just to get tough on its cheaters. It's an opportunity to be

introspective and proactive, to re-create its model, to prove it isn't burdened by inflexibility and greed. The reform ideas of the Condoleezza Rice-led commission were cool and all, and it's great the NCAA already has implemented some of those suggestions.

But those ideas should be viewed as a rough draft, not a complete effort. The NCAA can and must go deeper. It must loosen its definition of amateurism and figure out a creative way to compensate athletes in a manner that could eliminate some of the con men who are essentially ruining the sport's integrity one nickel and dime at a time.

I doubt the NCAA will listen, but it should. There is no fixing this system. There's too much hypocrisy, and there's no financial equality. In this environment, the NCAA can't even go after an alleged rules violator without seeming like a misguided leader selfishly attempting to protect its own image.

Programs used to cooperate and beg for forgiveness when the NCAA notified them of allegations. Kansas is punching back, similar to how North Carolina fought the NCAA, successfully, over its academic scandal. In his response to the NCAA, Self didn't just say he thought the NCAA was wrong. He did it with how-dare-you venom.

"In its haste and attempt to regain control, the enforcement staff has created a false narrative regarding me and our basketball program," Self said in the written statement. "The narrative is based on innuendo, half-truths, misimpressions and mischaracterizations. In reality, we all know there is only one version of the truth. The truth is based on verifiable

facts, and I am confident the facts we will demonstrate in our case will expose the inaccuracies of the enforcement staff's narrative."

On one hand, Self is being awfully defiant when evidence has been admitted in federal court linking him, through text messages, to former Adidas consultant T.J. Gassnola implying that players would be paid for and delivered to his program. But Gassnola, who admitted in federal court in October that he made payments to two Kansas players, also testified Self was not aware of those transactions.

I'm not sure the NCAA, if challenged in court, will be able to punish Kansas and Self for everything in that notice of allegations. There's no question it has the ammunition to sanction the program significantly, but if it wants to use the Jayhawks' situation as a long-term deterrent, good luck with that. If it takes an FBI investigation and a trial to take down shoe companies and cheating programs, most will consider that dumb luck and get craftier in their pay-for-play schemes.

Fear is fleeting. The NCAA doesn't have the resources to police this black market. It can eliminate a sizable portion of it, however, by reforming its policies, shrinking its rule book and not treating legislation such as California's Fair Pay to Play Act as the "existential threat" that Emmert proclaimed it to be this week.

Respect lasts longer. It must be earned, though. The NCAA can keep seeking to punish programs for doing the wrong thing, but it will never find enough of them to truly level the playing field. It would be much better — and more respectable — if the NCAA tried to do the right thing, too.

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
