



## Trick-or-treater winds up in harm's way

In Little Village shooting, 7-year-old girl is hit amid entrenched gang conflict

Every Halloween, 26th Street through Little Village becomes an unbroken parade of children in bright costumes snaking in and out of businesses braced for the trick-or-treaters.

"Who doesn't enjoy Halloween?" asked Laura Gutierrez Ramos, owner of Nuevo Leon restaurant, a staple of the strip for more than 40 years.

But this year, she felt only sadness and anger. A 7-year-old girl dressed in a red and black costume was shot and seriously wounded across the street from the restaurant by a gunman aiming at a gang rival. Yet children continued to come in for candy, despite the crime tape and squad cars.

"It did not faze people," she said. "Our community is very immune to the situation."

The girl is apparently the latest victim of a gang war that has been waged in the neighborhood since the 1960s.

Police believe the gunman is a member of the Gangster Two-Six gang and was targeting a Latin King when he shot the girl two times as she walked down the

street with her father Thursday evening in the 3700 block of West 26th Street — close to the border dividing rival street gangs.

The gunman stepped from an alley about 5:30 p.m. and yelled a Latin King insult before firing at least seven times into a crowd of children, hitting the girl on the right side of the neck and her upper chest, according to Chicago police.

"The girl's father was screaming, 'My little girl's been shot!'" said Lali Lara, 25, who was working in a cellphone store on the block.

She rushed the girl and her family inside the store, where she

## Facing ouster, Arroyo resigns

Gives up seat in Illinois House amid bribery probe

State Rep. Luis Arroyo resigned his seat in the Illinois House on Friday, one week after he was arrested on a federal bribery charge and just hours before a legislative committee was set to consider his ouster from the General Assembly.

Arroyo, the latest public figure to get caught up in a sprawling federal corruption probe that has reached from City Hall to the state Capitol, is accused of paying a bribe to a state senator in exchange for support of a gambling bill that would have benefited a lobbying client of Arroyo's.

House Speaker Michael Madigan, who called for the committee that was to consider ejecting Arroyo from the House, said in a statement Friday that "Arroyo's resignation shouldn't distract from the fact that the allegations contained in this criminal complaint go beyond anything that could be considered a lapse of judgment or minor indiscretion."

"Although the disciplinary process will no longer proceed, there is still a focus on strengthening our laws to prevent this unacceptable conduct," Madigan said. "I look forward to working with the governor and other legislative leaders to look for ways in which we can continue to improve the safeguards we

## Warren unveils blueprint of \$20 trillion health plan

Presidential hopeful pledges middle class won't see a tax hike

WASHINGTON — Democratic presidential candidate Elizabeth Warren on Friday proposed \$20 trillion in federal spending over the next decade to provide health care to every American without raising taxes on the middle class, a politically risky effort that pits the goal of universal coverage against skepticism of government-run health care.

The details of Warren's "Medicare for All" plan aim to

quell criticism that the Massachusetts Democrat has been vague about how she would pay for her proposal. Her refusal to say until now whether she would impose new taxes on the middle class, as fellow progressive White House hopeful Bernie Sanders has said he would, had made her a target in recent presidential debates.

However, her detailed proposal was quickly attacked by her moderate rivals, including former Vice President Joe Biden, whose campaign said it amounts to "mathematical gymnastics."

In a 20-page online post, Warren said a cornerstone of her plan would require employers to transfer to the govern-

## Time change can trigger some seasonal depression

For those affected, not sleeping late is one way to head it off

Standard time starts at 2 a.m. Sunday. Be sure to set your clocks back one hour.

Seasonal affective disorder, and the slightly less debilitating version, which psychologists call winter blues, are forms of depression that are tied to the winter season. An estimated 10 million Americans struggle with full-blown SAD, and another 10% to 20% are believed to suffer from less severe winter mood changes. Women are affected more often than men. The symptoms mirror those of any depression, but they show up year after year as the season shifts toward winter.

have today."

Madigan's name appeared in a subpoena and search warrant served on the City Club of Chicago earlier this year as part of a federal probe into ComEd's lobbying practices.

The speaker told reporters in Springfield this week he's not "a target of anything."

In his resignation letter, dated Thursday and filed with the secretary of state's office on Friday, Arroyo wrote that the time has come "to retire from public service." His resignation was effective at the end of the day Friday.

He thanked his colleagues in the House and specifically Madigan "for helping me bring member initiatives to my district and for the opportunity that he gave me to chair various committees."

Keeping his seat while facing criminal charges would create a distraction, Arroyo said.

"But more importantly, it was my sincere desire to spare the members of this body from having to take such a difficult vote at a time when you are all running for re-election considering how well we have all worked together," Arroyo wrote.

"I would like to add that you should all keep in mind that public service should be for a duration of time wherein you are an effective member of the body. Once you have gone beyond your period of peak effectiveness, you should really call it a day and retire while you can still enjoy the later years in your life."

Arroyo, 65, had been in office since 2006 and was an assistant majority leader. His annual salary as a legislator was \$80,037.84, including a leadership stipend of \$10,573.92. Lawmakers received their most recent paychecks on Thursday. Come Dec. 1, Arroyo will be eligible for a monthly pension payment of roughly \$3,950, based on his nearly 14 years in the House. He would lose his pension if convicted of the bribery charge.

The charges against Arroyo led to a flurry of calls for ethics reform in Springfield, where legislators spent three days this week as part of the fall veto session.

Arroyo's arrest followed a federal raid on the Capitol office of Sen. Martin Sandoval in September and the indictment of Sen. Thomas Cullerton in August on embezzlement charges in connection with an alleged union ghost payroll scheme.

Sandoval stepped down as chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee last month amid calls for his removal, from officials in-

cluding Gov. J.B. Pritzker.

Sandoval, who has not been charged with any wrongdoing, has not spoken publicly since the September raid, and he was not in Springfield this week for the first half of the General Assembly's fall veto session.

Cullerton was in Springfield this week. Senate President John Cullerton, his distant cousin, has not called for Tom Cullerton or Sandoval to step down.

Arroyo was the third public official to be charged as a result of the corruption probe, following Ald. Edward Burke, 14th, and Tom Cullerton.

Arroyo was in federal court in Chicago on Monday as his fellow lawmakers convened for the first day of the veto session. He was charged with one count of federal program bribery alleging he agreed to pay a state senator \$2,500 a month in kickbacks, in exchange for the senator's support on legislation involving video gambling sweepstakes machines.

The state senator wasn't named in the criminal complaint, but a source identified him as Sen. Terry Link, a Vernon Hills Democrat. Link has vehemently denied that he is the cooperating witness identified in the criminal complaint.

On Oct. 25, when charges against Arroyo were still under seal, the FBI raided the offices of businessman James Weiss, the son-in-law of Cook County Democratic Party boss and former county Assessor Joseph Berrios, the Tribune reported on Friday.

Weiss is connected through a complex web of corporations to John Adreani, whose company V.S.S. Inc. entered into a deal in 2018 to pay Arroyo \$2,500 a month to lobby City Hall on proposed legislation allowing sweepstakes machines to operate in the city. Adreani is a former Chicago police officer who was fired for consorting with a drug trafficker.

Arroyo also is the Democratic committeeman for Chicago's 36th Ward. If he doesn't relinquish his party position, Arroyo could play

a prominent role in selecting his replacement, controlling more than a third of the weighted vote when party leaders in the 3rd House District meet to select a replacement to finish out his term, which runs until January 2021.

As of Friday afternoon, Arroyo had not resigned from his committeeman post, said Delmarie Cobb, a spokeswoman for the county Democratic Party.

Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle, who heads the county party, is "going to take the weekend to take into consideration all that is going on" before deciding how to proceed, Cobb said.

Ald. Carlos Ramirez-Rosa, the 35th Ward Democratic committeeman, called on Arroyo to step down before committeemen within the district vote to replace him. "I'm not going to be part of the process where he's filling the vacancy," Ramirez-Rosa said.

Ald. Gilbert Villegas, 36th, an Arroyo ally, said he hopes to succeed Arroyo as committeeman. He called on Preckwinkle to convene a ward organization meeting within the next 30 days to replace Arroyo.

Arroyo's resignation was not enough to satisfy House Republicans, whose party has been untouched by the federal probe.

"The criminal complaint against Rep. Arroyo has shaken any trust the public had left in the General Assembly," Deputy House GOP leader Tom Demmer of Dixon said in a statement. "In an effort to begin restoring public confidence, Sen. Terry Link needs to step down immediately from his position on the Legislative Ethics Commission while this widespread federal investigation continues."

Link is one of eight members of the commission that oversees the work of Legislative Inspector General Carol Pope, who is charged with investigating allegations of wrongdoing by lawmakers and others in the legislature. Pope can't issue subpoenas or start investi-

gations without the panel's approval, and she's backing legislation that would give her more independence.

Link could not be reached for comment.

The special committee that was set to convene Friday would have considered booting a sitting legislator from the House for only the second time in more than a century.

In 2012, when Rep. Derrick Smith of Chicago was expelled after being indicted on charges that he took a \$7,000 bribe in a federal sting operation days before that year's Democratic primary. He was removed by a vote of 100-6 that August, the first time in more than a century that the House cast out one of its own.

Smith remained on the November ballot and went on to win reelection. While Smith was awaiting trial, Madigan backed him for another term in the March 2014 primary, but he lost a five-way race. He was automatically removed from office upon being convicted in June 2014 of bribery and extortion. He was later sentenced to five months in prison.

Rep. Fred Crespo, who was set to chair the special committee to consider Arroyo's expulsion, said the allegations against Arroyo, the federal investigation of Sandoval, and the revelation that a sitting senator has been cooperating with federal authorities on and off since 2016 casts a negative light on all lawmakers.

"If what they say is true, they deserve what's coming their way," Crespo said.

The Hoffman Estates Democrat has been trying to pass legislation for nearly a decade that would bar elected officials from working as paid lobbyists but hasn't gotten much support in the past.

"Finally it's getting some traction," he said.

## AFTER THE CPS STRIKE ...

Students get back to school Friday — but getting past the bad feelings could take longer

After weeks of rancor and declarations of mutual mistrust between the Chicago Teachers Union and city leaders, students and educators alike seemed pleased to be back in school Friday after a divisive and prolonged teachers strike.

Chicago Public Schools CEO Janice Jackson blogged Friday that “it’s now time for us to move past the acrimony, the name calling, and the outrage hashtags and get back to focusing on our young people.”

During the walkout, Jackson often stood next to Mayor Lori Lightfoot as the public-facing opposition to the union. But Friday, Jackson wrote that her values haven’t changed since she was a CTU member, and she reiterated her support for the district’s educators: “Our teachers chose to walk out of their classrooms for their students — not for greed or selfishness as some have claimed behind the anonymity of a Twitter account. Let’s put a stop to that myth.”

Officials on both sides of Chicago’s longest teachers strike in decades were on hand Friday morning to greet students and staff as they headed back to school more than two weeks after the walkout began.

Lightfoot appeared at Mason Elementary School on the West Side, while CTU President Jesse Sharkey joined returning teachers and students at Yates Elementary School about 6 miles away.

As Sharkey prepared to lead a contingent of teachers and staff members back into Yates, cook Elaine Tabron leaned out of the main door and waved excitedly.

“Welcome back, teachers!” she called out.

Sarah Shlemon, a second-year restorative justice coordinator at Yates, said that teachers were greeted with a giant “welcome back” sign hung in the hallway by

students who came to the school during the strike.

“I’ve been trying not to cry all morning,” Shlemon said. “I’m really, really happy to be back. I can’t wait to see the kids.”

Amalia Lopez, the parent of a student at Yates and another at Lane Tech College Prep High School, was also glad to see the strike end.

“We are so happy it’s over,” she said. “We’re happy for the teachers, but we’re happier for the students.”

But for all the expressions of joy and relief at the strike’s end, moving past the bad feelings might be even more difficult than the tentative teachers contract that took an 11-school-day walkout to hammer out.

Lightfoot and union leaders traded barbs throughout the work stoppage, culminating Wednesday night when the union — despite its House of Delegates endorsing the proposed agreement — announced that the strike would continue until the mayor agreed to allow teachers to make up all the school days lost to the strike.

The mayor, who had been staunchly opposed to any makeup days, angrily claimed the union had “moved the goalpost” again. Both sides relented the next day and agreed to five makeup days. But union officials, despite the end of the strike and gaining much of what they sought in the contract, said they were unhappy with the makeup days outcome, with Sharkey saying it was “not a day for victory laps.”

He said he did not want to share a photo-op with the mayor and did not join her in announcing the end of the strike.

And the fight for the new contract isn’t over yet. It must still be ratified in the coming days by CTU members, and Sharkey has said it might not be a “slam-dunk.”

Selling the deal to the rank-and-file will presumably be harder now, since members won’t be able to recoup all the pay they lost

during the walkout.

Both sides have said the strike was hard on everyone involved, from teachers who spent days marching and rallying, to parents who had to scramble for child care, to students who lost instructional time and opportunities to participate in sports and other extracurricular activities.

The walkout outlasted the last major CTU work stoppage in 2012 by several days. It began Oct. 17 and took 25,000 CTU members off the job and about 300,000 students out of school. It was the longest strike against the Chicago Board of Education since a 19-day walkout in 1987.

Mentioning the give-and-take of negotiators, Sharkey said that union leaders gained class size caps, staffing in key areas and other improvements — but conceded such things as the length of the contract and as much teacher prep time as they sought in order to obtain other victories in writing.

“Striking is hard. It’s physically hard and also there’s a lot of anxiety about the lost pay and the sacrifices involved there. Maybe the people in power wanted to see if we were really going to stand up, and we did stand up,” he said.

“A strike doesn’t just change the contract, it also changes the people who participate in the strike,” Sharkey added. “We feel a little bit of what it means to have our voice count in a society that often ignores our voices.”

Besides ratification, the union is also turning its attention to helping its members enforce the contract on a school-by-school, issue-by-issue basis, saying in a public statement to members that’s the “ground war,” following the “air war” of the contract fight.

Jackson, for her part, said in her Friday blog post that over coming weeks she will “be checking in on our school communities to help support the healing process in any way I can.”

She added: “We will also share resources for principals and edu-

cators to help foster positive and productive conversations in their school communities about the strike and its role in our democracy. Children have had questions for their parents about the strike, and they will come back to school with more questions for their teachers. It’s critically important that we, the adults, come together to rebuild trust in our school communities for our young people. This is an opportunity for us to make these past two weeks a teachable moment.”

In the meantime, many parents, teachers and students said they’re just relieved to get back to their daily routines.

Veronica Lopez, who walked her sons Aiden and Luis to school Friday, said the strike was difficult for her because she works the overnight shift at Target and cared for her sons when she came home.

The strike ending is “for the best,” she said, adding that her kids only want to watch TV while they’re at home. “They don’t learn.”

At Sullivan High School in Rogers Park Friday, a group of teachers in red jackets lined the snowy steps, greeting students as they approached.

“It feels like a family reunion here,” said Jefri Pinacho, 17, a senior. He was relieved to come back because they’re getting ready for college and he was looking forward to seeing his friends again.

He supported the strikers and noted that one of the union’s biggest concerns of class sizes was present at Sullivan. Some freshman classes have more than 35 students, he said.

“If it got things done, then I’m glad it went on,” he said.

Sisters Nazia and Yaseena Azizi walked toward Sullivan together. Yaseena Azizi, an 18-year-old senior, said she was concerned about her college application — many early-decision applications were due Friday — but planned to talk to a counselor about what she

needed to do to catch up.

The sisters said their teachers explained to them why they were going on strike beforehand.

“They deserve everything. They work so hard,” said Nazia Azizi, a 17-year-old junior. “They are like, ‘We want the best things for you guys.’”

Both girls agreed they wished classes started back up on a Monday instead of a Friday, though — and that it wasn’t so cold.

Outside Joyce Kilmer Elementary School in Rogers Park, Michael Johnson came to drop off his youngest of seven children. During the time off from school, Johnson and his 4-year-old daughter spent time bonding by reading, watching movies and practicing the alphabet. Since he’s retired, it didn’t bother him to have her home.

But he said he was tired of the union going on strike.

“The union is not doing their job,” he said. “It’s like clockwork. It’s always something.”

Shakara Jolly, 31, is a single mother who lives right next to Kilmer Elementary, where she was outside getting her younger son’s wheelchair out of her car.

During the strike, her mom and sister helped watch her children. She tried to keep them mentally engaged by doing flashcards or spelling tests. Still, she is afraid they may forget what they learned earlier in the school year. Her younger son also missed out on some of his physical therapy and other resources he receives while in school.

But Jolly said she agreed with the teachers going on strike. Class sizes are too big, which means kids don’t get as much one-on-one attention.

“If I was a teacher, I would go on strike too,” she said. “I hope they came to a nice agreement for the kids.”

## Judge overrules IHSA, says CPS runners can compete

In a last-minute reversal of fortune, a Cook County judge allowed Chicago Public Schools cross-country runners whose season appeared doomed by the teachers strike to compete in Saturday’s state sectional meets.

The Illinois High School Association does not allow athletes to enter postseason competition if their districts are embroiled in a strike, or to join in the middle once a strike has settled. But Associate Judge Neil Cohen said that policy is “ambiguous and vague and not good enough to not have these children run their race.”

He added that the runners would see their conditioning and aspirations “go for naught” if they weren’t allowed to compete.

“I’m tired of adults determining whether a child gets to have a childhood,” he said.

The IHSA did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

The decision left CPS coaches scrambling to get their teams ready for Saturday’s meets. Bob Geiger, who coaches the boys team at Whitney Young, said he was trying to notify his runners and arrange for transportation to Roselle, where the race will be held at 2 p.m.

“It’s going to create a little more chaos, but out of it, we just hope to run well and end the season on a positive note,” he said. “It’s great for these seniors to have a shot. ... With our team, it’s a long shot to get a guy downstate, but it’s going to be nice to get that opportunity.”

Top finishers at sectionals qualify for next week’s state champi-

onship in Peoria.

Ian Bacon, a senior at Jones College Prep, said the ruling was an enormous surprise.

“It means everything,” he said. “The memories I made through this sport ... they mean the world.”

The court victory late Friday reversed a string of losses for the runners. They sought similar permission from a different Cook County judge last week before the start of regional meets, only to be turned down. On Friday morning, the IHSA board rejected an appeal, saying it wouldn’t be fair to athletes in other sports.

Meanwhile, 19 CPS football teams were getting ready for Saturday’s first-round playoff games, their seasons saved by the end of the walkout and a school district decision that allowed them to practice even as the strike

continued.

IHSA rules say teams that remain idle for a week or more because of a strike must practice for three days before they can play. On Wednesday, before a resolution was reached, CPS officials allowed the teams to practice under the supervision of non-union coaches, thus keeping them eligible to play Saturday.

Coaches in other sports said they wished their teams had been granted similar flexibility.

“We’re happy for the football kids,” said Adrian Calleros, the boys soccer coach at Solorio Academy High School. “We’re happy they get to play. But that’s where the frustration came in. All we wanted was the same thing they got.”

He said coaches had proposed putting soccer teams under the

stewardship of qualified non-union coaches, only to have administrators rule that out because of safety concerns. Those concerns, he noted, did not prevent football teams from getting the green light to practice.

His team was aiming for a state championship, and being forced out of the competition hurt his players, he said. While classes, tests and concerts can be rescheduled, he said, there’s no coming back from a sports season cut short.

“They don’t get to make that up,” he said. “For those high school seniors, they’re done. It’s their one opportunity, and it’s over and done with. It’s very frustrating.”

IHSA officials have said they will review the strike policy at their December meeting.

held the girl's hand while pressing against her chest to stop the bleeding. "She was holding my hand for three minutes and then she let me go. I have kids — I would go crazy if something happened to my kids."

The girl was taken in critical condition to Stroger Hospital, where police said she has been stabilized. Friends said the girl lives around the corner from the shooting.

The target of the gunfire was a 32-year-old man with a minor arrest record who happened to be walking near the girl. He was hit in the hand and ran off. Police found him a block away, but he refused to talk to investigators, officials said.

Friday morning, police took a juvenile in for questioning. He later was classified as the "primary suspect" in the shooting, and charges are pending, Chicago police spokesman Anthony Guglielmi tweeted that night.

"Those involved don't deserve to be in our city," Chicago police Superintendent Eddie Johnson told reporters Friday. "I'm disgusted but committed to doing everything we can to find the cowards that would engage in a gun battle in early evening hours while children were trick-or-treating."

He credited surveillance video and tips from the community. "We've had

really a great deal of tips coming in," he said. "That tells me that people are tired of this senseless violence. It also tells me that people are ready to come and work with the Police Department."

Little Village has been divided for decades by a continuing war between the Gangster Two-Six gang and the Latin Kings. The border for this conflict is roughly Ridgeway Avenue, not far from the shooting. Gangster Two-Six to the west, Latin Kings to the east.

As the Tribune reported two years ago, each side has its own high school, its own Catholic church, its own McDonald's and La Chiquita grocery store. Police estimate that hundreds have died in the long conflict and thousands have been wounded.

But Halloween still brings out hundreds of children and their parents to 26th Street.

The stretch between Kedzie and Kostner avenues is one of the most trafficked retail corridors in the city, lined with beautiful murals. On Kedzie, an arch spans 26th Street and reads "Bienvenidos a Little Village."

The area where the shooting happened is lined with a range of businesses. Day of the Dead banners decorated with skeletons line the street.

On Thursday night, El Nopal Bakery was swarmed with parents and children in costumes waiting their turn for a cookie and cake pop when the shooting started, according to Claudia Gon-

zalez, a worker there.

"I told them, 'Don't go outside, what we heard were gunshots, not fireworks,'" Gonzalez said in Spanish on Friday morning. Everyone stayed in the bakery until police arrived.

A similar scene played out at Anahy Olivera's flower shop on 26th Street. The store, already busy with trick-or-treaters, was soon filled with people who ducked inside after shots were fired.

She heard people yelling

in Spanish, "The girl," while others yelled, "Help him." She saw a man running with a child. That's when she knew a child had been shot and called 911.

"In one second they ruined the lives of the girl's family," Olivera said in Spanish. "I think it's unjust what they did."

While Olivera thinks police responded quickly to the shooting, she wished police officers would have been walking along 26th Street before the gunfire.

"There needs to be a change with police," she said. "They need to walk the streets when there are so many children around."

Another business owner, Estefania Velazquez, who runs a nearby salon, also said she would like to see more officers along the busy street, particularly on Halloween.

She thinks masks should be banned to prevent anyone from shielding their identity.

Gutiérrez Ramos, owner

of Nuevo Leon, described Little Village as a strong community that needs to come together to ensure justice for the girl.

"We have no room to tolerate this in Little Village," she said. "Tragic."

weather, which keeps people indoors. But if people get out into the snow and walk about, you can get a dazzling amount of light reflecting off the snow. And the combination of light and exercise is a very good combination for people with SAD."

Research strongly suggests that it is the light, not the cold, that is the key to

seasonal depression. Light therapy has been prescribed for SAD patients for years, and a 2018 study from Brown University neuroscientists found evidence of a pathway in the brain linking photo-sensitive cells in the retina with areas of the brain that control mood. "People need to understand the key importance of a lack of light," says Rosenthal, who has written "Winter Blues" a guidebook for treating seasonal depression.

Winter's shorter days al-

ready deprive the brain of light, but the end of daylight saving time can compound that effect for people already beginning to feel the onset of SAD, Rosenthal says.

"When the clocks turn back, that's supposed to give you an extra hour of light in the morning. But people with seasonal affective disorder typically have a hard time getting up in the morning. So light is being given back to them when they have the comforter over their heads, and then it gets

dark in the afternoon, when people with SAD are most likely more active."

That's why experts like Kelly Rohan, a professor and researcher at the University of Vermont, have identified the end of daylight saving time as the moment for SAD patients to start implementing strategies to beat their depression.

Rohan's research, which has focused on both light therapy and cognitive behavioral therapy approaches to treating SAD, has shown that a cognitive approach can be as effective as light therapy and may have longer-lasting benefits. Cognitive behavioral therapy for SAD involves developing two sets of skills: pro-active behaviors to counteract the tendency to hibernate, and thinking skills to recognize and counteract depressed thought patterns.

"Knowing about the illness and knowing about how to do things that make a difference can be very impactful," says Rosenthal. "What Dr. Rohan has done is to systematize a way of telling people how to deal with winter depression."

Part of the treatment, Rosenthal says, is planning ahead for winter. "Come up with a fun activity for every day," he says. "People with SAD tend to be hibernators, they want to curl up, they don't see people. That can become a negative spiral." He suggests alerting friends and family to your tendency to hide during the winter, and ask that they help you by reaching out to make plans.

"Get outside whenever you can," he says. "Find a buddy, and make a pact to

keep each other active."

Getting outside helps provide the light your brain needs to regulate mood. But Rosenthal is also a believer in light therapy, if done correctly. "Just going out and walking in a bright, snowy morning is going to help you," he says, but supplementing with a therapeutic light box is beneficial as well.

"There are a lot of light boxes available online," he says, "and some of them are very beneficial. I think a nice, large light is better than a teeny-weeny one — I recommend light boxes be at least 1 foot square, maybe more." He also recommends checking for brands that have been used in clinical research, as a measure of quality.

Some researchers have suggested that a DIY approach to light therapy can be hit-or-miss, in part because it's hard to know how much light you're getting. Rosenthal says that trying light therapy on your own is fine, but he suggests reading up to make sure you understand how to use the light box to its greatest effect.

It's important that the light be used in the morn-

ing, when it is most beneficial, and that it is used consistently. "If you skip a day, that's probably OK," he says. "But skip two days, and symptoms will start to come back. As you become aware that the light is helping you and making you more energetic, it becomes like brushing your teeth — you don't skip a day brushing your teeth."

Perhaps the most important step in fighting SAD, however, is the first one: just get started. "Intervene as soon as it's having an impact on your quality of life or function," Rosenthal says. "If you're sluggish, finding it hard to get yourself going, often it's a cognitive issue."

Get in touch with friends, start making plans and get moving quickly to stop the symptoms before winter and depression take hold.

And, in spite of the temptation to "fall back" when daylight saving time ends, dig yourself out from under those covers and treat your retinas to some sunlight. "Sleeping in," Rosenthal says, "is very bad for people with the winter blues."

ment almost all the \$8.8 trillion she estimates they would otherwise spend on private insurance for employees.

"We can generate almost half of what we need to cover Medicare for All just by asking employers to pay slightly less than what they are projected to pay today, and through existing taxes," she wrote.

Campaigning in Iowa, Warren said her plan was drafted with help from health care experts and economists. "If Joe Biden doesn't like that I'm just not sure where he's going," she said.

Companies with fewer than 50 employees that don't already sponsor coverage would be exempted from the proposal. And in a nod to unions whose support will be key in the

Democratic primary, Warren said that employers already offering health benefits under collective bargaining agreements will be allowed to reduce how much they send to federal coffers — provided they pass those savings on to employees.

For all the attention being paid to Warren's proposal, Sanders is the chief architect of Medicare for All. He has previously released several options to pay for it, including a 4% income tax "premium" that kicks in after the first \$29,000 for a family of four.

Some experts raised doubts about the Warren campaign's estimates.

"They are making more aggressive assumptions about the same things we already made aggressive assumptions about," said John Holahan, an economist at the Urban Institute who co-authored a recent cost analysis that the Warren campaign is using as a

starting point for its estimates.

A Republican-controlled Senate is unlikely to approve anything approaching Medicare for All. And if Democrats took the Senate majority, the party almost surely won't have enough votes to break a filibuster.

"There's the practical application of getting 60 people in the Senate who are going to vote for this," said former Iowa Gov. Tom Vilsack, who has consulted Warren on rural policy.

A critical question for Warren is whether her \$20 trillion cost estimate is accurate. The Urban Institute think tank recently pegged the cost closer to \$34 trillion over 10 years.

"This seems like an exercise to low-ball the revenues needed to actually make this enormous transition," said Emory University economist Ken Thorpe, who has done his own estimates of Medicare for All.

### Crews fight 'uphill battle' near LA

California gusts fan fast-moving wildfire as 8,000 told to flee

LOS ANGELES — Firefighters struggled Friday to contain a Southern California wildfire amid shifting winds, forcing authorities to expand evacuations as forecasters extended fire weather warnings into the weekend.

The blaze, dubbed the Maria fire, erupted late Thursday northwest of Los Angeles during what had been expected to be the tail end of a siege of Santa Ana winds that fanned destructively across the region, but a tug-of-war developed between those offshore gusts and the return of some onshore flow from the ocean.

"It has been an uphill battle ever since," Ventura County Fire Chief Mark Lorenzen said. "We are finding that the winds are starting to change and that presents its own challenges all by itself."

Wind shifts expose new areas of fuel to the fire, bringing "a pretty significant firefight," he said.

The fire burned down the sides of a mountain bordered by agricultural land, the small city of Santa Paula and other communities as it grew to 14 square miles. Airplanes tried to flank it with retardant while helicopters dropped water.

Some 8,000 people were under evacuation orders and 2,300 structures were threatened, Sheriff Bill Ayub said.

Red Flag warnings for gusts and low humidity

levels had been expected to expire Friday, but forecasters extended them to 6 p.m. local time Saturday for valleys and interior mountains of Ventura and Los Angeles counties.

"As recent fire activity has shown, this remains a dangerous environment for fire growth, even with weaker winds than earlier this week," the National Weather Service wrote.

Elsewhere, the state was free of fire weather warnings and only a few hundred utility customers were awaiting restoration of power that was shut off to wide areas in an attempt to prevent blazes involving electrical equipment and

strong winds.

In Northern California, more people were allowed to return to areas evacuated due to the huge Kincadee fire burning for days in the Sonoma County wine country.

The 121-square-mile fire was 67% contained, the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection said.

The tally of destroyed homes reached 167, and there were 33 more damaged, Cal Fire said. Many other structures also burned.

In Los Angeles, the last remaining evacuations were lifted in Brentwood, where a fire that erupted

near The Getty Center arts complex roared into ridge-top and canyon neighborhoods and destroyed eight expensive homes.

In eastern Ventura County, the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library reopened to the public after being forced to shut down Wednesday as a wind-driven wildfire swirled around the hilltop facility.

Firefighters were protecting avocado and citrus orchards and infrastructure, including radio communication facilities and high voltage electrical power lines.

For most of October, fires sprang up across the state, forcing residents to flee

homes at all hours as flames indiscriminately burned barns, sheds, mobile homes and multimillion-dollar mansions.

Nearly 200,000 Sonoma County residents were allowed to return home even as the fire that forced them to evacuate continued to burn.

Brenda Catelani choked up as she recalled driving back home to Windsor with her husband.

Chunks of burnt embers, burned leaves and ash littered the outside of her house.

The fire had come within 500 yards of their house — closer than the wine country fires of 2017 that killed

44 people and destroyed 8,900 homes and other buildings in Sonoma and Napa counties.

"We feel extremely lucky," Catelani said.

Evacuations were also lifted for two small fires, fed by gusts up to 60 mph, that destroyed homes Thursday in the heavily populated inland region east of Los Angeles. One of those blazes, in Jurupa Valley, was caused by dry grasses ignited when a stolen car chased by police tried to escape through fields.

The wildfires came even as many people were in the dark from the intentional outages.

In places where the power stayed on, utility lines and other electrical equipment were suspected or confirmed as the cause of several fires, including the one in Sonoma, another that started on a hillside above the San Fernando Valley of Los Angeles and one that burned around the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library in Simi Valley on Wednesday.

Pacific Gas & Electric finished restoring power to dozens of counties in the north and central regions after a third round of shut-offs this week designed to protect power lines from being damaged or toppled by high winds and sparking fires.

The most devastating wildfires in California's history have occurred in the past two years in the fall, fueled by a combination of built-up brush, dry conditions and extreme winds. The anniversary of the deadliest of those — last year's fire that torched the town of Paradise and killed 85 — is next week.

### Inquiry shifting to pair of White House lawyers

Investigators seek what led to shielding of Ukraine transcript

WASHINGTON — The House impeachment inquiry is zeroing in on two White House lawyers privy to a discussion about moving a memo recounting President Donald Trump's phone call with the leader of Ukraine into a highly restricted computer system normally reserved for documents about covert action.

Deepening their reach into the West Wing, impeachment investigators have summoned former national security adviser John Bolton to testify next week. But they also are seeking testimony of two other political appointees — John Eisenberg, the lead lawyer for the National Security Council, and Michael Ellis, a senior associate counsel to the president.

The impeachment inquiry is investigating Trump's call in which he asked Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy for "a favor" — one that alarmed at least two White House staffers who listened in on

the July 25 call.

Trump asked Zelenskyy to investigate Democrats in the 2016 election and former Vice President Joe Biden, a potential 2020 rival, as the Trump administration held up millions of dollars in military aid for the Eastern European ally confronting Russian aggression.

The lawyers' role is critical because two witnesses have suggested the NSC legal counsel — when told that Trump asked a foreign leader for domestic political help — took the extraordinary step of shielding access to the transcript not because of its covert nature but rather its potential damage to the Republican president.

Trump has repeatedly stressed that he knew people were listening in on the call, holding that out as proof that he never would have said anything inappropriate. But the subsequent effort to lock down the rough transcript suggests some people in the White House viewed the president's conversation as problematic.

Tim Morrison, outgoing deputy assistant to the president who handled European and Russian affairs at the

NSC, told impeachment investigators Thursday that military aid to Ukraine was held up by Trump's demand for the ally to investigate Democrats and Joe Biden.

Morrison testified that he was "not concerned that anything illegal was discussed" on the July 25 call, but he said that after listening to what Trump said he "promptly asked the NSC legal adviser to review it."

Lt. Col. Alexander Vindman, a Ukraine expert at the NSC, had the same reaction. He and Morrison were both in the Situation Room in the basement of the West Wing listening in on Trump's conversation with Zelenskyy. Vindman told impeachment investigators that he was alarmed by what he heard, grabbed his notes from the call and went to see Eisenberg.

"I did not think it was proper to demand that a foreign government investigate a U.S. citizen, and I was worried about the implications for the U.S. government's support of Ukraine," Vindman said.

Vindman said Eisenberg, who's known inside and outside the White House as a meticulous, deliberate lawyer, suggested moving the document that re-

counted the call to a restricted computer server for highly classified materials, according to a person who familiar with Vindman's testimony. The person was not authorized to publicly discuss it and spoke only on the condition of anonymity.

Ellis, the other White House lawyer being asked to testify, was with Eisenberg when he made the suggestion to move the document into the more secure server. Ellis is no stranger to White House controversies. The New York Times reported in March 2017 that he allowed his former boss Rep. Devin Nunes, R-Calif., then the

chairman of the House intelligence committee, to review classified material at the White House.

The material was to bolster Trump's claim that he was wiretapped during the 2016 campaign on the orders of President Barack Obama's administration. The intelligence reports consisted primarily of ambassadors and other foreign officials talking about trying to develop contacts in the inner circle of then President-elect Trump. The report was not confirmed by The Associated Press.

Eisenberg and Ellis, both part of the White House legal staff, declined to com-

ment through an NSC spokesman.

"Consistent with the practices of past administrations from both parties, we will not discuss the internal deliberations of the White House Counsel's Office," deputy press secretary Hogan Gidley said.

Mick Mulvaney, the acting White House chief of staff, has declined to discuss how the White House handles classified materials, but he denies that moving the memo about the call into the highly restricted NICE server — which stands for NSC Intelligence Collaboration Environment — amounted to a cover-up.

### Astronauts to bake cookies with new test oven

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Forget reheated, freeze-dried space grub. Astronauts are about to get a new test oven for baking chocolate chip cookies from scratch.

The next delivery of supplies for the International Space Station — scheduled for liftoff this weekend — includes the Zero G Oven. Chocolate chip cookie dough is already up there, waiting to pop into this

small electric oven designed for zero gravity.

The experiment explores the possibility of making freshly baked goods for space travelers. With NASA eyeing trips to the moon and Mars, homemade food takes on heightened importance. What's in orbit now are essentially food warmers.

Run by a New York couple, Zero G Kitchen aims to create a kitchen in space one appliance at a time, starting with the oven.

"You're in space. I mean,

you want to have the smell of cookies," said Zero G Kitchen's Jordana Fichtenbaum, a social media specialist for hotels and restaurants.

"The kitchen is really sort of the heart of the home to me, and the oven is kind of where it's at," Fichtenbaum said. "So just to make (space) more comfortable and make it more pleasant, more delicious."

Also collaborating on this first-of-its-kind space bake: Texas-based Nanoracks, which designed and built

the oven and arranged the flight, and DoubleTree, which supplied the same cookie dough used by the hotel chain for welcome cookies.

Previous station crews have created their own pizzas using flatbread and warmed them in the galley. Astronauts have attempted other creative cuisines, mixing and heating chopped onions and garlic, for instance, and whipping up salads from station-grown greens. Results have been mixed.



## Attack on unconscious girl in Spain ruled sex abuse, not rape

BARCELONA, Spain — Spaniards are voicing outrage after five men were acquitted of rape on the grounds that their 14-year-old victim had been unconscious at the time.

The Barcelona-based court ruled Thursday that the men were guilty of the lesser crime of sexual abuse and sentenced them to 10 to 12 years and fined them \$13,300.

It ruled that their act could not be considered sexual assault since the

girl was unconscious after consuming alcohol and drugs and so they did not need to use violence or intimidation, a requirement for a rape conviction in Spain.

Spain's deputy prime minister, Carmen Calvo, said that while her government does not comment on court decisions, it has set as a priority a modification in the law to make clear that consent is necessary for sexual relations to occur legally.

## Flooding in East Africa affects more than 1 million people

NAIROBI, Kenya — More than 1 million people in East Africa are affected by flooding after higher than normal rainfall, an aid group said Friday. Parts of the region are bracing for a tropical storm, Kyarr, that could worsen an already dire humanitarian situation.

The International Rescue Committee said many people had been reeling from an earlier period of severe drought. Now the

rains in parts of Somalia, South Sudan and Kenya are expected for another four to six weeks.

In Kenya, government spokesman Cyrus Oguna said 38 people have died as a result of about a month of flooding. The torrential rain is uncommon for this time of year, he said.

Experts called the floods a worrying sign of how climate change is affecting already vulnerable communities.

## Oklahoma board OKs largest US mass commutation

OKLAHOMA CITY — Oklahoma will release more than 400 inmates after the Oklahoma Pardon and Parole Board on Friday approved what officials say is the largest single-day mass commutation in U.S. history.

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt said his office would process the recommendations for final approval.

Voters approved a state question in 2016 that made simple drug pos-

session and low-level property crimes misdemeanors instead of felonies. Stitt signed a bill earlier this year that applied those sentences retroactively.

Pardon and Parole board head Steve Bickley says the mass release is the most on one day since former President Barack Obama commuted the drug sentences of 330 federal prisoners on his last day in office.

## Democrat Beto O'Rourke drops his 2020 presidential bid

WASHINGTON — Beto O'Rourke, the former Texas congressman, announced Friday that he was ending his Democratic presidential campaign, which failed to recapture the enthusiasm, interest and fundraising prowess of his 2018 Senate race.

In an online post, O'Rourke said, "My service to the country will not be as a candidate or as the nominee." He was scheduled to address supporters later Friday at an event in Iowa, where many of his supporters were blindsided by his announcement.

O'Rourke was urged to

run for president by many Democrats, including supporters of former President Barack Obama, who were energized by his narrow Senate loss last year in Texas, a reliably Republican state. He raised an astonishing amount of money from small donors across the country, visited every county in Texas and used social media and livestreaming video to engage directly with voters. He ultimately lost to incumbent Republican Sen. Ted Cruz by 3 percentage points.

But O'Rourke struggled to replicate that model in

the presidential primary, and both his polling and his fundraising dwindled significantly in recent months.

He also struggled with consistent vision and messaging as a presidential candidate.

O'Rourke did not endorse another Democrat for the nomination, saying "I'm going to be proud to support whoever that nominee is."

President Donald Trump quickly weighed in, saying in a tweet: "Oh no, Beto just dropped out of race for President despite him saying he was 'born for this.' I don't think so!"

## Trump names Wolf as new acting head of DHS

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump on Friday said Chad Wolf, a longtime Homeland Security official, would be the new acting head of the department, the fifth person in the job for this administration.

But Trump's casual announcement, made in re-

sponse to a reporter's question outside the White House, created even more uncertainty about who was in charge of the sprawling department.

Wolf was chief of staff to former DHS Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen. He has been involved with the 240,000-person depart-

ment off and on since its creation following the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

The DHS was envisioned as a cohesive counterterrorism operation. It includes the Coast Guard, disaster relief and election security. But for Trump, Homeland Security means one thing: immigration.



Johnson on Friday gently rebuffed Trump's suggestion and ruled out an electoral pact with Farage.

"If I may respectfully say to all our friends around the world the only way to get this thing done is to vote for us," Johnson told ITV News. "If you vote for any other party, the risk is you'll just get Jeremy Corbyn, the Labour Party, dither and delay."

All 650 seats in the House of Commons are up for grabs in the election that is coming more than two years early, with winners to be chosen by Britain's 46 million voters. If the Brexit Party runs in only a small number of seats, that would help the Conservatives, who are vying with Farage for the support of Brexit-backing voters.

## Spain steps in for Chile as host of UN climate talks

BERLIN — The United Nations global climate meeting next month will take place in Madrid after previous host Chile canceled at short notice, officials said Friday.

U.N. climate chief Patricia Espinosa said representatives of the body that organizes the annual conference had accepted Spain's offer to host it in the country's capital Dec. 2-13.

Chilean President Sebastian Pinera had announced Wednesday that he was canceling plans to host the meeting to focus on restoring security in his country following weeks of protests in which at least a dozen people have died.

Among those planning to attend the conference in Chile was Swedish activist Greta Thunberg, whose climate protests have inspired tens of thousands to demand greater efforts from world leaders.

**In North Korea:** North Korea confirmed Friday it conducted its third test-firing of a new "super-large" multiple rocket launcher that it says expands its ability to destroy enemy targets in surprise attacks.

The latest launches extended a monthlong streak of weapons displays by the North, which continues to use a standstill in nuclear negotiations to advance its military capabilities while pressuring Washington for concessions.

Washington and Pyongyang resumed working-level discussions in Sweden earlier this month, but the meeting broke down amid acrimony with the North Koreans accusing the Americans of maintaining an "old stance and attitude."

## Economy weathers trade, slowdown storm

WASHINGTON — A solid October jobs report Friday spotlighted the surprising durability of the U.S. economy in the face of persistent trade conflicts and a global slowdown.

The economy managed to add 128,000 jobs last month even though tens of thousands of workers were temporarily counted as unemployed because of the now-settled strike against General Motors. What's more, the government revised up its combined estimate of job growth for August and September by a robust 95,000.

Though the unemployment rate ticked up from 3.5% to 3.6% in October, it's still near a five-decade low.

And for a second straight month, average hourly wages rose a decent, if less than spectacular, 3% from a year ago.

The report from the Labor Department suggested that the economy has enough strength to keep expanding despite the threats from overseas, political tensions at home, a downturn in manufacturing and a chronic gap between the wealthiest Americans and everyone else.

The healthy level of hiring also makes it less likely that the Federal Reserve, which cut short-term interest rates this week for a third time this year, will do so again anytime soon.

"This was an unambiguously strong report," said Kathy Bostjancic, chief U.S. financial economist at Oxford Economics.

The jobs data put stock investors in a buying mood. The Dow Jones Industrial Average rose 301 points, up 1.1%, to close at 27,347.36.

Friday's jobs report also raised the prospect of further job growth to come. The settlement of the GM strike, which contributed to the temporary loss of 41,600 auto factory and likely other related jobs last month, seems sure to lead to a return of those jobs in coming months.

In addition, the labor force participation rate, a gauge of how many adults either have a job or looking for one, reached 63.3%, the best since 2013. That suggests that a rising number of people continue to think it's a good time to find a job.

Besides GM, a temporary drag on hiring last month was the U.S. Census. The government let go of 20,000 short-term workers who had been helping prepare for the 2020 survey.

The economy has been

expanding for more than a decade, the longest period of growth on record. But the bump from the 2018 tax cuts is fading, and an aging population and other demographic forces are slowing potential growth.

That slowdown could be worrisome for President Donald Trump, who is seeking re-election next year amid an impeachment inquiry. The economy appears unable to achieve the lasting growth of more than 3% annually that Trump had promised. Within 30 minutes of the jobs report's release, though, the president celebrated the figures on Twitter as a "blowout," adding that "USA ROCKS."

Job growth this year has averaged 167,000 a month, down from an average of 223,000 in 2018, according to Labor Department figures. Even so, hiring remains high enough to keep the unemployment rate from rising even as overall growth has become more

tepid. On Wednesday, the government estimated that the economy grew in the July-October quarter at a modest 1.9% annual rate.

Much of the fuel for overall U.S. growth has come from consumers, who drive about 70% of economic activity. Pay raises are helping some of them. In September, consumers modestly stepped up their spending, and their incomes grew fast enough to let them save more, too.

In a sign that consumer spending is helping to lead to more hiring, restaurants added 47,500 jobs last month.

But even as consumers help drive growth, business investment has become a drag on the economy. Collectively, businesses have slashed their spending on industrial machinery and other equipment, mostly because the U.S.-China trade war has made them reluctant to commit to big purchases.

## Google buys Fitbit for \$2.1B, says it won't monetize data

Google, the company that helped make it fun to just sit around surfing the web, is jumping into the fitness-tracker business with both feet, buying Fitbit for about \$2.1 billion.

The deal could put Google in direct competition with Apple and Samsung in the highly competitive market for smartwatches and other wearable electronics. But it also raises questions about privacy and Google's dominance in the tech industry.

The company's announcement Friday came with a promise that it won't sell ads using the intimate health data that Fitbit devices collect.

Fitbit is a pioneer in wearable fitness technology, making a range of devices that have become pop-culture accessories, from basic trackers that count how many steps you take each day to smartwatches that display messages and notifications from phones.

They can track activities such as running, cycling and swimming and record

heart rates and sleep patterns. Fitbit typically asks for date of birth, gender, height and weight to help with such things as estimating calories burned. Some people use Fitbit's app to record what they eat and how much water they drink. Women can track their periods.

Fitbit has 28 million active users worldwide and has sold more than 100 million devices.

Google, meanwhile, makes software for use in other manufacturers' wearable devices, but those products haven't gained

much traction in the face of competition from Fitbit, Apple, Samsung and others. And Google doesn't sell a device of its own.

The deal to buy Fitbit could give Google a needed boost.

"Google doesn't want to be left out of the party," said analyst Daniel Ives of Wedbush Securities. "If you look at what Apple has done with wearables, it's a missing piece of the puzzle for Google."

Google's pledge that it won't sell ads using Fitbit health data is a continuation of promises previ-

ously made by Fitbit.

Privacy experts, though, were skeptical.

Consumer Reports health privacy expert Dena Mendelsohn said she is concerned that people enrolled in wellness programs through their employers that use Fitbit devices could lose control over their data.

Google's promise is also unlikely to stop it from gathering up other information from Fitbit devices.

For example, Fitbit has GPS models that could track users' locations. That could help Google know

that a runner stopped at a coffee shop on the way home. Google could then display ads for rival coffee shops.

More important, having a Google device on the wrist could drive wearers to use Google services even more, giving the company more ways to sell ads.

The deal is likely to face scrutiny from state and U.S. Department of Justice antitrust authorities, who are already investigating Google and other big tech companies over whether they have abused their market power.

# In Little Village, a child's Halloween joy becomes a night of terror

It's impossible to imagine the thought process that led to this. It's Halloween, about 5:30 p.m., when streets and sidewalks across Chicago are teeming with costumed children holding bags of candy in one hand, a parent's hand in the other. They feel safe because ... it's Halloween.

A gunman hiding in an alley spots a gang rival across the street. The rival is walking amid a group of children trick-or-treating. Nearby is a 7-year-old girl dressed in what looked to be a Minnie Mouse outfit, walking with her father. Unfathomably, the gunman fires.

*He fires at someone in a crowd of trick-or-treating children.*

The rival is shot in the hand. Bullets hit the 7-year-old girl in the neck and chest. "My little girl's been shot!" her father screams. A woman in a cellphone store rushes the girl and her family into the store, using one hand to hold the girl's hand and the other to stem the bleeding from her chest.

"She was looking at me, and I was calling her name," the woman told the Tribune. "She was holding my hand for three minutes, and then she let me go."

The scene played out in Chicago's Little Village neighborhood Thursday night. As of this writing, the girl was hospitalized in critical but stable condition. The gunman and two other people with him fled and

haven't been caught.

Questions for that man and his accomplices: How do you decide to knowingly fire into a crowd of children? How do you decide to take a child's Halloween evening of carefree giddiness, and turn it into a night of terror?

This city has been here before. Rival gang members turning side streets filled with families into zones of urban warfare. Retaliation that claims innocents — people simply in the wrong place at the wrong time. A rationalization by gunmen that, in the barbarous world of tit-for-tat gang violence, collateral damage is acceptable.

Chicagoans hope and pray the girl in a hospital bed with bullet holes in her neck and chest heals, both physically and psychologically.

Chicago police Superintendent Eddie Johnson called the girl's shooting "reprehensible," adding the people responsible "do not deserve to live in our city." Tips from community members have been "overwhelming." Friday afternoon, police said they were questioning a juvenile.

For Johnson, Mayor Lori Lightfoot, and the rest of this city, there's no higher priority than road-mapping a way toward a more peaceful, safe Chicago, a time when a child's Halloween evening can unfold with joy and peanut butter cups. Not fear.

#### Federal inaction hurts anti-violence efforts

In "Trump came to Chicago. He yanked chains. He left." (Oct. 29), the Tribune Editorial Board seeks to separate the rhetoric of President Donald Trump from the everyday reality of our city.

While we appreciate the board's efforts, it missed the point. The president came to Chicago on a mission to show that he's the "law and order" candidate and to decry the city, his favorite punching bag.

But Chicago's violence is inseparable from federal inaction. According to the Chicago Police Department, more than half of all Chicago crime guns come from outside Illinois.

That's because Illinois is surrounded by states with lax gun laws that fuel the violence in Chicago, largely because federal statute prohibits the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives from re-inspecting noncompliant firearms dealers within a year of their violation. Illinois took action to fill that gap with state inspections — President Trump could take action too and amend the federal statute.

He chooses not to because President Trump and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell are ignoring reality and pandering to the National Rifle Association. NRA lobbyist Wayne LaPierre made no secret of his calls to the White House. Clearly the more than \$30 million in direct election support from the NRA didn't go to waste.

Many Americans support the common-sense gun safety agenda laid out and passed by House Democrats; more than 70% of gun owners support universal background checks because responsible gun

owners want to ensure sellers check a buyer's background before a purchase.

So, in answer to the board's question, "What was lost in the melee?": the facts and the human face of gun violence in Chicago.

Proven, community-based solutions will help solve the gun violence epidemic, not President Trump's inflammatory rhetoric.

If the president isn't willing to speak with real Chicagoans working to stop the violence, if he isn't willing to be part of the solution, if he isn't willing or even able to acknowledge the base facts of the gun violence epidemic in our country, then he's part of the problem.

That's not "melee"; that's just fact.

#### In the dark on new teachers contract

Despite the pain of the unnecessary and just-concluded teachers strike, Chicago is still in the dark on what additional pain taxpayers can expect from this new deal. Among the critical issues:

What if future state budgets that are dependent on unreliable or unproven revenue sources like casinos, cannabis, sports betting, robust economic growth and the yet-to-be approved progressive income tax fail to fully fund the new school aid formula, which is likely? Do property taxpayers get the big bill for the higher teacher salaries, step increases and more school support positions? Do teachers defer their salary and longevity increases?

Over 57,000 students attend more than 120 "public" charters in Chicago, and 1 in 4

high school students attend charter schools. Are charter schools receiving any new funding for additional school support and capital improvements, or from the sharing of tax increment financing surpluses?

Does the contract or any side agreements or commitments limit school choice opportunities for poor children in Chicago by preventing the creation of new charters or expansion of existing charter enrollment?

How will the student instructional day be impacted by the contract and the union's demand for more prep time?

What are the 80 specific "contract updates" sited on the CPS website and the costs, and how will each update benefit the kids?

These are just some of the questions that need to be answered.

Though it didn't solve all the problems, as he cheekily observed in his charming opening monologue on "Saturday Night Live," it set a good example.

In worldwide online news coverage monitored by the GDELT Project, mentions of the term (in days immediately after Trump's invocation of lynching) were almost double those during the Jussie Smollett story earlier this year, and more even than the April 26, 2018, opening of the memorial in Montgomery, Alabama, to actual victims of lynching. ...

Combining mentions of "lynching" with mentions of "noose," the timeline shows that the Smollett story was largely framed by the media as involving a "noose" rather than as a "lynching." ...

Yet the actor's claim that a noose was placed around his neck by his assailants was meant, at the very least, to mimic a lynching, and some of the public commentary decrying the incident employed that language.

# Clash of the titans

As Apple, Disney and HBO enter the streaming world, how will movies be affected?

As mighty players including Apple and Disney prepare to go up against the likes of Netflix and Amazon, industry observers are busy speculating about which corporate behemoth will come out on top in the coming streaming wars. But cinephiles, filmmakers and the traditional gatekeepers of the movie business have their own concern: Namely, will the art form they love benefit from this clash of the titans, or will it end up suffering collateral damage?

That the film business has already been profoundly reshaped by streaming will come as news to no one. In less than a decade, Netflix and Amazon have upended a century-old distribution business and accelerated moviegoers' shift from their neighborhood multiplexes and toward their big-screen TVs, tablets and (gasp!) even their phones. Widely branded a mortal enemy to traditional moviegoing, streaming services have nevertheless won over many movie fans and filmmakers by creating a vibrant new market for the sort of risky, outside-the-tentpole fare that has largely been abandoned by the major studios.

Over the next six months, the entry of three major newcomers into this already topsy-turvy landscape — Disney Plus, Apple TV+ and HBO Max — will likely heighten the general sense of uncertainty. Executives at all three companies either declined or were unavailable to speak with The Times about their plans. But from what they've announced so far, it's possible to begin to glean a sense of their varying film strategies — including just how much of an emphasis they may place on movies relative to the more bingeable series that are the bread and butter of the streaming realm.

Launching Friday, Apple TV+ has announced that its first three films will receive theatrical releases before debuting on the platform, a necessary step to qualify films for awards consideration. But those releases will be limited, given the major theater chains' long-held resistance to the shorter theatrical windows common for streamers.

The documentary "The Elephant Queen" opened in select cities Oct. 18, two weeks before it will be available as part of the Apple TV+ launch lineup. Director Minhal Baig's coming-of-age film "Hala" opens Nov. 22 before hitting the platform in December. The period drama "The Banker," starring Anthony Mackie and Samuel L. Jackson, arrives in theaters Dec. 6 before debuting on Apple TV+ in January. The company's highest-profile original film project, Sofia Coppola's dramedy "On the Rocks," is expected to debut in mid-2020 after what some believe could be a premiere at the Cannes Film Festival.

By adopting this approach, Apple — which signed a partner-

ship last year with indie studio A24 — is clearly signaling its intention to vie with Netflix and Amazon to attract major filmmakers, who by and large still prefer to see their pictures play on the big screen.

Amazon has historically released its films in theaters 90 days before making them available on its Prime Video platform, though it has begun testing shorter windows (upcoming releases "The Report" and "The Aeronauts" will be streaming two weeks after opening in theaters) and will forgo theatrical releases for some titles going forward.

Netflix, which puts out more films per year than all the studios

combined, has offered exclusive theatrical windows for a number of its recent awards contenders (Martin Scorsese's "The Irishman" will be in theaters for 27 days before its streaming launch, and Noah Baumbach's "Marriage Story" will get 30 days), but it still releases the bulk of its titles either simultaneously via streaming and in theaters or, more often, solely on the Netflix platform.

Apple TV+ will have just one original film available at launch, compared with nine new series — not to mention that it has TV right there in the name — suggesting where its priorities may lie, at least in the near term.

Disney Plus, which launches

Nov. 12, is taking an entirely different tack, one that reflects its already dominant position as the leading movie studio in terms of market share. For Disney, whose pipeline is perennially stocked with big-screen offerings from powerhouse brands like Marvel, Pixar and "Star Wars," the streaming platform will provide a home not just for its vast catalog of existing titles but also for smaller new films that may not have quite as wide an appeal but will nevertheless attract family audiences.

At launch, Disney Plus will offer just one original film, a live-action reboot of its 1955 animated movie "Lady & the Tramp," compared with eight new series. But several other new pictures are slated to debut on the platform in its first year, including the Christmas movie "Noelle," starring Bill Hader and Anna Kendrick; an adaptation of the 2000 YA novel "Stargirl"; and a sled-dog adventure movie called "Togo." During the company's most recent earnings call in August, Disney Chief Executive Bob Iger told Wall Street analysts that Fox Searchlight, which the studio acquired as part of its purchase of 20th Century Fox, will also make movies for the streaming platform, por-

tending further potential shifts to come in the awards season landscape.

Scheduled to launch in spring, WarnerMedia's HBO Max has not revealed much yet about its film strategy, though its slate of original series and miniseries is already robust. This year, the company announced production deals with producer Greg Berlanti ("Love, Simon") as well as with Reese Witherspoon's production shingle, Hello Sunshine, to initially produce four and two films for the service, respectively. Production is underway on the inaugural movie under Berlanti's deal, an adaptation of the YA novel "UNpregnant," as well as a new film from director Steven Soderbergh, "Let Them All Talk," starring Meryl Streep and Lucas Hedges.

Earlier this month, HBO Max announced it had picked up the Melissa McCarthy comedy "Superintelligence," originally slated to hit theaters in December, for an exclusive streaming release this spring. Given HBO's traditional strength in documentaries, the service is also likely to provide direct competition to Hulu, which has prioritized nonfiction movies, including "Minding the Gap" and "Ask Dr. Ruth," in its own original-film strategy.

## Raymund will return for 'Chicago Fire' episode

Monica Raymund, who played firefighter and paramedic Gabriela Dawson for six seasons on "Chicago Fire," will appear in an episode later this month.

The winter finale, titled "Best Friend Magic" (which airs Nov. 20), will see Dawson dipping back into the storyline with her ex, Matthew Casey (Jesse Spencer). When her character left the show — and left her marriage — it was to work full time in Puerto Rico on Hurricane Maria relief efforts.

Raymund told Entertainment Weekly that "fans can expect sparks to fly" from the reunion, though it is unclear whether Dawson's return might involve more episodes in the future.

"Chicago Fire" involves a 10-month commitment from its regular cast members, and Raymund has moved on since leaving

the show two years ago in Season 6. She stars on the forthcoming Starz drama "Hightown" as an irreverent employee of a federal fishery agency who discovers a dead body that's tied to an underground drug trade.

"I have the opportunity to start the next chapter of my life and I'm very much looking forward to that," she told me last year. "I knew my six-year contract was coming to an end and I was hungry to explore a different role, a different story. I wanted to explore a different world."

"I had been in Chicago for five years and just personally where I was in my life, I was ready to create my home and kind of plant some roots in Los Angeles."

In the Season 8 premiere earlier this year, Yuri Sardarov's Otis, a firefighter on the show since the beginning, was killed off after sustaining injuries in a mattress factory fire.

Here's what Sardarov told me in October about moving on from the show: "I started getting this inkling of: Man, it's been nearly eight years of doing the same thing. And this is casino money that I have (laughs). I mean that sincerely. This is house money that I've been playing with for nearly a decade. This was never supposed to happen ... And going into Season 8, we'd done 180 episodes of television and you need a kick-start — you need something that will get the audience reinvested. And what better way than to get rid of a beloved character who is, in many ways, the character that nobody would expect to go, the comedic relief?"

Back in September, showrunner Derek Haas teased on Twitter that yet another character may be exiting the show in the near future. "What can we expect with Kelly (Taylor Kinney) and Casey (Jesse Spencer) this season?" a

viewer asked, to which Haas replied cryptically: "They won't both be at (Firehouse) 51 before the winter break."

Next week's episode is the


season's seventh (called "Welcome to Crazytown") and directed by Chicago native Carl Seaton.

## Woman may have to come out again

**Dear Amy:** I am a woman questioning my sexuality. I have been married to a man for over 20 years and we have children together. (I have not told my husband about my struggles, as he is homophobic.)

This has been a difficult and confusing time, and I have been in therapy throughout. My therapist says it's common for women to discover this in their 40s — to realize they are attracted to another woman, even though they may have been married to a man for many years.

I am in love with a friend — a woman. I was attracted to her before we became friends. We are very close but have only known each other for about a year. We are both going through divorces. (She found out that her husband is trans, and gay.)

We see each other nearly every day. We go out to dinner, movies, plays, museums, etc., as friends. I have never felt closer to another woman. We get along well and have so much fun together. Sometimes I think she feels the same way about me.

I recently came out to her, but through choking words and sobbing, I'm not sure she understood what I was saying. I did not exactly say, "I am gay." She never brought it up after that, but for me, a weight has been lifted off my shoulders.

I feel like a hypocrite giving her advice about her husband. I want her to be able to lean on me through good and bad times.

Should I tell her my true feelings?

**Dear Confused:** Coming

out is a process, and you're in the midst of it. You will continue to express your truth to various people in various ways over this transitional period.

Yes, I think you should continue to talk about this with your friend, even if it is awkward. One way to do so would be for you to discuss with her some of the conversations you're having in therapy. She may not have grasped that you are gay — and you can laugh about that missed communication later.

Yes, you should come out again to her. I do not think you should tell her that you are in love with her, however. You are both going through divorces. Regardless of whether she is also into you, you should walk around in your own identity for a while and gain some confidence and emotional stability before making any declarations.

**Dear Amy:** I am a married 50-year-old woman with a lovely family. My parents live just down the road. They think I should make more effort to visit, but here lies the problem.

I lived with my parents briefly in my early 30s while going to school and changing careers. I stayed in a suite in the basement. The rule was to never come upstairs unless I called first, and yet my mother was controlling and verbally abusive — coming into my area at all times — so I left after about four months.

I moved out of the city, got married, had a child and moved back to where they live. In the few years I was gone, my brother's marriage ended. He had no children and moved into

the basement suite at my parents' house. That was 16 years ago. He is now 55.

He does not work. He does not contribute. Mother cooks for him, cleans for him and lends him money. He takes his meals back down to the basement. He is not supporting them even emotionally.

I am baffled at the way they treat him compared with my experience there. I can't bring myself to even visit their home, it makes me sick to see. Am I right to just stay away? They complain about him still being there but do nothing to push him out the door.

I can understand why you don't enjoy spending time embroiled in this toxic system, and I think you should explain why.

## Actress Mbatha-Raw dazzles with variety of jobs

Multifaceted talent shines this fall in 3 diverse projects

Sometimes it seems like Gugu Mbatha-Raw is playing some crazy version of showbiz bingo.

This is a woman who has assembled an astonishing variety of roles in her 36 years. Big-budget Hollywood blockbuster? Sure, "A Wrinkle in Time." What about an 18th century English drama? Of course, "Belle." Any romantic comedies? Check out "Larry Crowne."

She's been on Broadway, in Shakespeare's "Hamlet" no less. And a classic Disney musical with "Beauty and the Beast." Sci-fi? Of course, look at "Cloverfield Paradox." Voicing a puppet? Check out "The Dark Crystal: Age of Resistance."

"I always like the idea of being a chameleon," Mbatha-Raw says. "I always like to feel like I'm stretching myself and doing something opposite to what I did before. Because that keeps me interested and hopefully keeps other people interested."

The actress has a clutch of projects coming out this fall, and they're typically diverse: the film noir feature "Motherless Brooklyn," the flagship Apple TV+ streaming drama "The Morning Show" and the searing indie film "Farming."

Mbatha-Raw plays a love interest opposite Edward Norton in the actor-director's adaption of Jonathan Lethem's 1999 novel "Motherless Brooklyn" about a private eye with Tourette's syndrome.

Norton went back in time to plunk the artist in 1959 and created Mbatha-Raw's character, a community activist from Harlem who forges an unexpected bond with the detective.

"They're both over-looked in different ways,"

she says. "I think they see something in each other where no one else sort of sees them, which I thought was really beautiful."

Mbatha-Raw is an actress who does her research. For "A Wrinkle in Time," she visited NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, so naturally she went to great lengths to get the tone right — walking around Harlem, listening to Miles Davis and Billie Holiday.

"When you're filming in New York, the history is all around you," she says. "And

it's such a treat because it really grounds you in a sense of place and time," she said.

Mbatha-Raw goes from the '50s to the present day for "The Morning Show," a series about the cutthroat

off-camera world of a morning TV show that stars Jennifer Aniston, Reese Witherspoon and Steve Carell.

She plays an ambitious talent booker and says the show is deeply influenced

by our post-#MeToo-era media landscape.

"It goes to some really interesting dark places," she says. "It's quite juicy and Machiavellian."

Mbatha-Raw graduated from London's Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts and soon found parts on TV and the stage, like on "Doctor Who" and opposite Jude Law in "Hamlet." Subsequent highlights include the Emmy-winning "Black Mirror" episode "San Junipero" and her first starring film role in "Belle."

Her work often explores race — as she did playing a biracial aristocrat in "Belle" — but she's also appeared in work in which her own race is not commented on, like in the multicultural cast of "A Wrinkle in Time."

Mbatha-Raw's father

grew up under apartheid in South Africa, and her mother is white and British. "Identity interests me," she says. "I like the freedom to be a three-dimensional artist that can explore all sides of humanity."

She has steered sharply into the topic of racial identity in one current project — "Farming," the harrowing, real-life tale of an African immigrant to England in the 1970s who somehow became a skinhead. It's based on the life of Adegwa Akinuoye-Agbaje, who directs, co-stars and wrote the screenplay.

Mbatha-Raw plays a kindly teacher, an amalgam of three or four real people who helped get Akinuoye-Agbaje's life back on track. The film is a terrifying look at identity and belonging.

"When I first read the script, I thought, 'Oh, this is brutal. This is really harrowing.' But I think you have to go on that journey. And I think it's one of those ugly parts of our British history that we need to heal from. I think you have to sort of acknowledge these parts of history."

Akinuoye-Agbaje had worked with Mbatha-Raw before — notable on the film "Concussion" — and needed an actress who exuded benevolence and purity. "While she's an amazing talent as an actress, she has that as a human being," he says. "It's just so effortless for her."

Mbatha-Raw, who in 2017 became a Member of the Order of the British Empire for her services to drama, makes her home in Los Angeles these days. This year marks the 10th anniversary of her first visit to America.

"I definitely consider myself British still, but I love America. I just love the spirit here. I love the work that gets made here. I think it's a fascinating bundle of contradictions and it's a dynamic place to live and work."

# Norton writes, directs a sturdy, wordy whodunit

feet, mentally and physically, skills no doubt honed from a childhood spent in a Brooklyn Catholic orphanage with a disruptive neurological disorder. But Lionel also has a near-perfect echoic memory for words and voices, details and clues erupting in involuntary bursts of sing-songy rhymes that serve, in part, as

mnemonic devices. Lionel was scooped up out of the orphanage by Frank Minna (Bruce Willis), and now he's one of "Minna's Boys," aiding the war vet in his private investigation business. When Frank is whacked during a meeting with a mysterious group of men, Lionel becomes hellbent on solving Frank's murder, plunging into the unknown territory of New York politics, roiling with class and racial strife as black neighborhoods are condemned and razed for development under Randolph's all-powerful hand.

The snappy investigative procedural is a pleasure to watch unfold, especially with the offbeat detective at the center. Norton's performance could be cartoonish, but he executes it with aplomb, the

twitches and tics motivated and authentic to the character and his experience of the world.

Seen through Lionel's eyes, the perspective is deeply empathetic, but in some ways myopic. He

wants to do the right thing for people he cares about, such as Frank and new friend Laura (Gugu Mbatha-Raw), a young aide to a city official tackling the housing crisis. But that's about as far as Lionel's humanitarian streak goes.

It seems a bit strange that Norton would insert the Moses story and engage with the city's dark history of development without saying much more than a vague condemnation of "power" and the morally corrupt nature of people who seek it. This is a solid and enjoyable mystery flick, but through all the twists, turns, tics and twitches "Motherless Brooklyn" works hard to impart its message. And what ultimately comes out is somewhat hollow.

eight, but that takes more courage than East could muster. Berkowitz ruffed the ace of hearts and had to decide how to play the black suits. This was a team game, so overtricks didn't


matter — just safety. Berkowitz decided to lay down the ace of spades. Should the king of spades be onside, with East, it would still be there later, and his goal was to assure no more than one spade loser, if possible. Lucky Berkowitz saw the king fall under his ace as West leaned farther back in his chair.

Assured now of only one spade loser, Berkowitz turned his attention to clubs and gave that suit the same treatment. He led a club to dummy's ace, no doubt disappointed not to drop that king also. Berkowitz crossed back to his hand and led another club. He mis-guessed by playing dummy's queen, but he had his contract, losing one spade and two clubs.


At the other table, the contract failed when declarer led a spade to the queen and then later a club to the queen. No luck in either suit. He probably wasn't an expert!

## Offense's only constant is Robinson

Wide receiver on pace for 105 catches, 7 TDs

Wide receiver Allen Robinson gave the Eagles all they could handle in the Bears' wild-card-round loss nine months ago. Mitch Trubisky threw his way 13 times, and Robinson responded with 10

catches for 143 yards, including a 22-yard go-ahead touchdown catch in the fourth quarter and a clutch 25-yard grab on the game's final drive.

Robinson took advantage of a favorable matchup against Eagles cornerback Avonte Maddox. But he might have to work harder Sunday to get himself free with the Eagles closer to full strength in their defensive backfield and

likely to defend him with heavy doses of cornerbacks Ronald Darby and Jalen Mills.

Still, if there has been one constant in the Bears' shaky offense this season, it has been Robinson, who is on pace for 105 catches, 1,202 yards and seven touchdowns. Those are practically Hall of Fame numbers considering just how constipated the rest of the Bears offense has been.

Furthermore, Robinson's value goes beyond his statistical production. He remains one of the team's most reliable leaders, a fierce competitor who holds himself to a high professional standard in everything he does. On game days. At practices. In meetings. In the locker room.

Robinson, per usual, has carried himself with a positive approach this week, to be a light that helps the

## 'I love the spot I'm in'

Now a Piston, Rose aims to model behavior for future stars, hints at return to Bulls

Derrick Rose returned to the United Center on Friday night as far more than a backup guard for the Pistons. "I have three kids," he said. "I'm settled. I'm more mature now."

Rose is comfortable in his skin — and his jersey. He wears No. 25 to salute Ben Wilson, the iconic Simeon player who in 1984 was shot and killed before his

senior season at age 17.

"Ever since I went to New York, I said I'd have a piece of Chicago with me," Rose said after the Pistons' morning shootaround. "I'm trying to take that legacy in and represent it with respect."

"Where I'm from, the inner city, people tend to lash out. Everyone in my situation, they handle things with their fists. It's just not who I am and what I represent. I love the spot I'm in right now. I'm trying

to be an example for the next Derrick Rose."

Fans gave Rose a huge ovation when he entered the game midway through the first quarter with the Pistons trailing the Bulls 10-8.

Rose played a quiet three minutes before blowing past Kris Dunn, pump-faking and finishing with his left hand for a three-point play.

## OSU's Young best of best?

Is this the worst slate of games in Big Ten history? We're in a rare double-bye season, and the result is a Week 10 with only four games and one ranked team (Michigan) playing.

The only game featuring a single-digit point spread pits Nebraska, coming off back-to-back losses, against 2-6 Purdue. May I recommend the Netflix series "Living with Yourself" for Saturday viewing?

Let's pivot to more intriguing odds: the Heisman Trophy.

LSU's Joe Burrow is even money to win. Wow. He opened at 200-1, according to the Action Network. Oklahoma's Jalen Hurts also is on the rise, from 6-1 in August to 7-4.

Alabama's Tua Tagovailoa and his "game-time" ankle have slipped from 3-1 to 4-1. Trevor Lawrence (eight interceptions and no real competition remaining for Clemson) has tumbled from 5-2 to 100-1.

The most intriguing option is Ohio State sackmaster Chase Young at 20-1. I have a vote, and he probably would be first on my ballot after what I saw him do to Wisconsin (four sacks, five tackles for a loss, countless nightmares for Badgers quarterback Jack Coan).

Does he have a real chance? I asked ESPN's Kirk Herbstreit.

"You and I live this sport," he said. "If guys that voted on the Heisman were like me and you, I'd say absolutely, he can win. Right now with Tua down with an injury, (Young) and Joe Burrow are right there. Then you look at some of the (previous years') results and when people voted ... it's almost like they (based it) on a preseason magazine.

"So can he win it? I'd like to think so. The ballot says the most outstanding player in college football. It doesn't say the most outstanding offensive player. I'd vote for a game-wrecker, but based on past years and these voters, I do not have high hopes."

The temptation is to predict the Irish will channel their rage, but the **Hokies** are 5-2, rested and averaging 39.7 points in their last three games.

### Georgia (minus 6) vs. Florida

2:30 p.m., CBS-2  
Ahhh, a battle between two top-10 teams. And two teams that need to win to stay in the College Football Playoff chase. Florida has been an underdog five times under Dan Mullen, winning three outright. (One glaring exception: Georgia's 36-17 thumping last year.) # 4-star point guard Curbelo commits to Illini

For the third consecutive recruiting class, Illinois coach Brad Underwood has landed a commitment from a top-60 national prospect.

Andre Curbelo, a four-star point guard from Puerto Rico who plays at Long Island Lutheran in Glen Head, N.Y., chose the Illini over Miami on Friday morning during a ceremony at his high school.

The 6-foot Curbelo is the No. 55 player in the Class of 2020, according to 247Sports.com's composite rankings, and the No. 9 point guard.

He's the second member of Illinois' 2020

class, joining three-star power forward Coleman Hawkins of Prolific Prep in Napa, Calif. Illinois is also heavily in the mix for four-star Morgan Park guard Adam Miller, the nation's No. 31 recruit.

Curbelo pulled an Illini cap from under a table and donned it at his news conference at Long Island Lutheran. Digital photos of him in an Illinois uniform appeared behind him.

He held up a Puerto Rican flag as family and friends cheered his decision.

"This journey started when I was 13. It was crazy what I had to do," he said of moving to New York. "I wanted better opportunities on and off the court."

Curbelo figures to be a key piece of the Illini's future. While Andres Feliz and Kipper Nichols are the only scholarship seniors on this season's roster, sophomore guard Ayo Dosunmu is widely expected to enter the 2020 NBA draft.

Dosunmu, the No. 32 player in the Class of 2018, began the streak of top-60 recruits. In 2019 Illinois signed center Kofi Cockburn, who was ranked 46th nationally.

Assistant coach Orlando Antigua played a pivotal role in Illinois landing Curbelo. According to Illini Inquirer, Antigua played professionally in Puerto Rico with Curbelo's father, Joel, a member of Puerto Rico's 1996 Olympic team.

# Georgia looks to get back in the College Football Playoff hunt

From a top-10 Southeast Conference matchup to a prime-time Group of 5 showdown to more Atlantic Coast Conference Coastal chaos, there's something for everyone this weekend.

Here are the most intriguing questions for Week 10:

### Can Georgia get back into the playoff race?

The No. 8 Bulldogs' bye week came at an opportune time, as Georgia was able to rest up, figure out its problems on offense and prepare for Saturday's matchup with No. 6 Florida.

Despite their shocking loss to South Carolina a few weeks ago, the Dawgs are still in contention for an SEC title and possible playoff berth. But they'll need to win out to accomplish those lofty goals, and given the tough slate ahead, it seems unlikely to happen. ESPN's Football Power Index gives Georgia just a 6.0% chance of winning out and 18.4% chance of winning the confer-

ence. The Dawgs are more likely headed for a 9-3 season than a trip to the national championship game.

Georgia has the blue-chip talent necessary to make a run at an SEC title, but Kirby Smart's questionable in-game coaching decisions and a reluctance to be more aggressive on offense and unshackle quarterback Jake Fromm might hold the Dawgs back.

Florida, led by its own strong defense and a more talented offense, will be Georgia's biggest test to date.

### Who's set up better for success in the future: SMU or Memphis?

No. 15 SMU (8-0) and No. 24 Memphis (7-1) meet in prime-time Saturday night, and the winner will be in the driver's seat in the American Athletic Conference West as it looks to win its first conference title and secure a Cotton Bowl bid. It's a clash of two programs on the rise, and impossible to overstate how meaningful it will be.

The Mustangs hadn't been nationally ranked since 1986, the year before receiving the NCAA death penalty, and have been to

just one bowl game in the past six seasons. Suddenly, under Coach of the Year candidate Sonny Dykes, SMU is 8-0 and has a chance to win 10 or more games for the first time since 1984.

The Tigers, meanwhile, have been to five straight bowl games after reaching just five total in their first 53 years. Justin Fuente built Memphis back into a competitive program before leaving for Virginia Tech at the end of the 2015 season, and Mike Norvell has picked up where he left off, guiding the Tigers to a 33-15 record.

Saturday's game not only has major implications for the AAC, but the Group of 5 at large. Both of these programs are set up to become perennial contenders on par with UCF and Boise State, especially if they can recruit well in the talent-rich areas they reside.

### Is USC really a Pac-12 contender?

For all the questions surrounding coach Clay Helton's job security, the Trojans hold the top spot in the Pac-12 South and can earn their second victory over a top-10 conference opponent Saturday when they host No.

# Mack says no need for revenge-game angle

The Bears wrapped up their week of practice Friday at Halas Hall before they take off for Philadelphia to play the Eagles on Sunday.

Here are four things we learned as they try to put an end to a three-game losing streak.

## 1. Eagles coach Doug Pederson told Philadelphia reporters rookie tackle Andre Dillard is about to face the 'biggest challenge of his young career.'

That challenge is helping to stop Bears outside linebacker Khalil Mack, whom Pederson expects to spend a good amount of time taking on the rookie. Dillard, the No. 22 pick this spring, will start his third straight game in place of veteran left tackle Jason Peters, who has been ruled out of with a knee injury.

The Eagles are bound to employ multiple tactics, including chip blocks, to stop Mack, who leads the Bears with 5½ sacks.

"You mentally prepare for it," Mack said. "You look at all the situations where they do it in the game, when they like to do it. So it's just getting ready for it, mentally and physically."

Mack has played the Eagles twice in his career, and both times were against former backup quarterback Nick Foles. But from watching film on Carson Wentz, Mack said "you know that you've got your hands full."

"He's a hell of a quarterback, man," Mack said. "He stays in the pocket, takes hits, is a real physical guy. A magician back there. He can duck and dodge and still make throws that a lot of quarterbacks don't really make."

## 2. Khalil Mack said the revenge-game narrative isn't needed this week.

The Eagles eliminated the Bears from the playoffs in January, and most of the current Bears felt the sting of that 16-15 loss. But coach Matt Nagy hasn't used it as motivation this week, and Mack understands why. A win Sunday would bring the Bears back to .500 and keep the season from spiraling further, and that's big enough.

"If you look at the situation in itself, you've got to understand that a win is going to be huge on Sunday," Mack said. "It's going to be one of those games where you've got to get it by any means."

"When you think about the game of football, you only have fun when you're winning."

"That's the whole point. We want to get back to having fun, and that starts with making plays and getting stops early and getting turnovers defensively."

Mack indicated the defense had some help off the bat getting ready this week.

The unit was on the field for only 45 snaps and 22 minutes Sunday against the Chargers as the Bears offense made strides at moving the ball down the field (though not scoring).

"I was trying to figure out why I felt the way I did Monday," Mack said. "It's one of those situations where you use it to your advantage and get ready for the next week."

## 3. Bears coach Matt Nagy will have a homecoming of sorts Sunday.

Nagy's hometown of Manheim, Pa., is about 85 miles from Philadelphia. The University of Delaware, where he played in college, is about 50 miles away. And Nagy

started his coaching career as an intern under Andy Reid with the Eagles.

"Growing up, I was surrounded by all the Eagles fans," Nagy said. "But being from that area and then going to Delaware, which isn't far away from there, we have some local ties there. So there will be a bunch of family and friends there. But you put that aside and you really just know why you're coming back — and that's to focus on winning."

## 4. Trey Burton isn't expecting a warm welcome from the Eagles.

The Bears tight end helped the Eagles win Super Bowl LII when he threw the "Philly Special" touchdown pass, and he didn't hurt their playoff run last year, either, considering he missed the Bears' loss with a groin injury.

But he's not expecting to feel the love.


"I have no clue," Burton said. "They didn't cheer for Santa, so I doubt they'll cheer for me."

He expects his emotions will be "high," however, as he returns to the place he played the first four years of his career, though he would probably prefer to do it when he's having a better season.

As he continues to battle a nagging groin injury, Burton has just 14 catches for 84 yards this season.

He was listed as limited on the Bears injury report Friday with that issue, as were safety Eddie Jackson (hamstring), wide receiver Taylor Gabriel (shin) and defensive lineman Bilal Nichols (knee). All are expected to play Sunday.

Outside linebacker Isaiah Irving (quad) was the only player ruled out.

## Seahawks claim WR Gordon

The Seahawks added a big wide receiver in name and in stature, landing Josh Gordon off the NFL waiver wire, the Seattle Times reported.

Gordon played in six games for the Patriots this season, compiling 20 receptions, 287 yards and a touchdown. He hasn't played since being knocked out of a game on Oct. 10 with a knee injury and was released by the Patriots on Thursday.

"He's a unique talent," Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said. "Next week, we'll take a look and see what he looks like."

Gordon, 28, was suspended indefinitely last December for violating the terms of his conditional reinstatement under the NFL's drug policy. His suspension was lifted in August.

The former second-round pick by the Browns out of Baylor in 2012 has more than 4,100 career receiving yards and 20 touchdowns over six years in the NFL, but spent both 2015 and 2016 out of the league serving multiple suspensions for violating the league's substance abuse policy.

## Mahomes listed as questionable:

Chiefs quarterback Patrick Mahomes is questionable for Sunday's game against the Vikings, raising the possibility the league MVP could return after missing just one game with a dislocated kneecap.

As he did last week, Mahomes practiced on a limited basis this week. But rather than being listed out, as he was for Sunday's 31-24 loss to the Packers, Mahomes status was upgraded.

"He did good this week. He added quite a little bit to it," Chiefs coach Andy Reid, who added little else during the roughly 3 minutes that he spent speaking to reporters. When asked how Mahomes was moving in practice, Reid replied: "He's doing some good things."

In seven games this season, Mahomes, 24, has passed for 2,180 yards with 15 TDs and one INT.

## Steelers, Tomlin fined over injury report:

The Steelers have been fined \$75,000 and coach Mike Tomlin has been fined \$25,000 for violating the NFL's injury report policy, a league source confirmed to ESPN.com.

The team did not accurately list quarterback Ben Roethlisberger on the practice report prior to the team's Week 2 game against the Seahawks, the league found. He was only listed on the report that week as not practicing Wednesday for reasons that were "not injury related." The Steelers typically gave Roethlisberger that day off. He fully practiced Thursday and Friday.

Roethlisberger left against the Seahawks before halftime with a non-contact elbow injury and subsequently had season-ending elbow surgery.

The Steelers (3-4), who face the Colts on Sunday, have been going with Mason Rudolph in place in Roethlisberger.

**Flacco placed on IR:** The Broncos placed quarterback Joe Flacco on injured reserve and promoted rookie Brett Rypien from their practice squad to back up new starter Brandon Allen.

Coach Vic Fangio said the herniated disk in Flacco's neck requires six weeks of rest and it would have taken another two weeks to get the veteran back up to speed.

Fangio said Flacco "was not happy about it, obviously. He's kind of surprised because he really doesn't feel that bad."

Flacco's first year with the Broncos after 11 seasons with the Ravens ends with 1,822 yards passing, six TDs and five INTs.

Flacco, 34, also was sacked 26 times behind Denver's porous offensive line, including a career-high eight against the Chiefs two weeks ago.

## Niners LB Alexander lost for season:

Niners linebacker Kwon Alexander will miss the rest of the season with a torn pectoral muscle.

Alexander, 25, was injured during Thursday's 28-25 win over the Cardinals that pushed the 49ers' record to 8-0.

This is the second straight year Alexander went down with a significant injury. He tore his ACL last year while with the Buccaneers.

"I think I can speak for a lot of people. We're in position to make plays," Robinson said. "Plays just aren't being made. We just have to execute better. I don't ever feel like, from a personal standpoint, that I'm not in position to make plays. I think the things that we prep throughout a week for certain situations in the game, we're getting the looks and the opportunities we want. We just have to execute."

Robinson also has made it known that he believes in the character inside the locker room. Don't forget, during his first three seasons in Jacksonville, Fla., the Jaguars lost 37 of 48 games.

So he has a basis for comparison in assessing a team's ability to deal with failure and dispiriting losses.

With these Bears, Robinson sees a group

that is solution-oriented.

"A lot of our guys have played a lot of football and have been with different teams and in different situations," he said. "And this situation feels a lot different. There are situations that our guys have been in that are worse than our current situation, and it's just a different feel than that here. Guys are locked in. We are."

Robinson admitted it was difficult to rewatch Sunday's 17-16 home loss to the Chargers, noticing in painful detail just how many mistakes the Bears made that kept them from a much-needed win. The Bears' red-zone struggles were particularly frustrating.

"Man," he said, "that was a very winnable game. That's what has made this tough."

Still, in Robinson's many years in the league, he learned how to deal with struggle.

"Each and every week, we have to come in here with an open mindset and a push to try and get things done," he said. "That's all

you can do. Pessimism or negativity will weigh you down. It's not going to do anything to do the job."

That's a message Robinson continues to impart through conversations with teammates and through his effort during the week.

"This game is always going to have a lot of ups and downs," he said. "You have to be mentally strong and mentally equipped to be able to say, 'This is cool. We're all right.' This is like a roller coaster. It is. Just in general, I like going to theme parks and I like roller coasters. So I'm just saying you have to have that mentality that whatever happens — whether it's good, bad or otherwise — you have to have the mindset that you want to go again."

As this week's ride leaves the station for a challenging game against the Eagles, Robinson has both hands in the air and a smile on his face.

"Most definitely," he said. "This is what I signed up for. This is what I'm built for."



## Hughes, 'Hawk' up for Frick Award

Cubs, ex-Sox voices among 8 finalists for national honor

Cubs radio voice Pat Hughes and former White Sox announcer Ken "Hawk" Harrelson were among the eight finalists announced Friday for the National Baseball Hall of Fame's Ford C. Frick Award, presented annually for excellence in broadcasting.

Rounding out the field are Jacques

Doucet, dubbed "the French Canadian Vin Scully" for his French broadcasts of the Expos and now Blue Jays; Red Sox voice Joe Castiglione; longtime Cardinals announcer Mike Shannon; Indians play-by-play man Tom Hamilton; Dewayne Staats, a former Cubs announcer now with the Rays; and the late Ned Martin, who called Red Sox games from 1961 to '92 and died in 2002.

Both Harrelson, 78, and Hughes, 64, have been Frick finalists before, most recently three years ago.

Harrelson, a White Sox announcer for 33 seasons, as well as for the Red Sox and

Yankees, retired in 2018. Hughes just completed his 24th season with the Cubs and 37th as a major-league announcer, having previously called games for the Twins and Brewers.

All local major-league market announcers have waited three years for Frick Award consideration as the Hall of Fame has adopted a rotation, with the honor going to a national announcer one year, then broadcast pioneers and early team voices, and team announcers the year after that.

The 2020 winner will be announced Dec. 11 at the winter meetings and honored July

25 in Cooperstown, N.Y.

The Hall's stated criteria for the Frick Award: "Commitment to excellence, quality of broadcasting abilities, reverence within the game, popularity with fans and recognition by peers."

A panel of past winners (Marty Brennaman, Bob Costas, Jaime Jarrin, Tony Kubek, Denny Matthews, Tim McCarver, Jon Miller, Eric Nadel, Vin Scully, Bob Uecker and Dave Van Horn) and baseball broadcasting historians/journalists (David J. Halberstam, Barry Horn, Ted Patterson and Curt Smith) selects the winner.

# 'Sport Changes Everything' — including the Billy Goat

Few Chicago establishments are more iconic than the Billy Goat Tavern, the restaurant chain William Sianis founded in 1934 across from Chicago Stadium.

So it's no wonder Nike used the Billy Goat's famous Michigan Avenue location, where it moved in 1964, as the backdrop for its "Chicago Style" commercials — the latest addition to its "Sport Changes Everything" ad campaign — which debuted last week during the Bears-Saints game and since aired during Bulls games and on social media.

Here's the thing, though: Instead of using the name of the tavern and grill — known nationally and worldwide via the "Billy Goat Curse" and "Saturday Night Live" — Nike turned it into Frank's, a fictitious hot dog joint.

The commercial opens with a carefully cropped view of the Billy Goat's dark Hubbard Street entrance. Above the door, the classic "Cheezborger, cheezborger, cheezborger, no Pepsi ... Coke" sign is covered with a large "Frank's" banner. The ad features Frank sitting behind the counter, narrating the "Chicago Style" scene of sports highlights, from Michael Jordan, Scottie Pippen and the Bulls to Buddy Ryan and the Bears to Chicago native and NBA superstar Anthony Davis, among others.

Considering the commercial includes student-athletes from a handful of Chicago high schools, as well as young "cultural influencers" as Nike calls them, it's understandable that the athletic giant might have wanted to change the name of the tavern. But one can argue that beer is as synonymous with the city and its sports teams as hot dogs — just ask the Super Fans and bleacher bums.

"As we looked to celebrate Chicago's unique sport culture and the Chicago 'style,' we picked iconic Chicago locations that could provide a great backdrop for us to tell that story," Nike regional communications manager Tim Shaw explained via email.

Fair enough. And make no mistake: The Billy Goat was well aware of Nike's plans.

Here are some other facts — and fables — from the commercial.

## 1. Who is Frank?

Actor Don Forston portrays the owner/narrator, and he fits the Chicago persona to a T. The gray-haired, thick-mustached — think Mike Ditka mixed with Joel Quenneville — Frank loudly and proudly opens with "Let me get one Chicago style, poppyseed bun, yellow mustard" while someone dresses a hot dog with said condiment.

Forston, 62, grew up in West Allis, Wis., and moved to the area in 1987. He spent years working on the Chicago theater scene, from which he said he recently retired, and has appeared in films and TV series, including Season 1 of "Chicago P.D." and this year's "Chicago Fire," according to his [imdb.com](http://imdb.com) profile.

Forston, who lives in southwest suburban Stickney, said shooting the commercials was a "blast."

## 2. What other professional Chicago athletes appear in the ad?

The first one who appears, just after the hot dog opening and as Frank says "extra heart," is Bears quarterback Mitch Trubisky — keep in mind Nike filmed the commercial from Sept. 17-19, when the Bears were 1-1 — in a picture on a calendar pinned to a wall. The rest, in order of appearance, are:

- Chicago Sky forward Gabby Williams
- Retired Bulls stars and Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen, both Basketball Hall of Famers
- Former Bears defensive coordinator Buddy Ryan
- Cubs outfielder Jason Heyward
- Lakers big man Anthony Davis, a Perspectives alumnus and No. 1 pick in the 2012 NBA draft
- Chicago Red Stars captain Julie Ertz, a standout U.S. women's national team defender
- Cubs shortstop Javier Baez
- Former Bears linebacker and Pro Football Hall of Famer Brian Urlacher
- White Sox pitcher Lucas Giolito and catcher James McCann
- Retired WNBA star Cappie Pondexter, a Marshall High graduate who won two WNBA titles and an Olympic gold medal
- Bears edge rusher Khalil Mack

## 3. Who else is featured in the commercial?

Nike includes high school student-athletes from "all sides" of Chicago: Simeon, Lane, Kenwood, Mather and Marshall. It also highlights three local athletes/community leaders who "are using sports to push themselves, the community and the world forward," Shaw wrote. Each of the Chicago trio also appears in subsequent Nike spots:

- McKinley Nelson, founder of Project sWish Chicago, which according to its website "utilizes sports and entertainment as the driving forces to unite people from diverse communities and cultures while providing a safe and supportive environment for youth and young adults." Nelson, a Young graduate, founded sWish in August 2018. "Getting kids off the streets and onto the court," Nelson's commercial says.
- Ixhelt Gonzalez, member of the U.S. women's wheelchair basketball team. As a 13-year-old eighth-grader last year, Gonzalez was the youngest player in history to make the national team and is a 2020 Paralympic team hopeful. "Hold the applause because she's just getting started," her commercial says.
- Monyett Crump, a dancer/choreographer who founded REVEAL Dance Chicago to unify and strengthen "the dance community throughout Chicago and the Midwest by providing top of the line training," according to its website. "Completely changing the Chicago dance scene," Crump's commercial says.

Shaw said Nike's campaign will be integrated across social, digital and streaming platforms as well as murals of the Nelson, Gonzalez and Crump that appear in different areas across the city.

## 4. What else did Nike change at the Billy Goat?

A better question: What didn't it change?

The microphone Frank uses in the commercial isn't used at the bar. The giant pickle at the southeast corner of the main counter is missing, and the chips are moved from that counter to the one to the right with the condiments.

And while the bar does have Chicago newspaper articles on its walls throughout, the ones seen in the commercial — one headline reads "Fans bear down in sub-freezing temperatures" — are made up, as is the source — the "Chicago News." Other signs, pictures and trophies on the wall are new/different, as are the old-time TVs used in the shoot.

Also fake news: The Billy Goat does not serve french fries — "No fries ... chips" — at least at that location. Nor does it serve gyros, as is shown late in the spot. You won't find beer or alcohol in Nike's fictitious restaurant, either, in contrast to the real Billy Goat.

But the tavern is represented later in the commercial. Sam Sianis, William's nephew who inherited the place in 1970 when his uncle died, appears in a historic photo.

A few months after Tribune Co. bought the team in 1981, the Cubs hired Dallas Green as president and general manager. In 1984, Green came to the tavern and told Sam: "All is forgiven. Please bring the goat." Sam brought a goat to opening day and renounced the curse during a pregame ceremony on the pitching mound. A photo from that moment appears in the Nike ad.

The Cubs won the National League East that season, earning their first playoff appearance in 39 years. But they lost to the Padres 3-2 in the best-of-five NL Championship Series — falling one victory shy of returning to the World Series for the first time since 1945, when the famed Billy Goat curse was born.

Sam, 84, and his family still own the Billy Goat at 430 N. Michigan Ave. and eight other locations — seven in Chicago and one in Washington, D.C.

There's really not much fun in getting players in shape or rehabbing them from injuries. The strength coach often arrives at the ballpark several hours before almost everyone else to hold individual workouts. After games, he supervises postgame conditioning programs, meaning 12-hour days are the norm.

Buss brought a different approach to the job, making Cubs players laugh their way through the often tedious workout programs and rehab stints. Once, late in the season, when the Cubs were struggling and about to fall out of playoff contention, Buss posted a giant photo in the clubhouse of him and Jennifer Aniston standing together in the old Wrigley Field weight room. Aniston had visited Wrigley Field when "Friends" was at its peak in the early 2000s, and the two looked like a couple.

So what was the purpose of displaying the photo?

"I want them to know anything is possible," Buss said with a straight face.

Buss never minded being the butt of the players' mocking or practical jokes, as long as everyone got a laugh out of it and got work in. The best example of his relationship with the Cubs occurred in 2008 during a spring training workout at HoHoKam Park in Mesa, Ariz.

Third baseman Aramis Ramirez pointed to a wrecked 1995 Nissan Sentra near the bullpen and said: "Hey, Bussy, what's your car doing on the ramp?"

Seeing the car was completely demolished, Buss confidently replied: "That's not my car."

But after a double take, he shouted: "Dude, that's my car!"

The entire team walked over to the car with Buss shaking his head in disbelief. The windows had been smashed out, and the body had dozens of dents in it from baseball bats. Buss wondered out loud what he was going to tell his wife.

"It's a shame," Jon Lieber said. "What kind of person would do something like that? It really just shocks me. I'm sure she'll understand."

Before Buss could call his wife, Ryan Dempster led him and the team to the weight room, then handed Buss the keys to a new Nissan Xterra. The players all had pitched in for a \$25,000 SUV for the strength coach, who for once was speechless.

Buss also served as the greeter for new players, welcoming them to the organization in his inimitable style, from Ramirez to Anthony Rizzo to Nico Hoerner.

When college star Kris Bryant signed after the Cubs picked him at No. 2 in the 2013 draft, Buss took him down the third-base line at Wrigley as a dozen of Cubs veterans surrounded the 21-year-old. Buss then interrogated him with personal questions, quickly bringing the prospect back to earth.

"It was a little overwhelming," Bryant said. "You see these guys on TV, and now I'm actually with them and talking to them. It was kind of cool, pretty funny. I wasn't really expecting that, but they're all pretty cool guys, and they were celebrities to me. And now I'm on the field with them. It was a feeling I'll remember forever."

Buss worked under Don Baylor, Dusty Baker, Lou Piniella, Mike Quade, Dale Sveum, Rick Renteria and Maddon. But he really came into his own under Maddon, who told him to loosen up the clubhouse by any means necessary.

"Joe wants me to be myself and do what I can to get the most out of the players and have fun," Buss told me in 2016 when asked about his role.

That meant conducting workouts in Batman pajamas or dressed as a leprechaun. He was also in the middle of the memorable spring skit when he, Maddon and bench coach Dave Martinez dressed as hippies and rode onto the spring training field in Maddon's old van, his so-called "Shaggin' Wagon."

"Everyone has a little hand in it," Buss said. "We all have different ideas, bouncing them off each other. The van thing, that was Joe's deal. We just go along with him and try to make a little more out of it."

Cubs President Theo Epstein is in the process of filling out new manager David Ross' coaching staff, and finding an experienced bench coach to work with Ross obviously is the most important piece of the puzzle.

But replacing his strength coach might be the most difficult task.

It's a long grind from February to October, and getting players to relax and have some fun is imperative.

No one did it better than Buss.

After he nailed the free throw, fans hollered “MVP!” “MVP!” — reminiscent of his last visit. He had the United Center rocking in December during a 24-point, eight-assist night with the Timberwolves.

“It felt a little weird being at home and (the crowd) chanting for other teams’ players, but I’m sure it will be like that,” Bulls forward Lauri Markkanen said before Friday’s game. “Everybody in the city loves Derrick. And he’s playing at a really high level.”

Rose entered the game averaging 20.4 points and 6.2 assists while shooting 55.3% for the Pistons.

Asked if Rose, 31, has discovered the fountain of youth, Bulls coach Jim Boylen replied: “I hope so. He’s a great kid, and I enjoyed being around him when he was here. Injuries are a very difficult thing in this business. It’s easy for people to see what he should have done. I’ll just tell you this: He’s a terrific kid, a respectful guy when you coach him and he’s a worker.”

Boylen was expecting Rose’s best Friday. He warned his team to be wary of a Bobby Portis-like performance. The former Bulls forward went off against his former team Monday in New York, scoring 28 points in 30 minutes for the Knicks.

“Guys) get excited to play their old team,” Boylen said.

Rose was explosive, hitting another

layup in the first quarter before drawing attention and setting up Langston Gallo-way and Christian Wood for easy baskets.

Rose, making \$7.3 million this season, said expectations were too high in Chicago after his ACL surgery and missed 2012-13 season.

“When I was here (after the surgery), I was averaging 15 or 16 (points) but you all wanted me to average 30,” he said. “That’s the honest truth. You all wanted me to play a certain type of way (without) understanding what I was going through. I learned I have to listen to my body, and if I didn’t, there was no way I would have gotten to Year 12. I had to do things for myself and my family. Look where we are right now.”

Rose, whom the Bulls selected with the first pick in the 2008 draft, also opened the door for a return to Chicago, as unlikely as that seems, saying that would depend on the front office.

Asked for his best memory from the United Center, he spoke of “the crowd and the fans. Them pushing us every game. You go to other places and the team doesn’t get the same love. Here it’s a different feeling.”

■ Jim Boylen was hoping versatile wing Chandler Hutchison would return for Friday night’s game against the Pistons, but his hamstring issue is lingering. “Hutch is still working his way through,” Boylen said. “Hopefully he can practice (Saturday) with us. ... It’s frustrating for him and for us, but we have hope.” Asked if Hutchison had suffered a setback, Boylen replied: “I don’t want to say setback. We slowed him down a little bit.”

“It’s more like let’s see where he’s at. A lot of times those young players, when they get the chance, you get an immediate boost in their play. So I expect him to probably be pretty good whenever he does get in, and we’ll take it from there.”

A day after being recalled from Rockford, Boqvist practiced with the Hawks on Friday, one of several changes as the Hawks prepared for their Saturday matchup against the Kings. Colliton mixed up his lines again and dramatically revamped both power-play units.

The most interesting new line had Jonathan Toews centering with Brandon Saad and Alex Nylander on the wings. Saad and Nylander both have created chances wherever they have played this season, and while they have only five points apiece, nine were at even strength.

Toews has only two points this season and none during 5-on-5 play. He scored a fluke overtime goal when the puck bounced off his leg in an Oct. 18 win against the Blue Jackets and had a secondary assist on an empty-netter against the Oilers four days earlier. The Hawks need him to produce if they hope to turn things around.

“They all add a little different dimension,” Colliton said of Toews and his new linemates. “Work ethic, compete level and skill level together, I think they have all three. So it’s another combo we think has a chance to have success. We’re just waiting for someone to really grab hold of 5-on-5, especially at the top of our lineup, and produce.”

As for the power play Alex DeBrincat and Patrick Kane remain on the top unit, Dylan Strome returns and Andrew Shaw and Duncan Keith are getting their first looks this season. The second unit is Toews and four rookies: Boqvist, Nylander, Kirby Dach and Dominik Kubalik.

Colliton has given the top unit a lot of leeway, providing them ample time to convert and sometimes letting them stay out for the entire two minutes. With the Hawks 3-for-32 on the power play — and

0-for-21 in their last six games — the days of deferring almost exclusively to the top unit appear over.

“To this point the one unit has got the lion’s share of the time, and if you’re going to do that, you’ve got to score,” Colliton said. “Now it’s going to be more of a competition, and I think that’s good. ... They both can be a threat. And maybe if they’re only playing half the power play, they’ll have a little more juice to win pucks back, to get to the net and win 50-50s around the net to score those dirty rebound goals you need as a power play.”

“It’s only one day, but we liked the look of both. They both moved it pretty well.”

The player most affected by Boqvist’s promotion is Erik Gustafsson, who likely will be a healthy scratch against the Kings. Gustafsson has had a dreadful start with no goals and four assists.

With Boqvist assuming Gustafsson’s role as a player with elite offensive skills who isn’t very strong defensively, it might be hard for Gustafsson to regain his spot in the lineup. But Colliton said there eventually might be room for both.

“If they are both competing defensively and sharp defensively, that would be a benefit to our team to have a little more puck movement back there and offensive capability,” Colliton said. “It’s difficult for teams to defend when you have that element.”

For now, the Hawks need to make sure Boqvist is comfortable enough defensively to take chances with the puck. Colliton paired him with Keith, who is happy to serve as a mentor.

“On the ice, hockey’s hockey,” Keith said. “It’s more so off-the-ice things, but on the ice, you’ve got to find your way and learn from everybody and be a sponge, and that doesn’t stop when you become an older guy. You can always ... get better and learn from different teammates and players. We’re all in it together.”

Will Boqvist stay with the Hawks for a week, a month, a career? Right now, the only thing that matters to the teen from Falun, Sweden, is that his next game will be in the NHL.

“It was a dream come true to get the call,” Boqvist said. “I didn’t expect it, but it’s nice to be here.”







Sunday will be warmer here, but temps will still be well below normal, with the high in the mid-40s.





Dear Tom,

Dear Jimmy,  
Chicago, like most locations in the U.S., experiences a "temperate climate," the variable climate in the Earth's middle latitudes that lies between the extremes of the hotter, wetter tropical climates and colder, drier polar climates. Local climates within the broad U.S. temperate zone exhibit a huge range of individual characteristics, but few spots can lay claim to weather records that have not been exceeded at some other location. None of Chicago's records qualifies as a national extreme. All our temperature, precipitation and wind extremes have been exceeded elsewhere in the country.



## Roll not slowed after a year

### QB Jackson may top list of NFL's dynamic stars

BALTIMORE — The sky did not open, and no thunder cracked when Stephon Tuitt swept around the left shoulder of Jermaine Eluemunor and crashed onto Joe Flacco with the full force of his 303-pound frame.

It seemed like just another hit in the eternally bruising turf war between the Ravens and the Pittsburgh Steelers. Flacco did not even leave the Week 9 contest, which ended as a 23-16 loss that dropped the Ravens' 2018 record to 4-5.

"We're rolling right now with what we have," coach John Harbaugh said the next afternoon.

With 12 months of perspective, however, we can see that Tuitt unwittingly closed one chapter in Baltimore football history and opened another. Flacco suffered a hip injury on the play and would never take another snap for the team he'd quarterbacked through 10 1/2 seasons. The Ravens traded him to the Denver Broncos in March, and after a star-crossed first eight games in his new city, Flacco is sidelined with a neck injury and facing questions about his NFL future.

Meanwhile, Lamar Jackson started in Cincinnati two weeks after the Tuitt hit and ran for 119 yards in a three-point Ravens victory.

From there, he led the Ravens to the playoffs, and he has them pointed in that direction again this season. The 22-year-old has wrought such havoc with his legs that he's forced seasoned NFL observers to reconsider long-held prejudices against running quarterbacks.

The Ravens went into Week 9 of the 2018 season as Joe Flacco's team. A year later, as they prepare to host the mighty New England Patriots in Week 9 of a new season, they're defined by Jackson's electrifying style.

"(In) the NFL in general, things change very quickly, rapidly, and you just move on," said Ravens guard Marshal Yanda, who spent most of his career blocking for Flacco. "Joe was here for a very long time, played a lot of really great games and productive football, but obviously, it's just part of the beast, part of the nature of this business. So, we roll, and Lamar has done a great job."

Jackson hews to an in-the-moment philosophy, so he hasn't spent much energy contemplating the year since Flacco went down.

"I didn't really care about that, to be honest," he said. "I'm just trying to win. That's why I'm here. I'm trying to build. I'm trying to be better than I was last year."

But it's natural to take stock of the Ravens' big picture when they're about to play the NFL's standard-bearing franchise in a Sunday night showcase. And it's apparent that to the outside world at least, Baltimore's football narrative became a lot more intriguing when Jackson took center stage as its protagonist.

Jackson's matchup with the Patriots is football catnip on multiple levels, from the generational quarterback showdown with Tom Brady to the tactical questions of how Bill Belichick might counter his one-of-a-kind running talent.

"Lamar Jackson is truly one of the most exciting young players to come into the league in some time. Some of the plays that I've seen him make this year getting ready for this game are breathtaking," said NBC analyst Cris Collinsworth, who will call the Patriots game with Al Michaels. "I think we've seen offenses evolve and change, the influence of the college game, and this is very much one of those matchups of style that is going to make this game as interesting as anything

that we've done all season."

Even the curmudgeonly Belichick acknowledged Jackson's "unique" skills, noting that the Patriots have no one capable of imitating him in practice. "I don't know if anybody else in the league has a guy, either," he said.

Given such flattery and Jackson's 11-3 record as a starter, it would be easy to present his last year as a seamless ascent. On the ground, it has felt quite different.

There was the playoff loss to the Los Angeles Chargers in January, when he threw an interception and fumbled three times as fans filled M&T Bank Stadium with boos and called for Flacco to replace him. There were the debates heading into this season about whether he'd ever throw precisely enough to thrive as a longtime NFL starter or whether his body would hold up to the punishment invited by his daring scrambles.

He's silenced some of the dissenters by continuing to win and posting running statistics, individual and team, that defy our expectations of the modern game. But part of the fascination around Jackson flows from the doubts that persist. Can he sustain a career playing the way he does?

"The only thing — all it takes is one shot," said NBC commentator and former All-Pro safety Rodney Harrison. "All it takes is one shot, and he's been doing a pretty good

job of not getting hit, but a couple times you'll watch him on tape, he'll take a couple shots, and he's young, and he's a stud, and he feels good. But all it takes is that one hit and it can really change the complexion of their team. So I still worry about a quarterback that's really heavily involved in the run game."

The excitement for Jackson vs. Patriots extends beyond fans and commentators and into the Ravens locker room.

"I feel like he brings a whole new dynamic to our offense," said defensive tackle Brandon Williams, who's 0-3 against the Patriots in his seven-year career. "He's a baller, and with him, they have a lot of things to work on. They have a lot of things to try to get ready to play him."

You'll never hear anyone with the Ravens utter a disrespectful word about Flacco, who led the franchise to six playoff appearances and a Super Bowl victory. But there's a palpable enthusiasm about what they've created around their young star.

"We've completely revamped the offense to tailor it more towards a mobile guy," said Jackson's back-up, Robert Griffin III. "I think that's the biggest difference, the ability to attack the defense with all 11 guys on the field as opposed to the more traditional 10 with most offenses."

How has Jackson evolved as the

atmosphere has changed around him?

Fans, writers and people within the team have made much of the pivotal fourth down in the Ravens' Week 7 victory over the Seattle Seahawks, when Jackson pushed Harbaugh not to settle for a field goal.

"I probably wouldn't have done it last year," Jackson said. "There probably were moments we could have went for it last year, and I was just jogging off the field."

But it's possible to go too far with this narrative and portray Jackson as a steely-eyed commander when in fact, his youthful joie de vivre remains a significant part of his charm.

As he spent the week preparing for one of the greatest tests of his career, he still took time to discuss the Harry Potter costume he wore for Halloween (sans lightning bolt scar) and to call Brady the G.O.A.T of G.O.A.Ts with a mischievous grin.

"He's comfortable with who he is and how he wants to lead," Griffin said. "He's still more of a laid-back, goofy kind of kid, so I don't know how to say if he's more assertive or not. Joe had his way of doing it. I have my way of doing it. I think everybody's different, and I don't think that's a problem."

The 29-year-old Griffin said he's still the "proverbial voice of reason" in a quarterback room that features Jackson and rookie Trace McSorley.

Seven years ago, he was talked about much as Jackson is now — an athlete who could re-define the accepted possibilities of how to play quarterback in the NFL. He understands the joys and the pitfalls of such attention, so he's in a unique position to play the older brother.

"He'll always have an opportunity to ring me up, hit me up with a text message and talk to me about anything," Griffin said. "That's special. It's something I never had in this league, so I wanted to be that for him while I'm here."

As Jackson prepared for the Patriots, news emerged that the man he used to play behind could miss at least five weeks because of a herniated disc in his neck. Once known for his extreme durability, the 34-year-old Flacco has now suffered three significant injuries in the last five seasons. The announcement of his latest came a day after he questioned the 2-6 Broncos' lack of play calling aggressiveness.

"What do we have to lose?" he wondered, pondering another bitterly close defeat.

## Words have consequences

As an analyst, Gruden once had plenty to say about the Lions. Now he faces them as Raiders coach

We hear it far too often in news conferences, when football coaches are understandably wary of saying the wrong thing. Most don't want to bash their own players, most don't want to give their opponents bulletin-board material and few say anything useful as it relates to game-planning.

But what about TV speak?

Before he became coach of the Oakland Raiders, Jon Gruden spent nine seasons in the broadcast booth as the color analyst on "Monday Night Football."

Gruden was one of the most popular and colorful analysts in the business when he worked for ESPN - remember his turkey hole comment about a throw Matthew Stafford made against the Green Bay Packers in 2017? - so we went back and watched a few games that Gruden did in his career to hear a less filtered opinion of the Lions ahead of Sunday's game in Oakland.

Gruden was highly complimentary of Stafford, coach Matt Patricia and others in his teleconference with Detroit reporters Wednesday, and that echoed most of what he said during his time at ESPN.

Here's a sampling, from the two Lions games he did in his last season on TV in 2017, wins against the New York Giants and Packers - the last New England Patriots game he did that same year (a loss to the Miami Dolphins) and the first Monday night game Stafford ever played in, in 2011 against the Chicago Bears.

**"I think they have a superstar quarterback in Matt Stafford. I like this team."**

That was Gruden during the second half of the Lions' Week 2 win over the Giants in 2017. Stafford hardly lit the world on fire, completing 15 of 21 passes for 122 yards and two touchdowns, but Gruden was effusive in his praise.

Stafford, you recall, signed a contract extension just before the start of that season that made him the highest-paid player in NFL history, and Gruden said unequivocally he thought Stafford was worth the money.

"I'm glad that Detroit gave him that contract," Gruden said during the game. "I've got a lot of respect for where the Lions have come in the seven, eight, nine years that Matt Stafford has been (in Detroit)."

In Oakland, Gruden inherited Derek Carr as his quarterback, the player Stafford passed to become the highest-paid player at the time of his deal.

**"What a competitor he is, and not only can he run, this man can throw the ball into any zip code you want it."**

That's more Gruden on Stafford from the Giants game. Gruden seemed most impressed by Stafford's ability to buy time by scrambling out of the pocket.

At one point, Gruden ran through a series of plays from the game that highlighted Stafford's mobility.

"He gets out of trouble and he runs through three Giants for a huge first down," Gruden said. "And then he reads Landon Collins coming down, he knows he has one-on-one outside to his deep-ball threat Marvin Jones, great throw, and then a beautiful scramble play once again (on a touchdown to Eric Ebron). He's making plays at the line of scrimmage, with his audibles and recognition. He's scrambling and he's making outstanding throws. You can see who the leader of the Lions is."

Hearing Gruden talk, you could almost imagine his coaching points for Sunday's game: Don't let Stafford out of the pocket and extend plays.

**"You can have a great imagination when you have a quarterback like Matt Stafford."**

One more Gruden on Stafford, this from the Lions' 30-17 win over the Packers at Lambeau Field.

Gruden gushed about Stafford's acumen against the blitz in the game ("His recognition is very good") and about the need to get pressure on him ("If you let Stafford look from right to left to his check down, he's going to complete every pass").

But this comment came right

after he went crazy over a Stafford completion to T.J. Jones in the small window over top of the cornerback and out of reach of the safety - the turkey hole.

"It's not an easy throw," Gruden said to his partner, Sean McDonough. "You got to be able to rifle it in there, Sean, and I had a quarterback here in Green Bay

(Brett Favre) who was able to do that at a high level and now I'm watching one here in Matt Stafford who makes a living putting the ball right there in the

turkey hole."

Gruden said in his conference call Wednesday he still calls it the turkey hole.

"I mean, we've been studying the turkey hole all week, the little hole between the corner and safety," Gruden said. "I don't know what you guys call it down there in Dee-troit, but we call it the turkey hole here in Oakland."

**"He's a nuisance"**

Gruden dropped this line about Lions return man Jamal Agnew during the Packers game, when Agnew returned kicks and punts and played a handful of snaps as a gadget player at receiver.

Gruden was in the booth for Agnew's punt-return touchdown against the Giants, too, when he called the cornerback an "unbelievable open-field runner."

The Lions haven't used Agnew much on offense this season, just two snaps in a Week 6 win over Green Bay, and it's safe to say they won't catch Oakland off guard if they try to do that Sunday.

**"The ex-New England Patriot is an excellent box safety."**

This was a comment Gruden made in passing about safety Tavon Wilson, and I bring it up because Wilson could be in for a larger role this week against the Raiders with Tracy Walker dealing with a knee injury.

The Lions have used Wilson as an extra run defender and key part of their big nickel package this season, and Gruden was right in his quick scouting report. The Raiders have one of the most productive tight ends in the NFL in Darren Waller. It wouldn't be a shock to see Gruden try to isolate him on Wilson.

**"I spent a lot of time with Jarrad Davis, the rookie out of Florida, in the offseason, and this man is wired like a 1975 throwback player. He'd play the game for nothing."**

Gruden dropped this line after Davis had his first career sack against the Giants. During the Packers game, he praised Davis as "a player," but noted "he's had some problems in coverage."

None of this should surprise anyone who has watched Davis' evolution with the Lions. Davis has excelled the past two seasons as a pass rusher. The Lions love his football makeup, but he has had problems in coverage.

**"Darius Slay, every week he gets your best receiver in one-on-one coverage. Slay told us, I got more confidence, more courage and I have more fun playing than any corner in football. One of these days he'll be recognized as a Pro Bowler. He'd get my vote."**

That was in November 2017, about two months before Slay earned his first Pro Bowl nod. The Lions have changed defensive schemes since that game, but Gruden clearly respects Slay's coverage ability.

It'll be interesting to see how the Lions use Slay on Sunday, assuming he returns from a hamstring injury. If he follows the Raiders' best receiver, that means he'll likely spend the game on Tyrell Williams, who leads Oakland with five touchdowns and 15.4 yards per catch.

**"Matt Patricia, he's been a Patriot for 14 years and I have to tell you, I think this is his best coaching job. They've had defections in free agency, injuries to key players. It hasn't fazed them one bit."**

Patricia was the Patriots' defensive coordinator in 2017, when New England had an awful start to the season defensively but was difficult to score on in the final three months.

The Patriots went 11-1 down the stretch on their way to the Super Bowl, but their one loss came in a Monday night game against the Miami Dolphins. Both Trey Flowers and Kyle Van Noy were inactive for that game, and Patricia's defense had no answers for Kenyan Drake at running back and Jay Cutler at quarterback.

The Dolphins went 69 yards in 13 plays on their opening drive, but had to settle for a field goal when Patricia's defense came up with a red-zone stop. Gruden summed it up perfectly during the drive, though he directed this one final comment at Bill Belichick, saying he'll "give you yardage for Christmas. He's (more) interested in scoring defense."

# Buick Enclave crossover returns for 2020 with new features

**B**uick's Enclave full-size crossover utility vehicle, which entered its second generation two years ago, returns for 2020 with no major changes, but a few style and technology updates.

The starting price remains at \$40,000 (plus \$1,195 freight) for the base front-wheel-drive Preferred model, and prices top out at \$55,800 for the all-wheel-drive Avenir model. Avenir is the recently introduced premium sub-brand for Buick.

Our test vehicle for this report was the all-wheel-drive Essence model (\$44,000). Essence is the next step up from the Preferred, and is available with front-wheel drive, beginning at \$42,000.

For 2020, there is a new Sport Touring package (\$1,695) for the Essence model, bringing a monochromatic exterior featuring a unique Sport grille with body-color surround and 20-inch bright machined-aluminum wheels with contrasting Satin Graphite pockets. This option was included on our tester.

Also added was next-gen Buick infotainment system, including a new eight-inch-diagonal touch screen, standard on all trim levels, with available connected navigation.

Other new features include an optional new HD Rear Vision Camera (included as standard equipment on our Essence model) and an HD Surround Vision system. A new four-way power lumbar seat adjuster with a driver and front passenger massage feature are standard on Premium and Avenir models.

Three new exterior colors are introduced: Champagne Gold Metallic, Rich Garnet Metallic (Avenir only) and Dark Moon Blue Metallic. Our tester came in the carried-over Ebony Twilight Metallic color (\$495 extra).

With the recent makeover, there were no radical exterior changes from the first generation, so the new generation is easily recognizable as an Enclave. But it is roomier inside and can seat up to seven passengers comfortably, even adults. There is a more-muscular appearance, with fewer curves, and it is more aerodynamic, for improved fuel economy.

The roofline is lower, the windshield angle is more pronounced, and there is a longer wheelbase that allows for the increased interior space. LED lighting was added for 2018, including projector headlights and taillights.

Other models and prices include the Premium front-drive (\$48,100); Premium AWD (\$50,400); and Avenir front-drive (\$53,500). All-wheel drive is available on all except the Essence model.

The Avenir treatment, which is offered in other Buick vehicles as well, is meant to represent "the highest expression of Buick luxury," the automaker says. It includes unique styling cues — such as the Enclave Avenir's special three-dimensional mesh grille — along with more standard amenities, premium materials and an up level suspension with continuously variable real-time automatic damping.

All Enclave models are powered by a normally aspirated 3.6-liter V-6 engine rated at 310 horsepower and 266 foot-pounds of torque. It is connected to a nine-speed automatic transmission.

This engine propelled our Enclave quite well, including drives around town and for a weekend trip that included some well-maintained unpaved state and national park roads.

EPA ratings are 18 mpg city/26 highway/21 combined for front-wheel drive, and 17/25/20 for all-wheel drive.

Standard safety features on all models include a backup camera (showing in the dash audio/nav screen), rear park assist and seven air bags, including a front center side air bag.

A rearview camera mirror (\$825) is available, but was not included on our test vehicle. It allows the rearview mirror to work as a regular mirror or as a display for a rearview camera (separate from the standard rear camera). In the camera mode, there are no obstructions for the rear view, such as rear headrests, body panels and passengers' heads.

The available Surround Vision camera system gives an overhead downward view of the vehicle to assist in maneuvering at low speeds. This was included on our vehicle as part of the rearview mirror camera system.

Our vehicle's standard Quiet Tuning cabin noise-reduction system brought active noise cancellation, designed to block and absorb noise. That made our

Enclave very quiet inside, even at highway speeds and on some unpaved roads.

The all-wheel drive gives the Enclave all-weather driving capability, along with limited off-road ability, allowing it to handle many gravel and dirt roads in national and state parks. But the vehicle has lower ground clearance than most traditional SUVs, and the all-wheel drive doesn't include low-range gearing for serious trail driving.

Buick's Intelligent All-Wheel Drive, available on Premium and Avenir models, has an active twin-clutch rear differential and a switch to force front drive only for better fuel efficiency. But our Essence model's AWD did not include these extras.

We had seating for seven, with two bucket seats up front, two captain's chairs with a center aisle in the middle row, and a three-person 60/40split/power folding bench seat in the rear.

Other features included heated eight-way power driver's seat (with memory) and six-way power front passenger seat; three-zone automatic climate control; power hands-free rear liftgate; leather steering wheel with power tilt/telescopic steering column; dual power/heated outside mirrors with turn signals and blind-zone alerts
