## Trump adds sanctions, asserts Iran posed threat to embassies

Pompeo confirms intel assessment of missile striking Ukrainian jet

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump ordered new retaliatory economic sanctions Friday on Iran, even as his administration faced persistent questions over its drone strike on an Iranian general that helped ignite the latest crisis with the Islamic Republic.

Trump issued an executive or-

der adding additional U.S. sanctions to an already long list his administration had imposed, aiming to force Iran to accept a new agreement that would curb its nuclear program and halt support for militant groups throughout the Middle East.

The president, in a statement announcing the new measures, referenced Iran's nuclear program and use of proxy forces throughout the region while noting that the Iranians have threatened U.S. service members, diplomats and civilians — an apparent reference to his administration's justifica-

tion for killing Gen. Qassem Soleimani in a drone strike Jan. 3 in Baghdad.

"The United States will continue to counter the Iranian regime's destructive and destabilizing behavior," he said.

Meanwhile, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo confirmed Friday that the United States and its allies have intelligence that a Ukrainian passenger jet that crashed shortly after takeoff in Iran had been shot down.

## City cops increasing patrols on Red Line

Superintendent Beck to take 'hard look' at spike in CTA crime

A recent spike in CTA crime, particularly robberies, has led to increased patrols on the Red Line and is getting attention from Interim police Superintendent Charlie Beck, police said.

Between Thanksgiving and Christmas, there were 458 reported criminal incidents on CTA buses and trains, from robbery to turnstile jumping, said Chicago police spokesman Anthony Guglielmi. That's a nearly 24% jump from 370 incidents in the same period of 2017, though a slight decrease from 2018.

An increase in thefts and robberies is expected before Christmas, Guglielmi said. Chicago police beefed up patrols on the CTA during the pre-holiday period and added additional Red Line patrols two weeks ago, he said.

"We're seeing a lot more high-profile robberies on the CTA," Guglielmi said. Most crimes happened on the rail system, and the most common type of serious crime on the "L" was robbery, with 70 incidents, a 43% jump from the same period in 2018.

Beck will take a "deep dive" into CTA crime and enforcement measures as part of the department's "CompStat" meeting next week, Guglielmi said. The data-driven weekly meetings use crime statistics in real time to hold commanders accountable for upticks in violence in their districts.

"He wants to take a hard look at (CTA crime) and deployment," said Guglielmi, who noted that the mass transit unit participates in CompStat meetings a few times a year.

Guglielmi said the CTA's extensive high-definition camera system has been "very helpful" in making arrests. Police made 145 arrests on the CTA in the Thanksgiving-to-Christmas period, compared with 102 arrests for the same time in 2018.

Last year saw a slight drop in serious crimes on the CTA rail system, down to 2,334 incidents from 2,372 in 2018, according to a Tribune analysis of police data. Nonviolent crime was down to 1,744 incidents from 1,925 in 2018, or 9%.

However, violent crime, which includes crimes like

## Building up city's storm defenses

Low-pressure system bringing 40 to 50 mph wind gusts, wintery mix into Chicago

A powerful winter storm is forecast to kick up towering waves along Lake Michigan on Saturday, threatening Chicago's shorelines, beaches and lakeside roadways, according to meteorologists and city officials. While the average waves are expected to be 12 to 18 feet tall, there is also a chance of occasional rogue waves

up to 23 feet.

These wave heights are remarkable, but not unheard of for southern Lake Michigan, said Eric Lenning, science and operations officer at the National Weather Service's office in Romeoville. Still, officials were warning people to take precautions.

"Be careful if you are anywhere near the lake, it will be very dangerous, with water showing

up in places it's not supposed to be," said meteorologist Mike Bar-dou of the National Weather Service.

In anticipation, the Chicago Park District closed portions of the Lakefront Trail, including the pedestrian path just south of Fullerton Avenue and both walking and biking paths from North Avenue to Ohio Street.

Most of the lakefront is also

under an advisory because waves are lapping water onto the pavement, causing slick conditions.

A low-pressure system barreling from the southwest is expected to rake across Chicago, carrying 40 to 50 mph wind gusts and a wintery mix, according to the National Weather Service. The worst conditions are anticipated

## Accountant pleads guilty to \$65M fraud to bankroll luxurious lifestyle

An accountant could face up to 25 years in federal prison after pleading guilty Friday to embezzling tens of millions of dollars from a wealthy Chicago-area family and using the money to finance a luxurious lifestyle that included more than two dozen homes, private jets, yachts and a Lamborghini luxury car dealership.

Sultan Issa also admitted in a plea agreement with federal prosecutors that he stole millions more from individual investors, including \$500,000 from a widow who trusted him to invest funds from her dead husband's estate.

In all, Sultan admitted to stealing what he said \$65 million over a seven-year period, but prosecutors warned that they were still tabulating the losses and the final number could go even higher.

Dressed in a dark gray suit and blue striped tie, Issa, 46, of Hinsdale, told U.S. District Judge Andrea Wood that he's been seeing a psychiatrist and is taking daily prescription medication to treat his anxiety and depression.

When the judge asked him to say in his own words what he did wrong, Issa, who pleaded guilty to a single count of wire fraud, cleared his throat and said in a firm voice, “I just basically lied to a lot of people.”

Wood set sentencing for May 21. With such extensive losses, Issa faces about 20 to 25 years in prison under preliminary sentencing guidelines.

For years, Issa served as the personal accountant for banker and philanthropist Roger Weston, a life trustee of the Art Institute of Chicago, where a wing of the museum bears his name.

According to the plea agreement, Issa began embezzling from the family's funds in 2010 by forging

signatures to gain control of assets and providing banks with fraudulent documents to secure millions of dollars in loans for himself.

One of the accounts Issa stole from was a trust fund that Weston had set up explicitly to pay for his mother's treatment while she was “suffering from an incapacitating illness,” the plea deal said.

The plea agreement refers to Weston only as Individual A, but details in the court record confirm he was the victim.

For more than seven years, ending in October 2017, Issa regularly lied to Weston about the status of the family's assets and cooked the books to make it look like investments were earning money, authorities said.

Instead, Issa was using tens of millions of dollars in ill-gotten gains to buy 25 residential properties in Illinois, Montana, Michigan, and Cabo San Lucas, Mexico, as well as two private jets, four yachts, about 60 firearms, and numerous watches and jewelry, according to the plea agreement.

Among the Chicago

properties Issa bought during the scheme were three condos in the Trump Tower in Chicago, real estate records show. The shell company he set up to purchase them was called Combover LLC — an apparent job at President Donald Trump's hairstyle.

The plea agreement said Sultan sank another \$15 million in stolen funds to pay expenses for Global Luxury Imports, a dealership he owned in Burr Ridge that sold Lamborghinis and other luxury vehicles. According to a 2012 news release, the dealership housed the bulletproof 1979 Rolls-Royce that Princess Diana and Prince Charles used during visits to Washington, D.C., in the 1980s.

The dealership has since closed, records show.

The charges also alleged Issa used his position to solicit at least another \$8.8 million from individual investors by claiming he would invest their money in legitimate opportunities.

In April 2016, prosecutors said, Issa convinced a widow to give him \$500,000 to invest even though he knew she “was unusually vulnerable due to

the recent loss of her husband.” Instead, Issa used the funds “in furtherance of his ongoing scheme to defraud,” according to the plea deal.

Weston, from Winnetka, sold Lisle-based GreatBanc to Charter One for \$180 million, according to reports in Crain's Chicago Business.

A collector of Asian art, Weston became a life trustee of the Art Institute of Chicago in 2009 and has donated many pieces to the museum.

Weston sued Issa in Cook County Circuit Court in 2018 seeking \$100 million in damages, court records show. Weston claimed in a separate lawsuit that Issa forged his name on bank documents as collateral to obtain a \$5 million loan using antique Chinese ceramics and other artwork owned by Weston. The lawsuits are pending.

Issa, who remains free on bond pending sentencing, left the Dirksen U.S. Courthouse on Friday without speaking to reporters. His lawyer, Daniel Collins, also declined to comment.

that the plane was shot down by an Iranian missile,” Pompeo said at a briefing at the White House. “We're going to let the investigation play out before we make a final determination. It's important that we get to the bottom of it.”

Pompeo was the highest-level official to publicly confirm the intelligence assessments. U.S. and allied officials said Thursday that they had intelligence that surface-to-air missiles fired by Iranian military forces shot down the Kyiv, Ukraine-bound Boeing 737 minutes after it took off from Tehran.

In Kyiv, however, Ukraine's main intelligence agency said Friday that it had narrowed down the possible causes of the plane crash to either a missile strike or a terrorist act.

The Security Service of Ukraine said in a statement that it is unclear whether the SA-15 missile system that Western officials say likely brought down the plane was responsible.

Iran's Fars News Agency, which is affiliated with the Revolutionary Guard, said Friday that Iran would issue a statement Saturday announcing the cause of the crash of the Ukrainian jetliner. The report offered no hint of what that cause might be.

“There will be a meeting with domestic and international representatives related to the crash tomorrow and after studying prelimi-

narily, the cause of the crash will be announced,” Fars News said in a news alert citing what it described as a source from the Joint Armed Forces.

Iran has maintained that there was no evidence that the plane was struck by a missile.

Trump and his administration have faced continuing questions over its claims of an “imminent” threat as justification for killing Soleimani, setting off a furor that may not yet be contained.

Members of Congress said officials did not provide sufficient detail or justification in briefings this week.

Trump said Friday that Iran had planned to attack multiple embassies across the Middle East, including the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad, after first asserting that he did not believe anyone had a right to more details on the intelligence that prompted the killing of an Iranian general.

would've been executed. But it was very clear: Qassem Soleimani himself was plotting a broad, large-scale attack against American interests. And those attacks were imminent.”

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi called the killing of Soleimani “provocative and disproportionate” and other members said they were unconvinced after a closed-door briefing on the intelligence.

The sanctions added Friday include measures aimed at eight Iranian officials involved in what Mnuchin called “destabilizing” activities throughout the Middle East as well as the missile barrage Wednesday.

Those measures, which would freeze any assets the officials have in U.S. jurisdiction and prohibit financial transactions with them, are largely symbolic since such senior figures are unlikely to have assets under American control after decades of hostility between the two nations.

Adnan Mazarei, a senior fellow at the Peterson Institute for International Economics, said the sanctions will hurt an Iranian economy that was forced to cut fuel subsidies earlier this year, triggering nationwide protests, but they also will make it harder for government to negotiate with the U.S.

“This will be seen as another sign that the U.S. government cannot be taken at its word when it says it wants to negotiate,” Mazarei said.

## Workers tranquilize coyote roaming across North Side

Authorities to learn in weeks if animal attacked 6-year-old

Animal control workers caught a coyote Thursday evening on Chicago's North Side, but authorities said it might not be known for weeks whether it's the same animal that attacked a 6-year-old boy the day before about two miles away.

The coyote, which appeared injured, was spotted about 10 p.m. in the 1700 block of North Dayton Street, according to Chicago Animal Care and Control. Workers from the agency caught up with the animal about a block away and "safely" shot it with a tranquilizer dart. The coyote was about three blocks west of the Steppenwolf Theatre, not far from the intersection of North Avenue and Halsted Street.

Animal control officials are attempting to determine if the captured coyote is the same animal that attacked a boy Wednesday afternoon outside the Peggy Notebaert Nature Museum in Lincoln Park, biting him on the head. Two DePaul University track team members were running nearby when the coyote attacked the boy and said they helped kick the animal away.

Animal control said Friday morning that DNA testing and evaluation of the captured coyote was

expected to take a few weeks.

An agency spokeswoman said the animal was being taken to a local animal rehabilitation center, where the DNA testing and additional evaluation will occur.

The boy was walking along a path in a park area near the museum when he came upon the coyote on a grassy hill, officials said. The boy may have startled the animal, which bit the boy. The child's nanny and several bystanders came to the boy's aid.

A spokeswoman for animal control declined to answer what would happen to the captured coyote if it is determined to be the same animal that bit the boy.

Officials said in a statement Friday they "will continue to aggressively patrol the area in response to any

potential coyote sightings."

Mayor Lori Lightfoot on Friday said she was pleased with how officials handled the situation.

"Never did I think I'd be talking about alligators in one breath and coyote in the next, but I think (animal control's director has) handled things very well, come up with a good plan, had the right experts in place," Lightfoot said. "And we're still out there being diligent because there's lots of different sightings."

Animal control, in its "Coyote Management & Coexistence Plan," reports it receives approximately 450 service requests annually involving coyotes. Coyotes, the report details, "can only be harmed or removed if there is proof of imminent danger to a human's life or property."

Ald. Brian Hopkins,

whose 2nd Ward includes the museum, tweeted that "preliminary indications strongly suggest this is the animal involved ... waiting for DNA test results to confirm."

The alderman said the coyote may also be the same animal that bit a man in the buttocks later Wednesday in Streeterville. Neither the boy nor the man — who showed up at a hospital with what he said was a coyote bite — suffered life-threatening injuries.

The attack on the boy is believed to be the first by a coyote on a human in the Chicago area in at least a decade, said Kelley Gandurski, executive director of Chicago Animal Care and Control.

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## Judge rules key evidence allowed at trial in Bauer death

Legghette attorney argues initial police questioning before chase not justified

The foot pursuit that culminated in the daylight slaying of Chicago police Cmdr. Paul Bauer began with a relatively minor infraction: Bauer's accused killer was approached moments before the shooting for urinating in public, court hearings this week revealed.

That was enough, though, to justify officers giving chase, a Cook County judge ruled Friday, setting the stage for Shomari Legghette, 46, to stand trial for first-degree murder later this winter. In a series of recent hearings before Judge Erica Reddick, officers recounted the moments leading up to Bauer's February 2018 death and Legghette's arrest, including the initial approach by officers who noticed Legghette appearing to relieve himself on Lower Wacker Drive.

Legghette took off running after police tried to stop him, sparking a downtown pursuit that Bauer ultimately joined. Bauer followed Legghette to a stairwell outside the Thompson Center, where Legghette allegedly shot the veteran officer six times.

In an effort to block prosecutors from introducing the gun, drugs and body armor found on Legghette as evidence at the upcoming trial, his attorney, Scott Kamin, had argued that officers didn't have legal justification to try to question Legghette, let alone chase after him, for what amounted to an ordinance violation.

But Reddick disagreed, finding that the officer was justified to try to question Legghette because he "reasonably believed he was urinating or about to urinate in a public setting."

The judge also chastised Kamin for asking to postpone the start of trial on Jan. 27, saying he's had plenty of time to prepare. Still, the judge agreed to move the trial to sometime in late February or early March, saying she didn't want Legghette to be harmed by his attorney's "lack of diligence."

The trial is expected to be lengthy and emotional.

Prosecutors said Friday that more than four dozen officers, as well as a dozen civilian witnesses, have been subpoenaed to testify, though far fewer will likely be called to the stand.

At recent court hearings, officers laid out in detail how the incident unfolded.

Officer Raymond Haran testified earlier this week that he was on patrol that afternoon when he noticed Legghette on Lower Wacker Drive appearing to relieve himself against a wall or pillar. When Haran approached and asked to talk to him, Legghette said, "No, I'm good," and ran up the stairs, the officer said.

Haran gave chase but ultimately lost sight of Legghette, then radioed a description of his clothing and told dispatchers that a shooting had recently taken place in the area.

Bauer, downtown for a meeting with aldermen after attending training for mass shootings earlier in the day, heard a radio call of a fleeing suspect and spotted Legghette running nearby moments later, authorities have said.

Bauer chased Legghette to the top of a stairwell outside the Thompson Center and attempted to detain him, authorities said. The two struggled and tumbled down to a landing below. Legghette, who was wearing body armor, drew a handgun and fired seven shots, fatally wounding Bauer, prosecutors have said.

Officer Deronis Cooper heard the gunshots, ran to the stairwell and saw Legghette not far from Bauer's body, he testified Thursday.

Cooper said he handcuffed Legghette and found a loaded handgun with an extended magazine in his possession.

Bauer's weapon was still holstered. His police radio and handcuffs were found next to his body.

The 31-year department veteran, commander of the Near North patrol district, was the highest-ranking Chicago cop killed in decades.

Prosecutors have said they would seek a life sentence for Legghette if he is convicted of Bauer's slaying.

## 'Pro-life is pro-women': Abortion opponents preparing for march

The obstetrician of nearly three decades marvels at how technology has advanced over the span of her career, in so many ways confirming her long-held belief that life begins at conception and must be protected, she said.

She has seen tiny hearts beating as early as six weeks gestation, a sight that never ceases to amaze her.

"I do consider this a life, a separate life," said Dr. Karen Deighan, associate professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Loyola University Medical Center. "I don't see this as different than a newborn baby who should be protected. I do think this is a continuum of life."

The physician is one of about a dozen speakers scheduled for Saturday's annual March for Life Chicago, a gathering billed as "the Midwest's largest pro-life event."

Thousands of opponents of abortion are expected to gather at Daley Plaza for the start of the march and rally, as the nation continues to

clash over abortion rights amid mounting threats to Roe v. Wade, the landmark 1973 Supreme Court case that established a woman's right to terminate a pregnancy.

Last year was pivotal for abortion legislation on opposite ends of the reproductive rights debate spectrum, leaving the country more polarized in terms of access to the procedure.

States like Alabama, Missouri and Georgia in 2019 passed some of the toughest restrictions on terminating a pregnancy in the United States. Others enacted sweeping expansions to abortion provisions, such as the controversial Illinois Reproductive Health Act signed by Gov. J.B. Pritzker in June, which declared the procedure a "fundamental right."

Illinois has long been considered an oasis for abortion access in the generally more restrictive Midwest, with thousands of women traveling here for the procedure from out of state each year, according to state health department statistics. While Illinois

abortion laws are among the most liberal in the United States, women in surrounding states face waiting periods, gestational limits and other barriers.

"There's more people in Illinois and the Midwest who recognize the urgency of this," Dawn Fitzpatrick, March for Life Chicago board president, said. "We recognize that there's a human being that's created from the moment of conception. If an abortion happens, that child is destroyed."

Speakers listed for the rally include Cardinal Blase Cupich, Chicago Bears vice president Pat McCaskey as well as U.S. Rep. Dan Lipinski, a social conservative Democrat from Western Springs whose anti-abortion stance goes counter to most of his party.

"Every January, I am proud to brave the cold and join the March for Life Chicago," Lipinski said in a statement provided by March for Life Chicago. "As a member of Congress, I work to protect the most vulnerable, and no one is more vulnerable than the

child in the womb and that child's mother."

The eight-term lawmaker, who is facing a tough primary contest, was heavily criticized earlier this month by reproductive rights advocates and other Democrats for signing an amicus brief asking the U.S. Supreme Court to revisit and overturn Roe v. Wade.

"I support a big tent but there's no room under the flaps for anyone who is actively seeking to deny women control over our bodies," Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot tweeted recently from her political account. "Time to leave @danlipinski."

Saturday's march and rally are expected to draw a heated counterprotest organized by more than a dozen reproductive rights groups, as advertised on various social media sites.

"Let's gather our forces to show that right-wing bigots should not have a say over our bodily autonomy!" states one post on Facebook.

The March for Life Chicago website instructs its supporters to refrain from

engaging counterprotesters.

"They are certainly welcome," Fitzpatrick said. "We hope that they listen to our speakers, hear the joy of the crowd and have a change of heart."

The event has grown from roughly 1,000 participants in 2014 to a crowd of more than 8,000 in 2019, according to organizer estimates.

Fitzpatrick added that the march theme this year is "Life empowers: Pro-life is pro-woman."

The concept resonates

with Deighan, who knows her position on abortion is fairly counterculture within the medical field and her specialty. The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists in May issued a statement opposing bans on abortion care, calling on lawmakers to "support health policies based on sound science and evidence."

Yet Deighan cautioned that "conscience" laws — those designed to prevent health care providers from being forced to make decisions against their faiths or beliefs — must be preserved against increasing attacks.

She added that she treats both the pregnant woman and fetus, and has contended with some particularly agonizing cases in terms of the health and well-being of each category of patient.

"They are equal, we care about both of them," she said. "Difficult decisions are made every day. But it's about protecting life and about protecting women."

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# ICE blames state, local laws for decline in its arrests

Immigration advocates in Chicago for months braced for the possibility of large-scale arrests by handing out “know your rights” material and forming networks within neighborhoods.

Those big immigration enforcement actions never materialized in Chicago. And on Friday, Henry Lucero, a deputy director for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, traveled from Washington D.C., to report that arrests were actually down in the area, blaming recent laws passed in Illinois that were aimed at protecting immigrants, such as the Trust Act.

Still, Lucero said that wouldn't stop the federal agency from trying to tackle immigration enforcement in the area.

“It does make it much more difficult,” Lucero said. “So our arrests are down in this area because the majority of our arrests used to occur from jails and prisons, a seamless transfer of custody.”

ICE held a rare news conference Friday in

Chicago to call for more cooperation with the federal agency, particularly when it comes to detainees it issues for people held in county jails.

In September, Robert Guadian, the newly appointed Chicago field office director for ICE, spoke to the media for the first time, commenting on a national enforcement campaign. But he was quickly upstaged by Mayor Lori Lightfoot and immigration advocates, who had an impromptu news conference outside the agency's office.

This time, the news conference happened without much fanfare, and there were no activists outside ICE's office.

Chicago officials and ICE authorities seem at odds over immigration enforcement. Chicago's sanctuary city ordinance bars police from giving ICE agents access to people in local custody. Among other provisions, the ordinance prohibits on-duty police officers from talking with ICE officials before a person's release, or allowing ICE agents to use local police facilities for investigations or interviews.

Last year, Lightfoot

ordered the Chicago Police Department to deny ICE access to all department databases related to federal civil immigration enforcement amid concerns of large-scale arrests.

And on Friday, the City Council Health Committee advanced an ordinance that would require local police to document instances when they provide information to ICE. Lightfoot has pushed for the ordinance, calling it, “the first step in a longer process of strengthening the city's immigration protections, which must include eliminating exceptions in the Welcoming City Ordinance.”

Still, activists and some aldermen have pushed for Lightfoot to do more to close what they say are loopholes in the ordinance, particularly when it comes to local databases that federal agents can access.

Last year, Illinois passed a law prohibiting local and state law enforcement agencies from participating in a federal program that deputizes officers with certain immigration enforcement powers, known as 287(g). The McHenry County sheriff's office,

which has a federal contract to house ICE detainees, had applied for the program before the law passed.

The Trust Act, which Lucero referenced Friday, prevents local law enforcement from detaining anyone solely on the basis of their immigration status without a judicial warrant.

Lucero said his agency no longer has access to databases in Illinois that officers previously used to track noncitizens, and local jails have denied the more than 1,000 detainers the agency issued during the fiscal year 2019. He argued this could be costing residents, because local law enforcement agencies will use more resources if this person were to get arrested again.

President Donald Trump has called for tougher immigration enforcement, and he has said his administration is targeting non-citizens with criminal backgrounds. But an analysis of ICE data from Syracuse University determined that the number of detainees with no criminal convictions has grown. In addition, their analysis found the number of

immigrants with serious criminal convictions has been falling.

In Illinois, as of last April 30, there were 599 people in ICE custody at three county jails that have federal contracts to house immigration detainees, according to another Syracuse analysis. Of those detainees, 249 had no criminal convictions, according to the analysis.

The other 350 did have varying criminal convictions, with the largest group being those who committed a “level 3 crime,” which typically involve misdemeanor offenses, according to Syracuse.

Lucero said ICE doesn't want to take any chances on when someone might commit a crime.

“Do we have a crystal ball for when someone's going to commit a crime? No,” Lucero said. “So why take the chance? If you are violating federal (immigration) law, ICE has an interest in you. If you are a criminal, we have more of an interest in you.”

armed robbery and assault, increased on the system by 32% to 590 incidents last year from 447, with the biggest increases in July, November and December, according to the Tribune analysis. Violent crime is defined as one that involves violence or a threat of violence.

The Tribune reported last year that violent crimes on the CTA rail system between 2015 and 2018 doubled, even as ridership declined and such crimes rose only slightly citywide. At the same time, the arrest rate for these “L”-related crimes dropped.

Last year, Chicago police and the CTA told the Tribune they knew that crime was up and that they were addressing it. Last summer, the police added 44 officers to the public transportation unit, bringing the total to 214.

The department also set up technology centers where detectives can get help analyzing CTA station and platform video.

to arrive Saturday morning, when the onslaught of angry lake waves will likely wreak lakeshore flooding and erosion. Officials anticipate parts of Lake Shore Drive and Lakefront Trail will be inundated and waves will swallow local piers and jetties.

This weekend's swells will put to the test the more than 5,000 feet of jersey barriers and 1,000 feet of sandbags placed along numerous stretches of the lakefront. Stone revetments have also been positioned on top of failing shoreline protections in front of drowned-out Juneway, Howard and Rogers Park beaches.

At Montrose Beach, bulldozers along the lakefront on Friday shoved sand into makeshift bulwarks, an apparent defensive measure to prevent inland flooding and protect beaches that have been rapidly eroding.

There will be no precise way to measure Saturday's waves, because scientists take buoys out of the water in late fall or early winter before the lake freezes.

At other times in the year, a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration buoy measures the average wave (the height from the trough to crest) over the course of 10 minutes in the middle of southern Lake Michigan, 43 miles east of Milwaukee.

The highest swells it has observed since that buoy began collecting data in 1981 were 23.1 feet tall on

Sept. 30, 2011, during a potent autumn storm packing 60 mph winds. However, considering 23.1 feet was the average wave height, Lenning said there were likely higher waves from 25 to 30 feet.

During the brunt of the 2011 storm, the buoy also sporadically lost wave height data, presumably because the conditions were so rough.

A tugboat captain in Burns Harbor, Indiana, observed waves crashing over the break wall. Elsewhere, people said they saw Lake Michigan's normally blue waters near the shore turn brownish as the waves stirred up sand and other sediment.

While this weekend's conditions aren't likely to be as rough, the flooding and erosion could be

severe, especially considering that lake levels are more than 3 1/2 feet higher now than they were in 2011. In addition, meteorologists are predicting a 2-foot storm surge, or temporary rise in lake levels caused by changes in atmospheric pressure.

“That's the key difference here,” Lenning said. “We've seen higher waves, but during lower lake levels. There are already places in Chicago's lakefront that are consistently

underwater.”

Fall and winter storms typically churn up the loftiest waves in the Great Lakes.

“So far we've had a pretty mild winter,” Lenning said. “But when you have really cold air from the north and it comes in contact with the lake water, which is relatively warm, it creates a really unstable environment. Winds and gusts work their way down to the surface to push that water

and build those waves.” Southern Lake Michigan shores, such as Chicago and northwest Indiana, are especially susceptible to winds blowing from the north or northwest, given the lake's oblong shape. As these winds glide along the length of the lake, they build and carry waves until they crash along the southern lip.

That's precisely what Chicago witnessed this fall. On Oct. 31 and Nov. 11, following north-northwesterly winds, Chicago's shoreline was buffeted by waves as large as 12 feet high.

## Unlikely political comeback in Asia

China's actions may deliver 2nd term to Taiwan's president

TAIPEI, Taiwan — This time last year, the political future of Taiwan's president, Tsai Ing-wen, was in ruins.

She had resigned as chairwoman of her party after it suffered a humiliating defeat in regional elections. Party elders urged her not to seek reelection. The premier she appointed quit to challenge her in the party's primary last summer.

Now, with the Saturday election nearing, Tsai has made a comeback that seemed impossible only a few months ago. She mostly has China to thank.

China's undisguised belligerence toward Taiwan has given Tsai's campaign a new vigor. So have the protests in Hong Kong over China's steady encroachment on that territory's autonomy.

Tsai and her supporters regularly cite the tumult in Hong Kong as evidence of why Taiwan, an island democracy that has been functionally independent since 1949, cannot simply surrender to China's demands to unite.

"We know the responsibility we bear," Tsai, 63, said at a rally in New Taipei City, where she pledged to a stadium full of cheering, flag-waving supporters to preserve Taiwan as "a beacon of democracy" in the face of efforts by China to undercut it.

"Taiwan is on the front

line," she said.

For Beijing, a second four-year term for Tsai would amount to a repudiation of the pressure tactics that it has wielded against Taiwan ever since she took power in 2016. As a policy failure, it would echo the overwhelming victory scored by the democratic opposition in Hong Kong's district elections in November.

The vision of a China Dream extolled by the country's leader, Xi Jinping, it seems, has little appeal to people when they are given the chance to vote on it.

A former deputy director of the office overseeing Taiwan affairs publicly acknowledged the failure at a policy forum in December, saying that China needed to rethink "our own working methods and approach."

Instead of enticing people in Taiwan to draw closer,

Xi's policies have pushed them further away, and a recognition of that reality is already raising unusually public concerns in Beijing. An annual government survey in Taiwan found that barely 1% of Taiwanese favored unification "as soon as possible."

Since Tsai took office in May 2016, China has largely refused to engage with her government. Instead, Beijing has issued threats against Tsai's aims to "split" China, and flexed its military muscle. It has also restricted economic and cultural ties, including the flow of tourists — all in the hopes of undermining her political support.

At the same time, it offered incentives to Taiwanese businesses and support for her political opponents, including the Kuomintang. China's tactics have involved what officials and

analysts have described as covert efforts to spread disinformation and otherwise undercut Tsai's administration.

Those efforts spilled into the public after a man claiming to be a disillusioned operative for Chinese military intelligence detailed for the Australian authorities an extraordinary — if still largely unverified — litany of secret operations aimed at advancing China's interests in Taiwan, as well as Hong Kong.

Those operations, he claimed, included providing support for Tsai's opponent, Han Kuo-yu. A former legislator with a populist agenda, Han was elected mayor of Kaohsiung, the southern port city, the same race in which Tsai's party was routed.

Han, 62, has denied receiving support from China, even suggesting that the

accusations of Chinese skulduggery were part of a plot by Tsai's Democratic Progressive Party. The public furor, though, has put Han — with his comparatively conciliatory views toward China — on the defensive.

As mayor and now as a presidential candidate, Han has called for a greater effort to smooth relations with China. In March, only months after being elected, he crossed the Taiwan Strait to visit four Chinese cities.

Han claimed the goal of his visit was to drum up sales for Kaohsiung farmers and fishermen, and Chinese state media touted an agreement for \$30 million in new trade. He also met officials from the Communist government who oversee relations with Hong Kong and Macao under the formula called "one country, two systems."

When the protests erupted in Hong Kong three months later, Han was forced to declare that he would never accept such an arrangement for Taiwan. Now, in his stump speeches on the campaign trail, he barely mentions China at all, reflecting how toxic the issue has become for voters across the political spectrum.

Han has focused his attacks instead on Tsai's handling of the economy and other bread-and-butter issues that are often on voters' minds as much as China. "Only I can make Taiwan strong," Han said at one rally, standing in front of a sign that reflected his populist message: "Safety for Taiwan, money for the people."

Tsai and her surrogates never miss a chance to tar him for his association with

China.

When the two squared off for the first time at a sort of televised debate Dec. 18, Han railed at her for losing Taiwan's dwindling diplomatic allies, most recently two tiny Pacific nations. The world, he said, had forgotten about Taiwan during her tenure.

She retorted: "Just now Han said the world has forgotten Taiwan. That's probably because he's going to China a bit too much."

Last January, Xi set the tone in a speech declaring that unification between China and Taiwan was "the great trend in history" and promising a similar "one country, two systems" model for Chinese rule over the island.

Tsai's latest campaign video warned that Xi's formula had failed Hong Kong, especially its youth.

"Only a few hundred kilometers away, countless young people are being arrested, being locked up, being mistreated, being disappeared," the narrator says, then adds, "From the beginning, 'one country, two systems' has been a dictatorship."

Hong Kong was "a wake-up call" that validated Tsai's efforts to forge deeper economic and political ties beyond China, said Lai I-Chung, an adviser to Tsai's party and president of the Prospect Foundation, a think tank in Taipei.

"What's happening to these youngsters is resonating with the youth in Taiwan," he said of the protest movement, which has received support from Taiwanese activists and church leaders, if not the government. "This is not something abstract."

### Texas governor to reject new refugees, first under Trump

HOUSTON — Texas will no longer accept the resettlement of new refugees, becoming the first state known to do so under a recent Trump administration order, Gov. Greg Abbott said Friday.

Since the 2002 fiscal year, Texas has resettled an estimated 88,300 refugees, second only to California, according to the Pew Research Center.

In a letter released Friday, Abbott wrote that Texas "has done more

than its share" and is "left by Congress to deal with disproportionate migration issues resulting from a broken federal immigration system."

Abbott argued that the state and its non-profit organizations should instead focus on "those who are already here, including refugees, migrants and the homeless — indeed, all Texans."

It wasn't clear how Abbott's letter might affect any pending refugee cases.

### Author Marianne Williamson ends White House bid

DES MOINES, Iowa — Democratic presidential hopeful Marianne Williamson, the spiritual guru and bestselling author, ended her campaign Friday, weeks before voting begins, saying she did not want to make it tougher for a progressive to win.

In a post on her website, Williamson said "we will not be able to garner enough votes in the election to elevate our conver-

sation any more than it is now." Williamson has barely registered in the polls and struggled in fundraising since launching her bid for president last January.

She laid off her entire campaign staff at the end of last year but continued to appear at campaign events in Iowa and New Hampshire in recent weeks. Her decision leaves 13 candidates remaining in the primary.

### Pakistan mosque blast kills senior police officer, 13 others

QUETTA, Pakistan — A powerful explosion ripped through a mosque in southwest Pakistan during Friday evening prayers, killing a senior police officer and at least 13 civilians, police said.

The bombing wounded another 20 worshippers in the city of Quetta, the capital of the restive Baluchistan province, said the city's police chief Abdur Razaq Cheema.

The slain police officer

was the likely target of the attack, but authorities were still investigating, said a second police official, Moammad Ajmal.

No one immediately claimed responsibility for the bombing, but the blast struck just days after a roadside bomb in Quetta hit a paramilitary force vehicle, killing two troops.

Hizbul Ahrar, an offshoot of the Pakistani Taliban, claimed responsibility for Tuesday's attack.

### Teacher, 11-year-old suspect die in Mexico school shooting

MEXICO CITY — A student and teacher were killed at an elementary school in northern Mexico Friday, when the 11-year-old opened fire on his teacher and classmates with two guns, authorities said.

Coahuila state Gov. Miguel Angel Riquelme said the sixth-grade shooter and his teacher died.

The preliminary investigation showed that the student arrived at his classroom, told a classmate, "Today is the day," and asked permission to go to the bathroom, Riquelme said. After 15 minutes he had not returned and his teacher went to look for him. He emerged from the bath-

room firing two guns. The shooting ended when he shot himself, he said.

Among the wounded were five students and a gym teacher, Riquelme said.

The governor said the shooter lived with his grandparents and that his mother had died some years ago. He said the boy had not presented behavioral problems before in the school. Investigators were looking into reports that the boy was influenced by a particular video game.

Danya Mendizabal, whose daughter is in the 4th grade at Colegio Cervantes, said she was initially alerted by a chat of student mothers. She called

the school, but no one answered, then she called a teacher who told her that her daughter was fine and she should come get her.

She said she never imagined anything like it could happen at the school. "Colegio Cervantes has always distinguished itself as a very safe school of middle class kids," she said. "Where the parents are working, but we're paying attention."

The school participates in a state program called "Safe Backpack" in which school personnel search each child's backpack when they arrive at school, she said, adding that she inspects her daughter's backpack daily.

### France rejects 11-month deadline for UK-EU talks

BRUSSELS — France made it clear Friday that it does not want to be shackled to the tight deadline British Prime Minister Boris Johnson is seeking to impose for the upcoming free trade talks between Britain and the European Union.

Johnson has said discus-

sions about the future must be completed by the end of 2020 and that there is ample time to reach a wide-ranging deal.

France's EU minister was skeptical and said it could take three times longer.

The European Commission has said it might be

possible to tackle some selected items in 2020, such as fishing rights, but that comprehensive discussions from trade to security would need longer.

The EU has said both sides would suffer — but that Britain would suffer more given the relative sizes of their economies.

### US ban forces Cuban charter flights to land in Havana

HAVANA — The Trump administration is banning charter flights to Cuban cities besides Havana in new U.S. restrictions on the island.

The State Department said in a press release Friday that charter operators would have 60 days to wind down their flights to Santiago, Holguin and seven other cities across the island.

The new restriction leaves both leisure travelers and Cuban Americans without an easy way to travel to destinations outside the Cuban capital. Driving from Havana to eastern Cuba can take more than 12 hours on poorly maintained and often dangerous roads.

Cuban Foreign Minister Bruno Rodriguez on Twitter called the new measure a "serious violation of human rights and freedom of travel of U.S. citizens and hinders family reunification."

**In the Arabian Sea:** An American warship was "aggressively approached" by a Russian Navy ship in the North Arabian Sea, the U.S. Navy said Friday.

Navy Cmdr. Josh Frey, spokesman for U.S. 5th Fleet, said that the USS Farragut was conducting routine operations Thursday and sounded five short blasts to warn the Russian ship of a possible collision. He said the USS Farragut, an Arleigh Burke-class destroyer, asked the Russian ship to change course and the ship initially refused but ultimately moved away.

A statement from the Russian Defense Ministry said the crew of the Russian warship acted professionally and moved to prevent a collision with the U.S. ship.

# Impeachment standoff may be close to ending

Pelosi says House taking steps to send articles to Senate

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said the House will take steps next week to send articles of impeachment to the Senate, ending Democrats' blockade of President Donald Trump's Senate trial.

In a letter to her Democratic colleagues, Pelosi said Friday she was proud of their "courage and patriotism" and warned that senators now have a choice as they consider the charges of abuse and obstruction against the president.

"In an impeachment trial, every Senator takes an oath to 'do impartial justice according to the Constitution and laws,'" Pelosi wrote. "Every Senator now faces a choice: to be loyal to the President or the Constitution."

The move could mean the trial starts as soon as next week.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky,

said Friday that the Senate is "anxious to get started" and "we'll get about it as soon as we can."

Soon after Pelosi sent out the letter, Trump criticized her in an interview with Laura Ingraham of Fox News. He said that it was "ridiculous" that she withheld the articles.

"She should have sent them a long time ago. It just belittles the process," Trump said. "Nancy Pelosi will go down as the least successful speaker of the House in the history of our nation."

The president also expressed concern about former national security adviser John Bolton's announcement that he would testify in the Senate trial if called. Asked if he would invoke executive privilege to stop it, Trump said, "Well I think you have to for the sake of the office."

Chuck Cooper, an attorney for Bolton, declined to comment.

Bolton was present for several of the internal White House discussions about Ukraine policy that were at the heart of the Democrats' impeachment case.

Trump faces charges of

abuse and obstruction over his efforts to urge Ukraine to investigate Democrats.

Since the House vote Dec. 18 to impeach the president, Pelosi has been in a standoff with McConnell that has consumed Capitol Hill and scrambled the political dynamics.

Pelosi, D-Calif., said she did not want to send the articles to the Senate unless she knew there would be a fair trial with witness testimony.

Pelosi also asked McConnell for details on the structure of the trial so she could decide who to appoint as impeachment managers. McConnell never provided them.

On Friday, Pelosi ended the stalemate by saying she had asked House Judiciary Committee Chairman Jerry Nadler to be prepared to bring to the floor next week a resolution to appoint managers and transmit the articles of impeachment to the Senate.

"I will be consulting with you at our Tuesday House Democratic Caucus meeting on how we proceed further," Pelosi wrote in the letter to her colleagues.

She did not announce a date for the House vote.

The move eases for now the protracted showdown between Pelosi and McConnell over the rare impeachment trial, only the third in the nation's history.

Transmittal of the documents and naming of House impeachment managers are the next steps needed to start the Senate trial.

Yet questions remain in the Senate on the scope and duration of a trial.

McConnell wants to launch a speedy trial without new witnesses but Democrats point to new evidence that has emerged as they press for fresh testimony, as well as Bolton's willingness to testify.

Despite McConnell's

wishes for a speedy trial, some Republicans in his caucus have indicated that they are open to witnesses.

Republican Sen. Susan Collins of Maine, who is up for re-election this year, said Friday that she is in discussions with some of her GOP colleagues about how they can adhere "as closely as practical" to former President Bill Clinton's trial, which included closed-door witness testimony.

"I am hopeful that we can reach an agreement on how to proceed with the trial that will allow the opportunity for witnesses for both the House managers and the President's counsel if they choose to do so,"

Collins said.

The House impeached Trump in December on the charge that he abused the power of his office by pressuring Ukraine's new leader to investigate Democrats, using as leverage nearly \$400 million in military assistance for the U.S. ally as it counters Russia at its border.

Trump insists he did nothing wrong, but his defiance of the House Democrats' investigation led to an additional charge of obstruction of Congress.

Republicans hold the leverage in the Senate, with a 53-47 majority, but it takes just 51 senators to set the impeachment rules.

## Buckingham Palace scurries to resolve Harry, Meghan crisis

LONDON — Prince Harry and Meghan's shocking announcement that they plan to become part-time royals caused a painful rupture in his family. But it has also forced Buckingham Palace to confront the changing nature of British royal life as the era of Queen Elizabeth II draws to a close.

On Friday, the palace convened an emergency meeting to address the couple's proposal that they "step back" from their royal duties, seek financial independence and live part of the year in North America. The goal, according to people with ties to the palace, was to find a quick accommodation with the couple, who have become dangerously isolated in the House of Windsor.

Meghan, also known as the Duchess of Sussex, flew to Canada alone after the announcement to care for the couple's 8-month-old son, Archie, who was staying there with a friend. Her hasty departure suggested that, however the palace chooses to respond, things are not going to return to normal.

While Friday's meeting was aimed at easing the crisis and finding a new arrangement for Harry and Meghan, people with ties to the palace said it would have broader implications. Whatever concessions or stipulations Buckingham Palace agrees to could potentially be applied to other members of the family, since the royal family has always been guided by precedent.

Private secretaries for the queen, Prince Charles, Prince William and Prince Harry all took part in the session. William had a particular interest, one person close to the palace said, because his younger children, Princess Charlotte and Prince Louis, will face the same predicament as his brother — unlikely ever to sit on the throne, but still highly visible members of the family.

Charles, the longtime heir and Harry's father, has taken charge of the response to the crisis, much as he did in November after his brother, Prince Andrew, gave a calamitous interview to the BBC about his dealings with the disgraced financier Jeffrey Epstein. Under pressure from Charles, the queen essentially stripped Andrew of his official duties.

Charles has long spoken of his desire to streamline the family during his reign, raising questions about how

many members would continue to carry out official duties or receive funding from the state.

The queen, 93, has already reduced her public schedule. With the banishment of Andrew and the self-exile of Harry, the number of royals who shoulder the family's heavy schedule of charity events, diplomatic ceremonies and hospital visits would dwindle to a small, possibly overburdened, circle.

For all the bruised feelings, experts on the royal family said they did not expect the queen to lash out against the duke and duchess. Harry and Meghan, along with Archie, have come to symbolize the family's future — global stars, with a multiracial family that has appeal throughout the Commonwealth.

"The queen is the first one to admit that she wants an amicable solution," said Dickie Arbiter, who served as a press secretary for the queen from 1988 to 2000. "It's important not just for Harry and Meghan; it's important to prevent the fracturing of the monarchy as an institution."

Still, the hurdles posed by the couple's plans are formidable, ranging from how they will earn a living to who will pay for their security. Many of those have implications for the public funding of the monarchy, which is based on the idea that the royal family is devoted full time to public service.

They have not ruled out spending part of the year in Southern California, where the duchess was raised and where her mother lives. Even in Canada, a member of the Commonwealth, their immigration status would be an issue.

The duke and duchess explained their thinking in a website they had designed by a Toronto firm over the past several months without any input from Buckingham Palace. They excluded their own palace staff from the announcement, leaving them uncertain of even keeping their jobs.

## Boeing worker in emails: Max 'designed by clowns'

Workers mocked FAA, questioned safety of grounded plane

Boeing employees raised doubts among themselves about the safety of the 737 Max, hid problems from federal regulators and ridiculed those responsible for designing and overseeing the jetliner, according to a damning batch of emails and text messages released nearly a year after the aircraft was grounded over two catastrophic crashes.

The documents, made public Thursday by Boeing at the urging of Congress, fueled allegations the vaunted aircraft manufacturer put speed and cost savings ahead of safety in rolling out the Max. Boeing has been wracked by turmoil since the twin disasters and is still struggling to get the plane back in the air.

As if to underscore the point, the Federal Aviation Administration said it plans to fine Boeing \$5.4 million for installing standard parts on the wings of 178 of its 737 Max jetliners.

The FAA said that poor oversight of suppliers led Boeing to install tracks that

could become brittle and weak because of mistakes during manufacturing.

In the 117 pages of internal messages released Thursday, Boeing employees talked about misleading regulators about problems with the company's flight simulators, which are used to develop aircraft and then train pilots on new equipment. In one exchange, an employee told a colleague he or she wouldn't let family members ride on a Max. The colleague agreed.

In a message chain from May 2018, an employee wrote: "I still haven't been forgiven by God for covering up (what) I did last year." It was not clear what the cover-up involved. The documents contain redactions and are full of Boeing jargon. The employees' names were removed.

Employees also groused about Boeing's senior management, the company's selection of low-cost suppliers, wasting money and the Max. "This airplane is designed by clowns who in turn are supervised by monkeys," one employee wrote.

Boeing has said that it is confident the

flight simulators work properly but that the conversations raise questions about the company's dealings with the FAA in getting the machines certified.

It said it is considering disciplinary action against some employees: "These communications do not reflect the company we are and need to be, and they are completely unacceptable."

The Max has been grounded worldwide since March, after two crashes five months apart — one involving Indonesia's Lion Air, the other an Ethiopian Airlines flight — killed 346 people. Investigators believe the crashes were caused when the jetliners' new automated flight-control system mistakenly pushed the planes' noses down.

Boeing is still working to fix the flight-control software and other systems on the Max and persuade regulators to let it fly again.

The work has taken much longer than Boeing expected, and it is unclear when the plane will return to the skies. Federal prosecutors in the meantime have opened a criminal investigation into the development and approval of the Max.

## To streamline, Chicago tech company lets 15% of staff go

Jellyvision laid off 65 people Tuesday, cutting staff by about 15% as the Chicago technology company works to increase revenue and become more nimble.

The layoffs at the 18-year-old company reduced the total number of employees to 356, said CEO Amanda Lannert. Jellyvision hit its profitability targets in 2019, she said, but missed revenue projections. She declined to disclose specifics.

"This is not a business in duress," she said. "It's a business that wants to be faster and better and it comes at a very high price."

Jellyvision got its start making computer games. Now, it makes software that helps employees select health insurance and benefits. Companies buy the software from Jellyvision and make it available to their workers. According to the company's website, 1,500 companies with more than 18 million employees use the software, called Alex.

The layoff is an effort "to better align the company for speed and innovation, not a culling of underperformers," Lannert said. "We built so many centralized departments that we were creating a bit of bureaucracy, and most departments were at least a little bit impacted."

Health benefit selections typically occur near the end of the year, Lannert said. That can leave some Jellyvision employees without much work at other times of the year.

The company plans to use more seasonal workers so it is better aligned "with the ebbs and flows" of the industry, she said. Additionally, Jellyvision will work to decentralize some of its departments.

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## Grubhub 'unequivocally' denies reports that business will be sold in competitive market

Grubhub says there is no process in place to sell the company, a day after media reports said the company was exploring its options as competition in the food delivery business grows increasingly competitive.

The Wall Street Journal reported earlier this week that Grubhub — the second-largest player in the U.S. market by sales —

was thinking about putting itself up for sale.

Grubhub said in a statement that because of the media speculation, it felt it was necessary to clarify "that there is unequivocally no process in place to sell the company and there are currently no plans to do so."

The Chicago company stands out from other recent startups in that it is making money. Grubhub was punished in October when it slashed its revenue expectations,

but it also reported food sales in the most recent quarter grew 15% year-over-year to \$1.4 billion.

Grubhub said that because its profitability is secure, it believes there will likely be opportunities to acquire share this year and that it continues to consult with advisers on possible acquisitions.

Share prices closed at \$52.38 Friday, up 2%.

# Freezing development doesn't fix the problem

There's no better window into Chicago's uneasy relationship with gentrification than The 606 and the Northwest Side communities it straddles. Alongside the 2.7-mile greenway that teems with runners, cyclists and strolling families, neighborhoods are undergoing a raft of teardowns and conversions of two- and three-flats into pricier single-family homes.

Real estate investment injects economic activity that ensures Chicago's continued vitality. But that infusion of dollars can drive out existing homeowners and tenants who can't afford their neighborhoods anymore.

The trick is to strike a balance that promotes growth and renewal but protects neighborhood affordability for those longtime residents who need assistance.

One thing's for sure: Imposing an outright freeze on growth won't strike that balance. Yet that's essentially what would have happened under a measure proposed by a couple of Northwest Side aldermen. On Tuesday Mayor Lori Lightfoot rightly intervened, putting the measure on hold.

Ald. Roberto Maldonado, 26th, and Ald. Carlos Ramirez-Rosa, 35th, have been pushing a new ordinance that would ban demolitions and new building permits along The 606 from Feb. 1 until March 31, 2021, the Tribune's Ryan Ori reported this week.

In addition, no rezoning of residential property would take place during that span. Exceptions would only be made if a building had to be razed for safety reasons, or was

being replaced by development devoted entirely to affordable housing. The moratorium would apply to properties bounded by Western Avenue on the east, Kostner Avenue on the west, Palmer Street on the north and Hirsch Street on the south.

So, for 14 months, anyone within that tract who wants to turn a profit and sell their property to a developer would have to wait. A freeze would be placed on new housing.

That's not a solution. That's avoiding a solution.

The aldermen want to set up a commission to study ways to stave off displacement of existing residents in what are largely Hispanic neighborhoods. That's a worth-

while undertaking, but why hasn't that been done before? The 606 opened in 2015. Since then, gentrification and the availability of affordable housing have been top priorities in these neighborhoods.

Lightfoot's office said the mayor had concerns about the proposed ordinance's legality, particularly because it would "unilaterally ban zoning changes in areas near The 606, as well as halt any building permits in the area," mayoral spokesman Eugenia Orr said in a statement emailed to the Tribune.

Rather than roadblocking development, Maldonado, Ramirez-Rosa and every other alderman should work on remedies

that ramp up housing affordability across the city without forsaking economic growth. Increasing the portion of new development devoted to affordable housing can help. One example: Tying more affordable housing into "transit-oriented development" projects that entail high-density housing and retail near mass transit.

Every neighborhood needs investment and regeneration. Without dynamism, Chicago communities will stagnate, job growth will shrink and the exodus out of Illinois will grow.

Gentrification is an issue. Shutting down real estate development is no answer.

### WHAT OTHERS ARE SAYING

In 1980, around 24% of school-aged children lived with a single parent, and just 9% lived in a household where a foreign language was spoken; today, 32% live with a single parent, and 22% are raised in households speaking a foreign language. These are challenges that schools did not cause and that we cannot expect teachers to easily overcome.

Even more important, classroom achievement will always be constrained by the abilities of the students themselves. The psychologist Douglas Detterman finds that "the majority of the variance in educational outcomes is associated with students, probably as much as 90% in developed economies." From that perspective, blaming teachers for

"failing schools" is unfair.

This is an argument that cuts both ways, however. One cannot assert that teachers are nearly powerless to overcome outside obstacles to student learning and simultaneously maintain that teachers require higher salaries for the vital work they do.

Teachers unions in particular suffer from this cognitive dissonance. "In

the end, it's the students who pay the price for low teacher salaries," according to one National Education Association article. But a different NEA article declares that we must "stop blaming teachers" for the problems in education, inadvertently making the case against higher salaries.

# Comedy is for everyone

Asperger's Are Us troupe is just one highlight of 2 weeks of laughs at Chicago SketchFest

It's rare that interviews are nonstop laugh sessions.

Direct questions often yield direct answers.

But not with the comedy troupe Asperger's Are Us, a group of four Boston-adjacent openly autistic people. You may recall the group's members Noah Britton, Ethan Finlan, Jack Hanke and New Michael Ingemi after the six-part HBO documentary series "On Tour With Asperger's Are Us" aired in spring 2019, showcasing their first cross-country tour.

From the time Ingemi, Finlan and Hanke (Britton was on the West Coast sleeping, per Ingemi) started talking about their upcoming appearance at the 19th Annual Chicago Sketch Comedy Festival this weekend, the team bantered jokes that kept the guffaws flowing. The following is edited from our conversation.

**Q: How did the team come to the fest?**

**Ingemi:** I forget if it was carrier pigeon or email. Jack, do you remem-

ber?

**Hanke:** It was smoke signals.

**Ingemi:** I think they forgot that carrier pigeons have a range of 500 miles, so they had to email us instead because the pigeons kept dying in route.

**Finlan:** Very unprofessional. Actually, one of the pigeons went to my spam pigeon folder.

**Q: Is it hard to keep the rhythm going after 10 years together as a comedy team?**

**Ingemi:** We're not really friends at all, we're sort of all nemeses. The spite motivates us to jump in, and I think our mutually held malice really encourages us to keep the insults and the anger going. Once our rage and hatred boils out ...

**Hanke:** The beautiful thing about our troupe was 10 years ago, we all started out as really good friends and now 10 years on, we've become really good colleagues — we worked our way up.

**Ingemi:** That's all anyone can hope to accomplish really with a friendship (laughing). The friendship has sunk to

the bottom of the sea, but the colleague-ship has soared to new highs.

With nearly 120 performances over the course of two weeks, SketchFest kicked off Thursday at Stage 773 with Chicago-area natives and funny men Parvish Cheena and Danny Pudi (a two-man show called Parv & Pudi). The duration of the fest, which began in 2002, will showcase international ensembles, comedy veterans and fresh talent. Other lineup highlights: SketchFest favorites Rehner & Nixon and Off Off Broadway, Los Angeles-based Billionaire Pity Party and Comedy Dance Chicago, which uses physical comedy and dance to connect with its audience. International acts include Toronto-based the Wow, Latin American-influenced Salsation Theatre Company and Israeli Wonder.

SketchFest executive producer Jill Valentine says there is something for everyone's comedic taste.

"SketchFest loves when comedians come home to Chicago after making such a name in the industry," Valentine said. "Danny Pudi and Parvish Cheena are great examples of amazing talent

that come back to Chicago where audiences absolutely love them. Asperger's Are Us ... I caught their documentary on HBO and thought I need to get them to Chicago. I thought that bringing this group will not only inspire all different types of comedians but also show Chicago audiences comedy is for everyone. These guys are super refreshing and downright funny."

As for the guys in Asperger's Are Us, this is not the first time they will be on a Chicago stage.

When asked what new material can the audience expect, Ingemi said, "All of our material was handed down to us via stone tablets by our ancient ancestors."

So they're just repurposing all of the jokes?

"Exactly, it's all plagiarized," Ingemi said.

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## Series a 'true crime podcast come to life'

Travel Channel's 'Lost in Wild' explores mystery of Chicago-area writer who vanished 31 years ago

Keith Reinhard was on a three-month sabbatical from his job covering prep sports for the Daily Herald in 1988 when he left for a solo mountain hike in Colorado and never returned. The 49-year-old Algonquin resident had been staying in a small mining town west of Denver and writing a novel inspired by Tom Young, who had gone missing from that same town the year before.

Filmmaker J.J. Kelley and journalist Kinga Philipps try to figure out what happened to Reinhard and Young on an episode of their new Travel Channel series, "Lost in the Wild," that's scheduled to air at 10 p.m. Sunday. Philipps describes the eight-episode series as a "true crime podcast come to life."

"A lot of times these cases are not that well investigated, especially when you get into some of our international cases, where the government might have had a hand in covering things up. A lot of times these people have never been interviewed on the record.

If they have been interviewed, those transcripts have been buried. With the Keith Reinhard story specifically, I think yeah, we definitely went in there trying to uncover new information," Kelley told the Tribune by phone.

Young, a bookstore owner in Silver Plume, Colorado, went missing in September 1987. His body, along with the body of his dog, were found in mountain wilderness outside Silver Plume in July 1988. They both had been shot in the head. Young's death was ruled a suicide, though some people were not convinced that Young would have killed his beloved dog.

Reinhard — who was working out of Young's vacant storefront — told people on Aug. 7, 1988, that he was going to climb Pendleton Mountain, which would have been an arduous hike for anyone, but especially for Reinhard, who was known to have a fear of heights. His disappearance spawned a massive search at the time.

Kelley and Philipps visit Silver Plume, interview people connected to the case and consult a

professional medium to try to solve the mystery.

"Seeing that location, hearing the depositions of the people that have something to do with the story, we sincerely hope that would trigger something for someone who maybe hiked in that area, who maybe connected with Keith, who maybe saw something, heard something that they didn't think mattered, but if

they saw the show and thought, 'Wow, that little bit of information that I had, if I bring that to someone, that could actually further this investigation.' That's our hope," Philipps said.

Upcoming episodes of "Lost in the Wild," which premiered in December, are slated to explore disappearances in the Galapagos Islands and Malaysia.

Reinhard's story, meanwhile, is


getting the movie treatment. "Dark Side of the Mountain," slated to screen at film festivals this year, delves into the conspiracy theories around Reinhard's disappearance. The documentary is said to feature exclusive interviews with Reinhard's family and friends and never-before-seen footage shot by Reinhard himself.



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# Wide-open Oscar race

Directors, producers guilds show 'Jojo Rabbit' love, leaving a question mark for academy

In an awards season version of Super Tuesday, the Producers Guild further confirmed the legitimacy of "1917" and provided fuel to a resurgent "Little Women," while Directors Guild voters nominated the usual suspects and, surprisingly, Taika Waititi, offering more good news to devoted fans of the quirky Hitler comedy "Jojo Rabbit."

The producers' and directors' nominations came hours after the British Film Academy

announced its slate and a day after the Writers Guild weighed in with its picks. It's a sign of the unusually accelerated awards season in which Oscar voting closed Tuesday, nominations are announced Monday and the show is set for Feb. 9.

With the precursor dust now settled, three movies — "Parasite," "The Irishman" and "Jojo Rabbit" — managed to secure nominations from the four primary guilds: producers, directors, actors and writers.

"Once Upon a Time in Hollywood" likely would have pulled off the sweep

as well, but the film was ineligible for the Writers Guild because Quentin Tarantino is not a member. Waititi's inclusion along-

side Tarantino, Bong Joon-ho ("Parasite"), Martin Scorsese ("The Irishman") and Sam Mendes ("1917") in the DGA nominations ranked as the day's biggest surprise. After winning the People's Choice Award at the Toronto International Film Festival, "Jojo Rabbit," a sentimental satire about a Hitler Youth member finding his humanity in the horrors of the Holocaust, did middling business in theaters.

But the movie — and Waititi — have a passionate, devoted following, including, it would seem, a great many awards season voters.

That Waititi directed the lauded finale of "The Mandalorian," Disney Plus' "Star Wars"-universe TV series, could have only helped his cause. The DGA does have a high percentage of television directors among its membership, but maybe Baby Yoda did the magic hand thing to put Waititi over the top. "Joker" director Todd Phillips landed nominations alongside Tarantino, Scorsese, Mendes and Bong at both the Golden Globes and the BAFTAs but was the one to miss out at the DGA. Mendes won the Golden Globe.

The Producers Guild nominees — "1917," "Ford v

Ferrari," "The Irishman," "Jojo Rabbit," "Joker," "Knives Out," "Little Women," "Marriage Story," "Once Upon a Time in Hollywood" and "Parasite" — mixed critical and commercial favorites, rewarding movies that have been cited throughout this awards season.

With 10 nomination slots, the PGA Awards have some wiggle room in lining up with an Oscar best picture slate, which has included either eight or nine movies since the motion picture academy's 2011 move to its current, complicated, voting system that allows for a variable roster of five to 10 best picture nominees.

Last year, all eight Oscar best picture nominees showed up on the PGA list. In 2018, when there were nine nominees, academy voters replaced PGA nominees "I, Tonya," "Molly's Game" and "Wonder Woman" with the PGA-overlooked "Phantom Thread" and "Darkest Hour."

As the academy has never nominated 10 movies in its current system, at least one of the PGA-feted pictures will have to go. And, unless Oscar voters grant "Bombshell," "The Farewell" or "The Two

Popes" an unexpected reprieve, we won't see any swap-outs this year. "Knives Out" is the most likely movie to drop off the academy's list, with "Ford v Ferrari" being a possibility too.

But as both films were commercial as well as critical hits, grossing more than \$100 million in the States, their inclusion would provide the telecast with a couple of familiar titles alongside other popular best picture contenders like "Joker," "Once Upon a Time" and the surging "Little Women."

The PGA film award has often been a strong precursor to an Oscar best picture win. After both the academy and the PGA expanded their best picture slates and adopted a preferential ballot to determine the victor, the two groups matched six years running.

There have been blips: The academy favored "Spotlight" over the PGA winner, "The Big Short," and "Moonlight" prevailed over "La La Land," the PGA's choice. But order has been restored the last two years, with "The Shape of Water" and "Green Book" winning both honors.

With the best picture race remaining unsettled, there will be notable attention paid to the outcome of this year's PGA prize.

Could that winner be Mendes' late-arriving war film "1917"? The movie won the Golden Globe for best drama and picked up a key nomination from the Writers Guild.

The movie will likely sweep through the academy's crafts categories when Oscar nominations are announced. Nods for cinematography, production design, score, sound editing, sound mixing and visual effects are likely along with picture and director.

But for the movie to win, it will likely need a nomination for original screenplay or acting, along with film editing. And the intimate, often wordless drama, constructed to appear as if it's one unbroken take, faces significant challenges on each of those fronts.

**“Family or Fiancé”** (8 p.m., 11 p.m., OWN): The high-stakes social experiment returns with new episodes in which relationship expert Tracy McMillan helps engaged couples seek the blessing of — at least initially — disapproving family members who think their proposed union would be a mistake for one reason or another.

The once-proud Hoosiers have fallen on hard times.

**“NFL Football”** (3:30 p.m., NBC): Jimmy Garoppolo and the San Francisco 49ers are the top seed in the NFC and also the NFC West champion. They’ll host Kirk Cousins and the Minnesota Vikings in the opening game of the Divisional round of the NFL Playoffs. While the 49ers sat out the Wild Card round, the Vikings won on the road against New Orleans. Later on CBS, the Tennessee Titans visit the Baltimore Ravens, who are the top seed in the AFC.

**“John Wick: Chapter 3 — Parabellum”** (7 p.m., 11:20 p.m., HBO): This third entry in the Keanu Reeves action franchise was the most successful to date, both in terms of box-office revenue and critical praise for the screenplay and performance. The story picks up just one hour after the events of the second “Wick” film and finds the ex-hitman title character on the run for his life, pursued by legions of assassins eyeing the \$14 million contract placed on his head for his recent actions.

**“Psycho Nurse”** (7 p.m., 11:01 p.m., Lifetime): Mira and Todd (Abbie Cobb, Sean Faris) feel overwhelmed when their son is diagnosed with a rare condition that requires a carefully monitored special diet and physical treatment to survive. They decide to hire a live-in nurse, Gwen (Lyndon Smith), to provide the kind of focused care their son needs, but alas, Gwen has a few screws loose and soon is fantasizing about removing Mira from the picture and taking Todd and his son for herself.

**“Love in Winterland”** (8 p.m., Hallmark): Italia Ricci stars in this new 2020 romance as Alice, a luxury hotel manager, who snags a spot on a TV dating show in the vein of “The Bachelor.” She’s even happier when things go well and she is among the finalists, but as she goes back to her hometown for the last date with her TV suitor (Jack Turner), she’s stunned to discover her former boyfriend, Brett (Chad Michael Murray), now is running the inn where the show’s crew is booked.

## EDD BYRNES 1932-2020

# ‘Kookie’ from ‘77 Sunset Strip,’ Vince Fontaine in 1978’s ‘Grease’

LOS ANGELES — Edd Byrnes, 87, star of the 1950s and ‘60s TV hit “77 Sunset Strip” who went on to co-star in the 1978 smash “Grease,” has died, the actor’s son, Logan Byrnes, confirmed Thursday via Facebook.

Byrnes died at his home in Santa Monica, California, according to Logan Byrnes, a news anchor for KUSI-TV in San Diego.

Byrnes became a comedic sensation as the co-star of the ABC detective drama “77 Sunset Strip,” starring Efrem Zimbalist Jr. as a hip LA private detective. Byrnes played Kookie, the parking lot attendant with a habit of running his comb through his slick hair. His character, Gerald Kookson III, introduced a host of early ‘60s slang into mainstream prime-time culture.

The series was among a slew of slick action-dramas that the fledgling Warner Bros. Television division produced for the Big Three networks in the late 1950s and early ‘60s.

The Kookie character took on more fame when Byrnes teamed with pop star Connie Stevens on a novelty record — “Kookie, Kookie (Lend Me Your Comb)” — for the then-newly formed Warner Bros. Records, that climbed the charts in 1959. Byrnes also appeared as Kookie in crossover episodes with fellow Warner Bros./ABC dramas “Hawaiian Eye” and “Surfside 6.”

Byrnes was dropped from “Sunset Strip” along with other cast members when Warner Bros. brought in “Dragnet” star-producer Jack Webb to shake the series in its sixth season, which proved to be its last.

In the mid-1960s through the late 1990s, Byrnes enjoyed a long run in TV guest shot roles and supporting movie roles. He played radio announcer Vince Fontaine in the 1978 movie rendition of “Grease,” alongside John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John.

A native of New York City, Byrnes came to Hollywood in his early 20s with

“a few hundred dollars and a dream of making it big in the entertainment business,” Logan Byrnes wrote.

Before “Sunset Strip,” Byrnes logged roles on 1950s TV dramas “Wire Service,” “Navy Log” and “Crossroads.” He was featured in three episodes of “Maverick,” the stylish TV Western starring James Garner that was also produced by Warner Bros. TV.

After his run as Kookie, Byrnes had guest shots on such series as “Burke’s Law,” “Honey West,” “Manix,” “Love, American Style,” “Adam-12,” “Marcus Welby, M.D.,” “Police Woman,” “The Hardy Boys/Nancy Drew Mysteries,” “Charlie’s Angels,” “The Love Boat,” “Fantasy Island,” “Married With Children” and “Murder, She Wrote,” among many others.

Byrnes published an autobiography, “Kookie No More,” in 1996 that detailed his long struggle with alcoholism.

In addition to his son, Byrnes’ survivors include his ex-wife, Asa Maynor, and longtime companion Catherine Gross.




It's unusual for the weak two-bidder to have as strong a hand as the over-caller, but both bids were reasonable. South won the opening spade lead with dummy's ace and drew trumps in three rounds. He then led a spade to dummy's queen and East's king. East shifted to a low club, South played his 10, and West won with his jack. West cashed the ace of clubs and the ace of hearts, but that was it for the defense. Dummy's jack of spades provided a parking place for declarer's third club. We don't know how often the final contract would be three diamonds in a duplicate contest, but we would expect to see the same defense at many of those tables. It is a lazy defense, however, and we think West should have done better. East made a good play when he shifted to a low club. The defense would have had no chance had he shifted to a high club. From West's point of view, it was certainly possible for South to have the queen of clubs rather than the queen of hearts, but how could the defense prevail after West wins the jack of clubs? West should see that the only chance for the defense was to win the club shift with the ace and return the jack. That would have led to down one. Always be on the lookout for an unusual play that can't cost and might be very successful.

Amid trade speculation, Bryant gets \$18.6M deal

Contreras, Schwarber, Baez also get 1-year deals, avoid arbitration

The Cubs agreed to one-year contracts with six players — including All-Stars Kris Bryant, Javier Baez and Willson Contreras — before Friday's deadline to avoid arbitration, sources confirmed to the Tribune.

Bryant and the Cubs agreed to

an \$18.6 million deal for 2020, as first reported by ESPN's Jeff Passan. Bryant made \$12.9 million in 2019.

Despite the agreement, Bryant's future with the team remains uncertain amid trade speculation and his pending grievance over alleged service-time manipulation. The deal does not affect the grievance, which the players union filed on the third baseman's behalf in October.

Bryant made his major-league debut April 17, 2015, leaving him

one day shy of the service time needed to become a free agent after the 2020 season. Bryant contends he was held in the minors in a deliberate effort to delay his eligibility for free agency.

If Bryant wins his case, he would be a free agent next off-season. If he loses, he would be under Cubs control through 2021. So the independent arbitrator's ruling will have a big effect on Bryant's trade value.

Carter's return in sight

Bulls center hopes to recover from ankle injury before All-Star break

Wendell Carter Jr. had never dealt with a high ankle sprain, and those first few days after he suffered the injury were the hardest.

The pain was so bad initially — he called it about a nine on a 1-10 scale — it interrupted his sleep schedule. He would wake up in the middle of the night with his

ankle howling in pain.

So, in a way, Carter felt a bit fortunate as he walked through the Advocate Center on Friday morning in street clothes and wearing a walking boot, even as his teammates prepared to host the Pacers without him. A Thursday MRI and CT scan revealed a high right ankle sprain that will keep Carter out for four to six

weeks, but judging from the initial pain, he feared much worse.

"I guess I've got good genes," Carter — now walking without crutches and his pain level registering at about a five or six — said with a smile. "It just started healing a lot faster than usual, so hopefully I can get back on the court."

Lehner eyeing a big payday

Blackhawks goalie wants to make splash in free agency

If the Blackhawks expect goaltender Robin Lehner to give them a discount in a contract extension because he likes playing in Chicago, they better guess again.

After an optional practice Friday at Fifth Third Arena, Lehner reiterated how much he enjoys being a Hawk and would like to be part of their future.

But he also made it clear he won't sell himself short like he feels he did last summer, when he signed a one-year, \$5 million deal with the Hawks after being a Vezina Trophy finalist with the Islanders.

"I've taken discounts my whole life," Lehner said. "I'm not a guy that wants to be overpaid either. I want to gain some respect that I think I deserve, and we'll see if that happens or not."

While Lehner said he is open to signing an extension with the Hawks before free agency begins in July, he seems to have done his research on the impending market for goalies.

Lehner, 28, is the only current starting goalie under 30 scheduled to be an unrestricted free agent. The top available UFAs next summer include Braden Holtby (30), Jacob Markstrom (30), Thomas Greiss (34), Anton Khudobin (34) and Jaroslav Halak (35).

"The market is wide open," Lehner said. "There's a lot of teams that need goalies. It's not that many goalies that are available this (summer). So we'll see what happens. All I know is I really like it here. I've learned enough."

# Deep South continues title tilt lock

Clemson-LSU matchup extends regional dominance

NEW ORLEANS — Gloomy clouds were lingering over the Big Easy as the contestants were scheduled to arrive for the so-called national championship game.

The weather conditions Friday were an appropriate mood-setter.

The tedious, 16-day-long break since the semifinals has largely stifled the momentum of the college football season, turning the biggest game of all into a bit of an afterthought.

Clemson and the Southeastern Conference have put a stranglehold on the title game, providing casual fans beyond this corner of the country with little reason to tune in.

Since the College Football Playoff was launched in 2014 — and Ohio State defeated Oregon in an inaugural championship game that turned out to be a total outlier — the Deep South has monopolized the four-team format.

Atlantic Coast Conference powerhouse Clemson has made five playoff appearances, won two national titles and will be going for another when it faces top-ranked LSU on Monday night at the Superdome.

Alabama, long-time kingpin of the SEC, made five straight playoff appearances and won two national titles before finally missing out this season. Their place was effectively taken by conference rival LSU, which knocked off the Crimson Tide in Tuscaloosa during the regular season.

Therefore, every championship game except the first has featured some combination of Clemson and/or the SEC.

No surprise, said Chris Fowler, who will be calling the title game for ESPN.

"Population base for the talent. Pretty simple," he said this week. "It's simply the concentration of youth football, high school football is so important, the pool of players is so large, and the commitment of resources to programs down there, other than a few exceptions outside of the South by and large more resources, more players down there, and I don't think it's going to change anytime soon."

Compare the relatively closed club that is the college football postseason with the free-for-all produced by its hoops counterparts.

Over the last six years, 19 schools from nine conferences — and every corner of the country — have reached the men's basketball Final Four.

Five teams have been fortunate enough to make two appearances. No one else has gotten there more than once.

While the powerhouse Atlantic Coast Conference has snagged three national titles during the six-year span, they've done it with different teams (Duke, North Carolina and Virginia). Villanova from the Big East claimed the title in 2016 and 2018, while UConn from the neophyte American Athletic Conference got the cycle started as the 2014 champion.

The SEC, Big Ten, Big 12 and West Coast conferences have all been represented in the title game, as well.

In other words, a truly national sport. Not so on the gridiron, at least at the highest level.


"You can structure the playoff any way you want to, but if it's the same couple of teams in the mix all the time, you have to ask the question: Is there truly national competitiveness?" said Big 12 Commissioner Bob Bowlsby in a blunt self-assessment.

Bowlsby's conference has been a playoff regular thanks to Oklahoma, which has made the field four out of six years. But the Sooners have barely bucked the dominance enjoyed by Clemson and the SEC, losing in the semifinals all four times.

This year, the gap never looked greater as LSU embarrassed Oklahoma 63-28 in the Peach Bowl.

At least LSU — led by colorful coach Ed Orgeron and Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow — gives the championship game a little different look. The last thing we needed was yet another Clemson-Alabama sequel.

"The playoff has, frankly, needed different teams," Fowler said.

# Colome closes on \$10.5M deal

Five players avoid arbitration with contract agreements

The White Sox avoided arbitration with five players Friday, including closer Alex Colome.

The Sox agreed to terms on one-year contracts with Colome (\$10,532,500), right fielder Nomar Mazara (\$5.56 million), starting pitcher Carlos Rodon (\$4.45 million), infielder/outfielder Leury Garcia (\$3.25 million) and reliever Evan Marshall (\$1.1 million).

With the signings, the Sox have no remaining arbitration-eligible players for 2020.

Colome finished tied for fourth in the American League with 30 saves in 33 chances in 2019. The right-hander went 4-5 with a 2.80 ERA in 62 appearances with 55 strikeouts and 23 walks in 61 innings.

Marshall went 4-2 with a 2.49 ERA and 19 holds in 55 appearances. The right-hander had 41 strikeouts and 24 walks in 50 2/3 innings.

Colome, Marshall and left-hander Aaron Bummer formed a strong back end of the bullpen for the Sox, who reportedly signed free-agent reliever Steve Cishek to a one-year, \$6 million deal Tuesday.

The Sox acquired Mazara in a Dec. 10 trade with the Rangers. The right fielder had 19 home runs and 66 RBIs in 116 games in 2019.

Garcia had a .279/.310/.378 slash line with 27 doubles, eight home runs and 40 RBIs in 140 games. He provides versatility with the ability to play almost everywhere. Garcia started at least one game at second base, third base, shortstop and all three outfield positions in 2019.

Garcia could be in line to start at second base until prospect Nick Madrigal is ready.

Rodon went 3-2 with a 5.19 ERA in seven starts before undergoing season-ending Tommy John surgery in May.

Friday was the deadline for arbitration-eligible players to agree on salaries or exchange numbers for 2020.

■ Pitchers Tayron Guerrero and Kodi Medeiros cleared waivers and were out-righted to Triple-A Charlotte, the Sox announced Friday.

The Cubs are confident they'll win the case, even if almost everyone agreed Bryant was ready to play in the majors at the start of 2015.

The 2015 National League Rookie of the Year and 2016 MVP, Bryant rebounded last year from an injury-riddled 2018 season to bat .282 with 31 home runs and 77 RBIs.

The Cubs also came to terms on one-year deals with Baez (\$10 million), Contreras (\$4.5 million), outfielders Kyle Schwarber (\$7 million) and Albert Almora Jr. (\$1.575 million) and pitcher Kyle Ryan (\$975,000).

According to rosterresource.com, the Cubs payroll stands at \$194 million, below the luxury-tax threshold of \$208 million. The Cubs had baseball's third-highest payroll in 2019 and paid a \$76 million penalty for exceeding the limit.

Players and teams had until noon Friday to come to salary agreements or head to arbitration hearings next month.

Baez nearly doubled his salary from \$5.2 million last season, when the shortstop hit .281 with 29 homers and 85 RBIs and made his second straight All-Star team. He finished second in 2018 MVP voting.

Contreras also made his second straight All-Star team at catcher, hitting .272 with a career-high 24 homers and 64 RBIs. He earned \$684,000.

Schwarber, who made \$3.39 million in 2019, set career highs with a .250 average, 38 homers and 92 RBIs. He was particularly good after the All-Star break, hitting .280 with 20 homers and driving in 49 runs.

The Cubs hope Almora can rebound after his average dropped 50 points to .236 and his on-base percentage fell from .323 to .271. The former first-round pick hit just .213 against left-handers even though he is a righty.

And his average on balls in play dropped from .337 to .255.

Ryan made 73 appearances in 2019 with a 3.54 ERA, 58 strikeouts and 29 walks.



# A chance for payback

Ex-Titans reflect on matchups with Ravens as bitter rivalry renews

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Chris Johnson's rookie season ended at Baltimore with his ankle injured so much he missed the Pro Bowl.

To Eddie George, a divisional round loss to the Ravens after the 2000 season ranks as possibly his most painful.

The Titans playing the Ravens in the divisional round on Saturday night has revived memories of an intense and bitter rivalry along with the agony of possible Super Bowl titles lost.

"This could be a revenge game for us," Johnson said.

In both 2000 and 2008, the Titans had both the NFL's best record and the AFC's No. 1 seed and home-field advantage in the playoffs with the Ravens as the wild-card team. This time around, the roles have reversed with the Ravens (14-2) being the AFC's top seed and the favorite to reach the

Super Bowl and the Titans (10-7) coming in off a big wild-card victory.

"All I have to say is my neck started getting real tight," former Titans safety Blaine Bishop said. "I mean it's just a lot of bad blood with the Ravens."

Bishop was with the Titans who rode the "Music City Miracle" to a close loss in the Super Bowl. The Titans followed up by going 13-3 in the 2000 season, determined to win the championship that eluded them months before.

"And that's why the Ravens have a dagger in my era of players because they took away the Super Bowl we felt like we should've gotten," Bishop said of a 24-10 loss to a Raven team that went on to win the Lombardi Trophy.

George got some payback against the Ravens in January 2004 in a wild-card win in Baltimore when he strapped up an injured shoulder and returned for a big win. He played his last game in a Titans' uniform the next week in a divisional loss on the road to the Patriots, but that divisional loss to the Ravens still stands out.

"It was probably the worst loss that I've ever had because of the emotional ties to it as well as knowing whoever won that game was not only going to the Super Bowl but was going to win the Super Bowl, was going to be the Super Bowl champions because both teams were just that dominant," George said.

In 2008, the Titans had a 10-game winning streak and again went 13-3. Against the Ravens, a couple of moments still stick out from a 13-10 divisional loss:

■ Ravens defenders were seen twisting Johnson's ankle after a whistle with no flag thrown, knocking him out of the game after he had 11 carries for 72 yards in the first half. "It was plays before that and all that stuff after the whistle, bending me back, trying to twist my ankles under the pile and stuff like that," Johnson said. "Then that happened. It was just crazy."

■ Then the play clock expired before the snap on third-and-2 with 2:51 left. Ravens quarterback Joe Flacco completed a 23-yard pass to Todd Heap with no flag. That set up Matt Stover's game-

winning field goal with 57 seconds left.

Derrick Mason played for the Titans against the Ravens in the 2000 divisional loss and the 2003 wild-card win. He said it felt weird coming back to Nashville in the playoffs wearing Ravens' purple after being a salary cap casualty. Mason scored the Ravens' lone TD in that game and he now lives in Nashville where he works in radio. He called the play clock issue something that can happen in a game.

"Just that one play a referee possibly missing a delay of game call that pretty much helped us win that football game that year," Mason said.

Titans coach Mike Vrabel isn't concerned with the past since he never played for either team.

"We have to focus on the Ravens of 2019," Vrabel said.

The Ravens lead the overall series 12-11, and the road team has won all three playoff games to date.

"Only fitting you have to go through Baltimore in Baltimore to get a victory for the Titans," Bishop said.

# Shanahan faces Cousins this time

Onetime Redskins play-caller, quarterback square off in playoffs

SANTA CLARA, Calif. — Kirk Cousins starting the 49ers' first playoff game at Levi's Stadium was how coach Kyle Shanahan planned it when he took over in San Francisco back in 2017.

The surprise is that Cousins is starting for the Vikings instead of the Niners when the teams meet in the divisional round Saturday.

Things have worked out just fine for both Cousins and Shanahan even though the quarterback and play-caller never reunited after building a strong relationship during their time together with the Redskins in 2012-13.

The 49ers (13-3) acquired Jimmy Garoppolo in a trade with the Patriots during the 2017 season months before Cousins hit the free-agent market and have built a strong team around a different quarterback.

Cousins ended up with the Vikings (11-6) on a fully guaranteed \$84 million, three-year contract. He is coming off the biggest win of his career, having thrown the game-winning TD pass in overtime to Kyle Rudolph last week in a 26-20 victory over the Saints in New Orleans.

That success comes as no surprise to Shanahan, who was part of the Redskins' staff that drafted Cousins in the fourth round and helped develop him into an NFL starter.

"I think he's always just steadily climbed," Shanahan said. "Every time he's gotten more opportunities, he's only gotten better."


"I know when he's had bad games, he's always learned from them, come back and respond." I think he's been given the right opportunity. Whenever he's been given the right opportunity, I think he's shown people he's one of the better quarterbacks in this league."

Cousins feels the same way about Shanahan as a play-caller and coach and is not surprised at the success he's had in rebuilding a losing franchise in San Francisco.

"I've been fortunate to be around some great coaches. And Kyle's certainly one of them," Cousins said. "He's shown that through the years since we have gone our separate ways."

But none of that will matter once Saturday's game starts on Saturday. Shanahan says neither side has any advantage because of knowledge on how the other operates.

"I'm not sitting there going against Kirk," he said. "So I think that stuff is totally overrated. He's been a lot of places, he can do a lot of things that I don't know about."

## Chiefs may be without DT Jones, TE Kelce

The Chiefs could be missing DT Chris Jones and TE Travis Kelce when they face the Texans in the divisional round of the AFC playoffs on Sunday.

Jones was listed on the injury report Thursday after coach Andy Reid said he had "tweaked his calf" at practice the previous day. Jones did not practice Friday and Reid declined to say whether there was a chance he'll play Sunday.

Jones also didn't play when the Chiefs lost to the Texans in Week 6 at Arrowhead Stadium.

Kelce has been limited all week with a knee injury that Reid characterized as "a bruise." He also is questionable.

The only player ruled out for Kansas City is CB Morris Claiborne, who did not practice all week. The reason is somewhat of a mystery because he was listed with both not-injury-related and shoulder injury designations.

### Niners activate LB Alexander:

The 49ers activated LB Kwon Alexander off injured reserve ahead of their divisional round matchup with the Vikings on Saturday.

Alexander was placed on IR on Nov. 5 after suffering a torn pectoral muscle but was designated to return on Jan. 2.

The Niners are also expected to have S Jaquiski Tarrt (ribs) and DE Dee Ford (leg) available against the Vikings. Tarrt has not played since Dec. 1, while Ford was injured on Dec. 8.

The Niners also placed DL Kentavious Street on injured reserve.

### McDaniels meets Browns again:

Patriots offensive coordinator Josh McDaniels is again interviewing to become coach of the Browns — his third go-around with the team he grew up watching.

McDaniels was a candidate for the Browns' job in 2009 when it went to Eric Mangini and again in 2014, when he pulled himself from consideration.

McDaniels, 43, might be ready to leave the Patriots after winning Super Bowl titles on Bill Belichick's staff while working alongside superstar QB Tom Brady.

McDaniels is the eighth candidate to meet with owner Jimmy Haslam and his search committee, who have no other scheduled interviews at this point and could be nearing a decision.

Because of his major past success, McDaniels' meeting could be as much about him seeing if the Browns, who haven't made the playoffs since 2002, are a fit for him.


McDaniels is from Canton, Ohio, and he went to college in suburban Cleveland.

The Browns interviewed Vikings offensive coordinator Kevin Stefanski on Thursday. He was a finalist for the job a year ago.

The Browns have also interviewed former Packers coach Mike McCarthy, who is now coach of the Cowboys, Ravens offensive coordinator Greg Roman, Chiefs offensive coordinator Eric Bieniemy, Bills offensive coordinator Brian Daboll, 49ers defensive coordinator Robert Saleh and Eagles defensive coordinator Jim Schwartz.

**Extra points:** Eagles QB Josh McCown tore his hamstring off the bone in the second quarter of last weekend's 17-9 loss to the Seahawks and played through the injury. McCown, 40, will undergo surgery with a six-month timetable for recovery. McCown entered the game after Carson Wentz suffered a concussion. ... Former Dolphins LB Zach Thomas and his wife filed a federal lawsuit seeking a refund of more than \$18,000 in tax penalties paid after working with a convicted tax advisor, the South Florida Sun Sentinel reported. Thomas, who played for the Dolphins from 1996-2007 is one of 15 finalists this year for the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



# Humbling night includes Rinne goal

For a little bit there, the Blackhawks really had us.

They were defying an array of injuries and looking like they were about to make a run toward respectability and, dare we say, the playoffs.

Oh, but no. A pair of consecutive home losses, including Thursday's 5-2 defeat to the Predators, has the Hawks once again closer to the basement of the Western Conference than to a playoff spot.

They're eight points behind the Jets for the final wild-card spot and five points ahead of the Ducks for last place in the conference. That gap at the bottom could narrow even more very soon — the Hawks conclude a four-game homestand Saturday against the Ducks.

Here are three takeaways from Thursday's loss.

## 1. Where was the desperation from the start?

All of the boxes were checked for the Hawks to come out ready to play the desperate 60 minutes they always talk about but rarely display.

Turns out it was all talk again.

The Hawks were at home against a bitter rival that also happened to be the team directly ahead of them in the standings, and they still didn't show up when the puck dropped.

If the Hawks can't play like their season depends on it at a time like this, when can they? They have 37 games to figure it out, but after Thursday's loss, they couldn't explain it.

"We talked about it (before the game)," Connor Murphy said. "We needed desperation tonight, and we didn't have that at the start. That's got to be the first step to the next game for us."

Focusing on the next game is all they can do, but that focus needed to be there for the first 20 minutes against the Predators. It wasn't there until it was too late.

The sad part is the Hawks probably had a better night overall. They had a strong second period, then dominated the third. That is, except on the scoresheet.

"The effort we had in the first, we've had worse periods, and maybe that would've been good enough in November," coach Jeremy Colliton said. "But not in a game like tonight."

Or in the previous game, a 2-1 loss to the Flames on Tuesday. The Hawks fell to 1-2 on their homestand with both losses coming against Western Conference wild-card contenders.

## 2. Is it time to put Patrick Kane and Jonathan Toews together?

When all else fails — or when too many players are injured — it might be time to turn to Patrick Kane and Jonathan Toews on the same line.

Jeremy Colliton put his two best players together Thursday, mainly on a line with Dominik Kubalik, and they were dominant. They were on the ice for 12 shots for and only one against in 7 minutes, 13 seconds of even-strength play for a 92.31 Corsi percentage.

But viewing Kane and Toews together as some panacea would be misguided. While they have been on the ice for 11 goals scored and just eight allowed in 166:31 of even-strength ice time together this season, they have only a 47.54 Corsi percentage.

Colliton said he's willing to have a Kubalik-Toews-Kane line, but he believes they would do better when moved together late in the game.

"When they've started together, it hasn't worked out that well," Colliton said. "They seem to play better when we spot them in for a shift here, shift there, or we'll do it late in a game. But we look at everything to try to win."

## 3. It was a historic night for Pekka Rinne.

The disappointed Hawks fans who hung around long enough saw some history before they left the United Center. For the first time in six seasons, and for just the 15th time in NHL history, a goalie scored a goal.

With the Hawks trailing 4-2 and having already allowed one empty-net goal, they pulled Corey Crawford again. Predators goalie Pekka Rinne stopped a dump-in attempt behind his net and airlifted a shot beyond the far blue line, and it slid into the Hawks net for his first career goal.

Rinne is only the 12th goalie to score in an NHL game, including playoffs. Martin Brodeur scored three times and Ron Hextall twice.

The first NHL goalie credited with a goal was the Islanders' Billy Smith, who was the last player on his team to touch the puck before an opposing player shot the puck into an open net on Nov. 28, 1979.

The first goalie to shoot a puck into a net was the Flyers' Hextall on Dec. 8, 1987. Hextall did it again on April 11, 1989.

One of Brodeur's three goals for the Devils came when he shot the puck, and twice he was credited with a goal when he was the last player on his team to touch the puck.

after injuring his right knee and was available but did not start in Thursday's 3-2 loss to the Predators.

**Strome still not ready:** A fully dressed Dylan Strome stepped onto the ice minutes before the Hawks were set to start practice.

After skating for less than a minute and appearing to favor his sprained right ankle, Strome headed back to the locker room and didn't return.

Strome hasn't practiced since injuring his ankle in Tuesday's loss to the Flames, and he sat out Thursday's game.

"Trying to figure it out," coach Jeremy Colliton said. "It seems like it's day to day, so that's good. As far as when he's going to return, I don't know."

for the game, feel for my teammates. But it is just a minor setback. Not as devastating as my previous injuries were, so that's a positive to it."

Coach Jim Boylen also attempted to find the positives, even as he acknowledged it would be challenging for the Bulls to play without what he called "the anchor of their defense." The Bulls have also been better across the board offensively with Carter in the lineup (plus-0.24 in effective field-goal percentage and a plus-6.4 net rating in addition to plus-10.3 in total rebounding percentage).

Gafford started Friday night, but Boylen did not want to commit to anything beyond that, saying the lineup will remain fluid depending on the matchup with either Gafford or Thaddeus Young inserted into the starting five.

Gafford gives the Bulls a traditional rim-protecting center in Carter's absence, while Young can help bolster a second unit that has scuffled recently.

"It's an opportunity for someone else on our team to grow," Boylen said. "It's an opportunity to build experience, depth. It's not what we would like, it's not what we prefer. It's what life throws at you."


## Major winter storm sweeping across Midwest

### NATIONAL FORECAST



Late Friday, low pressure was moving northeast from Oklahoma, spreading heavy snow, rain and severe thunderstorms into the Midwest. As of 6 p.m. Friday, at least 30 reports of large hail and tornadoes were received from Missouri to Texas. This storm will track across the lower Ohio river early Saturday, before lifting across Indiana. Heavy rain across the metro area will transition to snow, with several inches of accumulation likely, but timing of this change over is critical to how much. West and north portions of the metro area can expect rain or freezing rain to mix with sleet and snow early before becoming all snow in the afternoon. From the city, south and east, this transition will take place Saturday evening. Accumulations of 6 to 10 inches to the northwest are expected to taper to about an inch to the south.

### ASK TOM

Dear Tom,  
 I have noticed on occasion that the wind direction at the ground is sometimes different than higher up. For example, northeast winds at the ground but southeast winds at cloud level. How are these two events, next to each other, appearing to act independently of each other?  
 Margaret Robertson, Chicago

Dear Margaret,  
 Different wind directions at the surface and aloft are not at all unusual. In fact, it is the case much more often than not. And it's true of wind speeds as well. The atmosphere is complex. Broadly speaking, the factors that cause wind vary considerably from place to place, especially in the vertical. Aloft, say at 2,000 feet above the surface, air usually moves in response to large-scale weather features that often have little effect at the surface, where winds respond to local surface factors.



## SMASHING STEREOTYPES

### Jackson leads a successful generation of black QBs

Days before Ravens rookie quarterback Lamar Jackson made his first NFL start against the Bengals in 2018, he received a phone call from Redskins great Doug Williams.

The former quarterback wanted to provide words of encouragement for Jackson, who was set to become the next in a line of black quarterbacks to start in the NFL.

"As a young, African-American quarterback, sometimes the road might be a little more slippery for him than for other people," said Williams, senior vice president of player personnel for the Redskins who, in 1988, became the first black quarterback to play in and win a Super Bowl. "The call was basically to tell him, 'Don't look back. Just keep going forward.' And I think that's what he's done."

Jackson, starting for an injured Joe Flacco, led the Ravens to a 24-21 victory, beginning a stretch of six wins in the last seven games as the Ravens won the AFC North for the first time since 2012 and reached the playoffs for the first time since 2015.

After a disastrous performance in a wild-card round loss to the Chargers, he returned in his second season a vastly improved player, leading the Ravens to the league's best record (14-2) and the AFC's top seed while becoming the presumptive NFL Most Valuable Player.

Jackson headlines a list of young, black quarterbacks — many of whom are producing from inside and outside the pocket — who have had standout seasons as the NFL celebrates its 100th anniversary.

Their achievements this season merit praise, but also serve as a stark reminder of how far black quarterbacks have come and a time when they were overlooked as signal-callers.

Of the league's leaders this season in QBR, ESPN's all-encompassing metric of quarterback play, five of the top 10 are black. Four of the six quarterbacks named to the 2020 Pro Bowl are black: Jackson, Deshaun Watson, Patrick Mahomes and Russell Wilson. Jackson, Watson and Mahomes each led their teams to a division title.

Heading into the 2018 draft, Jackson was one of the more widely scrutinized prospects in recent memory. At Louisville, Jackson dazzled the college football world with his arm and legs, and in 2016 became the youngest player to win the Heisman Trophy.

But as he approached the NFL scouting combine and the draft, questions arose about his ability to transition to the pro level.

Some, most notably former NFL executive Bill Polian, suggested Jackson would be better suited switching to wide receiver, or another skill position that could make use of

his rare athletic ability. Earlier this season, Polian acknowledged fault in his assessment of Jackson, telling USA Today Sports he "used the old, traditional quarterback standard with him."

Still, the commentary was eerily similar to a time when biases and stereotypes prevented qualified black quarterbacks from getting a fair shot in the NFL. Marlin Briscoe, after starring as a quarterback at Nebraska-Omaha, was drafted in the 14th round of the 1968 AFL draft and forced to switch to cornerback with the Broncos.

Briscoe, whose dual-threat capabilities Williams said most reminded him of Jackson, eventually got his opportunity at quarterback as a rookie after an injury, becoming the first black quarterback to start in the modern era of American professional football.

In the NFL, Colts running back George Taliaferro, who starred at multiple positions, became the first black player to start at quarterback in 1953.

Although Briscoe set records in 1968, he wasn't considered for the starting job at the beginning of the next season. After requesting his release from the team, Briscoe never played quarterback again but won two Super Bowls as a wide receiver for the Dolphins.

Briscoe's football journey was similar to many black players who had aspirations of playing quarterback. As the NFL demographics shifted and the league became predominantly black, African American faces were missing at the game's most important position.

Former NFL executive Louis Riddick

said in his time as a pro scout and director of player personnel, these notions were never displayed outwardly, but "we'd be naive to think that some people don't have those biases."

"Lamar looks different than Tom Brady. We all can see that," said Riddick, an ESPN analyst. "And some people will then go even further with that and say, 'Well, he's going to be different than Tom Brady in many different ways' or any other white quarterback."

"His success, though, is showing those people who have those biases, hey, what's more important to you? Your stale, narrow-minded ways of thinking or winning football games and having the best players play and utilizing their strength and trying to minimize their weaknesses?"

This season, Jackson replicated the success he saw in college, dismantling arguments that his style of play can't translate to the highest level of football. Questions still remain about the sustainability of Jackson's game, and whether a quarterback who runs as often as he does can withstand the bruising hits.

Dating back to his days at Louisville, Jackson has been compared with Michael Vick, who Jackson said he grew up idolizing. The two connected when Jackson was a sophomore at Louisville, and have maintained a relationship. In December, Jackson broke Vick's record for most rushing yards by a quarterback in a single season.

"Those questions are going to come up naturally because of his style of play, and you don't see quarterbacks getting hit or run-

ning the football the way he does, or the way I did," said Vick, a Fox Sports analyst. "So those questions are going to come up: Can you protect yourself? Can you sustain? Can you be a more effective passer as opposed to runner?"

Williams and Riddick lauded the Ravens' front office, at the time led by former general manager Ozzie Newsome, for having the foresight to pick Jackson, and coach John Harbaugh for fully investing in an offensive system based on Jackson's unique talents.

As Jackson attempts to lead the top-seeded Ravens to their third Super Bowl appearance in franchise history, Vick and Riddick said a championship run would further validate that a player of his mold can be successful in the league and change minds as to the way to build an offense and play the position.

"I think Lamar, along with the success of Russell Wilson, has opened people's minds now — and even the success of (No. 1 overall draft pick) Kyler Murray so far this year — have opened people's minds to what does the prototype quarterback look like," Riddick said.

"He doesn't have to be 6-4 and stand in the pocket and be that big, strong, statue-in-the-middle-of-your-front-lawn type of thrower. He can take on the shape of many different sizes, many different types of athletic abilities because it's all proven to be successful so far."

Though Jackson isn't the first dual-threat quarterback in NFL history, he's reaffirming that a different style can have success. Not only did he break Vick's rushing record, but he also led the league with 36 touchdown passes.

According to ESPN's The Undefeated, black quarterbacks have combined for more starts, wins, touchdown passes and yards in the 2019 regular season than in any other season in NFL history.

"It's a big deal," Williams said. "We're going into the 100th year NFL anniversary. There was a time when people didn't believe a black quarterback could be in that position because it came along with being able to think and figure out stuff. And we're in America: Let's be fair, some people didn't think that could happen."

"Just because I won the Super Bowl 30-something years ago, or was part of a Super Bowl team, there were guys before me. ... There's a lot of guys that today would be playing in the National Football League."

Jackson doesn't often sit back to ponder the impact his historic season will have on future generations of players.

But before a November matchup with the Texans and Watson, Jackson was asked if he takes pride in seeing the number of black quarterbacks excelling in the league.

"Yes, that's incredible. We just have to keep it going," Jackson said. "We have others coming in, (the) next generation, and years on years coming. We just have to keep it going — keep doing great on the field, off the field, and help our other brothers out."

## Taking a swing at 2020

### Woods' major push, battle for No. 1 among top PGA storylines

**T**his week's Sony Open in Hawaii is the PGA Tour's first full-field event of 2020 and a starting point for what shapes up to be a memorable and demanding season.

Tiger Woods will look to defend his emotional win at the Masters in April. The annual trip to Augusta National Golf Club kicks off a major championship season that also will include Phil Mickelson's return to Winged Foot at age 50 seeking to win the U.S. Open and avenge his crushing defeat there on the 72nd hole in 2006.

The PGA Tour's wraparound schedule actually kicked off in September and included a dramatic comeback by the U.S. team last month at the Presidents Cup in Australia. But the biggest events still remain for the sport's world elite. They include the Olympics July 30-Aug. 2 in Tokyo and the Ryder Cup Sept. 25-27 at Whistling Straits in Wisconsin.

Here are five storylines to keep an eye on going forward:

#### Tiger's chase

Tiger Woods tied Sam Snead's record 82 PGA Tour wins in the fall. Few doubt Tiger will pass The Slammyer sometime this year. Much of the focus, though, will be on Woods' pursuit of the ultimate record — Jack Nicklaus' 18 grand slam titles — even if the quest is the ultimate long shot. Woods picked up No. 15 — and his first major win in 11 years — in stunning fashion at the Masters. He then did not finish within eight shots of the lead the rest of the 2018-19 season, hinting injury and age once again

had won out. Following a minor clean-up procedure on his left knee, Woods won convincingly in Japan. He then might have been the best player of the 24 as he captained the U.S. team to a Presidents Cup comeback.

While Woods still has the talent and will to contend at the highest levels, it appears as if time and opportunity are running out on the 44-year-old. Expect Woods to play a limited schedule — 15 or 16 events, tops — in order to be at his best when he does tee it up. Even so, winning majors often requires a perfect storm. With the PGA Championship's move to May, for example, the cool, damp weather at Bethpage Black eliminated Woods — and his balky back — as a threat. The weather during the PGA's debut at San Francisco's Harding Park this year might be no picnic, either.

Whatever the case, 2020 will be a pivotal season to determine whether Tiger can get back on track to catch Jack. After all, only seven men 44 or older have won a major — and none of them two of golf's biggest prizes.

#### Youth movement

The young guns are getting younger. Woods' success the past two decades continues to have a major influence on a generation looking to emulate his career. Justin Thomas and Jordan Spieth, both 26 and with 23 combined Tour wins; 25-year-old Jon Rahm, a 10-time winner worldwide; and Bryson DeChambeau, 25 and a five-time winner on Tour, have set the bar pretty high for the golfers coming up just behind them.

Five players, in particular, stand out among the pack. Victories by Matthew Wolff and Joaquin Niemann marked the first time since 1931 two players under 21 years old won in the same year. Last July, Colin Morikawa, 22, won the Barracuda Championship, an alternate-field event played the same week as the World Golf Champi-

onships-FedEx St. Jude Invitational. No member of the Presidents Cup's International team was more impressive than 21-year-old Sungjae Im of South Korea. The 2018-19 PGA Tour Rookie of the Year was 3-1-1 and defeated reigning U.S. Open winner Gary Woodland in singles. Viktor Hovland, 22, might be the best of the bunch and became the first player to win low-amateur honors at both the Masters and U.S. Open in the same season since Matt Kuchar in 1998.

The next step for each will be showing up and winning on the biggest stages.

#### Race for No. 1

World No. 1 Brooks Koepka and No. 2 Rory McIlroy appeared to spark a rivalry this past summer when they went head-to-head and split a pair of WGCs. Koepka dismissed the notion, pointing to his four major titles since McIlroy's last of four, in 2014. The dynamic between them intensified when McIlroy's peers voted him Player of the Year over Koepka. Yet the battle for the world's top spot does not shape up to be a two-man race in 2020.

After being plagued by a wrist injury much of last year, world No. 4 Justin Thomas won twice in the fall and then captured the Tournament of Champions last week for his 12th win on Tour — more than any player under 30. Rahm, at No. 3, is a rising star and on the short list of Masters favorites. Meanwhile, it is hard to count out former world No. 1 Dustin Johnson, who at 35 has plenty of great golf ahead of him after a so-so two-win season.

Koepka has held the top spot in the world rankings since May but also is coming off minor knee surgery. In the end, the days of undisputed No. 1s like Woods or Greg Norman appear to be a thing of the past.

#### Spieth no longer elite

Long known as the Golden Child, Spieth was at the top of the game two summers ago

following a dramatic British Open win. His fall since then has been hard to fathom — and watch. The former world No. 1 and 11-time winner currently ranks 43rd in the world. Lately, Spieth rarely has performed even to that level.

Spieth's magical putting touch — long the strength of his game — disappeared in 2018. He fixed his stroke last year and then saw his pinpoint iron play desert him. Never a long hitter by the standards of a professional game increasingly geared toward power, Spieth's skill, grit and guile allowed him to work his way around a golf course and at times will the ball into the hole.

Those gifts surely remain within the 26-year-old, but turning things around will not be easy. While the talent and depth on Tour continue to increase, the ultra-intense Spieth's biggest obstacle might be himself due to his shaken confidence.

#### Action-packed schedule

In 2020, the PGA Tour is putting to the test the notion of “too much of a good thing.” The condensed major championship schedule — with last year's move of the PGA Championship to May — presented a challenge for players and organizers of middle-tier events. The game's top players will be stretched even thinner this year while even more events will be left with few marquee names in the field.

The Florida Swing will kick off a seven-month period featuring the Players Championship, four majors, the Olympics, the FedEx Cup and the Ryder Cup. The travel demands alone will test even the most fit and focused players on the PGA and European Tours.

Consider: Two weeks after the British Open in mid-July, players will tee it up 5,900 miles and nine time zones away in Tokyo for the Olympics. The FedEx Cup kicks off 6,700 miles and 14 time zones away in Boston two weeks after the Games.

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# Some favorite looks from 2019

After a year of driving some of the finest cars in the world — and more than a few mediocre ones — it's the time of the year to summarize my favorite rides. No, there's no Corvette. I have yet to drive it. But there are some truly memorable rides, ones that are sure to bring a smile to your face. They did to mine. Here are my faves from 2019.

## Ford Mustang Shelby GT500

How could you not love the most powerful street-legal Ford ever built? Powered by a supercharged 5.2-liter V-8 engine rated at 760 horsepower and 625 pound-feet of torque, and mated to a new seven-speed dual-clutch transmission and a Torsen limited-slip differential, 0-60 comes up in 3.3 seconds, with the quarter mile arriving in at less than 11 seconds. It's so fast, so furious and so mind-numbingly fun, you'll wonder if your license will withstand your ability to put this steed through its paces. The many changes brought to the GT500 transform this crazy colt into a true supercar, one totally capable of dominating the track. Its capabilities are most likely beyond those of most owners' ability to exploit.

## Jeep Gladiator

Long overdue, the brand's first pickup since the 1992 Comanche is a five-passenger Crew Cab model based on the Wrangler four-door SUV. So, it has body-on-frame construction, a solid front and rear axle, a five-foot steel cargo bed, fold-down tailgate and a best-in-class towing of 7,650 pounds. There's up to 30 inches of ground clearance, 30 inches of water fording ability, while providing an approach angle of 43.6 degrees and a departure angle of 26 degrees. The Gladiator proves true to its name, handling any off-road situation with an unassailable confidence. But it's this pickup's on-road civility that surprises, with a lack of excess body motion through corners and an amazing knack for soaking up the worst that America's crumbling infrastructure can throw at it.

## Kia Telluride

Designed by Kia in California and assembled in Georgia, the 2020 Kia Telluride is far more upscale than its nameplate suggests, with an elegantly bold style thanks to its a broad, boxy look. While the Telluride's mechanicals aren't unusual, with a 291-horsepower 3.8-liter V-6 and an eight-speed automatic transmission powering the front wheels or all four, the Telluride returns a luxurious driving experience, thanks to its optional self-leveling rear suspension that returns a sumptuous feel, particularly on higher-end models. And the Telluride is filled with clever touches, such as intercom system for the driver to talk to rear seat passengers through the audio system speakers, or the Quiet Mode that isolates music to the front row so as not to disturb other passengers. Punching far above its weight, this Kia is a stunningly good value.

## Lincoln Aviator

Replacing the MKT, Lincoln's rotund three-row luxury crossover, the Aviator wears crisp lines offset by a sporty sloping roof and distinctive Lincoln grille. It's handsome and urbane, like the finest Lincolns of yore. Inside, there are three rows of unabashed extravagance. There's a standard 3.0-liter twin-turbocharged V-6 generating 400 horsepower, but true automotive nirvana can be found in the Grand Touring plug-in hybrid model that produces 494 horsepower and a mammoth 630 pound-feet of torque. Thankfully, power is routed to the rear wheels, although all-wheel drive is optional. This is a classic new American luxury cruiser: large, in charge and oozing with comfort and power.

## Nissan Leaf Plus

The Nissan Leaf Plus is a thoroughly modern Japanese compact that's quiet, peppy and comfortable, with room for four (or five if they're friendly). It's well designed, with an eye-catching exterior, an ergonomically friendly interior, comfy seats, an easy to use infotainment system

and a driving experience you'd expect from any modern compact sedan. Yet the Leaf is electrically powered. There's no exhaust noise because there's no exhaust. There's no engine noise because there's no engine, only electric motors. The instantaneous acceleration from a stop is exhilarating, mostly because all of an electric motor's torque is available at any time. While Teslas, the new Porsche Taycan and the Audi E-Tron get all the attention, the affordable the Leaf Plus is unjustly overlooked.

## Rolls-Royce Dawn

To compare the Rolls-Royce Dawn to any consumer product, let alone any other car, is unfair. For the Dawn is the result of an arcane alchemy that mixes mechanical excellence and exquisite design that continue Rolls-Royce Motor Cars' 115-year tradition. Under the time-honored trappings resides a state-of-the-art twin-turbocharged V-12 with 563 horsepower. That and the eight-speed automatic transmission effortlessly deliver a deftly balanced driving experience, taking you from zero to 60 in less than five seconds. For those who can afford such finery, the Rolls-Royce Dawn remains a rare chance to revel and romp in one of the world's finest cars.

## Toyota GR Supra

Let's applaud that, 20 years after being dropped, the Supra returns, still powered by an inline-six engine, a key part of its personality. But the engine is BMW's — as is the car, which is based on the BMW Z4. Overlooking such Bavarian bloodlines is easy once you're behind the wheel, as the Supra effortlessly drifts through corners, its steering and chassis working with a remarkable precision. Making all the right moves, the GR Supra returns a 0-60 mph time of 4.1 seconds on the way to top speed of 155 mph. Out of the box, the 2020 Toyota GR Supra is a delightfully entertaining, fun-to-drive sports car, something that has been lacking in Toyota's line-up for far too long. Welcome back!
