



## Trump adding star power to legal team in historic trial

Dershowitz, Starr join impeachment defense before Senate jurors

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump has assembled a made-for-TV legal team for his Senate trial that includes household names like Alan Dershowitz and Ken Starr, the prosecutor whose investigation two decades ago resulted in the impeachment

of President Bill Clinton.

The additions Friday bring experience in the politics of impeachment as well as constitutional law to the team, which faced a busy weekend of deadlines for legal briefs and other documents before opening arguments begin Tuesday.

The two new Trump attorneys are already nationally known for their involvement in some of the more consequential legal dramas of recent American history and for their regular appearances on Fox News.

Dershowitz, a former Harvard

professor, is a constitutional expert whose expansive views of presidential powers echo those of Trump. Starr is a veteran of partisan battles in Washington, having led the investigation into Clinton's affair with a White House intern that brought the president's impeachment by the House. Clinton was acquitted at his Senate trial, the same outcome Trump is expecting from the Republican-led chamber.

Still, the lead roles for Trump's defense will be played by White

## Metra reminds riders to be fair and pay fares

As railroad prepares to invest in new fare-collection technology, it warns nonpayers risk getting boot

Metra put leaflets on trains Friday morning to remind customers to pay their fare or risk being booted off the train.

Leaflets placed on seats on the commuter railroad told riders that there would be "stepped-up efforts by Metra staff this year to make sure everyone is paying

what they should be paying."

Metra also reminded riders that if a customer does not produce a paper or mobile ticket or refuses to pay the fare on board with cash or via the Ventra app, "Metra may remove that customer from the train and police may issue citations for state and/or county offenses," the leaflet said.

The railroad said Metra police will be complementing the efforts of conductors to validate fare collection. Metra CEO Jim Derwinski said the railroad has added more conductors to help with the collection effort. Metra also will be posting signs throughout the system about fare compliance and potential penalties.

Derwinski said the increased fare collection is partly an effort to gather data to present to the board, as the railroad prepares to invest in new fare-collection technology. Derwinski said Metra is planning to replace some vending machines with devices with the latest security features

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## Ex-state Rep. Arroyo likely to plead guilty in probe

Federal prosecutors have filed a criminal information against former state Rep. Luis Arroyo — a likely indication he intends to plead guilty to an alleged scheme to pay a state senator \$2,500 a month in kickbacks in exchange for support on legislation that would benefit an Arroyo lobbying client.

The one-page information charging Arroyo with a single bribery count was filed in U.S. District Court on Friday afternoon. While no new details about the alleged scheme were revealed, an information typically means a defendant has agreed to waive an indictment and plead guilty.

Arroyo's attorney, Michael Gillespie, did not return calls

seeking comment.

Arroyo, 65, a Chicago Democrat who was an assistant majority leader, was originally charged in a criminal complaint in late October. He resigned Nov. 1, one week after his arrest and just hours before a legislative committee was set to consider his ouster from the General Assembly.

According to the charges, Arroyo had sought an undisclosed state senator's support on legislation involving video gambling sweepstakes games that would benefit one of Arroyo's lobbying clients. The state senator was wearing a wire for the FBI when Arroyo delivered the first of the promised \$2,500 checks at a restaurant in Skokie on Aug. 22.

## 25 people vie to be Chicago's top cop

Fewer than half of applicants currently work for CPD

Fewer than half of the people vying to become Chicago's next top cop currently work for its Police Department or once spent much of their law enforcement career there, a city official said Thursday night.

Chicago Police Board President Ghian Foreman disclosed the demographic breakdown of the 25 people who applied for the job, a pool that included mostly white and African American candidates and an overwhelming number of men.

Eleven of the 25 applicants either currently work for the Chicago Police Department or "spent a significant amount of their career" there, Foreman said at the board's monthly meeting at police headquarters. The other 14 applicants work outside of Chicago.

In a statement earlier this week, Foreman indicated the board received applications from around the country to lead the nation's second largest police force.

During the Thursday night meeting, Foreman said 21 of the applicants were men and four were women. He also said 13 applicants were white, 11 were African American and one was Latino.

The names of the applicants were not disclosed. But Foreman and the eight other board members were now tasked

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House Counsel Pat Cipollone and Trump personal lawyer Jay Sekulow, who also represented Trump during special counsel Robert Mueller's Russia investigation.

There are some signs of tension between the president's outside legal team and lawyers within the White House. The White House would not confirm the fuller roster of the president's lawyers Friday, and some officials there bristled that the announcement was not coordinated with them.

A legal brief laying out the contours of the Trump defense, due at noon Monday, was still being drafted, with White House attorneys and the outside legal team grappling over how political the document should be. Those inside the administration have echoed warnings from Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell that the pleadings

must be sensitive to the Senate's more staid traditions and leave the sharper rhetoric to Twitter and cable news.

White House lawyers were successful in keeping Trump from adding House Republicans to the team, but they also advised him against tapping Dershowitz, according to two people who spoke on condition of anonymity. They're concerned because of the professor's association with Jeffrey Epstein, the millionaire who killed himself in jail last summer while awaiting trial on sex trafficking charges.

Dershowitz confirmed his role in a series of tweets Friday, saying, he would "present oral arguments at the Senate trial to address the constitutional arguments against impeachment and removal."

Dershowitz said of himself: "While Professor Dershowitz is nonpartisan when it comes to the Constitution — he opposed the impeachment of President Bill Clinton and voted for Hillary Clinton — he be-

lieves the issues at stake go to the heart of our enduring Constitution."

A Fox News host said on the air that Starr would be parting ways with the network as a result of his role on the legal team.

Other members of Trump's legal defense include Pam Bondi, the former Florida attorney general; Jane Raskin, who was part of the president's legal team during Mueller's investigation; and Robert Ray, who was part of the White-water investigation of the Clintons.

Trump was impeached by the House last month on charges of abuse of power and obstructing Congress, stemming from his pressure on Ukraine to investigate Democratic rivals as he was withholding security aid and his efforts to block the ensuing congressional probe.

Senators were sworn in as jurors Thursday by Chief Justice John Roberts.

The president insists he did nothing wrong.

Starr, besides his 1990s role as independent coun-

sel, is a former U.S. solicitor general and federal circuit court judge.

More recently, he was removed as president of Baylor University and then resigned as chancellor of the school in the wake of a review critical of the university's handling of sexual assault allegations against football players.

Starr said his resignation was the result of the university's board of regents seeking to place the school under new leadership following the scandal, not because he was accused of hiding or failing to act on information.

Dershowitz's reputation has been damaged in recent years by his association with Epstein.

One of Epstein's alleged victims, Virginia Roberts Giuffre, has accused Dershowitz of participating in her abuse. Dershowitz has denied it and has been battling in court for years with Giuffre and her lawyers. He recently wrote a book rejecting her allegations, called "Guilty by Accusation."

and also is looking at machines that take cash.

"We're listening to our conductors and conductors on other systems," Derwinski said.

Derwinski said Metra wants to reduce — and eventually completely eliminate — the number of cash transactions on trains that slow conductors and prevent them from verifying other fares. Derwinski said Metra staff will bring new fare collection data to the Metra board in two or three months.

The CTA uses turnstiles and a "tap-on" card system to help make sure people can't get on the train unless they pay. But Derwinski said this would be not be "feasible" at Metra, which has 242 different train stations.

Metra does not have an estimate of how much it loses on fare evasion, said spokesman Michael Gillis.

Customers have complained that when trains are crowded, not all fares are collected, which is unfair to

those who pay.

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"This is, this is the jackpot," the complaint quoted Arroyo as telling the senator as he handed over the check.

Additional \$2,500 payments were expected to be made over the next six to 12 months, federal authorities alleged.

The Chicago Tribune has previously identified the state senator as Terry Link, a Democrat from Vernon Hills. Link has denied being the cooperating witness mentioned in the complaint.

Also involved in the alleged scheme was businessman James Weiss, the son-in-law of former Cook County assessor and county Democratic Party boss Joseph Berrios, whose house was raided by the FBI shortly before the charges against Arroyo were unsealed, the Tribune has reported.

In addition, Weiss's business partner, John Adreani, opened V.S.S. Inc., a sweepstakes machine company that hired Arroyo as a lobbyist, after his firing as a Chicago police officer for consorting with a drug trafficker, the Tribune reported.

Neither Weiss nor Adreani has been charged.

The development in Arroyo's case marked the latest in a series of ongoing federal probes that have rocked political circles from Chicago to Springfield. Arroyo was the third elected official to be charged so far, joining longtime Chicago Ald. Edward Burke and state Sen. Thomas Cullerton.

Records show the FBI is also investigating former state Sen. Martin Sandoval, Cook County Commissioner and McCook Mayor Jeff Tobolski, Lyons Mayor Christopher Getty, Chicago Ald. Carrie Austin and officials in the suburbs of Oakbrook Terrace, Summit and Cicero.

A separate probe delving into the lobbying practices of utility giant Commonwealth Edison has led to FBI raids on current and former lawmakers and political operatives, including several who are close confidants of House Speaker Michael Madigan.

None of those officials has been charged.

The charges against Arroyo center on his work as manager of a lobbying firm called Spartacus 3 LLC, which included V.S.S. and other sweepstakes gaming machine companies as clients.

Sweepstakes machines, sometimes called "gray machines," allow customers to put in money, receive a coupon to redeem for merchandise online and then play electronic games like slot machines. Critics contend the largely unregulated devices, which operate in cities such as Chicago that have banned video gambling, are designed to skirt the law.

According to the criminal complaint, the cooperating state senator told the FBI that Arroyo had approached him about "the passage of sweepstakes-related legislation" during the House's 2019 spring session.

In early August, Arroyo texted the senator asking to meet at a restaurant in Highland Park, according to the complaint. Also at the meeting was the company owner, identified only as Individual A, as well as one of the owner's associates.

During the meeting, Arroyo said he was going to introduce a "trailer bill" in the veto session expanding the use of sweepstakes games and offered to make periodic payments to the senator in exchange for his support, according to the complaint.

Arroyo then asked the senator to "carry the bill,"

explaining that he had "no-body in the Senate."

After the senator told Arroyo to send him some language for the proposed bill, the two politicians left the table to speak privately, carrying on their conversation outside the restaurant as FBI agents conducted surveillance, according to the complaint.

During their purportedly private talk, the senator told Arroyo he was "in the twilight" of his career and was "looking for something" to bolster his income.

Arroyo said he would "make sure that you're rewarded for what you do, for what we're gonna do moving forward," the complaint alleged.

Three weeks later, Arroyo and the senator met at the Skokie restaurant, where Arroyo made the "jackpot" comment as he handed over the \$2,500 check — written to a third party to disguise the purpose for the payoff, according to the charges.

"I'm not too happy about doing this, but I'm doin' it for ya," the senator said near the end of the conversation.

"I know you're not," Arroyo allegedly replied.

with reviewing the applications, interviewing the candidates and presenting Mayor Lori Lightfoot with three finalists for her consideration.

The names of finalists will be released publicly before Lightfoot chooses one of them as her next superintendent within a few months.

In 2016, then-Mayor Rahm Emanuel bypassed the Police Board's three finalists and had the City Council pass a special ordinance to allow him to hire Eddie Johnson as his superintendent, though he didn't apply for the job. Lightfoot, who was Police Board president at that time, has pledged to make her selection based on the board's

finalists.

Earlier this week, the board said 23 candidates applied for the job this time around. But on Thursday night, Foreman said the board accepted two more applications it received in the mail after the 5 p.m.

Monday deadline. The two applications were originally scheduled for delivery before the deadline, he said.

In December 2015, 39 candidates applied to be superintendent when the job was last open. That was after then-police Superin-

tendent Garry McCarthy's firing as part of the fallout of the Laquan McDonald shooting scandal.

This time, the board opened the application process Nov. 21 after Johnson announced plans to retire by the end of the year. Lightfoot announced his temporary successor would be former Los Angeles police Chief Charlie Beck.

But that all changed Dec. 2 when Lightfoot abruptly fired Johnson, saying he had intentionally misled her about his conduct after a late weeknight out in October when he was found asleep in his running vehicle near his South Side home. Beck flew in from LA that afternoon to run the department until Lightfoot announces a permanent successor to Johnson.

## Mayor makes call to action at MLK breakfast

Lightfoot: Struggling neighborhoods need business investment

At the city's interfaith breakfast honoring Martin Luther King Jr., Mayor Lori Lightfoot on Friday hailed the work her administration has done to address poverty and equity in Chicago while acknowledging there's much more work to do.

“I ran for mayor of this great city so that kids that look like me and came from families like mine would never, ever, ever have to ‘beat the odds’ to get a good education, a good job, and blaze a trail towards their wildest dreams. Those are things that should not require ‘beating the odds,’” Lightfoot told a packed crowd at the Marriott Marquis. “The opportunity for our children, all of our children, must be at our fingertips. We have work to do to make that bold and audacious goal a reality but I know that we can get there.”

Lightfoot, the city's first African American woman mayor, also used the occasion to call for more business investment in struggling neighborhoods. As part of her speech, Lightfoot hailed BMO Harris for committing \$10 million to her INVEST South/West initiative. She also praised a \$10 million fund Starbucks has promised for small business loans.

“We cannot continue to leave people behind in the city and we need your help to step up, to support them, so that we all benefit

from the greatness of this city,” Lightfoot said.

In a speech to a room full of dignitaries and community leaders, Lightfoot highlighted her administration's successes so far, including passing a “fair workweek” law and fines and fees reforms.

“Our work has begun in raising the minimum wage to \$15 an hour, now and not waiting until 2025,” Lightfoot said.

Lightfoot also hailed her administration's efforts to curb aldermanic prerogative and implement other ethics reforms “so neighborhood businesses no longer have to give something to get access to basic city services.”

“Today, we have the power to end poverty by growing our economy and rebuilding our neighborhoods. To strengthen historic areas like manufacturing, while also

driving investment in growth industries like technology and transportation,” Lightfoot said. “We have the power today to build and rebuild communities that have been left out and left behind for generations. And the power to do it in our areas where it's needed the most — like on our South and West sides.”

Ultimately, Lightfoot said, she wants to “create a more inclusive and equitable city that will not only give hope to our neighborhoods, but halt the exodus of families leaving our borders for new homes elsewhere because they don't believe that Chicago cares about them and is willing to make sure their futures can be thriving and vibrant as everyone else in every neighborhood in Chicago.”

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## Officers tended to wounded boys in barbershop shooting

Shooting happened when 2 men entered Gotcha Faded on North Pulaski Road

The first officers at the West Side barber shop picked their way through shell casings and broken glass littering the sidewalk from large bullet holes in the door and window.

Going inside Thursday evening, they found what one veteran officer called “a horrific scene.” People were shouting and screaming, as many as 10 of them children who ranged in age from about 2 to 16. Two boys were lying on the floor, bleeding but not crying out in pain.

“They just seemed like they were in shock,” a source said. “Scared, visibly shaken.”

Some of the officers tended to the wounded, applying tourniquets to one of the boys and a barber. One officer applied a compression bandage on another kid. “Doing what good cops do,” the source said, using supplies that officers in the city now carry with them.

One boy, 11, was hit in the back, abdomen and left arm while his older brother, 12, was shot in the right knee, police said. Three others in the shop were also wounded: A 16-year-old boy shot in the right hip, a 30-year-old man hit in the left arm and the 40-year-old barber shot twice in his right leg.

The three boys were taken to Stroger Hospital in serious-to-critical condition, fire officials said. The barber was brought to Mount Sinai Hospital in fair condition, and the other man went to Loretto Hospital.

The shooting happened shortly after 6 p.m. when two men entered Gotcha Faded in the 200 block of North Pulaski Road, looked around and walked back out. At least one turned and started firing into the shop and one of them appeared to laugh, according to police.

The attackers fled in a car, but detectives “did get some good surveillance video from inside the shop as well as outside the barbershop,” said Chicago police spokesman Anthony Guglielmi. “We're hoping that we'll have a description of a vehicle too.”

No one was in custody Friday evening.

Relatives said the two brothers had always wanted to go to the barbershop in West Garfield Park, and Thursday night they finally

got their chance. They had been there less than an hour after their mother dropped them off when the gunfire erupted.

“One of my sons was sitting in the chair getting his hair cut and the other was waiting,” their mother, Cierra Mobley, told reporters outside Stroger on Thursday night. “I'm very emotional, I'm real upset.”

Guglielmi said detectives were not sure about a motive but “we have no reason to believe the juveniles were the intended targets.” He added that detectives “have some optimistic leads garnered in the last 16 hours.”

A law enforcement source told the Tribune a man inside the shop may have been the target.

Chicago police Deputy Chief of Patrol Ernest Cato, who went to the scene Thursday night, called on the community to help detectives solve the shooting.

“We have to do something about this violence,” he said. “And this is going to be a cooperation with the community and organizations. This will not be tolerated anymore.”

By 3 p.m. Friday, the barbershop was open for business even though glass was still strewn along the sidewalk. The front door's glass was shattered, and there were two bullet holes in the shop's window. People inside the barbershop did not open the door to reporters.

Nearby, organizers for the Institute for Nonviolence Chicago grilled hot dogs as workers canvassed the neighborhood. Chris Patterson, senior director of programs and policy for the group, said the objective was to engage the community.

“We just want to make the statement that this is not normal,” Patterson said. “That people care. I think people get the sense sometimes when shootings happen in communities that are underserved, such as this, that they are alone and they are isolated. So the idea here is we've called outreach organizations from across the city to come in ... just the idea that we are standing unified against violence.”

## Ill. to reinstate driver's licenses suspended over unpaid tickets

Illinois will no longer suspend the licenses of drivers who fail to pay parking tickets and other fines beginning July 1 under a measure Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed into law Friday.

The secretary of state's office also will automatically reinstate the driving privileges of roughly 55,000 people who've had their licenses suspended over unpaid fines and fees unrelated to moving viola-

tions.

“Right now, tens of thousands of Illinoisans lose their licenses each year for reasons that have nothing to do with their ability to drive,” Pritzker said at a bill-signing event in Chicago's Homan Square neighborhood.

The suspensions disproportionately affect low-income drivers who need their cars to get to work and earn the money to pay their fines, the governor said.

“If you're living below or

near the poverty line and you're looking at a choice between your unpaid parking tickets or your kid's medicine or your family's next meal, well, that's no choice at all,” he said.

While his choice wasn't quite that stark, Rodney Shelton said he nearly lost his job as a Chicago firefighter when his license was suspended in April 2015 over \$18,000 in unpaid parking tickets. Shelton, who spoke at the bill signing, said he racked up 77

tickets in 90 days on a car he'd parked on a private lot.

He ended up filing for bankruptcy, which helped him retain his license and his job as a firefighter, which pays \$99,324 annually, according to city records. He also began driving for Uber to help pay down his debts, he said.

“This is a domino effect; it affects my family at home,” said Shelton, who choked up when talking about the impact of drivers license suspension in neighbor-

hoods like West Garfield Park, where he grew up and works.

“Most people are not fortunate,” he said.

The legislation was sponsored by state Rep. Carol Ammons of Urbana and Sen. Omar Aquino of Chicago, both Democrats, and approved with bipartisan support in the House and Senate.

Both Ammons and Aquino credited an investigation from ProPublica Illinois and WBEZ on the

disproportionate impact of license suspensions on drivers in low-income, predominantly black neighborhoods in the city and suburbs.

The change to the state law comes after the City Council voted in September to end the practice of seeking license suspensions over unpaid tickets.

“Suspending someone's license really suspends their entire life,” Ammons said.

# FAA orders ground-stop at O'Hare as winter storm hits

A winter storm barreled into the Chicago region Friday evening, forcing the cancelation of flights and disrupting evening commutes as snow and wind pelted the area.

At one point Friday evening, the Federal Aviation Administration went so far as to impose a ground-stop at O'Hare International Airport, halting takeoffs and landings, after more than 600 flights had already been canceled as the storm moved in.

Commuters heading home on their evening commutes slogged along snow and wind-swept streets as the storm hit the Chicago area just in time for the evening commute Friday. The area could see as much as 5 inches of snow before the storm moves out early Saturday morning, according to the National Weather Service.

A winter weather advisory has been issued for Lake, Kane, DuPage and Cook counties from 5 p.m. Friday to 6 a.m. Saturday, with snow likely transitioning to sleet and freezing later in the evening.

Still, most of the northern half of the Chicago area and parts of southern Wis-

consin could see 2 to 5 inches of snow from Friday night to Saturday morning.

"If there is travel you don't need to make ... consider postponing it," said Ricky Castro, a meteorologist with the weather service.

Jake Petr, another weather service meteorologist, said it will be a "wet, heavy snow, which could

make roadways really slushy."

By 6 p.m. Friday, snow layered the ground, and vehicles were navigating through slushy roads, with more snow expected.

Anticipating slippery road conditions, city officials urged motorists to take precautions while traveling.

Chicago's Department of Streets and Sanitation de-

ployed 287 snow vehicles Friday before the afternoon rush hour, according to spokeswoman Marjani Williams. Salt spreaders were focused on keeping the city's arterial routes and Lake Shore Drive safe for motorists and buses.

"We're prepared to adjust resources depending on what happens," she said.

Airlines at Chicago's two

major airports were reporting cancellations and delays Friday as a winter weather advisory was in effect.

As of 7 p.m., 615 flights had been canceled at O'Hare and 159 at Midway in the last 24 hours, according to the Chicago Department of Aviation.

As temperatures increased Friday night, the snow was likely to turn to

sleet or freezing rain, according to the weather service. It also will be windy Friday night, with gusts as strong as 25 mph, compounding low visibility while snow falls, according to forecasters.

Closer to Chicago, there could also be a period of freezing rain or rain Saturday morning, although it could also remain as light snow flurries. If it does rain, Petr doesn't expect it to be heavy or to last too long.

"Around 5 or 6 in the morning, it'll switch over to rain and maybe a drizzle for a couple of hours," he said. "I don't think it would wash away too much of it."

Saturday morning there could be a high of 38 degrees, but strong wind gusts will drive the temperature down, with potential wind chills of minus 10 to minus 20 degrees late Saturday night.

By Sunday morning, it will be cold across the northern part of the state. Meteorologists expect a daytime high of just 14 degrees, with temperatures falling overnight. On Monday, the daytime high could top out around 21 degrees with mostly sunny and clear skies.

While slightly warmer Tuesday, it will still be cold, Petr said. On Wednesday, the temperature is expected to rebound to the low 30s.

# Retired judge objects to selection of private law firm in Smollett probe

The retired appellate judge who successfully petitioned for a special prosecutor's investigation of the Jussie Smollett case is objecting to the selection of a private law firm to represent the Cook County state's attorney's office in the probe.

The attorney general must represent Kim Foxx's office in such matters, Sheila O'Brien alleged in a filing Thursday, not the politically-connected law firm that has been retained for months.

Ruben Castillo, the former chief judge of the Northern District of Illinois and now a partner at the high-powered firm Akerman, has been helping the office vet voluminous materials requested by special prosecutor Dan Webb.

O'Brien argued in her filing that by law, the state attorney general's office must "defend all actions and proceedings against any state officer in his official capacity."

No date has been set for a hearing on O'Brien's latest petition.

Veteran attorney Terry

Ekl said it is extremely common for prosecutors' offices to hire outside counsel at taxpayer expense under certain circumstances, particularly in civil matters.

"The part that's somewhat unusual, though, is that the lawyers are being hired to represent the state's attorney's office in a criminal matter," he said.

A spokeswoman for the attorney general's office could not immediately be reached for comment.

While the attorney general's office defends state's attorneys in lawsuits and

other matters, Ekl said they may not want to be involved in this matter in the first place.

"I can't picture the attorney general, who's got to work with the state's attorney's office on a routine basis, necessarily wanting to get involved in this," he said.

Castillo, who worked for Webb as a young prosecutor in the 1980s when Webb was the U.S. attorney, confirmed to the Tribune last week that his firm has been billing the county a "deeply

discounted" hourly rate of \$250 to \$375 for its work on the Smollett case, which he said is less than half what the firm typically charges.

Foxx's handling of the Smollett case has drawn national attention and continues to fuel criticism and calls for her to be replaced.

The actor allegedly staged a hate crime and was accused of hiring two men to pretend to assault him while using racist and ho-

mophobic slurs and shouting that he was in MAGA country — a reference to President Donald Trump's campaign slogan. Smollett was charged with faking the crime, but Foxx later dropped all 16 counts filed against the actor, who is best known for his role on the Fox series "Empire."

Her handling of the case drew outrage from then-Mayor Rahm Emanuel and then-police Superintendent Eddie Johnson and is currently under investigation.

## 11 US troops injured in Iran missile strikes

Service members being checked for concussion signs

WASHINGTON — Eleven U.S. troops were flown out of Iraq for evaluation of concussion-like symptoms in the days following an Iranian missile strike, officials said Friday.

The Pentagon's chief spokesman, Jonathan Hoffman, said Defense Secretary Mark Esper did not know of the injuries until he was told Thursday that 11 troops had been sent for evaluation at U.S. medical facilities — eight in Germany and three in Kuwait. Hoffman said the notification to Esper was in line with military procedures, which he said do not require notification of service member casualties to the Pentagon unless they involve the loss of life, limb or eyesight.

As recently as Tuesday night, President Donald Trump said he had been told no Americans had been harmed in the Iranian missile strike Jan. 8. The question of American casualties was significant at the time because the missile attack's results were seen as influencing a U.S. decision on whether to retaliate and risk a broader war with Iran.

Trump chose not to retaliate, and the tensions with Iran have eased somewhat.

After Esper was notified of the possible brain injuries Thursday, U.S. Central Command put out a public statement saying "several" troops were treated for concussion symptoms from the missile blasts. The AP had reported this Monday when

reporters were allowed to visit the attacked base, al-Asad, in western Iraq.

Thursday's statement said that "out of an abundance of caution," some of the injured troops were flown out of Iraq for follow-up screening. Medical personnel at al-Asad do not have a magnetic resonance imaging scanner, which can be used to diagnose brain injuries.

One service member with concussion-like symptoms was flown out of Iraq on Jan. 10; the rest were

taken out five days later, Hoffman said.

Meanwhile, Iran's supreme leader lashed out at Western countries as he led Friday prayers in Tehran for the first time in eight years, dismissing "American clowns" who he said pretend to support the Iranian nation but want to stick their "poisoned dagger" into its back.

Ayatollah Ali Khamenei used his rare appearance at the weekly prayers to deliver a fiery address in which he insisted Iran would not

bow to U.S. pressure after months of crushing sanctions and a series of recent crises — from the killing of a top Iranian general to accidentally shooting down of a Ukrainian passenger plane.

Khamenei said the mass funerals for Gen. Qassem Soleimani, who was killed in a U.S. airstrike earlier this month, show that the Iranian people support the Islamic Republic despite its recent trials.

He said the "cowardly" hit on Soleimani had taken out the most effective com-

mander in the battle against the Islamic State group.

In response to Soleimani's killing, Iran launched a barrage of ballistic missiles targeting U.S. troops in Iraq. Khamenei said the strike had dealt a "blow to America's image" as a superpower.

In the part of his sermon delivered in Arabic, he said the "real punishment" would be in forcing the U.S. to withdraw from the Middle East.

Khamenei called the downing of the plane a "bitter accident" that he

said had saddened Iran as much as it made its enemies happy.

Khamenei also lashed out at Britain, France and Germany after they triggered a dispute mechanism to try and bring Iran back into compliance with the unraveling 2015 nuclear agreement.

"These contemptible governments are waiting to bring the Iranian nation to its knees," Khamenei said. "America, who is your elder, your leader and your master, was not able to bring the Iranian nation to its knees. You are too small to bring the Iranian nation to its knees."

Thousands of people attended the Friday prayers, occasionally interrupting his speech by chanting "God is greatest!" and "Death to America!"

Tensions between Iran and the United States have steadily escalated since Trump withdrew from the nuclear accord, which had imposed restrictions on Iran's nuclear program in exchange for the lifting of international sanctions.

The U.S. has since imposed crippling sanctions on Iran, including its vital oil and gas industry, pushing the country into an economic crisis that has ignited several waves of sporadic, leaderless protests. Trump has encouraged protesters — even tweeting in Farsi — hoping the protests and the sanctions will bring about fundamental change in a long-time adversary.

Khamenei mocked those efforts, dismissing "these American clowns who falsely and despicably say that they are standing with the Iranian people."

### Justices to consider faithless electors, ahead of 2020 vote

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court said Friday it will decide ahead of the 2020 election whether presidential electors are bound to support the popular vote winner in their states or can opt for someone else.

Advocates for the court's intervention say the issue needs urgent resolution in an era of intense political polarization and the prospect of a razor-thin margin in a presidential election, al-

though so-called faithless electors have been a footnote so far in U.S. history.

The case arises from the 2016 presidential election. Three Hillary Clinton electors in Washington state and one in Colorado refused to vote for her despite her popular vote win in both states. Thus they hoped to persuade enough electors in states won by Donald Trump to choose someone else and deny Trump the presidency.

### 3 US airports screen for new virus amid outbreak in China

LOS ANGELES — Federal authorities will begin screening airline travelers arriving from Wuhan, China, for signs that they may be infected with a new coronavirus that is spreading in Asia, officials announced Friday.

Passengers flying into Los Angeles International Airport, San Francisco International Airport and John F. Kennedy International Airport in New York will be examined for the

virus's pneumonia-like symptoms, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said.

About 100 additional CDC workers will be deployed to join existing public health staff at the three airports.

The newly evolved virus, known as 2019-nCoV, has sickened at least 41 people and killed two. Thailand and Japan have each identified infected patients as well.

### Ex-Guantanamo commander convicted of lying in probe

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — A former commander of the U.S. Navy base at Guantanamo Bay was convicted Friday of interfering with an investigation into the death of a civilian with whom the commander had fought and argued over his affair with the man's wife.

A federal jury in Jacksonville convicted Navy Capt. John R. Nettleton on charges of obstruction of justice, concealing materi-

al facts, falsifying records and making false statements.

Nettleton wasn't charged with Christopher Tur's death. He could get 75 years, but guidelines suggest his term will be significantly less.

Nettleton denied to his superior officer and others that he had the affair, but investigators later determined that it had happened, according to prosecutors in Jacksonville.

### Jury of 7 men, 5 women selected for Weinstein trial

NEW YORK — A jury of seven men and five women was selected Friday for Harvey Weinstein's rape trial after an arduous, two-week process in which scores of people were dismissed because they had already made up their minds about the disgraced Hollywood mogul.

Opening statements are expected Wednesday in the case against the 67-year-old executive who has come to be seen as the arch-villain of the #MeToo era.

The once powerful and feared studio boss behind such Oscar winners as "Pulp Fiction" and "Shake-

speare in Love" is charged with raping a woman in a New York City hotel room in 2013 and forcibly performing a sex act on another at his apartment in 2006. He has said any sexual activity was consensual. If convicted, he could get life in prison.

During jury selection, prosecutors accused Weinstein's lawyers of systematically trying to keep young women off the panel, though the final gender makeup of the jury turned out to be more closely balanced.

"We got the best jury we could get under the cir-

cumstances," defense attorney Donna Rotunno told reporters.

A stooped Weinstein, shuffling out of the courthouse with the use of a walker, had no comment on jury selection. "Ask Donna!" he said, referring to Rotunno.

Weinstein's lawyers have tried, so far unsuccessfully, to move the trial out New York City, arguing that heavy publicity has turned the case into a "carnival" and that the media hub where celebrities and ordinary people often intersect can't possibly give their client a fair trial.

### Ukrainian president rejects PM's resignation

KYIV, Ukraine — Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy rejected his prime minister's offer to resign and asked him to stay on the job Friday after he was caught on tape saying Zelenskyy — a former sitcom star with no previous political experience — knows nothing

about the economy.

In a video released by Zelenskyy's office, the president called the situation "unpleasant" but asked Prime Minister Oleksiy Honcharuk and his Cabinet to carry on.

The offer to step down was subject to approval by the Rada, Ukraine's parlia-

ment, which is dominated by Zelenskyy's party. It presented a legal quandary since Ukrainian law prevents the Cabinet's dismissal for a year after it presents its program. Honcharuk did so in September.

Zelenskyy demanded an investigation into the source of the recording.

### Former Rep. Chris Collins sentenced to over 2 years

NEW YORK — A former congressman who was one of President Donald Trump's first supporters was sentenced Friday to two years and two months in federal prison after admitting he helped his son and others dodge \$800,000 in stock market losses when he learned that a drug trial by a small pharmaceutical company had failed.

Christopher Collins, 69, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge Vernon Broderick in Manhattan after the Republican pleaded guilty in October to conspiracy to commit securities fraud and lying to law enforcement.

The trading, prosecutors said, enabled Cameron Collins and friends to dodge \$800,000 in losses.

Broderick called it baffling that Collins would exercise such poor judgment when he and his son had the financial means to deal with any loss.

**In Paris:** Dozens of protesters blocked the entrance to the Louvre museum and forced the famous Paris landmark to close Friday while they denounced the French government's pension overhaul plans.

The protesters, who included some Louvre employees, staged the demonstration against President Emmanuel Macron's proposals after several hard-left trade unions appealed for public actions to oppose that they said would "lower everyone's pensions."

The museum's Leonardo da Vinci exhibit marking the 500th anniversary of the Italian master's death was included in the closure. Protesters chanted, "Mona Lisa in on strike, Leonardo is on strike."

# 3 more linked to neo-Nazi group arrested in Georgia

WASHINGTON — Three men linked to a violent white supremacist group known as The Base were charged with conspiring to kill members of a militant anti-fascist group, police in Georgia announced Friday, a day after three other members were arrested on federal charges in Maryland and Delaware.

The Base, a collective of hard-core neo-Nazis that operates as a paramilitary organization, has proclaimed war against minority communities in the United States and abroad, the FBI has said. Unlike other extremist groups, it aims to bring together highly skilled members to train them for acts of violence.

Its organizers recruit fellow white supremacists online — particularly seeking out veterans because of their military training — use encrypted chat rooms and train members in military-style camps, according to experts who track extremist groups.

The group, which has the motto “learn, train,

fight,” brings together white supremacists with varying ideologies.

There’s an intensified focus on The Base after three members were arrested Thursday in Maryland and Delaware on federal felony charges. A criminal complaint included details of how some of the men built an assault rifle. They were believed to be planning to attend the pro-gun rally in Richmond, Virginia, according to a law enforcement official who spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity.

The arrests only added to rising fears that Monday’s rally could devolve into violence, with thousands of protesters plan-

ning to descend on Virginia’s capital.

Virginia Gov. Ralph Northam signed an executive order banning guns from the state Capitol grounds for Monday’s rally, but pro-gun groups have filed an appeal seeking to overturn the ban.

In his legal brief urging the Virginia Supreme Court to uphold the ban, State Attorney General Mark Herring called Northam’s action “a carefully limited Executive Order” that “does not prevent anyone from speaking, assembling, or petitioning the government.”

“Instead, it temporarily precludes private possession of firearms in a

sensitive public place during a specified time to protect public safety,” the brief says.

A circuit court judge Thursday upheld Northam’s ban after gun-rights groups filed a lawsuit against it, arguing that it would violate their Second Amendment right to bear arms and their First Amendment freedom of speech.

Philip Van Cleave, president of the Virginia Citizens Defense League — the group sponsoring the rally — called the judge’s ruling “mind-boggling.” The Defense League and the organization Gun Owners of America filed an appeal of the ruling to the state Supreme Court. It was not clear when the high court would rule. Northam’s ban was scheduled to go into effect Friday afternoon and remain in effect through Tuesday afternoon.

On Friday, police in Georgia confirmed that three other men linked to The Base were arrested on charges of conspiracy to commit murder.

The men were identified as Luke Austin Lane, Michael Helterbrand and Jacob Kaderli.

## Anti-Trump groups move on to more action

CHICAGO — Days after President Donald Trump killed an Iranian general and said he was sending more soldiers to the Middle East, about 100 protesters stood on a pedestrian bridge over Chicago’s Lake Shore Drive with an illuminated sign that read “No War in Iran.”

Some 200 people marched in the bitter cold near Boston, while a few dozen people demonstrated on the steps of Los Angeles City Hall and at similarly sized gatherings across the U.S.

Three years after Trump took office and millions swarmed to the Women’s March in Washington and companion marches across the country, these typically modest protests are often the most visible sign of today’s Trump resistance.

Activists say the numbers should not be mistaken for a lack of energy or motivation to vote Trump out of office in November.

The anti-Trump movement of 2020, they say, is more organized and more focused on action. Many people have moved from protesting to knocking on doors for candidates, mailing postcards to voters, advocating for specific causes or running for office.

But the movement that sprung up to oppose Trump’s presidency also is more splintered than it was when pink-hatted protesters flooded Washington the day after his inauguration for what is generally regarded as the largest protest in the city since the Vietnam era. There have been schisms over which presidential candidates to back in 2020, as well as disagreements about race

and religion and about whether the march reflected the diversity of the movement. Those divisions linger even as many on the left say they need a united front heading into November’s election.

The disputes led to dueling events in New York City last year, the resignation of some national Women’s March leaders and the disbanding of a group in Washington state.

Organizers expect this year’s Women’s March, scheduled for Saturday in over 180 cities, including Washington, D.C., to have about the same turnout as last year, when about 100,000 people held a rally east of the White House. Instead of a single big event, the group has been holding actions around three key issues: climate change, immigration and reproductive rights.

The week reflects that the movement is “moving into the next stage,” said director Caitlin Breedlove.

While waiting, many have passed on some major moments in Trump’s presidency. Resistance groups rallied on the eve of the House vote for impeachment, but even some of those who participated said they were disappointed more people didn’t turn out.

Several organizations also said much of their organizing is done through social media or text message and email programs, which are less visible but have a significant effect.

Atef Said, a sociology professor at the University of Illinois at Chicago, said all social movements evolve over time. He noted the Trump resistance movement is global and will continue regardless of whether Trump is re-elected.

## Pompeo discusses threat allegations

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Friday broke nearly 72 hours of silence over alleged surveillance and threats to the former U.S. ambassador to Ukraine, saying he believed the allegations would prove to be wrong but that he had an obligation to evaluate and investigate the matter.

In interviews with conservative radio hosts, Pompeo said he had no knowledge of the allegations until earlier this week when congressional Democrats released documents from an associate of President Donald Trump’s personal attorney suggesting that Marie Yovanovitch was being watched. He also said he did not know and had never met Lev Parnas, the associate of Rudy Giuliani who made the claims.

Pompeo, who was traveling in California when the documents were released, had been criticized by lawmakers and current and former diplomats for not addressing the matter. The documents provided by Parnas suggested there may have been a threat to Yovanovitch shortly before she was recalled last spring.

“We will do everything we need to do to evaluate whether there was something that took place there,”

he said in a radio interview with Tony Katz, an Indianapolis-based broadcaster. “I suspect that much of what’s been reported will ultimately prove wrong, but our obligation, my obligation as secretary of state, is to make sure that we evaluate, investigate. Any time there is someone who posits that there may have been a risk to one of our officers, we’ll obviously do that.”

“It is always the case at the Department of State that we do everything we can to ensure that our officers, not only our ambassadors but our entire team, has the security level that’s appropriate,” Pompeo said.

Pompeo made similar but less specific comments to commentator Hugh Hewitt.

## Trump plans to pick 2 for Fed board

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said Thursday that he intends to nominate two people to serve on the Federal Reserve's Board of Governors, an institution he has repeatedly attacked for not cutting rates deeply enough.

Both were first named by Trump on Twitter in July, but their nominations hadn't been formally announced. Trump said he has picked Judy Shelton, an economic adviser to his campaign who recently served as the U.S. executive director for the European Bank of Reconstruction and Development, and Christopher Waller, director of research at the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis.

Shelton's history of unorthodox economic commentary could make her nomination more controversial. Waller, who regularly attends the Fed's rate-setting meetings in Washington, is a more conventional selection. Both will require confirmation by the Senate, a process that can take months.

Shelton and Waller would fill two vacancies on the Fed's seven-member board. Board members vote on the Fed's interest rate policies and also weigh in on financial regulation.

## 'Deeply troubling' trend at airports

TSA found record 4,432 firearms in '19

The Transportation Security Administration caught more firearms at airport checkpoints in 2019 than in any other year since it was created in 2001, the agency said, as part of a steady uptick that its leader called "deeply troubling."

The agency said that it found 4,432 firearms last year in carry-on bags or carried by passengers, neither of which is allowed. That number was 5% higher than the 4,239 firearms discovered in 2018 and nearly five times the 926 found in 2008, the

TSA said. A vast majority of the guns found in 2019 — almost 90% — were loaded, the TSA said. About one-third of the guns caught had a round in the chamber.

"The continued increase in the number of firearms that travelers bring to airport checkpoints is deeply troubling," David Pekoske, administrator of the TSA, said in a statement this week. He advised flyers to follow the rules of the "proper way to travel safely with a firearm."

The airports where the most firearms were found in 2019 were at three major hubs: Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International, 323; Dallas/Fort Worth International, 217; and Denver International, 140.

Jenny Burke, a TSA spokeswoman, said the agency did not speculate on why the numbers were increasing because "a lot of factors" could play a role. She said it was important "to note that there is an increasing volume of travelers every year."

Jeff Price, a professor of aviation management at the Metropolitan State University of Denver, said the increase was a "conundrum our industry has been trying to figure out for a while."

"It's not like it's unknown to the average public that you're not supposed to carry a gun on the plane," he said.

Price, who trains airport staff nationwide on security issues, said improved technology could be detecting more firearms.

## Flu shots for kids can be tough to find

As the flu season gears up to be a tough one for children, parents may wonder why they are limited in where they can take their kids to get a flu shot. Pharmacies throughout the state offer flu shots, but only to older children, teens, and adults.

That's because under the Illinois Pharmacy Practice Act, pharmacists can only give the flu shot to children age 10 and older.

Pharmacists say there is no health or medical reason for preventing them from vaccinating young children, although several other states also have age restrictions.

But Anita Chandra-Puri, a national spokesperson for the American Academy of Pediatrics and a pediatrician at Northwestern Medicine, said primary care physicians are better equipped at providing the vaccine to children.

"It's not just as simple as giving someone a shot. ... There is a lot of reaction variation that goes into administering a vaccine. A pediatrician is experienced with injections. They are the ones who have a patient's background records," Chandra-Puri said.

Up until recently, kids had to be at least 14 to get a flu shot from pharmacists in Illinois.

"Illinois is very restrictive when it comes to flu vaccines," said Garth Reynolds, executive director for the Illinois Pharmacists Association.

The H1N1 swine flu pandemic caused Illinois lawmakers to loosen the restriction, Reynolds said. In 2012, state legislators lowered the age restriction to 10 from 14.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends everyone 6 months and older get a flu vaccine each season, regardless of where they obtain them.

According to the CDC, about 45% of children didn't get a flu shot in Illinois during the 2017-2018 flu season, the most recent period for which data is available. Some 180 kids died from the flu that season nationwide.

"We do recommend parents get their children vaccinated before Halloween. We tell them wherever it's easy for them to get it," said Scott Goldstein, a pediatrician at Northwestern Children's Practice in the Gold Coast. "The point is to give the kids the flu shot."


While Walgreens and CVS Health stores in Illinois can only give flu shots to children who are at least age 10, CVS MinuteClinics can administer the vaccine to anyone 18 months and older because nurse practitioners are on hand to administer the shots.

"Pharmacists have the training and capability to administer flu shots. There is no reason to restrict when they can get it from a qualified, trained and educated health care provider," Reynolds said.

### VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

#### People with disabilities face bias

“Will you always be like that?” “What’s wrong with you?”

Questions asked (I assume) from a well-intentioned place. However, it’s challenging for me to respond in a way that doesn’t reveal my frustration with this repeated experience. Being a paraplegic and manual wheelchair user since 2013, I assure you that bias against the disabled community is both real and embarrassingly prominent in our society.

Countless memoirs share stories of disability-related discrimination. Statistics echo those stories: The Bureau of Labor Statistics has reported lower employment-population ratios for *all* age groups and higher jobless rates for people with disabilities across *all* levels of educational attainment. Expectations of my success or benefit to society by strangers have been drastically depleted since my walking days.

My peers with disabilities and I exist in a world subscribing to a medical model of disability, in which disability is viewed as a problem to be fixed. Perhaps one could argue the desire to fix and improve is a behavior central to human existence, and people are “only trying to help.” We like to improve. We like to fix. We assign categories of “broken” and “not broken” to items. But when we dangerously apply these categories to people, especially people with disabilities, we derail progress and emasculate the lived experience of disability.

This medical model is old and outdated, yet it persists — in media, medicine and everyday life — informing attitudes and opinions, resulting in harmful bias. We must rewrite this narrative and subscribe to a social model of disability, in which my wheelchair use is acknowledged as a simple adaptation to my inability to walk. We must recognize that what is “disabling” are physical and social arrangements of institutional norms. These norms are easily altered with straightforward changes allowing for inclusion of an often-excluded population: ramps, universal design communication, reasonable accommodations.

It’s accurate to say my body no longer functions as it did prior to my injury, and it’s accurate to say I encounter barriers on a daily basis as a result of that injury. Yet I consider this disabled body to be stronger physically — having raced in multiple marathons — and mentally, thriving in a way of life I never imagined. I consider this disabled body to have purpose as I pursue dual medical and doctorate degrees. I consider this disabled body to be one that will make a difference.

We are disabled, and we are far from broken.

#### Teachers’ influence is expansive

The death of Christa McAuliffe aboard the space shuttle Challenger in 1986 sounded the death knell for the teacher-in-space program. I was one of 11,000 who had vied for the seat. When she was chosen, I went through the predictable stages of jealousy to eventual pride that a teacher was chosen.

Then the shuttle blew up that cold January morning, and in the aftershock, the human factors that led to the program’s demise were visible. All the human frailties teachers warn students to avoid were there: poor communication, impatience, arrogance.

Seven dead, one a civilian dying to prove a point that did not need proving from up there: that more lives have been touched and saved in classrooms by teachers and our interactions with students than could ever have been reached by the Challenger mission. The horizon we reach is always there, inside our students’ heads and hearts. We can touch their lives from across the expanse of desks more meaningfully than from across the expanse of space.

McAuliffe was 37 when she died. Had she continued teaching to a standard retirement age, she would have taught another 28 years. If she taught 125 students annually, 3,500 students from 1987 to this year would have been taught by her. Those 3,500 students would have, given metrics beyond my ken, impacted their part of the world, in part influenced by the time spent with her.

The challenge that exists in teaching was there before McAuliffe and all of us began working and will continue after all of us in teaching die. The only arena we need to impress upon students the necessity of becoming and the value in learning is in our classrooms.

#### Invest more in higher ed, Illinois

Higher education is an investment, not just a cost. By not adequately funding higher education in Illinois, we are eating our seed corn.

Higher education benefits society in numerous ways. It serves as an economic engine and an incubator of innovative ideas in fields as diverse as technology, health care, finance and agriculture. Overall, college graduates enjoy better health, commit fewer crimes, have lower unemployment and poverty rates, earn higher wages, and thus pay more taxes; these benefit our society, not just the graduates. A college education enhances cultural appreciation and understanding of others, which makes people more capable of working in a diverse modern workforce and participating in a democracy and in civic life.

Unfortunately, higher education in Illinois is facing a crisis: Half of all college-bound Illinois high school graduates attend college out of state. This leads to a brain drain and a related series of negative consequences: Students earning college degrees out of state are more likely to work and raise families out of state after graduation.

Moreover, today’s students should not be saddled with a crushing debt that older Illinois citizens did not have. We need to treat the next generation fairly. Our schools need to be able to offer financial packages that competitively match out-of-state offers. It is in the state’s best interest to make a significant financial investment in higher education.

## 988 emergency number would provide a stronger suicide lifeline

Extreme stress scrambles the brain, but it’s second nature to dial 911 to summon help in a crisis. Now a welcome sequel is coming, one that should allow mental health crises to be addressed more adeptly.

Pending federal legislation would establish 988 as the number for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, which is currently 800-273-TALK, or 800-273-8255, the Tribune’s Kate Thayer reports. The proposal to establish the number, currently in a period of public comment, has bipartisan support.

Anyone considering suicide should know that mental health disorders can be treated and that the hotline is available 24/7 at the existing nine-digit number. The 988 emergency number is not yet in use.

Suicide has been on an alarming rise. In 2017, more than 47,000 people in the United States died by suicide and 14 million attempted it. From 1999 to 2016, suicide increased in 49 of the 50 states.

While other types of gun violence grab headlines, by far the most gun deaths are suicides — a full two-

thirds.

Suicide impacts all communities. It has increased among boys and girls ages 10 to 17; recently, the Tribune just told the story of a seventh-grade boy in Lincoln Park who died this way. Six Chicago police officers died by suicide in an eight-month period in 2018-2019.

The toll is even higher in many at-risk communities. “More than 20 veterans die by suicide every day, and more than half a million LGBTQ youth will attempt suicide this year alone,” said FCC Chairman Ajit Pai. “A shorter, simpler suicide hotline number could be a game-changer.”

Advocates say creating a simple three-digit dedicated number will allow mental health to command the same urgency as physical crises. They expect other benefits, too, including potential savings in offering an alternative to the dispatch of first responders.

With no choice but to call 911, “a police officer and ambulance shows up at their door. If that’s how our society treats mental health emer-

gencies, people aren’t as likely to report,” said John Draper, executive director of the national suicide lifeline. The proposed 988 number “would not only give them the right care, but it won’t give them the wrong care.”

When dialing 988, callers would speak to trained counselors who would evaluate whether the person needed emergency care or referral to other resources, as well as whether follow-up contact is warranted. People could also call 988 with concerns about friends or family members.

If the number is widely marketed and works as it should, there will be many more calls for mental health services. That’s both the good news and the next challenge. Calls to the lifeline could double from 2.2 million in 2018, according to experts. As with 911, phone-bill fees will provide extra dollars for staff and training. Crisis centers, aided by state and local governments and grants from nonprofits, must make sure there are plenty of trained staff waiting on the other end of the line.

### WHAT OTHERS ARE SAYING

The NBA tries too hard to keep Brooklyn fans entertained.

There’s almost nothing I wouldn’t do if one of my children asked. When it was a recent Boston Celtics game, with grandchildren coming along, I didn’t hesitate for a moment to accept. Though I might be reluctant to do it again.

Certainly Boston’s loss colored my experience. But the real problem was that the game itself was made to seem incidental, lost in a tsunami of nonstop, high-volume canned chants and a variety of sideshows — all seemingly based in a fear that fans would become bored.

... Pauses in the game immediately cue other entertain-

ment. The “Brooklynettes” take over the court to dance. T-shirt cannons shoot up toward the balconies. Random candid shots of fans appear on the overhead screens. An on-court emcee leads a trivia game. There are contests for kids. It’s very loud — and nonstop. ...

It’s largely harmless, I suppose. ... The problem is its implicit assumption that, absent continuous stimulation, everyone will lose interest.

This is the opposite of what I always hoped sports would teach my sons: the value of strategy. One must learn to *concentrate* on what is happening in the moment and use it to discern what might happen next.



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## 'THE MOST PERFECT LOCATION'

How Kristin Cavallari's new Uncommon James store ended up on Randolph Street in West Loop

Cameras trailed Kristin Cavallari as she searched for the perfect Chicago spot to open a store for her Uncommon James lifestyle brand on Thursday's episode of "Very Cavallari."

Cavallari brought her friend and Uncommon James consultant, Stephanie Biegel, to look at two West Loop listings during summer 2019. The first location was a ground-floor unit at Washington Boulevard and Aberdeen Street. Cavallari liked the size of the 8,879-square-foot space, but worried about foot traffic.

"I mean, I don't see anybody on

this damn street right now," Cavallari told Biegel. The space was still unoccupied as of Thursday morning.

The second spot Cavallari visited, and ended up choosing, is at 849 W. Randolph St. Jaipur, a renowned Indian restaurant, operated there until its doors closed in July 2018.

Here's where the drama comes in. When Cavallari initially toured the Randolph spot, she said it was too small and she needed the neighboring unit, but it was being renovated for another tenant. "Gwyneth Paltrow's company Goop is about to sign a lease, so I don't know. Maybe I'll have to go

to Dallas and see how I feel about that," Cavallari told her husband, former Bears quarterback Jay Cutler. Cavallari said on last week's Season 3 premiere that she wanted to open a store in Chicago or Dallas. Her first Uncommon James store debuted in March 2018 in Nashville.

Cavallari spent much of Thursday's episode lamenting the too-small Randolph space. When a friend asked her if the Chicago store may not happen, she replied: "I don't think it's going to. I literally found the most perfect location, but it's way too small. Maybe I can knock the wall down and get two units, but there's

somebody next door. I'm bummed, but there's nothing I can do."

That statement doesn't seem to line up with reality. Cavallari made the comment Sept. 18, 2019 — weeks after she announced she was opening the store in the West Loop and a week after the city approved alterations to the space. This is not the first time the "Very Cavallari" timeline differed from real life.

But the episode ended on a happy note for Cavallari because her real estate broker, David Goldberg of GoldStreet Partners, told her she could have both units. Goldberg told the Tribune

that Cavallari had a clear vision from the start. "She was on it. This was very, very fast to get something done, and she made it happen," he said. "She was pretty dead set on where she wanted to be, and she pushed very hard to get it." Sterling Bay retail leasing director Jessica Brown, who also appeared on the episode, did not respond to a Tribune request for comment.

■ **July 23, 2019:** Kristin Cavallari posts on Instagram a picture of herself in an orange dress and declares that filming has started on Season 3. Wearing the same orange dress, she tells Uncommon James information technology director Brittainy Taylor that she is thinking about opening a second Uncommon James store, and Dallas and Chicago are her top two choices. "I feel like I have to just go and look at places and see what I can find." That scene is part of the Season 3 premiere, which aired on Jan. 9, 2020.

■ **July 24, 2019:** Paperwork that allows Uncommon James LLC to do business in Illinois is signed and dated July 24, 2019. The paperwork is filed with the Illinois secretary of state's office on Aug. 1, 2019, records show. Cavallari had submitted similar paperwork for Uncommon James in early 2017, before the Bears cut her husband, quarterback Jay Cutler, and the couple moved to the Nashville area. Uncommon James is also allowed to do business in other states, including North Carolina, Virginia and Texas, records show.

■ **Aug. 2, 2019:** Cavallari is spotted filming in the West Loop.

■ **Aug. 3, 2019:** Cavallari posts on Instagram a picture with three friends, including Uncommon James consultant Stephanie Biegel, in the West Loop. While dining with these women at the Japanese restaurant Momotaro, Cavallari says she's going to look at spaces for Uncommon James the following day. This scene was part of the Season 3 premiere.

■ **Aug. 30, 2019:** Cavallari announces she will open her Uncommon James store in the West Loop in October 2019. The picture she uses for the announcement appears to have been taken during her search for Chicago locations with Biegel. News of the store opening had already leaked on social media a few days before.

■ **Sept. 5, 2019:** Cavallari posts on Instagram a picture of herself, Biegel and Taylor in hard hats with glasses in their hands. "Just doing our part to get the Chicago @uncommonjames store up and running," she writes.

Later that evening, Cavallari and Cutler attend the Bears season opener against the Green Bay Packers at Soldier Field.

■ **Sept. 11, 2019:** The Chicago Department of Buildings receives and approves a permit for interior alterations at the Uncommon James location, records show.

■ **Sept. 26, 2019:** The buildings department receives and approves a permit to demolish and remove a door and install a new storefront window at Uncommon James, records show.

■ **Oct. 25, 2019:** Goop MRKT opens at 48 E. Oak St., in the Gold Coast neighborhood, and stays open until Jan. 5, 2020. A Goop representative did not return a Tribune request for comment about whether Gwyneth Paltrow's company was interested in the space Cavallari took on Randolph Street.

■ **Oct. 26, 2019:** Uncommon James opens at 849 W. Randolph St. with Cavallari and Cutler on hand and a line that goes around the block.

### IN PERFORMANCE 'Stop Kiss' ★★★

## A poignant reminder of when Ellen made headlines by coming out

When Diana Son's moving "Stop Kiss" was first produced at New York's Public Theater in 1998, starring Jessica Hecht and Sandra Oh, it became one of the very few dramas to feature a lesbian couple at the heart of its story, and one of an even smaller subset of plays that drew attention to the violence and hostility routinely endured by gays and lesbians in cities such as New York in an era when even the West Village was less tolerant and by no means safe for everyone.


In the years that followed, "Stop Kiss" was often produced by college theaters; in almost every case, I well recall, its selection for a campus season was controversial and its production took courage. For a 90-minute play that spends most of its time charting a budding romance, "Stop Kiss" had an outsized social impact, especially since lesbians still were mostly invisible in mainstream Hollywood products. A lot of

young actresses who worked on the play in college were kissing another woman for the first time in rehearsal.

So it's a delight to see a relatively rare revival of this groundbreaking play that honors its history, its period, its openheartedness and its determination to embrace and teach audiences of all kinds. For today's young progressives, the piece may seem overly benign in its tolerance for hapless men and police officers struggling to do the right thing.

It demurs politically, you could argue, although that would be a 2020 argument, the situation 22 years ago being both very different and not so different at all. "Stop Kiss" comes from an era when a character named Ellen Morgan, played by Ellen DeGeneres, had just made headlines after coming out on prime-time television.

Co-produced by Pride Films and Plays and The Arc Theatre and warmly directed by Kanomé Jones, this new staging of "Stop

Kiss" makes no apologies for the late 1990s—in fact, the sound design, credited to Mike McShane, is so filled with carefully curated tracks I've had to stop myself from calling and asking for

a play list (the show is worth seeing for the musical cuts alone). Yet more importantly, it features two actresses, Kylie Anderson and Flavia Pallozzi, who forge a pair of contrasting characters

about whom you quickly come to care.

Jones has really cast her show well. Most notably, Anderson is a huge new talent: here, she's charming, funny, vulnerable and determined. You really pull for this couple as the play ideally requires, even if the two women have no idea, really, where they're going. They're just propelled by events and the limitations of men like the one played by Shane Novoa Rhoades.

"Stop Kiss" is a conventionally structured play, with one foot firmly in that Ellen sitcom world. But the benefit for audiences is that the show is funny and taut and generally a pleasure to watch.

In this production, it's both a look back at what was not so long ago and a reminder of how small plays in the American theater often have been at the vanguard of change.





## Homeowners go nuts over squirrels

## 'DOLITTLE' ★½

## Downey Jr. talks to animals, not that he cares about them

The new film "Dolittle" proves there's more than one way to spell "Dolittle," its preferred spelling being "J-u-m-a-n-j-i."

In what feels like a corporate panic, co-writer and director Stephen Gaghan's franchise hopeful trades charm for noise, and wit for a climactic dragon colonoscopy (don't ask). Meantime, Robert Downey Jr. offers a determined Scottish burr as a replacement for the bored silken tones of Rex Harrison, star of the 1967 musical "Doctor Dolittle," and Eddie Murphy, headliner of the disposable non-musical 1998 remake and its 2001 sequel.

The latest "Dolittle," like the others, owes its inspiration to Hugh Lofting, whose fanciful letters home during World War I formed the genesis of the first Dolittle book published in 1920. So many Oscar winners have lent their voices to the menagerie here, from Emma Thompson (a macaw) to Rami Malek (a gorilla). So where's the ... oh, what's the word ... fun?

Even in a realm dependent on digital effects, you'd hope a project co-written and directed by the same person, in this case "Syriana" filmmaker Gaghan, might retain some personality. Along with everything worth tossing — the quaint colonialist racism, for starters — Lofting's adventures of the animal doctor conversant in myriad mammal, aquatic, insect and aviary languages offer plenty for reinvestigation. And Downey Jr., if you haven't noticed or couldn't recall, is a fine actor as well as huge star.

The once and future Iron Man, however, favors a blasé, throw-it-away delivery that can easily lapse into subtle heckling. The set-up in "Dolittle," set

in the mid-19th century: After his wife and fellow explorer dies in a shipwreck, Dr. D hides away, Howard Hughes-like, in his private, zoolike house and grounds donated by Queen Victoria (Jessie Buckley). Two young people coincidentally pay the doctor a visit at the same time, forcing him out of his hermit zone: a teen royal (Carmel Laniado), sent to fetch Dolittle to save the mysteriously ailing queen; and a tender local lad (Harry Collett) who has accidentally shot a squirrel and seeks emergency treatment.

The palace intrigue features Michael Sheen and Jim Broadbent, mugging and skulking as the queen's enemies. Soon enough, a newly engaged Dolittle shakes off his grief and takes off across the seas in search of a magical potion to save Her Majesty.

The problems begin and end with the script, credited to three writers. "Dolittle" turns its title character into an eccentric and wearying blur of tics, tacked onto a character who comports himself like

a bullying, egocentric A-lister rather than someone who, you know, actually enjoys the company of animals. The banter enjoys the benefit of genuine comic pros doing the voices, but the zingers remain low on zing. "I've got a front row seat to Crazy Town!" goes one bit.

Then "Dolittle" turns into a "Jumanji" sequel, or a "Pirates of the Caribbean" knockoff, with Antonio Banderas as a Jack Sparrow-influenced adversary. I won't go into details regarding the dragon rectal exam, except to note that Gaghan doesn't know if he should treat this development seriously or comically. He settles for a little bit of neither. As for Downey Jr.'s dialect: It's thick. The synchronization is never quite right, so it never seems to be human speech coming out of a specific human's mouth. All those digital and A-list millions don't come to much in "Dolittle," though I did appreciate Kumail Nanjiani's vocal flourishes as the ostrich. I wouldn't say I prefer the clunky 1967 musical to the frenetic mechanical bull of this version.

But I wouldn't say I don't.

## Attendance dropped to new low at the Chicago Architecture Biennial

BY BLAIR KAMIN

Attendance at the Chicago Architecture Biennial last year dropped below a half-million for the first time, according to figures released Thursday.

The 2019 version of the global architecture and urban design exhibition, which closed Jan. 5, drew about 483,000 visitors, according to Agency H5, a public relations firm that represents the event.

That was a decline of nearly 13% from 2017, when city officials reported attendance of almost 550,000. And it was down nearly 9% from the event's debut year of 2015, when the reported number visitors was about 530,000.

Open to the public without charge and run by a nonprofit in cooperation with the city, the biennial is headquartered at the Chicago Cultural Center, with other venues located around Chicago.

Last year's version, titled "... and other such stories," drew mixed reactions from architecture critics since it opened Sept. 19.

Some praised the

exhibition's broad focus on issues such as environmental degradation and social housing. Others, however, faulted what they viewed as the show's over-emphasis on research and its lack of attention to architectural design.

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## Lowe has personal interest in new role

PASADENA, Calif. — Rob Lowe knows a little something about the vital roles of first responders, and he's bringing that to TV with his latest role.

He co-stars with Liv Tyler in "9-1-1: Lone Star" as a New York fire captain who relocates to Austin, Texas, to launch a firehouse from the ground up.

Lowe lives in Santa Barbara, California, which has endured wildfires and flooding in recent years. The actor has hosted and fed firefighters and police on his property.

"I was really interested in why these men and women do what they do, what does it mean to them, how do they go and sleep in the dirt for weeks on end if it comes to that," Lowe told a TV critics panel. "It was fortuitous that I had that in my own life leading up to this."

Lowe said he already knew medical lingo from his time on "Code Black," a CBS series that aired from

2016-18. "9-1-1: Lone Star" marks his return to a starring role on U.S. TV for the first time in four years, and it is Tyler's first network series.

Lowe's favorite part of the new show is "it's the only network procedural you'll see where the male hero is obsessed with

men's skin care." And there's a keto diet joke in the pilot. (Lowe promotes the Atkins eating plan and has his own skin care line in real life.)

Ryan Murphy ("Nip/Tuck"), Brad Falchuk and Tim Minear co-created and co-executive produce the show.

"Let's face it, I'm not a stranger to looking in the mirror," Lowe said. "They knew how to write for me, so any of that crazy stuff is probably coming from them knowing me as well as I know myself."

Murphy once wrote a role in "Nip/Tuck" for Lowe, but his agents never passed it on to the actor even though he loved the show.

"It's the humor, the weirdness, the randomness that we get to weave into this," Lowe said. "There's a lot of 'Nip/Tuck' tone in this."

The series debuts Jan. 19 on Fox after the NFC championship game, with a second episode airing Jan. 20 in its regular time slot.

In preparation for the role, Lowe trained with a Los Angeles Fire Department unit near Dodger Stadium. But his famous face posed a problem with real-life victims.

"People are like, 'I don't feel safe with Rob Lowe standing there. I don't feel like the real experts showed up,'" he said.



Today's deal is from the World Championships in 2011. The full auction is not available — just the first three bids. We've guessed at the rest. Forgive us if you don't like our bidding, but we had to get to slam somehow.

Slam looked nearly impossible when dummy came down. East had to have a heart, so that he couldn't ruff the opening lead, and it had to be the 10 so declarer could avoid a second heart loser. South played dummy's ace at trick one and was both relieved that East followed and disappointed that he didn't follow with the 10. South drew trumps in three rounds as West discarded one heart and one spade. South cashed the king and queen of clubs before crossing to dummy with the ace of spades. He discarded a heart on the ace of clubs, then cashed the king of spades and led another spade. East played the queen and declarer had a brainstorm. Instead of ruffing, South discarded a heart. East, on lead with only black cards remaining, had to lead one. The resulting ruff-sluff allowed South to discard his remaining heart and ruff in dummy. Making six!

Defender gets high marks for his enterprising play, but the defense could have done better. West should keep all his spades, discarding two low hearts when declarer drew trumps. This would allow East to make the fine play of ducking his queen of spades later and giving South no winning option in the play. No brainstorm, no slam.

## Full of hope and doubt

Ross extremely optimistic about 2020 Cubs, but wants to be known more than just 'Theo's guy'

Newly hired Cubs managers tend to come in two categories: realists and optimists.

A few weeks into his first spring training in 2007, Lou Piniella declared "this is no push-button operation, I can tell you that." During his opening news conference as Cubs manager in November 2014, Joe Maddon predicted he would be "talking playoffs next year."

Both were right, and despite their yin-and-yang approaches to the job, Piniella and Maddon became the two most successful Cubs managers in several decades.

So where will David Ross fit in? His stated belief the 2020 Cubs can win the World Series seems to put him in the optimists club. But who knows how he'll feel if the team that collapsed in September comes out of the gate in similar fashion in March and April.

As Piniella said on that March day in

2007: "You never know what to expect when you come in. You come in as positive as you can (be), and rightfully so. Then reality starts hitting you in the face a little bit, and you have to adjust to it accordingly."

Reality hit the Cubs in the face in 2019, opening the door to the Ross era.

As Ross prepared to be introduced to fans at the Cubs Convention on Friday night, one thing appeared obvious: He was the right choice for President Theo Epstein, who is navigating the club through a tenuous time and needs a compadre in the manager's seat.

That doesn't mean Ross will do everything in lockstep with Epstein, and Epstein said one of Ross's strengths is a willingness to tell his bosses they're wrong.

Uncertainty about Bryant's future lingers as Cubs Convention kicks off this weekend

A bout of the flu sent Kris Bryant to the doctor's office Friday, preventing the slugger from addressing his uncertain status before the opening ceremony at Day 1 of the Cubs Convention at the Sheraton Grand Chicago.

But team President Theo Epstein, overseeing a roster without a guaranteed free-agent signing this winter and no financial flexibility, reiterated his faith while the Cubs await an arbitrator's decision on Bryant's service-time grievance and potentially not signing any of his young, prized players to extensions before spring training.

"There's significant upside with this group of players," Epstein said before introductions. "We're not going to whistle past the graveyard."

But Epstein, who wasn't afraid to trade All-Stars such as Nomar Garciaparra and Manny Ramirez during his time with the

Red Sox, recognizes the uncertainty regardless of whether he trades Bryant or eventually signs All-Star shortstop Javier Baez to a long-term contract before he's eligible for free agency after 2021.

"It's clear we're going to carry more risk into this year than we have in the past, and it's our job to operate our way around it," Epstein said.

"Last year there was tremendous risk in the bullpen, and we knew we had to have our guys step up to save us."

Rowan Wick, Kyle Ryan and Brad Wieck — who all started the 2019 season in the minors — emerged as potential staples of a bullpen that lost veterans Pedro Strop, Steve Cishek and Brandon Kintzler to free agency.

"We're going to carry risk in the pen this year, and we must have a repeat where we find value in guys and guys improve and

## Saad nearing return after long break with injury

ETOBICOKE, Ontario — When Brandon Saad hurt his right ankle Dec. 19, the Blackhawks were nursing a one-goal lead against the Jets and reeling from what seemed to be the latest in a season's worth of destructive injuries.

So what did the Hawks do without Saad? They finished off a 4-1 win over the Jets and, including that victory, have gone 9-4 to save their season from ruin.

With Dominik Kubalik emerging, Jonathan Toews playing his best hockey of the season, Patrick Kane as good as ever and four lines rolling as strong as they have all season, what do you do with Saad?

You get him back in as fast as you can. "It's not like we don't want to touch the lineup," coach Jeremy Colliton said after practice Friday at the Ford Performance

Center outside Toronto. "It's just whether he's ready to play or not. Then we've got the back-to-back as well, so that's something we'll consider."

Saad skated well during practice and is in line to return against the Maple Leafs on Saturday after missing 12 games, the most he has lost to injury in his career. Since 2012-13, his first full season, Saad had missed a total of 12 games and never more than four in a season.

Until getting hurt, Saad had been the Hawks' best all-around player. He was a fierce penalty killer, playing a tireless 200-foot game, and his 11 goals were second on the team at the time of his injury.

Despite a strong record while Saad has been out, the Hawks missed him. And he missed them.



## Ex-Sox ace McDowell says team stole signs in late '80s

Former White Sox ace Jack McDowell said during a radio interview Friday that the team had a sign-stealing system involving a camera at Comiskey Park.

"We had a system at Old Comiskey Park in the late '80s, Gatorade sign out in right-center had a light, there was a toggle switch in the manager's office and a camera zoomed in on the catcher," McDowell told WFNZ-AM in Charlotte, N.C.

"I'm gonna whistleblow this now because I'm getting tired of this crap. ... Tony La Russa is the one who put it in. He was also the head, the first team of all the people doing steroids (referring to La Russa's time as Athletics manager). Yet he's still in the game making half a million, you know? No one is going to go after that. It's just, this stuff is getting old where they target certain guys and let other people off the hook.

"Like the media doesn't know that this all happened, what was going on. Everybody

knows, everybody that's been around the game knows all this stuff. Why all of a sudden it became a big thing, I have no idea. But it's frustrating being on the outside and watching what's going on with the game that I played for so long."

La Russa — who joined the Angels in November as senior adviser of baseball operations — managed the Sox from 1979 to '86. McDowell pitched for the Sox from 1987 to '94 and won the American League Cy Young Award in 1993.

ESPN reported the Angels did not respond to a request for a comment from La Russa.

"I've never said anything about the old system we had because once we got to New Comiskey (in 1991), I didn't know if there was one or not," McDowell said. "There were rumors that we had one, but it wasn't as out there as the first one was, where they forced the pitcher who was pitching the next day to go in there and flip on the toggle switch and stuff."

McDowell, who is head coach at Queens University of Charlotte, spoke in the aftermath of a week in which three major-league managerial positions opened in the fallout of the Astros sign-stealing scandal.

The Astros fired manager AJ Hinch and general manager Jeff Luhnow on Monday. The Red Sox and manager Alex Cora "mutually agreed to part ways" Tuesday. Cora was the bench coach for the 2017 Astros. The Mets and manager Carlos Beltran also parted Thursday. Beltran played for the '17 Astros.

## Darvish has flashbacks to '17 Series

Pitcher wonders if Astros cheated against him

BY PHIL THOMPSON

Yu Darvish had a nightmare of a World Series in 2017. Pitching for the Dodgers, he allowed eight runs in two starts, lasting only 3 1/3 innings in the two losses, which were instrumental in the Astros' 4-3 series win.

For two years, the story was that Darvish, now with the Cubs, was tipping his pitches and the Astros took advantage. Now Darvish isn't so sure.

Earlier this week, Major League Baseball fined the Astros \$5 million and took away their first- and second-round draft picks in 2020 and 2021 as punishment for an electronic sign-stealing scheme. Astros replay-review staff trained a camera on the opposing catcher and relayed signs to batters through teammates in the dugout. The Astros fired manager AJ Hinch and general manager Jeff Luhnow.

On Friday at the Cubs Convention, Darvish wondered about the true cause of his World Series meltdown. He signed as a free agent with the Cubs — whom he shut down in Game 3 of the NLCS that season —

in February 2018.

"That's what I want to know," Darvish said. "A couple of Astros players told me that I was tipping pitches 100%. But then it came out they're stealing signs. That's why I want to know, (if) the World Series came from stealing signs or tipping pitches."

"Game 3 was (a) maybe," Darvish added. "After that the Dodgers started checking (whether I was) tipping pitches or whatever. But they couldn't find it, especially Game 7. But Astros players (later) told me I was tipping 100% in Game 7. So it's like ..."

Darvish trailed off. Does he still believe those players' claims in light of recent

revelations that the Astros used technology to cheat that season?

"Not sure, no."

Still, Darvish said he took lessons from that World Series experience that proved invaluable later. Darvish had a disappointing first season with the Cubs but rebounded in 2019, especially after the All-Star break when he had a 2.76 ERA and 0.81 WHIP with 118 strikeouts and seven walks in 81 2/3 innings.

"If I didn't have that World Series, I can't pitch like last year in that second half," he said. "That came from that thing; I was fired up. I have to take that the right way."

step up," Epstein said.

Epstein also acknowledged the rotation doesn't have the depth he prefers, as well as depth questions at a couple of other positions.

"If things don't break our way, we could have holes out there, and that's on us," he said.

The last two offseasons, Epstein tried to sign Bryant, Baez, Kyle Schwarber and Willson Contreras to long-term contracts that would buy them out of free agency and give the Cubs cost certainty. But only pitcher Kyle Hendricks signed a long-term deal (through 2024), and Epstein paused before assessing progress on negotiations this winter.

"I'd say we moved the ball forward, but it's a long process," Epstein said. "So we're not sure what the outcome is going to be. We've had some productive talks but not to the point we got anything done yet."

Epstein praised Bryant for his contributions but reiterated about listening to deals for all his players — including Bryant, the 2015 National League Rookie of the Year, 2016 NL MVP and three-time All-Star.

"We expect that (Bryant) would be our third baseman, but we've been open and transparent about the fact we'll talk about all our players this year," Epstein said. "We have to. We have to be more mindful of building a successful future — post-2021 for this group. We're running close to that point where a lot of our best players will be in a position to leave and we'd get nothing in return."

"Because of that, we're in a position where we're going to listen to everybody. We value Kris. We respect everything he's done. We appreciate everything he's done. We look forward to many great days ahead and we hope he's part of it."


Moving Bryant's \$18.6 million salary would hurt the Cubs offense but would give them financial flexibility to address areas of need, such as a leadoff hitter. The Braves, who lost slugger Josh Donaldson to the Twins in free agency, could use Bryant and have young pitching that would suit the Cubs' long-term needs.

Baez, meanwhile, declined to comment on negotiations on an extension, saying he agreed to a \$10 million contract last week.

"It's up to (the Cubs)," Baez said. "When the right deal comes, we'll be ready for it."

Baez was confident in leaving negotiations to his representatives, adding he would feel no pressure if he and the Cubs can't reach an extension before the season.

And if someone gets traded, "I think Theo and the front office know what they're doing for this team," Baez said.

But when things get crazy, as they inevitably will with the Cubs, it's comforting for Epstein to know he can count on "Rossy" to keep things in perspective for panicky fans and media wags.

Ross is off to a strong start, showing Thursday he's ready to challenge media assumptions about his team, which won only 84 games last year and returns most of the same players.

Instead of the usual interview session with reporters at a charity event, Ross turned it into a mini-debate.

One reporter questioned Ross's unwavering faith in this team, mentioning the Cubs' pitching issues.

"You don't think there's enough pitching?" Ross replied, listing off the returning starters and Tyler Chatwood. "We've got a lot of options. What don't you like? What don't you think we've got enough of?"

The bullpen was the obvious response. "Yeah, there's a lot of turnover in the

bullpen," Ross said. "I don't think we're going to win or lose the division out of the bullpen. We've got Brandon Morrow coming back, which is super important if he's able to be an impactful guy like he's been the past. He's healthy ..."

The reporter noted that questions about Morrow remain because of his long-running health issues.

"Of course, but there are questions with everybody," Ross said, laughing. "There are questions with me."

Ross's relationship with the media helps with a smooth transition from Maddon. He already knows the local mob and enjoys the back-and-forth, much like Maddon.

But he also knows he will be under a microscope in Year 1 because he has no managerial experience and because some always will consider him "Theo's guy."

His reputation as fun-loving "Grandpa Rossy" from the 2015-16 Cubs teams, along with his celebrity status from being a "Dancing with the Stars" contestant, puts even more pressure on Ross to prove he was the right choice to replace Maddon.

One thing Ross may need to ditch is the "Grandpa" thing, though that's probably

easier said than done.

"I don't want to be 'Grandpa,' right?" Ross replied. "'Rossy' is good. 'Skip.' Fans can call me whatever they want. I'm sure there will be some names that I'll like 'Grandpa' a lot better."

When a reporter advised Ross to dye his gray-flecked beard to look younger, Ross said that wasn't an option.


"If I Just For Men' it, then it's like you're fake, you're not real," he said. "You've got to be real with yourself. This is who I am. I've got the crow's feet from smiling too much. I told (Anthony) Rizzo I'm getting the coaching body; the boiler is starting to poke out a little bit."

"But whatever they want to call me (is OK). A bunch of the guys walk by the office and say, 'What's up, Skip.' It makes me smile every time. (Call me) Grandpa Rossy, Skip, David ..."

Ross thought about it for a second. Forget about calling him David.

"I don't think anybody calls me David," he said. "If you call me David, you don't know me."

The Ross era is off and running. Rest assured, attention will be paid.

## Cubs acquire righty reliever Casey Sadler from Dodgers

The Cubs added bullpen depth Friday, acquiring right-hander Casey Sadler from the Dodgers in exchange for minor-league infielder Clayton Daniel.

Sadler, 29, was 4-0 with one save and a

2.14 ERA in 33 games (32 relief appearances) with the Rays and Dodgers in 2019. He limited right-handed hitters to a .230 average and lefties to a .241 mark, which could be helpful with the new rule stating a reliever must face at least three batters.


Sadler, a 25th-round pick of the Pirates in

2010 out of Western Oklahoma State, had a 1.86 ERA in nine games with the Rays before he was designated for assignment June 29 and traded three days later to the Dodgers, with whom he posted a 2.33 ERA in 27 innings.

Sadler has a 3.55 ERA in 42 major-league

appearances with the Pirates (2014-15, 2018), Rays and Dodgers. Sadler missed all of 2016 because of Tommy John surgery.

Daniel, 24, a 31st-round pick in 2018, hit a combined .305 with 21 RBIs in 67 games with Class A South Bend and Double-A Tennessee in 2019.

# A bargain now, Chiefs' Mahomes to cash in

Next deal could rival that of Warriors' Curry, Angels' Trout

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Chiefs had just lost to the Titans, their fourth defeat in the first 10 games of the season, and much of the optimism that surrounded the defending AFC champions had begun to evaporate.

That's when team owner Clark Hunt chose to speak publicly for the first time since training camp.

"We have had some outstanding players here over the years," Hunt said with conviction, "but I don't think we have had one like Patrick Mahomes in a very long time. Having him as the Chiefs quarterback really gives us an opportunity every year to be competitive and hopefully compete for an AFC championship, and ultimately a Super Bowl."

It turned out to be a prescient statement. The Chiefs haven't lost since, rolling through the rest of the regular season and climbing out of a 24-0 hole to beat the Texans 51-31 in the divisional round of the playoffs. And they'll aim to keep that roll going Sunday, when they get a rematch with the Titans at home with spot in the Super Bowl riding on the outcome.

Much of the credit belongs to Mahomes, who has quietly followed his MVP season with another spectacular run. He eclipsed 4,000 yards passing despite missing two games with a serious knee injury, threw 26 touchdown passes against just five interceptions, and he was even better against the Texans last weekend.

Mahomes became the first player with at least 300 yards passing, 50 yards rushing and five TD throws in a playoff game, all while keeping the Chiefs in the right mindset as they embarked on the greatest comeback in franchise history.

"Best quarterback in the NFL," Chiefs tight end Travis Kelce said afterward. "He'll prove it again next week."

Mahomes may not have been the best this season, of course. The ankle injury he sustained in the opener against the Jaguars in Jacksonville and the knee injury he sustained against the Broncos in Denver slowed him down most of the way, and the records that counterpart Lamar Jackson of the Ravens shattered could make him the heir for Mahomes' player of the year hardware.

But much to the chagrin of fantasy football diehards, statistics only tell part of the story, and the reality is Mahomes is a much better quarterback than he was as a first-time starter.

"This guy can make every single play on the field," Titans safety Kevin Byard said. "Playing those guys earlier in the year, I just remember at the end of the game and the next day my body was sore. I was mentally tired, and I feel like this is the same exact feeling I'm going to have at the end of this game."

It is all those things — the talent, the

mentality, the winning persona — that have made Mahomes among the best values in professional sports. What he's accomplished in his young career has been done on his rookie contract, paying him a shade over \$5 million this season, or less than what 10 players make on his very own team.

That is about to change in a record-setting way.

The Chiefs are able to negotiate a long-term deal with Mahomes for the first time this offseason, and some front office executives believe the going price will be a four- or five-year contract worth about \$40 million annually. That would just about match the salary of the Warriors' Steph Curry, the highest-paid player in the NBA this season, and eclipse the roughly \$38 million that the Angels' Mike Trout will make in 2020 as the best-paid player in baseball.

The Chiefs have been planning for it, too, structuring contracts the past couple of seasons with an eye on his future.

"We are certainly excited about the opportunity to extend Patrick's stay with the Chiefs and hope that it lasts his entire career," Hunt said.

In the meantime, the only thing Mahomes is focused on is the AFC title game. He led the Chiefs within a coin toss and untimely a penalty of perhaps beating the Patriots in overtime last season, and Mahomes admits that drove him through the summer.

"I mean, until you win that Super Bowl, I don't think you can be complacent with anything," Mahomes said. "Being that close last year, you want to find a way to win."

# LSU's Burrow would be OK playing for Bengals, dad says

Joe Burrow doesn't appear to have any reservations about playing for the Bengals.

Jimmy Burrow, the father of the Heisman Trophy winner, told Montreal's TSN 690 radio Thursday night that his son has no qualms about wearing orange and black if the Bengals take the LSU quarterback with the top overall pick in the NFL draft.

"He's excited to even be in that conversation and if the Bengals do draft him, he's going to be happy," said Jimmy Burrow, who played five seasons in the Canadian Football League.

The Bengals went 2-14 this season under first-year head coach Zac Taylor. They haven't won a playoff game since 1991 — five years before Joe Burrow was born — and haven't been to the postseason since 2015.

Joe Burrow, who led LSU to an undefeated season capped by a victory in Monday's national championship game against Clemson, has plenty of experience playing football in Ohio. He played high school ball at Athens High School, which is less than 160 miles east of downtown Cincinnati. Burrow spent three seasons at Ohio State before he transferred to LSU for his final two years of college.

In leading the unbeaten Tigers to the national championship, the 6-foot-4 Burrow posted some of the best numbers in collegiate history, passing for 5,674 yards and 60 TDs with only six INTs in 15 games.

In an interview with the Bengals' in-house website, quarterbacks coach Alex Van Pelt praised Burrow's ability to create plays, limit turnovers and make good decisions.

"He definitely checks off a lot of boxes early on in the evaluation process," Van Pelt told Bengals.com. "He's definitely an intriguing guy."

Jimmy Burrow said he doesn't know if his son will join the Bengals' coaching staff next week at the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Alabama.

"He'll look at it as a challenge," Jimmy Burrow said of his son playing for the

Bengals this fall. "But he'll be confident that eventually they can win a lot of games there in Cincinnati."

**Chiefs DT Jones limited in practice:** The Chiefs have a monster to try to stop this weekend in Derrick Henry when they take on the Titans in the AFC Championship Game.

Their best answer up front isn't certain he'll be able to play.

DT Chris Jones (calf) was a limited participant in Friday's practice, coach Andy Reid said. Jones is officially listed as questionable on this week's injury report.

"It's day to day," Jones said told reporters after practice. "It's not really the magnitude of the game because if I can [I'll] play. If I can't then it's unfortunate. But it could be a regular-season game, playoff game, a preseason game, if I can play [I'll] play."

Jones did not practice Wednesday and Thursday.

Jones went through a similar process in the week leading up to the Chiefs' divisional-round win the Texans, but wasn't able to play in that contest due to being unable to push off on the injured calf.

The Chiefs own the 26th-ranked run defense in the NFL and is going up against a Titans offense powered by the league's rushing champion in Henry.

In addition to Jones, RB LeSean McCoy (illness) and QB Matt Moore (illness) are also listed as questionable.

**Extra points:** After spending three seasons in the Browns' front office, the Eagles' vice president of football operations Andrew Berry was interviewed Friday to be the Browns' new GM. Berry was with the Browns from 2016-18, when they won just eight games and had an 0-16 season, but he was well-liked and admired by Browns owners Dee and Jimmy Haslam. ... The Jaguars plan to interview former Cowboys offensive coordinator Scott Linehan for their offensive coordinator job this weekend. The Jags are looking to replace John DeFilippo, who was fired after one season.

# McGregor makes long-awaited return

Polarizing Irish fighter says he's 'lot more centered now'

LAS VEGAS — Conor McGregor used to train whenever he felt like it, and he stayed up late every night. He would sleep deep into the daylight hours, and he perpetually showed up late for almost any commitment required of a rising mixed martial arts star.

McGregor had reason to believe chaos was his natural environment: He was climbing to the pinnacle of the so-called combat sports, winning two UFC title belts and earning an absurd payday against Floyd Mayweather while becoming the most famous fighter in the world.

But McGregor knows the chaos gradually caught him and consumed him.

The last half-decade of McGregor's public life has been an exhausting stretch of competitive disappointments and continuous legal troubles, including at least three violent confrontations outside the cage. His side career as a whiskey distiller has been more successful than his endeavors in a boxing ring or a cage, where he has competed just twice — and hasn't had his hand raised in victory — since 2016.

McGregor has analyzed what went wrong, and he believes he has identified the source.

"Consistency and structure was missing," McGregor said Thursday after arriving a mere half-hour late to a UFC production facility in the Vegas desert. "Structure. I was sporadic with my work and with my life. I'm a lot more centered now, a lot more grounded and a lot more focused."

That means a regimented schedule for training, sleeping and eating. In fact, McGregor couldn't lounge in bed these days even if he still wanted to do it, thanks to two alarm clocks in his new Irish countryside mansion: His toddler son, Conor Jack, and his 1-year-old daughter, Croia.

"With activity, with consistency and with structure, I can do anything, like I have done already," McGregor said.

Nearly 16 months after he lost to Khabib Nurmagomedov in his only mixed martial arts fight in more than three years, McGregor (21-4) returns to the cage at T-Mobile Arena off the Las Vegas Strip against Donald "Cowboy" Cerrone, a fellow veteran brawler and UFC stalwart attempting to mount a comeback.

McGregor is promising a productive,

active year from a fighter who still has fortune and fame but wants to reclaim the championships and the pride he lost.

"I want to be the best version of myself," McGregor said. "Everyone is saying they want the old Conor, the Conor that fought in 2016, the Conor that fought Eddie (Alvarez for the lightweight title). I feel I'm in a better place than that. I have a better skill set than that. I'm more experienced. That's certainly a drive of mine, to be a better version of myself."

Although he can still employ the swaggering persona that abetted his rise to fame, McGregor is notably humble in quieter moments these days. After multiple arrests and police investigations, McGregor has shown interest in keeping his cool.

When he is asked about the downside of worldwide fame, McGregor acknowledges it but quickly adds: "I also understand that this is not a real problem. People have real problems. I rolled up in a bleeding Rolls Royce truck. My family is back home, and my son is playing in our Vegas home. I'm very, very blessed."

McGregor moved his family last summer to a new mansion in Kildare, a small town well west of Dublin where he could revel in the quiet beauty of the Irish countryside. When McGregor was still an up-and-coming fighter, he spoke of his desire to own Irish land, and the move has fulfilled it.

"It's a phenomenal property on beautiful grounds," McGregor said. "The Irish air, the trees and the forest are in it. It's like a park in the house."

According to many fans and journalists who have followed his career closely, McGregor's reputation in Ireland has taken several hits with his misbehavior. He no longer sparks the universal adoration that accompanied his rise. His believe is the move to the countryside has the added benefit of keeping him away from people and places that caused trouble for him.

McGregor is still the biggest draw in the so-called combat sports. McGregor has no set schedule for the rest of 2020, but he clearly hopes to fight more this year than he did in the previous three combined.

And though many wondered if his recent inactivity would become a retirement, McGregor says he couldn't do it.

"There's still weight on my shoulders, but I love it," McGregor said. "That's what I love to do. I want that feeling. You've got to have that feeling to get in there. It's a pressure game. I'm very happy with the situation now."

# Fire sign Bolingbrook native Pineda to homegrown deal

The Chicago Fire on Friday announced the signing of Bolingbrook native Mauricio Pineda to a homegrown contract.

Pineda, whose brother Víctor was the Fire's first homegrown signing in 2010, is signed for the 2020 season with club options for 2021, 2022 and 2023.

"We're very happy that Mauricio has decided to return to Chicago to begin his professional career," Fire coach Raphael Wicky said in a statement. "He has all of the abilities necessary to become an impactful player. I'm looking forward to working with Mauricio to help him reach his potential."

Pineda, 22, was a member of the Fire's youth academy team that won the U.S. Soccer Development Academy national championship in 2015. He played four years at North Carolina, where he scored 17 goals and had eight assists in 79

appearances at midfield and defense and served as the Tar Heels' captain last season.

Pineda was a preseason MAC Hermann Trophy watchlist candidate before his final college season, and Major League Soccer rated Pineda as one of the top 10 prospects coming out of college. He was a first-team All-ACC player the last two seasons.

"I'm so happy to sign my first professional contract with the Fire," Pineda said in a statement. "I joined the club when I was 10 years old and have been dreaming of playing for the Fire since then. I can't wait to get started."

Pineda will be added to the roster ahead of the Fire's preseason schedule, which includes reporting for medical testing Saturday before a week of training starting Monday.

The Fire also are expected to announce the acquisition of Slovenian striker Robert Beric from French club AS Saint-Etienne in the coming days.

## Brandon Hagel could make NHL debut:

It was a little more than a year ago that forward Brandon Hagel became a free agent after going unsigned by the Sabres, who drafted him in the sixth round in 2018, and he started to wonder what might come next after hockey.

It wasn't like he was ready to quit the game, but having a backup plan is never a bad thing. So he started to look at classes and wonder where he might go to college.

That was a smart move, but it turns out he can hold off on his education for a bit. On Thursday, less than 15 months after signing Hagel, the Hawks called him up from Rockford, and Colliton said "it's possible" Hagel, 21, will make his NHL debut Saturday against the Maple Leafs.

"It's been crazy ups and downs in my career," Hagel said. "But I finally got here and I've just got to roll with it."

Hagel has a team-high 13 goals for the IceHogs, but he won't be asked to take on a scoring role when he gets in a game with the Hawks.

"He brings something similar to (Matthew) Highmore in his work ethic," Colliton said. "He's a great skater, he wins races, he plays with a little edge. He does have some skill. He showed he can produce in the Western (Hockey) League last year (with 102 points). We like that mentality in our team: relentless, hard to play against."

"He's got a little bit of rat in him, and we like that. When he gets in, I don't know exactly, but (we) definitely brought him here with the intention that he would get in at some point."

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# Ford dealership gets 40 orders for Mustang Mach-E – in one night

Imagine getting 40 customers in one night for a vehicle that starts at \$43,895 and reaches \$60,500. Steve Fuentes did. “And we’re up to 100 reservations now,” he said. “The Mustang Mach-E has had a tremendous positive response. This is one of the biggest game changers we’ve ever had.”

The owner of Sunnyvale Ford in the heart of Silicon Valley raved about response to the 2021 Mustang Mach-E SUV at a dealership located just blocks from Tesla, the rival high-profile electric carmaker led by controversial CEO Elon Musk. “I just think the market is ripe and it’s ready for something other than Tesla. Our all-electric SUV with a 300 mile range is super cool and functional.”

Fuentes noted that the high-efficiency vehicle will allow drivers to use special commuter lanes in the notoriously congested West Coast highways. “It’s like the e-ticket at Disneyland,” he said.

More than one in four buyers of the now sold-out first edition version of the Mach-E lives in California.

Yet response from other parts of America to the vehicle has been immediate.

Tom Nardone, 49, an entrepreneur from Birmingham, Michigan, placed his \$500 reservation for a base model 2021 Mustang Mach-E with all-wheel drive within hours of watching the unveiling on YouTube. “I’m interested in efficiency. I like the idea of a Tesla but I don’t trust Tesla. I would’ve bought a Chevrolet Bolt but it wasn’t very attractive. Right now I’m driving a 2020 Camry hybrid. I love it. This new vehicle will replace my wife’s 2017 Dodge Journey.”

Mike Van Camp, 36, an industrial metal fabrication contractor from Schererville, Indiana, chose the Mustang Mach-E GT nearly two decades after buying a 2001 GT yellow convertible. “I was looking for something sporty and considered getting a Jeep Gladiator. But this, it’s the first of its kind and I can say I was there when it first came out.”

Anne Thimm, 58, a retired analyst from Alexandria, Virginia, laughs when she talks about her love of Mustang.

“Back in 2001, the Mustang Bullitt came out and I just fell in love with that car. I walked into a Ford dealership and

the guy said to me, ‘Honey, don’t you think that’s a little too much for you?’ Like, really? I was just floored. I was ready to pay cash for that car. So I walked right out and went to another Ford dealership 15 miles down the road and got my Bullitt. I loved that car.”

She sadly parted with the Mustang to transport her four dogs.

“I mourn that car every day,” Thimm said. “Now we can get a Mustang to haul our dogs and also have electric. When I saw the Mach-E, I thought, ‘Oh my God, it checks all our boxes.’ It’s fun and it has plenty of room.”

Soon she will replace her Toyota Highlander hybrid with a first edition red Mach-E.

Matt Stanford, general manager at Varsity Ford in Ann Arbor, Mich., said he has totaled 70 orders for the Mach-E.

“And I actually ordered one for myself, a black GT,” he confessed. “I have professors who have ordered, doctors, Ford employees, folks looking for an answer to the combustible engine — people concerned about their carbon footprint. I’ve got folks in their mid-20s all the way up to their late 60s.”

This is new territory for Ford, said Stanford, whose uncles founded the dealership and whose family members sell cars. “Ford, instead of sticking its toe in the pool, jumped completely into the deep end. Tesla has owned the market. Tesla is just killing it. There’s a sexiness to the Tesla vehicle. It’s a status symbol,

almost a way of life for some people. It’s a sleek, nice looking car. So Ford’s going at ‘em.”

First editions are selling mostly in Carbonized Gray at 38%, Grabber Blue Metallic at 35% and Rapid Red at 27%. More than 80% of U.S. customers are reserving Mach-E with an extended range battery. About 55% are buying all-wheel drive. Almost 30% are choosing the top-model GT.

The Dearborn automaker doesn’t reveal the number of first editions sold but does note that the company has promised only 50,000 Mach-E vehicles that will be sold for the first 12 months in the U.S., Canada and Europe, and then other markets including China, Ford spokeswoman Emma Bergg confirmed.

There are four other trim levels besides the first edition. A potential tax credit of \$7,500 will be applied to the prices below:

While some Mustang aficionados freaked out when Ford announced the iconic pony car’s name would be used on an SUV, many Mustang collectors loved the idea.

“I own a silver 2005 Mustang GT,” Nardone said. “I’m dying to get rid of that Mustang. It gets 12 miles to the gallon. This electric Mustang is going to be quicker than my Mustang GT.”

Van Camp, who drives a 2017 Ford Explorer for work, has been searching for years for the right car and all-electric didn’t play a key role in his decision. “I was definitely dead set on buying a Mustang and after I saw the Mach-E, I definitely knew I wanted that Mustang.

“It’ll probably be an evening car, a weekend car. There’s still a little trepidation about taking it on road trips. I’m anxious to see where the charging stations will be. They don’t pinpoint a lot around my area yet; I’m just outside Chicago. But I know I can go back and forth from my house to Blackhawks games because they have charging stations in their parking lot.”

With energy efficiency top of mind, now Van Camp is considering the idea of installing solar panels at his business, Van’s Industrial.

Carla Bailo, CEO of the Center for Automotive Research in Ann Arbor, said she’s not surprised by the rapid response to the hot new electric vehicle.

“We’re starting to see a new era in EVs,” she said. “They’re being seen as performance vehicles now. They really get off the line fast. They have great acceleration. Because of that, you’re getting kind of an enthusiast culture around EVs. Initially when they came out, it was more about the green side of things and saving the environment. Now this is being marketed as a performance vehicle.”

Fuentes said the potential for Ford can’t be overstated.

“This Mustang Mach-E is going to be so impactful,” he said. “If we’re getting this kind of response, and it’s a year away, you can only imagine and have to believe that this is the second coming of the original Mustang.”

While America is responding with enthusiasm, consumers in the Golden State continue to lead the way.

“California has been on the environmental forefront for decades and Californians are on the leading edge of electric vehicles,” said Mike Levine, Ford North America product communications manager. “Ford is committed to bring EVs to market that are exciting and meet the needs of California and the rest of the U.S. as well as customers around the world.”
